59 **Refreshments, Networking and Information**

Attendees viewed the displays, stands and information on climate change. Information was available from Wessex Water, Extinction Rebellion, The Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, The Pantry Partnership and the Wiltshire Council Waste Team.

60 **Welcome and Introductions**

The Chairman welcomed everyone to the Climate Emergency special meeting of the Amesbury Area Board and thanked them for attending.

61 **Chairman's Announcements**

The Chairman made the following announcements:

- **New Fly-Tipping Campaign – We're Targeting Fly Tippers**
The new We're Targeting Fly-tippers (WTF) campaign was announced. The campaign aimed to combat the scourge of fly-tipping by offering residents a reward of up to £200 in high street vouchers if they report information that leads to the successful prosecution of an offender or the payment of a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN). Email peter.white@wiltshire.gov.uk with as many details as possible to report fly-tipping.
- **British Telecom Proposed Payphones Removal Consultation**
The council had received notification from BT regarding a consultation on a programme of proposed public payphone removals. BT proposed to remove payphones with low usage levels following a full consultation. Wiltshire Council would also carry out a consultation. Responses

received by 14 January 2020 would be included in our return to BT. Please see the agenda report for full details and email Mary Moore, Economic Development and Planning, on mary.moore@wiltshire.gov.uk to comment. The Chairman noted that parish councils and registered charities could adopt a kiosk for £1.00. Uses for these kiosks could include mini libraries, or a space for a defibrillator. There were 3 telephone boxes that may be removed within the Amesbury Community Area.

- **Community Governance Review**

Wiltshire Council were undertaking a Community Governance Review, which was a process to provide the opportunity to review and make changes to governance arrangements to town and parish councils. - **Wiltshire Green Pledge**

Earlier this year Wiltshire Council pledged to be carbon neutral by 2030, and its councillors had agreed to seek to make the county of Wiltshire carbon neutral by 2030. To help with this, The Green Pledge had been launched which was asking people to commit to making small changes that could have a big positive impact on the environment. 62 **The Climate Emergency and Wiltshire Council**

The board received a presentation from Cllr Richard Clewer, Cabinet Member for Climate Change.

In February 2019 Wiltshire Council passed a motion declaring the Climate Emergency. The council resolved to seek to make the county of Wiltshire (excluding Swindon) carbon neutral by 2030 and to establish our carbon baseline and renewables baseline. The Cabinet had committed to making Wiltshire Council Carbon Neutral by 2030.

To help achieve this the council would update the local plan to include the carbon neutral plan, and green policies for any new builds. Consultations would begin on the local plan in 2020. The transport plan would also be updated; public transport, walking and cycling needed to be promoted. Moving forward all Wiltshire Council plans would need to be developed to include policies on reducing carbon.

In order to be able to address the problems and reduce carbon emissions the council needed to establish carbon baselines. Baseline emissions referred to the production of carbon that had occurred in the past and which were being produced prior to the introduction of any strategies to reduce emissions. The baseline measurement would be determined over a set period, typically one year. This historical measurement would act as a benchmark to evaluate the success of subsequent efforts to reduce emissions. Without the knowledge of

baseline emissions, it would be impossible to reliably judge the success of any remediation efforts. To do this Wiltshire Council were talking to local universities; the Anthesis Group (SCATTER); Swindon and Wiltshire Local Economic Partnership; the Local Government Association; and other local authorities to see what they do.

It was estimated that each Wiltshire Council resident was responsible for approximately 7 tonnes of carbon emissions a year.

Wiltshire Council had established a Global Warming and Climate Emergency task group, chaired by Cllr Graham Wright, to consider renewable energy generation, energy use and efficiency; planning; transport and air quality; waste; land use; business and industry; the carbon baseline and renewable energy baseline. The aim of the task group was to develop an effective strategy which would then be approved by council. The council wanted to get things right, so it was worth investigating all the options.

The council aimed to adapt housing stock and council buildings to make them more energy efficient. This included introducing solar arrays over park and ride sites and solar panels on all council housing. All street lights would be changed to LED's which were far more efficient and decreased light pollution. Changes to waste collection would also help.

