16	<p><u>Chairman's Welcome and Introductions</u></p> <p>The Chairman welcomed everyone to Calne Area Board and introduced the Councillors and Officers present.</p>
17	<p><u>Apologies for Absence</u></p> <p>Apologies were received from Cllr Ian Thorn, Cllr Tony Trotman, Jane Vaughan (Community Engagement Manager), Mel Wilkins representing Hilmarton Parish Council and Stuart West representing Calne Town Council.</p>
18	<p><u>Minutes</u></p> <p>The minutes of the meeting held on 29th May 2018 were approved and signed as a correct record.</p>
19	<p><u>Declarations of Interest</u></p> <p>There were no declarations of interest.</p>
20	<p><u>Chairman's Announcements</u></p> <p>The Chairman drew attention to the following written announcement included in the agenda pack:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • UK Youth Parliament Elections and Activity
21	<p><u>Waste Collection Services Changes</u></p> <p>The Area Board received a presentation from Martin Litherland, Head of Waste Management about changes in the Waste Management Service from the end of July 2018.</p> <p>The Head of Waste Management commented on a number of new materials that would be recyclable from 30th July 2018. He indicated that recycling saved energy, costs less and frees up space in the household waste bin. The changes would help to reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill and achieve recycling rates of at least 50%. Town and Parish Councils and Community Groups were encouraged to work with Waste Services to spread the message about the changes.</p> <p>The Area Board were informed that Hills Waste had planned to install new equipment to sort comingled waste, although it was not anticipated that this would be available until sometime in the future. In the meantime, existing equipment would be used. It was noted that Hills Waste had submitted planning applications to install new equipment to sort comingled waste at their sites in</p>

	<p>Westbury and Amesbury, therefore reducing the need for additional waste vehicle movements across the county.</p> <p>The Chairman thanked the Head of Waste Management for his presentation and encouraged Town and Parish Councils and Community Groups to advertise the changes to the service.</p>
22	<p><u>Policing in the Calne Area</u></p> <p>The presentation from Insp Mark Luffman about Policing in the Calne area since the Community Policing Team model was introduced in October 2016 was deferred until the next meeting of the Area Board on 11th September 2018.</p>
23	<p><u>Volunteers Fair</u></p> <p>The Chairman commented on the Volunteers Fair held at the Calne Hub and Library on 30th June 2018. The Pirate themed volunteer recruiting event drew large numbers of people and received many generous donations from local companies. A number of positive comments from the Chairman of the Friends of Abberd Brook were passed onto the Area Board.</p> <p>The Chairman thanked everyone involved for making the event so successful, and was confident that a number of new volunteers would be gained through the event.</p>

25	<p><u>Our Community Matters</u></p> <p>The Area Board was provided with updates on community issues and progress on Calne Area Board working groups, as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Local Youth Network (LYN) – The Area Board considered a Youth Grant Funding request from the LYN Management Group for Calne Fairtrade Group to hold a Gambian experience event and exhibition. The report highlighted the detailed activities of the event and exhibition. Cllr Alan Hill proposed the award, seconded by Cllr Christine Crisp. A consultation on a pattern of electoral divisions for that council size will run from 28 August 2019 to 5 November 2019. Any proposals must align as closely as possible to an electorate size of 4291 per division (projected figures for 2024), reflect community identity, and provide convenient and effective local government.

Calne Area Board Update - Sept 2018

Wiltshire Council has been working with a specialist design team to develop plans for the refurbishment of Calne Leisure Centre. The objectives have been to ensure the centre provides facilities that meet the needs of the local community whilst safe-guarding the facilities for the future.

A detailed set of drawings and detailed cost plan are due to be issued on the 14th September. Once these designs are completed we will share them with the local community.

The scheme will deliver the following facilities:

- A new fitness suite: this will be twice the size of the existing facility and will include new state-of-the-art fitness equipment.
- New changing facilities: all changing facilities will be replaced and reconfigured to better meet customer needs and will include a new accessible change facility.
- Toilet Facilities: all toilets will be upgraded.
- Reception: the reception area will be re-designed and redecorated.
- Community/Event Space: the café area will be redecorated. Further improvements may be made to this area; pending available budget.
- Those areas not being reconfigured will be redecorated
- Mechanical equipment will be upgraded, where required.

The scheme is not expected to require planning and therefore works on-site are expected to commence in early 2019.

Is it intended that the centre will remain open during the refurbishment process, with works completed in phases. More information regarding the phasing and impact on aspects of the facility will be provided to the community once the main contractor is appointed.

The refurbished centre is planned to open in early 2020.

