The right way forward

Our agenda will:

- Deliver savings that are genuinely available
- Avoid cuts in service
- Enable efficiency savings to continue being achieved in line with Gershon efficency targets
- Create minimal one-off costs that would be absorbed by existing budgets and investment programmes

A better financial case

We are confident that the savings available as a result of these new ways of working will be equivalent to the realistic aspects of the county council's proposals.

This equates to:

- Savings of some £6 million a year
- Transition costs of £1.5 million (as opposed to £21 million)
- A three year improvement programme that can start immediately

Work in partnership, look to the future, build on success

Much of the county council's unitary bid is based on assumption; our case is based on taking what we already do well and building on that success.

We have been working together on these ideas since well before the county decided to bid for unitary status. That's partly why we tend to score well when we get inspected - it's also why our local 'star' and performance ratings are better than most unitary councils.

Our achievements from working in partnership include:

- Above average CPA ratings in all the districts and improvements since the last inspections.
- A four star rating for the county council that reflects the quality of partnership working with the districts, especially in recycling and community safety.
- Above target efficiency savings of around £7 million per year.

- Beacon status for our joint work on community engagement.
- Customers First delivering a common approach to customer standards, that has achieved over £7 million of savings. We are now progressing towards a target of 80% of telephone calls being answered at the first point of contact.
- A joint Local Area Agreement for improving the quality of life for Wiltshire residents.
- An active Wiltshire Improvement Partnership, working on areas identified by the Government as the preferred way forward for local governance.
- Joint procurement and joint provision of 'back office' services.
- Joined-up websites, where information about all services is easily available from each of the councils.

Our proposals offer an efficient and effective way forward for local government in Wiltshire, without the cost and disruption of creating a new council.
