Minute No	Summary of Issues Discussed and Decision
4	Welcome and Introductions
	The Chairman, Cllr Richard Britton, welcomed everyone to the meeting of the Southern Wiltshire Area Board.
	New and former Members of the Board were welcomed and invited to introduce themselves.
5	<u>Apologies</u>
	There were no apologies.
6	<u>Minutes</u>
	Decision The minutes of the previous full meeting held on 11 March 2021 and the meeting to elect a chair and vice-chair on 18 May 2021 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.
7	Declarations of Interest
	There were none.
8	Chairman's Announcements
	The Chairman made the following announcements:
	<u>Leader delegated decision</u> The legislation which allowed local authorities to take public meetings and decisions online was not extended past May 6 th despite national requests for an extension.
	Area Boards held before the 21 st June (when it is hoped the roadmap will move forward and lift current restrictions on the number of people able to meet in public) would need to have any funding decisions ratified through the Leader Delegated Decision process before funding could be released.

Fire & Rescue - Matthew Maggs invited questions:

- Was the establishment currently at full strength?
 <u>Answer</u>: Salisbury Station was currently two under full capacity, with two new Officers starting in August. They were extremely short of on-call officers at Amesbury and Salisbury stations. Anyone that was interested in becoming an on-call Firefighter and was able to spare 40 hours min a week and lived within 10 minutes of a station was urged to get in contact.
- How long was the training period for an on-call Officer?
 <u>Answer</u>: After clearing the HR process, the physical and medical aspects of clearance usually took approx. 10-12 weeks. Training consisted of 2 weeks basic training and other various specialised courses once on station, new officers were on a 2 year probationary period.
- What was the take up of the Safe & Well visits in light of Covid?
 <u>Answer</u>: Generally, there had been a huge increase in people's own fire safety. Local councils were on board and homes were now fitted with smoke detectors in all council housing. There was a backlog in visiting due to the Covid pandemic, however anyone wishing to have a Safe & Well home safety check was encouraged to make contact to arrange one.
- Large parts of the Southern Wiltshire community area were outside of the target response times, how did that apply in the Bourne Valley?
 Answer: Rural response times were 20 minutes, that was based on there being a fire unit available at the time of response. We can meet that target for the rural areas.

10 <u>Matters of Community Wide Interest - New Sector Inspector</u>

In addition to the written report available online as Supplement 1, the Chairman welcomed the new Sector Inspector Tina Osborn.

Inspector Osborn gave an update, some of the main points were:

- Tina had 20 years in the job, predominantly policing in the south of the county, and was now CPT for Salisbury and Amesbury.
- Reported crime figures for the last 8 months were below average, with a slight increase in March, however since coming out of lockdown they had reduced back down again. It was expected to see a rise once people come back out of the current lockdown.

- A plea for people to report crimes as it gave a better understanding of the true picture of the community.
- Criminal damage was still below average, even with an increase seen in Jan – March, the figures were still below average.
- Local priorities included, non-dwelling burglaries, theft from motor vehicles, vulnerability patrols, speeding vehicles – CSW back out in operation and off-road motorbikes/ASB.

Questions and comments:

- Chairman With the uplift of 60 new Officers, what would that mean for the southern CPT?
 - <u>Answer</u>: Once they start, we would look at our vacancies, and bolster our shifts in the south. We have had a number of Officers join the Salisbury and Amesbury CPT's.
- Charles Penn- Could we have clarification on the alignment of the CPT.
 We are a village in the Bourne Valley, are we still covered in the Amesbury area, where do our figures get included, here at Southern AB or at Amesbury AB?
 - <u>Answer</u>: Staff wise cover would be from the Amesbury CPT but I will include figures for your area in the next update for this AB.
- Was there a specific problem with catapults in the south west or was it a country wide issue?
 - <u>Answer</u>: No, it was not confined to the south, it was a national problem. We have had issues in Downton and Bemerton Heath, but the problem was greater than just our areas, the legislation did not cover catapults so it would be great to have that changed.
- There appeared to be an increase of the use of e-scooters, it was not a good idea to have these unlicensed vehicles on pavements and roads. <u>Answer</u>: Officers were trying to educate people on e-scooters. Whilst it was ok to hire one, it was not legal to purchase one, and this was what we needed to get across to people. It did not sit comfortably with me, that here are these powerful scooters being used on the pavements.
- In Alderbury there had been an increase in ASB, thank you for contacting our PC to advise how we could combat this.
- Cllr R Clewer As Leader of the Council, I would be happy to look into the possibility of a Public Space Protection Order to combat the catapult issue.
 - <u>Answer</u>: I would welcome your help on that, we can get together out of this meeting to discuss that further.

