

	• When will the contract for Hills waste Solutions MBT (Mechanical Biological Treatment) Plant at Westbury be signed (go ahead 23rd March) and why is it for 25 years? How much is it costing us?					
	• Following the collapse of joint venture talks with SBC (Swindon Borough Council) what technology has been selected by WC for waste treatment - presumably this is for East Wilts. Will this be another eternal partnership with Hills?					
	• Waste collection per household for East Wilts is shown as £31 per household. North £50 South £69 West £48.50. It sounds as if the unified service, or which the only additional benefit is a doorstep cardboard and plastic collection in East Wilts is actually threatened to					

	cost us more. The sums do not add up. If all areas go to the East Wilts cycle plus a Plastic and cardboard collection then there should be a reduction. Decision

The revised Area Plan would be the blueprint for the future of the area, MaVCAP intended to consult widely and provide to highly detailed aspirations for this community area. MaDT Chairman Martin Cook outlined the six phases with consultation of the Area Board and community being the first and current phase.

MaVCAP would be producing a newsletter to summarize its view of the current position.

The date of the next meeting of MAVCAP will be on Tuesday, 28 September at 7.00pm at Marlborough Town Hall

The passing of Mervyn Lilliwhite was noted and the contribution that he had made to MaCAP and other local community groups.

	c.Pewsey Road Bridge	
	Councillor Dick Tonge, Cabinet Member for Transport and Highways gave an update on the works at Pewsey Road Bridge and advised that Wiltshire Council appreciated that any roadworks in a busy town like Marlborough was likely to increase traffic congestion, but the current works was unavoidable	

	 Closing the bridge or implementing weight limits was not feasible because of the importance of the route and its use as an alternative route when the High Street is closed. In view of the bridge's condition and type of construction it became apparent that replacing the existing structure was the only feasible option. The works had been phased and timed around local events, including the Jazz Festival in July and the Mop Fair in October when the road would be temporarily reopened. The scheme had to fit in with other work on the network being carried out by public utilities elsewhere in the town, and this affected the start date. The future programming of the works was being reviewed to see if there was scope for increasing the time the bridge could be opened before Christmas, and the council and 	
	contractor were working on this at the moment. To some extent this may depend on the weather and the conditions encountered during the demolition of the existing bridge and the construction of the foundations of the new bridge. Points made included:	
	 Better traffic information covering the town centre would be welcomed. 	
	 It was vital to keep the Marlborough open to tourists. 	
	• George Lane residents were suffering from noise created from the traffic and have had cars using their drives as turning points.	
	The Chairman thanked Cllr Tonge for his update.	
8.	Young People's Issues	
	Councillor Peggy Dow presented a proposal from Area Board Task Group for the £5,000 funding allocation for Youth Transport/Access.	
	At its meeting of 22 June 2010, Marlborough Area Board considered suggestions for improving transport for young people, with an allocation of £5k that Wiltshire Council had awarded to each area board. Following this, and the subsequent MaVCAP meeting on 13 July, an area board task group was convened, chaired by Councillor Peggy Dow,	

	which met on 22 July 2010 to consider the matter further.	
	It was proposed to use the £5k to pilot minibus transport from the villages to a number of activities for young people, aged 13-19, between September 2010 and March 2011.	
	Three planned activities have already been identified as being suitable for the transport project. These are:	
	 Saturday 4 September- 'Skate Jam' at Salisbury Recreation Ground. 	
	 Friday 10 September- Marlborough Downs Movies (MDM) showing of 'the Prince of Persia', Cert 12 A at St John's School. 	
	• Saturday 30 October- 'Slum Survivor' event to raise awareness and funds for people who live in slum settlements in the poorest parts of the world.	
	Decision	
	That the Marlborough Area Board agreed to fund the three pilot events and then look at the business plan of the project, it would then decided on any further future funding from the £5,000 allocated by Wiltshire Council.	Karen Scott

Performance Reward Grant Scheme

This project is a two year initiative which will challenge our Area Boards to develop new and innovative approaches to community engagement and empowerment, particularly focused on engaging with hard to reach and traditionally excluded groups.

