1	<p><u>Welcome and Introductions</u></p> <p>The Chairman, Cllr Richard Britton welcomed everyone to the online meeting of the Southern Wiltshire Area Board.</p>
2	<p><u>Apologies</u></p> <p>There were none.</p>
3	<p><u>Minutes</u></p> <p><u>Decision</u> The Board approved the minutes of the last meeting held online on 1 October 2020.</p>
4	<p><u>Declarations of Interest</u></p> <p>There were none.</p>
5	<p><u>Chairman's Announcements</u></p> <p>There was a slightly unusual agenda for the meeting, in that the grant section was quite full. A larger amount of time had therefore been allocated to that section to allow enough time to give proper consideration to the applications.</p>
6	<p><u>To note the written reports and updates in the agenda pack or distributed on the night</u></p> <p>The Board noted the written reports and information items detailed in the agenda. 7	<p><u>To note the written reports and updates in the agenda pack or distributed on the night</u></p> <p><u>Community Policing – local issues and priorities</u> Inspector Pete Sparrow updated the Board on crime statistics for the period and current priorities of the local policing teams.</p>

Staffing overview:

There were 4 student officers coming in, which were currently in tutorship and would become independent in February. There were also 3 extra PCSOs.

Teams were working on strategies that prevent crime and to adopted the mindset of 'what can I do to stop someone else coming here to deal with the same issue again'.

Local Priorities:

- Covid patrols – Using the '4 E' approach
- Rural Crime – prevent/reduce/disrupt/detect, cross border liaison
- Road Safety - speed enforcement/CSW
- ASB - Downton & Redlynch, closure order checks, youth engagement
- Vulnerable People – making contact with those identified

Analytical tools help to identify issues. The slide showed all reported crime for Salisbury and southern Wiltshire and specifically the reduction during lockdown one and two.

The Commander control system 'Storm' showed incidents of antisocial behaviour, there were 271 incidents recorded in Salisbury over a 3 month period. The majority of the incidents were around Salisbury city.

Whilst there may be some localised clusters, figures showed a lower level of incidents in southern Wiltshire than Salisbury city.

Questions:

During lockdown had there been an increase in domestic violence?

Answer: We did see a rise during lockdown, some of that was seasonal, but the lockdown did coup people together. The message is to stay home, unless it's not safe to do so.

The Police had not been going overboard on enforcement, please remember that not everybody that is out there breaking a covid regulation is someone that has done it before. It may be accidental.

Answer: Discretion always played a part of Policing, it's the people that are regularly breaking the rules that need enforcement.

With regards to the burglary figs, were there any particular trends, or opportunist, and what could be done to take a proactive stance to prevent this?

Answer: The majority would be sheds and outbuildings some vans with tools had also been broken in to. We advise marking valuable tools to make it harder and deter these incidents. The use of signage and CCTV also helped.

There had recently been a lot of reports of dog thefts was that a particular concern?

Answer: That was more noise than actual crime, but there has been an arrest today. Last year there were a total of 22 reports of Dog theft for Wiltshire This area of crime was not as bad as people think. The prices of animals had gone through the roof, they were an expensive commodity and unfortunately with that, they were worth stealing.

Was the Bobby Van still available to come out and advise?

Answer: Yes it is.

Residents had fed back to Cllr Clewer their concerns regarding criminal damage, rural crime and the police response. Last night, cars severely damages, car burnt out, cattle grid damaged and a phone box destroyed, all what residents feel were a linked chain of events. You reported that you stopped a vehicle in Downton a week ago, these events are happening all the time. When they are happening, the Police response was for him to locate CCTV evidence. It made that person see red.

There were also repeated reports over the summer of windows and conservatories smashed at old people's residence. People have got to the point where they feel all they get from the police is a crime reference number. Things this year have not helped, and people seem to have lost confidence in the Police.

Answer: They are some of the perceptions that I hear. The important part is that incidents must be reported, if not then we do not know about them.

The issues around asking members of the public to look at CCTV, was partly down to a system where we have people on the telephones recording information. They need to distinguish which incidents they need to send the Police to.

People were more likely to know if their neighbour had CCTV and it was acceptable to ask whether they could look to see if something was captured. We need to put our resources where they were most needed.

With the issues in Downton, it was sad that people were not reporting incidents. There weren't that many offences in Downton and Redlynch.