11 Housing Needs Surveys

The Board received a presentation on the approach to determining affordable housing needs in rural areas, from Rebecca Lockwood Norris - Community Led Housing Project Manager and Laura Young – Residential Development Team

Manager. The main points included:

- This was a free service for PC's Survey undertaken online in two parts.
- PC's were involved in the process and act as contact.
- Timescale approx. 6 weeks from request to being online and then open for 4-5 weeks. Reports can take up to 6 weeks to be completed.
- Publicity material provided by Wiltshire Council survey also publicised through AB.
- The survey could recommend how many homes were required to meet local need in a parish and be used to contribute to evidence required for neighbourhood planning.
- It could not recommend how many open market homes should be provided or indicate the distribution of affordable housing where more than one village makes up a parish.
- The report would belong to the parish council.
- Housing requirement was tested through local plan and detailed the expected need for growth over the next 20 years.
- Housing need defined as the need of families or individual in a community who require public assistance to access adequate housing; the rural housing needs survey allows recommendations to be made in response to this need over the next 3-5 years.
- Community led housing where community are involved throughout the process and plays a long-term role in ownership, management or stewardship of the homes.
- Community driven development was important as it overcomes many barriers to the delivery of housing.

Questions and comments:

- Would a rural development on an exception site count towards a housing allocation emerging from the local plan?
 Answer: Yes
- There was an inconsistency between the approach you take in linking

adjacent villages in the same parish, compared with the local plan which separates the villages regardless to them in the same parish.

Answer: Yes there were discrepancies between the two.

- Your survey lasts 3-5 years and the local plan runs to 2026.
 Answer: Yes Housing Need is quite an immediate thing, it looks at the need now.
- Could the slides be circulated to Parish Councils? Answer: Yes.

12 Area Board Forward Work Plan and Priorities 2021/22

Karen Linaker ran through the Area Board (AB) Forward Work Plan and Associated Funding proposals which were set out in the agenda.

In March 2021, the last AB agreed to recommend a new Work Plan. The purpose of that was to steer work and funding in line with a set of local priorities.

The Board engaged with PC's and held dedicate meetings to consult with Partners and Schools.

The suggested top 6 priorities were listed as:

- 1. Our Community Matters encourage better use of the online noticeboard
- 2. Rural Youth Outreach projects
- 3. Village Youth Group support
- 4. Make a Friend be a Friend delivery
- 5. Health & Wellbeing Directory
- 6. Healthy Schools Project

The Chairman noted that there was an amount of overlap of priorities detailed in the Plan which could be grouped together and that the JSNA had also indicated there were higher than average levels of Dementia in the community area, so that would need to be looked at carefully.

Questions and Comments:

The action plan and the targets seem open ended – do we have enough data, and could we move to something more tangible?
 <u>Answer</u>: We would need to establish what the base line was, so we would need to do a piece of work to understand what that was as I am not comfortable we have the baseline.

Chairman – some of the work does not set itself to target goals, so setting objectives was an integral part of the early stages of many of these workstreams.

- Cllr R Clewer I would be happy to work with the6 priorities, but am nervous in how we make communications work, we would need to try and make some headway but also must be prepared to cut our losses if not achievable.
- When it came to finding Lead members to work on the priority areas, everyone has different skill sets. It would also be sensible to draw on our parish councils to tap in to their help.

Merv Quick stated that as the Wiltshire Neighbourhood Watch Committee member for the area, he would volunteer for the community safety role.

The Chairman thanked Merv and noted the support he had provided in creating the Community Safety Directory.

Anyone with an interest in volunteering to be a Lead on any of the priority areas to contact him or Karen.

The Chairman moved the motion to support the recommendations as set out in the agenda. This was seconded by Cllr Rogers.

Decision

The Southern Wiltshire Area Board agreed to:

- Approve and adopt the Work Plan
- Follow a rolling prioritisation process.
- Hosts up to 4 community engagement events in 2021/22, covering themes such as Young People, Eco-Friendly Villages, Health & Wellbeing, Parish & Community Group Networking.
- Appoint councillors and community volunteers to work in conjunction with the CEM to provide leadership and capacity for each of the Work Plan's priorities:
 - 1) Strengthening arrangements for village and area board communications and improving their impact
 - 2) Facilitate eco-friendly villages and projects
 - 3) Continual focus on maintaining a strong sense of community safety
 - 4) Loneliness and isolation of older people
 - 5) Rural Isolation of families and young people
 - 6) Youth Engagement
 - 7) Physical Health & Wellbeing
 - 8) Mental Health & Wellbeing

9) Support people living with Dementia

- Note the action list relating to Work Plan priority: Strengthening arrangements for village and area board communications and improving their impact.
- Prioritise its resources, including funding, upon those issues identified in the Work Plan.
- Requests the Community Engagement Manager to work with key partners, agencies and community groups to encourage them to consider where they are best placed to take actions around the priorities identified.
- That regular updates are submitted to the Area Board on progress made in relation to its own Work Plan.

13 Youth Engagement Update

Karen Linaker gave an update on Youth Engagement for Southern Wiltshire.

In Southern Wiltshire the offer for youth positive activities was mainly volunteer led. The provision had been hit hard by the impact of the pandemic. Old Sarum had a paid youth worker to work alongside the volunteer workers and was going strong. The other youth clubs would require some support to get back up and running.

