16	<p><u>Chairman's Welcome and Introductions</u></p> <p>The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting and invited the Councillors and Officers present introduce themselves.</p>
17	<p><u>Apologies for Absence</u></p> <p>Apologies for absence had been received from the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cllr Nick Fogg MBE
18	<p><u>Minutes</u></p> <p><u>Resolved:</u></p> <p>The minutes of the meeting held on 29 January 2019 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.</p>
19	<p><u>Declarations of Interest</u></p> <p>There were no declarations of interest.</p>
20	<p><u>Chairman's Announcements</u></p> <p>The Chairman made the following announcements:</p> <p>Children's Centre Consultation There had been a consultation on new proposals to build on the successful community model for children's centre services. The consultation ended on 20 March 2019 with a report due to go to cabinet later this spring.</p> <p>Electoral Review The draft recommendations of the Local Government Boundary Commission for England were now available to be viewed online at http://www.lgbce.org.uk/all-reviews/southwest/wiltshire/wiltshire-unitary-authority-ua and a consultation had been launched to receive comments. The consultation would be open until 15 April 2019 and was the final opportunity for parties to comment.</p> <p>Update on responsibility for Road Safety Education Further to questions that arose at the last Area Board on who was responsible for Road Safety Education the board could report that the Dorset and Wiltshire Fire Service were the lead on Road Safety Education.</p>

	<p>Special Schools Consultation Cllr Jane Davies advised that the consultation on special schools provision was ongoing and would be extended. The meeting was encouraged to take part and give their views.</p>
21	<p><u>Partner Updates</u></p> <p>Written updates were available in the agenda pack from the Police, Fire Service, Healthwatch Wiltshire, the Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group and Transition Marlborough.</p> <p>In addition to the written updates, the following verbal updates were given by partners present.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Wiltshire Police Acting Inspector Pete Foster gave an update to the meeting. It was stated that the Deputy PCC spoke at the last meeting regarding precept increases. As a result of the increase Marlborough would be getting a new police constable. A new PCSO would also be starting the week after the area board. The increased staffing was welcomed. The PC would be completely dedicated to Marlborough and would be focusing on solving long term problems. A ram-raid had taken place at Screwfix, the suspect was chased to Swindon where he ran out of petrol and was arrested. The suspect was remanded in custody and was awaiting trial. Plain clothes police had stopped a male from London from coming into Marlborough with class A drugs, the suspect was arrested. Marlborough Police Station would close, the new site was likely to be Corner House in George Lane Car Park. This would not affect the service provided. Decisions about the police estate were made by the OPCC. In response to a question from the Chair regarding the timeline for the move it was stated that the move was slightly delayed as they were waiting for sign off from the solicitors. All being well the move was scheduled to take place in July. In response to members of the audience who had contacted the police regarding setting up Community Speedwatches, but had not received a response, the Inspector stated that he would chase this up for them. • Transition Marlborough Milly Carmichael of Transition Marlborough gave an update to the meeting. Wiltshire Council was now one of 48 councils to have declared a climate emergency. Plans were being made to reduce emissions and Milly was attending a conference to gather ideas and help to move plans forward. There were very promising discussions underway for Swindon to also become a transition town. Further details could be found in the agenda pack.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Town and Parish Councils Froxfield Parish Council announced that they had been awarded a grant of £5,500 to upgrade Pocket Park. Pocket Park was a 1.1 acre water meadow site to the south of the A4 which had been given to Froxfield Parish Council and was a nature and wildlife area. Lack of maintenance had led to the area being overtaken by nettles. The parish council had sought help from ARK who had put together a design, design statement and helped with planning permission. The design included a dipping pond, boardwalk and new hedging and would vastly improve the area. The Devizes Community Payback Scheme had come on 5 consecutive Saturdays to help trim and clear the site. The upgrades required a lot of funding and ARK had paid for everything so far. The Ministry of Housing provides grants to Wiltshire Council that can be used for projects which meet the criteria and they had applied for some of this funding. They wanted £15,000, however, weren't sure if they met the criteria. You also have to match fund and they only had £5,000 of funding. A letter of support was provided by Wiltshire Council. They recently found out they had been awarded £5,500 and were very pleased. They would not have been successful without the enthusiasm of the parish clerk, parish council, Wiltshire Council and ARK. They have also applied for lottery funding but are awaiting a response. The Chairman thanked them for the update and praised them on a fantastic job. Neighbourhood Plan Cllr Mervyn Hall, Chairman of the Marlborough Area Neighbourhood Plan (MANP) Steering Group, gave a verbal update. A call for sites had been put out, looking to meet community need, for example affordable housing. They had received submissions from a number of land owners and should be able to meet the need. Land for parking had been more problematic and they were struggling to find land to provide the 100 new spaces required. Land for a new cemetery, Preschute School and the medical centre was also required. The redundant police station was a possible option but may get sold to the highest bidder. Sites were being evaluated and policies formed which would then go out to consultation. After consultation the plans would be submitted to Wiltshire Council, after which there would be more consultation and then a referendum.
22	<p><u>Highways Schemes 2019-2020</u></p> <p>Diane Ware, Principal Technical Officer, Highways gave a presentation on the proposed Highways Schemes for 2019/2020.</p> <p>The officer introduced herself and stated that she was involved in planning all major highways schemes. She was often out and about visiting areas and</p>