The Chair noted that there clearly was a problem in the areas Cllr Clewer had spoken about and asked how they could be taken forward?

Cllr Clewer added that there was a theft from vans in Whiteparish, where the initial Police response was good. Then nothing was followed up.

Answer: I would be happy to take some of the detail on the incidents that were not followed up and look at that and would discuss the other matters with Cllr Clewer to take those forward.

8	<p><u>Census</u></p> <p>Jonny Corbett, Census Engagement Manager for Wiltshire, delivered a presentation on the Census 2021, its importance for Wiltshire and the key target groups.</p> <p>A survey every 10 years, owned by the Office of National Statistics. The purpose of the Census was to gather millions of data points for the government and local and parish councils.</p> <p>The Census provides information that is used to shape policies, allocate funding and resources, plan services and monitor equality.</p> <p>The Census would take place on 21 March 2021 and would be a digital first census, with paper copies available for those that required it.</p> <p>Town and Parish councils were asked to spread the word. 9	<p><u>PCC Precept proposals</u></p> <p>Deputy PCC Jerry Herbert gave a presentation on the annual Precept proposals.</p> <p>The precept was increased last year, with additional money and the additional officers that came as part of the 'Boris Bobbies' scheme, into our Rural Crime team. There would be a total of 65 additional Officers by the end of the financial year. Up to 1050 Officers in total from the 934 two years ago. A vast amount of those Officers were going into the Community Police Teams.</p> <p>Other areas of Policing which had received an uplift were Cyber-crime, dealing</p>

	<p>with crime prevention and investigation.</p> <p>A flat cash settlement from the Home Office would pay the basic costs, beyond that there would be a shortfall of around £3m, that was driven by the fact that the Home Office funding did not pay for the 50% of last years pay award which fell into the next financial year, the increased costs of running the Police Aviation service or the national Police technologies.</p> <p>The only way to keep the force running at the current level was to rise the precept. A £15 increase a year, which worked out as £1.25 a month for a band D property. Without this they would have to cut Community Policing</p> <p>It was expected that there would be an add 48 officers in the new financial year.</p> <p>The Commissioner has just launched a consultation period, running from 5 January 2021 to 2 February 2021. Please could you spread the word on the consultation as would like as may contributions as possible. It offers the chance to contribute your thoughts on what you think the local priorities should be.</p> <p><u>Questions and Comments:</u></p> <p>Was Wiltshire the lowest funded force in the country on a per capita basis?</p> <p><u>Answer:</u> No, not strictly. Of the 43 forces we get substantially less.</p> <p>In general, £1.25 a month increase wasn't too much.</p> <p>The Police & Crime Panel would next meet on 4th February and had the power to veto the precept.</p> <p>Information links: Public consultation survey: https://www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/PNHBKSG PCC Precept Video: https://youtu.be/eRMtE_YxdWk</p>
10	<p><u>Area Board Work Plan</u></p> <p>Karen Linaker, Community Engagement Manager reported on progress towards the ambition to hand over as many detailed projects as possible to the new Area Board, post the May elections.</p> <p>Every three years the Board looked to review its workplan to ensure it was shaped to the needs of the local community.</p> <p>Looking at the latest data compiled by liaising with our partners and consulting our communities we set our priorities for the years ahead.</p> <p>At the March 2021 Area Board meeting the Board will present its updated plan, ready to hand over to the new Area Board after the May elections.</p>

	<p>Events:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Parish council mini workshop • Health & Wellbeing workshop – held last Wednesday with 25 attendees. We spoke about what the top priorities for H&W were. From that discussion we drew the conclusion that rural isolation and older peoples isolation and dementia were all big priorities <p>The Plan so far:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Support and strengthen community communications 2. Facilitate collaborative working between parish councils, e.g. play areas, rights of way... 3. Support for village activities now and as we emerge from the pandemic 4. Support projects to tackle rural isolation, i.e. “Make A Friend Be A Friend”, “Silver Sunday”, new Dementia Memory Group, new youth activities and interventions with the New Forest Park Authority, and “Get Out Get Active” 5. Work closely with the new Sarum Wellbeing Collective team based at Downton and Whiteparish surgeries on initiatives to help our physical and mental health and wellbeing 6. Young People: Healthy Schools Project, Fun Days and youth engagement activities, ongoing support for youth clubs and activities, and targeted ASB interventions 7. Online survey to clarify who is doing what, so that the area board can truly add value <p>The Chairman added that this was a huge range of initiatives and partnership work, that Karen was managing, along with her role as the CEM for the SWWAB she was thinly spread.</p> <p>From the H&W event, one thing picked up was the need to engage with schools. The board had tried this in the past, and had not been very successful in attracting them to be involved.</p> <p>The next year of scheduled Area Board meetings would include four business type meetings and a couple of event type meetings, with the possibly of a youth based one.</p>
11	<p><u>Community Area Transport Group (CATG) Update</u></p> <p>The Chairman moved that the Board approved the funding recommendations of the CATG as detailed in the report attached to the agenda.</p> <p><u>Decision</u> The Area Board approved the recommendations from the CATG meeting</p>