I will also make you aware of the current Wiltshire police campaigns and what you can do to help.

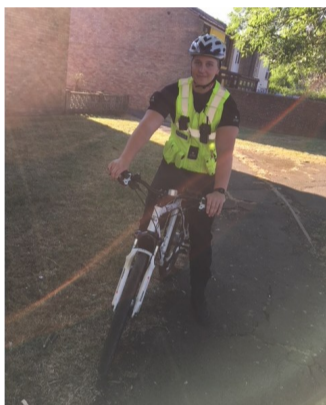
Community Events



This years Calne Motorcycle Meeting held on the 28th July, was a great success again with thousands of motorcycles, residents and visitors to our town.

We are please to report that no issues were reported to us on the day, and that this year we did not receive any reports of speeding along the A4 or A3102 routes into and away from the town.

Pro-active Police cycle patrols



Police officers and PCSO's have been conducting pro-active Crime and Anti-social Behaviour patrols in some of reported hot spot locations. These patrols have been greatly welcomed by residents' and wider members of the public

Good New Stories

- On 14th July at 17:59hrs, a Silver BMW was seized by officers in New Road, Calne for showing no insurance.
- On 15th August at 20:00hrs, a man was arrested on suspicion of possession with intent to supply class A drugs.
Officers were travelling through Devizes when they spotted a suspicious silver BMW being driven in the opposite direction. Officers turned around and carried out an area search for the vehicle which they located a short time later on the A4 travelling towards Calne. The vehicle was stopped by officers in Calne and searched. A quantity of suspected class A drugs were located within the vehicle. the 29-year-old man from Calne was arrested on suspicion of possession with intent to supply class A drugs and was taken to Melksham custody. Enquiries are currently ongoing.
- On the 15th August at 23:59hrs, a White Honda CBF125 motorcycle was stopped by officers on The Strand in Calne, after the rider of the motorcycle had failed to give way at a roundabout.
The rider was detained after the officer could smell the scent of cannabis on him. A roadside drug test procedure was then preformed on the rider. The male rider was also searched where items believed to be cannabis were located.
The male was then arrested and taken to Melksham Custody.
The rider, as 33 year old male from Chippenham was later issued an adult caution for being found in possession of a Class B drug.
- On 19/08/2018 at 00:50hrs, a male was arrested for being drunk and disorderly in Buzzard Road, Calne. The 23 year old local male was taken to Melksham custody and received £90 fixed penalty ticket for the offence of being drunk and disorderly in a public place.



Calne PCSO recognised for his dedication to the Community

On 26th July 2018, PCSO Mark Cook of the Calne Community Police Team was awarded an Assistant Chief Constable's Certificate of Recognition.

PCSO Cook was awarded this certificate in recognition of his initial investigative work into the theft of a Calne landmark.

On the 22nd of October 2017, whilst being off duty, he was made aware of the overnight theft of a Calne land mark known as the two pigs from the town centre. The large valuable bronze statue had been in situ in Phelps Parade and stood to symbolise the town's heritage since 1979.

PCSO Cook immediately changed his tour of duty start time to conducted several lines of enquiry, and investigation work surrounding deployment of the jointly funded mobile CCTV van to the town to prevent further losses, he also utilised the popular police website to cascade messages to the public as quickly as possible.

He also contacted local press and newspapers where the story was aired on BBC points West.

The coverage in the press culminated in the swift recovery of the two pigs and they were quickly rescued from reclamation yard in Gloucester, after the owner had seen this press coverage and contacted Calne town council. The statue was then returned to the home to delight of the local community and town Council.

Assistant Chief Constable

Gavin Williams says: "The diligence determination, tenacity and commitment he displayed were excellent, thus ensuring a successful outcome for the Wiltshire Public. This is just one example of his continuous excellent work ethic, PCSO Cook a true professional who regularly goes above and beyond and exceeds all expectations of the role of a Police Community Support Officer whilst delivering Community Policing in Calne.

PCSO Mark Cook of the Calne Community Police Team says: "upon hearing about what had happened overnight to the two pigs. I felt what had happened as a real sense of a personal assault on our town, as many of the residents of Calne did.

"Although many initial steps were taken at the start of the investigation, this was a successful outcome due to the team work of everyone involved- the local police team, our Proactive Tasking Team, led by PC Jo Cheshire, Calne Town Council CCTV, Calne Shout-out Facebook pages and ultimately the residents of Calne who responded so well in sharing the news far and wide which assisted us in the safe return of the our pigs.

The investigation is going where two males have been summons to Court in regards to their involvement in the theft.