Wiltshire's roads were in not too bad a condition in comparison to other places. Previously, when working out the 5 year plan and how much money to allocate each area they used the amount of road network in each area to calculate the budget. However, it had now been decided to allocate spend by need, so areas with the worst roads would get more money.

Approximately a third of Marlborough's roads were rated red and amber. However they did not yet have full network coverage on the state of the roads, with some roads still to be assessed. There were 2 specialist land rovers driving the network with lasers and cameras to assess the state of the roads. They could also use the help of the public. If aware of potholes or an urgent issue that needed fixing then please report it on the My Wiltshire website or App, for other issues, contact Diane herself or report to CATG.

Diane spoke briefly about the budget for the next five years and the plans for Marlborough, the details of which could be found in the agenda pack. The lists of planned works could change depending on survey results and what was reported to them. The officer also stated that even though CATG meetings were not to consider substantive schemes she would be happy to attend some CATG meetings to discuss the area's needs.

Wiltshire Council had a million pounds available for footways. The meeting was encouraged to let Martin Cook know about any footpath issues and about any reactive patching that was required.

There was separate money available for lining works, again let Martin Cook know of requirements. Wiltshire Council was also upgrading street lighting to LED lighting which in the long run would save money and give less light pollution.

In response to questions from the audience the officer stated that works carried out by contractors were checked after 12 months and 24 months. However if the work was found to be faulty or sub-standard then the contractor would be liable.

Yellow lines were checked and renewed. Parking enforcement officers reported flaws in yellow lines and people could also report them on the My Wiltshire App.

The Chairman stated that white lines were an issue for a lot of parishes, lists had been reported to Wiltshire Council, however as the contractors were from out of the county it took a long time to get them in to do the work. He asked if

	<p>there were there any plans to bring white lining in house. The officer stated that yes in the future they were driving to bring a lot of work, such as white lining, in house. Engineers were being mentored to take on the work of consultants and contractors, however it might be 5 or 6 years for this to come to fruition.</p> <p>Cllr Davies asked if when the A4 Salisbury road was worked on, they could modify the white lines, for example a visual narrowing of the road to help reduce speed, as the parish council had a lot of concerns regarding speeding there. The officer advised to report this to her or Martin for action.</p> <p>The board considered the recommendations in the report and it was:</p> <p><u>Resolved</u></p> <p>To:</p> <p>(i) Welcome the road surfacing work and repairs carried out in 2018/19 and note the improvement in the overall condition of Wiltshire’s roads in recent years, but acknowledge that further investment is still required.</p> <p>(ii) Approves the highway maintenance scheme list for 2019/20 prepared for the Area Board.</p> <p>(iii) Note the new provisional five year programme, which will reviewed annually to ensure best value for money and whole life costing for the highways asset.</p> <p>The meeting was adjourned at 7.57pm. The meeting reconvened at 8.02pm.</p>
23	<p><u>Community Area Transport Group</u></p> <p>In Cllr Fogg’s absence Cllr Stewart Dobson updated the meeting on the CATG. Cllr Dobson ran through the minutes of the CATG meeting which took place on 14 March 2019, which could be found in the agenda pack.</p> <p>Cllr Dobson also stated that setting up a Community Safety Partnership had been discussed. Parishes who had attended the CATG were going to consult with their members as to whether the Community Safety Partnership should focus on crime or road safety.</p> <p>It was;</p> <p><u>Resolved</u></p> <p>To note the CATG minutes of the meeting on 14 March 2019.</p>