12	<p><u>Community Area Grants</u></p> <p>The Chairman noted that some of the activities detailed in the applications may not be able to go ahead until the covid restrictions had been eased. In light of that, he advised that where there was a delay in a project taking place, there may also be a delay to the release of Area Board funds.</p> <p><u>Health & Wellbeing Funding</u></p> <p><u>Decision</u> The Board noted a £200 award which had been made to the Salisbury Older People’s Champion from the Health & Wellbeing budget 2020/21, under CEM Delegated Powers.</p> <p><u>Community Area Grants</u></p> <p>The Board considered 6 applications for funding, as detailed in the agenda pack. Applicants in attendance were invited to give a short summary of their projects. Followed by any questions.</p> <p><u>My Salisbury - Community Journalism & Media Training requested £4479.97</u> The applicant, Andy Munns spoke in support of the project.</p> <p><u>Questions</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The skills set you are training them in, would the content then be used by local radio? • <u>Answer:</u> No the content they would be creating is for ‘My Salisbury’ only, if another platform wished to use those storeys that would be good. The website would be promoted through social media and other mediums, we would hope that Salisbury Journal and the Valley news etc would then write a piece on us. • What would happen if we were enthusiastic about the youth aspect but not the other bid? <u>Answer:</u> They are stand alone, not funding one would not prevent the other from happening.

- Which other Area Boards had been approached for funding?
Answer: For the youth grant applied to Southern and Salisbury.
The other project – we have already received £5K funding from SAB, we will be needing more as have now got over 50 people interested
- We would need to see the full figures before we consider this.
- There is no mention of SAB in the application or £5k coming in?
- We don't normally fund projects that only cover Salisbury, if we did fund this I would expect a guarantee that we had a number of candidates that benefitted from this in our area.
Answer: I live in your community area, outside of the city. I aim to reach the rural areas outside of the city.
I would be happy to guarantee a minimum number of spaces for those outside of the city.
- Have you spoken to the schools?
Answer: Yes have spoken to several and they are interested in workshops

The Board felt that although the project was one that met the funding criteria, it sought clarification on whether a project was able to receive more than 50% funding from Area boards, and whether that rule was individually or as a combined award from several boards.

Action: The CEM would work with the applicant to resubmit the application with the required figures.

Decision

The application by 'My Salisbury' was deferred until a future meeting.

Reason

The applicant had applied for funding from multiple Area boards and clarification was required on some of the missing data.

Devenish Bradshaw Trust – City to countryside dog trails – requested £940

The applicant, David Burton spoke in support of the project.

Questions and comments:

- The amount applied for of £940 was 100% of the project, but you are showing a surplus of £1386.
Answer: That's to manage the Watermeadows.
- What is the aim of the project?
Answer: Its about raising awareness for dogwalkers, particularly new dog owners – without causing danger to the countryside.

- Cllr McLennan - Up until the end of last year, I was a trustee of the trust, I stepped down at that point after securing the 55 acres. As said, the RBCF and the land that was beside it, was now owned by the Trust. It's about creating areas. The project is local and is able to be accessed by visitors. Happy to support this.
- There was no argument of it being a local project, however the Board is asked to fund the entirety of the project. The paperwork doesn't state that the PC gave £1000 for bins.
- Nicholas Baker – chair of L&F PC speaking for myself – there are a lot of new dog owners in the area. There have been issues with animals being damaged by dogs. As part of this the PC had sited 2 bins for this. We are covering £100 for the year to empty them.

Cllr McLennan moved the motion of awarding the full amount of £940. The Board was supportive of the project however felt that some detail was missing. As the original motion was not seconded a new motion of a £500 award was proposed and seconded.

