3.	<p><u>Minutes</u></p> <p>Decision</p> <p>The minutes of the meeting held on 4 July 2013 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.</p>
4.	<p><u>Declarations of Interest</u></p> <p>Councillor Andrew Davis declared that in relation to agenda item 11 – Area Board Funding – Community Area Grants – that he was a trustee of the Chapel of St Lawrence who had applied for a grant. Councillor Davis did not speak on the item but did vote.</p>
5.	<p><u>Chairman's Announcements</u></p> <p>The Chairman made the following announcements:</p>
5.a	<p><u>Wiltshire Core Strategy - Consultation on Schedule of Proposed Modifications (including SA and HRA updates); two ministerial statements relating to wind farm development; and national planning practice guidance for renewable energy</u></p> <p>The Chairman explained that the announcement provided information about the Wiltshire Core Strategy, which provided the planning policy framework for</p>

	<p>Wiltshire. The Core Strategy recently underwent discussion at a public examination conducted by an independent Planning Inspector.</p> <p>Following the examination hearing sessions the council has published a schedule of Proposed Modifications (August 2013) containing 'main' and 'minor' changes to the Core Strategy to give all interested parties the opportunity to comment before the Inspector completes his report.</p> <p>The consultation will take place for a six week period from Tuesday 27 August to Wednesday 9 October 2013 inclusive.</p>
5.b	<p><u>Current Consultations</u></p> <p>The Chairman encouraged those present to become involved with the on-going consultations which could be accessed on the Wiltshire Council Website</p>

7.	<p><u>Local Authority Responsibility for Public Health</u></p> <p>The Area Board received a presentation from Amy Bird, Public Health Consultant, and viewed a DVD about the service. Amy explained that the public health team moved from the NHS to Wiltshire Council on 1 April 2013. The team facilitated and promoted healthy behaviours, environments and practices to ensure populations remained healthy. They also managed infectious diseases and ensured health resilience.</p>

	<p>The following issues were discussed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · How the public are made aware of public health campaigns. It was noted that information about future campaigns would be published by the Council's Communications Team on a quarterly basis and copies of the publication would be made available at future Area Board meetings. · Updates surrounding the on-going issue of 'bed blocking'. The Cabinet member for Public Health, Protection Services, Adult Care and Housing explained that there was still a problem with 'bed blocking', however, the situation was improving and he was pleased to report that there were no delays in transfers from the RUH, Bath during the last week. <p>The Chairman thanked Amy for a very informative presentation.</p>
8.	<p><u>Community Area Joint Strategic Assessments</u></p> <p>The Area Board received a presentation from Amy Bird, Public Health Consultant who provided an update on the Community Area Joint Strategic Assessment –JSA - 2013-2015.</p> <p>Amy explained that this was the second round of community area JSAs with the first JSA being produced in late 2011 with community events in early 2012. The JSA for 2013-15 had been commissioned by the Wiltshire Public Services Board and had been presented to the Chair's of the Area Board at a meeting in June 2013.</p> <p>It was noted that the JSA would use evidence to understand the issues at a local level, make comparisons with 2011 and see where any changes had taken place, add new chapters around leisure and culture and would be produced in a more user friendly format.</p> <p>The Area Board were informed of some of the differences between the original JSA from 2011 and the current version. Some of the differences included a fuller executive summary for community events, making issues bespoke to each community and engagement with the Youth Advisory Board.</p> <p>Community events were being organised from January 2014 with an event for the Warminster area on 1April 2014 at the Civic Centre. There was a possibility that meetings could be organised for the outlying areas of Warminster if the local communities made a request.</p> <p>The Chairman thanked Amy for the presentation.</p>

<p>9.</p>	<p><u>Your Local Issues</u></p> <p>The Community Area Manager introduced her report including new issues since the last meeting, on-going issues and those issues since resolved. She invited people to contact her should they have any issues to raise. On Monday 21st October, the Clinical Commissioning Groups were advised that the national panel overseeing the implementation of the NHS 111 service has agreed our recommendation that the service goes to full service commencement on Monday 28th October.

Working closely with us, Harmoni has shown a steady and sustained improvement in performance over the summer, giving Commissioners confidence that it is providing a safe and effective service to our communities. As you are aware we initially had experienced some difficulty with the delivery of this service, but I am pleased that after significant hard work and endeavour by both Harmoni and Commissioners, we have reached this important milestone. Naturally, as part of the enduring contractual obligations, performance will be monitored and managed routinely to ensure that the service provided continues to be of a safe and effective standard.

Running up to and going beyond the launch date, there will be a range of activities to raise public awareness about when to call NHS 111 with leaflets and posters also being distributed in the coming weeks to GP surgeries and public and community spaces.

Army Rebasing Briefing for Amesbury, Pewsey, Tidworth and Warminster Area Boards

Background

In March 2013, the government announced its rebasing plans. The plans will see approximately 4000 extra troops moving to Wiltshire. As well as the troops relocating to Wiltshire, their families and dependents will also be moving to the county with them. These plans will inevitably mean the requirement for more services and provision of appropriate levels of infrastructure especially in relation to housing, education provision, leisure facilities, transport and health facilities.

November 2013 Update

- A monthly Newsletter was launched on 17th October 2013 to all Parish Clerks for dissemination to community through websites, notice boards etc.

- The additional 4,000 army personnel and their families are relocating mainly to Larkhill, Bulford, Tidworth and Perham Down.

- MOD development will comprise of:
 - New build for single living accommodation (SLA) within the camps
 - Refurbishment of existing SLA blocks within the camps
 - Additional mess facilities within the camps
 - Changes to the training area
 - A mix of new build and refurbishment of existing technical accommodation, including workshops, garages, armouries, stores and offices
 - Up to 1,400 new houses for Services Family Accommodation (SFA).

- SFA is likely to be provided near these bases, to meet MOD requirements and address Wiltshire Council's sustainability policy.

- Military Civilian Integration Partnership Board regularly meets at senior level to ensure there are good lines of communication and progress is monitored.

- Neighbouring local authorities (Hampshire County and Test Valley Borough councils) are involved in the plans.

- It is anticipated that MOD build is likely to commence in 2015 in readiness for the relocation of service personnel and their families the following year. This requires planning applications to be submitted from 2014 onwards.

- Prior to formal public consultation on MOD plans in the early New Year, informal community engagement will take place on 20 Nov 2013 at Wellington Academy, with static exhibitions of MOD plans in public spaces, where initial comments from the public will be sought. Further details on exhibitions will be given in due course. Input from the community will help shape MOD's Masterplan for the area.

- Wiltshire Council will be assessing additional civilian facilities and services (schools, medical, social, leisure, transport etc) that will be required as soon as the MOD determines, through the Masterplan, where it is to site SFA.

3. Performance and Other Local Issues

There have been several events during the reporting period including the Freedom Parade and the Warminster Carnival. Both of which were good natured and well attended.

Monday 21 October 2013 sees the launch of a new project called the Outbox scheme which is designed to refer youths and adults into boxing clubs throughout the County. Wiltshire Police Outbox has been commissioned by the Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon through his Innovation Fund. The funding will go towards start up and running costs for a multi-agency scheme to refer young people to boxing clubs and to support, guide and mentor them. The aim is that the scheme will give individuals a positive focus, reducing their anti-social and/or criminal behaviour. The nearest Club for our area is in Trowbridge.