24	<p><u>Local Youth Network Update and Applications for Youth Funding</u></p> <p>The applications for youth grant funding were introduced. The LYN had recommended all grant applications for approval.</p> <p>Representatives of the 1st Ramsbury Scouts and Marlborough Tennis spoke in support of their applications.</p> <p>The applications for youth grant funding were considered by the board and it was;</p> <p><u>Resolved:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To grant 1st Ramsbury Scouts, £3,500.00, towards activities, courses and camps, rather than the £3,815 applied for. REASON: As it was the end of the financial year, funds were limited, so unfortunately the full amount could not be awarded. However, the board stated that it was a fantastic project and it was hoped that the £3,500.00 would help. • To grant Marlborough Tennis, £3,200.00, to create increased capacity for young people’s tennis, rather than the £3,515.00 applied for. REASON: As it was the end of the financial year, funds were limited, so unfortunately the full amount could not be awarded. However, the board thought it was a very worthwhile project and it was hoped that the £3,200.00 would help. <p>It was determined that the application from Marlborough RFC would be considered under community area grants, where funding comes from the capital budget.</p>
25	<p><u>Marlborough Health and Wellbeing Group</u></p> <p>Jill Turner, Chair of the Marlborough Health and Wellbeing Group gave an update.</p> <p>The HWBG had met on a couple of occasions, with the last meeting being on 4 March 2019. The notes from that meeting could be seen in the agenda pack.</p> <p>The group had 3 main priorities; to appoint an older persons champion; to set up a web based information platform; and to run a health and wellbeing fair, similar to the one that had been held in Devizes last year, to enable providers to network and provide information to the community. The group would report back as they take these initiatives forward.</p>

26	<p><u>Update from Community Engagement Manager</u></p> <p>The Community Engagement Manager, Alexa Davies, gave an update to the meeting.</p> <p>A quick reminder was given regarding National armed Forces day which was coming up on 28-30 June 2019. The event would be free to attend and would involve three days of celebrations:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Friday - Armed Forces family event • Saturday - Community day with parade and air show • Sunday - Veterans and young people's day, to include a human poppy world record attempt. <p>A photography project was underway, with people and community groups being encouraged to take photos of what the armed forces meant to them. Photos would be combined into a collage that would be at the event. The meeting was encouraged to have their photo taken at the end of the meeting with the NAFD flag.</p> <p>Cllr Stewart Dobson spoke, stating that at a previous Area Board meeting funding for a coach to the NAFD on the Sunday had been agreed. As the head of the local Royal British Legion, Cllr Dobson wanted as many veterans as possible to be able to attend. The coach would be leaving Marlborough at 9.30am and leaving Salisbury at around 6pm to return to Marlborough. The coach would be free for veterans and their partners, who would be given priority. If anyone was interested in obtaining places on the coach they should contact Cllr Dobson or the CEM.</p> <p>The CEM also told the meeting about the Great British Spring Clean which was taking place between 22 March and 23 April 2019. There would be quite a few litter picks taking place around Marlborough and the meeting was encouraged to take part.</p>
27	<p><u>Community Area Grant Scheme</u></p> <p>The Chairman introduced the Community Area Grant applications as detailed in the agenda.</p> <p>Representatives of Fyefield & West Overton Parish Council and Marlborough RFC (whose application for youth grant funding was instead being considered under capital grant funding), spoke in support of their applications.</p> <p>The Board considered the application for community area grant funding and it was;</p>

	<p><u>Resolved:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To grant Fyefield & West Overton Parish Council, £3,065.00, for 4 new defibrillators. • To grant Marlborough RFC, Junior Section, £2,000.00, towards new floodlighting for evening training. (Rather than the £4,136.00 requested). REASON: As it was the end of the financial year, funding was limited. The Board wished to spread the funding left over several worthy causes. Marlborough RFC were encouraged to apply for funding again in the new financial year. • To grant the Cllr Led Initiative by Cllr Nick Fogg, MBE, any remaining funding, to help support the New Road Day Centre and the Jubilee Centre. Remaining funds were calculated as £5,635.55, so each centre would receive £2,817.77.

