Planning: Support for Local Councils and Communities

Thank you to the speakers, guests and WALC members who attended the recent WALC County Conference, which took place on 9th June 2023 at West Lavington Village Hall. Thank you also to CCLA, Lemonbooking, and Microshade VSM who generously supported this event.

The conference theme for this year was Planning. This included the National Planning Policy Framework, CIL & s106 monies, commenting as a consultee on planning matters and preparing a Neighbourhood Plan.

Speakers in attendance were Dr James Derounian and Dr Carlton Brand. James Gray MP and Danny Kruger MP were also in attendance, giving their views on the current Planning policies and how they impact our local area. The conference included a panel session with Wiltshire Community Land Trust and Community First who discussed how they can help Parishes with a Neighbourhood Plan and associated consultation.

Community First has recently seen an increase in local councils who are looking for support with planning, including Neighbourhood Plans. We have worked with a number of local and national councils to support with planning consultation through online surveys. We can also help with analysis of the data and report writing. This can include thematic analysis of open-ended responses.

Building Bridges Programme

We are pleased to announce that the Building Bridges programme is being relaunched with funding from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund via Wiltshire Council and the new programmes will run through to April 2025

What Building Bridges does:

The programme offers a holistic service that provides personalised support to people with significant barriers and challenges to help them build their independence and move towards education and employment outcomes.

As with the previous programme, a Support Worker will work closely with each participant to ensure they have strong consistent support from joining the programme through to leaving it – they will help understand their barriers & challenges, develop and implement plans to deliver them and provide support to sustain outcomes. They will also assist participants when they engage with external services to ensure the engagement is as smooth and seamless as possible.

A personalised needs analysis, circles of support map and holistic support action plan will be developed with each participant. They will then be offered a range of one-to-one and group activities based on their individual needs as they progress through support.

We are more than happy to integrate existing support that participants have in place into their plans with Building Bridges if they would like us to. In addition, Building Bridges will also offer:

- Access to self-confidence-building courses.
- Volunteering and work experience activities.
- Debt and benefit advice.
- Travel training.
- One-to-one counselling, anxiety, and mental health support.
- Support in gaining skills and qualifications.

Participants will be supported to develop their CVs, job search skills and interview skills and have access to support for up to three months to help them sustain their education and employment outcomes.

Who can we support?

The programme can support participants who are aged 16+, but those aged under 18 need to be NEET (not in education, employment & training) or at risk of becoming so.

Participants need to have the legal right to work in the UK and we can support those who are:

- Economically Inactive
- Unemployed but not receiving support from DWP employability programmes
- Employed but facing barriers & challenges to sustain employment

Building Bridges cannot support people who are in prison or remanded in custody, but we can support those who are remanded on bail and ex-offenders.

Please note that Building Bridges cannot replace statutory provision (Local Authority, DWP Job Centre, etc.) but we can work alongside other support provision if there is additionality.

Making Referrals

People can refer themselves to the programme or make a referral on behalf of someone else they are supporting with their permission.

MiDAS – Minibus Driver Awareness Training

Community First offers accredited MiDAS (Minibus Driver Awareness) Training for organisations and groups, led by our fantastic Training Co-ordinator Martin Carter.

MiDAS is a membership-based scheme designed to enhance both driving and safety standards for drivers of minibuses. MiDAS is a nationally recognised standard for the assessment and training of minibus drivers. Community First is now taking new bookings for MiDAS minibus training with our Training Coordinator Martin Carter. Martin is a retired Police Advanced Driver with over 35 years' experience of driving minibuses.

The MiDAS training course includes a session on how to operate a minibus safely. This is followed by a 30-minute multiple choice assessment with 20 questions. Trainees will need to answer 16 questions correctly to pass the theory test. Finally, there will be a practical test which incorporates a driving skills training session and an assessment drive which will last just over an hour, with the assessment taking 30 minutes. Upon completion of the theory and practical test, trainees will receive a certificate which is valid for 4 years.

Pricing is based on a minimum group size of 3 drivers per booking and starts at £105.00 per person. We are now taking new bookings for late Summer/early Autumn 2023 and early booking is recommended to secure a training place.

Rural Youth Project

The Community Development team and Stacey from District Sports recently held a youth pop-up event in Pewsey, as part of the ongoing rural youth project which aims to engage young people in rural areas. The pop-up event was attended by over 60 young people, who took part in activities including zorbing, sports and crafts. The young people were very well mannered and all enjoyed a fantastic evening. Further youth-pop-up events are planned over the summer months.

Feedback on our pop-up events:

“The Shrewton youth pop-up has meant the world to our daughter, who has disabilities and is now at an out-of-county specialist school. It has given her a safe, structured, and supported way for her to see and socialise with her old primary school friends and keep local ties (something that has started to be trickier for her as her interests and abilities diverge increasingly from those of her peers). She has had an absolute whale of a time at the group, has been brilliantly supported to join in, and is always asking when the next one is.”

“I also particularly love that the group is open to all – meaning young people at different schools, and those who are no longer at school because, for one reason or another, they have fallen out of the system, have a place where they can maintain their relationships and a sense of community. My hope and belief is that this will positively impact outcomes not just for those who attend, but for our community as a whole – as young people who are otherwise at risk of feeling isolated, bored and disenfranchised (and so more likely to behave antisocially) have positive opportunities to engage together and re-build a sense of togetherness.”

