7. Area Board End of Year Report and Outside Bodies

Part I – Looking Back

The Area Board received a presentation from Caroline LeQuesne, Area Board Delivery Officer on the Area Board End of Year Report. The presentation included the following points:

Improving outcomes and positive activities for Young people – Cllr Andrew Davis

Cllr Davis updated that the Local Youth Network (LYN) had been re-established and had had its first meeting recently with partners, which had been kindly accommodated by Wiltshire Police. Gratitude was placed to the partners in the room who had supported some of the work taking place. An overview of some of the work which had taken place was provided both in the town and rural villages, including but not limited to detached youth work and pop-up events.

Health and Wellbeing – No councillor appointed.

Gratitude was placed towards David Reeves for his running of the Health and Wellbeing Forum, which acted as an incredible opportunity for networking. David Reeves provided an update on the success that 650 Health and Wellbeing booklets had been produced and received well. Reference was also drawn to the success of the Health and Wellbeing Fair, which David outlined that there were plans to hold another event. In addition, a digital inclusion event had successfully taken place involving 7 organisations, which showed people how to get online, be safe as well as how to recycle old devices.

o Environment, Biodiversity, and sustainability – Cllr Tony Jackson It was outlined that an Eco watch event had taken place, which included a film and a speech from a brave, young local resident. Reference was also drawn to grants which had been provided to such places as Grovelands and the Orchard. Cllr Jackson placed gratitude towards Caroline LeQuesne's efforts and support.

Transport and Access – Cllr Bill Parks

The LHFIG had supported 10 projects, spending £35,275, including providing support for over 70 signage and access projects which aimed to combine rights of way to give continuous links around Warminster. Cllr Parks thanked Nigel Linge and the Salisbury Plain Rights of Way Volunteer Group for their hard work to open up bridleways and footpaths with it noted how beneficial the work had been.

Part II – Looking Forward

Liam Cripps, Strategic Engagement Partnerships Manager (SEPM) provided a summary of the Community Survey/CAJSNA Data:

- It was outlined that the Area Board was more than just four business meetings a year, with a lot of work done by volunteers and community organisations to create an empowered community.
- There had been 84 responses to the survey (3.1% of the population), with the demographic of respondents split across age groups.
- The following 4 priorities were identified by respondents:
 Health:
 - Almost 50% of respondents had chosen this as their first choice.
 - The top 5 health issues in order were mental health support, support for "living longer better", support for keeping physically active, care for those living with dementia, tackling levels of obesity.
 - CAJSNA data was provided to support this, including that Warminster had the 2nd highest level of adult diabetes in Wiltshire and the joint highest percentage of patients living with dementia.

Environment:

- o 15% of respondents chose this as their first choice.
- The top 5 environment issues in order were addressing flooding, improving the quality of landscapes, tackling fly tipping, support for increase in biodiversity and supporting public transport services.
- CAJSNA data was provided to support this, including that there had been 134 reports of fly-tipping in Warminster and that some of the community area was in flood zone 3.

Cost of Living:

- 11% of respondents chose this as their first choice.
- The top 5 cost of living issues in order were support for housing/rent affordability, support for households on low incomes, support for children living in low-income families, fuel poverty and debt, support for foodbanks.
- CAJSNA data was provided to support this, including that Warminster was higher than the Wiltshire average for Children living in relative low-income families.

Children and Young People:

- o 6% of residents chose this as their first choice.
- The top 5 children and young people issues in order were improving positive activities for young people, SEND, young people's mental health, improving health and obesity, improving school attainment.
- CAJSNA data was provided to support this, including that Warminster was higher than the Wiltshire average of 10-11 years old classified as overweight.

9. Wiltshire Police Chief Constable

Wiltshire Police

The Area Board noted written updates attached to the agenda. In addition, Inspector Louise Oakley provided a verbal update which covered the following points:

- An overview of the current neighbourhood policing team was provided as well as the areas that they cover.
- Reference was drawn to the Neighbourhood Policing Pillars, which were outlined as being engaging communities, solving problems, and targeting activity.

