


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

Agenda Item No.	Summary of Issues Discussed and Decision
1	Welcome and Introductions The Chairman, Councillor Richard Britton welcomed everyone to the meeting. Board Members and Officers introduced themselves.
2	Apologies Apologies were received from: Councillor Julian Johnson Tracy Carter – Associate Director. Inspector Pete Sparrow – Wiltshire Police Louis Minchella – Dorset & Wiltshire Fire & Rescue
3	Minutes The minutes of the last meeting held on Thursday 26 May 2016 were approved as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.
4	Declarations of Interest There were none.
5	Chairman's Announcements The Chairman made the following announcement. The Community Policing item planned for this meeting had been cancelled due to the unavailability of the new Police Sector Inspector; Pete Sparrow. Inspector David Minty had been promoted to Superintendant and would be running the Devizes communications centre. The board looked forward to welcoming Inspector Sparrow at the next meeting, where he would present the Community Policing item.

7 Report on issues facing the community as a whole

The Board noted the written updates attached to the agenda and received the following verbal updates:

Police – Matt Holland and Tina Roylance

In addition to the written report attached to the agenda, PC Matt Holland, Beat Manager for local NHP team explained that Inspector Sparrow was on leave, however he would be in attendance at the next Board meeting in September to give a fuller update on the new Policing model.

Matt would be the Area Coordinator for the area under the new model, bringing continuity and local knowledge to the post.

Henry Clissold based at the local Alderbury station had passed his Sergeants exam, and would be moving to Salisbury. PCSO's Tina Roylance and Matt Smith would remain in Alderbury and would become the main point of contact for the area.

The team would be looking to provide a written report to each parish council meeting. Although they would not be able to attend every meeting, if required to attend for a specific issue they would try to do so.

The Chairman commented that a police presence at every parish meeting was not expected, but a short message to the clerk to say "nothing to report" would be welcomed.

Tina had circulated the monthly neighbourhood reports for her patch, Matt would be circulating his shortly. Tina urged people to get in contact if they had any requests for her to attend meetings or events.

Questions and comments included:

With improved Broadband services in many villages, would it be possible
to consider having a regular 5 minute Skype session with the Police to
ask any questions? <u>Answer</u>: The Police use a similar system for internal
briefings called Lync. This is something we could look in to, to see if it
could work.

Fire & Rescue

In addition to the written report attached to the agenda, Cllr Devine gave an update. Everything was going well at Dorset & Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service. The Chief Fire Officer had recently resigned, this would take effect as of December 2016. A recruitment process would run from September with the aim of having a replacement in post by January 2017.

Wiltshire Council Update – Broadband Commitment

A written report was attached to the agenda. The Chairman noted that the Government was committed to delivering a minimum of 2mbs to every household. The Area Board had previously held a meeting to discuss broadband provision within the community area and those present were asked whether they would like to see this subject return to a future meeting for further discussion.

This idea was supported by a small majority in attendance.

Parish Clerks Coffee Morning

Catherine Purves (Clerk to Pitton & Farley PC) had scheduled another Clerks Coffee morning at her house on Tuesday 9 August. Parish clerks for the area were all invited.

Speed limit on the A36, Partridge Hill, Landford.

Cllr Leo Randall explained that residents had asked him to support their request for a reduction in the speed limit on Partridge Hill in Landford, to alleviate some of the associated issues with the current 50mph speed limit.

There was huge support from residents and businesses along the road and further support from the adjoining authority; Test Borough Council to the proposals.

John Martin of Landford parish council had taken up the matter with CATG in general for roads right through the parish, but agreed that there were problems with this section of the road in particular. The parish was trying to get support of the police to get these changes made.

Mr Garnett who lived at top of Partridge Hill informed the Board that the residents had organised a petition to raise awareness of the problems along the A36. There had been a 96% response.

Cllr Randall had spoken to the Cabinet Member who had advised him that this was a matter for the Area Board and therefore asked the Board to support the request for a reduction in the speed limit to 30mph.

Decision

Cllr Randall to produce a statement of ambitions and a list of the people in support, so that the board could take the issue forward.