"Finally, I would just like to pass my thanks to the volunteers who assist us each week in Calne CCTV. The valuable support and commitment of everyone involved within Calne CCTV continues to have a huge impact in reducing Anti-social Behaviour, crime and the fear of crime within the Community of Calne. Without them policing Calne would be significantly harder task."

16 year old boy arrested and taken to court for an assault and Breach of a Community Protection Notice.

On 13/07/2018 at 21:42hrs, police were called to the field located near Beversbrook Road in Calne after receiving reports that two assaults had taking place at the location.

Upon police arrival the officers discovered that a large group of youths had gathered at the location. The two victims aged 18 and 13 years old reported that they had been assaulted by the same male. An ambulance from the Great western Ambulance service also attended the location to administer treatment for the injuries sustained in the assaults.

Officers later attended the home address of the suspect and arrested a 16 year old boy from the address. The boy was then taken to Melksham Custody, where he was later charged with one offence of assault and breaching the conditions of a Community Protection Notice.

The boy has been released under investigation to appear at Swindon Magistrates Court on 14/08/2018 09:15hrs.

he additional assault reported is currently being investigated.

Help us tackle County Lines

Young and vulnerable people living in our communities are being exploited by drugs gangs. It's happening right now. And we need your help to protect them.

County lines is a term used to describe gangs and organised criminal networks involved in exporting illegal drugs into one or more importing areas in the UK, using dedicated mobile phone lines or other form of 'deal line'. They are likely to exploit children and vulnerable adults to move and store the drugs and money, and they will often use coercion, intimidation, violence and weapons. gangs based in cities like London are targeting the most vulnerable people in small towns across the country to sell class A drugs on their behalf.

This type of behaviour is a significant threat to our communities and will not be tolerated.

But we need your help to spot the signs and act on your concerns. Your voice will be heard and will make a difference.

Director of Intelligence Sonja Leith said: "County lines is everyone's responsibility and I would urge members of the public to be vigilant and look out for some of the most visible signs that county lines drugs gangs are operating in neighbourhoods and to report this to police.

"Our intelligence teams work hard to identify where county lines are exploiting vulnerable children and adults, and to proactively disrupt these networks. The intelligence we receive from our communities is crucial in helping us, our partner agencies and neighbouring forces in tackling county lines and safeguarding people.

"By raising awareness of the issue, I hope more people will be able to spot the signs, and feel comfortable in reporting information to the police. Your call could save lives."

Angus Macpherson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, said: "Two of my priorities for the next four years, as outlined in my Police and Crime Plan 2017 – 2021, are to prevent crime and keep people safe, and protect the most vulnerable people in society. It is these very people who are being targeted by individuals from large metropolitan cities, who are travelling to rural counties like Wiltshire, with the belief that they will be able to deal drugs from the properties of these vulnerable people. As a result, vulnerable people are being threatened and exploited, often in their own homes.

"I am aware that many people still consider drugs as a victimless crime. This is not the case, and we want to ensure that people who find themselves in these situations have support.

"The Force will continue to work with local authorities to reduce the harm and prevent the crime caused by alcohol and substance misuse, but I would also urge the residents of Wiltshire and Swindon to help us combat drug supply – we cannot do it alone and the police often rely on information from the public to build up an intelligence picture. Please continue to help by reporting any information to 101."

Signs to look out for:

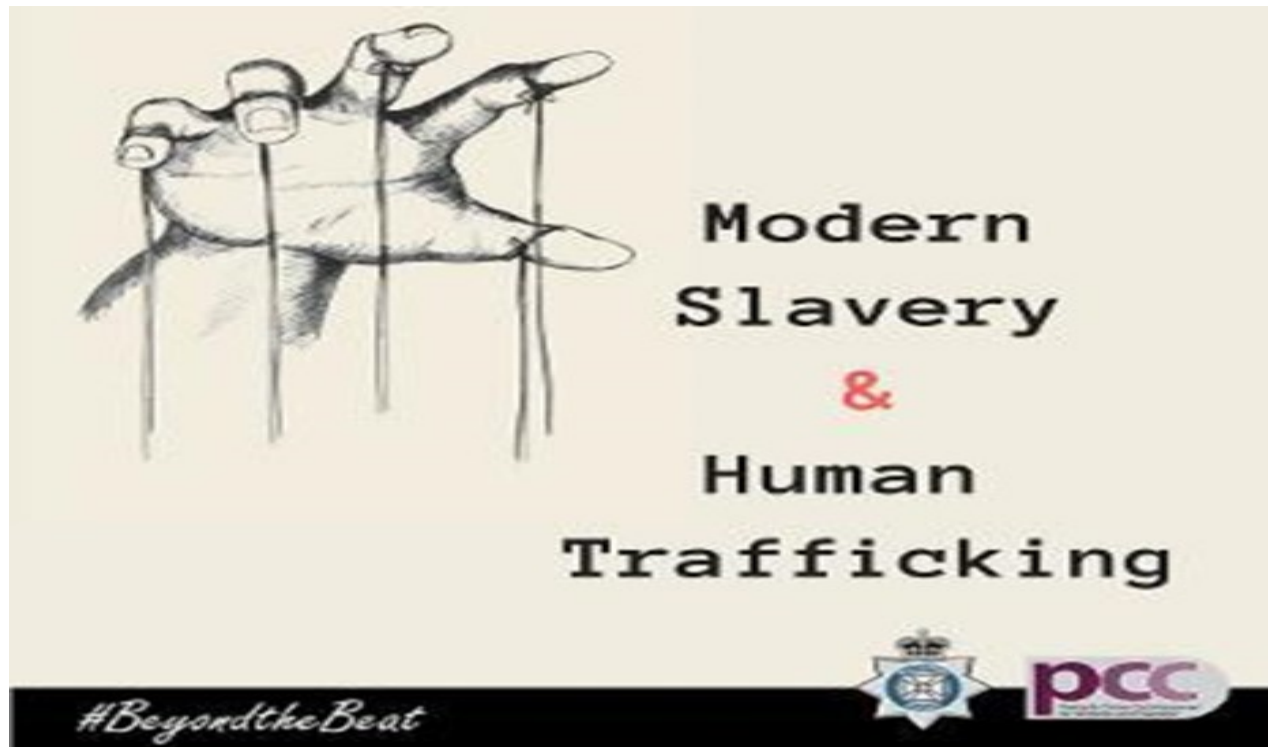
Exploitation

- Has a child or young person gone missing from school or home?
 - Are they meeting with unfamiliar adults?
 - Have you noticed a change in their behaviour?
 - Are they using drugs and alcohol?
 - Has there been a breakdown in relationships with family and friends?
- This could be a sign that they are being coerced and controlled to commit crime.
Call 101 to report it.

Cuckooing

Drug dealers will often take over the homes of vulnerable people as they use it as a base to deal drugs in the area. The vulnerable person may be being kept inside against their will.

- Have you noticed more people calling at an address? Sometimes at unsociable hours?
- Have you noticed a neighbour has not been seen for a while?



As part of our summer-long #BeyondTheBeat campaign to highlight the hidden demands on policing, we are urging residents to familiarise themselves with the potential signs of Modern Slavery.

Modern Slavery is the recruitment, movement, harbouring or receiving of children, women and men through the use of force, coercion, deception, and abuse of vulnerability or other means for the purpose of exploitation.

Individuals may be trafficked into, out of or within the UK, and they may be trafficked for a number of reasons including sexual exploitation, forced labour, domestic servitude and organ harvesting.

Often, people may not see themselves as victims.

Assistant Chief Constable Craig Holden, Force Lead for Crime, Justice and Vulnerability at Wiltshire Police, said: "Although Modern Slavery presents itself in many different ways in our communities, over the last few years the most notable and visible have been within nail bars and car washes.

"There has also been a significant trend in off-street prostitution, often involving women trafficked into sexual slavery; many who thought they were coming to the UK for other jobs and a better life.

"It is understandable that spotting the signs of modern slavery can be difficult but it is vital that we as a Force, and our local communities, are educated and have an approach that helps us to protect vulnerable people and prevent their exploitation.

"Information from the public is vital in the fight against modern slavery. Together, we can eradicate slavery and trafficking in Wiltshire, and reduce the exploitation of the most vulnerable people".

What are some of the signs of exploitation?

- Lack of personal protective equipment
- Chaperoned or accompanied everywhere
- Money being withheld from them
- Language barriers
- Working long hours
- Lack of possessions
- Passport held by someone else

Angus Macpherson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, said: "Wiltshire Police and local partner agencies play a crucial role in tackling modern slavery and human trafficking across the county.

"This type of crime is an emerging national threat, and the reality is the Police cannot tackle this alone and need to draw upon the local community and partners to play an equal part. I would urge the public to remain on the look-out for possible exploitation in their communities and to report any concerns they have.

"Safeguarding the most vulnerable people and offering the best possible service to victims across Wiltshire and Swindon continues to be a top priority for the Police".