CRIME & DETECTIONS (July 2012 – July 2013 compared to previous year)

Detections remain broadly similar to last period however there has been success in identifying and charging two persons with separate series of Dwelling Burglaries.

Violence against the person is still increasing and this will be a focus for the Town centre team

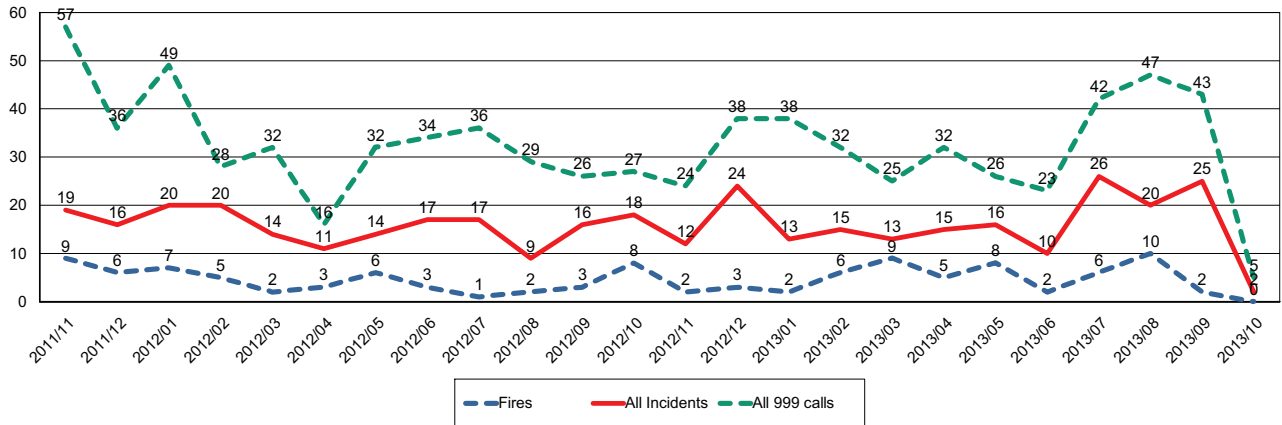

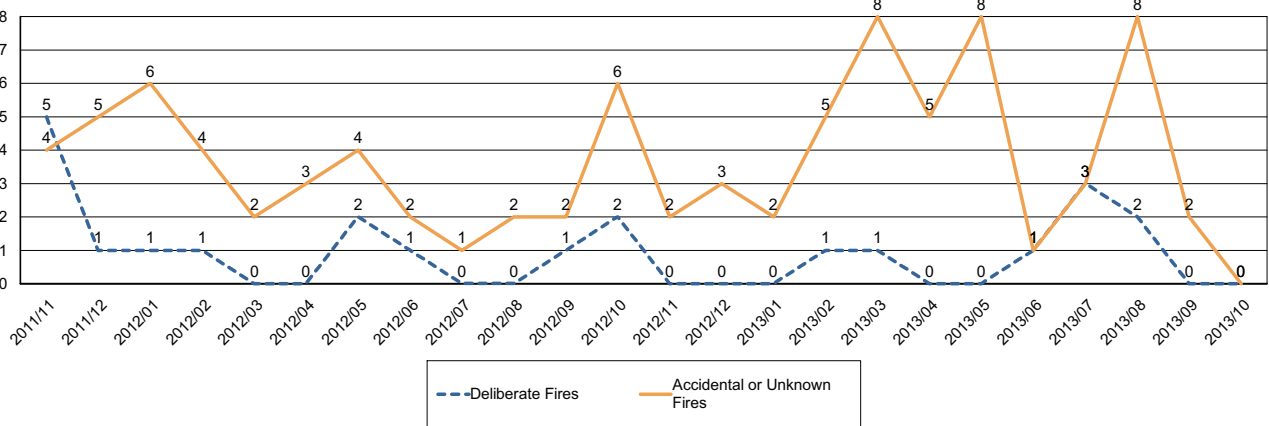

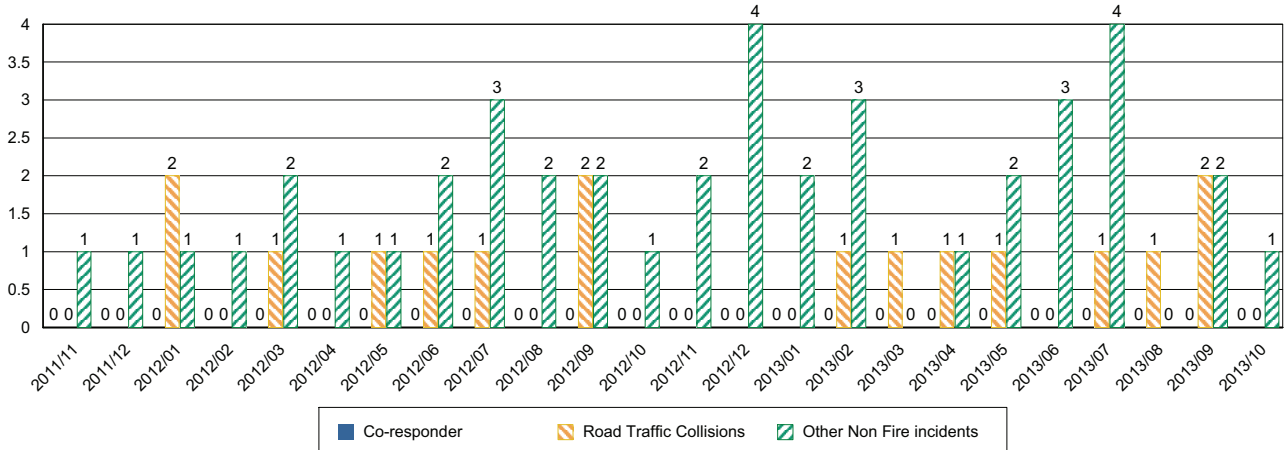
Incidents and Calls



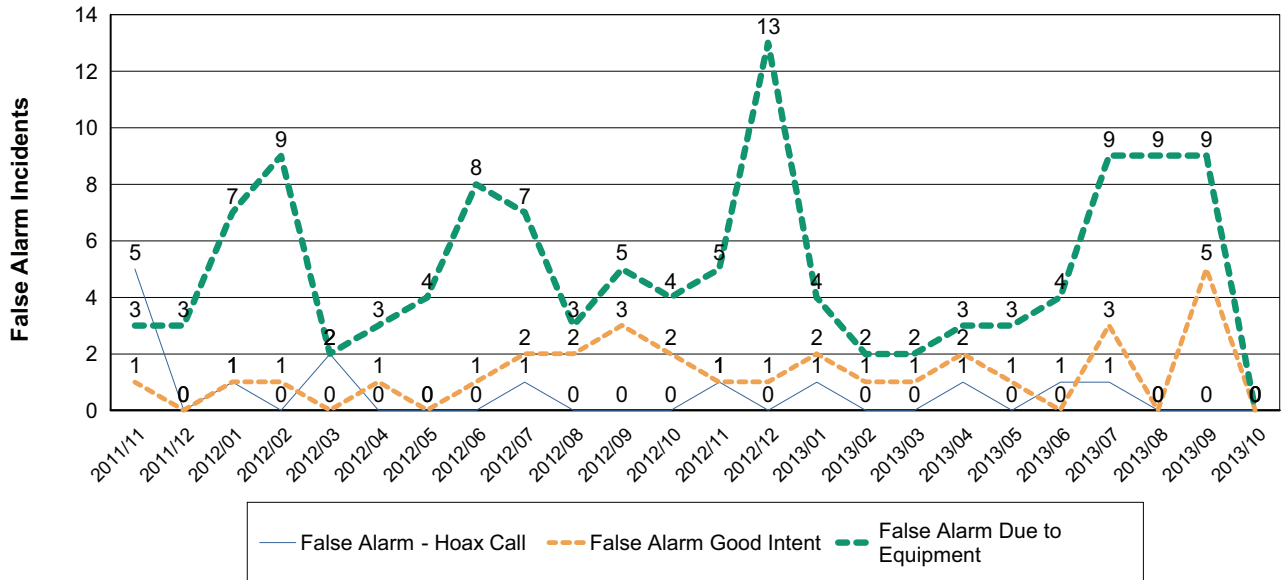
Fires by Cause



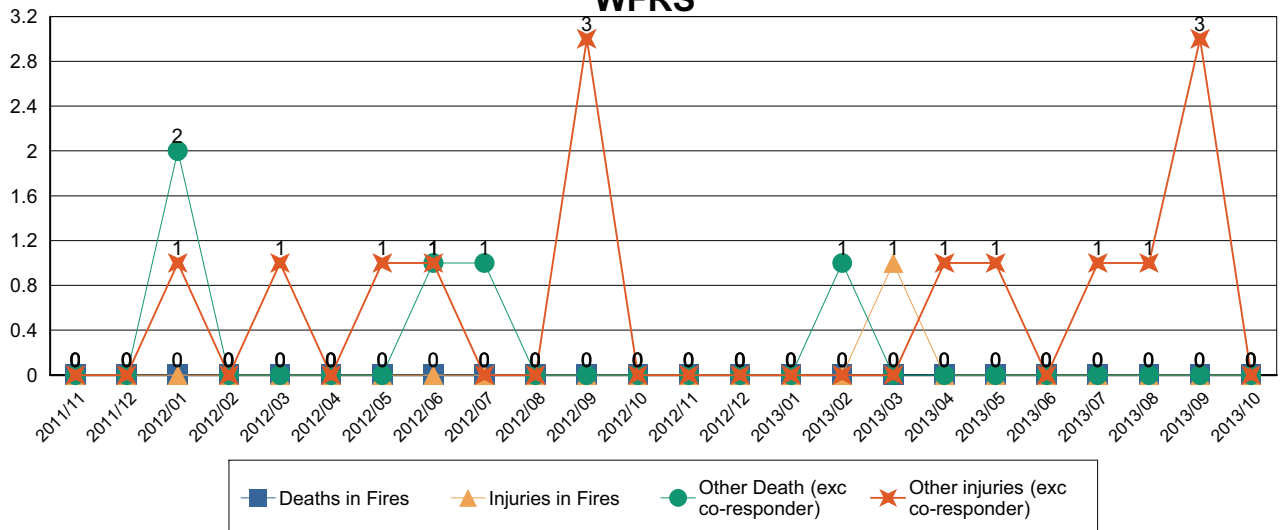
Non-Fire incidents attended by WFRS



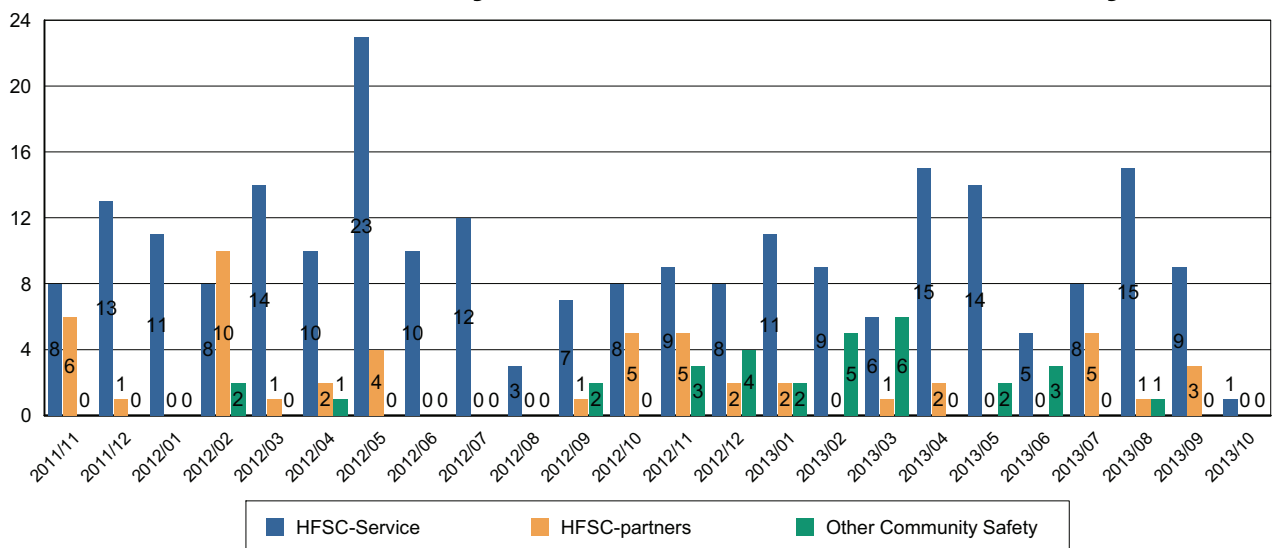
Number of False Alarm Incidents

Partner Update for Warminster Area Board

Name of Partner: Warminster and Villages Community Partnership (WVCP)

Date of Area Board Meeting: 7 November 2013

Headlines/Key Issues:

- Second tranche of 2013/4 core funding is requested from the Area Board for a reduced balance of £4144.
- The updated Community Plan is presented to the Area Board.
- Asset mapping work carried out by WVCP for the new culture chapter of Wiltshire Council's Joint Strategic Assessment.
- Development work ongoing for volunteering opportunities and the environmental theme group.

Projects:

- The Warminster and Villages 'Your Community Plan 2013-2026' is now published. The new framework covers eight themes that identify community priorities and includes supporting appendices that detail the consultation results, a local organisations listing and a media contact list for support in publicising events. These are living documents that will be reviewed and regularly updated via the website. WVCP is most grateful for all the support received in producing the final plan.
- Further appendices are to be published in 2014 that centre on volunteering and fundraising opportunities. This will enable efficient dissemination of intelligence to support local clubs and community groups.
- New JSA culture chapter is being developed by Wiltshire Council. Work is being carried out by WVCP to map local assets as part of this process.

Warminster Area Board Issues Report for 7 November 2013

New issues reported since last Area Board:

1. Obelisk – motorists turning right from left hand lanes

This was discussed at the Community Area Transport Group (CATG) meeting in September. It was felt that this may not be a serious issue for enough people. Heather agreed to investigate with Town Council. To be discussed at CATG 4 December.

2. Motorists cutting through Sambourne Gardens

Previously there had been bollards to prevent this. Highways officer to investigate. CATG 4 December

3. Woodcock Road – Boreham Road end

Petition received from residents. Highways officers setting up two metro count to check speeds.

4. Woodcock Road – Imber Road End

Issue raised via residents regarding speeding and difficulties at this end of the road. One house has had vehicles collide into it. Metro count to be set up to check speeds and Highways officers to view

5. Chain Lane – access onto Boreham Road

Residents find this difficult – requesting yellow lines. Will need to complete appropriate forms for Town Council and also our Highways team will view.