“Thank you so much for the pop-up and the time and support you have given to our young people.”

“Thank you so much for the kindness and ongoing support that you and your colleagues are giving to my son.”

“Just a few lines to tell you how much [name] enjoys attending the pop-up youth clubs and the young carers events. [Name] has a lot of fun taking part in these activities. He is an only child. By attending your groups he is able to mix with other children his own age outside of school which is giving him more confidence and self-belief, which helps positively to support his social, emotional and learning skills.

“As a young carer, he is often unable to go on day trips due to his father’s mobility and health issues. The young carers respite days give him the chance to have experiences that he normally wouldn’t be able to take part in and gives him a break both emotionally and physically from his caring role (he helps to look after his father who is living with terminal cancer).”

How we set our priorities

Each year Healthwatch Wiltshire sets its priorities for the year ahead based on the experiences that we hear from local people. These are gathered by:

- Reviewing feedback that we have received over the past year
- Conversations with our Local Leadership Board and volunteers

All the evidence and feedback we gather is shared with our Local Leadership Board and it is their role to decide what areas we focus on in the year ahead. We also talk to local commissioners and voluntary sector organisations to ensure our work can add value to what they're doing and to check that we aren't duplicating work that's already being done elsewhere.

While other people can suggest areas of focus to us, we are an independent organisation and decide our own workplan.

Our priorities for 2023/24

Thank you to the 127 people who completed our Help us shape our key projects in 2023/24 online survey that ran in March 2023. The survey [invited respondents to choose their preferences](#) from a list of six key project themes, all of which came from the feedback we'd received over the previous year. Here are some of the key themes people raised:

- Health and social care services should be working together more.
- Better communication is needed when patients are discharged from hospital.
- Services should be more aware of patients with disabilities.
- Better mental health support is needed, particularly when people transition from Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) to adult mental health services.
- Healthcare workers should receive more



- training to support autistic people.
- Pharmacies are overstretched and under-resourced, with many closing.
- More signposting is needed in communities to help people with the cost of living.

Our planned work for the year ahead

Based on the survey responses we received, and after a discussion with our volunteers and Local Leadership Board, the following priority areas have been agreed:

- **Hospital discharge and care at home/ virtual wards** – Hearing the views of people who have been discharged from hospital with an NHS@Home (virtual ward) package, and how this is working for them.
- **Children and young people's wellbeing** – finding out what young people are concerned about and what local support they would like.
- **Mental health and autism** – our joint project with Wiltshire Service Users' Network to find out [what autistic people, and their carers and families, think of local mental health services](#).
- **Access to GP services** – continuing our work to see how practices are adapting and changing since the pandemic.

Virtual wards

Patients across Wiltshire as well as those in Bath and North East Somerset and Swindon are now able to receive acute clinical care in their own homes through an initiative called NHS@Home Virtual Wards.

NHS@Home Virtual Wards is jointly provided across BSW by BSW Integrated Care Board, Wiltshire Health and Care, the Royal United Hospital, Great Western Hospital, HCRG Care Group and other local health and care organisations.

The service supports suitable patients to receive a high level of care, assessment, monitoring and treatment at home or their normal place of residence, similar to being an inpatient in a hospital ward.

NHS@Home Virtual Wards, which is also sometimes known as Hospital at Home, provides a range of interventions from a team of doctors, nurses, paramedics and therapists and other healthcare professionals who assess patients both remotely and face-to-face as required to provide clinical advice and treatment.

Patients who are assessed as being suitable for being cared for in their own homes may be referred to the service by their doctor or other healthcare professional. Members of the NHS@Home Virtual Wards team will schedule regular visits, dependent on individual needs, to deliver the treatment and care required. Patients also have access to advice and support outside of their visits.

Treating people in their own homes can be beneficial as patients will not be waiting around in Accident and Emergency departments for a long time before starting their treatment and are also less likely to decondition through long periods in bed as they may do on a hospital ward.

The programme also presents some tangible benefits for under-pressure hospitals as it helps to free up beds during periods of intense pressure and means patients are much more involved in their own care.

Across Bath and North East Somerset, Swindon and Wiltshire over 1,200 patients have been admitted to a virtual ward and a similar number have been discharged.

Wiltshire hospitals recognised for their commitment to carers

Two hospitals in Wiltshire have been given awards by local VCSE group Carer Support Wiltshire to recognise excellent levels of support for carers on hospital wards and outpatient departments.

Great Western Hospital in Swindon earned the award for its main outpatient department and Wiltshire Health and Care for its wards at Chippenham, Warminster, and Savernake community hospitals.

There are over 42,000 unpaid carers in Wiltshire and the NHS depends on the vital contribution they make by looking after family members and friends. Carers play a key role in providing support to others; enabling and facilitating outpatient appointments, earlier patient discharge from hospital, and helping to prevent re-admissions.

Both wards received a Silver Award which recognises their considerable commitment to carers by developing a series of practical ideas to improve how they can better identify, and support carers of all ages.