Crossing at Petersfinger Park & Ride

Keith Rodger asked the Board to look into the safety at the crossing next to the Petersfinger Park and Ride as the crossing was invisible to vehicles turning left off the A36 at the traffic lights, making it dangerous for pedestrians.

Decision

The Southern Wiltshire Area Board agreed to look into the matter. First it would establish whether this site was within the Southern Wiltshire community area or whether it was in Salisbury.

Community Governance Review

Cllr Ian McLennan gave feedback following the recent decision of Full Council not to allow Laverstock Parish Council to be merged with Salisbury City Council, adding that he was ecstatic with the outcome. From the Area Board's perspective this meant that the population figures in Laverstock in 2020, should enable us to have another Councillor for Laverstock, which would strengthen our standing.

Carers Support Wiltshire

Diana James explained that a carer was someone who without payment provided care and support to a family member or loved one. Diana and her colleagues worked across the county, providing emotional support, visits to carers, help to put in place funded services, signposting to other organisations and work with partner organisations. Leaflets were circulated at the meeting, the Board thanked Diana and welcomed working with her in the future.

Laverstock & Ford Parish Council

Thanks were given to the Board members for their support and vote which secured the outcome of the Community Governance Review. The parish was now a rural gateway, with a parish council ready to continue to do business for its rural villages.

8 Theme Updates

Youth Officer

The Chairman explained that following the reorganisation of the Youth Officer provision across the county, there was still a vacancy in the south of the county. It was hoped that an update would be available at the next meeting.

Health & Wellbeing

Work had started in this area, with an initiative in Winterslow and an event in Downton, where they held a meeting of interested people, doctors, pharmacy, professionals and agencies on 14th July. Discussion took place where they thought about what we might be able to do and how we could help at a local level. Two ideas which came out of this were:

- The take up of the Safer Places Scheme.
- To produce a resources signposting booklet.

Following the presentation on dementia earlier in the year, Mick Brown and his colleague Angela Sillence of Winterslow parish council met to discuss a way to take this initiative forward, where they identified 3 factors.

They established a forum which met for the first time on 9th June. Ten people attended including representatives from the Woman's Institute, LINK and Age UK. There was a good exchange of information and ideas to take forward.

The next step was to raise the profile of the forum and hold meeting in September, to recruit volunteers and prepare for the Celebrate Winterslow day event in November.

The Chairman explained that the Board was planning to use the Winterslow experience to produce some templates for other Parish Council's to pick up and run with when planning their own events.

9 Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE)

Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) Manager, Blair Keltie presented information on this vitally important subject.

CSE had a high profile nationally and locally, with the Police prioritising work in this area.

What is Child Sexual Exploitation?

Someone taking advantage of you sexually, for their own benefit. Through threats, bribes, violence, humiliation, or by telling you that they love you, they will have the power to get you to do sexual things for their own, or other people's benefit or enjoyment (including: touching or kissing private parts, sex, taking sexual photos).

Background

Following events in Rotherham, Rochdale, Oxford and elsewhere; in March this year, the Prime Minister stated that CSE was a National Threat and that child sexual abuse was a national Policing priority. Police forces must prioritise CSE and this is reflected in Wiltshire Police Priorities.

An idea of the problem nationally:

- 88% increase in Police investigations since 2012 = 70K investigations nationally and no sign of slowing down.
- In 2012 there was a watershed with the Savile revelations and it is estimated that 30,000 victims of non-recent cases would come forward.
- Estimated 100m images of children being abused in circulation and 50K people viewing these online.
- 15 50% will go on to have contact offences.

The sexual exploitation of children and young people is a form of sexual abuse. It is not new. What is new is the level of awareness of the extent and scale of the abuse and of the increasingly different ways in which perpetrators sexually exploit children and young people.

Groomina

Grooming refers to actions deliberately aimed at establishing an emotional connection and trust with a child or young person in order to increase the likelihood of them engaging in sexual behaviour or exploitation. Signs of Grooming include:

- Regularly missing from home or school and staying out all night
- Change in behaviour becoming aggressive and disruptive or quiet and withdrawn
- Unexplained gifts or new possessions such as clothes, jewellery, mobile phones or money that can't be accounted for
- Increase in mobile phone use or secretive use
- Appearing to be under the influence of drugs or alcohol

- Being picked up or dropped off in cars by unknown adults
- A significantly older 'boyfriend' or 'friend' or lots of new friends
- Spending excessive amount of time online and becoming increasingly secretive about time spent online
- Sudden involvement in criminal behaviour or increased offending
- Sexual health problems

There are a number of ways in which local authorities, police and other key partners can reduce the prevalence of CSE.