The Board was part of a shared initiative with 4 other boards, the Rural Outreach project, which was about to commission a provider. An update on the progress of this initiative would be presented at the next meeting.

When restrictions eased, a series of fund days would be held.

So far only 4 of the 14 schools in the community area had signed up to the Healthy Schools Programme, a national programme.

A Needs Analysis would be run by the Community Engagement Team, to review of all groups engaged in youth support and activities, to have more knowledge of who the contacts were and where support was needed.

The Chairman added that this was such an important area of work for the Board. The efforts to engage young people in positive activities was vital in tackling ASB in the villages.

Questions and comments:

 The Healthy Schools Programme was a great example of how we could improve communication. It had been difficult to establish who the

contacts were at the schools. Answer: Chairman - We have historically had difficulty engaging with schools, it remained a priority for us. There was a youth club at Bishopdown Farm, run by the church, which now needs to be included in the provision for our community area. Answer: KL – I will go and introduce myself and bring that into our fold. Whiteparish also had two youth clubs, the village one and the church one. We would appreciate being in contact with Karen. 14 <u>Lead Member Representatives to Outside Bodies and Working Groups 2021/22</u> The Board considered the proposals to appoint Lead Members to the Themed areas, Outside Bodies and Working Groups for the Southern Wiltshire Community Area for 2021/22 report attached to the agenda. Decision The Southern Wiltshire Area Board agreed to: a. Appoint Members as Lead representatives to Outside Bodies as set out at Appendix A; b. Agree to reconstitute and appoint to AB Themed Areas and the Working Group(s) as set out in Appendix B; and c. Note the Terms of Reference for the Working Group(s), as set out in Appendix C Delegated Authority to the Community Engagement Manager (CEM) 15 The Board considered two proposals of CEM Delegated Authority as set out in the agenda. Following discussion Cllr McLennan moved a motion to increase the CEM delegated minor amount to a maximum of £200. This was seconded by Cllr Oliver. It was noted that all funding allocations taken under these CEM Delegated powers will follow consultation with Board Members and seek confirmation that a majority in support is present. All decisions taken in this way would also be noted on the next funding report presented at the area board meeting. Decision The Southern Wiltshire Area Board agreed: 1. That in order to expedite the work of the Area Board and to deal with urgent matters that may arise between meetings, the Community Engagement Manager, following consultation with the Chairman (or in

their absence, the Vice-Chairman) of the Area Board, may authorise

expenditure to support community projects (including youth, health and wellbeing and community area transport) from the delegated budget of up to £5,000 per application between meetings of the Area Board.

The Community Engagement Manager should seek the views of all Area Board members to obtain a majority in support, prior to the expenditure being agreed.

Decisions taken between meetings will be reported in the funding report to the next meeting of the Area Board explaining why the matter was considered urgent or necessary to expedite the work of the Board. Where a significant number of urgent matters arise between meetings, a special meeting may be called, following consultation with the Chairman to determine such matters.

2. To reaffirm the separate CEM Delegate Powers devised by the previous Area Board to devolve minor funding requests for amounts under £200 in between meetings.

16 Area Board Funding

The Board considered the funding applications as detailed in the reports attached to the agenda. Applicants in attendance were invited to speak in support of their projects and answer any questions that arose.

Community Area Grant funding:

Naturally Social, Wiltshire Digital Drive – requested £5,000

The Applicant, Kieran spoke in support of the project, to refurbish 150 laptops to donate to identified individuals and groups in need, in southern Wiltshire community area.

Questions:

- How do you identify who needs it?
 Answer: We are in contact with local organisations who decide where they go.
- Are the laptops gifted or loaned?
 Answer: It is a long-term indefinite loan including the virus software, we can then detect when the laptop is not being used so we can re-locate it.
- If we look at areas of deprivation, Southern Wiltshire does not come to mind before other areas such as, Westbury, Trowbridge and Salisbury. Did you see there being much demand after we come out of lockdown?
 Answer: We have already provided those areas with laptops. I agree that

the home working and schooling is fading out but we have also seen that providing technology to charities that work with dementia is very beneficial.

- How was the ongoing support handled?
 Answer: The laptops are wiped and upgraded before they go out. They have been donated from corporate organisations, so higher end kit and the support is offered by means of a simple swap of kit.
- What is your total funding need?
 <u>Answer</u>: We have a stock of 400 ready to go out, based on funding for parts.
- How will people be equipped with the training they need?
 Answer: We work with the charities which provide that and we provide the kit.
- I like the idea of connecting older people, but there are the routers and the wifi that is also needed in addition to just providing a laptop.
 Answer: We are speaking with Vodafone who help people in isolation.
- What is your target?
 Answer: The target over 3 years is 10,000 devices delivered (approx. 3k a year), with 300-400 in this area.
- Is the work done at cost or are you funding the labour?
 <u>Answer</u>: My guys are doing it in their spare time so we are now looking at volunteers and some kick starters to help. Those things would really upscale what we are doing now. No one is profiteering. We are only asking for funding for the parts. The National lottery are helping us with storage.
- This seems quite a green thing to do, recycling old kit rather than recycle it.