Friends of the Earth had found Wiltshire Council to be the best performing local authority in England and Wales, however there were still many improvements to be made.

The Chairman thanked Cllr Clewer for his presentation.

63 **"Put Your Cards on the Table" Climate Emergency Workshop**

Cllr Graham Wright thanked all the people who had provided stands and exhibits for the meeting. He then introduced Bill Jarvis of Extinction Rebellion (XR).

Mr Jarvis introduced himself to the meeting, explaining that he was a retired engineer with grandchildren. Due to the climate emergency he was scared for their future. Wiltshire Council had started to address the climate emergency, although progress was slow and XR wanted to help Wiltshire Council achieve.

It was explained that Carbon Dioxide levels were continuing to rise, if no actions were taken the world could expect a 3m rise in sea level by the end of the century. Sea levels and extreme weather events were already having an effect. Venice had flooded recently, as had Doncaster in the UK. The Greenland ice sheet was melting at a rate 50 years ahead of forecast. The Arctic summer sea ice would disappear by 2028, Antarctic ice was also disappearing at an alarming rate. Many species were becoming extinct. Wildfires were increasing. The consequences of not acting were extremely dire.

The UK was rated 68th for carbon reduction. The Climate Act was passed in 2008 however central government had failed on a lot of their goals. People needed to commit to action.

Cllr Wright thanked Mr Jarvis for his presentation. Cllr Wright urged communities to imagine; think and be informed; use their voice; start a climate conversation; work together and commit to change.

Wiltshire Council had established a Scrutiny Task Group which was working with the Cabinet to help produce a strategy that would enable Wiltshire Council to be Carbon Neutral by 2030.

Central government needed to act now. Technology and new processes were available, people were encouraged to keep the pressure on by lobbying through Wiltshire Council and directly with their MP.

There were around half a million residents in Wiltshire. How could we help them to reduce their carbon footprint? The meeting was asked to consider actions that could be taken, and a workshop session was undertaken. The feedback from the session can be seen as an appendix to the minutes, in the Outcomes from Climate Change Workshop document.

Most felt motivated to change their behaviour by the workshop session. Cllr Clewer assured the meeting that feedback would be listened to and the council would take steps to address the climate emergency.

The minutes of the meeting held on 12 September 2019 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman, with one amendment to minute number 52, (page 7 of the minutes), where the roundabout referred to at the Toby Carvery was in Amesbury, not Bulford as stated.

67 **Declarations of Interest**

68 **Partner Updates**

The Chairman referred to the updates set out in the agenda and invited further updates from Town/Parish Councils and other Partners.

- **Shrewton Parish Council**

A verbal presentation was received which summarised the Shrewton Parish Council update published in agenda supplement 1. One of the main issues raised was large military vehicles driving through areas of Shrewton where they were prohibited. The deputy commander of Larkhill Garrison addressed the meeting, advising that their drivers were reminded regularly not to drive the back way. It seemed that the problems often occurred when drivers were civilian contractors from out of the county. The military were not allowed to put signage on the highway and requested Wiltshire Council's help with this.

The Chairman thanked people for their contributions and advised Shrewton Parish Council to raise a CATG issue to look at the signage issue.

- **Roof Repairs to Amesbury's St Mary and St Melor Church**

Mark Verbinnen of Amesbury Town Council gave a presentation on the need for roof repairs at Amesbury's St Mary and St Melor Church. The Church was over a thousand years old and serious damage to the roof had occurred over the last few years, there was water ingress and the lead had deteriorated. There was also death watch beetle decay throughout the roof. No funding was received from the Church of England or the government to maintain the building. Costs had spiralled and they needed to raise a further £250,000. Action needed to be taken now to save the building. Actions people and their communities might take to tackle these issues:

1) Imported Emissions

- Vertical farming
- Buying locally/use local suppliers
- Buying seasonally
- Buy less – only buy what you need

2) What We Eat

- Plan your meals for the week
- Go vegetarian/vegan/flexitarian
- Eat fresh food with less packaging
- Educate people on what to eat
- Learn to make meals with leftovers
- Grow your own