Inspector Oakley provided a breakdown of local priorities in Warminster which included the following points:

- A question had been raised at the last Area Board regarding knife crime statistics, therefore Inspector Oakley had gone away to confirm that the data provided at the last Area Board was out of data and was from 2018, therefore meaning that Warminster did not currently have a knife problem. Further detail was provided that most knife crime reports related to domestic incidents and that Warminster was the lowest in the county for knife crime.
- It was outlined that shoplifting had seen an increase; however, CCTV had enabled the police to catch 5 people, with work being conducted with businesses, including Shopwatch meetings and prevention work to reassure shop managers.
- A lot of partnership work with other agencies had taken place in relation to youth anti-social behaviour crime. In addition, a youth worker who had received Area Board funding was patrolling the streets and speaking to youths. Additionally, 4 youths had been referred to the Focus Deterrent Group for their input and support.
- Burglaries had seen an increase in January but had since decreased.
 The only issue recently had been shed breaks in Warminster, therefore the police had increased patrols at the allotments.

The Area Board received an update from Wiltshire Police Chief Constable, Catherine Roper. The update covered the following matters:

- There are three operational policies for Wiltshire Police which are safer public spaces, tackling violence and tackling burglaries. This has led to greater visibility from the Police, with the force held to greater account, which has led to crime rates decreasing. For example, the positive outcome rate for burglaries had been tripled as well as violence decreasing.
- It was outlined that in the summer of 2022, Wiltshire Police had been placed into "Engage" by the independent auditor after it had not provided a satisfactory service. Since then, the force had recently been taken out of "Engage", which demonstrated that it is making process with investigations, protecting the vulnerable and responding to crime.
- In the last 14 months, the Chief Constable had reorganised front line policing, with the re-establishment of Neighbourhood Policing Teams, who would not be reinstructed to other roles.
- The police were now focusing on detective assets and focusing on the vulnerable, with it noted that though domestic violence is decreasing, there is concern that this isn't a true reflection therefore the force is working to provide safe spaces for people to come forward and talk.
- A new strategy had been launched two weeks ago, which shows what the Police have committed to publicly deliver over the next three years. This was in conjunction with all senior officers being required to produce a plan on a page for their workstreams so that they could be held to account.
- Wiltshire Police had recently been inspected again by the internal auditor and the Chief Constable would publicly provide an update following this, with it stressed that there has been a real focus on trying to open the doors of Wiltshire Police to providing information to the public.

After the update, there was time for the following questions and points to be made:

- It was questioned whether anything was being done to stop aggressive driving and speeding in towns, to which Inspector Oakley provided an example of how the local policing team and response team had worked together to arrest an individual and charge them with dangerous driving. The Chief Constable also drew reference to the road policing team and Project Zero, which had taken place across the county, for example last time in Warminster in May, 37 offences had been recorded. The team planned to return to Warminster within the next three weeks.
- Gratitude was placed for the increased police presence in the local villages.
- Clarity was sought regarding the rural crime team, to which it was stated that there is a dedicated rural crime team, which looks at rural crime across the county. Currently work is taking place to consider indicators of

organised crime so that the team can be deployed better to hold people to account. A rural crime conference was set to take place in Tidworth next week, which would explain the future focus of the team. It was also noted that in terms of the strategy, rural crime was important as it sat under safer public spaces.

- Assurance was sought regarding the consistency of the neighbourhood policing team, to which it was outlined that apart from promotions and circumstances outside of the team's control, the team was now up to compliment and should not experience any further changes.
- It was suggested that it would be positive for the Warminster Business Network to link up with the Police and Shopwatch to help reporting and enforcement.
- The Chief Constable was thanked for personally attending the newly opened CCTV facility in Warminster, to whom she showed gratitude for their work as volunteers, as well as how vital intelligence sharing was to reducing crime.
- Congratulations were placed to towards the Chief Constable for Wiltshire being the quickest time for a constabulary to be taken out of "Engage".

10. Updates from Partners

Updates were received from the following partners:

• Warminster Garrison

The Area Board received a verbal update from Welfare Officer Jason Broad, which covered the following points:

- The scope of the Warminster Garrison was outlined, including that the Garrison was set to receive 289 families of 2 Royal Yorkshire Regiments in August 2024.
- The culture of the Garrison was outlined.
- The Warminster Garrison Environmental and Conservation Working Group was outlined including their work and involved parties.
- The Garrison had trained circa 4,000 Ukrainian soldiers.
- An overview of community support and events completed by the Garrison was provided.
- It was outlined how the Garrison had been involved in the Spring in the Park event on 5 May, including the provision of an obstacle course.
- The Garrison was set to hold a Health, Sport and Wellbeing Fair on 21 August 2024, which would be free to attend.

After the verbal update, there was time for the following questions and points to be made, including that the Garrison would provide flyers to Councillors which could then be distributed to parishes.