d. Gypsy and Traveller Site Consultation

Consultation planned on possible new Gypsy and Traveller sites following on from the work carried out in April and June this year has now been put on hold. The issues consultation used figures proposed in the draft South West Regional Spatial Strategy as the basis of future need for Gypsy and Traveller sites. The Regional Spatial Strategy has now been revoked and it falls to local authorities to determine the right level of site provision. Officers are currently assessing existing information about the level of need for new Gypsy and Traveller sites in Wiltshire to make sure the development plan document progresses with the correct local targets for new site provision. This has affected the overall timetable for the preparation of the Gypsy and Traveller Site Allocations document. The Area Board will be informed once a revised project timetable on the provision of new sites for the travelling community is available.

e. Wiltshire Local Transport Plan 2011 - 2026

The Council has a statutory duty to review and publish a new Local Transport Plan (LTP) by the end of March 2011. In essence, Local Transport Plans steer the implementation of national transport policies at the local level.

The Wiltshire Local Transport Plan is made up of:

- A long-term transport strategy that seeks to:
 - o support economic growth
 - reduce carbon emissions
 - o contribute to better safety, security and health
 - o promote equality of opportunity
 - improve quality of life and promote a healthy natural environment
- A shorter-term implementation plan based on a realistic assessment of available funding, and
- A number of supporting strategies and technical documents.

In addition, the Local Transport Plan provides the framework for all other organisations with a direct or indirect involvement in transport in Wiltshire.

Consultation on the draft Local Transport Plan will run from **4 October to 26 November 2010**.

Paper copies of the summary document, questionnaire and a reference copy of the Local Transport Plan will also be available from all libraries and main Council offices.

The Council's Cabinet and full Council will consider the results of the consultation in February 2011 prior to the publication of the final Local Transport Plan in March 2011.

2. NPTs - Current Priorities & Consultation Opportunities:

Our Neighbourhood Policing Teams have concentrated on a variety of issues involving anti social behaviour, traffic matters, and crime. Three Marlborough town priorities are traffic in London Road which receives regular attention with the resultant issue of fixed penalty tickets for speeding and mobile telephone use, anti social behaviour in the skate park, and the Manton parking issues.

Over the school holidays the skate park has been well attended and regularly patrolled, and the Manton traffic issues monitored. Behaviour in the skate park has improved greatly, and Wiltshire Council are assisting with signage to ease problems in Manton. These two priorities will be finalised.

Marlborough Rural West are concentrating on school parking issues in Baydon, and minor obstructions in Froxfield. Baydon will remain an ongoing issue but the problems in Froxfield have resolved themselves and this will be closed.

Marlborough Rural East have turned their attention to the seasonal increase in theft from motor vehicle at our beauty spots. Regular patrols, warning signs, and the heightened awareness have to some extent reduced and displaced the offences across the wider rural area.

Summary of main events:-

The Service's 'Rural Safety' team is continuing to engage with farming and equine communities regarding fire safety.

We are continuing our ongoing work with our 'Fire Stop' project working with statutory and voluntary organisations to identify the more vulnerable members of our community who may be at an increased risk of dwelling fires. We then offer home fire safety checks and fit smoke alarms where needed.

NHS Update – October 2010

Transforming Community Services (TCS)

The revised NHS Operating Framework for 2010/11, released by the Health Secretary Andrew Lansley in June 2010, makes it clear that all Primary Care Trusts in England must make it a priority to separate themselves completely from providing actual services and that a complete split has to be achieved by April 2011.

This means that NHS Wiltshire must organise a transfer of community services provided by Wiltshire Community Health Services (WCHS) to other organisations, such as hospital Trusts, other NHS providers (such as GPs) or to Wiltshire Council, with the capability of securing on-going employment for front-line staff on NHS pay and conditions.