Answer: That was always a key thing.

Cllr Richard Britton moved the motion to award in full. This was seconded by Cllr R Clewer.

Decision

The Area Board awarded £5,000 to Naturally Social, towards the digital drive project to refurbish laptops for distribution in Southern Wiltshire. *Reason*

The application met the funding criteria for 2021/22.

My Salisbury, Community Journalism and Media Training Project – requested £4479.97

Applicant, Andy Munns spoke in support of the project to provide workshops

and training for community journalists.

Questions:

- What media outlets do you use
 <u>Answer</u>: We run MySalisbury.co.uk, it has had over 90k visits since
 August last year. I also have a good relationship with the people setting
 up Salisbury Radio, and have a meeting with them next week.
- Could you clarify the £3k listed as staff costs on the application?
 Answer: That is what it would cost if I paid for the trainers. I have volunteers experienced in the area of journalism who come to run specialised workshops. (Karen Linaker confirmed that including staffing costs in this way was permitted).
- What would happen with the purchased equipment if this organisation was no longer in existence?
 Answer: We would need to find another NFP company to take on the kit.
- I like the idea but worry what output it would generate.
 <u>Answer</u>: The numbers on the website have kept on showing an increase, the more we do the more people will come and share the pages. I could also provide statistics to show where the site visitors are from.

Cllr Ian McLennan moved the motion to award in full. This was seconded by Cllr Britton.

Decision

The Area Board awarded £4,479.97 towards the journalism project for those living in Southern Wiltshire.

Reason

The application met the funding criteria for 2021/22.

<u>Laverstock & Ford PC, Partridge Way Play Area – requested £5,000</u> Applicant Trudi Deane spoke in support of the project, to replace and refurbish the play area in Old Sarum.

Questions:

- Please clarify what contractor's welfare was on the application? Answer: This covered items such as the contractors Portaloo etc
- We have funded play areas in the past, but for for small parishes with no S106 money and no resources. L&F has had lots of development, there must be S106 funding to do this?
 Answer: We are taking on 6 play areas from WC, this is one of the first we are looking at refurbishing, there will need to be lots of investment.
- How much S106 money are you sitting on at the moment? <u>Answer</u>: I don't know.

- Cllr McLennan noted that it was a lot of money but it was tied up to the new development. The PC was taking on 8 of the worst play areas in Wiltshire, either closed or on the verge of closure, and this was the most deprived area of southern Wiltshire and has been for many years.
- Cllr Oliver supported all that Cllr McLennan had said. The area was disadvantaged, the L&F PC were working with the housing association to try and tidy it up, they had taken on a lot.

Cllr Oliver moved the motion to award in full. This was seconded by Cllr McLennan.

Decision

The Area Board awarded £5,000 to Laverstock & Ford PC, towards the refurbishment of the Old Sarum play area at Partridge Way.

The application met the funding criteria for 2021/22.

<u>Swaything Housing Society trading as Abri, The Good Grub Club Longhedge – requested £2310</u>

The Applicant, Nicole Abela spoke in support of the application to provide ingredients and training in cooking and nutrition for residents at Longhedge.

Questions:

- The application shows £1600 on account for food, was that a one off? Answer: We aim to run the project through the school holidays and use as much surplus food as possible, we then purchase the rest of the food. The project would run until December as a trial.
- The Housing Association had large reserves, why does it not pay for this?
 <u>Answer:</u> We do have a lot of money but that goes to building properties.
 We are employed to build up community projects and set up leads to continue with the projects.
- A chunk of the development is for market sale and the size of the organisation was a concern.
- I would be more comfortable if we had better feeling about its continuity and it developing into a self-sustaining project.
- There were so many unknowns to this, I would like to see the summary of results from the other areas where it has taken place already.
 Answer: It has run since 2017 in the other areas but was only for those on free school meals, where here we are offering it out to a slightly different demographic.

The Board was minded to part fund with the condition that the Housing Association contribute the balance to fund the project in full.

Cllr Britton moved the motion to award £1200, with the condition that the balance be paid by the Housing Association. This was seconded by Cllr Oliver.

Decision

The Area Board awarded £1,200 to Swaything Housing Society trading as Abri, towards the Good Grub project at Longhedge, with the condition:

• that the balance of £1110 be funded by the Housing Association.



Key messages:

- This is a serious public safety issue and landowners are responsible for dealing with it on their land.
- There is an urgent need for all landowners to identify ash trees growing alongside the highway, public rights of way and in public spaces that are showing signs of this disease and take action.
- Trees on private land away from public access can be left, the resulting dead wood, will continue to provide essential habitat for a range of wildlife including insects, nesting birds, roosting bats and a whole range of other small mammals.
- It is important that we replant our woodlands, hedgerows and parklands
- There is a range of local and national funding opportunities available for replanting
- Our ecologists and landscape officers can offer advice to landowners on tree management and replacement, including replacement funding opportunities.