Warminster Health and Wellbeing Forum

The Area Board noted the written update attached to the agenda. The Area Board received a verbal update from David Reeves which covered the following points:

- The Boots pharmacy Avenue Branch closed in October, after work had been done to keep the pharmacy open, which had unfortunately been unsuccessful.
- David had attended the Wiltshire Council meeting of the Health and Wellbeing Board last week with the aim of getting them to change the Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment to reflect the fact that Warminster could not cope with having only two pharmacies.
- It was outlined the Boots pharmacy Avenue Branch had prescribed the most prescriptions in Warminster.
- A response had been provided which was simply a statement that the Boots pharmacy Avenue Branch would close.
- David made a plea to the Area Board to consider putting their weight behind changing the requirement to allow market entry applications to take place.
- Currently there was one application with the Integrated Care Board (ICB) however it was unknown if this would be successful.

After the verbal update, there was time for the following questions and points to be made:

- The Chairman stated that four members of Area Board sat on the Western Area Planning Committee so could therefore have an influence on applications.
- Online prescription delivery was discussed with it suggested that most repeat prescriptions were able to be delivered online, however new prescriptions would need to be set up in person via appointment.
- Attention was drawn to the Volunteer Fair which was set to take place in the Civic Centre on 1 June 2024.

Action: The Area Board moved a motion which agreed to write to the Integrated Care Board to express that they were concerned about the provision of pharmacies in Warminster.

Town and Parish Council Nominated Representative

The Area Board noted a written update Warminster Town Council which was attached to the agenda.

Cllr Sue Fraser provided a verbal update including:

- Planning for the 100-year anniversary event in the park was taking place with free tickets set to be made available soon.
- The first quarterly market took place on 24 March in the Civic Centre with the next set to take place on 29 June.
- o A 99-year lease for the community hub had been agreed as part of a

community asset transfer.

The Area Board received the following verbal update from Cllr Neil Carpenter on behalf of Corsley Parish Council. The update covered that there would be a beacon lit on Cley Hill on 6 June to commemorate the D-Day landings.

BSW Together (Integrated Care System)

The Area Board noted a written update attached to the agenda.

Healthwatch Wiltshire

The Area Board noted a written update attached to the agenda.

Community First

The Area Board noted a written update attached to the agenda.

11. Wiltshire and Swindon Road Safety Partnership

The Area Board received an update from Wiltshire and Swindon Road Safety Partnership Manager, Perry Payne. The update covered the following matters:

- It was outlined that road safety is not the remit of one organisation, therefore the Wiltshire and Swindon Road Safety Partnership allows organisations to work together.
- The organisations of the Partnership were outlined.
- The three main workstreams of the Partnership were identified as Engineering, Education and Enforcement.
- Currently education has a focus on the #Fatal5, which it was explained are the 5 main contributors to road traffic collisions.
- The education provisions of Wiltshire Council and Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service were outlined.
- Gratitude was placed towards the work of Community Speedwatch teams, with it stressed that these people were volunteers making a significant contribution.
- Community Speedwatch data was provided for Warminster from July 2020 to May 2024, with it noted that 882 watches had been carried out with 4,432 letters sent.
- Additionally, 36 traffic survey speed assessments had taken place with 7 areas needing Community Speedwatch action and one requiring police action.
- The enforcement aspect of the Partnership was outlined, including the role of Community Speed Enforcement Officers who between 1 January 2023 and 8 May 2024 had been active in 851 locations, issued 10,667 speed awareness courses, 1,450 fines/points and 144 individuals referred to court.
- The work of the Road Policing Unit was outlined, including Operation Tramline.

 An emerging trend had been identified of an increase in pedestrians distracted by mobile phones and stepping out into roads.

After the update, there was time for the following questions and points to be made:

- Gratitude was placed to the impact of the work in villages.
- The issue of LGVs from Somerset quarries not sticking to freight routes and travelling through villages at excessive speeds and weights was discussed. Perry Payne suggested that the Local Member get in touch with him via email to follow up on the issue and then to arrange a meeting with all relevant parties to take the issue further. It was acknowledged by the Chief Constable that the enforcement of weight limits was a grey area, in addition Inspector Oakley stated that some work had taken place in relation to this, with the team speaking to companies and the traffic commissioner, however it seemed as though this had not been followed through so she would further investigate it. It was also outlined that enforcement of weight limits required specific training and the use of weight bridges, which the neighbourhood team did not have.
- It was outlined that there was set to be a meeting with the Director of Highways in Maiden Bradley to discuss freight issues.
- It was suggested that cyclists, scooters, and mobility scooters on pavements be added to the education element of the Partnership.
- It was agreed that statistics for the 33 speed enforcement locations for the Warminster Area would be attached to the minutes.