What is Community Led Housing?

Community led housing is about local people playing a leading and lasting role in solving local housing problems, creating genuinely affordable homes and strong communities in ways that are difficult to achieve through mainstream housing.

Community led housing can empower local communities, making them more resilient and able to address issues such as affordable housing and the need for downsizer accommodation.

What is the Wiltshire Community Led Housing Project?

Wiltshire Council, in partnership with Community First and Wiltshire Community Land Trust, has set up a partnership project to advise and support communities to address their housing needs.

The project vision is to enable and support community groups to deliver housing development that provides defined community benefits which are protected in perpetuity; and to provide a legacy for community led development. Localism and innovation lies at the heart of this and it will help to build stronger and more resilient communities. Community led housing can be complimentary of the on-going Neighbourhood Planning work of the council and its communities.

Community led housing needs to have meaningful community engagement and has to have widespread community support. This means the community needs to have a common vision and shared values; they need to be empowered. This project supports and enables groups seeking to deliver alternative solutions to their community needs beyond the mainstream delivery mechanisms. It can also support community groups working in a developer-community partnership.

The project team has been established with two project managers, a senior planning officer and a housing enabler. It is a cross service project. Grant funding is currently available to groups to help with start-up subject to qualifying terms and conditions.

What has happened so far and what will be happening?

The project is currently supporting seven community groups across Wiltshire including the formally incorporated Seend Community Land Trust. This group have been supported in their establishment, and land identification and negotiation work. Going forward, further support will be given through the planning, building and living stages of their projects as appropriate. They started as individuals, formed a steering group and became a legally recognized community led housing group formulating their own development proposals to serve their community needs.

The team are keen to build as wide a network of community led housing groups as possible throughout Wiltshire. We want to speak to anyone who is interested in trying to take a leading role in addressing community housing issues.

A consultation has been launched on how we can prevent homelessness and help those who are homeless to find a home.

Wiltshire Council is asking for views on its new strategy which sets out priorities and actions to work with those who are homeless or threatened with homelessness, to help them secure and keep a good home.

Ashley O'Neill, Portfolio Holder for Housing, said: "We are making real progress in tackling homelessness in Wiltshire, but we can never be complacent – we always need to do more"

"We need to think creatively, deliver a wide range of services and have effective, strong, partnership working to prevent homelessness, and provide the homeless with support to tackle the cause of their homelessness."

"This strategy will rely on stakeholders and the communities in Wiltshire and we would like people to let us know their views so we can all make a positive impact on preventing homelessness into the future."

The consultation will seek views on five priorities:

- Reducing rough sleeping
- Identifying and preventing homelessness at the earliest possible stage
- Ensuring services are designed to prevent homelessness and support those who are homeless.
- Ensuring those who are threatened with homelessness or who are homeless can secure and keep a suitable home.
- Maintaining effective strategic direction and partnership working

Each priority has a number of actions. These include increasing street outreach, developing a resettlement support service, and ensuring there is more housing available to help the homeless.

The strategy has been informed by Wiltshire Council's Homelessness Review 2018 and Homeless Health Needs Assessment. It also follows the national Homelessness Reduction Act 2017, which introduced a new legal duty on specified public services to refer customers who may be homeless or threatened with homelessness to a local housing authority.

The Council has withdrawn the statutory proposal to close Larkrise, St Nicholas and Rowdeford schools and create one new, larger school in Rowde by 2023 to enable further wider views and thoughts to be put forward. 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News

Primary Care Networks

The Government announced a number of policies and incentives this year to help the health and care system meet increasing demand. General practice is at the core of these new ideas with the establishment of Primary Care Networks.

Each network will serve patient populations of around 30,000-50,000. Organisations within the network area will work closely together to give patients access to a wider range of health and care professionals, as part of community teams. This includes GPs, nurses, physios, therapists, pharmacists and social care providers – each providing care that is proactive, coordinated and accessible. With the focus on patients seeing the right health professional for their needs, GPs should have more time to spend on patients who need them the most.

To support their establishment, a Primary Care Network Development Programme will be centrally funded and locally delivered. By 2023/24, the PCN contract is expected to invest an additional £4.5bn per year, or £1.47 million per typical network covering 50,000 people.

