Procedure for the Election of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman

The Democratic Services representative will call for nominations for the position of Chairman of the Area Board and preside over the election. A Member's nomination must be seconded to be valid. A Member shall not be nominated in their absence without their written consent.

In the event of only one valid nomination being received the person presiding will declare the nominated Member elected.

In the case of two valid nominations the Democratic Services representative will ask for a show of hands from those Members in favour of each Member and declare the candidate receiving the majority of votes of the Members present and voting, to be the winner.

In the case of an equality of votes for the two candidates, the Democratic Services representative shall draw lots, or an equivalent method to break the tie, to determine the winner of the election and then declare the result.

In the case of three or more valid nominations being made, the Democratic Services Representative will call for a show of hands for each of the candidates. The Democratic Services representative will then announce the candidate with the least number of votes and that candidate will be eliminated (in the case of a tie for the least number of votes, the Democratic Services representative shall draw lots or use an equivalent method to determine which candidate to be eliminated). A further vote shall be taken for the remaining candidates and after each vote the candidate with the least number of votes shall be eliminated until only two candidates remain and a final vote taken.

The newly elected Chairman of the Area Board shall then preside over the election of the Vice-Chairman in the manner described above with the ability to use a casting vote in the event of an equality of votes.

A number of tributes were paid to Cllr Trotman, including from Calne's Mayor, Robert MacNaughton. The Chairman praised Cllr Trotman for his kind support and described him as man who you could ask any question to. Cllr Ashley O'Neill applauded Cllr Trotman as a fantastic community champion with a kind heart, who was often referred to as Mr Calne and said that he would miss his knowledge and encouragement. Cllr Tom Rounds added that Cllr Trotman was a lovely man who was much loved around the town.

	In relation to the Calne Wordfest grant application under Item 11, the Chairman noted that he had received a dispensation from the Monitoring Officer for an Other Registerable Interest, being a Trustee of Calne Wordfest. The dispensation allowed him to chair the item and remain in the room in his capacity as a councillor and take part in debate. However, he would not vote on the item.
	Cllr Tom Rounds declared that he was a member of Calne Town Council. Members of town councils had a standing dispensation to participate in and vote on applications from their councils unless there was any other valid reason not to do so.
110	Chairman's Updates
	The Chairman noted that a consultation was open on the Calne and Melksham Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans (LCWIP) until 22 December. There would also be an opportunity to comment on the final report in early 2024. A member of the public, Celia, highlighted the importance of walking within the plan, noting that the majority of comments related to cycling. Glenis Ansell from Clane Town Council spoke about ensuring that all of the relevant footpaths were included in the plans, including to Marden Farm.

	The Chairman also highlighted that the Rise Trust had been awarded £5,000 from the Police and Crime Commissioner's Community Action Fund, some of which would help go towards supporting activities in Calne.

	The Chairman highlighted that page 24 of the agenda pack provided detail on
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	the early history of Calne, including information from archaeological digs in 2016 and 2021.
112	Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks (SSE)
	Mel Grace from Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks (SSEN) explained that they were responsible for the maintenance of cables in the regional electricity network. They were not the company to which customers paid their bills but did receive a small part of the bill to maintain the network. She then referred the Area Board to information about grid capacity and power outages in Calne, available on page 39 of the agenda pack. This information had been requested following questions at the recent Ask the Leader session on 26 October.
	She explained that the Priority Services Register allowed vulnerable people to sign up to be contacted during prolonged power outages. The most vulnerable customers would, where appropriate, be eligible to receive further assistance and a welfare van would travel to their home to ensure that they were receiving the right support. For security, it was also optional to set a password that the support assistant would provide on arrival. It was noted that it was possible to report a power outage anywhere in the country by ringing 105. Further information could be obtained by contacting melanie.grace@sse.com.

	The following partners also provided verbal updates:
	Calne Community Safety Forum
	Glenis Ansell reported that the group was planning to reinstate the Safe Spaces Scheme. Information was requested by Alan Hill from Calne Town Council about the involvement of Wiltshire Council in the Safe Spaces Scheme. The Strategic Engagement and Partnerships Manager, Ros Griffiths, noted that a response

would be co-ordinated and provided to Cllr Hill and the Community Safety Forum directly.

Calne Health and Social Care Forum

Diane Gooch, the Area Board's Older Person's Champion, reported that they were running reconnecting sessions on Tuesday mornings which were attended by 50 people. She also noted that the Area Board had funded forthcoming Celebrating Age projects, including a pantomime in February and an opera in March 2024.

The Older Person's Champion also highlighted that Calne Health and Social Care Forum had been contributing to Wiltshire Council's dementia strategy and that Calne was the first dementia friendly town in Wiltshire. Alison Ingham, Practice Manager at Northlands Surgery, added that Christmas party for carers would be held in Calne Town Hall and that Calne Health and Social Care Forum wanted to hear local views about dementia service needs.

Calne Town Council

Alan Hill gave an overview of recent updates from Calne Town Council, including:

- The town council had agreed its budget for 2024-25, including a five percent increase for a Band D property. He noted that although the precept would increase in the forthcoming financial year, the budget had not gone up for the previous seven years. Calne Town Council had previously had the highest Band D precept of any town in Wiltshire but, due to financial control in recent years, it was currently down to eleventh.
- He was pleased to report that Calne had been approved to be the location of a new banking hub and that this step was supported by the town council.
- It was important to have a footpath from Marden Farm to Kingsbury Green Academy to allow pupils to get safely to school.
- He noted that he would welcome more information about newly painted survey markings in the town.
- Concerns were raised about the closure of the A3102 in Royal Wootton Bassett on 25 November, as the diversion was through the A4 in Calne, which had been closed on 24 November.

The Chairman noted that he been assured by Wiltshire Council's Highways Team that they would consider the timing of every set of road works when approving the schedule.

Wiltshire Police

Sergeant Mike Tripp gave the following update on activity in the Community Police Team's area:

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	 They had conducted a number of engagement activities including at Holy Trinity C of E Academy, where Police Constable Jon Bourke gave a presentation about County Lines. The force had been undertaking immigration enforcement, modern slavery and anti-drug related activities. An adult had recently been arrested for drink driving and another for assaulting an emergency worker. A Community Protection Notice had been issued to the owner of an out-of-control dog. An adult male had been charged with a serious offence but, as the suspect had been detained, they were no longer believed to be a threat to the public.
	In response to a query about shoplifting by young people at a local supermarket Police Community Support Officer, Mark Cook, explained that the supermarket had attended a recent Community Safety Forum meeting to receive advice about how to tackle the issue.
	Calne Without Parish Council
	John Barnes provided an update on environmental and road safety issues, including:
	 The parish council had received 120 trees earlier that day that would be given away free to residents who had registered for the Plant a Tree Scheme. They were offering a thermal imaging camera loan scheme. A path was being reinstated where it crossed Millennium Bridge. The parish council would like to see a weight limit imposed for vehicles travelling along Norley Lane in Studley. The progress in clearing the footpath along the A4 was welcomed.
	Cllr Ashley O'Neill noted that progress was being made on Wiltshire Council's freight strategy and that he had been lobbying for a full-width pavement along the A4.
	Cherhill Parish Council
	Progress had been made on Cherhill Monument and White Horse.
	Calne Community Neighbourhood Plan
	John Barnes reported that the Calne Community Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group had recommended reducing the scope of the proposed housing allocation in the draft Wiltshire Local Plan in order to complete the review before Calne Without Parish Council was restructured to form six separate councils in May 2025.