- Prevent the abuse from happening;
- Protect young people who are victims or at risk of sexual exploitation;
- **Prosecute** offenders wherever possible;
- **Publicise** this activity, including how people can report Child Sexual Exploitation.

Area Boards

The Area Boards are a way of working to bring local decision making back into the heart of the community. They are a formal part of Wiltshire Council that try to find solutions for local issues.

By working in partnership with local communities, the council could achieve so much more than it ever could on its own. Leading to better services, better communities and a better quality of life for everyone in Wiltshire. Councillors had a key role to play in this, and should not be afraid to raise these issues within the communities they represent.

Questions and Comments included:

- Do you work in conjunction with the safe place leaflets which have come out? Does that include children? <u>Answer</u> – I have heard of that and will explore that option.
- There were 3 secondary schools in the parish do you liaise with schools and is there info available for other groups? <u>Answer</u>: A touring drama called Chelsea's choice was available to schools and did visit Laverstock schools last year. We are repeating that offer after autumn half term. I have visited many schools where I have briefed school staff. The Council had staff who worked with schools around PSHE and there were many resources available.

10 Fly Tipping

The Chairman explained that the speaker had not been able to attend. He drew attention to the paper in the agenda pack which set out the option of the Area Board having its own surveillance camera.

At present there was only one camera in the county, it had been deployed to a location in the south, but has not yet identified any fly tipping activity.

There had been 10 interviews under caution as a result of the department handling this with one prosecution of a prolific offender who would be prosecuted for 8 cases. A further 4 cases were under preparation with a view to prosecution.

There was legislation to allow fixed penalty notices to businesses, 12 had been issues and 5 fines of £300 each had been imposed so far.

Since the regulation the government had introduced a smaller fixed penalty notice for fly tipping. Fly tipping had increased 27% nationally but in Wiltshire the increase was only 22%, with this community area ranked as third in county.

Without the speaker present the Board felt that it would be beneficial to postpone the decision regarding the acquisition by the board of a camera dedicated to our community area until the next meeting in September, before committing funds to this initiative.

Decision

To defer the item until the next meeting in September when a speaker could be present.

11 Area Board Theme - Conservation

Stephen Davis, Head of Conservation at Wiltshire Wildlife Trust explained that the Trust was a membership organisation with volunteers at the heart and soul of it.

The Coombe Bissett Down Nature Reserve had the opportunity to purchase a further 40 hectares of land. An application had been made to the Heritage Lottery fund to purchase this land. The Trust had to come up with match funding and had appealed to the local community who had so far been very generous.

The Trust needed to find £185k of match funding. Coombe Bissett drama group held an event and raised £1000 towards the project.

There were up to 40 plant species per square metre. Areas of arable land would be reverted back to chalk grassland and opened to the public. The site backed onto the local primary school, providing an opportunity for the children to be involved with the conservation area.

Another site in the area was Blackmoor copse, which was probably the most important in England for butterflies. These were wonderful resources and really important for nature conservation.

The Trust supported health and wellbeing groups including adults with mental disabilities, and vulnerable children.

The Chairman noted that the Board had heard of all sorts of things taking place which involved health and wellbeing, there must be benefits in joining up these activities, so that they did not remain in isolation from other groups doing the same work.

Stephen agreed that this was something that the Trust would pursue.

12 Talk to us

People were invited to take part in an electronic survey of options about the community area and its Area Board.

Results of that survey are attached to these minutes.

Community Area Transport Group (CATG) Update

The Board considered the recommendations for funding arising from the last meeting of the CATG held on 22 June.

Decision

No.4449, C12 Stratford Tony Road – refer back to CATG for consideration as Coombe Bissett parish council had not agreed to contribute any funding towards this scheme.