Crimes that have impacted the community

From June 30th to August 15th 2018

On 30th June 2018 at 1600 hrs a known suspect has entered the Co-Op in Calne and selected 6 x bottles of Co-op's own brand Vodka TVO £16.50 per bottle and ran out of the store making no attempt to pay. **The suspect was arrested and charged with shoplifting and attended court, where he was convicted and given fines and benefit deductions.**

On 02/07/2018 21:58 hrs a known male has entered the Co-Op and stolen alcohol and threatened staff. **This male was interviewed and has been summonsed to court for shoplifting and public order sect 4 act.**

On 03/07/2018 09:00 a burglary occurred in Derry Hill Calne and entry was gained to a garage, no items were stolen and no suspects have been identified.

On 04/07/2018 10:58 a burglary occurred in Northway Calne, through an open door, nothing stolen and no suspects identified.

On 04/07/2018 18:28 a known youth has assaulted another youth, the matter was resolved by the parents. **The Police however were aware of numerous ASB and problems with this youth and he was issued with a community protection notice to prevent this behaviour in the future.**

On 06/07/2018 18:00 an unknown suspect has cut two strands of barbed wire on the owners fence which surrounds a field containing cattle in Heddington. No known suspects have been identified.

On Thursday 12th July 2018 Police have attended, Cherhill and arrested three males for being concerned in the supply of Class A drugs as they have been suspected of controlling a dealer line. A substantial amount of cash, drugs, Weapons, mobile phones and drug paraphernalia were seized. All the males have been interviewed and released under investigation.

On 30/07/2018 16:18 a known suspect has entered Tesco express in Calne and stolen meat, cheese and household items. The investigation is ongoing at this time.

A local man has concealed two bottles of wine in his pockets, and a bag of meat in a plastic bag, he has then left the store without attempting to make payment. Staff followed the suspect out of the store and managed to retrieve one bottle of wine. Suspect made off with the meat and other bottle.

Male Charged to court and will go to trial. **This male is also subjected to a criminal behaviour order that will be seen by the courts with various Conditions and will last for 3 yrs if granted.**

On 09/08/2018 09:00 hrs a known suspects has stolen the reporting persons valuable watch £3600. **The known suspect is being actively sought to be arrested.**

13/08/2018 17:25 unknown persons have cut the lock to gain access to the site and have then forced another lock to a container - copper piping and a generator taken, also fuel tank has been cut too approximately value is £3500. No persons have been identified at this time.

15/08/2018 20:12 hrs a silver BMW was stopped in Calne and the driver was acting suspicious in his answers to questions. Upon searching the vehicle an amount of class A drugs, mobile phone and cash were located and seized. **The local male was arrested for possession with intent to supply class A drugs. He was interviewed and has been released under investigation.**

On Wednesday 15th August a local male was located in a vehicle the Strand Calne and found to be in possession of controlled Substances. **He was arrested and given an adult caution.**

Automatic fire alarms



Responding to automatic fire alarm (AFA) activations that subsequently turn out to be unwanted fire signals has been identified as a major draw on our resources, resulting in an inappropriate use of emergency crews and equipment.

Such activations cause resources to be diverted away from other, more important, activities, making them potentially unavailable to respond to genuine emergency calls.

Unwanted fire signals have a major impact on the Service and cause concern, as they:

- Render fire crews unavailable, creating the possibility of delayed attendance to genuine emergency calls.
- Create unnecessary risk to fire crews and members of the public when fire appliances respond under emergency conditions.
- Are disruptive to planned work, particularly training and community fire safety activities.
- Can cause a false expectation amongst personnel, especially those attending high numbers of false alarms.
- Impose significant financial burdens on the Service.
- Have a negative impact on employers who release on-call firefighters working the retained duty system.
- Cause problems for the occupiers of affected premises through lost production and general disruption to business continuity.
- Cause complacency among employees, reducing the effectiveness of automatic fire alarms by delaying the initiation of emergency procedures.
- Indicate other failings may exist within the premises' fire safety management.

A properly designed and maintained automatic fire detection system provides early warning of fire. However, a badly designed or poorly maintained system can become a potential hazard due to inappropriate or unwanted activations.

Management procedures should be set in place as part of an emergency plan. Suitably trained personnel should investigate the cause of the alarm activation before calling the fire and rescue service (with the notable exception of residential care providers who should not allow these procedures to cause undue delay in calling 999).

Chinese lanterns



Chinese lanterns (also known as wish, sky or flying lanterns) have origins that go back thousands of years, and they have become increasingly popular as a way of celebrating weddings, birthdays, anniversaries or other special events.

However, there is a high risk of fire from using such lanterns, either through incorrect handling, unspent fuel cells or unexpected flight patterns.