114	BaNES, Swindon and Wiltshire Together - Integrated Care Board
	Fiona Slevin-Brown, Place Director for Wiltshire at the Integrated Care Board and Jo Cullen, Director of Primary Care, from the Integrated Care Board delivered a wide-ranging presentation about health provision in the local area. They gave a brief overview of the Integrated Care System, explaining that it was established to better join up health and care services.
	During the discussion, points included:
	 The Area Board thanked the directors for their update. They were informed that a Primary Care Network was a group of GP practices working together with other health and social care organisations to provide integrated services to the local population. In response to queries about the impact of an increasing population on service provision, the directors explained that GP surgeries were funded according to their registered population. The role of the Integrated Care Board was to understand the views of the local population about how they accessed services and to co-ordinate service provision across the area. It was noted that were economies of scale that could be achieved within a Primary Care Network by working closely together. In response to reservations from ClIr O'Neill about whether Patford House Partnership joining the proposed Primary Care Network would help to improve services, given previous challenges, the directors stressed that the focus would be on patient outcomes across the network and bringing professionals together. When asked by representatives from Calne Town Council about the timeline for the proposed new medical practice in Calne, the Director of Primary Care stated that she hoped to bring some positive news soon. She noted that plans for the new centre needed to be assessed in the context of service provision across the area and were therefore related to plans for the Primary Care Network. Alan Hill from Calne Town Council said he would welcome further collaboration between the Patford House Partnership and the Integrated Care Board in delivering the new medical corting. The Place Director emphasised that forming a Primary Care Network would help to unlock funding from central government and support the business case for a new premises. Emmy Butcher, the Managing Partner at Patford House Partnership, explained that the original business case for the proposed centre was approved before the Covid-19 pandemic and
	concerns about the direction of the project to deliver the new medical centre. The Manging Partner at Patford House Partnership reassured the Area Board the Patford House were working closely with their builder to

	 submit a revised business case to the Integrated Care Board and that a project manager was in place. It was noted that Patford House had submitted two business cases to the Integrated Care Board, but they had not met the criteria required by NHS England. The Place Director emphasised that the business case was not being delayed pending a wider strategy and that it would need to be assessed through the District Valuer Service, a nationally run body independent of the Integrated Care Board. Alison Ingham, Practice Manager at Northlands Surgery, highlighted that they were facing lots of pressure given the volume of patients at their practice and challenges caused by the pandemic. She noted that decisions about a possible extension at Northlands would have to be taken in the context of provision across the wider area, as a band new practice could impact their number of patients in the longer term. Details were sought about dental services for children. It was noted that oral health was a priority for the Integrated Care Board and that schemes were being run for supervised toothbrushing. Furthermore, work was being done to ensure that Children Looked After had access to dental services. Further information was sought about the support on offer for children with autism.
115	Area Board Priority and Working Group Update
	Young People
	The Chairman reported that he had visited Kingsbury Green Academy to receive presentations from students. He stated that it was amazing to hear their perspective and noted that it was important to think about how best to communicate with young people.
	Older People
	Cllr Tom Rounds praised the successful Dementia Day held on 16 September 2023. He noted that the Dementia Dome had been a useful experience and that they would look to hold events in 2024.
	Environment
	Area Board Delivery Officer, Louisa Young, explained that Calne Without Parish Council had held a fantastic eco-day, which had been attended by councillors. She also highlighted that a <u>report</u> on Wiltshire Council's response to the climate emergency had been considered by Cabinet in October. Another successful event was when Wiltshire Wildlife delivered a presentation about community energy in Hilmarton. Furthermore, she noted that Sustainable Calne were now lending out their thermal imaging camera, funded by the Area Board, to identify areas of heat loss.

	<u>Economy</u>
	The Strategic Engagement and Partnerships Manager, Ros Griffiths, stated that she had been holding conversations with Calne Food Bank and Citizens Advice about support for food bank users. She also reported that Calne Leisure Centre had run FUEL events for children from lower income families over the holidays and that they would be offering support again over the Christmas break. She encouraged eligible families that were interested to register by 8 December.
	<u>Transport</u>
	Cllr Ashley O'Neill was pleased to report that there had been progress following up on the actions from the recent Highways Matters event, including speed reductions in Studley and tackling accessibility issues in Quarr Barton. He also reiterated that, although the budget of the Local Highway and Footway Improvement Group has doubled since the previous financial year, the group had managed to spend its full budget.

Priorities

The council's top priorities are road safety and road maintenance. A speed reduction in Foxham and West End has been agreed and new speed limit signs will be installed. Work progressing is progressing on installing horse rider signage, starting with Tytherton Lucas, and on purchasing speed indicator devices. Our thank go to our Parish Steward, Michael Jarzebinski, for all the work he has done on our lanes in the last few months and particularly for cutting grips to allow the water to run off the road more easily.

Vehicles continue to travel too fast and our thanks go to the police who have continued to deal with speeding drivers in East Tytherton.

We are still working on improving the passing places with the biggest holes in them but have been delayed by the wet weather.

Not a Formally Constituted Meeting

Please note that this was not a formally constituted meeting as it was not quorate. No formal decisions were made.

1 Introduction to Wiltshire's Councillors

The Democratic Services Officer, Matt Hitch, informed the Area Board that it would not be possible to open a formally constituted meeting as it would be inquorate. The Area Board would therefore not be able to take any formal decisions at the meeting.

The Wiltshire Councillors present introduced themselves.

2 Apologies for Absence

Apologies were received from:

- Cllr Ian Thorn
- Cllr Ashley O'Neill
- Perry Payne Wiltshire and Swindon Road Safety Partnership
- Helen O'Gara Calne Wordfest

3 Minutes

The Area Board had the opportunity to discuss the minutes of the previous meeting, held on 5 December 2023.

Glenis Ansell, Chair of Patford House Partnership Patient Participation Group, reported that, since the previous meeting, Patford House had rejoined Calne and Yatton Keynell Primary Care Network. She explained that the surgeries

were working on a toolkit for patients. She also noted that Wiltshire Council owned the building at Patford House and it was in need of additional investment.

4 **Declarations of Interest**

The Chairman declared an Other Registrable Interest in relation to the Youth Tale Trail Storytelling application by virtue of being a Trustee of Calne Wordfest. He explained that he had received a dispensation from the Monitoring Officer to remain in the room during the meeting and contribute during debate from the Chair.

The dispensation would also have permitted him to vote on the application, were the Area Board to be able to take decisions at the meeting. However, the Chairman noted that he would not have intended to vote unless there was a need for him to use his casting vote.

The Chairman also declared that he was a member of Calne Town Council. Members of Wiltshire Council have a standing dispensation to participate in, and vote on, applications from town and parish councils, of which they are members, unless there are other overriding reasons for them not to do so.

5 Chairman's Updates

The Chairman drew attention to the following information:

- He thanked Area Board Delivery Officer Louisa Young for her help in supporting the Area Board and wished her well in her new role as a Community Conversations Officer in Chippenham.
- Thanks were also given to Alison Ingram for all of her work in the community. Alison chaired the local Health and Social Care Forum and supported a number of events held in partnership with the Area Board, such as the Big Get Together and Calne Dementia Day. Alison would be retiring as Practice Manger at Northlands Surgery in March.
- Advice was available <u>online</u> to support victims of flooding, including the recent Storm Henk.
- A statement from the BaNES, Swindon and Wiltshire Integrated Care Board about Patford House Partnership joining the Primary Care Network was on page 17 of the agenda pack.