NHS Wiltshire is currently in discussions with each of the potential bidders who will submit their proposals by 15 October. The proposal will be short listed by the 28 October with bidders being invited for interview. The Board and Commissioning Committee will make a decision about the preferred provider by 9 November, this will ensure that WCHS staff can be notified formally about their new employer by January 2011 and will allow for a smooth transfer by 1 April 2011 to fulfill government requirements.

Wiltshire performs well in cancer stats

More people than ever are surviving longer than a year after being diagnosed with cancer, and Wiltshire patients fare better than the national average, figures just released from the Office of National Statistics (ONS) show. In England, the number of people surviving for at least a year after diagnosis increased during the period between 1996 and 2006 from 61.8% to 65%. In Wiltshire the one-year survival rate went up from 64% in 1996 to 65.8% ten years later.

NHS Wiltshire's blueprint for improving cancer survival is its Wiltshire Cancer Reform Strategy, approved by the Board in October 2008. One of the key aspects of the strategy is encouraging and supporting people to make lifestyle changes (stopping smoking, sensible drinking and keeping an eye on your weight) that can help prevent many forms of cancer. Cervical, breast and bowel cancer screening offer a better opportunity for early diagnosis and successful treatment.

In 2008, the year when the strategy was introduced, NHS Wiltshire invested an extra £1.1million on early detection and screening services, bringing its total cancer spend to £6.7million for the year. The Cancer Survival Index for Primary Care Trusts covers all cancers, and has been designed to monitor the effectiveness of cancer services in PCT areas. It is adjusted for differences

between PCTs in the profile of their resident cancer patients by age, sex and type of cancer.

Chippenham celebrates new NHS dental practice

A new dental practice in Chippenham offering NHS treatment to around 12,000 patients opened officially on 24 September 2010. Guest of honour Duncan Hames, MP for Chippenham 'cut the ribbon' at the Hathaway Dental Practice. He was joined children from nearby New Road Nursery, who last year won the prestigious Gold Award from NHS Wiltshire's Happy Little Teeth programme. Happy Little Teeth works with children aged 0-5, their families and carers, to promote healthy teeth and stop children being scared of the dentist's chair.

The Hathaway Practice, which started seeing patients in spring 2010, is the flagship of a three-year, £3million+ investment in NHS dentistry in Wiltshire. Run by established dental providers Dr Michael Frain Ltd., the practice has state-of-the-art accommodation for 5 dentists, 2 hygienists and an oral health promoter. It currently has 5,500 NHS patients on its books, with capacity for at least another 6,500 over the coming two years.

Overnight stays for partners to continue at PAW

A pilot scheme offering partners an overnight stay after the birth of their baby at the Princess Anne Wing (PAW) of the Royal United hospital in Bath has been so successful that Wiltshire Maternity Services have decided to run it indefinitely.

The Annual General Meeting and Board meeting of NHS Wiltshire will be held on Wednesday 17 November at 10am - **2010 at Southgate House.** Members of the public are welcome to attend.

Youth Transport Proposal

Proposer:

Marlborough Area Board Youth Transport Working Group

What is the purpose of this report?

The purpose is to ask the Board to support this proposal to provide free transport for young people within the community area so that they are able to attend an additional 7 organised events.

What does the project hope to achieve?

- To address the identified need that evening transport within the area is often difficult for young people, especially from rural areas.
- To promote the minibus scheme so that it can be seen whether it is an effective way of addressing the need.
- To provide a safe way for young people to travel to organised events.
- To help explore if a more sustainable model of transport provision can be provided.

How will the project work?

- Transport to three events were organised in the late summer which provided a platform on which this project can be run. Although take-up was low (4 people for the first two events), this was to some extent to be expected. It will take some time for the scheme to get well known and the publicity went out during the summer holidays. No funding from the Area Board was spent in the running of these events.
- It is proposed that transport is offered to the following 7 events:
 - 1. Salvage Fashion Show (13th November)
 - 2. The Rat Pack Vegas Spectacular (20th November)
 - 3. Three evening events during the Youth Development Centre events programme. The Youth Service will provide the driver and chaperone for these events. (During Autumn half term)
 - 4. Bluz 'n' Zuz (During November)
 - 5. Drop-in to enjoy Christmas in Marlborough (During December)
- The transport will be publicised electronically and through the school.