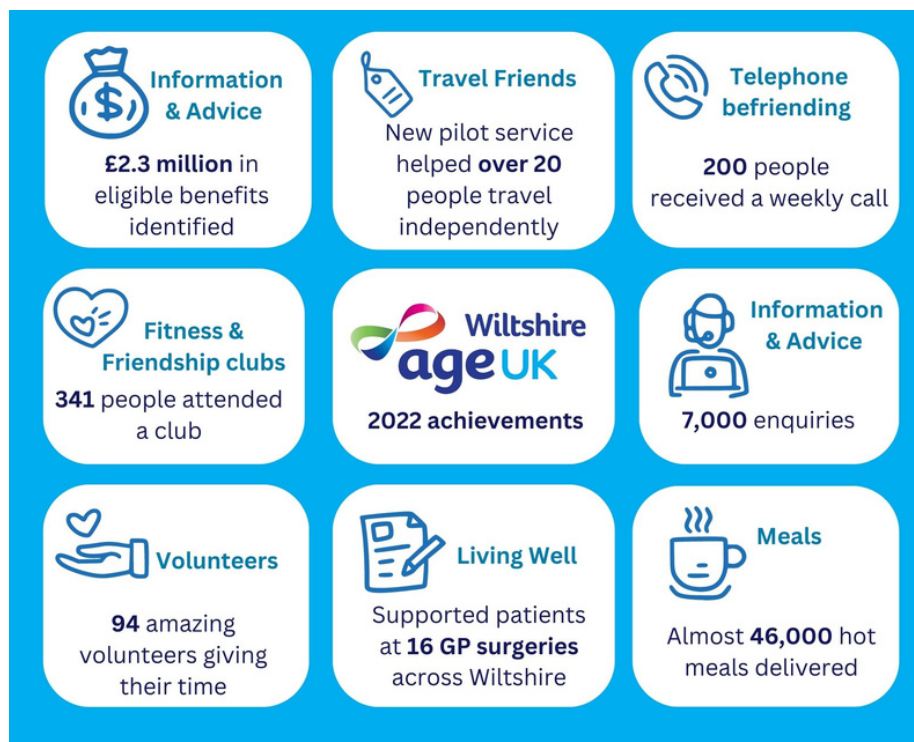

Age UK Southampton Merger

We are excited to confirm that Age UK Wiltshire and Age UK Southampton have joined forces to continue to offer much needed support to older people in their local areas!

Our organisations have a long history of providing vital services and support to older people to help improve their quality of later life. By combining our resources and expertise, we believe we can have an even greater impact on the lives of our clients. This expansion enables a strengthened service provision, shared learning, and the potential to develop new and important services, identified by older people within their local communities. The collaboration will ensure that the rising demand for frontline services and support will be met, not only in the Wiltshire and Swindon area but across the Southampton area.

We are committed to ensuring a smooth transition and to keeping all stakeholders informed throughout the process. We believe this merger will create new opportunities for growth and collaboration, and we are excited to embark on this new chapter together.

The Merger took place on the 1st April 2023 and our gratitude goes to all our supporters, volunteers, and staff who have helped make this merger possible. We look forward to continuing to work together to make a positive impact in the lives of older adults.

Our future development plans for this year

We have ambitious plans to open **three charity retail shops**, which will become hubs across Wiltshire! We're working in partnership with another charity to use their expertise as consultants to help us build a sustainable model.

The Information & Advice service is busy helping many older people combat the cost of living with grants, advice, and benefits information, including making Surviving Winter grants. We're looking at how we can develop new I&A services across Wiltshire and Swindon, including more face-to-face information and advice.

"I couldn't have done this without you, I felt so dejected when the lady said I wasn't entitled and I'm glad you helped me see that I was. Thanks for helping with the phone call, it felt so reassuring."

The Meals+ Service is currently expanding and building on routes in Melksham, Corsham, and Chippenham. Having provided a nutritious meals service to clients in Wiltshire and Swindon, including some routes in Bath & North East Somerset for many years, we are now expanding into the South Cotswolds as a natural next step in the growth of the service.

We have also been working hard to help the NHS by providing meals for those coming home from hospital, as part of their discharge plans.

"We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for all the assistance that you have given us. It has allowed our dad to stay in his home for a great deal longer than we thought, which was his wish. Your staff have kept his spirits up and I know he has really enjoyed having a visitor each lunch time."

We started a pilot **Travel Friends service** last year which has been a great success. Volunteers have worked 1:1 with older people who needed more confidence to travel independently and have been able to support them on their journeys to shops, appointments, visiting groups and getting out and about.

We hope the pilot has shown the value of such a service and are excited about future possibilities!

"What a wonderful service. The volunteer who helped me was just great and so very helpful. I am now confident to travel on my own."

We're now working with Melksham Town Council and Melksham Without Parish Council, and are leading the Melksham Community Support service, who have a number of volunteers and are already supporting a group of older people.

We have recruited a new Melksham Community Support Senior Project Worker and can't wait to see what we can do in this area!

Last year, our **Big Knit** campaign was incredibly successful and our knitting warriors knitted an amazing 40,000 hats! We hit our target and were given £10,000 from Innocent Smoothies. We will be running another campaign this year, and will be updating our social media channels with more information soon.

Invaluable Volunteers!

Foreword from the PCC Philip Wilkinson

Welcome to my Quarterly Performance newsletter from March to May 2023 where I'll be highlighting some of the projects, initiatives and policing performance that have been delivered over the past few months.

It's been a highly productive quarter as we've seen Wiltshire Police exceed the Government uplift target, the Youth Commission presented their findings from the last two years at the Big Conversation Conference and building work started at the Tidworth site.

During this quarter I have attended a total of 12 public engagements, including Area

Boards and public meetings and appeared in the media 315 times via online, print and broadcast platforms.