12. FACT Programme Update

The Chairman noted that the Area Board was due to receive a presentation from FACT Lead, Simon Thomas on the FACT Programme, however it had been requested that this agenda item be withdrawn. Simon had provided Democratic Services with the following update to be included within the minutes:



Careless or inconsiderate driving

The offence of driving without due care and attention (careless driving) is committed when your driving falls below the minimum standard expected of a competent and careful driver, and includes driving without reasonable consideration for other road users.

Some examples of careless or inconsiderate driving are:

- overtaking on the inside
- driving too close to another vehicle
- driving through a red light by mistake
- turning into the path of another vehicle
- flashing lights to force other drivers to give way
- misusing lanes to gain advantage over other drivers
- the driver being avoidably distracted by tuning the radio, lighting a cigarette etc
- •unnecessarily staying in an overtaking lane
- unnecessarily slow driving or braking
- dazzling other drivers with un-dipped headlights

It is an educational initiative, it doesn't result in speed awareness courses, fines, points on licenses or court appearances, but can influence separate future police enforcement activity.


Those identified as speeding by a Community Speed Watch will receive a letter – and can receive up to 3, each increasing in severity in terms of tone, but all purely advisory.


The tone of the 1st letter is set by the severity of the speeding.






Our Roads Policing Unit (RPU) in the last quarter, covering January to April issued over 2390 tickets to motorists, for numerous road related offences.

- Speech, language, and communication needs
- Substance use disorder
- Other factors impacting a child, adult, or family's ability to achieve positive outcomes (e.g., trauma, domestic abuse, exploitation)

The project seeks to collaborate with extended partners to better understand how and where to engage with the adult organisations you work with. By leveraging existing trusted relationships, the initiative aims to co-host and conduct consultations more effectively, ensuring the voices of these clients are included, valued, and acted upon. Community First offers MiDAS Minibus Driver Training, a nationally recognised standard for drivers of minibuses that offers training for members of staff and volunteers to drive minibuses to ensure they transport adults and children safely. MiDAS training offers the following benefits for your organisation:

- The Department of Education and Department for Transport highly recommend that all minibus drivers complete MiDAS training.
- Some insurance companies offer lower premiums on completion of this training.
- Drivers gain more valuable experience and feel more confident in driving minibuses and will become
 more competent and safer minibus drivers.

Community First is offering the new national MiDAS training programme. The theory module is now completed individually by drivers prior to undertaking a practical assessment. Upon application drivers will be allocated a 'learner pass' to access the Community Transport Association (CTA) learning portal.

Once this module has been completed one of our Driver Assessors will arrange to visit clients to complete a theory follow up followed by the driving assessment. On successful completion of both theory and practical, drivers will be able to log on the CTA portal to print off their personal MiDAS certificates.

Community First employs two highly qualified and experienced MiDAS trainers. Demand for training is high and will increase as we move towards the autumn and start of the new school year. Please book early to ensure your drivers are up to date with their training.



ICB updates for Wiltshire Area Board – August 2024

New primary care centre in Hindon

The ICB has approved the funding to enable a new primary care premises to be built in Hindon.

There are still several hurdles to cross before final confirmation that the scheme will be able to proceed including, such as the securing of planning permission.

The fact remains that this is positive news for both the GP partners and the residents of Hindon and the surrounding areas.

This scheme represents the first of several priority estates projects which the ICB is looking to secure certainty on as part of its wider Primary Care Estates Plan.

Further details on this will be shared by Gordon Muvuti, Executive Lead for Primary Care, the coming months.

Ongoing work to tackle inequalities in Wiltshire

Core20PLUS5 is a national NHS England approach to inform action to reduce healthcare inequalities at both national and system level.

The approach defines a target population – the 'Core20PLUS' – and identifies five focus clinical areas requiring accelerated improvement.

All ICBs are encouraged to have a focus on the most deprived 20 per cent of the national population (Core2) as identified by the national Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD).

ICBs can also choose additional population groups (PLUS) which experience poorer than average access, experience and/or outcomes.

PLUS populations have been identified for Bath and North East Somerset, Swindon and Wiltshire respectively, with the specific Wiltshire populations listed below:

- Routine and manual workers
- Gypsy, Roma and Traveler communities, including children
- Rural communities

In Wiltshire, there are several projects already under way which are helping to improve the health and wellbeing of people which make up the groups listed above.