3) Stuff

- Buy less stuff
- Reduce the presents you give
- Ask if you really need it
- Recycle/donate unwanted items

4) Cars-Travel

- Work from home
- Restrict engine size
- Go electric?
- Lobby government for low cost and efficient public transport



The JSNA is refreshed every three years, with the next cycle due to be updated in 2020. There will be three key engagement stages to support the area board in hearing from their communities and identifying their active local priorities:

- Public JSNA survey (completed in Autumn 2019)
- A JSNA event (scheduled for Spring 2020)
- A resident and partner engagement exercise (scheduled for early summer 2020)

The flowchart shows the key milestones of the JSNA process with a more detailed description of the process below.

- Arts, culture and leisure

- Environment
- Health and wellbeing
- Highways and transport
- Housing
- Older people

Partner and resident engagement – early Summer 2020

Following this meeting, further local conversations will take place with residents and partners. The engagement aims to establish partner and community capacity, resource and preference for the priorities that have been identified.

The key messages for a safer home

- **Ensure you have working smoke alarms installed on all levels of your home.** Working alarms can give you the vital time needed to escape in a fire. Test your smoke alarms regularly and never remove batteries!
- **Never leave cooking unattended.** The majority of fires start in the kitchen so this is a high-risk area. Many of us enjoy a merry tippie over the festive season but be sure to avoid cooking whilst under the influence of alcohol. Always turn off kitchen appliances when you have finished cooking.
- **Never leave burning candles unattended.** Keep candles out of the reach of children, and away from decorations, cards and wrapping paper, fires, lights and heaters.
- **Put your cigarette out, right out.** Make sure your cigarette is fully extinguished and take care when under the influence of alcohol or tired. It's very easy to fall asleep while your cigarette is still burning and set furniture alight.
- **Never use heaters to dry clothes.** Heaters can start fires when things are placed too close to them. Keep them well away from curtains, clothing and furniture.



- **Don't overload sockets.** Ensure only one plug per socket. Always turn off plugs when they are not in use, except those that are designed to be left on, like freezers.
- **Ensure you switch off fairy lights** and unplug them before you go to bed or leave the house. Check your Christmas tree lights conform to the British Standard (BS EN 60598) and are in good working order before use.
- **Always use an RCD (residual current device)** on outdoor electrical equipment. This safety device can save lives by instantly switching off the power if there is a fault and can be found in any DIY store.
- Make sure that everyone in your home knows what to do in a fire – **in the event of fire you should get out, stay out and call 999**

Our dedicated team of Safe & Well advisors can (at request) come to your home and discuss with you and your family how to maintain and regularly test you smoke alarms. They will also assist you in establishing a fire plan which will enable you to make a safe exit or go to a place of safety in the event of a fire in the home.

But this is not all the advisors do, they are also able provide you with information on how to make simple changes to enable us all to live a healthier life style. They can assist in organising support from organisations such as Age UK to assist our older relatives, arranging mental health support for those who maybe finding things just a little bit harder to deal with and, can also signpost with Safeguarding issues. All of which can bring together our partner agencies within the NHS, Council, Police and volunteer services who's aim is to enable those most vulnerable in our communities to be able to live in their own homes with the correct support.

DO YOU KNOW A CHARLIE

More than 6.5 million people in the UK are currently caring, unpaid, for a family member or friend who is older, disabled or seriously ill. Yet many people don't identify themselves as carers, they simply see themselves as spouses, partners, parents, children or friends.

A CHARLIE is a person whom meets at least one of the following criteria:

- **Care and support needs**
- **Hoarding and/or mental health issues**
- **Alcohol and medication use**
- **Reduced mobility**
- **Lives alone**
- **Inappropriate smoking**
- **Elderly and would benefit from support**

It only takes a few minutes to email or call us but can save a lifetime of heart ache for those who may suffer in silence, especially when they are cold in winter months or do not have the correct means to alert them to a fire in their home or to the dangers of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Hoarding



We all keep things we don't really need. Some of us have more possessions than we have storage for. But hoarding is a complex issue that goes far beyond untidiness or indecisiveness.