All of these highlights have been delivered in line with the priorities set out within my Police and Crime Plan which you helped to shape with your valuable input and engagement during my Use Your Voice consultation.

PRIORITY 1: A police service that meets the needs of the community

Includes increasing public confidence, trust and our policing engagement with communities, providing a quality of police service to all our communities and giving the Police the right tools for the job.



QUARTERLY UPDATES

- Wiltshire Police exceeded the Government uplift target with 1,196 FTE Police Officers against the 1,189 target as of 31 March 2023.
- Work at the Tidworth police building site has started and is expected to be finished in Q4.
- The new Chief Constable commenced fortnightly updates to the PCC which are published online.
- The Force has published Plans on a Page for 2023-2024 which details a range of plans to ensure delivery of the Police and Crime Plan through increased leadership scrutiny, accountability, and performance management.
- Wiltshire remains the lowest force nationally for crimes per 1,000 population at 58.61 v UK average of 72.20.

The average time taken to answer 999 calls in March was 10 seconds



- Average immediate response times remain stable at 12:26 for March and the response rate for February is reporting at 81.8%.
- The OPCC and the Force commissioned a review of Human Resources. A HR Director has been appointed on a 12-month contract.

PRIORITY 2: Reduce violence and serious harm

Includes reducing violence and domestic abuse, such as violence against women and girls, child abuse and child exploitation, county lines and serious organised crime and exploitation.



QUARTERLY UPDATES



140 businesses have signed up to the Safety at Night charter

- Following the launch of the 'Safety at Night' charter public transport links have been forged with 16 taxi firms joining.
- The OPCC has appointed a Serious Violence Coordinator who will work with the force and Community Safety Partnerships to deliver the requirements of the Serious Violence Duty and support implementation to reduce violence in Wiltshire.
- The Starting Point Mentoring Pilot, commissioned jointly with Swindon Borough Council, has supported a total of 26 children at risk of engaging in the criminal justice system or being exploited. These include young people attending EOTAS (Education Other Than at School).
- The OPCC have worked with partners to develop an intervention called the 'The Blunt Truth' running alongside Op Sceptre, a national initiative tackling knife crime. The Blunt truth is delivered in schools and supports knife crime education.
- The OPCC is aligned to Op Soteria and a further survey has been rolled out to victims of rape and serious sexual offences.
- Mobilisation of the Victims Voice Project which is aligned to the victim satisfaction survey. This will deliver surveys to a wider range of victims and the results will help drive improvements in policing for future victims.
- The OPCC mobilised a co commissioned Domestic Abuse perpetrator programme, allowing Integrated Offender Management to monitor 64 high risk offenders in the community and custody.
- Volume of RASSO is reporting a year-on-year increase of 2.7% to March, but an exceptional low volume at the beginning of 2021 is contributing to the increase. Wiltshire did experience a 2.7% overall increase in offences being recorded between 2020 and 2021.

PRIORITY 3: Tackle crimes that matter to local communities

Includes anti-social behaviour, road safety, rural and heritage crime, fraud, cyber crime and hate crime.



QUARTERLY UPDATES

- PL Kicks have successfully delivered 160 hours of sessions to children within Swindon during the 22-23 programme. PL Kicks will continue in 2023-24 delivering a further 160 hours, including providing opportunities for children working with Swindon Youth Justice Service.
- The Wiltshire and Swindon Youth Commission (WSYC) presented their year 2 findings at the 'Big conversation Conference' in March in respect of policing and community safety. WSYC identified 5 priority areas along with recommendations for the PCC and Partner agencies to consider in the year ahead.
- The fourth Operation Scorpion was occurred; a national campaign set to cause major disruptions to drug dealers

and targeting those that would exploit young people across Wiltshire.

A total of **14 arrests** were made with cocaine worth **£9,150**, cannabis worth **£1,150**, cash to the value of **£1,500** and **10 vehicles** seized

- The community remedy document has been updated and made available on the OPCC website.

- The Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) Toolkit for the public has now been published on the Wiltshire Safeguarding Vulnerable People Partnership (SVPP) website. Swindon are due to localise this and replicate on the Swindon Borough Council website.
- ASB volumes are following seasonally anticipated trend of summer highs and winter lows. The last 2 months to March have seen an upturn in monthly volumes in line with Spring/Summer increase. Volumes however remain lower than previous years.
- Long term arrest volumes for drug driving are stable. January and February recorded a two-month exceptional high, 52 and 58 consecutively however March was recording back to normal figures at 28.

PRIORITY 4: Improve the experience of victims and deliver justice

Includes victim care and support, mental health, the criminal justice system, restorative Wiltshire and reducing re-offending.



QUARTERLY UPDATES

- OPCC funded Swindon Youth Justice Services received an Outstanding rating following the 2023 HM Inspectorate of Probation visit. The inspectors highlighted the services organisational governance, leadership, staff and partnerships alongside Court disposals for excellence.
- Resilience has been built within the Wiltshire Police Legal services following the recruitment of a para legal with civil preventative orders expertise to assist in VAWG policing.
- The OPCC have worked with partners to mobilise the new alcohol and substance misuse and Mental Health Treatment Requirement (MHTR) services.
- A refreshed local female offender strategy and delivery plan has been produced. The OPCC has developed the Ministry of Justice tactical tool kit which will now sit within the National Police Chief's Council board and Association of Police and Crime Commissioner female offender working group.
- The OPCC are supporting both Wiltshire Council and Swindon Borough Council with their new individual substance misuse service tenders and will continue to co-commission from April 2023.