These initiatives, such as tailored support for tobacco dependency, help with managing and reducing levels of obesity and dedicated clinics for proactive hypertension checks, are being led through a collaborative arrangement between colleagues at the ICB and counterparts at Wiltshire Council.

Pharmacy provision in Wiltshire

The Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment (PNA) for Wiltshire is due to be refreshed for September 2025.

The PNA maps current provision, assesses local need and identifies any gaps in provision.

It also is used as a key tool for identifying what is needed at a local level to support the commissioning intentions for pharmaceutical services and other services that could be delivered by community pharmacies and other providers.

Developing a PNA is a significant process, and the ICB has chosen to establish a steering group, made up of key partners, including Wiltshire Council, Healthwatch Wiltshire and Wessex Local Medical Committee, to help ensure its production fully represents the needs of the local communities, especially those that have called for more pharmaceutical services, such as Warminster.

A draft version of the PNA will be brought to the Wiltshire Health and Wellbeing Board ahead of its deadline of March 2025, with the finished article also due to go through the committee for sign off.

Bringing health and care services to Wiltshire's farming community

Through the accelerator vaccine programme and Health Inequalities Funding, the ICB has brought together more than 10 partners to pilot essential health and wellbeing services that are tailored specifically for those in the farming and rural community.

By engaging with farmers and listening to their experiences, the ICB has been able to gain a better understanding of the challenges they face when accessing health and care, such as not being able to attend GP appointments due to surgery car parks being unsuitable for tractors.

This unique insight spearheaded a unique initiative which has seen teams from multiple health and care organisations spend time at Salisbury livestock market to offer attendants a variety of on-the-spot services, such as health checks, including blood pressure and cholesterol monitoring, and mental health advice.

While teams at the market are not yet able to offer clinical interventions, it is hoped this kind of outreach work will continue to grow and develop in a way that ensures those from more isolated communities have the support they need to live healthy, happy lives.

Collaborative work to improve children's oral health in Wiltshire

The ICB and Wiltshire Public Health team have been working collaboratively on three priorities linked to oral health. These priorities can be seen below:

- Improve access of dental care services to the Wiltshire population, considering vulnerable populations who are at risk of poorer oral health outcomes and face barriers in access to dental care and treatment
- Increase the dental workforce within Wiltshire
- Improve oral health outcomes focused on Core20PLUS5 populations, including engagement, and further understanding population needs

In addition, there has been an allocation of £300,000 to fund oral health activities in Wiltshire for 2024/25.

This has been allocated from the dental care underspend, and the Public Health team and ICB are undertaking scoping work to plan how this funding can be used to deliver dental outreach services in Wiltshire for the most vulnerable populations.

Elsewhere, a number of oral health promotion programmes, which aims to prevent tooth decay and the subsequent need for dental treatment, have been under way across Wiltshire.

One such programme is First Dental Steps, which involves all health visitors receiving oral health champion training, and then using their new skills to provide families with expert advice and guidance.

The health visitors also give their families age appropriate oral hygiene packs, which contain toothpaste, a toothbrush and a sippy cup for children.

As part of the programme, children who meet a specific criteria, such as those whose siblings have undergone dental extraction, will have a direct referral to an NHS dentist.

Background

In early 2023, the Wiltshire Families and Children's Transformation (FACT) Partnership launched its Family Help project to enhance the local arrangements for the delivery of early intervention and prevention services for children, young people and families.

What do we mean by 'Family Help'?

Wiltshire's multi-agency Family Help arrangements enable children, young people and families to access the right help at the right time through a co-ordinated approach to prevention and early intervention through:

- a co-ordinated approach at a whole population/universal level to prevent needs from arising and to build resilience across all residents
- a robust multi-agency approach to identifying any additional needs at the earliest point and providing effective joined-up support that prevents the needs from escalating further

We use the term 'Family Help' to stress that the focus is on working with families and to avoid historical confusion associated with the term 'Early Help'.

Summer '24 Update

The project is now focussed on understanding the learning from the various strands of work and particularly the locality-based pilot activity in Warminster and Westbury with a view to embedding the successful features into the County-wide model for Family Help.

The Warminster and Westbury Pilot

What we set out to achieve and what we have achieved?

