Also given the benefits to Network Rail it would be sensible to explore joint funding. It is possible that a footway could be provided as part of any scheme to install traffic lights on the A345 at the railway bridge, where the existing road width and alignment is substandard. Difficult to assess costs at this stage but looking at 6 figures. Because land acquisition is required the timescale is likely to be lengthy.

		The County is divided into four areas, which are the former district council areas. This area forms the former Kennet area which has a ROW budget of £60,000 this year. In a good year where the weather is kind and access is easy, the ROW officer visits around 10 parishes per annum. FREIGHT ROUTE INFORMATION

A) Information provided by Laura Gosling, Senior Transport Planner

Wiltshire's Local Transport Plan contains a Freight Strategy that seeks to achieve a more sustainable pattern of freight distribution that balances the needs of the economy, environment, and society. A key component of this strategy has been the development of the Wiltshire freight route network which is a two-tier system of advisory routes made up of strategic lorry routes and a supporting network of local lorry routes. The aim is to route long distance lorries where possible, on to strategic lorry routes; the M4 motorway, A303, A34, A36 and A350. As an aid to the implementation of the lorry route networks, a Freight Routes in Wiltshire leaflet was produced in 2003 and is available here: http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/parkingtransportandstreets/roadshighwayspavements/transportfreight.htm#freightroutes / hard copy leaflet.

The map informs HGV drivers of the most appropriate routes to use in Wiltshire. By using these routes it is hoped that drivers will reduce the stress of driving by avoiding unsuitable roads and localise their impact on the environment and local residents while still meeting the economic needs of the County. Over 10,000 leaflets showing the Wiltshire HGV Route Network have been issued to lorry operators to inform drivers of the most appropriate routes in the County.

The A345 is not a recommended route within Wiltshire's advisory freight route network and <u>the Council encourages hauliers and drivers to use</u> the preferred route of the A34 if possible. However, localized deliveries upon the A345 are to be expected and are not restricted. As the designation of the routes in the Wiltshire freight route network is only **advisory in nature**, this does not place any limitations on the rights of lorries to use roads such as the A345. Our Freight Strategy is due to be reviewed in the next 12 months so the Wiltshire HGV route network map will be reconsidered at the same time.

In addition, it may be useful for you to know that we have had requests in the past for freight management measures on the A345. The requests have been on the A345 between Durrington and Enford and the A345 at Manningford Bruce. We have assessed these routes using our Freight Assessment and Priority Mechanism, which allows us to assess all the requests we receive so that we can then identify the routes that are a priority for investigation. Neither of these sections of the A345 were identified as a priority in 2009/10. Further information on the Freight Assessment Mechanism can be found on our website at:

There are going to be a number of joint Local Development Framework and Local Transport Plan consultation events taking next year. These events will provide an opportunity for people to give their thoughts and opinions on what should go into the next Local Transport Plan which will include the review of the Freight Strategy. In addition, there will be consultation on the draft Local Transport Plan 3 in Spring 2010 which will also provide another opportunity for people to get involved.

B) Information re A338/A346 Working Group

The above working group was formed by the Tidworth Community Area Partnership and a report has been written about freight routes, mainly in relation to the A338/A346 but which also relates to the A345.

The report will be presented to the Area Boards of Marlborough, Pewsey, Tidworth and Amesbury. If the report receives their support, further consultation with other interested parties will take place. The support of the local Members of Parliament will also be sought once the Area Boards have considered the report. The report will then be submitted to Wiltshire Council with a formal request that the Council makes an application for the A338/A346 corridor to be de-primed. This would give weight, width, height and night time restrictions to be imposed on the A338/A346 corridor and other roads such as the A345. Once this has been accepted a detailed study would be required to determine location of appropriate signage to prevent LGV traffic from entering the corridor.

Further questions to Highways

1. What is being done to pursue the Strategic Signing Review and the recommendations but forward to the Highways Agency? There were improvements suggested to confirm the A34/M4 as the preferred route between Southampton, Portsmouth and South Hampshire

and Bath, Bristol, Swindon, Wales and the Midlands. (Source Wiltshire County Council A338/A346 HGV Registration Plate Survey Report August 2007

- 2. What proposals will be in place to prevent an increase in HGV traffic along the A345/A338/A346 when the Solstice Park Distribution Centre plans are approved?
- 3. On the Wiltshire HGV Route Network map there are local lorry routes marked from the M4 to Marlborough and from the A303 to Tidworth. The roads that are experiencing the most problems with in this area are "other routes not identified for through HGV traffic" so more should be done to prevent large HGVs using these roads.