Wiltshire Council

- Transport will be hired through the Urchfont minibus (See costs below). The key advantage is that a driver will be provided. However, a CRB checked chaperone will be required to accompany the driver. This is because it is Wiltshire Council policy that all staff who work with young people must have a approved Criminal Records Bureau check before they work with those young people. While Wiltshire Council is funding and organising this project these rules are in place. Ellie Vesey-Thompson has offered to co-ordinate the requests to go on the minibus. This can be done electronically and once numbers are known, the Urchfont Minibus co-ordinator will let her know when the young people will be picked up. This information can then be sent out them.
- Future co-ordination of transport schemes could be carried out in several ways including a co-ordinator in each village or possibly utilising the Youth Champions within each Parish Council. However this will be decided when this scheme has been evaluated and can be considered alongside the transport 'Mapping and Gapping' report.

How much will the project cost?

- The exact cost for the hire of the minibus depends upon who wants to use it and therefore how far it will have to travel. However we would expect it to be in the region of £90 per event; hence about £630 in total.
- Publicity via electronic means is generally free as is radio and press coverage.

How will the project sit alongside the proposal to map and gap transport provision?

- This project will provide real data on how much demand there is for a scheme such as this and where that demand seems to be coming from.
- This project will also be able to help identify lessons learned if considering running a similar scheme again.
- This information can be then placed alongside the 'Mapping and Gapping' project report so that the Board can consider how to take this issue forward.
- The long term goal of both projects is that the Area Board can help support the setting up and running of a more sustainable and community led solution.

What will happen when?

19 October 2010 - Marlborough Area Board decide whether to support the proposal
End of October - Publicity finalised and sent out
Mid Nov – Mid Dec - Events held
January - Project evaluated



8 February 2011 - Area Board considers 'Mapping & Gapping' report with evaluation

1. **Project Background**

- Transport has been identified as a key issue for young people living in Wiltshire
- Wiltshire Council has responded by devolving an additional amount of approximately £5000 to each Area Board to use as they see best within their local area. This needs to be spent/allocated by the end of March 2011
- In Marlborough, it was agreed that a transport group would be set up to look at possible uses for this funding. This has been centred on providing transport through the use of mini buses to selected events
- Alongside the work of the transport group it has been suggested by Wiltshire Councillors of the Area Board that an additional complementary task should be carried out which looks to carry out a mapping and gapping exercise of transportation in the Community Area
- This PID sets out what this work would hope to achieve and how it will be undertaken

2. Project Objectives

• To provide a clear understanding of what transport and supporting services are available in order to identify gaps and agree appropriate action to address them

3. Project Scope

The project will be confined to the following areas:

- What mini buses are available, how can they be booked and when are they available?
- What transport schemes operate?
- What bus routes are there, when do they run, how well used are they?
- Are co-ordinators (particularly in each parish) required? Are there people who are willing to act as co-ordinators? How could the young people take responsibility for this?
- What are the needs of the young people? When and where is transport required? What do they want to travel to?
- In what ways can the community be helped to help itself?
- Some analysis of this information and recommendations on the way forward

The project will not at this stage:

- Explore solutions in detail
- Not carry out significant additional consultation

4. Project Approach

It is proposed that Community First carry out this project as they have the expertise and knowledge required. The work will be mainly a desktop exercise that will collate the local information and data and present it together in a way that is clear, digestible and points to what action is required.

The information will be provided from a mixture of sources:

- Existing data e.g. bus providers, transport services, Community First, etc.
- Consultation exercises such as 'Dreams and Wishes'
- Best practice and learning from other areas

5. **Project Deliverables**

The project will produce a report covering those areas described in the project scope. This will be ready for and presented to the Marlborough Area Board on 8 February 2011 meeting. It will be the responsibility of the Board to decide if it wants to accept the recommendations and how to take the work forward.

6. Associated Projects

The project will compliment and run alongside the work being carried out by the transport group that aims to provide lifts to chosen events for young people who would otherwise be unable to attend.