The average number of days from **arrival to case completion** at the Crown Court is at **181 days**, 17 days down from the previous quarter. The national average sits at 250 days.

PCCs across the South West launch new rural crime survey

Police and Crime Commissioners across the South West have come together to launch a survey to explore how crime is affecting rural communities.

Wiltshire Police and Crime Commissioner, Philip Wilkinson and his counterparts in Dorset, Devon and Cornwall, Avon and Somerset and Gloucestershire are hoping the survey will help them to understand how their county's rural communities are affected by crime.

Mr Wilkinson said: "In an agricultural county like Wiltshire, it's so important to keep on top of how Wiltshire Police are responding to and dealing with all forms of rural crime. A lot of work has gone into improving this as a police force and I included it in the priorities set out in my Police and Crime Plan.

"I'm keen to understand what improvements have been made since the National Rural Crime Network ran a similar survey in 2018, and what we still need to put more resource into. By taking a couple of minutes out of your day to complete this survey you will be helping me to understand how I can continue to make Wiltshire safer."

In Wiltshire, the Rural Crime Team cover all heritage and wildlife crime including theft of livestock and machinery, fly tipping, poaching and hare coursing to name a few.

The survey asks rural residents if they have been the victim of any crimes in the last 12 months as well as asking what rural crimes concern them the most.

Chairman's Announcement - Wiltshire Local Plan Review

At its meeting on Tuesday 11 July, Cabinet will consider the review of the Wiltshire Local Plan, as this important document approaches the final stages towards adoption. [The papers for this meeting can be found here.](#)

The Plan will set out the vision and framework for housing, infrastructure and land for employment growth for the next 15 years, until 2038. Once adopted, all planning applications will be determined against the Plan, making it the most important place-shaping document for Wiltshire.

It also identifies sites for development throughout the county, as the council looks to plan for 36,740 homes (of which over 20,500 homes have already been built or are committed) and will look to allocate 115 hectares for employment sites.

The Plan must be positive and address the need for new homes, jobs and infrastructure, and also provide ways to protect the environment and the environmental impact on communities, while helping to deliver the council's ambitions to be carbon neutral by 2030, and for Wiltshire to have a smaller carbon footprint. It must also align with the Government's National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF).

If the Plan passes through Cabinet, it will then go to Full Council 18 July before a final public consultation in the autumn. Once the public consultation is complete and all comments have been considered, the Plan will be examined by an independent Planning Inspector before it is adopted.

We will have more details on the public consultation stage in the coming weeks.

Operations Conducted in 2023

OP Exit (Monthly) – A joint operation between Wiltshire Police Licence representatives and Local Neighbourhood Policing teams. Together we are engaging with licensed premises to support and assist owners, managers, staff and members of the public in maintaining a safe environment and the prevention and detection of Crime.



Op Sceptre (May 23) A national initiative to tackle knife crime through a period of intensified action.

Across two weeks, Wiltshire Police coordinated activity which targets knife crime from the root cause right through to enforcement.

Whether it's engaging with local communities, working with young people to dispel myths around knives or carrying out test purchases with retailers – Op Sceptre showcases the many varied and impactful ways in which Wiltshire Police is working to reduce knife crime and tackle violence.

This iteration of Op Sceptre will run for two weeks across Wiltshire, and featured a knife surrender campaign to encourage the public, particularly young people, to hand in any knives they had in surrender bins across the county.

