The Rural Crime Partnership for Wiltshire and Swindon (hereafter 'the Rural Crime Partnership') has been established by Wiltshire Police in consultation with the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for Wiltshire and Swindon. The partnership aims to provide governance for, and oversee the delivery of the rural crime strategy. It provides coherence, direction and guidance to the delivery and apportionment of rural policing resources across the county in the context of the Community Policing Model.

The Rural Crime Partnership is chaired by the Head of Crime Prevention, Supt Phil Staynings of Wiltshire Police.

For the purposes of the Rural Crime Partnership, rural crime is defined as "crime that specifically targets and exploits agriculture, wildlife, the environment and heritage".

The government's own statistics identify 97% of Wiltshire's land area as being 'rural' in nature. Rural crime cost Wiltshire businesses and communities £800,000 in the last financial year. National Farmers Union data suggests that rural crime cost the South West region £6.1m in 2015, and year-on-year reporting indicates that this figure increases by 3% annually. Intelligence suggests that a majority of this crime – particularly rural burglaries, theft of agricultural machinery, livestock and metal theft – is Organised Crime.

The aim of the Rural Crime Partnership is to reduce the number of victims of rural crime; improve the confidence of rural communities in reporting crimes knowing that action will be taken; and to reduce offending and re-offending.

The partnership is made up of members from a number of organisations including the National Gamekeepers' Organisation, the National Famers' Union, and the Country and Land Business Association.

Wiltshire Police encourage all of the rural communities to sign up for their free messaging system, Wiltshire and Swindon Community Messaging. Community Messaging is a system where local officers and their press office send out local police and crime updates by email, text and voicemail. You can sign up for free by visiting <a href="www.wiltsmessaging.co.uk">www.wiltsmessaging.co.uk</a> . Several recent policing operations have resulted in real successes across rural communities, and we intend to maintain these operations going forward.

You can help. Be aware of rural crime and what constitutes it. Report it – on 101 the non- emergency number, or 999 if there is a crime currently in progress. Subscribe to the Community Messaging system. Volunteer to work with Wiltshire Police in the rural crime area, or perhaps join the Rural Crime Team as a Special Constable.

#### 10 Community Area Transport Group update

Cllr Mark Connolly outlined two schemes from the CATG notes dated 24 October 2016 that required Area Board approval to fund or approve:

#### Decision

- Somme Road Cycle path Mark Connelly to email Wiltshire Council to register the CATG's support for the puffin crossing to be provided earlier than the s106 states.
- Perham to Tidworth Cycle Path S106 funding needs to be spent by September 17. The CATG agreed that up to £8,000 should be spent on

#### designing a foot/cycle and foot path.

Concerns were raised re the number of HGVS using the A345 through Enford village. It was agreed that the issue would be raised with the relevant Wiltshire Council officers, and reply feedback to the Tidworth Area Board.

Answer to the HGVS using the A345 through Enford village question from Peter Binley – Head of Highways Asset Management & Commissioning, Wiltshire Council.

The problems of increasing vehicle sizes on our roads are appreciated. The introduction of kerbs can help define the road edge for drivers and provides structural strength to the road edge. However they have limited value in restraining vehicles, especially the larger ones, and in some circumstances can deflect vehicles into the oncoming traffic. The cost of installing kerbs can be substantial and with a backlog of maintenance required on the highway network this is not likely to be a high priority at this site in the present circumstances.

Part of the problem appears to be the hedge on the other side of the road which is causing vehicles to move towards the centre of the road, with oncoming vehicles pulling over to the road edge to avoid them. Cutting the hedge is the responsibility of the landowner, and our local highway team will contact the Parish Council in order to approach the owner about getting the hedge cut. This may need to be followed up by enforcement action, but we would hope this issue can be resolved by agreement.

The traffic count information does not indicate any large increase in traffic in recent years. However, this is an A class road which does provide an important link for the local economy and businesses on the east side of the county and this is likely to remain the case.

The verge marker posts will be replaced when the matter of the hedge has been resolved.

Concerns were raised re missing signage on Coombe Lane, Enford. Answer to the Coombe Lane sign question from Adrian Hampton – Head Local Highway Weather Emergency Services, Highways and Streetscene – South, Wiltshire Council.

I recognise the issues around this reported sign. I am aware of the history and have received many such requests for similar sign maintenance/ replacement.

The council has committed to meeting its obligations stated in its Highway Inspection Manual to ensure expectations and services delivered are aligned. The manual covers the replacement of signs.

Regrettably signs such as the one described are not covered by the inspection manual. Which means that this council does not replace these signs when they become damaged, go missing or are removed. However, we would allow the parish council to fund the replacement if they feel this is appropriate.