Hoarders can fill entire rooms from floor to ceiling, leaving themselves the minimum space in which to live. This retention of property presents a real fire risk and makes it far harder for firefighters to be able to tackle any blaze.

The Fire and Rescue Service can't solve the problem of hoarding; however, where we know there is an issue, we can work with other agencies to try and reduce the risk of fire.

Evidence from across the country shows that:

- In 90% of all residential fires, the fire itself is contained to the room where it started. However, that figure drops to 40% where there is hoarding – as this additional material fuels the fire and makes it spread more quickly.
- When there is a fire in a hoarder's home, there is a far greater risk that the individual and/or family members will find it difficult or impossible to escape.
- Common materials kept by hoarders include newspapers, magazines, books and soft furnishings – all of which are highly combustible.
- The presence of vast amounts of hoarded material creates a risk to firefighters, both in getting to the fire and through increased heat and smoke.

By offering Safe and Well visits, and installing smoke alarms, we can work with hoarders to try and make their homes more fire safe. If they want help in dealing with their hoarding compulsion, then we can refer them to other agencies for that support. However, we know that not every hoarder is ready to take that step and we want to ensure that they are as fire safe as possible, whatever the circumstances of their home.

Are you an employer that is willing to release a member of your staff to join us? Without the willingness of those in the community to join us then we will continue to struggle to turn fire appliances out for emergencies.

We will provide full training which includes firefighting skills, first aid, driving skills for Cat C vehicles (if required) and fire prevention and protection skills. All these skills that we provide can assist in an individual's normal workplace making that a safer environment within which to work. We provide all the uniform and fire kit and can help with travelling so there should be no expense to an individual once they manage to get in.

Payment / salary is based on the number of hours an individual can provide us and we provide holiday leave entitlement and a pension.

Our appliances and stations are based in the community and we need you as the community to help staff them.

- **Local Housing Needs Survey**

The Parish of Shrewton is undertaking a housing needs survey for all households in the Parish from **Friday 28th February closing on Monday 30th March 2020**. We welcome responses either by returning the paper form or online at <http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/housing-local-housing-needs> under the heading **Current Housing Needs Surveys**.

The main aim of the survey is to determine the need for affordable housing together with the need for adapted housing or housing with care or support. It will also help us to understand your views on new housing development in the parish in general. All households within the parish are encouraged to complete a survey and to read/pass on the information below to ensure that affordable housing options are promoted to all who could benefit from it.

Types of Affordable Housing

- Social Rented - set in line with Government policy and in the region of 50% of market rents
- Affordable Rented - let at up to 80% of local market rents
- Shared Ownership – where the purchaser buys a share (can be as low as 25% of the open market value) of the property using a mortgage and pays a reduced affordable rent to the Registered Housing Provider for the remaining share
- Discount Market Units - these are sold to a qualifying purchaser at a minimum of a 20% discount on the market sale price

Applicants for affordable and social rented housing in Wiltshire need to be registered with Homes4Wiltshire with the following eligibility:

- A local connection to Wiltshire and further criteria as defined by the Homes4Wiltshire Allocations Policy:

- People without an immediate housing need can still register and may be considered for some types of affordable rented housing as well as being able to apply for any form of affordable home ownership.

Shared ownership housing and other forms of low-cost home ownership are available to a wide range of customers, and you may be surprised to find that this is something that could suit your needs, or the needs of a family member:

- Monthly costs of owning a property on a shared ownership basis could be cheaper than renting the same size property in the private sector
- Anyone with a household income of less than **£80,000** per annum can register for shared ownership housing and other forms of low-cost home ownership

- The average shared ownership purchaser in Wiltshire in 2018/19 was 36 years old, with an average **household** income of **£29,223**
- The average share purchased was at 44% of open market value, equating to an average purchase price of £100,675
- 81% of purchasers bought a house, and 19% bought a flat
- 40% of purchasers were previously renting in the private sector.