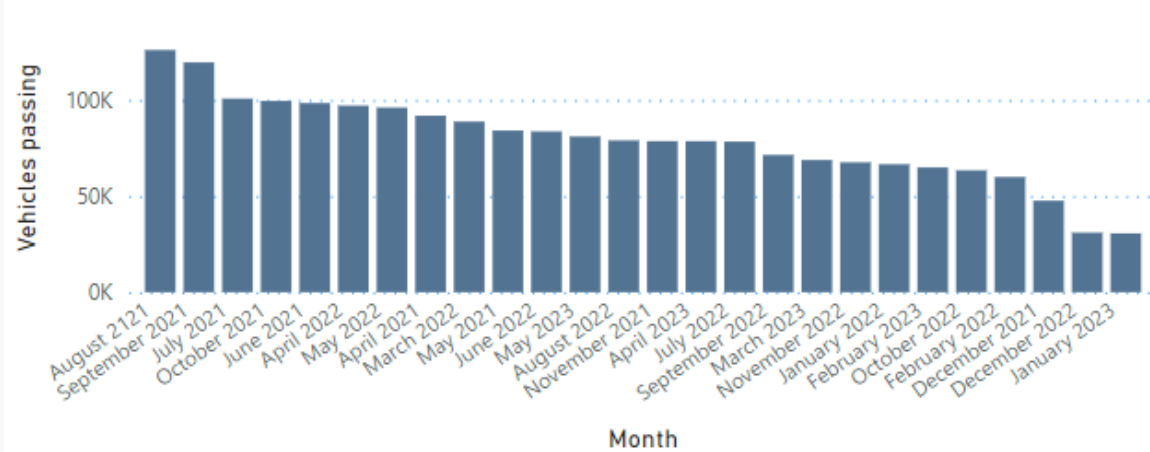

Colerne Parish Council update for Corsham Area Board. July 20th 2023

1. **Recreation ground** - the council has seen completion of upgrade work on the pavilion. There has been some major clearing of historic debris around the skate board, paid for by the PC and this has created more space for recreation and play. To celebrate the Coronation there was a parish drone photo taken on the ground and a Coronation theme for the Annual May Fair.
2. **Highways** - the request for work to be done around the C151 junction with the Fosseyway and Bath Road has happened. The safety signage has been installed. The PC is currently seeking funding from Corsham Local Highway and Footway Improvement Group to improve pedestrian road safety.
3. **Section106 funding.** - The PC is currently seeking its outstanding S106 funding for use towards the cost of modern LED flood lighting for the Colerne Rugby Ground. The use of this fund was agreed some time ago but it is proving difficult to access.
4. **Climate strategy and biodiversity Working Group** - this group continues to work at implementing the parish Climate Strategy Plan and implementing the environmental and biodiversity policies of the Neighbourhood Plan. Work in co-operation with the Cotswold Voluntary Wardens has commenced installing accessible gates to Rights of Way that connect with areas of housing, as part of making the countryside more accessible to all. This is jointly funded by the PC and the Corsham Area Board. It includes improving access to our community woodland (Frank's Wood). Alongside this, in partnership with the volunteers of Wild Colerne, a local charity, work is proceeding to establish managed areas of greater biodiversity along verges in the Thickwood area, and around Watergates Common and within Franks Wood. It is hoped to restore some verges to "Protected Verge" status.
5. **Big Green Weekend** event occurred during June, focusing on a Home Energy Saving Day, and a Nature Day. This is now an annual event hoping to keep nudging the importance of responding to the impact of climate change by changes to how we live and interact with our environment. The Parish Council is encouraging residents to engage with the further Solar Together venture and is exploring ways to support residents in understanding ways in which they can engage in simple and more complex home energy saving solutions.
5. **The Colerne Neighbourhood Plan** - is proving robust in the clear guidance it gives the council, the Local Authority and potential developers regarding planning applications. It is currently having to hold up against a planning appeal which is yet to be resolved. It is also forming a core to early discussions with the Defence Infrastructure Organisation concerning future disposal of the two MOD sites at Colerne.

Headlines/Key successes

- The Town Council's Taste of Corsham food festival took place on Saturday 17 June, with stalls offering the best local food and drink; live music on the stage at Digital Mansion Corsham, and fun activities for children. The feedback was excellent, with many stallholders selling out of stock and expressing their appreciation for the great day they had enjoyed in the town.

- On 10 July, the pedestrian area of the town centre travelled back in time to the 1980s as it featured in filming for a new Disney+ series based around Jilly Cooper's 'Rivals'. There were some parking restrictions in place, and cars and pedestrians were asked to wait while scenes took place. Filming for the series, which could be on air this autumn, but more likely in the spring of 2024, has also taken place at Neston Estate and in Tetbury. Happy Prince, the production company behind the series, at the request of the Town Council, will be making a donation to local charities as a thank you for Corsham's help and support with the project.

- The Town Council was, as always, very happy to support the volunteers who put together another excellent Corsham Walking Festival (9-11 June). This year's Festival was, yet again, a great success, seeing over 200 walkers enjoying the various themed walks, and bringing people from as far away as Whitehaven, Ipswich and London to the town.

- Cllr Helen Belcher OBE has chosen Corsham Churches Foodbank as her Chair's charity for 2023/24.

Projects

- The Town Council's new retail map is now available. Featuring a design by local artist Susie Brooks – who also created the 'Corsham Map' – the retail map shows the town centre's shops and businesses, with a key listing them all. Large-scale versions of the map will be in the town centre noticeboards, once they have been refurbished, and copies have been delivered to various retailers, all of whom are delighted by the project. In the slightly longer term, an interactive version of the map will be available on both the Town Council's website, and the Visit Corsham site.

- Ahead of the summer and an increase in visitors, the Town Council is working on a revised version of its popular Walking Map. A new Public Art Trail leaflet will also be available in the next few weeks.