Decision

No.4453, Homington Road, Coombe Bissett - refer back to CATG for consideration as Coombe Bissett parish council had offered a reduced amount of £800 towards this scheme.

Decision

No. 4536, The Causeway, Winterslow – To award £750 to erect a sign at either end of the lane, positively directing drivers to enter from the correct end, with Winterslow PC agreeing to make a contribution of £375 towards this scheme.

14 Community Area Grants

The Board considered two applications for funding from the Community Area Grant Scheme for 2016/17.

Decision

The application from Salisbury & South Wilts District Scout Council was deferred until the next Area Board meeting, pending the applicant providing further information:

- Which PCs have been asked for a contribution.
- Details of the rates of hire.
- When the lottery grant will be determined.
- Sharing a vehicle with other community groups


Decision




Turning Graphical Results by Question


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
1.) What do you find most useful about the Area Board?




9.) How important is it that we bring you information and updates on community safety and emergency planning issues affecting our area? (multiple choice)






10.) How important is it that we bring you information and updates on health and wellbeing issues affecting our area? (multiple choice)




12.) How important is it that we bring you information about changes to Wiltshire Council services that affect our area?




13.) How important is it that we bring you information and updates about activities for young people in our area?

Calls to Fire Alarms

This item is by request of the CAB;

Responding to automatic fire alarm (AFA) activations that subsequently turn out to be unwanted fire signals has been identified as a major draw on our resources, resulting in an inappropriate use of emergency crews and equipment.

So far this year we have **returned** from 2000 false alarms in Wiltshire alone, however it is important to state that DWFRS are never mobilised to a false alarm, that is just the end outcome.

Such activations cause resources to be diverted away from other, more important, activities, making them potentially unavailable to respond to genuine emergency calls.

Unwanted fire signals have a major impact on the Service and cause concern, as they:

- Render crews unavailable, creating the possibility of delayed attendance to genuine emergency calls.
- Create unnecessary risk to fire crews and members of the public when fire appliances respond under emergency conditions.
- Are disruptive to planned work, particularly training and community fire safety activities.
- Impose significant financial burdens on the Service.
- Have a negative impact on employers who release on-call firefighters working the retained duty system (On-Call).





- Cause problems for the occupiers of affected premises through lost production and general disruption to business continuity.
- Cause complacency among employees, reducing the effectiveness of automatic fire alarms by delaying the initiation of emergency procedures.
- Indicate other failings may exist within the premises' fire safety management.

A properly designed and maintained automatic fire detection system provides early warning of fire. However, a badly designed or poorly maintained system can become a potential hazard due to inappropriate or unwanted activations.

Management procedures should be set in place as part of an emergency plan. Suitably trained personnel should investigate the cause of the alarm activation before calling the fire and rescue service (with the notable exception of residential care providers who should not allow these procedures to cause undue delay in calling 999).

Staff at the Service Control Centre will always question the caller on what the incident actually is. This is to ensure we use our resources appropriately.

Alarm Calls are challenged from premises that include; commercial, industrial, retail, public assembly, agricultural and domestic low battery actuations. This is because the above mentioned Management Procedures should be in place. The call challenge will not slow down any response from the service as this is done concurrently as the call is taken, but it will help identify the right resources to send.

Seasonal Safety Message

A clean chimney can help prevent fires and structural damage to your property. Regular cleaning of your chimney or flue will eliminate the build-up of soot and clear obstructions such as bird or animal nests, leaves and debris. It is not enough to use a vacuum cleaner and you should make sure that your chimney or flue is inspected regularly.

Chimneys should be swept:

- At least once a year when using smokeless fuels
- At least once a year when using bituminous coal
- Every three months when burning wood
- Once a year when using oil
- Once a year when using gas

The following safety advice should always be followed when lighting an open fire or woodburning stove:

- Don't use flammable liquids such as petrol or paraffin to light your fire.
- Don't burn excessive amounts of paper or rubbish.
- Don't overload the fire with fuel.





When the fire is alight, check the loft space occasionally to make sure there is no smoke leaking from cracks, defective brickwork or mortar joints.

The Public Health team at Wiltshire Council have developed some tools to help raise awareness of mental health both in the workplace and in communities.