I know the person who raised this will be disappointed, but I trust Wiltshire Council's position is now clear.

We have been promoting the expected service levels through Cllr Mr Whitehead's Newsletters to town and parish councils and have included the Highway Inspection Manual on many of the issues. We have also discussed the service levels at the annual Parish and Town Council Highway Evening Meetings. I will ensure the service levels are covered again in the January issue of Cllr Mr Whitehead's Newsletter and I will ensure it is raised at the Parish and Town Highway Evening Meeting.

The Chairman thanked Cllr Connolly for his update.

Answer to Alan Wood's question from Steve Milton – Head of Service for Community Engagement and Governance, Wiltshire Council.

The Boundaries of Wiltshire's area boards were agreed and set in 2009 following a very extensive consultation exercise. There was much debate at that time about the possibility of Amesbury and Tidworth forming one community area. However, public opinion was very much against this proposal and the Council decided to keep the areas separate.

The area boards are formed of electoral division, which in turn are made up of groups of parishes. It was the agreed that parishes would move with the Electoral Division to which they are attached through their elected unitary councillor.

	When setting the boundaries, the Council agreed with partners that it would avoid changes unless triggered by a local governance review. This was done to provide certainty for partners and to enable services to be aligned and integrated. However, the council recognised that for parishes on the edge of a community area, particularly in large rural areas, individual parishes may feel a greater sense of affinity with a neighbouring area. To address this it was agreed that parishes would be free to attend neighbouring area board meetings should they wish, although for grants and funding they would remain attached to their original area.  Demographics do change over time. Army rebasing in the Tidworth and Amesbury area are likely to impact by 2020, when the Council may have to review the democratic governance arrangements again. Until that time, there are no plans to change the boundaries of the two area boards involved.  The Chairman thanked everybody for their updates.

### Tidworth Area Board Police Report January 2017

#### 1. East Community Policing Team

The Community Policing Team (CPT) model commenced in this area on 17 October 2016 and was followed by Swindon on 7 November 2016.

This followed a successful trial of the new model in Trowbridge, Warminster, Bradford on Avon, Westbury, Tisbury and Mere.

CPT combines Neighbourhood Policing, Response teams and Local Crime Investigators so there is a "one team" approach to community policing. It means there is a bigger team of officers and police staff available to attend incidents and improves communication between teams and departments. It gives the public a better service because issues can potentially be resolved at the first point of contact (101 and 999 call-takers) and provides them with a named officer/police staff member who they will be able to keep in touch with during the investigation. It also encourages officers and staff to take more "ownership" of cases.

There are seven Community Policing Teams: Swindon North, Swindon West, Swindon South, Wiltshire North, Wiltshire West, Wiltshire East and Wiltshire South. Pewsey comes under Wiltshire East area.

Each Community Policing Team will be overseen by a Superintendent and will have an Inspector and a Deputy. The team will be made up of a mix of police officers, community co-ordinators, PCSOs, civilian local crime investigators and Specials.

We have been engaging with the public since commencing this new Policing Model and we welcome any feedback. Please speak to your local officers to find out more

about how Community Policing is affecting your local area. #### 2. CPTs - Current Priorities & Consultation Opportunities:

#### i. Andover Road - ASB

Following consultation with the community the previous priority concentrating on Anti-Social Behaviour for Dewey's Lane in particular Jubilee Gardens closed In December 2016. They acknowledged that there had been additional patrols in the area and any reported problems had stopped. However problems then started outside the Moghul and other shops along Andover Road, a new priority commenced on 25<sup>th</sup> November 2016. At present 5 youths have been identified and have been referred to ASBRAC (the Anti Social Behaviour Risk Assessment Conference, a Multi Agency approach to dealing with ASB) and additional work has been carried out with the families. The Neighbourhood Taskign Group (NTG) took place in Council Chambers, Ludgershall on 13<sup>th</sup> December. NTG members agreed for the Andover Road priority to continue.

#### ii. Reassurance patrols - Tidworth Military Married quarters

The NTG also decided that Wiltshire Police and the Military would share a new priority with reassurance patrols around the married quarters in Tidworth, this priority will run for a period of at least a month. Persons have been seen attempting to gain entry to properties recently. Our aim is to deter any criminal activity and offer reassurance to the military families.

#### iii. Hare Coursing continues as a priority for the whole area.

Your local PCSO's have also been carrying out Community Consultations. It was discussed at the NTG how we could carry out consultations in a better way. Plans are ongoing.