Decision

Devenish Bradshaw Trust was awarded £500 (capital) towards the City to countryside dog trails project.

Reason

The application met the Community Area Grant Criteria for 2020/21.

ArtCare – Wellbeing TV at SDH - requested £2500

The applicant Rebecca Seymore spoke in support of the project.

Questions and comments

- You have applied for 3 x Area Boards for £2500 each, could the CEM clarify whether a project could be awarded more than 50% collectively?
Answer – Karen - My understanding was that the maximum of 50% funding was to an individual AB and not collectively.

The motion to award the full amount was moved and seconded.

Decision

ArtCare was awarded £2500 towards the Wellbeing TV at SDH project.

Reason

The application met the Community Area Grant Criteria for 2020/21.

1st Downton Scout Group - Hut Refurbishment – requested £4500

The Applicant, Ian Porter spoke in support of the project.

Questions and comments:

- Were costings subject to VAT and could you get them back?
Answer: We are not VAT registered and yes the sums include VAT

- You have money in reserve.
Answer: Yes the trustees have agreed to keep the operational costs as reserve.
- There was lots of support for this locally. The toilets in the hut were 50 years old. PC keen on supporting this.

The motion to award the full amount was moved and seconded.

Decision

1st Downton Scout Group was awarded £4500 towards the Scout Hut Refurbishment project.

Reason

The application met the Community Area Grant Criteria for 2020/21.

Alderbury PC – Speed Indicator Device (SID) – requested £1000

The Chairman noted that he was a regular Speedwatch volunteer and was aware there was regular speeding through Alderbury.

The motion to award in full was moved and seconded.

Decision

Alderbury PC was awarded £1000 towards the SID project.

Reason

The application met the Community Area Grant Criteria for 2020/21.

Downton FC – Clubhouse – requested £5000

The applicant, Luke Wordley spoke in support of the project.

Questions and comments:

- The application was short by £3k, to trigger Sports England funding.
- Would there be any sale of alcohol during the children's match games?
Answer: No, the bar area was not open during Saturday mornings, when all of the youth games took place. I can provide a copy of the Safeguarding Policy to the CEM if required.
- Luke and others had come together with a new manager running the sports centre, it was much more viable. The site was turning it into something that could be more sustainable.

The motion to award in full was moved and seconded.

Decision

Downton FC was awarded £5000 towards the Clubhouse project with the condition that a copy of the Safeguarding Policy is provided to the CEM.

Reason

The application met the Community Area Grant Criteria for 2020/21.

Youth Funding Bids

The Board considered 3 bids for Youth Funding as detailed in the agenda. (The board previously voted to reserve £1200 for the Old Sarum event – that money was being drawn down, estimated at £800).

My Salisbury – Project Spark – requested £4975.

Decision

My Salisbury was awarded £4975 towards Project Spark from the Youth Budget for 2020/21.

Area Board Project – Rural Youth Outreach – requested £5000

Karen explained that this initiative had arisen from the rural CEMs in the south of county, to commission a youth provision pot of £30k.

There would be a bespoke offer of 8/9 events or initiatives to benefit young people. A Partnership Steering Group would lead it. The activities would be fairly apportioned across the areas.

Questions and comments:

- This looks as if we are being asked to fund a youth worker. I would like to see this as a presentation at an AB. Could we defer this until the next AB?
- The statement that we cannot get volunteers in our villages gives weight to this proposal.
- On the basis that it was a one year pilot project to work out what could be implemented, I would be comfortable with it as it stands.

Our foster carers do an amazing job, making a massive difference to the life chances of some of Wiltshire's most vulnerable children and young people. Foster carers provide a safe and nurturing home for our children who have experienced abuse, trauma and loss.

We are currently seeking to recruit 100 new foster carers over three years so that our children can continue to live in their local communities, within Wiltshire. We started a campaign back in May 2020 at the start of Foster Care Fortnight to encourage more applications to foster. To date, we have successfully recruited 26 new fostering families towards our target. This is great news, but we still don't have enough to keep all our children in care within Wiltshire, especially for our teenagers.

With more Wiltshire Council foster carers, our children and young people can remain living locally, which means they are more readily able to remain in the same school, see friends and maintain relationships with their family.