Glenis Ansell, Chair of Patford House Partnership Patient Participation Group, said that patient groups were developing a strategy and looked forward to positive news.

Diane Gooch, the Area Board's Older Person's Champion, requested further information about the engagement work being carried out by the Integrated Care Board in the local community.

Alan Hill from Calne Town Council highlighted the importance of delivering a new medical facility for the town and stated that he would welcome additional support from Wiltshire Council in achieving that goal.

6 Information Items

The Area Board noted the information items set out in the agenda pack, they were:

- The Wiltshire Council <u>Consultation Portal</u> was open.
- Crime figures for Calne Town and Calne Rural were available to view online.
- Families and Children's Transformation Programme, **pg. 19-22**

7 Chief Constable Update

Inspector Pete Foster gave an update on behalf of the local neighbourhood police team. Key points included:

- He was pleased to report that the Neighbourhood Team now had more officers and introduced their newest recruit PC Lizzie Wright.
- The importance of neighbourhood policing was emphasised.
- It was noted that the operating model of Wiltshire Police's response teams had been reformed going from a five team to four team model. Having fewer, but larger, teams would ensure better availability of officers.
- Wiltshire Police had published a number of community commitments.
- Recent initiatives to improve community engagement included hosting a series of Facebook Live events where officers would answer presubmitted questions. Neighbourhood police teams would also participate in online parish forums in addition to their existing engagements.
- Wiltshire was a very safe county and had the lowest crime per thousand people in the country.
- Community conversations had taken place at Calne Hub and Library and Marden Vale CE Academy.
- Out of Court Disposals had become a significant area of focus, as evidence was showing that it was effective at reducing reoffending rates. Under this approach, rather than offenders being sent to court, they would be invited to make reparations to their victims, such as writing letters of apology.
- Prevention was very important component of the strategy to reduce crime including in areas such as speed awareness.
- The Community Road Safety Team had greatly increased the number of enforcement notices issued, with over 2,000 sent out in the previous quarter.
- There had been issues in the local area with e-scooters. It was illegal to ride e-scooters on pavements and they needed to be taxed.

During the discussion, points included:

- Chief Constable Catherine Roper reassured the Area Board that Calne Police Station would not be closing. She reported that under the new operating model there were additional resources for neighbourhood teams, so that local inspectors could bid for additional support if there were particular areas of concern.
- Additional mobile police engagement vehicles had been sent out in the county and had visited Calne.
- Police Community Support Officer Mark Cook was doing a great job.
- In response to questions about why the Area Board's area did not often appear on priority speeding lists, Inspector Foster noted that lists often included areas of civilian patrols and his team had been conducting additional patrols.
- It was noted that through Project Zero, traffic officers would conduct additional patrols in different areas of the county at specific times.
- Referencing the lower than predicted crime levels in December 2023, Cllr Tom Rounds questioned whether cost of living pressures had had an impact. Inspector Foster explained that there was a complex relationship between crime and economic circumstances, as crime could go up in times of poverty. However, he noted that less disposable income spent on alcohol did have an impact on reducing the number of violent offences.
- When asked about the steep fall in the number of burglaries, Inspector Foster noted that they had a low level of burglaries in Calne, so the arrest of one or two prolific offenders could have a significant impact on the figures.
- Alan Hill from Calne Town Council asked why the map on page 9 of Wiltshire Police's Estate Strategy 2023-27 did not feature Calne in the estate model locations. In response, the Chief Constable reiterated that there were no plans to close the station. She noted that, although the station was not staffed 24/7, it was used by the Neighbourhood, Response and Rural Crime teams. The Chief Constable offered for a link to the Estates Strategy to be sent to the Clerk at Calne Town Council.
- It was noted that town councils in Calne, Corsham and Chippenham had funded a police van for use in their towns. Further information was sought about how the van was being deployed.
- It was confirmed that the van funded jointly by the town councils was not the CCTV van that had recently been recently vandalised in Calne. Wiltshire Police would provide an update about the vandalised van.
- The Area Board's Older Person's Champion praised Wiltshire Police's Fraud Prevention Strategy and noted that they had been given a presentation at Calne Health and Social Care Forum.
- It was asked whether there were plans to roll out bleed kits, like those introduced in Swindon, to the rest of Wiltshire. Inspector Foster noted that different types of crime were often committed in Swindon to the rest of the county.

A question was asked about whether Wiltshire Police were still in special measures and, if they were, what this meant for residents. The Chief Constable explained that Wiltshire Police had been placed in special measures in 2022. The force was adjudged to be inadequate in its response to the public, protection of vulnerable people and strategic planning. She noted that since she had come into post 11 months ago progress had been made towards addressing the issues identified. A new inspection was due in March 2024 and the inspection report was likely to be available in May or June. She stated that significant strides had been made in the response to 'phone calls, criminal charge rates and reducing certain types of criminality. In terms of what this meant for the public, she noted that there was now a reinvigorated neighbourhood policing offer and emphasised the importance of laying the foundations for continued improvement.

Bremhill Parish Council

The Chairman of Bremhill Parish Council, Isabel McCord, gave an overview of the news from the parish. Details included:

- A new 30mph speed limit had been approved in Foxham and new signage was due to be installed by March.
- Horse rider signs were due to be installed in Tytherton Lucas.
- Locations for Speed Indicator Devices had been identified in Foxham, East Tytherton and Tytherton Lucas.
- Thanks were given to the Local Highway and Footway Improvement Group for supporting these initiatives.
- A project to build a village hall in East Tytherton had been successful in a bid for £80,000 of funding from the National Lottery. Around £100,000 of further funding was required.
- The Neighbourhood Plan was being reviewed and was currently being considered by Wiltshire Council, who would provide further advice.

- The Bremhill Parish History Group's award-winning book was now out in paperback. Requests to buy copies could be made to <u>hello@bremhillparishhistory.com</u>.
- The Neighbourhood County Parish Forum initiative was welcomed and it was confirmed that Bremhill Parish Council would be attending the first event on 17 April.
- It was requested that briefing updates from Wiltshire Council were sent by the sixth of each month in time for the parish newsletter.

In response to concerns about the withdrawal of funding to Visit Wiltshire by Wiltshire Council, it was confirmed that an update had been sent to parish clerks. Cllr Tom Rounds explained that efforts to promote tourism would be run in-house by Wiltshire Council.

Calne Community Neighbourhood Plan

Alan Hill from Calne Town Council noted that a Reg 14 Notice was now out for consultation. He encouraged individuals in the local area to complete the survey <u>online</u>. In addition to the online consultation there would be a series of in-person events held including at Calne Library, Calne Town Hall and the Lansdowne Hall. Further details were available in Agenda Supplement 1.

Calne Without Parish Council

John Barnes reported that 137 free trees had been given out to residents to plant around the parish and that funding had been approved for seven defibrillators. He was pleased to note that the footpath near the Millenium Bridge had been restored with the steps being replaced on each side of the embankment. Attention was also drawn to an application by the British Horse Society to reinstate a restricted byway, which was made in error. Assistance was requested from the Area Board to try to ensure that the application was withdrawn to avoid it going through a very lengthy determination process. The Chairman noted that they would follow up the issue and make enquiries.