6. Victoria Road

Visibility for a resident is difficult. Streetscene to view hedges; Highways to view junction. Metro count being checked / organised. CATG on 4 December.

7. Chitterne Junctions – Knook and Tilshead. Highways investigating and temporary bollards suggested for Tilshead Road (CATG report)

Ongoing issues under investigation:

1. Central Car Park

This road is owned by Wiltshire Council but not adopted. Highways officers looking at options. For CATG on 4 December

2. Caravans entering Longleat via Geys Hill, Lane End, Corsley

Meeting held in September. Actions identified. All to meet again in November.

3. Dropped kerbs

Wiltshire Council liaising with Town Council regarding costs and usefulness of further dropped kerbs on route to Morrisons. For CATG on 4 December

4. Copheap Lane – speeding & visibility

Eligible for community speedwatch. Checking if scheme is viable and also Highways to view area to see if improvements can be made. Police also check fairly regularly.

5. Congestion in Market place

The Town Council (Development Committee) has requested that the Community Area Transport Group (CATG) consider lining or box junction markings at turnings into the Maltings and Wilsons and Kennard's yard. This would be to ease congestion. Highways to view this and check traffic lights are working OK at junction.

6. Carbuncle outside Batchelor's cycle shop

The Development Committee of the Town Council have requested that the carbuncle outside Batchelor's cycle shop is removed to ease congestion. Wiltshire Council officers are investigating this issue and costing options – for CATG on 4 December.

Issues Resolved since last meeting:

1. Condition of A362

This work is being undertaken to improve the road and associate drainage etc.

2. Signage in Warminster Town

Wiltshire Council has identified funding to improve signage in town centres. Warminster is first on the list to receive this funding. The work is being scheduled.

1. Purpose of the Report

- 1.1. To agree the budget allocation proposals from the Community Area Transport Group (CATG) for the Warminster Community Area.

2. Background

- 2.1. Funding for local road schemes for 2013 /14 is to be allocated by area boards through Community Area Transport Groups (CATGs).
- 2.2. The Warminster CATG met in September 2013 to prioritise projects which have been put forward for CATG expenditure.
- 2.3. The CATG discussed a variety of projects and have recommended 3 projects detailed in section 4 below for approval by the Area Board.

3. 2013 / 14 Budget allocation

- 3.1 The budget for CATG projects in 2013 /14 is:

4.1 Chitterne chevron boards **£800**

Following concerns raised by the parish council regarding inappropriate speeds on the B390 at western end of Chitterne by traffic travelling towards Knook, two 'Chevron' boards are proposed in order to provide greater driver awareness of the right hand bend.

4.2 Chitterne B390 Biden Lane / Townsend junction improvement trial
£1,500

The aim is to implement a temporary scheme at the B390 Bidden Lane / Townsend junction in order to encourage reduced speed for vehicles turning left and heading north towards Tilshead. The trial will use concrete interlocking blocks (see attached) to reduce the radius on the western side of the junction. If the temporary scheme is successful permanent changes to the kerb line may be considered by the CATG in the future.

4.3 Cycle crossing Warminster to Westbury (Upton Scudamore)
£3,700

The aim is to encourage cycles to use the lightly trafficked route of Upton Scudamore through Westbury Leigh towards Westbury rather than the busier A350. A new uncontrolled cycle crossing will link the un-adopted route from Westbury Road to the C35 which links directly to Upton Scudamore.

Total = £6,000

Remaining in budget = £13,283.92

The CATG recommends that the Warminster Area Board:

- a) Agrees the 3 projects listed in section 4 for CATG expenditure.

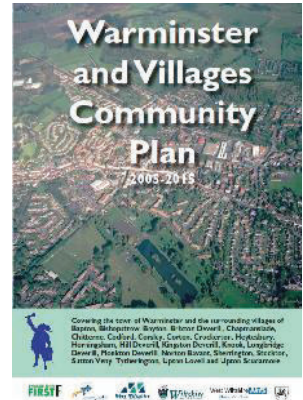

Area Boards take decisions about local resources and allocate funding to local communities. They will also give local people power to influence decisions made by its elected councillors.

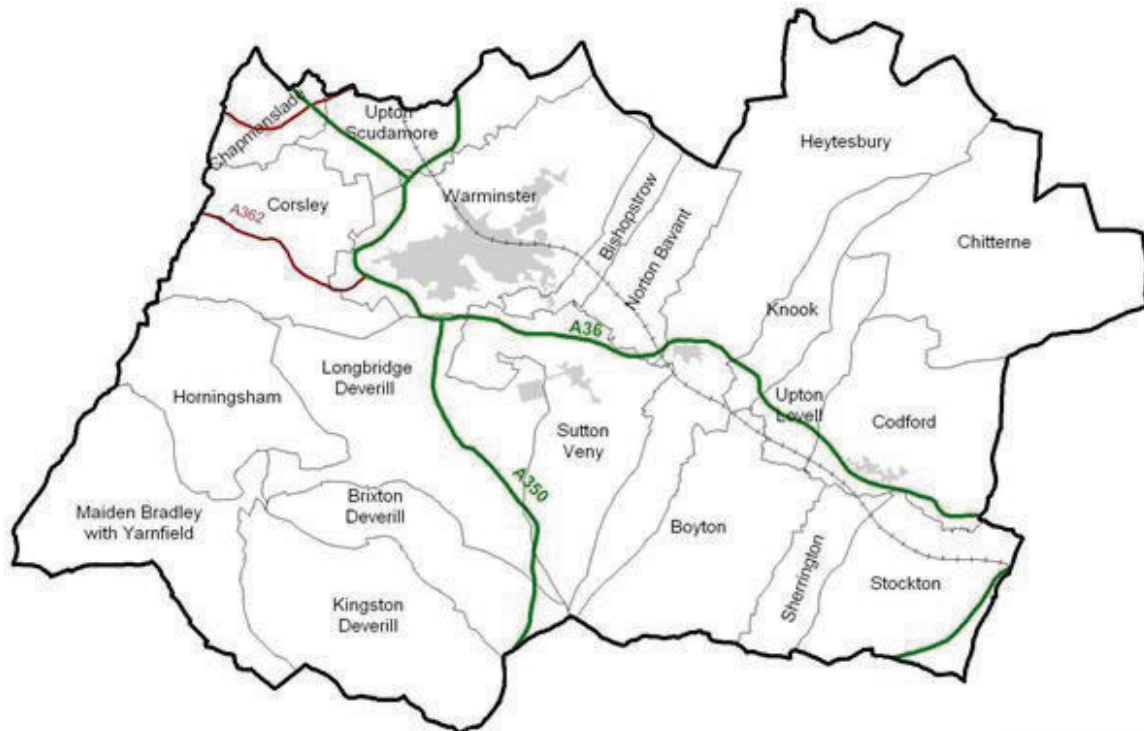

Beside statutory bodies, volunteers can take on projects where possible, and our theme groups which look at specific issues are open to anyone in the community. The Warminster Community area includes the parishes of Bishopstrow, Boyton, Chapmanslade, Chitterne, Codford, Corsley, Heytesbury, Horningsham, Brixton Deverill, Kingston Deverill, Knook, Longbridge Deverill, Maiden Bradley with Yarnfield, Norton Bavant, Sherrington, Stockton, Sutton Veny, Upton Lovell, Upton Scudamore and Warminster.