GPs in Wiltshire have decided on 11 Primary Care Networks:

- Sarum West
- Sarum South
- Sarum North
- Devizes
- Trowbridge
- Bradford on Avon and Melksham
- Westbury and Warminster
- Chippenham including Corsham and Box
- Calne
- North Wiltshire Border Locality including Malmesbury, Tolsay, Royal Wootton Bassett, Purton and Cricklade
- East Kennet.

GPs and Practice Managers attended a meeting in mid-March to discuss the establishment of the networks and we will provide more information on the progress of the networks in the months to come.

Update for Marlborough Area Board from Transition Marlborough – May 2019

Climate Emergency

It is a sign of the times that we can simply copy and paste the first sentences of the report to Area Board in March and for them to still be true:

“Since the last Transition report to the Area Board seismic shifts have occurred in public awareness and activity around climate change, plastic pollution, biodiversity depletion, food security and sovereignty, trust in political processes and the urgency that is required in taking effective action to address them all. The IPCC report, Blue Planet, Greta Thunberg and the school strikes for climate, and Extinction Rebellion have all been key drivers in that shift.”

Momentum is certainly gaining and media coverage balance is shifting. Wales, Scotland and the Labour Party have all since declared a Climate Emergency and there is a strong push now for the UK Parliament to be the first national parliament to declare too.

Wiltshire Council is bringing together a committee to take their own declaration forward. Transition Marlborough is inviting an alliance of other Transition, Climate Action, Environmental and Social Justice groups across the county to support the council in their goals once that committee is established. That will be informed by what was learned by our members and friends who attended the Climate Emergency conference in Lancaster on March 29th.

The Bee Roadzz Project

Permaculture Magazine and Bee Craft magazine have now published articles about the project and we have already had interest from the British Bee Keepers Association schools liaison lead as a result. Our sister project in Swindon has had lots of positive media coverage with representation at Swindon’s Ecofest and mural painting of the project logo at Penhill Haven. Work has also begun on a new community bee-friendly garden at Mildenhall Village Hall as a contribution to the project.

Introduction to Permaculture course

Five of the planned twelve sessions of this year’s course have taken place. The group is smaller than usual but all participants are learning much and giving us very positive feedback. Interestingly, once again, most participants are not actually from Marlborough but from Devizes, Swindon, Calne and other local areas. This is something we will seek to address for the 2020 course.

Film Nights

We continue with seasonal free film nights hosted at the Community and Youth Centre.

Thursday May 2nd saw a screening of ‘Down to Earth’ - currently on a national tour and following one family’s journey, over 5 years, to live with indigenous communities around the world to capture the wisdom of ‘The Earth Keepers’ and inspire a more sustainable way of life. (This report was written before the screening so an evaluation of the event will come in the next report)

Local Sustainable Food Network

In a bid to start small and build slowly, the first aim of this budding new project is to make creative use of the town's used coffee grounds (of which there are large quantities owing to the numbers of coffee outlets, cafes and restaurants in Marlborough). It is a nutrient-rich, organic product that is heavy and bulky to dispose of through usual waste management routes and could be much better utilized than disposal in landfill. Three avenues are currently in the early stages of research: distribution for home composting, making fuel briquettes / 'logs' and use as a growing medium for mushrooms.

Transition Swindon

We are supporting moves in Swindon to bring together a wide range of existing community and environmental projects and groups under the umbrella of a new 'Transition Town'. A meeting in Swindon is planned for mid-June to take this forward with a speaker from the national Transition Network presenting the compelling case for becoming a Transition Town. It could be an important step for Swindon and very encouraging for us in Marlborough to have the presence of such an alliance on our doorstep.

Our '**Transition Healthcheck**' analysis was very successful. We reflected on and celebrated all that has been achieved by Transition Marlborough over the years, how we are developing now and highlighted areas of needed development. This has fed into an international project to analyse the 'health' of Transition across the globe.

The healthcheck tool could be easily adapted for use by any community group or public-facing organization to examine purpose, structure, effectiveness, group culture, activity, public engagement, goals and progress. We are happy to share it with anyone who is interested.