Cherhill Parish Council

Andrew Sadler-Smith gave an update about the Lansdowne Monument. He explained that he had written to the National Trust and had received a reply from their Assistant Director. He reported that an architectural review had taken place within the last year, to investigate the options for repairing the monument. He invited ideas from attendees about how to take the project forward. Glenis Ansell offered advice about who to contact.

The Area Board welcomed efforts to renovate the monument and said that the members would hold further discussions.

Dave Grafton gave an update on the Cherhill White Horse, explaining that they had managed to source some chalk from outside of the county for the refurbishment works, which were due to begin in May. Alan Hill from Calne Town Council commended Cherhill Parish Council for their hard work. Andrew Sadler-Smith stated that anyone was welcome to volunteer and noted that they had had 12 the last time they cleaned the White Horse including six from outside of the parish.

Heddington Parish Council

It was reported that they had experienced flooding since the previous meeting.

Hilmarton Parish Council

Shawn Warren-Wilcox noted that they had agreed to install posts for four Speed Indicator Devices. Discussions were ongoing about where to install the posts and whether they would be Hilmarton or Goatacre.

Older Person's Champion

Diane Gooch, the Area Board's Older Person's Champion, gave an update including news that:

- A series of events were being held for Calne Reconnecting Group including a pantomime and swing band.
- Dementia awareness sessions were being promoted as part of Dementia Friendly Calne and Calne Town Council had signed up as being dementia friendly.
- A consultation was being undertaken by the Integrated Care Board about the withdrawal of the Prescription Ordering Direct (POD) Service.
- A new hospital discharge service, Caring Steps Together, was being drawn up and she suggested that the Area Board might like to invite someone to talk about it.
- Discussions had been taking place with Avon Needs Trees about holding events in Pudding Brook Wood, although this would be dependent on level access.
- Discussions were ongoing with Celebrating Age about holding garden concerts for older people.

Calne Health and Social Care Forum

Alison Ingham reported that a Health and Wellbeing Day was being planned for 14 September and that a marquee had been booked. She thanked Diane Gooch and the Area Board for supporting the event. The Area Board then gave a round of applause for Diane to thank her for her work in the community.

Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue

Tom Burns from Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue was in attendance. It was noted that there was a video <u>online</u> with news about their recent activity.

9 Area Board Priority and Working Group Update

The Strategic Engagement and Partnerships Manager (SEPM), Ros Griffiths, reported that <u>Wiltshire Wildlife Community Energy</u> were holding a series of popup events during the winter to provide advice about energy usage. She also noted that £10,000 of funding had been awarded to food banks through the <u>Household Support Fund</u>.

In addition, she explained that a <u>Joint Strategic Needs Assessment</u> would be launched the following week. The findings for each community area in Wiltshire would be published to help identify need, to enable partners to make better informed decisions on how to allocate resources. The results of the survey would also be used to help construct the Area Board's Forward Work Programme.

Glenis Ansell highlighted that the notes from the meeting of Calne Community Safety Forum held on 13 December 2024 were available on pages 31 and 32 of the agenda pack. She noted that the group had also been holding conversations about reinstating the Safe Places Scheme. She thanked the SEPM for providing contacts for those running the scheme in <u>Salisbury</u> and noted that there were 21 premises locally that had expressed an interest in supporting the scheme.

10 **S106 Working Group - Meeting Update**

The Chairman reported that the meeting scheduled for 1 February 2024 had been rescheduled and would be held at a future date. He explained that he would chair the group on an interim basis following the passing of the S106 Group's late Chairman Cllr Tony Trotman.

11 Area Board Funding

As the Area Board were not able to hold a formally constituted meeting, it was agreed to move consideration of the grant applications to the start of the agenda. The Area Board noted the budgets remaining for allocation and heard from representatives in attendance, who gave a brief overview of their projects and were questioned by the Board. The members of the Area Board present were invited to indicate whether they were supportive of the listed projects.

In response to questions about whether an extraordinary meeting would need to be held to approve the applications, the Democratic Services Officer provided reassurance that efforts would be made to try to progress the grant applications. Options could include asking the Leader of Wiltshire Council whether he would be able to approve funding via delegated authority.

Community Area Grants

Consideration was given to the following applications made to the Community Area Grants Scheme.

Calne Men's Shed requesting £500 towards the purchase of an oscillating cutting tool, drill and impact driver kit.

The Acting Chair of Calne Men's Shed explained that they were in need of additional equipment having moved to a new premises the previous year. She noted that they did have an existing drill and impact driver kit but there were often queues to use the equipment.

Alan Hill from Calne Town Council noted that they supported the application.

The Wiltshire Councillors present noted that they were supportive of the application and noted that the Men's Shed did great things for the community.

Calne Tennis Club requesting £2,885 towards court refurbishment.

Club Directors Derek Warnett and Claire Bielby explained that their courts had been built in 2014 and were very well used, so were now showing wear and tear. They noted that they wanted to restore the non-slip playing surface. The total cost of repairs would be in excess of £12,000. The club supported people of a wide range of ages, including over 70s and under 10s.

The Wiltshire Councillors present noted that they were supportive of the application.

Young People's Grants

Consideration was given to the following applications made to the Young People's Grant Scheme.

Calne Wordfest requesting £565 towards Youth Tale Trail Storytelling

In the absence of the applicant, Strategic Engagement and Partnership Manager, Ros Griffiths, explained that the group aimed to run four sessions with a storyteller practitioner. They also wished to carry out street-based work with pupils at Kingsbury Green Academy.

Cllr Tom Rounds indicated that he was supportive of the project. The Chairman did not comment, having declared an interest.

The Open Blue Trust requesting £2,100 towards the Open Blue Bus in Calne

David Sanburg explained that they planned to bring the bus to Calne Town Centre for an hour on Friday nights to offer a range of activities for young people.

Alan Hill stated that Calne Town Council was in favour of the project.

The Wiltshire Councillors present also indicated that they were supportive of the application.

Delegated Funding

The Area Board noted the following funding award which had been made between meetings under the Strategic Engagement and Partnerships Manager Delegated Funding Process, due to a matter of urgency:

Sustainable Calne had been awarded £539 towards a tree planting project in the Stokes Croft.

Forthcoming Application

Celia from the Pocket Park Project highlighted that they planned to bring an application to the next meeting. She reminded the Area Board that Joseph Priestly had discovered oxygen when he was living in the town and explained that a number of commemorative events were being planned to mark the 250th anniversary. Possible events included murals, a community quilt and a music and art festival.

Local Nature Recovery Strategy Briefing Note No. 24 - 12

What is a Local Nature Recovery Strategy?

Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS) are a mechanism to deliver nature recovery at a local and regional scale as introduced in the <u>legislation.gov.uk</u>: <u>Environment Act 2021 - Local nature recovery strategies Section 106</u>. Wiltshire Council has been appointed by DEFRA as responsible for preparing the LNRS for Wiltshire and Swindon.

The Wiltshire and Swindon Local Nature Recovery Strategy will consist of a document containing biodiversity priorities and a habitat map which will inform and guide nature recovery across Wiltshire and Swindon.