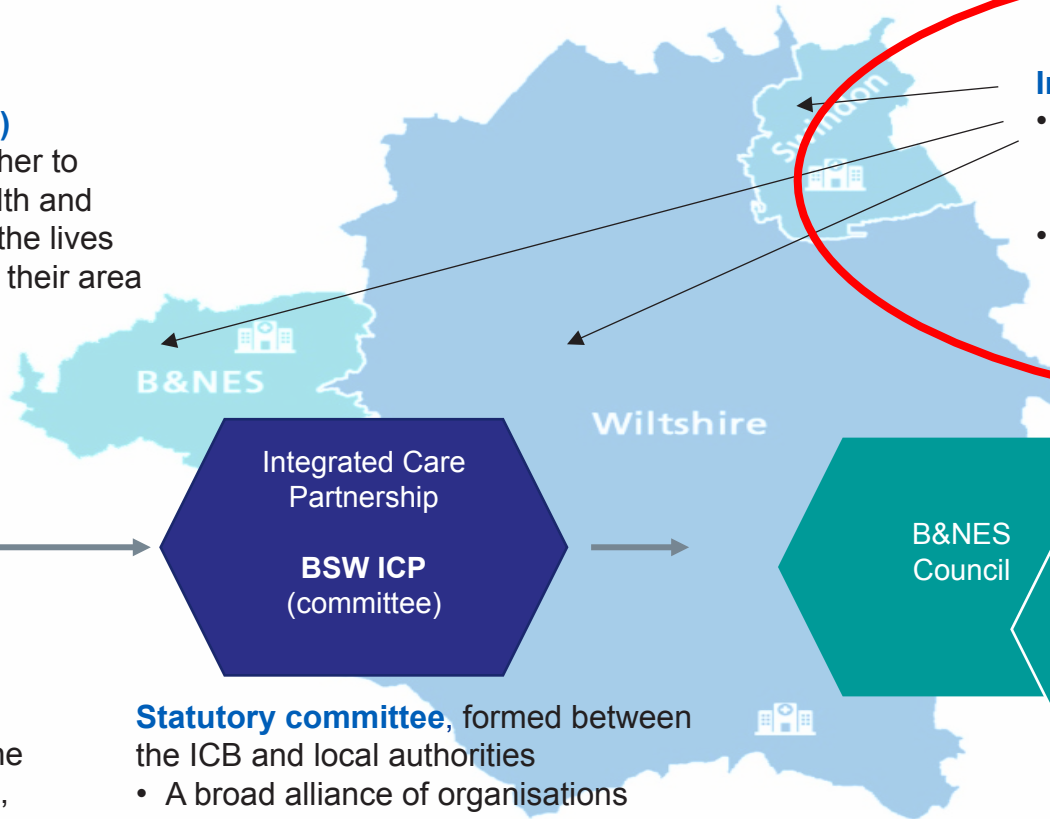

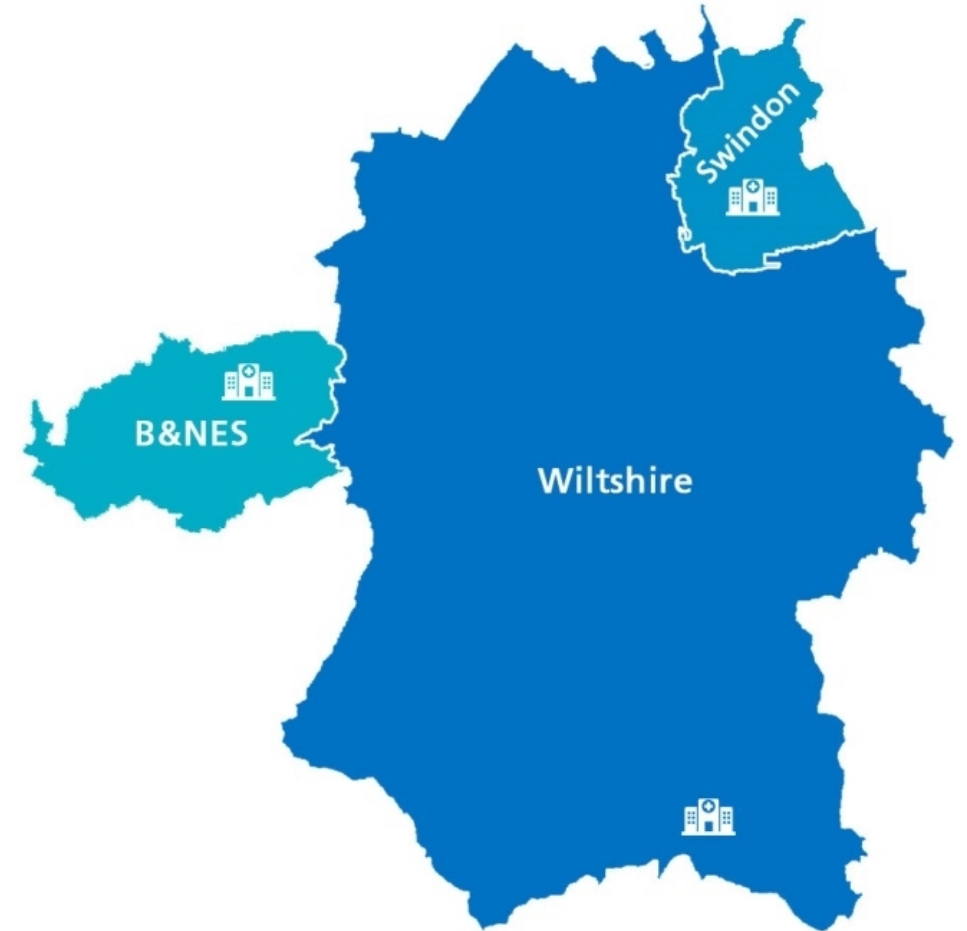

Role of ICAs in BSW

Our ICAs have a key role in enabling the ICS in delivering its strategic aims including supporting broader social and economic development. Our Places are where partners come together (in service of and as part of the System) to work collaboratively for the benefit of local communities. Our ICAs are responsible for leading the design and deliver of local health delivery at neighbourhood, and community level

The following features of Place define their contribution to the *BSW System*

- Closeness to local populations: relationships, democratic mandate, knowing the population
- Geographies in which health and local authority partners align best
- Population sizes that can support locally based service models

These features enable:

- Joint decision making between Place Partners
- A strengthened relationship with local communities
- Integration of community based services across organisational boundaries
- Tapping into and empowering local assets including the voluntary, faith and community sectors
- Opportunities for reducing duplication, inefficiencies, and unwarranted variation
- Meaningful population health management footprints offering the potential for improving equity of access and reducing inequalities in health and care outcomes



Wiltshire ICA Joint Local Health and Wellbeing Strategy Actions

- Provide integrated services at key stages in a person's life – including later life planning, end of life care, and increasing the provision of personal budgets and coproduction of services.
- Boost 'out-of-hospital' care, dissolving the divide between primary and community health services - through community multi-disciplinary teams, clustering services around primary care networks, and guaranteeing support to people in care homes.