Warminster is an important service centre for the people who live in the town itself and its large rural catchment of villages that sweep from the Deverill Valley to the south, the Wylve Valley to the south east, the Longleat estate to the west and the fringes to Salisbury Plain to the north and east. The town is strategically situated at the junction of the A36 and A350 with direct links to the A303 and M4. The A36 Warminster bypass absorbs much heavy traffic. Warminster is serviced by a mainline railway and is within an hour from Bristol Airport.

Warminster was once a major cloth manufacturing centre and this former prosperity is evident in some of its impressive buildings with an aesthetically pleasing mix of Jacobean, Georgian and tasteful Victorian architecture. Most of the buildings in the central area of town are listed – over a tenth of the listed buildings and scheduled monuments in the county are found in the Warminster Community Area.

Some manufacturing still takes place in the town, such as Lyons Seafood and Dents glove factory. There has been significant investment at the Crusader and Warminster business parks and at smaller employment sites in in a further 10 locations across the community area. To the west of the town lies the stately home and safari park of Longleat, and together with the holiday village of Center Parcs, are major contributors to the local economy through tourism and employment.

Like many small market towns the effect of the recession has been felt with some shop closures in recent years. However a major attraction of the town’s shopping environment is a good mix of independent shops that add interest and colour to the retail offer. It also hosts a popular weekly open-air market and regular farmers’ market.

Warminster is home to a military garrison, which uses Salisbury Plain as a training area. There is a continuing awareness by the military authorities of how important it is to be involved in the life of the town generally, and indeed a tendency of many military personnel to make the town their home on retirement.

The Warminster Community Area is the location of many areas of protected land and AONB. The Cranborne Chase and West Wiltshire Downs form the southern part of the area and the Salisbury Plain Special Protection Area of Conservation borders the north. There are also 9 sites of special scientific interest and over 120 wildlife sites. The use of Salisbury Plain by the military has preserved it as the largest single expanse of unaltered chalk downland in Europe with evidence of human occupation for circa 5,000 years. The area also has more Iron Age hill-forts than anywhere else in Europe, with Cley Hill, Arn Hill, Copheap, Battlesbury Hill and Scratchbury Hill surrounding the town.



What is the Community Partnership?

WVCP is an independent, non-political organisation with a remit to identify and develop a common vision for the future of the Warminster community area. It is an open forum for community planning and involvement, and comprises local individuals, groups and organisations working with local councillors and the assistance of Wiltshire Council Officers, to improve the quality of life in the locality.

WVCP has developed and maintains a fit-for-purpose Community Plan which evidences the needs and aspirations of those who live there in the area. The Partnership is open to all who live or work in the Warminster community area. It is managed by a Committee elected at its AGM and the work is taken forward both by this Committee and a number of themed partnership groups. Engagement with the wider public is ongoing and membership of WVCP has expanded

Projects

- ✚ Economic and Tourism Group – monthly meetings. Their recent work includes production of a media contact list to help Warminster clubs and organisations publicise their events (see appendix 3). They undertake the collection of annual Benchmarking data. Action for Market Towns has also asked the group to do some work on a national pilot for enhanced benchmarking. Ongoing monitoring of town scene and empty buildings is carried out and their signage report highlighted work that is now being considered by local councils. The group works in close conjunction with the Tourism Group of Enterprise Warminster.
- ✚ Health and Social Care Group – quarterly meetings. The group monitors and shares information of local developments within the health sector, including Clinical Commissioning Groups and Healthwatch.
- ✚ Job Club and Job Fairs – events are ongoing with support from Enterprise Warminster. Local sessions run with job seekers and employers.
- ✚ Warminster in Bloom – now continuing under the Civic Trust, the group carry out regular work with volunteers to maintain various planted areas. More volunteers are needed.



Developments

- ✚ The new website for Community Partnership is now launched, where all the Community Plan documents are available to download, together with links to other stakeholders in the community. This is an area of ongoing development. You can also follow WVCP on Twitter.
- ✚ Initial discussions are taking place with interested parties in the community around the issue of volunteering in the Warminster area, with the aim to set up a new theme group under the community plan theme of volunteering and/or green recycling.
- ✚ As part of the JSA update for 2014, Wiltshire Council is developing new chapters on leisure, arts & culture. Work is being carried out by WVCP to map local assets as part of this process.

Public Consultation

Initial work to update the 2005 Community Plan commenced in partnership with the Area Board as part of the JSA event in January 2012. This looked at the findings of the 2011 JSA for Warminster Community Area in order to produce outputs that address the issues raised in each of the thematic chapters.

WVCP produced a survey questionnaire based on these results that was distributed to households in October 2012 and also made available online, which successfully generated over 900 responses by the closing deadline. Results of the survey feedback (Appendix 1) were presented at a public consultation in January 2013 where

themed group discussions confirmed the major priorities to be taken forward in the updated document. This extended process was essential to ensure local people were given every opportunity to add their valued views and comments.

The result of all the feedback has formed the basis of this new Community Plan that identifies local priorities, with revised theme headings that define community areas more clearly and strengthen links to the JSA. Cross-cutting themes also apply. The Plan is further underpinned by Appendix 2 that identifies organisations linked to each theme. Work is also ongoing by WVCP to identify sources of fundraising. This will enable efficient dissemination of intelligence to support local clubs and community groups.

Communications

- Wiltshire Council's Our Community Matters blogsite is used to highlight news and events within the Partnership and WVCP also actively signposts others to use it.
- The Economic and Tourism Group issue publicity each month of its activities, using the Warminster Journal and other media.
- Information and email circulars from other partners are disseminated by WVCP to interested parties for signposting purposes. Work is ongoing to strengthen this using lead people under the reconfigured themes of the Community Plan.



Community Plan themes

Themes: The work of WVCP has been structured around 8 key themes that link in the main to current JSA document that provides the statistical socio-economic indicators for each community area in Wiltshire, and allow direct comparison and assessment in a standardised approach. The themes have been amended from the previous WVCP plan for 2005-2015 to encompass all aspects that affect the daily lives of people in the locality. Naturally some of the issues will be cross-cutting and apply to more than one theme, e.g. inclusivity, young & older people, disabled, disadvantaged, carers etc.

Scope: The issues included under each theme.

Partners: The services, organisations and groups that have an interest in the thematic area.

WVCP vision: As identified in the original WVCP plan for 2005-2015.

JSA key issues: Local issues as indicated in the 2011 JSA for Warminster Community Area.

Background: Outcomes from the JSA consultation carried out in January 2012 and weighted by the WVCP survey results in December 2012. See Appendix 1 for the summary of the survey results by each theme.

Taking this forward: Key priorities identified at the WVCP public consultation event in January 2013 that form the basis of the updated plan. The major issues and aspirations are listed with suggested actions and partners to enable achievement. Other priorities and actions are identified that also must not be overlooked.

Community Safety

Scope: Personal and property safety, anti-social behaviour, road safety.

Partners: Police Neighbourhood Tasking Group, Police & Crime Panel, Fire & Rescue Service, CCTV Partnership, Neighbourhood Watch, Good Neighbours Scheme.

WVCP vision: *Create a community in which the quality of life is undisturbed by threats to personal safety or property.*

- Prosecute dog owners who do not pick up.