The Local Nature Recovery Strategy will:

- agree priorities for nature's recovery
- map the most valuable existing areas for nature
- map specific proposals for creating or improving habitat for nature and wider environmental goals

In February 2024, we held six usability testing workshops with different stakeholder groups. This has given us practical feedback and guidance on how to produce the mapping element of the LNRS from end users. We have attached a copy of our report detailing the methodology and outcomes from these usability testing workshops.

In March 2024, we ran three interactive, in-person events in Swindon, Salisbury and Trowbridge to hear from stakeholders across the public, private and voluntary sectors, encouraging their support for delivering the strategy and to gather their views and expertise on what should be included in the LNRS. We have attached a copy of our report detailing the methodology and outcomes from these longlist workshops.

Having gathered a long list of suggested nature recovery priorities through direct engagement with locally active organisations and individuals, we are currently in the

shortlisting stage. This is being led by a small group of experts who are refining the list of nature recovery priorities for Wiltshire and Swindon which will feed into the production of the LNRS first draft documents.

The reason for this project

The Wiltshire Council Business Plan states that our mission is to ensure:

- The people of Wiltshire are empowered to live full, healthy and enriched lives.
- Our communities continue to be beautiful and exciting places to live.
- Our local economy thrives and is supported by a skilled workforce.
- We lead the way in how council and counties mitigate the climate challenges ahead.

To support this, Wiltshire Council has produced a Climate Strategy and a Green and Blue Infrastructure Strategy to help meet these aspirations. A central part of these strategies is to support nature recovery across Wiltshire for the benefit of people, nature and to help mitigate climate change.

Next steps

The shortlisting process has been taking place throughout May 2024. Once completed, the chosen priorities will be mapped in draft form.

County wide engagement and opportunities for feedback on these mapping drafts will take place in July 2024 through an online interactive survey, supported by a video and a public webinar. Several engagement opportunities are also being planned across July exclusively for farmers, who are key stakeholders in the LNRS. Details will be confirmed in a briefing note in due course.

We will also be hosting a members only first look event at the end of September. Details to be confirmed in due course.

The project programme aims to seek sign off by the supporting authorities; Swindon Borough Council, New Forest NPA and DEFRA at the end of October 2024 ahead of formal public consultation in November and December 2024, with final council approval and adoption in February 2025.

Careless or inconsiderate driving


The offence of driving without due care and attention (careless driving) is committed when your driving falls below the minimum standard expected of a competent and careful driver, and includes driving without reasonable consideration for other road users.

Some examples of careless or inconsiderate driving are:

- overtaking on the inside
- driving too close to another vehicle
- driving through a red light by mistake
- turning into the path of another vehicle
- flashing lights to force other drivers to give way
- misusing lanes to gain advantage over other drivers
- the driver being avoidably distracted by tuning the radio, lighting a cigarette etc
- •unnecessarily staying in an overtaking lane
- unnecessarily slow driving or braking
- dazzling other drivers with un-dipped headlights




Wider work recently




Calne Town Crime and Incident Statistics





Calne Rural - Crime and Incident Statistics





Voice It, Hear It - Current and Upcoming Engagement Projects



The Voice It, Hear It partnership and delivery team has been working with Wiltshire Council and BSW ICB to engage with people in Wiltshire on a variety of topics related to health and social care, with the overall aim of co-producing, co-designing and co-developing health and social care services locally.

BeMindful - New Wellbeing Pilot Project



'BeMindful' is a new pilot wellbeing project led by Youth Action Wiltshire. Through Health Inequalities Funding, the project targets young people aged 11-16 living in the 20% most deprived wards of Salisbury and struggling with their mental health.

By working in partnership with schools and experienced VCSE services, BeMindful offers young people a range of support including access to group work, 1:1 mentoring, counselling referrals, signposting, vocational learning, healthy living and skills development.

The following partners are involved in delivering the pilot project:



FIRST

New Rural Housing Enabler Project

Community First is leading a new Rural Housing Enabler project in Wiltshire, with support from Wiltshire Community Land Trust. The Rural Housing Enabler (RHE) project will play a critical role in raising awareness of the lack of affordable housing for local people in rural parts of Wiltshire and encouraging and supporting communities to welcome and help make provision for new homes. The RHE will gather information to understand the need for affordable housing within rural communities and help empower communities so that they can explore a range of options.

The RHE will explore all options to bring forward projects that have the support of the local community. These will encompass, but not be limited to, conventional local authority and housing association new build or conversions; Section 106 or similar planning related affordable homes schemes; and schemes that combine both affordable homes for rent and shared or low-cost ownership. To achieve this the RHE will be willing to work with the two local authorities, housing associations and other not for profit providers in the area and private sector builders and developers.

The RHE will provide a great opportunity to connect with all parishes in rural Wiltshire, to begin ascertaining both the extent and type of affordable housing needs in the county and engage with those communities able and willing to do something about it. That `something` might include obtaining evidence of need, identifying possible sites (in particular `exception` sites) and in some cases establishing some form of community-led housing vehicle, such as a community land trust.

Crucially, the RHE will also be able to ascertain the existing and potential delivery agents for affordable housing, including Wiltshire Council, developers willing to provide a proportion of affordable housing in their proposals, and housing associations able to keen to work with rural communities. Accordingly, the RHE will be able to begin painting the whole picture of affordable housing needs within the county, help those villages keen to do something about it, and identify the potential ways of meeting those needs.

As well as establishing housing need another important ingredient in bringing forward more affordable housing for local people is the identification of suitable sites within or on the edge of the villages where these much-needed homes can be built. Part of the role of the RHE will be to liaise with landowners, CLTs, Parish Councils and Neighbourhood Plan groups to seek out such sites that might be brought forward.

The project is at an early stage, and we hope to have more information and project updates to share in the coming months.

Employability Programmes

Building Bridges

Our Building Bridges Programme, which supports people with significant barriers and challenges to move towards and then sustain education and employment, continues to deliver strongly and is currently supporting 108 participants across Wiltshire.

We will shortly be extending Building Bridges further with a specialist team to support individuals affected by homelessness as part of the Wiltshire Council Rough Sleeping Initiative.

Building Bridges also continues to provide numeracy skills support to qualifying participants as part of Wiltshire Council's Multiply Programme.

Household Support Fund

Community First has been actively involved in helping to deliver Household Support Fund assistance to households in most need across Wiltshire during the current cost of living crisis. Between November and March, our Building Bridges and Youth Action Wiltshire teams distributed £45,000 of vouchers to 156 households - 82% of these were for food, 12% for energy and 6% for other essentials. We are hoping to provide even more assistance to households in need in the next phase of this funding in the coming months.

How we set our priorities

Each year Healthwatch Wiltshire sets its priorities for the year ahead based on the experiences that we hear from local people.

These are gathered by:

- Reviewing feedback that we have received over the past year
- Conversations with our Board and volunteers
- All the evidence and feedback we gather is shared with the Board and they help us decide what areas we focus on in the year ahead.

We also talk to local commissioners and voluntary sector organisations to ensure our work can add value to what they're doing and to check that we aren't duplicating work that's already being done elsewhere.

While other people can suggest areas of focus to us, we are an independent organisation and decide our own workplan.

Our priorities for 2024/25

This year we ran an online survey throughout March and we also visited libraries, community campuses and local groups to gather people's views.