We are sharing our message with each area board, with the hope you can encourage people to support and promote our recruitment campaign and highlight the importance of foster care in your local communities.

In all areas, we require more fostering families to look after our children in care. We know that some areas may need a significant increase whereas a few others may only need a few more. We would like our fostering service to get to the position where we are able to offer children a choice of foster carer to best suit their needs.

We especially need more foster carers who want to care for our teenagers and specialist carers, able to look after a parent and child and /or provide an emergency home at a time of crisis and/or look after children with complex medical needs and/or disabilities.

Louise, a 14 year old young person who lives in foster care, who has explained below how foster carers can help teenagers deal with the ups and downs of growing up.

"When I've been upset, they've cheered me up. They also help me understand my feelings and help me with my worries. They are also good fun too and don't take things too seriously. Children need foster carers who have lots of time. They listen to what I have to say and are interested in my thoughts. The three things I think are most important for foster carers are: listen to what I say, make me feel like I am a part of their family and get along with me in general."

To become a foster carer, people need to be over 21 years of age and have a spare bedroom. More details are available on the fostering website: www.fosteringwiltshire.uk

Fostering payments vary depending on the skills and experience of the foster carer, starting at £350 per week per child up to a maximum of £1300 per week for a specialist parent and child carer providing an assessment.

Wiltshire Independent Visitor Scheme provides independent befriending support to children in the care of Wiltshire Council. These are children who are fostered or living in other care settings, usually in Wiltshire but sometimes outside the county borders. It is a requirement that the council to provide an Independent Visitor service, but young people chose whether or not they wish to take up this offer. This means they are really motivated to take part!

Our volunteer Independent Visitors (IVs) play a really important role, visiting the young person they are “matched” with regularly, listening to them and taking an interest in their lives. They offer consistency, and quality, fun, one to one time. IVs make a long-term commitment to support a young person until they leave the care system, and often beyond this time.

We already have a fantastic team of almost 60 volunteer IVs, who are out supporting young people in the community. The scheme is very popular with young people and currently we have a waiting list of those waiting to be linked up with an IV.

These are some comments from young people in our scheme, talking about what having an IV means to them:

“She’s very funny, very caring, if I am ever sad, she is someone to talk to”.

“She’s brilliant, bubbly and nice to be around.”

“It’s lovely to have somebody ‘normal’ to talk to outside of the system.”

“You get to do things you never knew about.”

We are sharing our message with each Area Board, with the hope you can promote our volunteering opportunity and highlight the importance of this scheme. We don’t want our young people to be kept waiting for a “match” and so we are keen to find the right volunteers in the places where they are needed. At present, we are particularly short of male volunteers, those who have experience of supporting children with more complex needs, and also volunteers who might be willing to travel further afield if needed (e.g. the south coast and Gloucester area). We want to find volunteers from Wiltshire if possible, in case young people move back in-county when they are older.

All volunteers will require an enhanced DBS disclosure. They should be over 18 and able to make a long-term commitment to meet with a young person for a couple of hours every three to four weeks. There is a requirement that all volunteers should be car drivers and be independent from Wiltshire Council (not a teacher, foster or residential carer or member of children’s social care staff).

Volunteers are reimbursed for their travel and any visit expenses. The scheme also offers volunteers regular training and support.

We will shortly be introducing the Government's COVID-19 rapid community testing initiative for specific groups of asymptomatic people in Wiltshire.

Our programme is primarily aimed at the following groups of people:

- Smaller businesses (50 employees or less) where staff are unable to work from home
- Early years staff based at private (non-maintained nurseries)
- Childminders

Our test sites will be at the following locations:

- Trowbridge – County Hall
- Devizes – Leisure Centre
- Salisbury – Five Rivers Health and Wellbeing Centre
- Chippenham – Monkton Park

Devizes will be the first to open on 18 February and the rest will soon follow. Until the other sites are open, the Devizes site will initially be the only one that people can book a place for.

Those in smaller businesses who cannot work from home, staff at private (non-maintained) early years settings, and childminders have been chosen because they are not currently involved in any other national mass-testing programme.

People will have to book to arrange an appointment and will not be tested if they have not done this.

The tests are self-administered and will take less than 15 minutes and results should be known within half an hour.

This is not to be confused with surge testing. Surge testing is increased testing (including door-to-door testing) and enhanced contact tracing in specific locations in England and is not currently taking place in Wiltshire.