We wanted to develop and test some specific ways of working:

- Wrapping services/groups around local cluster(s) & communities.
- Creating a local case consultation system Family Help Co-ordinator being local contact for support on case discussions.
- Applying a more flexible/responsive practice model Localised team that built professional working relationships within the community.
- Creating a local community of practice Warm hand overs and introductions for families rather than referrals
- Working with sibling groups across phases bringing schools together to work across the whole family.
- Offering local training & sharing Offering Peer supervision to the local pastoral care and parenting support staff in local schools, offering coaching and resources to support direct interventions
- Developing local 'voice' activity- Learning from the feedback of families

Over the last 15 months the pilot has been able to work with partners in the Westbury and Warminster area to provide a more individual response to Family Help. We have supported 53 families who under previous models would not have had received direct intervention within the home. We have been using



the Outcomes Star tool to understand impact and progress in families; analysis shows every family worked with has reported and shown positive progress.

In terms of other insights regarding impact of the project, early data analysis suggests specific positive impact in school attendance and school exclusion. There is also evidence that the provision of local advice to schools and other partners reduces unnecessary demand on the Council's 'front door' in terms of queries about support for individual children, young people and families. Work is ongoing to explore both quantitative and qualitative data and Oxford-Brookes University are currently undertaking the final stage of the pilot project evaluation to inform discussions about the future model for Family Help across Wiltshire.

Evaluation will also be completed on the Early Help Mental Health Pilot that has been integrated within the Warminster and Westbury activity; this project is due its national evaluation in September which will inform the future model of early help mental health support across the County.

What's next For Westbury and Warminster? Family Help Pilot:

The specific activity of the Family Help Pilot Team ceased at the end of the Summer Term and has been transferred as 'business as usual' activity led by Spurgeons as the new delivery organisation for Family Hubs across Wiltshire (see below). All families that the pilot team are currently working have been introduced to staff from Spurgeons for any ongoing support needs.

Family Hubs:

The learning from the pilot has already fed into the delivery specification for the Family Hubs. These are the new Wiltshire wide service for families with children aged 0-19 (25 with SEND) delivered by Spurgeons since April 2024.

Family Hubs provide information, advice and support for all families with a mixture of evidence based interventions based on the local need. There are three flagship hubs in County Hall Trowbridge, Monkton Park Chippenham and Five Rivers Sailsbury. Alongside this there are Community and Family Navigators based in community buildings such as libraries, leisure centres and community projects to offer support and guidance to families.

Ongoing roll-out of the whole system Family Help Workforce Development offer Further development and implementation of the Family Help outcomes framework

During this period the multi-agency partnership group will be reflecting on the learning and feedback from the pilot activity to inform a long-term county wide model.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

Transitional Safeguarding is an "approach to safeguarding adolescents and young adults fluidly across developmental stages which builds on the best available evidence, learns from both children's and adult safeguarding practice and which prepares young people for their adult lives" (Chief Social Workers Knowledge Briefing June (2021)).

In response to multiple partners identifying opportunities for improvement in how we support young people who are vulnerable in the context of criminal and/or sexual exploitation as they move between services at age 18, the Families and Children's Transformation (FACT) Partnership is undertaking a specific project to explore how strategic and operational systems and practice can be developed. The project is specifically exploring the concept of achieving better outcomes for this cohort of young people through a programme of culture, practice and system change rather than a structural change model. National evidence tells us that failure to effectively support young people in this transition to adulthood impacts significantly upon their future outcomes as well as increasing the cost of interventions later in life that are felt across a wide range of system partners including Adult Social Care, Housing, Police, Justice System, Health partners and the welfare benefits system.

The multi-agency project has been running for 20 months with an initial focus on seeking to understand the lived experience of the young people and how the whole system works in the context of young people's support arrangements before, at and after the point they turn 18.

SUMMER 2024 UPDATE

As the project now moves towards closure in April 2025, the focus has shifted to identifying and implementing opportunities for improvement. This phase of activity is informed by case reviews, learning from cases that have been explored at the Creative Solutions Board during the period to date as well as the learning from cases considered within the Early Planning for Transitions activity. There has also been significant insight gained from engagement activity with young people, review of the Transitional Safeguarding mentoring programme and wider dialogue with a range of system partners about their experiences of working with young people in Wiltshire. We are also involved in a number of national networks exploring this issue and seeking to enhance approaches across the country.

The multi-agency activity has identified four key themes going forward.

Theme 1 - How the system can provide effective post-18 support for young people who have received intensive support prior to their 18th birthday

The project is working closely with Adult Social Care to enhance the existing post-18 support arrangements and to ensure that young people who require support from Adult Social Care experience a well-planned and smooth transition that leads to them being able to access appropriate support whilst also ensuring robust safeguarding oversight.