The survey invited respondents to choose their preferences from a list of six key project themes, all of which came from the feedback we'd received over the previous year:

- The wellbeing of children and young people
- Pharmacy




- Care at home
- Accessibility of health services
- How the cost of living is affecting our health
- The impact of living in a rural county.

Our planned work

Based on the survey responses we received, and following a discussion with our volunteers and our Board, the following three priority areas have been agreed:

- **Pharmacy** a review of the Pharmacy First scheme.
- Living in a rural county focusing on the issues people face living in isolated areas and how they access services.
- Care at home hearing the views of people who have an NHS@Home (virtual ward) package to provide care at home and how this is working for them.

Covid spring booster programme

The Covid-19 booster vaccination programme for those most at risk of serious illness from the virus will begin in April.

The advice for this Spring is to offer the vaccine to those at high risk of serious disease and who are therefore most likely to benefit from vaccination.

The JCVI advises the following groups should be offered a COVID-19 booster vaccine this Spring:

- Adults aged 75 years and over.
- Residents in a care home for older adults.
- Individuals aged 6 months and over who are immunosuppressed.

Trailblazing health centre

Devizes' state-of-the-art health centre has recently celebrated its first anniversary, with staff at the site proud to have cared for more than 59,000 people during its inaugural 12 months.

The centre, which takes pride of place as the Wiltshire town's flagship location for health and care, had its official opening on 22 February 2023, just a few weeks after the doors first opened to patients.

Since then, the team at Devizes Health Centre, which holds the title of being one of the country's first fully integrated healthcare centres, meaning GP appointments take place alongside many other health and care services, such as outpatient clinics and community care, have carried out a total of 16,834 face-to-face appointments.

When combined with appointments carried out over the phone, the Devizes team cared for 59,457 people during their first year, which equates to approximately 238 patient interactions each day.

Along with being 100 per cent energy efficient – the site uses heat pumps and solar panels to generate its own power – Devizes Health Centre is also a hub for same and next-day care.

Patients of four nearby GP practices are able to be referred directly to the new urgent care service, meaning local people need not travel further afield for quick help and treatment.

BSW Care Coordination initiative wins prestigious HSJ award

Medvivo and BSW ICB have won a prestigious Health Service Journal Award for a project to coordinate health and care services so that patients receive the best possible care to meet their needs, at the right, in the right place and avoids emergency admission.

The project, which has been running across BSW wince December 2022, received a Gold Award in the category 'most effective contribution to integrated health and care'.

The Care Coordination Hub see Specialist Paramedics working alongside Advanced Clinical Practitioners and other Health and Care Professionals (in the hub and virtually) to optimise the flow of patients across the region. Working this way reduces the risk of harm and makes the best use of the resources to provide high-quality care.

New Partnership announced to support unpaid carers in Wiltshire

Wiltshire has thousands of people who provide help as unpaid carers to those needing additional support. Wiltshire Council and the BSW ICB have a role to ensure those people are provided with respite, support and opportunities to network with other unpaid carers.

The council has announced that Age UK Wiltshire is working in a consortium with Community First, Alzheimer's Support, Wiltshire Service Users Network, Citizens Advice Wiltshire and Wessex Community Action (and many more charities). As a group they are called 'Carers Together Wiltshire' and will provide respite, and a range of support to adult unpaid carers from the age of 18. This will include training, carer cafes and awareness raising in the community for unpaid carers. They will also work closely with Wiltshire Council to continue conducting carer's assessments.

Community First has been awarded the contract for younger adult and young carers from ages 5 - 25, focusing on support in primary schools and supporting Wiltshire Council with their work with secondary schools and colleges, understanding their rights and what support is available to them and giving them opportunities to carry on doing the things they enjoy – whilst also teaching them key life skills as they grow up.

Both providers will work together to support carers aged 18 – 25 and family support including parent carers. There is also investment in online support so carers can access training, chats, helpful guides and support at any time.

There will continue to be a Wiltshire Carer Card which will provide unpaid carers with ID as a carer and record emergency contact details. This will be available as a physical card and a digital app for people's smartphone, if preferred. Unpaid carers can continue to use the emergency card they already have while they wait for the new card. The new providers will also continue to work closely with hospitals to ensure unpaid carers are supported. Assessments for unpaid carers will continue as normal.

From 1 April Carer Support Wiltshire will continue to run its services independently of the council including carer cafés, the Hear to Talk service, family support and activities, carer wellbeing workshops, young carer activities, carer grants and their Bereavement Help Points.

The unpaid carers contract is jointly funded by Wiltshire Council and BSW ICB.

Let's talk about: Offline and Overlooked – Age UK's new report on Digital Exclusion

Age UK has released a new report – 'Offline and Overlooked – Digital Exclusion and its impact on older people' – written to continue raising awareness of digital exclusion with MPs, local councils and service providers.

Age UK has been campaigning to highlight the impact on older people that the rush to go digital is having.

The report sets out how prioritising digital routes to accessing essential services like banking, NHS and GP appointments, parking, local council services and social security is disproportionately impacting older people. It highlights the important support being provided by local Age UKs to increase digital skills.

The report highlights that:

- 4.7 million people aged 65+ don't have the basic skills needed to use the internet successfully.
- 2.3 million people aged 65+ don't use the internet at all.
- 3.3 million people aged 65+ don't use a smartphone.

The report's recommendations are:

- All public services must offer and promote an affordable, easy to access, offline way of reaching and using them.
- The Government must make sure local government receives enough funding to provide offline services.
- More funding and support provided to enable people who are not internet users, but would like to be, to get online.
- The Government should lead on the development of a long-term, fully-funded national Digital Inclusion Strategy.
- The Government should change the law to require banks to maintain face-to-face services.
- Banks must accelerate the roll-out of Shared Banking Hubs.


Area Board Investment

The Area Board invests in local community projects and initiatives that meet local priorities and deliver exceptional outcomes for residents. The Area Board aims to work in partnership to achieve maximum value for its investment.

Local Priorities

The Calne Area Board reviewed available local data and evidence and integrated this with local knowledge and community conversation to agree the following local priority themes. The Area Board has undertaken a series of more specific local actions to positively address them, including the key achievements below:

Supporting positive mental health and wellbeing in young people



We organised a Local Youth Network meeting at Kingsbury Green Academy and facilitated discussion with the Yr11 Citizenship class on a range of issues. Students provided presentations on issues such as body image, crime, Teen mental health and the environment. We invested in detached youth work through the Rise Trust and Open Blue Bus and provided funding for the Skate Series 2023 event.

Addressing climate change

We facilitated Environment working group meetings and shared resources and updates from the Wiltshire Council Climate Team. Schemes such as HUG2 Retrofit, Green Homes and Tree Wardens were promoted and discussions initiated on Information Boards / signage relating to Air Quality. We helped co-ordinate energy cafes across the community area in partnership with Wiltshire Wildlife Community Energy, which offered advice to help residents stay warm over winter and reduce energy bills.



Promoting wellbeing and combating social isolation in older and vulnerable people



We supported the Health and Social Care Forum and Voices group and funded projects such as the Men's Shed, Reconnecting Group and Celebrating Age to improve the quality of life of older and vulnerable residents. We organised a Dementia Awareness Day for residents, families and carers where visitors were given an opportunity to experience how dementia might feel, with a presenter led voyage inside the brain exploring basic neuroscience and promoting discussion around keeping our brains healthy.