Video:

The Ash Dieback <u>video</u> explains why ash dieback is an issue that ALL landowners in Wiltshire need to take action to address. It outlines the help available from Wiltshire Council and signpost to other national organisations that can offer advice and funding to plant replacement trees.

Background:

Ash Dieback or Chalara Dieback of Ash is a disease which is expected to lead to the decline and death of most of the ash trees in Britain. 90% of woodland Ash trees nationwide are likely to be affected over the next five to 15 years.

Ash Dieback is already affecting trees in all parts of Wiltshire, and the council, along with other large landowners is working to address the impacts of the disease.

In trees alongside the highway, rights of way and in public spaces, this can pose a risk of injury to people and damage to property. There is an urgent need for all landowners to identify Ash trees growing alongside the highway, public rights of way and in public spaces that are showing signs of this disease and remove or significantly reduce these trees in order to avoid risks to the public or to property.

Once infected, trees decline quickly, often dying within two growing seasons. Trees rapidly lose timber strength, leading to branches and trees falling.

The loss of so many ash trees will have a dramatic impact on our landscape, both visually and from the numerous benefits they provide. It will affect our carbon cycling and water cycle, will leave crops and housing more exposed to

the effects of weather and result in a direct loss of wildlife species that rely on trees and woodland areas.

It is important that we replant our woodlands, hedgerows and parklands with the most appropriate, alternative species of native trees and shrubs, in order to maintain the unique landscape character of Wiltshire, and to ensure that sufficient habitat continues to support the varied range of wildlife species that rely on these for food and shelter.

There is a range of local and national funding opportunities available for planting whole woodlands, or just sections of hedgerow with standard trees, or small copses.

Our ecologists can help landowners with land that could accommodate trees, to assess its suitability for planting and the most appropriate tree species.

The council is developing a Green and Blue Infrastructure Strategy for the county as well as a Nature Recovery Strategy. They will identify the existing natural areas of high value for people and wildlife, but also where further planting would be of most additional benefit.

Our ecologists and landscape officers are available to offer advice to landowners on tree management and replacement, including replacement funding opportunities.

Climate Strategy

This strategy has been developed after Wiltshire Council acknowledged a climate emergency and pledged to become carbon neutral as an organisation by 2030. The document has deliberately been kept simple to encourage a wide readership. The UK Climate Change Committee estimates that local authorities can influence one third of emissions in their area. This makes public engagement and buy-in from organisations and businesses critical to tackling the other two thirds – as well as advocating for strong government action. This high level strategy sets out our objectives and areas of focus while remaining flexible. As the world around us evolves in terms of knowledge, legislation and policy, technology and the market, we will adapt to take advantage of these opportunities. Detailed delivery plans will be developed, and in recognition that we are facing an emergency, we are already taking action on a number of fronts.

Our Natural Environment Plan - Green and Blue Infrastructure (GBI) Strategy

This strategy looks at the future for Wiltshire's natural environmental assets focussing on the need to address climate change adaptation and mitigation, halt and reverse biodiversity loss and contribute to the health and wellbeing of Wiltshire's residents.

'Blue infrastructure' means water courses such as rivers, lakes, canals, ponds and wetlands, while 'green infrastructure' covers plant life such as fields, woodlands, hedgerows and parks, and the GBI Strategy will set a clear vision, goals and principle to guide delivery through partnership working. Having a strong GBI will help mitigate against the effects of climate change through nature-based solutions such as, increased water retention in the land to

reduce the risk of flooding, maintain and improve biodiversity, and help to provide improved access to the countryside.

The GBI strategy will inform the development of new polices in the emerging Local Plan and other council documents such as the Local Transport Plan and set the framework for a new Local Nature Recovery Strategy that will identify biodiversity net gain sites (a new requirement in the Environment Bill).



Title of Report	Rural Youth Outreach Project

- 1. The full description of the new Rural Youth Outreach Project is included at Appendix 1.
- 2. The targeted project outcomes are as follows:
 - Improved level of engagement with young people, targeting a reduction in isolation of young people in rural areas.
 - Identification of young people with issues around mental health, educational attainment and physical health issues and signposting to appropriate activities and support.
 - Increased and strengthened community led activity provision, with stronger communications channels between providers and partners across the communities.
- 3. Community First has been selected to deliver this project in the following community areas: Southern Wiltshire, Amesbury, Tidworth, Pewsey and Warminster.
- 4. Progress to date includes:
 - (a) Discussions between Community First officers, Cllr Richard Britton, Cllr lan McLennan and the Community Engagement Manager to inform the initial research phase, where the objective will be to: map and gap where the issues are and which young people need to be targeted and how.
 - (b) These discussions have also taken into account the feedback recorded at Appendix 2 from the 1st July 2021 Youth Opportunities area board event. Key aspects from this that we hope to take forward are:
 - Explore the scope to fund additional professional youth worker support
 - The need to ensure young people themselves continue to shape the area board's youth offer (this will be helped by the Autumn 2021 Youth Survey)
 - The potential to re-start a new youth committee to facilitate the youth 'voice'

- Consider the re-start of a leisure credit scheme, especially to facilitate youth involvement in village work days (i.e. footpath work or village hall painting work etc)
- A day of activities at a local venue, e.g. Hazel Hill Wood, Farley or at <u>Cameron's Cottage (cameronbespolka.com)</u> in Nomansland
- Future collaborations and activity programmes with the Youth Team at the New Forest National Park Authority
- (c) An interim report on the RYOP will be submitted to the area board in December 2021.