7. Project Resources

Community First have agreed to undertake this work at a reduced rate of £1108. The funding for this will come from the remainder of the Youth Transport Money There is an additional £5,200 available that was carried over from last year's budget that can be used to help implement any recommendations. The Board also has funding available if suitable requests are made and agreed.

8. Communication Strategy

The project will be overseen by the Marlborough Community Area Manager on behalf of the Board. They in turn will ensure that the Unitary members are kept informed of progress and that the output of the project is presented to the whole Area Board in February.

Options for an Air Quality Management Area, Herd Street, Marlborough

Summary

Wiltshire Council have been monitoring Air Quality in Marlborough for several years and a recent report (The Detailed Assessment of the Air Quality in Herd Street, Marlborough) states that the UK Air Quality Objectives for the average concentration of the exhaust pollutant, nitrogen dioxide (NO₂) is likely to be exceeded in Herd St / Barn St. The report is on the Air Quality pages of the Wiltshire Council website, <u>www.wiltshire.gov.uk</u>.

As a result of the conclusions made in this report, Wiltshire Council now have a duty to declare an Air Quality Management Area (AQMA) which will need to cover at least the area known to be a problem and are seeking to consult on options for the AQMA within the Marlborough area

Nitrogen dioxide - source and health impacts.

It is known that road vehicles are responsible for over 50% of the emissions of nitrogen oxides in the UK; the proportion in the impacted area in Marlborough is to be established as part of the Air Quality Management Process we are going through.

Nitrogen dioxide has been identified as having a number or adverse health effects, focused around the respiratory system, in both asthmatic and non asthmatic subjects. Short-term exposures can increase reactivity to allergens, such as pollen. In some individuals high levels of nitrogen dioxide can precipitate or exacerbate episodes of asthma. Exposure of children to nitrogen dioxide may increase the risk of respiratory infections and possibly lead to poorer lung function in later life. There is some evidence that use may be linked with impaired lung function.

The Government has set an annual mean objective of 40 ug/m³ to be met by 31.12.2005 and a 1 hour mean objective of 200 ug/m³ not to be exceeded more than 18 times a year by 31.12.2005.

The objectives are set for the protection of human health and have been set purely on the basis of medical and scientific evidence of how the pollutant affects human health.

Pollution Monitoring in Marlborough

We monitor for nitrogen dioxide at 12 sites in the town, 7 in the Herd St. / Barn St. area. To measure the level of NO2 we use diffusion tubes, a clear plastic tube open at one end and at the closed end a mesh is impregnated with a pollutant absorbing chemical. The diffusion tube collects the pollutant during the exposure period and then is resealed and

returned monthly to a laboratory for analysis. The laboratory then assesses the quantity of the pollutant absorbed by calculating the average ambient NO₂ concentration over the exposure period.

Each tube is mounted on a lamp-post or similar structure ensuring that the open end is at the bottom to prevent rainwater collection.

The results from the monitoring carried out in Herd St. / Barn St. in 2009 indicate that the annual mean objective is being exceeded at 4 locations with levels at the other sites close to the objective.



Monitoring Locations in Herd St / Barn St, Marlborough

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What is an Air Quality Management (AQMA) Area ?

An AQMA (Air Quality Management Area) is an area where air pollution is expected to be above the National Air Quality Standards and where people could be exposed to air pollution. Necessary steps will be identified to reduce the pollution in these areas wherever possible. Any major development proposed within an AQMA will need to take account of the impact of the proposals upon the quality of the air.

As air quality improves the AQMA may be reduced in size or removed_completely.

Introducing the Options for an Air Quality Management Area in Marlborough

While the air quality problems in Herd Street / Barn Street are known and monitoring is established, there is concern regarding levels of pollution in other areas of the town and so we are suggesting three alternatives for the AQMA within Marlborough and to consult with residents as to the best option for the town.

The final decision of the boundary and the formal designation of the AQMA will be made by the Marlborough Area Board, the decision making body for Wiltshire Council in the Marlborough Area.