6. Project summary:

Marlborough Town Council together with the English Civil War Society ECWS and with the support of Marlborough History Society and The Merchants House intend to stage The Battle of Marlborough depicting various exciting events and activities from the English Civil War of 1642 to bring the 17th century alive during the weekend of 27-28 July 2019. The events will take place throughout the town The Merchants House St Marys Church and other exhibition venues. There will be an encampment in Priory Gardens where visitors will be transported back to everyday life in the 17th century with the large battle re-enactment itself on Marlborough Common involving an hour-long display of pikemen with their 16 feet long pikes, musketeers, cavalry and the firing of cannons - a real history lesson. Playground for Marlborough St Marys CEVC Primary School

6. Project summary:

The new playground will be constructed of high-quality materials in keeping with the surroundings and will

include a double wooden tower pirate ship with bridge, slide, fireman's pole and den, a large woodland climber, a bouldering wall, an area with a mixed level activity trail including parallel bars, monkey bars, balance bar, balance weaver and swinging logs. There will be a variety of accessible high points and raised platforms maximising space and adding an element of adventure for all children inclusive of their different physical needs. This will encourage social inclusion, turn-taking and improve health outcomes of the children by supporting their physical development. In particular improving upper body strength and assisting the development of gross motor skills. We are proposing to install a modest scheme cost wise that is high quality exciting and challenging. We obtained 3 quotes from API -Association of Play Industry- accredited companies with our preferred supplier offering a guarantee of 05-15 years. 5 years for surfacing and 10-15 years for timber and materials. The Friends of Marlborough St Marys have been incredibly supportive of this project and recognise that it is of high priority for the school and have been fund raising hard with the aim that we can start work on installing the scheme in Spring-Summer 2019. If we receive funds from the Area Board then it would be a fantastic boost in order for us to complete our goal as soon as possible.

When St Peters Junior and St Marys Infant schools amalgamated on to the one site as Marlborough St Marys Primary School in September 2017 we were unable to bring the St Peters play equipment to the new site. Consequently, the KS2 children do not have access to stimulating play equipment except for a ball games area which does not appeal to all children. An important part of the school experience is the benefit of outdoor play. Marlborough St Marys has actively been promoting this and has worked hard to develop new ways for the children to use the outdoor spaces around the school. This project represents a vital phase in this work. The area we wish to develop cannot be used in winter as the ground becomes wet and muddy. This project would mean it is available all year round increasing the community's access to leisure spaces and increasing their activity levels. This is important particularly as one local play area in the school's catchment area has just been removed to make way for a housing development. Marlborough St Marys is located in the ward of Marlborough West however the catchment area is mainly to the east of the town with a large proportion of social housing. The Wiltshire Mosaic Index for 2018 shows the school graded 28 out of 199 schools in Wiltshire with 1 being the most disadvantaged. The school currently has 385 children on roll and is projected to be at capacity within a few years. The new play area will be a lasting legacy that thousands of local children will get the benefit of over the coming years. The children will have access to the new play area before school at lunchtime and after school. The after-school club will use it daily to expand the kind of activities on offer and ensure the children increase their daily activity levels at a time when they would usually be indoors playing games or watching TV. Youth groups in the area know about the plans for the project and want to book the area to use on an ad hoc basis e.g. Cubs. Scouts. local church youth group and MYFC. This will enable them to enhance their activities and broaden the projects reach to local

youngsters outside of the school. The school has also just agreed in principal a holiday club proposal which would be open to all local children and would offer regular use of the play facilities outside term time. The community has been involved in the projects development and will be central to its delivery. We involved the PTA, parents, children, PE and SEN staff in the design and asked local groups what they would like to use and why. Adventure play equipment was the most popular design because it would deliver much needed excitement and challenge e.g. climbing. It would be suitable for a range of needs e.g. low level for children with physical disabilities. It would offer higher level challenges to keep on improving gross motor skills and core body strength and finally it would provide a basis for so many different activities that the local community could use e.g. pirate ship for imaginative play - navigation of obstacles - problem solving and physical exercise. This project will provide all round benefits for the children's well-being. Physical social and emotional development will be enhanced.