Promoting and Supporting Initiatives to address Economic Inequalities

We visited Calne foodbank and helped to facilitate a partnership with Citizen's Advice Wiltshire to help maximise foodbank user income. We promoted the Household Support Fund and Wiltshire's FUEL Programme and invested in local organisations supporting low-income households. We shared information and opportunities with local businesses.



Addressing Highways/Transport Issues




The Local Highways and Footpath Infrastructure Group has met regularly over the past year finding solutions to problems and leading on improvements. Action has been taken and issues resolved following the Calne 'All Things Roads' meeting in November 2022. Projects continue to be worked on including speed limit reviews at Studley Crossroads, improvements to the footway surface at Quarr Barton and Safety on the A3102 route.

Engagements

The Calne Area Board works alongside other organisations to make things happen in the local community. These groups include the town council, voluntary and community groups, youth organisations, sports clubs and local charities.

The Area Board wouldn't be able to achieve what they do without these partners working on the ground with them. The Area Board hosts regular business meetings, engagement activities, events, surveys and working groups to stimulate and support local community action.

The LHFIG is a sub group of the Calne Area Board, which deals specifically with highway issues. They aim to find solutions for local transport issues, such as road repairs, traffic problems, road layouts and parking. The amount allocated is dependent on the geographical size and population for the community area and the funding allocation is for capital expenditure and can be used to provide new and improved highway infrastructure.

The CAJSNA enables the local Area Boards and partner organisations to make informed decisions on the allocation and focus of their resources. It aims to improve local understanding of need in order to better address health inequalities and empower voluntary and statutory organisations to support our residents to lead full, health and enriched lives.

- 2.2. The Area Board is invited to appoint Councillor representatives to the Outside Bodies or Working Groups (which do not fall under one of the Area Board Priority areas) listed at **Appendix A**. These appointments will continue for the duration of Councillors' terms of office, and will be reviewed annually, unless the Board determines otherwise.
- 2.3. Similarly, the Area Board is invited to reconfirm Diane Gooch as their Older Persons and Carer Champion to work with the Area Board and Health and Wellbeing Group for 2024/25.

3. Main Considerations

- 3.1. The Local Highways and Footpath Improvement Group (<u>LHFIG</u>) operates as an informal working group making recommendations to the Area Board for approval. Terms of Reference are set out in **Appendix B** for information. The Area Board are invited to appoint a Lead Councillor on an annual basis.
- 3.2. Any amendments to the currently appointed Representatives on Non-Priority Working Groups can be agreed by the Area Board here or at any future scheduled business meeting.

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LOCAL HIGHWAY & FOOTWAY IMPROVEMENT GROUPS (LHFIG)

TERMS OF REFERENCE

Membership of the LHFIG

The LHFIG will normally be made up of:

- Members of the Area Board
- Town and Parish Council representatives
- Community / Stakeholder representatives

It is recommended that the groups do not normally consist of more than 10 representatives, but for larger community areas this may not always be feasible.

Representatives should act as a conduit between their organisations and the LHFIGs by putting forward the views of the body they represent and providing feedback to its members regarding the work of the LHFIGs. The group members will also need to be mindful of the needs of the community area when making their recommendations, as not all councils and groups may be represented on the LHFIGs.

Recommendations to the Area Board will usually be reached by consensus, but if necessary, these can be agreed by a show of hands by those representatives present at the meeting.

The group will normally be chaired by a Wiltshire councillor. Membership of the LHFIGs will cease when a member ceases to hold the stated office as first appointed, or when a parish/town council or group choose to nominate an alternative representative.

The LHFIGs may invite representatives from local organisations to its meetings to give technical advice or to share pertinent local knowledge on projects in the area.

Appointment of LHFIGs members

Appointment of Wiltshire Council members to the LHFIGs will normally be agreed at a full meeting of the Area Board. Membership may be varied, with the agreement of the Area Board Chairman, subject to approval at the next full Area Board meeting.

Where required for flexibility, the Area Board may appoint an unnamed representative of an organisation to the LHFIGs (e.g. town/parish council or Community Area Partnership) to ensure that the organisation is always represented at meetings. However, it is preferred that the same representative attends if possible to ensure consistency of membership.

Media relations

Members of the LHFIGs must not issue press statements on behalf of the Area Board.

Any press statements about the work of the LHFIGs should be agreed between the Chairman of the LHFIGs and the Chairman of the Area Board, and in consultation with

Wiltshire council's communications team. You can contact the communications team at <u>communications@wiltshire.gov.uk</u>.

Meetings

It is recommended that the LHFIGs meet four times a year. Ideally the meetings should be 2 to 4 weeks in advance of the Area Board meetings. Meetings are intended to be limited to the membership set out above and is open to other members of the Area Board who wish to attend. It can be open to public if the LHFIG chair wishes, and by invitation. It should be noted that LHFIGs are advisory bodies and do not exercise delegated decision-making powers. All decisions are to be ratified by the Area Board.

Officer support

Meetings will be attended by relevant officers from Wiltshire Council, including a Senior Transport Planner, a Senior Traffic Engineer, Local Highway Maintenance Engineer and the local Community Engagement Manager. Attendance by officers of other expert knowledge may be arranged when necessary.

Additional support will be provided outside of the meeting by the Corporate Office Business Support unit as currently for Area Boards, for the purpose of arranging meetings, venues, and the production of meeting action notes.

Terms of reference

The LHFIGs have no formal decision-making authority on operational matters or budget expenditure but act as an informal discussion forum making recommendations to the Area Board. Recommendations must be agreed at a full LHFIG meeting before being brought to the next Area Board for approval.

The LHFIGs terms of reference are set out at Appendix 1:

Examples of projects the LHFIGs can and cannot fund are set out in Appendix 2:

Terms of Reference

1. Small-scale transport schemes - discretionary funding

To make recommendations to the Area Board to determine priorities and levels of expenditure required for small-scale transport schemes in the community area. A discretionary highways budget has been allocated to the board by the Cabinet Member for Transport, Waste, Street Scene and Flooding. The funding allocation is a mixture of highways and council capital funding and can only be used to provide new and improved highway infrastructure. It is suitable for schemes that improve safety, increase accessibility and sustainability by promoting walking, cycling and public transport and improve traffic management.

It cannot be used to fund revenue functions, such as routine maintenance schemes or the provision of passenger transport services.

A list of schemes which the groups can fund in contained in Appendix B

Schemes considered by the LHFIGs must have first been raised through the highway improvement request system and endorsed by the relevant town or parish council.

The LHFIG's can be directed to look at issues identified by Highways Officers when considered appropriate. For example, when an issue is raised for which other centrally held resource does not exist.

In choosing their local transport schemes, Area Boards will need to be mindful of the priorities of the Local Transport Plan and the likely availability of future funding for implementation.

2. Small scale transport schemes - substantive funding

To submit bids for funding from the centrally held substantive funds. A scheme qualifies as substantive if the estimated cost is more than the total discretionary amount available as part of the group's annual allocation.

<u>Appendix 2 of Appendix B</u> – Example of projects which can and cannot be funded by LHFIGs

LHFIGs can fund the following:

Pedestrian improvements: including dropped kerbs, new footways, substantive improvements to existing footways, pedestrian crossings (including assessments).
Cycle improvements: new cycle paths, cycle parking / storage.
Bus infrastructure: new and replacement Shelters (subject to agreement on future maintenance liability), bus border kerbs, bus stop road markings.
Traffic signing: new and replacement signs (including signposts), street name plates, village gateways.
New road markings: new and replacement of existing markings.
Speed limits: assessment and implementation.
Waiting restrictions: assessments and implementation.
Footpath improvements: styles, gates, surface improvements to rights of ways (council maintainable only).
Drainage: minor improvements, new gullies.
Street lighting: new installations.