Recommendation

That this update is noted, with part of the aim of this project being to identify what further funding might be needed to continue this work in subsequent years.

Background

The Area Boards in Amesbury, Pewsey, Southern Wiltshire, Tidworth and Warminster identified a need to increase engagement and opportunities for young people within their respective rural communities. Data and evidence that the boards reviewed highlighted that there were limited community led activity providers operating in the rural areas and that there was little variety of opportunities for young people. Transport and physical access to activities created another barrier for young people to participate in positive activities.

The respective Community Engagement Managers for the 5 areas worked with colleagues from Children's Services, Communities and Neighbourhoods as well as external partners to develop a project to target rural youth engagement and activity provision. All 5 of the Area Boards supported the project brief setting asides £5,000 per board for its delivery.

Project aims

The project aims to identify a selected specialist youth provider to work across all 5 community areas to develop a stronger offer of positive activities, especially aimed at those young people at risk. The programme will compliment and strengthen what already exists, address need and develop local ownership. The initial 12-month programme will undertake research, implementation and review stages, with significant focus on ensuring that the project has a sustainable future past the initial period. The targeted project outcomes are as follows:

- Improved level of engagement with young people, targeting a reduction in isolation of young people in rural areas.
- Identification of young people with issues around mental health, educational attainment and physical health issues and signposting to appropriate activities and support.
- Increased and strengthened community led activity provision, with stronger communications channels between providers and partners across the communities.

Current position

Community First have successfully been awarded the 12-month grant (£25,000) to undertake this programme, following a procurement process. Members of the Community Engagement team are due to meet with representatives from Community First week commencing 12th July. Community First have set out a delivery programme that utilises their Youth Consultants and the Youth Action Wiltshire arm of their delivery service to develop sustainable activity provision across the rural areas.

The Community Engagement Managers along with Community First will be developing a comprehensive communications plan and will continue to link this project with colleagues from across the council. A particular focus will remain with ensuring that Children's Services are involved and informed of the developments and findings of this project. Frequent assessment and a comprehensive evaluation of the project will take place which will include any recommendations for further action.



1. Purpose of the report:

Councillors are asked to agree the allocation of Youth Club Funding for 2021-22

2. Main Considerations

- (i) The 2021-2022 youth budget has £19k remaining.
- (ii) The following 2 options are for the area board to consider in agreeing the allocation of this fund. These options are based on feedback from the leaders and young people at Winterslow, Whiteparish and Old Sarum youth clubs. The clubs have benefitted from and enjoyed the activities delivered by District Sports, Boomsatsuma and Any Body Can Cook, in previous years, and in 2019/20 also requested (and thoroughly enjoyed) a new Bubble Football activity.

Option 1 – 50% commissioned providers / 50 % reserved fund Option 2 – 33% commissioned providers / 66% reserved fund

- (iii) The board will observe that the proposal is to facilitate a reserved fund in 2021/22 for other grant requests, as the Community Engagement Manager is confident of the submission of these, and to make possible the objective of further broadening the overall offer. This reserved fund could, for example, cater for:
 - outdoor learning days provided by the Wiltshire Outdoor Learning Team or Oxenwood Outdoor Learning Team
 - new ideas for new projects and activities arising in year (particularly responding to the findings of the Autumn 2021 Youth Survey)
 - reserve for youth club leader support
 - new ideas and opportunities to support youth activities in the 5 new parishes
 - reserve for events, projects, or support associated with the Rural Youth Outreach Project

3. Youth Clubs

- i. At the time of publishing this report, the only up and running village led youth club is Old Sarum Youth Club, but the hope is for Whiteparish Youth Group and Winterslow Youth Zone to be up and running in the Autumn.
- ii. As an area board we have always tried to fund a menu of 'off the shelf' activities for the village led youth clubs, and perhaps even more so this year, this offer is needed, especially to help Winterslow and Whiteparish get going.

4. Rural Youth Outreach Project (RYOP)

- i. This project has been explained in a separate report.
- ii. This project aims to reach out to those young people not engaged for whatever reason in positive activities, and to strengthen the existing infrastructure of youth activities in Southern Wiltshire. Ideally this infrastructure would extend (perhaps in a more targeted way) its reach to young people not currently engaged.
- iii. Consequently, there is a reasonable expectation that the RYOP will stimulate new activities, possibly new youth clubs, and call upon area board funding to support this.