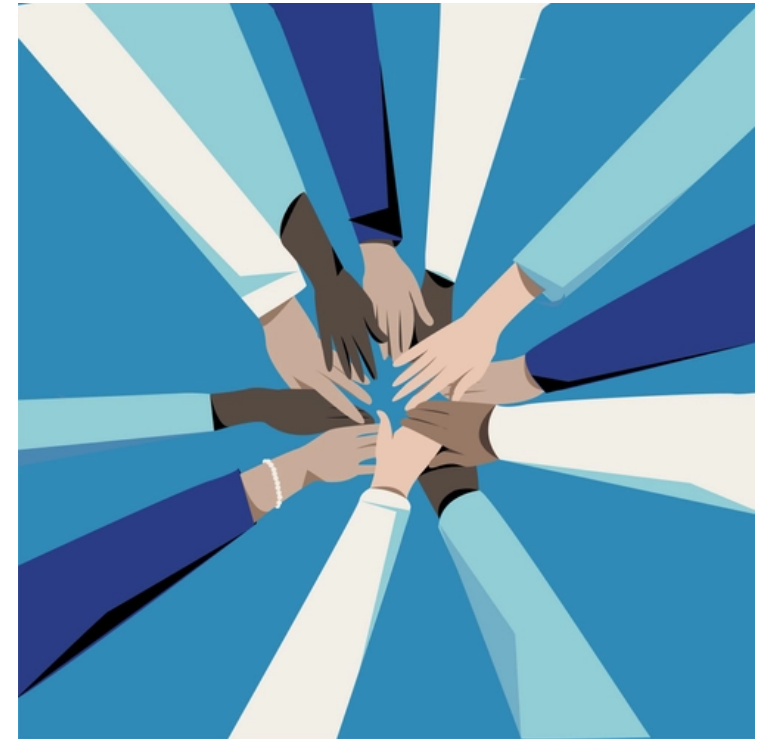

Neighbourhood Collaboratives Programme

- Co-developed by Wiltshire Alliance Partners, the Neighbourhood Collaboratives Programme aims to support neighbourhoods to establish collaborative groups who will work to improve health and wellbeing outcomes
- The Alliance will offer support to develop connections between organisations, community groups and services, with the aim of building stronger relationships with communities
- Collaboratives will connect with each other to learn, develop, and succeed through the Wiltshire Collaborative, which will bring neighbourhood groups together





New state-of-the-art health centre

- New facility in Devizes, made possible following an £11 million investment from the NHS, is one of the South West's first integrated care centres
- GP appointments, along with other health services, such as outpatient clinics, community care and mental health support, can be provided under one roof
- Also leading the field in sustainable design as one of the NHS' first net zero buildings





Virtual Wards

- People living in BSW are able to receive acute clinical care at home through the NHS@Home Virtual Wards service
- Within Wiltshire there are Consultant & Advanced Clinical Practitioners with healthcare professionals specialising in community Frailty & long-term conditions
- This is a joint initiative provided across BSW by local health and care organisations
- It supports suitable patients to receive a high level of care, assessment, monitoring and treatment at home or their normal place of residence, similar to being an inpatient in a hospital ward.

Community Health Services 2 hour rapid response and reablement care



- Health and social care partners across BSW are working in collaboration to provide urgent care to people at home
- Within Wiltshire the service provides care to adults over the age of 18 experiencing a sudden deterioration in health and wellbeing who without urgent response are likely to result in a hospital admission
- It delivers a crisis response within two hours of referral and reablement care within two days of referral
- The service offers support for catheter problems, end of life support, wound care, carer breakdown, equipment provision, decompensation of frailty, diabetes, falls and delirium
- The services in Wiltshire work closely with other organisations including acute hospitals, out of hours services, adult social care and SWAST



Care Coordination Centre

- Partners across BSW working together to coordinate care across the entire system
- This project is helping to ease pressures on our ambulance service and Accident and Emergency departments and help patients and ambulance staff avoid long unnecessary waits
- Innovative, holistic and data-led approach to improving the flow of patients through the BSW system





Mental Health, Learning Disabilities & Autism

- Within Wiltshire we have seen a 60% reduction in the number of adults with a learning disability and/or autism admitted as an inpatient in a mental health ward
- This is supported by the continued alignment to the national policy for Dynamic Support Registers and Care Education Treatment Reviews - our 'prevention mechanisms' in Learning Disabilities & Autism to support admission avoidance
- Within Wiltshire Learning Disabilities Annual Health Checks were completed for 76.4% of our population (23/34 target of 75%) – more for us to do!
- Wiltshire Mental Health Workshop held with our ICA stakeholders – this will support our BSW Mental Health Strategy, and importantly identify what our local priorities should be

Recruitment outreach to India

- New recruitment initiative to attract nurses from India to come and work in health and care roles in BSW
- Integration course launched in both Kerala in South India and Mumbai to help increase local nurses' knowledge of nursing in the UK
- Working with partners in India to establish career coaches in universities and teaching hospitals to help create long lasting links and positive relationships
- 60+ nurses recruited to take part in the course





Publication of Green Plan