We are able to offer (to Area Boards and other community groups) a session which is ideally about 90 minutes long (but can be tailored to provide a session of about 50 minutes if timings do not allow the full package to be delivered).

The session takes inspiration in its approach and ethos from the extremely successful Alzheimers' Society 'Dementia Friends' programme and is designed to deliver community awareness raising, increase understanding and reduce stigma and discrimination.

The session itself is interactive and suitable for both professionals and members of the public. It involves some group activities and video clips as well as information about mental health and how to keep yourself well. It focusses strongly on how to improve and maintain wellbeing and mental health and uses tools like the Five Ways to Wellbeing http://www.neweconomics.org/projects/entry/five-ways-to-well-being

Sessions held to date (including Health and Wellbeing Board, Health Select Committee and Westbury Area Board) have been extremely well received and have generated some healthy debate about promoting mental and emotional wellbeing.

The Public Health team is now in the process of rolling this session out more widely to include:

- Training key members of staff to deliver the sessions (e.g. Health Trainers, volunteers)
- Delivering the session within Wiltshire Council for staff members
- Publicising the sessions for wider dissemination
- Engaging with local voluntary and community sector organisations such as Mind to explore the option of offering the opportunity for their staff/volunteers to receive training and deliver the session
- Producing a toolkit to run alongside the training (or to stand alone) which will be available from September 2016.

SOUTHERN WILTSHIRE AREA FLY-TIPPING INCIDENTS AND COVERT CAMERA BRIEF

1.0 Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report aims to brief the Southern Wiltshire Area Board on the recent fly-tipping incidents within the area and also to brief on the use of covert camera systems used to apprehend offenders.

2.0 Background

- 2.1 Fly tipping is the illegal deposit of waste on land not licensed to receive it, contrary to Section 33(1)(a) of the Environmental Protection Act (1990). The types of waste fly tipped range from 'black bag' waste to large deposits of materials such as industrial waste, tyres, construction material, hazardous and liquid waste. Fly tipping is a significant blight on our local environment; a source of pollution; a potential danger to public health and a hazard to wildlife. It also undermines legitimate waste businesses where unscrupulous operators undercut those operating within the law.
- 2.2 Nationally over the past two years, the number of reported incidents of fly tipping has increased by more than 27%. Over the same period of time, incident numbers have increased in Wiltshire by 22%, so below the national average. During 2015/16 Wiltshire Council received a total of 2,727 reports of fly tipping.

3.0 Southern Wiltshire Fly-Tipping Statistics

- 3.1 A review of the data for financial year 01 April 2015 31 March 2016 showed that the Southern Wiltshire Area Board had a reported 234 incidents of fly-tipping. This was the third highest number of reports from all area boards in Wiltshire over the same time period.
- 3.2 Table 1 below details the Area Board comparisons in the South (01 January 14 June 2016):

^{*} It should be noted that the majority of reports in Salisbury were for both commercial and domestic waste (black sacks) in the city centre placed out at inappropriate times so not technically classed as 'flyttipping'.

4.0 Covert Camera Surveillance

- 4.1 The service currently utilises one covert camera surveillance system for use countywide in trouble hotspots where fly-tipping is prevalent. This is deployed under the required legislation, council policies/procedures and Magistrate requirements.
- 4.2 The unit is used under strict controls where it can be demonstrated that all other investigatory techniques have been exhausted and any collateral intrusion is kept to the absolute minimum.
- 4.3 The service has previously been successful in apprehending fly-tipping offenders using such a system. Once an area is deemed suitable for a camera operation, detailed reconnaissance is conducted to ensure a successful installation can be achieved and maintain servicing whilst in situ. Such a system can be deployed for a prescribed period of time specific to operation requirements/restrictions.

5.0 Additional covert camera considerations

- 5.1 An opportunity to purchase an additional covert camera system for the Southern Wiltshire Area Board has been informally discussed. If this was formally agreed, it would be solely used by authorised enforcement officers within the Southern Wiltshire Area Board.
- 5.2 A recently obtained quote for a like for like system which is currently used totals £3,100 inc. VAT (this includes high grade batteries with 4 day life after charge). This figure can reduce by purchasing lower grade battery packs (2 day life after charge).