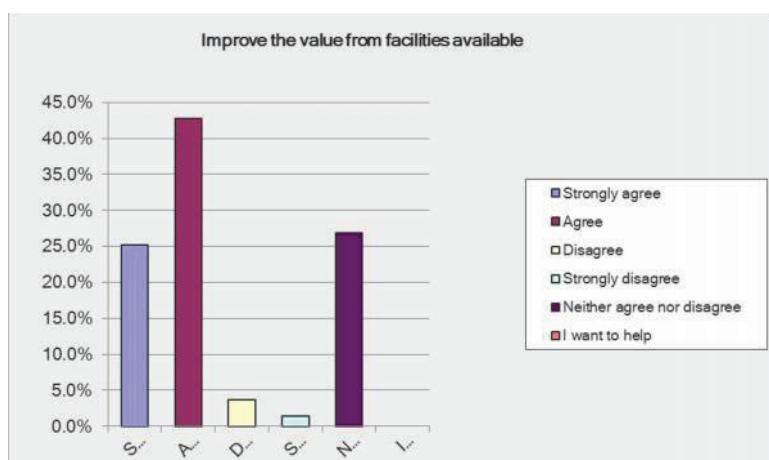

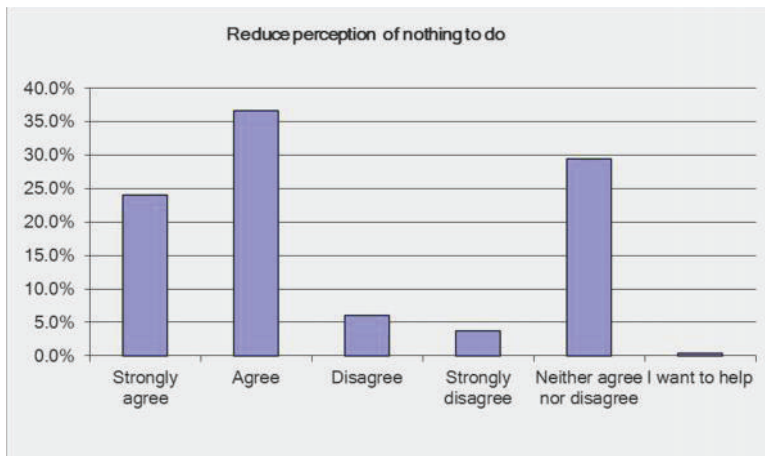

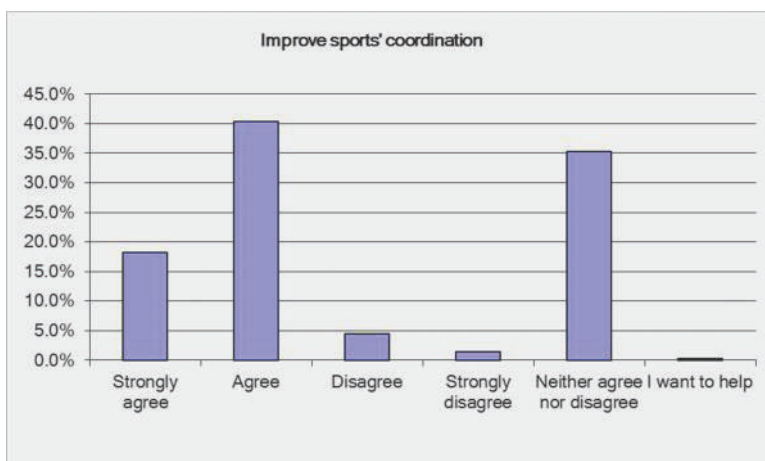

- Give up supporting playing fields with the tax I pay

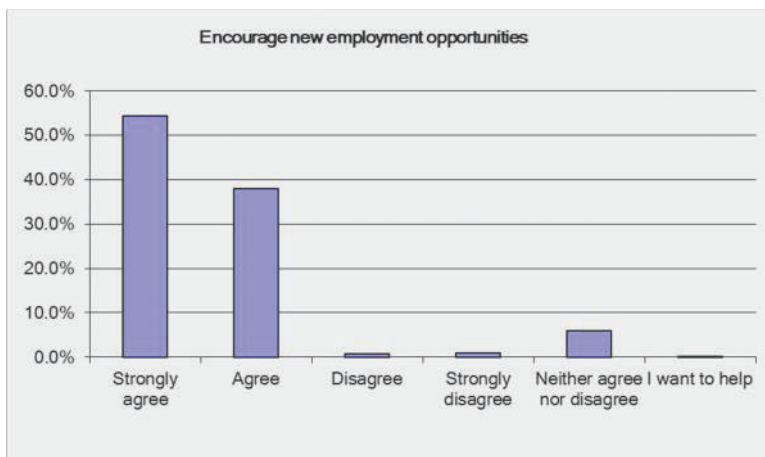

Negatives:

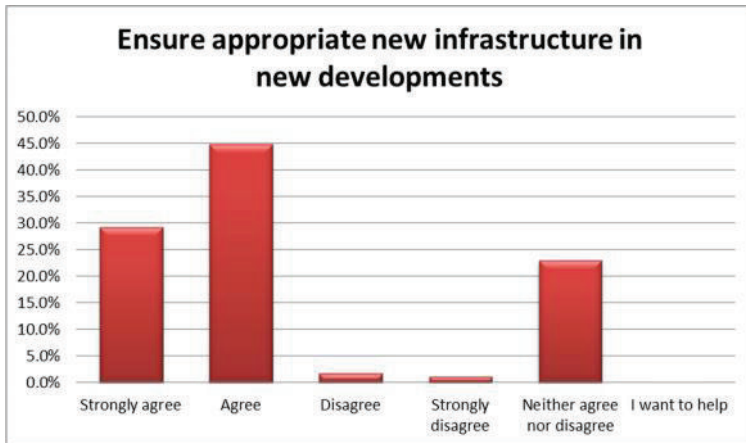

- The road after the roundabout at Longleat is full of potholes & is in a dreadful state – a cyclist came off his bike but luckily was only shaken. Pleas can something be done before any more accidents occur!



Comments

- I would like to see this applied to Warminster not just villages, speed at top of Victoria Road is regularly excessive i.e. 40-50mph (est.)
- I cannot see how this can be achieved without fixed cameras.
- Most are 30 mph where appropriate.
- Yes as long as it is monitored more frequently by police. You can put in lower speed limits but that will not deter those who already drive through villages at 50 miles an hour.
- There needs to be effective deterrents and enforcement.
- Enforce the existing speed limit in villages.
- In Sutton Veny where I live, I often see neighbourhood traffic speeding officers - it seems this issue is well resourced
- Reduce Deverill villages to 20 mph
- If the 30 limit is adhered to it is adequate
- Speed limit B3092 from Norton Ferris to Kilmington, also weight limit.
- Speeding in our High St Sutton Veny is very bad and bad parking restricting vision.
- I live in the Deverills – I strongly believe the speed limit should be a lot lower – thank you.
- Speed limits in villages too high. 40 mph through Deverills in parts. TOO HIGH.
- Upton Lovell A36 junction must have urgent attention. 30 mph speed limit & better mirror.