1. Physical. Positive early experiences with a range of physical activity and development of gross motor skills in children is important in enabling a life-long participation in sports and recreation activity so contributing to long term physical social and psychological health. More immediately children benefit from having a wide choice of gross motor experiences that are non-competitive and focused on having fun. The proposed scheme caters to a range of children's individual interests' skills and abilities. Physical development benefits include. Gross motor experiences. Fine motor experiences. Physical challenges. Self-help skills.
2. Relationship Building. Providing a range of outdoor play equipment for children of primary age who naturally seek to engage in active play and have a desire to interact with other children helps to build social relationships and to develop the school as a supportive and inclusive community. Informal play experiences are an excellent way for children of different backgrounds and with different life experiences to interact, build understanding, tolerance and develop friendships. The use of shared equipment engenders a sense of citizenship as children learn and practice turn-taking. Other social development benefits include. Social cognition and empathy plus perspective-taking. Cooperation. Sharing. Turn-taking. Conflict resolution. Leadership skill development e.g. control of impulses and aggressive behaviour.
3. Emotional Well-Being. Playing outside gives children a heightened sense of emotional well-being. The freedom offered by outdoor play impacts positively on behaviour e.g. allowing children to more openly express themselves become less solitary and enjoy a range of sensory experiences. Emotional benefits include. Enjoyment, fun and love of life. Relaxation, release of energy and tension reduction. Self-expression. Self-confidence, self-esteem, anxiety reduction and therapeutic effects.
4. Outdoor Environment. This project will encourage children to have a positive and fulfilling relationship with the outdoor environment. Time spent outside in the natural outdoor environment also has positive outcomes in terms of more difficult behaviour. The calming and relaxing influence of active outdoor play has huge and long-lasting benefits in terms of behaviour and ability to learn in the classroom environment. The multiple benefits of having a stimulating outdoor play environment accessible to children through the seasons cannot be over-estimated. It can help children with. Language and communication skills e.g. vocabulary, story-telling and emergent literacy. General education. A meaningful and fun and enjoyable context for children to learn new concepts and skills. Exploration and discovery on their own and with others. A context for experimenting and risk-taking. Practicing skills. Other developmental benefits including creativity, abstract thinking, imagination, problem-solving, concentration and persistence. The new playground will enable more people to fulfil their potential by working to address issues at the earliest possible stage. Specifically, physical and mental health as Marlborough St Marys has a higher than average number of children with special educational needs who have a range of physical, social, emotional and learning needs. The school has 22 percent SEND which is 9.6 percent higher than the national of 12.4 percent in state-funded primary schools. Currently the 20-place resource base is oversubscribed with 25 children on roll. Some of these children have very significant needs. In particular, gross motor skills development is low which impacts children's activity levels, stamina and overall well-being. For all children there is a pressing need to address their low self-esteem, resilience and growth mindset. This is holding them back from trying new things, taking risks and dealing with failure in a positive way. This is due to a lack of enriching experiences e.g. families tell us they would like to do more but are restricted because of money or transport or time issues as well as wider societal pressures e.g. to do well at school or to portray a positive image of themselves. This is especially true for older children and young people in the age of social media. Families said it was important that the outdoor area was developed into something special that could be used by pupils and their families plus outside groups thereby giving something back to the local community. This play equipment will enhance outdoor learning experiences and help develop social interaction and cohesion. We hope this will enhance a sense of community both within the school and beyond.

14. How will you monitor this?

The Personal development, behaviour and welfare of the children is a key area on the School Development Plan.

This includes the following objectives. To enable children to develop positive behaviours and engage constructively in learning and the wider school environment. To improve children's self-esteem and well-being. To continue to develop provision of PE and enable all children to participate in 30-minute daily exercise. To develop an awareness of a safe and healthy lifestyle in the school to enhance children's health and their learning capacity as well as their life opportunities. To develop and enhance outdoor learning opportunities and access to the outdoor environment. The school employs a pastoral support and parent support advisors who along with the Teachers and Midday supervisors and play leaders will be able to assess the impact of the new playground. The board of governors includes a Children's Emotional Wellbeing Governor. The school is in the process of applying for the Healthy Schools Award. We encourage parents to submit their feedback via OFSTEDs Parent view. parents' meetings and regular coffee and chat sessions. Governors and Senior Leadership regularly monitor the school development plan. the children's outcomes. parent feedback and behaviour. The school also monitors agreements with local community groups and plan to send out an annual questionnaire on the benefits of its facilities.
