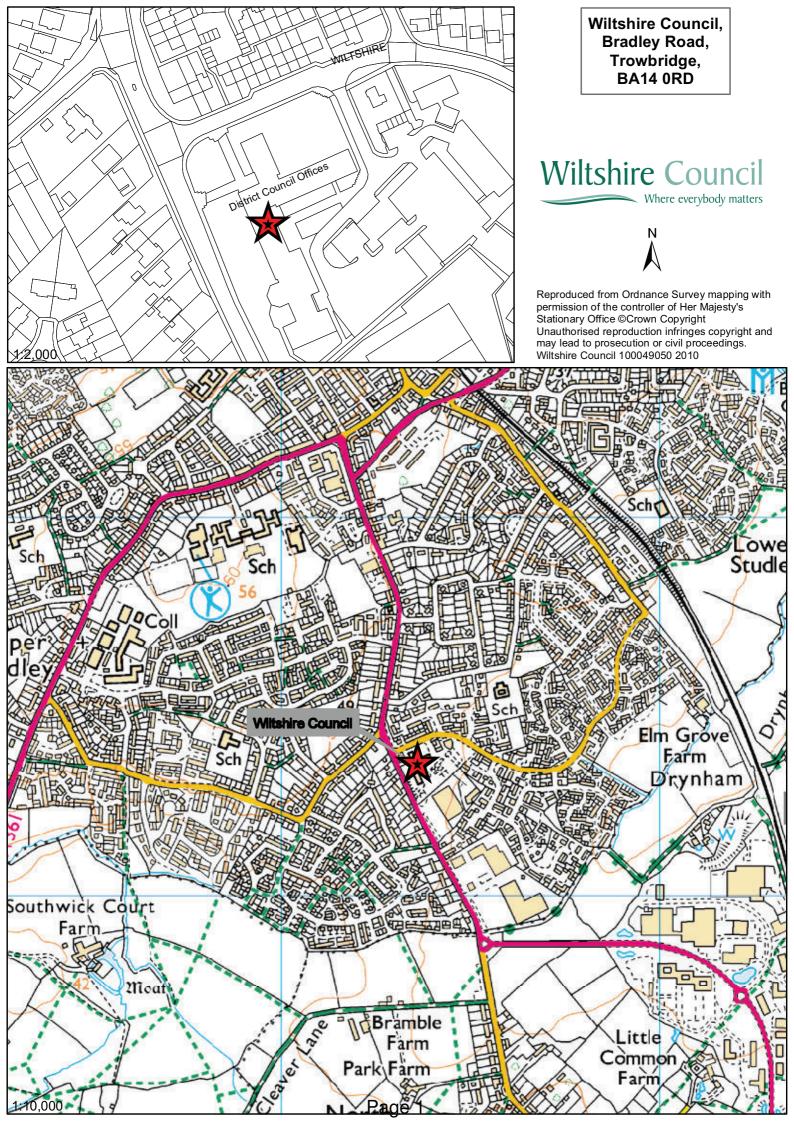

Chairman's Announcements

Local Transport Plan (LTP) Scheme Selection Process

The establishment of Area Boards presents an opportunity for decisions on small-scale transport and highway improvement schemes to be taken locally.

In response to this there are plans for the Area Boards to be allocated a discretionary budget to assess and select small-scale transport schemes to be progressed in their community areas. The amount of funding available to the Area Boards will be confirmed in due course.

The allocation will be for capital funding and can only be used to provide new and improved infrastructure. It is to be used for schemes that improve safety, increase accessibility and sustainability by promoting walking, cycling and public transport, and improve traffic management. It cannot be used to fund maintenance schemes or to pay for revenue functions such as passenger transport.

Due to the complexity of assessing and selecting a scheme from the many requests, and the potential time that such an agenda item would take, it is proposed that recommendations are made to the Area Board by a Community Area Transport Group (CATG).

Members of the CATG will be identified by the Community Area Manager in conjunction with the Chairman, and agreed at the Area Board. It is requested that the number on each Group should not exceed ten and that the meetings take place during the day. Meetings will be attended by relevant officers from Wiltshire Council and will be chaired by the Area Board Chairman.

It is envisaged that the first meeting of the CATG would include a half day workshop covering the following matters:-

- Background to the Council's transport policies and transport funding.
- Review of requests received in the community area.
- Assessment of schemes.
- Discussion on the need for a feasibility study
- Discussion on future funding
- Selection of scheme(s)
- Recommendation to Area Board.

Points made included: • reassurance to dispel rumours surrounding Trowbridge County Hospital. There was one provider for the Out of Hours Service, wiltshire Medical Services, and there would	
	 not be any changes to the service. Trowbridge would continue to provide a 24 hr service for minor injuries currently accommodation issues were being addressed in relation to development of the Primary Care Centre. It was acknowledged that bringing together two medical practices had its issues. Board members made the point that planning permission for the

Significant savings had been made of £25 million and further would be made in rationalising 97 office buildings down to 4 hubs at Trowbridge, Chippenham, Devizes and Salisbury.

The Thrive event - went well on the 1st May and there was lots of positive feedback from both participants and the public. A dance exhibition is planned for the end of 2010 and we will still be entitled to utilize the Olympics logo.

Museum Friends – 2010 is the 20th anniversary of the Friends of Trowbridge Museum. As part of the commemorations items that the Friends have purchased for the Museum will be displayed, they also recently produced a souvenir newsletter on their contribution over the years.

20th Anniversary of the Museum and Shires opening - an exhibition showcasing some of the themes and objects that have been displayed over the past 20 years will open on Saturday 7th August.