Comments

- East Street in Warminster is often choked. A talked-about one-way system also involving Imber Road may improve matters and also allow safer pavements.
- Warminster Town Centre is a disaster in terms of Traffic Management, particularly if trying to move from East to West through Town. Also the eastern end of Grovelands way where it joins the main road into town is dangerous, particularly when attempting to turn right from Grovelands towards Masefield Road.
- Traffic does not flow through the town at busy times. Do we really need the second set of traffic lights; these cause congestion.
- Very poor regarding Longleat traffic through Horningsham. Centre Parcs create a problem with traffic build up from the picket post roundabout. Especially on Mondays and Fridays between 2-4pm.
- Bishopstrow is a village that people drive through, often with little consideration for the people that live there. A further reduction in the speed limit and some signage to help drivers to be better at anticipation may help.
- Large lorries in Sutton Veny and along the Deverill Road disrupting life and destroying the road and verges on the junction High Street / Deverill Road in Sutton Veny.
- Upton Lovell A36 junction must have urgent attention. Traffic light option & new junction east of village should be explored as options before another dies.
- Please can we have a one-way round the Obelisk to help elderly & others coming out of Church St. Mews?
- We need to stop heavy lorries using the Deverill Valley road as a short cut to Mere or Gillingham. Amongst others, Waitrose lorries are offenders. They are too wide for the safety of other road users; we have to walk on these roads.

General comments:

- Before making any further “improvements” work out the implications, for example – Warminster High Street is a nightmare for transport users since the “improvements” – think things through!
- Drains no longer cleared or gutters swept – as a result drains blocked with leaves – potential flood risk.
- Sort out scruffy roundabouts as they give Warminster a bad introduction.
- Do away with speed humps they damage cars.
- The A36 is too small, too crowded and dangerous.
- With more people working flexible hours public transport doesn’t match shift patterns especially as many people have to work out of Warminster.
- Reducing speeding in villages & improving rural transport services – number 1 issues for villages.

Other issues to consider/discussion points:

- Many villages in Devon with high density traffic now have a 20mph which is quite fast enough. *Is this something we could consider for our villages?*
- Warminster high street should be pedestrianized. Would like shops to be pedestrian only area – there is a ring road. *Do you think this is a feasible suggestion?*
- Traffic lights needed at junction of Upton Lovell and A36 following fatal accident, and numerous near misses. *Do you have any specific areas of concern that need immediate attention?*

1. Background

- 1.1. Area Boards have authority to approve Area Grants under powers delegated to them by the Deputy Leader and Cabinet member for Adult Care, Communities and Housing (5 April 2013). Under the Scheme of Delegation Area Boards must adhere to the [Area Board Grants Guidance 2013/2014](#).
- 1.2. In accordance with the Scheme of Delegation, any decision of an Area Board that is contrary to the funding criteria and/or the officer's recommendation would need to demonstrate that the application in question has a wider community benefit, and give specific reasons for why this should justify an exception to the criteria.
- 1.3. The Localism agenda supports the ethos of volunteering and community involvement and the nurturing of resilient communities. With this in mind Community Area Grants (CAGs) should be encouraged from and awarded to community and voluntary groups.
- 1.4. The area board may want to link funding to local priorities, including those identified in their Community Plan, Local Area Joint Strategic Assessment and any other community based consultative work.
- 1.5. Warminster Area Board has been allocated a 2013/2014 budget of **£51,672** ([See Appendix one of report to Cabinet](#)) for community area grants, **£1,500** for digital literacy grants and up to **£10,334** for community partnership core funding.
- 1.6. In addition to CAGs and digital literacy grants councillors can submit an Area Board/Councillor Led Initiative. This enables area boards to tackle sticky community issues and/or community identified priorities. Cabinet have emphasised that they do not wish these to be used to avoid complying with Community Area Grant criteria or for filling gaps where there are council service shortfalls.
- 1.7. In support of the Olympic and Paralympic legacy, in 2013/14 the Warminster area board invites applications that encourage young people and people with disabilities to become more actively involved in sports, outdoor activities, recreation, arts and volunteering.
- 1.8. Applications of up to and including £500 can be made for a Community Area Grant, which will not require matched funding. Amounts of £501 - £5,000 will be required to find matched funding. The area board will rarely award more than £5,000. Grants of up to £500 are available for Digital Literacy projects.
- 1.9. New for 2013/14 is a single on-line application process for Community Area Grants (CAG) and Digital Literacy grants,

introduced to provide an easy step by step application process. The application process and funding criteria can be found [here](#).

- 1.10. Area boards will not consider CAG applications from town and parish councils for purposes that relate to their statutory duties or powers that should be funded from the local town/parish precept. However this does not preclude bids from town/parish councils, encouraging community projects that provide new opportunities for local people or those functions that are not the sole responsibility of the town/parish council.
- 1.11. Officers are required to provide recommendations in their funding reports (except in the case of Area Board/Councillor led initiatives), although the decision to support applications is made by Wiltshire councillors on the area board.
- 1.12. Funding applications will be considered at every Area Board meeting whilst there is money available.
- 1.13. All recipients of area board funding are expected to complete an evaluation form as soon as the project has been completed and provide receipts if requested. Groups are encouraged to up-load information and photographs about their project on to their area board [blogsite](#). Failure to evaluate projects will preclude applicants/organisations being considered for future funding.

2. Main Considerations

- 2.1. Warminster Area Board has been allocated a 2013/2014 budget of **£66,951** in total that may be allocated through Community Area Grants, Digital Literacy Grants, Area Board/Councillor Led Initiatives and core funding for the CAP.
- 2.2. Councillors will need to ensure that the distribution of funding is in accordance with the Scheme of Delegation outlined in Section 1 of this report.
- 2.3. Councillors will need to be satisfied that grants awarded in 2013/2014 are made to projects that can realistically proceed within

a year of the award being made.

8.1.1. Officer recommendation : Approve

8.1.2. This application meets grant criteria 2013/14 and is a capital project.

8.1.3. A technical assessment has been undertaken by Community First's Village Hall's Advisor. The assessment finds that:

- Costs are realistic
- The committee has a track record of delivering such projects
- Refurbishment has been carried out in stages to this 1972 village hall and free reserves are going towards this phase which the committee has raised.

8.1.4. The project comprises the wholesale replacement of the existing 38 year old mosaic wooden flooring that has reached the end of its design life. Piecemeal temporary repairs in recent years have extended the life of the old floor, but a new floor is now required. Various options have been considered and the most assured long term solution would be to install a hardwood floor.

8.1.5. There will be many beneficiaries to the project including the residents of Chapmanslade and the many groups that use the village hall. These include toddlers, younger people and older people. Many activities take place in the hall including sports and leisure.

8.1.6. The refurbishment of the floor fits within the priorities identified in the Warminster and Villages Community Plan in terms of culture and leisure and will also help to deliver the Council's goal of stronger and more resilient communities.

8.1.7. The total cost of the project is £16,000 and match funding of £11,000 is in place from reserves.

8.2.1. The officer recommendation is that £950 is awarded towards the Medieval Warminster Project subject to the following conditions:

- The application to the Heritage Lottery Board is successful to ensure match funding is in place
- The Area Board funding is used towards the capital aspects of the project; namely the CD Roms and the interactive display screen.
- A detailed project design including method statement for geophysical survey and any other fieldwork is developed and agreed with the Wiltshire Council Archaeology Service
- The project team should consult the Wiltshire Council Archaeology team Historic Environment Record (HER) and provide the final reports from all fieldwork to the HER at the end of the project
- The project team should work closely with the Wiltshire Buildings Record who hold the records of Medieval buildings in Warminster

8.2.2. This application meets grant criteria 2013/14

8.2.3. A detailed technical assessment has been undertaken and the results of this can be accessed online [here](#). The conditions placed on the grant above follow from the technical assessment.