Free testing continues to be available to everyone in Wiltshire who has COVID-19 symptoms – high temperature, continuous cough or loss of / change in taste or smell. People should visit www.nhs.uk/coronavirus or call 119 to book a test in that instance.

With regards to early years staff, we're very aware that due to the need to have the correct ratios at settings, that logistically it might be difficult for them to release staff to attend one of the testing sites. We completely sympathise with this, but at the moment this is the only way we are able to provide this testing service. We are speaking to representatives at national Government to see if more can be done and will update everyone should the situation change.

When used alongside other measures, this type of community testing has the potential to help reduce the spread of COVID-19 within communities.

However, should people choose to participate in the testing programme, it must be stressed that getting a negative test result is only a snapshot indication that the person tested didn't

have COVID-19 at that time. It is therefore not a passport to freedom and all other COVID secure measures must continue to be followed.

Anyone who receives a positive Lateral Flow Test result automatically activate legal obligations to self-isolate and may also claim for a Test and Trace payment if they are eligible. If we all continue play our part, then we can control the spread of the virus and help ease the pressure that our health and care services are under.

NHS Test and Trace is working with government departments, institutions and employers across both public and private sectors to support delivery of asymptomatic testing to large organisations, including those providing critical services. Mental health forum members produce their own guide to support services

People with lived experience of mental ill health have produced their own comprehensive guide to mental health and wellbeing services on offer in Wiltshire.

Members of the Wiltshire Mental Health Open Forum worked together to compile the Wiltshire Mental Health and Wellbeing Support Services list, which details where adults, children and young people can get support, counselling, and advice on topics such as addiction, bereavement and homelessness.

Set up in July 2020, the forum is a joint collaboration between Healthwatch Wiltshire and mental health service provider Avon and Wiltshire Mental Health Partnership NHS Trust (AWP), and is supported by a range of organisations including Wiltshire Council, Richmond Fellowship, Carer Support Wiltshire and Citizens Advice.

The free online forum, which runs once a month, provides a unique opportunity for people to speak directly to those who run mental health services in Wiltshire, talking about their experiences and sharing their ideas for ways services could be improved.

Forum regulars wanted to create the list of contacts as a way of helping people who are struggling with their mental health to find the right support for them quickly and easily.

One member said: “I found, as a mental health service user, it was especially useful to learn more about the different organisations that are out there and to be able to contribute my opinions and ideas and for them to be listened to by professionals. Being part of the creation of the list was very exciting.”

AWP Local Involvement Coordinators **Teresa Bridges and Christina Gregory** said: “We have been really pleased with the way the forum is going and the willingness of people to join us virtually and get their views heard.

“Service users and providers informed us that there was not enough information out there about the range of services available to someone needing mental health support in Wiltshire, and when someone is very poorly the last thing they would do is look at notice boards or search online. Therefore they needed something that could be given to them directly, by their GP for example, and hopefully this is what we have achieved.”

Claire Edgar, Director - Learning Disabilities and Mental Health at Wiltshire Council, said: “Having access to support and advice for those struggling with mental health is so important and particularly so at this current time as we all cope with the challenges of life during the pandemic. This guide is going to be a tremendous help to many people to help them access the right support with ease.”

Jo Woodsford, Volunteer and Partnerships Lead at Healthwatch Wiltshire, said: “Our members have taken complete charge of putting this list of resources together, bringing their own experiences to creating something that not only benefits them but will help other people too. Their determination and enthusiasm has been amazing, and we’d like to say a big thank you to them for all their hard work.”

On Call Recruitment

Have you always wondered if you could join the fire service, but haven't had the opportunity to find out more? Have you found yourself seeking your next challenge, keen to give back to the local community or wanting to learn new skills including leadership and teamwork? Then becoming an on-call firefighter is for you.

As a paid position, on-call firefighters commit anywhere between 40 to 120 hours per week, during which time they must be able to respond to the station immediately.

Many have 'normal' jobs during the day, then upon their return home make themselves available overnight or during the weekends. Some of our crew respond from their workplaces during the day, and we are very grateful to their employers for releasing them to perform their vital duties.

Anyone over 18 years old can apply (although you can also apply once you are 17½) you must be able to respond and attend the fire station within 5-8 minutes, you have a good standard of physical fitness (i.e. you are generally active), and you must have the right to work in the UK.