Option 1 - Herd Street / Barn Street AQMA

It is known that the Air Quality will exceed the Air Quality Standards for NO₂ throughout the highlighted area, the zone of exceedence. Adoption of Option 1 will cover our statutory duty in respect of this zone.

However, further monitoring in Marlborough is ongoing and in the future the Air Quality Management Area may need to be expanded or a separate one declared which will involve significant extra work and introduce further time delays.



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Option 2 – Marlborough Main Roads AQMA

Option 2 is limited to the known area of exceedence in Herd Street and the major roads feeding traffic towards Herd Street, the A4 and the A338 south of Herd Street. The proposed AQMA thus covers all of option 1 plus the A4 east to the Elcot Lane junction and west to the town hall. The A338 to the south of Marlborough would be included as far as the roundabout with the new industrial estate.

An extended AQMA is likely to cover any further Air Quality problem hotspots in the town and will benefit us if new problem areas be identified as the lengthy reporting procedure will not be required. It should be noted that the monitoring of the air quality in the High Street over the past 15 years indicates that it is not likely to be a problem area.




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Option 3 – Marlborough AQMA

Option 3 is a blanket AQMA for the main residential area of the town. This mirrors a method used in other areas – Tewkesbury and Salisbury for example.

Adoption of this option for the AQMA will remove the lengthy reporting stage should any further air quality problems be found within the town.



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The procedure following the declaration of an Air Quality Management Area

Once an AQMA has been declared the Council is required to complete a Further Assessment of the Air Quality within 12 months. This is aimed at confirming the problem; to suggest the improvement in air quality that will be necessary and to clarify where the pollution is actually coming from.

The Further Assessment will provide useful information for the next stage in the process, the development of the Air Quality Action Plan (AQAP), and assist in the targeting of appropriate measures.

The Action Plan will essentially set out how the local authority will use its powers and also work in conjunction with other organisations to improve the air quality in the problem area. This report needs to be produced within 18 months of the declaration of an AQMA.

What is Wiltshire Voices?

Wiltshire Voices is a project to encourage broader participation in civic life. It is designed to ensure that the needs of all local people are properly understood and addressed.

Background

A recent review of the Area Boards revealed concern that some sections of the community are not fully engaged. These groups are often absent from meetings and events and their needs are not well understood. The Boards were criticised for focusing too heavily on the needs of the 'usual suspects.'

Responding to the challenge

Wiltshire Council's Cabinet considered this issue carefully. It has challenged the Area Boards to respond positively at local level. The Cabinet encouraged the submission of a funding bid to support this work and the Performance Reward Grant (PRG) Panel has given 'in-principle' support subject to approval by the Boards.

A focus on positive local action

Wiltshire Voices is about changing lives – not glossy reports. We want information in the form of personal stories, articles and recordings that will challenge, question and prompt responses. The information will be tailored to meet the needs of different people – such as service professionals, community groups, schools, parish councils and the media. The aim is to generate discussion, learning, ideas and - most importantly - *action*.

A lasting legacy

Wiltshire Voices is about making a lasting difference. New ways of involving people will be developed and this will become the way we do business not an optional add-on. With help from localised public services, communities will be finding and delivering solutions to local challenges and issues. Grants and funding will be better targeted to support projects that really make a difference. Priorities and plans will be more clearly focused on the needs of local people and our work will centre around improving lives not services. Over time these things will help make Wiltshire a better place for everyone.

Capacity and resources to deliver

Instead of each Board trying to engage many groups it is proposed that each Board works intensively with one priority group in its locality. Across Wiltshire this will mean that the needs of 18 different community groups will be addressed. The bid proposes that each Board is allocated a sum of £3,000 to complete its own local project. The work will be coordinated by the Community Area Manager and involve councillors, service providers and community groups – *but most importantly local people*. Each project will take around 8 months and Wiltshire Voices will be complete by Summer 2012 at the latest.

To enable Wiltshire Voices to proceed, the Area Board is asked to support this bid for PRG funding.