8.2.4. The project will explore the early medieval town of Warminster. Little is known of this important heritage and the aim is to involve groups and individuals within the community in activities that will add to this heritage whilst providing learning opportunities for all. The materials developed will then be available as an interactive cd-rom and app. The cd-roms will be duplicated and given free to the community and will also play on a portable touchscreen based at the library. We are asking for funding from the area board for these two components of the project (CD Rom and touchscreen)

8.2.5. This project will be open to everyone and will help to strengthen a number of strong links within the community between local groups such as Warminster school, the Dewey Museum, the Warminster Camera Club and the local history society amongst others. The

project will involve local historians / archaeologists talking to members of the community about the town's history and will allow this modern interpretation to be used by local schools and groups. Local people and schools will also have the opportunity to be involved in the geophysical survey.

- 8.2.6. This enhanced information will be accessible to all, using contemporary media such as a cd rom, an app and touch screen at the library and the Civic Centre, all of which will be free of charge to the community and those visiting the town. This in turn will capitalise on area's natural and historic heritage and will help to develop a greater pride of place. The activities and learning opportunities that are an intrinsic part of the project will engender a culture of lifelong learning for young and old alike, helping to increase civic pride and encouraging more volunteering among local people.
- 8.2.7. This project links to the Warminster and Villages Community Plan objectives by helping to cherish and protect the architectural heritage in the town and increasing the tourism potential by enhancing what is known of the heritage of medieval Warminster.
- 8.2.8. The total cost of the project is £31,800. A grant application is to be submitted to the Heritage Lottery Fund for £30,850 and the project can only go ahead if this is awarded. A £5,000 conditional award from the Warminster Area Board will allow the group to bid to the Heritage Lottery fund.

The project comprises the wholesale replacement of our existing 38 year old mosaic wooden flooring that has reached the end of its design life. This was a low cost option chosen on budget grounds by the then Management Committee when the hall was originally built, in lieu of the more usual but costly hardwood block flooring favoured in this application for its durability and aesthetics. The existing tiles have been debonding from the concrete floor over recent years, something expected with time for this type of flooring which is highly subject to changing humidity levels. Piecemeal temporary repairs in recent years have extended its life but we now need to act and replace. This will incur a significant cost as we will have to strip all of the flooring away, sand the concrete clean, float in some self levelling grout (we have a few shallow hollows that need filling in), and then install from scratch the new flooring. We

have looked at various options but have concluded the most assured long term solution would be to install a hardwood floor (though not wooden blocks).

The Committee are continuing to undertake a number of improvements to the Hall as part of a prioritized action list; these are much less costly projects ongoing or imminently planned which collectively total Â£6,000. With the cost of the new flooring being in the order of Â£16,000 (3 bone-fide quotations have been received varying from Â£14,000 to Â£18,000 depending on detail specification) this would completely deplete our cash reserves - hence we are seeking grant funding to allow this imperative improvement for our Hall to proceed. The beneficiaries for the described project (completion of the 5 year plan to fundamentally upgrade Chapmanslade Village Hall, by replacement of the ageing floor) will be the current and prospective users. The hall plays host to an ever widening range of customers from toddlers to senior citizens with an increasing focus upon sport & leisure. For example in addition to the external sports field being the home ground to under 10â€™s Frome Town FC, we now have indoor â€œrugby as well as the more common keep fit classes. Essential to attracting such user groups, and equally retaining their interest, is the condition of the flooring commensurate with the pattern of use. In the past, for example, we have also been a venue for martial arts training but the condition of the flooring meant we lost their custom. By replacing the floor and with appropriate marking, the Hall could provide an ideal venue for badminton (as in the distant past). Chapmanslade, though close to the towns of Frome and Warminster, has relatively limited public transport connections, and in particular there is a dearth of activity options available particularly for those of secondary school age. Further, with planning permission pending for additional housing (inc affordable) at Barterâ€™s Farm, there would be an increase in population, inevitably of younger demographic, who would welcome further facilities in the local community building

(Chapmanslade Hall). Looking at the Warminster Villages Community Plan (WVCP) 2005 - 2015, of the 8 Themes adopted, the enhanced utilisation of Chapmanslade Hall supports the Future Initiatives of Culture & Leisure, which mentions our Village (amongst others) “refer pages 12 & 13. Further, in respect of identified Priority Projects that have emerged from the consultations, which for villages include both provision of and improvement to village halls and meeting places, and provision of facilities for young people” page 22. Chapmanslade Hall fulfills these target criteria of the WVCP and, mentioned on page 22, through the Parish Council Chapmanslade has been active in contributing to the WVCP by undertaking community planning.

14. How will you monitor this?

We will solicit opinion from our user groups and villagers via direct liaison, community magazines, and via the Parish Council by their planned canvassing of the local community through a Community Action Plan questionnaire (ChapCap). The first such survey was held in 2002 in conjunction with WWDC and addressed matters such as Community services, the environment, transport and the adequacy of the existing Village Hall to satisfactorily meet the demands placed upon it. Hand delivered to each household, a return of 69% provided evidence of a strong desire to see the Village Hall developed in particular improve the ambient environment that would benefit the young and elderly, reduce opex, comply with statutory obligations, and allow an expanded and more diverse user group base. With years of concerted fund raising, the Management Committee has expended £83,000 over the past 5 years with self funding contributing two-thirds of the cost together with the balance (£28,500) comprising 3 grants awarded between 08 and 11. The replacement flooring is now our one remaining substantial project to undertake.

15. If your project will continue after the Wiltshire Council funding runs out, how will you continue to fund it?

The operating costs of the completed project (ie the Chapmanslade Village Hall) will be self funded through hiring & event charges. The Hall operates with a positive annual P & L balance due to the energy and enthusiasm of the incumbent Management Committee. By having a new floor, this will open up further opportunities to attract increased custom from all sections of the community, from young children playing indoor touch rugby to the more senior in our short mat bowls club.

16. Is there anything else you think we should know about the project?

The project to replace our ageing hall floor is essentially standalone, though with other existing smaller value improvements either in progress or imminent, the total planned spend to further improve the facilities we can offer to the local public is approx £22,000.

This project will tie in with the community plan objectives by helping to cherish and protect the architectural heritage in the town and increasing the tourism potential by enhancing what is known of the heritage of medieval Warminster. This enhanced information will be accessible to all, using contemporary media such as a cd rom, an app and touch screen at the library and the Civic Centre, all of which will be free of charge to the community and those visiting the town. This in turn will capitalise on the area's natural and historic heritage and will help to develop a greater pride of place. The activities and learning opportunities that are an intrinsic part of the project will engender a culture of lifelong learning for young and old alike, helping to increase civic pride and encouraging more volunteering among local people.

16. Is there anything else you think we should know about the project?

The overall project aim is to explore the early Medieval town of Warminster by undertaking a geophysical survey aimed at locating any evidence of the early town. Any evidence will be interpreted with filmed interviews by local professional historians and archaeologists, as well as a 3d animation of the Saxon area, including the Minster, and a 360 digital tour of some of the town's earlier buildings. Dendrochronology will also be used to date the timbers in some of the oldest buildings, in order to establish their place in the town's timeline. 1000 CD-roms will be duplicated containing all of the project material and given out free to local groups and people, and the project will also be accessible on a portable touchscreen at the library and the Civic Centre. The information will also be available as an app, in order to maximise accessibility for the community as well as visitors to the town. The digitization of the project will preserve this important information for the future and will also add to the historic record, enhancing and extending the rich heritage of Warminster.