4. Recommendation

That councillors agree option 1 or 2 as the funding model for youth activities in 2021/22

- 1. The Area Board agreed a new Work Plan to steer its work at the May 2021 meeting.
- 2. Attached is an updated Plan for members to note progress so far.
- 3. Key progress against the top 6 priorities is:
 - (a) **Communications:** Encourage improved use of Our Community Matters:
 - (i) Baseline subscribed to OCM weekly newsletter: 500
 - (ii) Increased page views from April 2021 of 126 to 298 in August
 - (iii) Baseline contributor numbers: 30

To improve on (iii) in particular, the following is suggested:

- Target all village newsletter editors, voluntary and community groups to ask them to contribute (repeat this request every other month?)
- Could each unitary cllr ask the Chairman of their parish councils to consider posting once a month to the site?
- Could each unitary cllr aim to contribute perhaps 5 times a year to the site?

NB: please also note the update below from My Salisbury, funded as part of the board's Communications priority earlier this year;

mySalisbury's website has now been operational for a year and has attracted over 45,000 unique visitors to it. Our initial small team of volunteers has published over 600 articles covering the activities and goings on of Salisbury and Southern Wiltshire – often these are positive news stories not covered by other local media outlets.

We have recently made contact with all the parish councils covered by the Southern Area Board by way of email to parish clerks. There has so far been an underwhelming response to these emails with only Alderbury and Laverstock and Ford responding. Both of whom are fully supportive of the project and will be providing a flow of news our way to hopefully increase awareness and engagement with their activities. A press release was also included for them to assist with promoting our activities, L&F are attempting to include in their next parish newsletter.

We have also announced our first workshop, with many more to follow. The uptake has been great with only a few spots remaining after only 2 days of announcing the initial dates and we are already working on organising a repeat session. Equipment ordering has begun, ready for the first workshop and we look forward to arming our volunteers with the skills and equipment to help take mySalisbury forward.

- (b) **Young People:** Rural Youth Outreach Project as detailed in earlier report.
- (c) Young People: Support village led youth groups to get back up and running, including Family Fun Days referred to in previous report.
- (d) <u>Health & Wellbeing: Make A Friend Be A Friend</u> aiming to start project in Autumn 2021, when more village groups are back up and running
- (e) <u>Health & Wellbeing:</u> Produce a local directory of health and wellbeing related activities, support and services this is still very much work in progress, and we have had an offer of help from the Silver Salisbury project team to assist with this
- (f) <u>Health & Wellbeing: Healthy Schools Project</u> –invitation to be issued to schools in September for an Autumn Induction session
- 4. A youth engagement event took place in July 2021, and we are currently consulting with parish councils on a date for a Parish Council engagement event in the Autumn. An opportunity has arisen to run two Health & Wellbeing themed engagement events for older people involving a local deliverer of Silent Disco's (this is the subject of a funding application later on the agenda). An eco-friendly villages engagement event will be organised for early 2022.

The Highways Engineer for the Amesbury CATG has previously advised the PC that concealed entrance warning signs are not prescribed in the Traffic Sign Regulations & General Directions, which govern what signs can be erected on the public highway and in which circumstances they can be used.

The PC have requested further advice as to potential options for addressing this matter.

There are no signs that could be erected to warn motorists of traffic potentially accessing the road from a private entrance. The two closest signs would be a Farm Traffic warning sign and the general exclamation mark warning sign with a blind summit supplementary plate. Of these two signs the Farm Traffic sign is the one that may potentially be of benefiting providing. This sign is intended to warn motorists that they may see farm traffic in the road ahead – this might cause motorists to think that there is a farm access ahead. The blind summit sign would be inappropriate in this situation. The summit is not particularly blind, and it is not certain that such a sign would lead motorists to think that there are entrances ahead.

It may also be possible to provide a small worded sign saying village hall to alert motorists to the access to the village hall, albeit that siting such sign will be tricky given the lack of verge opposite the village hall in which one could be positioned. This could be investigated further if there was support for this option.

More generally, it should be noted that if local residents (or the farm owner) have concerns about the visibility of their vehicular accesses then there is as much onus upon them to make

Milford Mill Road Traffic Issues Update on Actions from November 2020 Meeting

The current updates on the actions from the meeting are:

Traffic Survey Request

A traffic survey request form has been submitted for a survey to be undertaken in the vicinity of the junction of Milford Mill Road and The Meadows as requested by the Chair of the Milford Preservation Group. The council has suspended undertaking traffic surveys because of the national lockdown restrictions. Traffic surveys will recommence following lifting of the last remaining lockdown restrictions, currently planned for 19/07/2021. This survey will be part of the first batch of surveys to be undertaken by the council's contractors when such activities recommence.

Yellow Box Marking

A request for a yellow box marking to be provided on the A36 was submitted to Highways England (HE) in November of last year. A response to that request was received at the end of February. HE have stated that they would not support the provision of a yellow box marking at the location requested. HE's view was that the key concern to them was congestion on Southampton Road which blocks up the Strategic Route Network and that any measures they sought to provide on the A36 would be aimed at addressing that problem and the provision of a yellow box would not meet that criteria.

Whilst the issue can be raised again with Highways England their view on this issue is unlikely to change in the near future.

Extension of 20mph Speed Limit

The issue can only be considered once the results of the traffic surveys requested by Laverstock & Ford Parish Council are known. The undertaking of the traffic surveys are subject to the comments provided above.