The lanterns are generally made from paper, supported by a wire or card frame that incorporates a holder at the bottom for a solid fuel cell. The paper outer may or may not be fire retardant. Flying times suggested by manufacturers vary from 6-8 minutes and up to 20 minutes, with achievable heights claimed to be up to one mile.

Whilst lighting and launch are largely in the control of the user, the actual flight path and ultimate destination are generally not. There is also no guarantee that the fuel cell will be fully extinguished and cooled when the lantern eventually descends, and any subsequent contact with a combustible surface could result in a fire developing.

It is best to avoid using Chinese lanterns if you are near:

- Areas with standing crops.
- Buildings with thatched roofs.
- Areas of dense woodland.
- Areas of heath or bracken, especially in dry conditions.

Top tips

- Lanterns should be used by responsible adults only.
- Adults should not be under the influence of alcohol or any substance that could affect their level of responsibility.
- When launching the lanterns, make sure you have a water supply to hand in case something goes wrong.
- Keep the launch area clear of combustible materials.
- Don't try and launch damaged lanterns – and be aware that writing messages on the paper can cause damage.
- Don't smoke whilst handling lanterns.
- Ensure that there is sufficient clearance for the lanterns to avoid obstacles such as trees, power lines or buildings.

- Avoid launching lanterns near roads, especially major roads or motorways, as they can be off-putting to drivers.
- Don't try and launch lanterns if it is windy, and be sure of the wind direction as this will affect the flight path.

Fireworks



Fireworks are safe if you use them properly. If you're putting on a home display, you should follow some simple steps to make sure that everyone has a good time without getting hurt:

- Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable.
- Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time.
- Read and follow the instructions on each firework, using a torch if necessary.
- Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks.
- Never return to a firework once it has been lit.
- Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them.
- Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.
- Never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire.
- Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving.

Did you know?

- It is against the law to carry fireworks in public if you're under 18.
- Fireworks must not be sold to anyone who is under 18.
- It is an offence to let off fireworks during night hours (11pm to 7am), except on Bonfire Night (midnight), Diwali, New Year, and Chinese New Year (1am).
- It is an offence under the Explosives Act 1875 to tamper with or modify fireworks.
- Sparklers can reach temperatures more than 15 times as hot as boiling water!

After the event

- Never put fireworks, even those which are fully spent, on the bonfire.
- Never dispose of fireworks by burying them.



- Safely dispose of fully spent fireworks.
- Soak misfired or partly spent fireworks in a container of water in an area where they cannot be tampered with (preferably away from the display site) and contact the manufacturer or supplier for advice on disposal.

- Using electricity safely
- Cooking safely
- Making an escape plan
- What to do if there is a fire
- Keeping children safe
- Good practice – night time routine and other points relevant to you
- Identifying and discussing any further support the occupier may need

Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) is following new guidance set out by NHS England in March 2018, meaning that for 35 minor, short-term conditions, medicines that are available over the counter will no longer routinely be prescribed.

Medicines under the guidance include treatments for coughs, colds, dandruff, mild cystitis, nappy rash, warts and verrucae, ear wax, head lice and mild dry skin.

This means that some patients who contact their GP Practice to make an appointment regarding any of the 35 conditions may be advised by the receptionist to seek advice from a pharmacist instead. There are certain scenarios where certain patients should continue to have their treatments prescribed.

New report!

Healthwatch Wiltshire has been gathering the views of local people on a new vision for health and care services in the county.

We spoke to 117 people about the new proposed vision statement being put forward by the Wiltshire Health and Wellbeing Board, which brings together local authorities, the NHS, public health and adult and children's services in a shared vision for the future.

The vision aims for everyone in the county to be empowered to lead happy, healthy and fulfilling lives and tackle the inequalities in health.

We found that most local people supported the vision, however almost a quarter of those interviewed didn't, and this was because they thought it was 'just words' or due to poor experience of health and care services. Most felt it was a good aspiration to lead a healthy life.

Needs Assessment and Recommendations to Calne Area Board

11th September 2018

Purpose of the report:

- 1. To make recommendations for further work in the Calne Community Area and create a sustainable model with projected officer support in the future.**
 - 2. To share an assessment of need for the Calne Community Area based on the Joint Strategic Assessment and focus groups conducted in the area.**
-

Recommendations

- To appoint a youth and children's champion to assist the CEM in coordinating LYN functions
- To create a partnership with John Bentley School to host the physical meetings of the LYN and provide more youth voice to the decision-making process. All consent will be held by JBS.
- To create partnerships with the Town Council and other funders to devise a coordinated plan for youth provision in the community area. Focused on a paid worker with a ¾ or full-time role coordinating volunteers.
- To approach appropriate youth agencies to invite grant applications for paid workers to address the ideas below.
- The successful youth organisation would employ this worker and direct the work streams based on the aims in the applications. Each funder can liaise on the aims for their section of funding in line with the coordinated strategy and will be able to conduct quality assurance checks.