Traffic management measures: including Sockets and posts for SID (Speed Indication Device) equipment.

As a general rule, an asset should exist at the end of the project, i.e. something new that wasn't there beforehand.

LHFIGs cannot fund:

Routine maintenance: such as gully emptying, ditch clearing, hedgerow cutting, pot hole repairs.

Service subsidy: bus services Promotional campaigns SID equipment Improvements for individuals and properties

As a general rule, activities that repair, clean, tidy or remove something that is already present are likely to be considered routine maintenance and cannot be funded by LHFIGs.

Project Summary:

To fund Interactive science demonstrations (£200) - using an 18th century style mobile science cart, led by an experienced science educator/actor, in costume, at 'Oxygenfest' in Calne Pocket Park on 13 August. Also to cover the costs of other activities (£300) to run concurrently incl St John's Ambulance, hopefully the Fire & Rescue Service and other groups to demonstrate contemporary uses of oxygen. The centrepiece of 'Oxygenfest' will be the British Oxygen Company running 4 x 40 min shows of experiments using oxygen and other gases (at the Pocket Park - though the Calne Corn Exchange has been booked as contingency should the weather be poor) and with opportunities for spectators to talk to the 2 BOC demonstrators, handle equipment, and conduct simple experiments under supervision themselves , BOC will be there from 10am - 4pm - and are making no charge for the day. The money would also cover the cost of his materials and chemicals. We are also seeking a further £250 as contingency funds for the Priestley Monument (covered by our successful bid to Arts Council England) as it seems we may have underestimated the cost of transporting and installing the finished stone sculpture. We undertake that if at the end of the Priestley Project (end of 2024) money is left in our account we will return this £250 (or as much of it as remains) to the Calne Area Board. In August 1774 Joseph Priestley, who was living in Calne at the time, discovered Oxygen in the laboratory at Bowood House. This was a hugely significant scientific breakthrough, and we plan to mark its 250-year anniversary with a number of local events and activities. Calne calls itself a 'Town of Discovery' primarily because of its association with Joseph Priestley; though it also has links to Jan Ingenhousz who built on the work of Priestley, and 5 years later (1779) discovered Photosynthesis. Ingenhousz is remembered in a blue plaque in the town, and he was buried in St Mary's Church. Priestley himself is remembered in the name of Priestley School; in Priestley House, on the Green; in a small plaque at Doctor's Pond; and in a pavement mosaic and brass relief off Church St. We are aiming to provide both an exciting and varied programme of events and activities between July and October 2024, and short-term legacies in the form of 2 planned murals, and a banner, designed by disadvantaged youngsters from the Rise Trust; and long-term legacies with the Calne Community Quilt - which Calne Town Council has agreed can hang in the Corn Exchange (downstairs at the Town Hall); and in a Monument to be carved by local sculptor Richard Cowdy, with an engraved plaque by local artist Geoffrey Stephenson. Its location, should we secure funding for this, is still to be determined.

We are seeking Capital Funding. Calne Pocket Park & Community Garden was set up in 2019 and operates under licence from Wiltshire Council. A team of almost 20 volunteers manage and maintain the Pocket Park, meeting every Sunday afternoon, throughout the year (weather permitting) to keep the area tidy and welcoming. We have 2 main designs of planters: square ones, made by Calne Mens' Shed, in which we have flowers; and half-barrel (round) planters in which we have small trees. 

Calne A4 White Hart Pedestrian Improvements



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1 Introduction and Background

This report is in response to a request from Calne Area Board via the CATG for a feasibility study for pedestrian improvements in and around the double mini roundabout of the A4/A3102 by the White Hart public house. The aim is for a safer environment for members of the public travelling in the area.


Data Collection

2.1 Pedestrian Review

The location is at a double mini roundabout junction with 2 major A roads, the A4 and A3102, it links the town of Calne to Chippenham, Melksham and the A4 East to Beckhampton/Marlborough.

A pedestrian survey was undertaken to identify pedestrian movements as shown below, see **Appendix A** for data.

The survey was undertaken during term time mid week 7am-7pm. The survey showed pedestrians were crossing A-B and E-F with a high majority of those pedestrians being aged 18-65



2.2 Collision data

Current collision data (last 6 years) shows no general concern for safety of pedestrians.

2.3 Additional observations

This junction has a double mini roundabout arrangement and is the intersection between two "nonprimary" routes, A4 and A3102 and a residential road, "The Green". The junction is situated well within a 30 mph limit and street lighting is provided throughout. The junction is used by all vehicle types and peak time queues are frequent, particularly during the morning rush period. Traffic movement in and out of The Green is considerably less than on the two A routes. The A4 is part of a main bus route. Vehicle approach speeds have not been flagged as a concern. Whilst there is potential for school pupils to cross the A4 here as part of their journey to and from school, the majority of pedestrians observed were estimated to be between the ages of 18 and 65 years. Most pedestrian activity was recorded across A-B and E-F, (see plan of section 2.1).

The junction is situated just inside of the town's designated Conservation Area but despite this the streetscene is dominated by traffic signs, bollards and other roadside infrastructure. Some of the signs are poorly sited causing difficulty for pedestrians to see and be seen. The footways here are wide and there is scope to alter curb lines and to reposition signs without causing obstruction.

The twin roundabout arrangement and busy environment demands high levels of concentration for drivers but because of this, they are less likely to be aware of pedestrian activity around them.

3 Analysis

3.1 Review of Signs and Road markings:

It is noted that the existing signing and road markings in the area are in need of reviewing and refreshing. It should be noted that areas of the carriageway surface is in a poor condition for laying new lining.

4 Recommendation

4.1 Option 1

It is recommended to remove the existing island and replace with a pedestrian refuge fit for purpose, new kerbing, tactile paving and bollards, also the relocation of existing sign assembly. Provide new dropped kerb crossing points with tactile paving and bollards to highlight the desired crossing location on either side of the A4, declutter signing. Refresh all lining. **See Appendix B**

4.2 Option 2

Relocate and replace existing dropped kerb crossing point into pedestrian desire line as per the survey results. New pedestrian bollards. **See Appendix B**

4.3 Option 3

Option 3 consists of option 1 and 2 together along with the removal of the northern mini roundabout to be replaced with a T- junction. This will include amendments to existing kerb-lines, carriageway resurfacing, signs and new road markings. **See Appendix B**

Site Plans for Proposed 2024/25 Schemes






Increased Highway Investment

In addition to the planned major maintenance sites listed, additional works across Wiltshire will be undertaken using the additional investment in road maintenance provided by Wiltshire Council. This funding will be used in two ways:

- a) To target sites most prone to potholes through a package of road resurfacing and localised repairs. These areas will be identified through analysis of customer reports, pothole repairs and local knowledge of areas of concern from the Local Highways Area Engineers. Special consideration will be given to C road and Unclassified roads.
- b) To undertake preventative maintenance using surface treatments, thereby extending the life of the current surface by up to 7 years. These sites will be identified using condition data.

Work to identify sites is currently underway.