2. Community Services

Sunday Club – The next one will be on 11th July 2010. This will be the last Sunday Club taking place at the Civic Hall until the new Civic Centre is built. During the interim period, the Sunday Club will operate from Longfield Community Centre.

Playbuilder – Officers met WC on 21^{st} May. They have committed to seeking the extension of the Rec. into the former Innox Hall site. The new play equipment will be provided alongside the existing play area. Utilising £100,000 of WC money and £25,000 from the Town Council as previously budgeted. Toilet facilities are not being provided. We will discuss with Changing Places the possibility of incorporating this into the Civic Centre.

Purpose of the Report

1. To agree a process for the allocation of the £7,759 funding allocated to the Trowbridge Area Board for supporting youth related priorities.

Background

2. The decision was made to allocate each Area Board with funds to support young people's priorities in each community area with transport being one of the suggested priorities. £7,759 has been allocated to Trowbridge Area Board for supporting youth related priorities

The Area Boards have been asked to be proactive in their allocation of this funding not reactive as with the community area grants.

Main Considerations

3. After feedback from Wiltshire Council's Youth Development Service and Extended Schools Service, it is proposed that the amount allocated to the Trowbridge Area Board is jointly allocated to the Trowbridge community area CAYPIG and Trowbridge community area Youth Parliament to help them address their key priorities.

This would address the key priority of transport which the CAYPIG has discussed at the area board meeting on 13 May 2010. The Youth Parliament will be attending the 18th November area board meeting to discuss their key priority which is Anti Social Behaviour.

The process would be that the two youth bodies will be asked to draw up a short proposal (a simple proforma for them to fill out will be provided) as to how they would spend the funding to address their key priority issues. This proposal would then go to the area board for Members to agree to fund or not.

If the young people cannot reach a consensus as to one project/funding application then each body will be able to make a submission for up to 50% of the funds available to deliver on their key priority.

Headlines

- Castle Place/St. Stephens Place acquired by Legal and General Investment Fund. They are working up plans for a revamp of Castle Place but have no plans at present for St. Stephens Place.
- The opening of the 44,000 sq ft Sainsbury's store on the former Bottling Plant site completes the first phase in the delivery of Transforming Trowbridge which also includes the Brewery Apartments and The Gateway. This represents an investment in Trowbridge of over £65 million, the bulk of which has been in the last 12 months. There are residential elements to The Gateway and Bottling Plant which will create in the region of 200 new homes. These are anticipated to will follow once the residential property market improves.
- Bowyers we have facilitated a dialogue between a residential developer and the owners of the former Bowyers site. There is scope for the involvement of the Homes and Communities Agency.

Projects

- **Public Realm Improvements** we are investigating a range of approaches to improving the street scene in Trowbridge. This may involve making better use of Planning Powers to encourage owners to "tidy up" sites.
- Leisure and Recreation we are talking with the Council's Leisure team to move forward long-standing issues on the relocation of the Rugby Club and football pitch provision as well as sports and recreation provision for Trowbridge, in general.
- **Trowbridge Masterplan** first phase (Scoping and Vision Study) is complete. This will ultimately provide the detail for the growth of the town centre "area of mixed use regeneration" identified in the Core Strategy. For the first time the preferred land uses for specific town centre sites has been identified and prioritised to move us a way from sending a message to developers that we can have any and all types of development on any site.

- 1.6. The 2010/2011 funding criteria and application forms are available on the council's website (<u>www.wiltshire.gov.uk/areaboards</u>) or paper versions are available from the Community Area Manager.

Please describe how your initiative will support the ambition(s) indicated above, and summarise the action that will be taken	 This project will considerably contribute to the long term health and wellbeing of young people involved in the activities provided through it. Many young people involved in alternative sport are those who are dis-engaged from mainstream sports. Consequently without regular physical activity they are prone to developing sedentary lifestyles. This could increase the chances of developing coronary heart disease or diabetes as well as reducing self esteem, energy levels and the 'feel good' factor associated with involvement in exercise. By engaging young people in regular alternative sport sessions the project will provide young people with positive healthy activities and give them the opportunity to learn new skills and achieve. This could lead on to roles within sport as a volunteer or coach if the interest is maintained and life skills learned that will play a large role in career and life development. The development of independent alternative sports activity centres will allow young people to take part in a new and exciting project that will be relatively easily accessed. There are only 2 current projects in Wiltshire that provide this and through the project we hope to increase this to 5 or 6 – this will clearly give young people a great chance to take up something new, improve at something or excel in a chosen sport. All of which contribute to greater opportunities in their lives and a sense of belonging, identity and wellbeing.

	 Activities provided on a regular basis for young people in alternative sports can contribute to reducing anti social behaviour in local areas. Projects tend to be delivered in partnership with local youth development service workers and at the time of the day that would see most anti social behaviour perpetrated. Therefore by delivering activities

Building Resilient communities This project would only be successful with partnership working. Therefore it will require differing organisations across Witshire to work together in order to make it successful. The main aim of the hubs is to promote inclusion for all and allow people within the development of the hubs. Development of the alternative sports will allow young people to succeed at school as it allows them to develop new skills and build on existing skills. Developing stronger resilient young people. It also allows them to participate in positive activities whilst socialising and having fun. The sports promote team work and effective communication. Success of the Pewsey and Tidworth Alternative sports Hubs show that there is a clear need for alternative sports in Wiltshire based on the number of young people who turn up to our alternative sports taster sessions. In 2009/2010 alone we had 759 young people attend our current existing alternative sports in locations other than school. Over 65% of young people would like engage in alternative sports coaching, umpiring or event volunteering.