Needs Assessment

The 2017 Joint Strategic Assessment (JSA) is attached giving an overview of the community area against key indicators.

At the 'Our Community Matters' event in November 2016 the community voted on priorities for the area. For children and young people these were:

- Mental and Emotional Health
- Job Prospects
- Educational Attainment

There were some young people from the local youth network and key children and youth service agency partners present. The conversation did address some of the core concerns of young people and children's services and the community vote reflected these priorities.

In 2017 the Locality Youth Facilitator conducted some focus groups at John Bentley School to gain further opinions from young people in the JSA. Young people from different year groups were asked to attend and the school endeavoured to include young people from a variety of backgrounds and abilities.

These young people looked at all the JSA data, not just the children and young people section.

The salient points from these groups included:

The younger years (7-9) didn't feel there needs to be any more activities. Many are beginning to hang out outside in groups. They felt this was part of growing up and finding ownership of a space.

They discussed the experiences of living in Calne. Some felt there were no-go zones. Where they perceived there would be trouble. This led to discussions about personal safety, groups and ownership of older groups.

This group did have strong views about the link between poverty and educational attainment. They felt there was not enough support if you were poor. They identified a link between education and social care and thought there wasn't enough being done to prevent this. They felt education could be improved

While the older years (10-11) had similar feelings about ownership but did see space for more venues rather than activities.

There was a stronger sense of ownership of place than the young group. Multiple venues discussed as well as knowledge of what goes on in each area. There was discussion about interaction with the police asking them to move on. A lot of misperception of anti-social behaviour. They felt they were viewed as anti-social regardless of their actions.

They struggled to formulate a message to adults to communicate their point of view when asked for it from many adults.

They discussed what Calne needed and felt somewhere to sit and eat like a subway would be extremely good for many reasons. To keep out of the way, somewhere safe and somewhere with provisions and a toilet. Shelter. They also thought some form of entertainment would be good, like lazer quest.

In terms of 'Job Prospects' this was discussed by the year 10-11 group and the sixth form group.

The young of these two discussed tactics they use to get employment and how they feel they are seen as not good enough. A lot of them don't know how to go about getting a job as a teenager. Some felt their job prospects as adults were the same while others thought they would be determined enough to get a career and earn money. A lot of discussion was focused on money and economic growth as their success measurement.

The Sixth form group talked about staying in Calne. Many said they wouldn't, they didn't see the job prospects they desired in Calne. Expected to head to a city. Most felt they could find work in Calne and would know how to, however, they didn't feel they could have a career beyond a teenage job role. These young people have already reached a level of attainment that is not considered a concern.

Under 'Mental Health' there was less awareness in younger years of what is available, the year 10-11 group was mixed between people who felt there was enough support and it was effective and people who didn't know what was available and felt there should be more. One person acknowledged she probably thought there wasn't enough as she had no need to access a service so didn't know what was there. All knew of 'Kooth' and felt they knew where to start if they had concerns.

The Sixth Formers all said they didn't know what was available to them in school and felt what would be available wasn't for them. There was discussion about transitions to adulthood and how services in either adult or children's sectors weren't for them.

At the end of each session the young people voted on the children and young people's priority choices as in the JSA event.

This vote demonstrates that there is a possible disparity between what agencies are seeing and dealing with and what young people themselves see as priorities.

There was a short discussion about youth work or positive activities being a space where a lot of the other priorities are addressed. But the conversations about activities centred around space rather than organised activities.

The Local Youth Network

The LYN has functioned since 2014 with a young person chair supported by the LYF/CYO. Calne has had a good youth representation throughout this time while adults from key agencies have been consulted with rather than taking an active role. Although the town council and Launch 2Learning have maintained stronger links and had reps sit on the LYN.

With the potential Wiltshire Community Engagement team restructure and the departure of a dedicated LYF, the Calne LYN and Area Board need to consider how to maintain this youth voice function in grant recommendations and to the area board.

John Bentley School has a strong pupil parliament who have been consulted with by the LYF and has been visited by the current town Mayor Cllr Glenis Ansel. Preliminary conversations with the Head Teacher Mr Tudor have led to the idea that this pupil parliament could host the LYN with the same bi-monthly pattern and include pupils from other secondary's if there is interest.