#### 3. Wiltshire Police Control strategy



#### Cybercrime

There have been no reported instances of cybercrime since the last meeting.

#### **Domestic Abuse**

Amesbury CPT continue to be involved in pro-active engagement. We are currently liasing with the Military to plan some drop in sessions with various agenices being present to signpost and offer support to people attending.

#### **High Risk Offenders**

The CPT continue to work closely with the Public Protection Department to identify persistent or dangerous offenders, to engage with them and to take positive action where required.

#### Other local crimes

#### Ludgershall Area-

There has been 5 reports of Hare Coursing, enquiries into these are ongoing at this time. Hare Coursing remains as a local priority with increased patrols all over the patch. Like Tidworth there have been incidents where vehicles have been broken

into and items such as handbags and power tools have been stolen. Garages and sheds are also being broken into and people are reminded to keep these areas secure. Wiltshire Police sent out advice on Community Messaging and Facebook in relation to security.

#### Tidworth Area -

A successful drugs warrant was executed in Tidworth on Monday 15th December.

In November a Youth was caught with Cannabis and received a youth caution.

There has been 6 Burglaries, which consist of 2 dwelling burglaries, the others relate to sheds and garages. Crime prevention work is being carried out at locations across the area in relation to thefts from motor vehicles.

### Tidworth Area Board - Report, 16th January 2017

#### **Community Engagement**

The Service is currently in negotiations to run a Salamander course in Ludgershall in the spring. At present we are looking at targeting young carers in the area. The primary aim of Salamander is to work with young people, aged 12 and over, to provide them with experiences that will help them to learn new life skills and gain confidence.

The course can run over one week or a series of evenings and there can be 8 to 16 young people attending.

#### **Chimney Safety**

After a couple of serious chimney fires over the Christmas period, I think it prudent to offer the following advice;



A clean chimney can help prevent fires and structural damage to your property. It is not enough to use a vacuum cleaner and you should make sure that your chimney or flue is inspected regularly.

Chimneys should be swept:

- > At least once a year when using smokeless fuels
- > At least once a year when using bituminous coal
- Every three months when burning wood
- Once a year when using oil
- Once a year when using gas

When the fire is alight, check the loft space occasionally to make sure there is no smoke leaking from cracks, defective brickwork or mortar joints.

## Tidworth 'Our Community Matters' Local priorities for action

#### 1. Purpose of the Report

To update members on the outcome of the 'Our Community Matters' Joint Strategic Assessment event held on 9<sup>th</sup> November 2016 and to recommend that the Area Board endorses the outcomes.

#### 2. Background

The Tidworth 'Our Community Matters' event was held on 9<sup>th</sup> November 2016 at Wellington Academy, Tidworth. Over 100 members of the public and partner agencies attended and participated in the event, which focused on the data set out in the *Community Area Joint Strategic Assessment 2016-17*.

The JSA brings together the results of research conducted by the major agencies and public sector bodies in Wiltshire over the last six months. The project was initiated by the Wiltshire Health and Wellbeing Board and the Wiltshire Assembly. These bodies will use the priorities emerging from the events to focus and support strategic projects, activities and services across Wiltshire.

Participants at the events used the data to inform themed roundtable discussions and to identify local priorities underpinned by the research. All participants had the opportunity to vote on the priorities and the results are set out in this report. Following agreement on the priorities, the themed roundtables then looked at practical community-led actions that could be taken to address the issues identified.

The purpose of the event was to:

- Gain a consensus around priorities for the area
- Provide the basis for community-led action and projects over the next two years
- Develop a community plan for the area
- Provide the Council and partners with a clear focus for local actions

The Area Board is now invited to review the priorities and agree how it wishes to initiate and coordinate action working with partners, community groups and the public.

#### 3. Priorities identified

The following documents set out the outcomes of the meeting and the priorities identified:

- Online video achievements over the last two years (https://twitter.com/TidworthCEM?lang=en-gb)
- Apprendix 1 summary of issues identified by the research
- Appendix 2 priorities agreed at the event

#### 4. Moving forward with community-led action

To address the priorities, the Area Board will need to use its strategic influence and delegated powers to shape the delivery of local services and actions. It will also need to use its delegated resources to facilitate and support community-led projects. Some of the actions will be easier to address than others and it is important to target areas where tangible outcomes and progress can be delivered. This will help to capitalise on the enthusiasm and momentum generated by the event.

It will be up to the Area Board whether it wishes to champion a particular issue or theme over the next year and to target resources to support community-led initiatives around these themes and issues.