The project is also exploring the commissioning of housing provision with support specifically informed by the needs and vulnerabilities identified within the project.

Implementation of these developments will not just involve Adults Social but will require wider partner engagement and will need to be flexible and responsive to take account of the fluidity in young people's lives.

Intended impact

Success in this theme will mean that more young people are able to access effective post-18 support that enables them to achieve positive outcomes such as engagement in work and learning and reduced homelessness. The need for crisis-related support from across the system will also be reduced.

Theme 2 – How the system can best support young people with Special Education Needs/Disability (SEND) who are also vulnerable to exploitation

The project is facilitating conversation with colleagues from the Council's SEND Services, Social Care and pre/post-16 education providers to explore opportunities to ensure the support for these young people is as joined up and robust as possible taking account of the additional vulnerability and risks.

Intended impact

The key outcomes related to this theme are that fewer young people will drop out of post-16 work and learning and those that do will be picked up and supported to re-engage at an earlier stage.

Theme 3 – How the system partners can best work together to share information related to risk and vulnerability so that a shared assessment of risk is in place for each young person

This strand of work is in its exploratory phase with focussed conversations taking place with Police and Social Care colleagues, utilising case reviews to inform future recommendations and developments.

Intended impact

Improved sharing of information and consistency of assessment of risk will mean that partners will have a shared understanding of our most vulnerable young people and be able to respond more effectively when intervention is required. This will also enable consistency of support and response when young people move across and between services and parts of the system.

Theme 4 – How we can ensure that planning for transition from pre-18 to post-18 services is well-planned and effective

Informed by feedback from professionals and young people as well as case review activity, the project is working closely with Children's Social Care to embed best practice regarding planning for transition where contextual risks are present.

Intended impact

This theme is seeking to ensure that individual young people's needs, risks and vulnerabilities are well understood by relevant pre-18 and post-18 services so that transfer of support is as smooth as possible and that the risk of young people either disengaging from support or 'slipping through the net' are reduced.

Introduction

This briefing note provides an overview of the Youth Council's role and outlines what Councillors can expect from this body. The Youth Council is a crucial initiative aimed at fostering youth engagement in local governance and community development.

This year 13 Youth Council members were elected, and they meet together on a monthly basis; facilitated by the Voice & Participation Team, within Families and Children Services. The council is made up of young people aged 11 to 19 from across Wiltshire.

Role of the Youth Council

Our Youth Council serves as an advisory body, providing valuable insights and recommendations on issues affecting young people in our county. Their unique perspectives can help shape policies and programs that better address youth needs.

The Youth Council ensures that the voices of young people are heard in decision-making processes. It acts as a bridge between the youth community and Wiltshire Council, representing the interests and concerns of young residents.

Through participation in the Youth Council, members gain leadership and advocacy skills. This experience prepares them for future roles in civic and community life.

The Youth Council plans and executes 3 community projects, contributing to local development and addressing specific community needs. These projects can range from environmental initiatives to social programs.

The Youth Council engages with the broader youth population through forums, surveys, and social media. This helps ensure that the council's activities and recommendations are reflective of the wider youth community.

Members participate in national and regional initiatives, such as the British Youth Council and the United Kingdom Youth Parliament.

Expectations from the Youth Council

Councillors can expect termly updates from the Youth Council on their activities, projects, and key issues. This will be in the form of termly newsletter and presentations at council meetings where considered appropriate.

The Youth Council will provide informed recommendations on policies impacting young people. Councillors can expect well-researched and practical suggestions that address the specific needs of the youth demographic.



Youth Council Members will have the opportunity to attend a Council meeting to observe.

The Youth Council may seek to collaborate with councillors on initiatives and projects. This will include co-hosting events or supporting council-led programs aimed at youth development.

Councillors will often seek feedback from the Youth Council; this is most effectively achieved through engagement with the collective Youth Council and not through engagement with individual representatives. Similarly, the Youth Council will seek feedback from councillors on their initiatives and proposals. This two-way communication helps ensure that their activities align with broader county objectives and benefit from the experience of elected officials.

Councillors can expect the Youth Council to actively advocate for youth-related issues within the community. This includes raising awareness about challenges facing young people and promoting positive initiatives.

Not wearing a seat belt

It is a legal requirement in the United Kingdom to wear a seat belt if one is fitted, there are only a <u>few exemptions</u>.

In 2017, 27% - over a quarter - of those who died in cars on the road were not wearing seat belts.

Fou can be fined up to £500 for not wearing a seat belt.

Rearing a seat belt not only helps protect your safety, it helps protect the safety of others.