All young people joining the LYN will need to have consent held by an organisation they are attached to, not an officer from the area board.

A Youth and Children's Champion role has been suggested to help coordinate this new function and maintain contact with the area board. This role could function like the Older People's champion They would coordinate meetings and take actions from meetings to address with the Community Engagement Manager. The role would include children because this age group is also under-represented in the area board.

The LYN would take the JSA priorities to guide their decisions. A combination of the official JSA priorities and the locally focused results will be considered.

The LYN will need to draw in more partners to provide some stability to the LYN group in the absence of a dedicated worker. The LYN could take a commissioning role to fund the dedicated support they require to ensure their actions are delivered professionally.

Ideas for exploration:

Youth Coordinator Role

Commissioning a substantial role for a qualified youth worker in the town could help to put a lot of the following ideas into place. Someone to coordinate volunteers and practically coordinate a couple of evenings of youth work, both centre or café based and street based would ensure that continuous

contact was kept with young people. Face to face engagement with a skilled worker on a long term basis in different settings provides a consistent face for young people and youth voice.

A joint funding model where different agencies fund different aspects of the work and solid partnership agreements will need to be explored to ensure priorities and work streams are clear for the youth worker.

Safe Space.

A group of young people were consulted with in 2016 with Sgt Lungu and Helen Bradley. The idea of a teenage playground came up because young people are often asked to move from the large bucket swing in playgrounds. North End was held up as an inclusive playground space but was very far away. A shelter that you could plug a phone or ipod and play to a certain sound level was brought up as an ideal situation. Young people explored the concept of safety with us and cited physical aspects such as being close to a shop or establishment with adults in case of emergency, somewhere well-lit and somewhere they wouldn't disturb residents. Space is important to young people gaining a sense of ownership and therefore responsibility. Dedicated space for young people, whether a building or outdoor space will be important moving forward.

Positive Tickets

This concept was a successful partnership between the police and area board. It has been agreed to explore this again using more agencies to widen the referral points. Branding and promotion will be key in the success of a new positive tickets model because agencies have less capacity and less face to face time with young people to spot positive acts.

Street Based Outreach

This method is extremely effective but very hard to predict and not consistent. Youth culture and movement has changed a lot in the last 5 years which has been seen across the county. There is now very little intelligence about the effectiveness of street based because most of this provision has been removed.

The LYF has tried to include outreach in grant applications to the LYN. This has had varying success. Young people were met on the street, however the skills of the workers involved did not always bring this to fruition.

There are a couple of agencies with workers skilled in this area. If this were to be pursued, a long term street based approach could be very effective in Calne because of the number of outdoor spaces, including the skate park and because of the feedback from young people in the focus groups.

Youth Café, not Youth club.

Open access spaces are the most requested provision when young people are asked. However, when discussed, a transactionary relationship with adults is often preferred. Young people talk about 'Subway' or 'McDonalds'. A Youth Café can provide a space that is halfway between this client/establishment relationship and a youth work relationship.

There was an attempt to set up a Calne Youth Café however finding someone to coordinate and lead the project proved difficult. Volunteers were abundant and two people attended youth work training in preparation to volunteer but a leader wasn't found. There is a bank account, constitution and potential venue ready to go.

If a paid worker could be found for this role, then I am confident the volunteers would be available to keep a project of this sort running.

Chippenham has a good model of this, run by The Rise Trust. There have been discussions with Rise about youth work in Calne and this avenue could be explored further.

Next steps

As set out in the recommendations. A coordinated approach will be needed to effectively deliver on these ideas. With a decrease in officer support it will be necessary to appoint both voluntary and paid professional support in the Calne area. These elements will support the youth voice function of the area board, support the Area Board officers in delivering aims focused on young people and create solid partnerships to deliver professional youth work.

Preliminary drawings have been completed, but not yet circulated internally for comment and no adverts have yet been placed. **MS to follow up and report to next meeting.**

3. Review of table of schemes:

Update on active schemes

- Woodhill Rise. (legal update)

No change in status in legal status – however footpath improvements are to be completed by end of 2019. **Laura Gosling/Fiona Steven will lead on legal status. SH leading on improvements.**

- Shared use cycle/pedestrian route from Woodhill Rise towards Abberd Way – **This work remains on hold pending resolution of legal matters at Woodhill Rise.**

- Cycle/pedestrian route Abberd Way to Abberd Brook/ liaison with Greensquare – **Atkins have been briefed to start work on this scheme and are currently undertaking preliminary tasks. SH will lead on technical elements. Laura Gosling/Fiona Steven will lead on liaison with Greensquare in future.**