Signing of 7.5t Weight Limit

The Vivacity sensor in New Petersfinger Road indicates that roughly twice as many HGVs are travelling along Milford Mill Road away from the A36 than are travelling towards it. This disparity is considered to be as a result of substandard advanced warning signs on the A36 of the weight limit. HE have indicated that they would consider allowing the erection of advanced warning signs of the weight limit on the A36 but the provision of the signs would have to be funded by Wiltshire Council (and/or others) and would need to be subject to a HE design check. The cost of which would again need to be funded by Wiltshire Council.

For reference the existing weight limit sign on the A36 Southampton Road can be seen here.

For reference the existing weight limit sign on the A30 London Road can be seen here.

Improving the signage on the A36 would be a reasonable option to take forward and should be the first course of action pursued.

Fowlers Hill One Way

The impact of reversing the one way on Fowlers Hill cannot be modelled within any of the existing Wiltshire Council traffic models. Creating a specific traffic model to model the impact of reversing the one way restriction would not represent value for money.

Technically, the one way system on Fowlers Hill could be reversed. However, doing so is likely to have minimal impact on the volume of traffic using Milford Mill Road. The attraction of using Milford Mill Road is to avoid the length of the A36 between College and Bourne Way roundabouts. Reversing the one way system on Fowlers Hill wouldn't change that. Reversing the one way system would likely only change the routes that people use to get to Milford Mill Road and result in traffic being displaced to other routes (i.e. Milford Hill).

There is only limited anecdotal evidence that traffic currently using Fowlers Hill is then going on to travel along Milford Mill Road. In terms of determining whether or not this is a significant problem the key factor is where vehicles arriving at Fowlers Hill are coming from. The one way restriction in Fowlers Hill starts at its junction with Fowlers Road and ends at its junction with Shady Bower. To get to the start of the one way restriction vehicles must currently travel along:

- Milford Hill > Fowlers Road > Fowlers Hill
- Milford Hill > Rampart Road > Tollgate Road > Fowlers Hill
- A36 Southampton Road > Tollgate Road > Fowlers Hill

Other than to avoid ad-hoc occurrences of localised congestion diverting off of Milford Hill or the A36 Southampton Road to access Fowlers Hill to then in turn access Milford Mill Road would involve an unnecessary detour on motorists journeys. It is unlikely that motorists are undertaking such detours in any significant volume. As above, if the one way restriction was reversed on Fowlers Hill traffic would likely just seek to use Milford Hill to access Shady Bower and then Milford Mill Road.

In the view of officers reversing the one way system on Fowlers Hill wouldn't be of any benefit to addressing traffic issues in Milford Mill Road.

If there was a significant local desire to pursue this issue then seeking to reverse the one way system on a trial basis using an Experimental Traffic Regulation Order would the proposed way forward.

Tesco Additional Exit

Works to install the additional exit from Tesco onto New Petersfinger Road are ongoing The works shown on the plan are primarily aimed at stopping vehicles turning left out of the new exit and travelling along Milford Mill Road. The works will provide a significant gateway to Milford Mill Road. The measures provided could be bolstered by additional weight limit signage and HGVs could be directed to use the Park and Ride bus access route to turn around and head back out onto the A36. Additional signage improvements to be considered at this location once works to construct the additional exit have been completed.

Project Summary:

We propose to develop a new Dementia Centre based in central Salisbury to serve the Southern Wiltshire area. This new, purpose-designed space will provide a high quality, engaging environment. It will be the "one-stop-shop" for all dementia services in Laverstock, Firsdown, Winterslow, Clarendon Park, Piton & Farley, Britford, Alderbury, Grimstead, West Dean, Coombe Bissett, Odstock, Downton, Whiteparish, Redlynch, Landford, Cholderton, Newton Tony, Allington, Idmiston and Winterbourne (hereafter Southern Wiltshire) - particularly to the villages. The plans include a spacious Day Club at the rear for up to 10 people per day, 4 days a week with an open plan kitchen, indoor garden, quiet memory lounge and office. At the front of the building there will be a reception area, a storeroom and three offices that will form the backbone of the new Dementia Centre. In addition to the Day Club, the Salisbury Dementia Centre will provide a base for our Creating Communities activities programme. The Centre-based co-ordinators will oversee a whole range of our activities, including. Music and Movement for the Mind sessions, Gardening Café and Muddy Boots outdoor exploratory events. Additionally, the Centre will also host representatives of our national award-winning Home Support Service (HSS) that provides trained support workers to help people to continue enjoying social contact and interests. They also provide a break to family carers for a few hours each week. Run by a team of care co-ordinators, they will stay in close contact with families across Southern Wiltshire and offer advice and support. Further support will be provided by our experienced Dementia Advisers (also based at the new Centre) who will keep in regular touch with families in the Southern Wiltshire area. They provide confidential advice and information to help people to understand more about dementia and to make informed decisions about future care, treatment and support. They can help identify available community services, make referrals and generally 'open doors' to available support.