#### 5. **Recommendations**

- (1) That the Area Board adopts the priorities identified by the 'Our Community Matters' event and works to facilitate local action to tackle those priorities.
- (2) That the Area Board requests the Local Youth Network, the Health and Wellbeing Group and the Community Area Transport Group (and any other local task groups established by the Board) to adopt and take forward the priorities identified in the relevant theme areas.
- (3) That the Area Board requests the Community Engagement Manager to work with key partners, agencies and community groups to coordinate action around the priorities identified.
- (4) That the Board considers whether it wishes to champion a particular theme or priority and to earmark funding to promote, initiate and support community-led action around the selected priorities.

- (5) That the Board considers appointing a lead member to champion any priority (priorities) adopted.
- (6) That reports are submitted to the Board on progress made to address the priorities to ensure that positive outcomes are delivered and that this be made a regular item on future Board meetings.
- (7) The Area Board expresses its thanks to the people who gave their time to participate in the event.

We are targeting parents that have been identified by local schools as needing additional support to improve the health and economic outcomes for themselves and their families. The JSA 2013-15 identified an increase in parents applying for both carers allowance and income support - lone parents which is above the Wiltshire average. The parents will achieve accreditation through the AQA unit award scheme and this will increase their confidence as well as providing externally verified evidence of their learning and achievement over the course. We would be supporting them to gain 4-5 certificates across the course. We will also offer volunteering opportunities and a forum to share the learning from the first course with the group on the second course. This could also be accredited. We are looking to support the integration of military families into the wider community through this project building support networks for parents within the group that extend beyond the delivery of the project. Both the schools and community learning team at Clarendon have identified this as a need. The most recent JSA reinforces this stating the percentage of people who feel they belong to their local area has remained consistently below the Wiltshire average since 2011 and is the lowest of all the community areas across Wiltshire as well as the percentage of people who agree that people from different backgrounds get on well together has reduced markedly from 80 agreeing in 2011 to 62 in 2013. We are seeking to bring the community together through the shared experience of preparing cooking and eating food. We are seeking to provide parents with the practical skills and knowledge of how to feed their families healthy nutritious food whilst operating on a tight budget as the number of children living in poverty has increased over the past few years to 502 children Tidworth JSA 2014. The location of the schools will mean we draw on the population living in the local LSOA of greatest deprivation the schools prior engagement with families means they can target those in greatest need. The 2011 census also identified two output areas within Tidworth as among the top 20 in England of those with the highest percentage of households experiencing three or four types of deprivation. The slow cooker provided at the end of the course will enhance their ability to shop cook and eat healthily with minimal expenditure on ingredients and energy.

#### 14. How will you monitor this?

We will ask parents to complete a questionnaire before the start and at the end of the course regarding skill level and confidence. We will be able to provide accreditation for units completed through AQA. We will complete a follow up evaluation 3-6 months later via 3rd party for more reliable evidence to ascertain how helpful the slow cooker and course has been and whether any further learning volunteering or employment opportunities have been accessed. We can ask for other information such as postcode etc as the area board requires.

#### 3. When will the initiative take place?

If funding is agreed then Parishes will be invited declare an interest in receiving equipment immediately after the area board with a view to using it initially on the weekend of March 3<sup>rd</sup> – 5<sup>th</sup> 2017.

The Great British Spring Clean is a campaign with one simple ambition. To bring together people from across the country to clear up the litter that blights our towns, villages, countryside and coastline.

In 2015, one enthusiastic individual - Melissa Murdoch - had an idea to get people from all walks of life together in cleaning up the rubbish that surrounds us. Together, with Adrian Evans, Keep Britain Tidy, Country Life Magazine and a range of supporting partners the Clean for The Queen campaign inspired 250,000 people to get involved in local clean ups through March 2016. But we couldn't leave it there...Through March 2017, we want to inspire 500,000 people to get outdoors, get active and help clear up the rubbish that lies around us.

We're calling on individuals, community groups, charities, sports clubs, business, local authorities and many more to sign up and take part.

It is hoped that local litter picking will also encourage volunteers to take part in other local initiatives.

Your Care Your Support Wiltshire is focused on continuous improvement. The team at Healthwatch continue to have a two-way conversation with our users. We help our community understand how to use our site, how to interact with our content and how to use the internet to solve their problems. In doing so we learn how real people approach the internet, their search for resolutions to the issues they face, and how they plan to maintain their health and independence at home. We feed this information back into our site design and content provisioning.

We have added 70 new directory entries this month, and will be adding these to pre-prepared Area Guides. New pages are coming about End of Life Care and older pages are being refreshed. The community of site users is growing, with 1000 page views on busy days, 24% of which are from users on mobile or tablet devices, 76% from desktop devices.