Only one person is allowed in each seat fitted with a seat belt. Never use the same seat belt across two or more passengers.

As a passenger over the age of 14 it's your responsibility to ensure you're wearing a seat belt. Failure to do so could result in a fine.




Child passengers

Children under 135 cm (4'4") tall must be in the correct car seat for their height and weight. You can be fined £500 if a child under 14 years old isn't in the correct car seat, or, if over 135cm tall, wearing a seatbelt whilst you are driving.

Conservation Group Grants

We are now accepting bids for the Conservation Group Grant. The Conservation Group Grant consists of £10,000 of Conservation Stewardship Funding which has been put aside for the sole use of MOD Conservation Groups. If your Conservation Group requires any tools, equipment or other items that may facilitate the completion of a conservation project at your site then your chairperson can bid for monies. Over the last year the Conservation Group Grant has been used to purchase barn owl nest boxes, wildflower seed for the improvement of pollinator habitat, bird rings, trail cameras, invertebrate surveying equipment and bat detectors for surveying foraging bats.

Forestry Update - by Steve Holdsworth

Ash dieback disease

Once an ash tree *Fraxinus excelsior* is infected with ash dieback disease, it rapidly starts to lose condition, with small trees dying within a season. Larger trees can withstand the disease for longer but are structurally weakened and soon start shredding limbs. Unlike many trees, ash timber becomes inherently weak once dead and therefore cannot be used. The most significant ash dieback on MOD land to date is in Kent, North Yorkshire and Ashdown Copse. There are currently no effective strategies for managing the disease. The removal of trees in infected areas has little effect as the fungus lives and grows on leaf litter on the forest floor.

New woodland across the UK Defence Estate

Expectations are that across three sites in England and Scotland there will be 25ha of new planting in 2023/2024. Planning is also underway for a further 15ha across an additional three sites. The UK Government has committed to increasing the tree planting rates across the UK to 30,000ha per year by the end of this Parliament. This equates to 300ha per year in tree cover on the MOD estate. DIO considers that, with sufficient resource, the annual MOD ambition should match this 300ha of new woodland per year across the UK. This new woodland will be registered with the UK Woodland Carbon Code and therefore have

carbon credits calculated by an independent 3rd party.

Oak processionary moth

The oak processionary moth is a native of central and southern Europe, where it is widely distributed but predators and environmental factors usually manage their numbers. However, its range has been moving steadily northwards mainly due to the movement of live oak trees in the nursery trade. Oak processionary moth was first discovered in the UK in 2006. Larvae can be found from April to June. The newly hatched have a brown body and dark head, but as they grow they become lighter and have a single dark stripe running down the middle of their back. Please see picture top left. The larvae feed together in groups and when not feeding they congregate in nests made of white silk spun under a branch. The hairs present on larger larvae contain a toxin thaumetopoein which is potentially harmful to humans and animals. As caterpillars emerge from eggs in April the most effective control method is to treat affected oak trees with insecticide during the spring and summer when the caterpillars are out. With careful application and timing the treatment is successful with minimal damage to other species. Most spraying is done from ground level and supplemented with the removal of nests using vacuum equipment.

Local Nature Recovery may be happening near you!

The Government has made legally-binding commitments to end the environmental declines in our country and to allow for our nature to recover. We expect local nature recovery strategies to propose actions such as the:

- creation of wetlands
- restoration of peatlands
- planting of trees and hedgerows
- more sustainable management of existing woodlands and other habitats like grasslands.

These actions are intended to help nature itself and to also help improve the wider natural environment. They should also involve a wide range of groups to make sure that local nature recovery strategies reflect local priorities and benefit from local knowledge. Examples of these groups include:

- landowners and managers
- government organisations, such as the Environment Agency, Forestry Commission and National Highways
- environmental charities
- businesses
- local group and composities.

Because they care... by Iain Perkins

Dave and Paul from Landmarc Support Services' Ground Maintenance team at Westdown Camp, have revised their mowing regime. Old accommodation blocks were removed as part of the Net-Zero Carbon Accommodation Programme, which left the original chalk grassland ground exposed. They spotted chalk grassland species beginning to grow on the newly exposed ground and saw an opportunity to encourage more flowers.

As part of a wider initiative, they identified and reduced mowing on areas where wildflowers such selfheal, bird's-foot trefoil and other low growing species could flourish, allowing them to self-seed and support our pollinators across the site.





To our first ever SFA Biodiversity Champion! by Iain Perkins

Laura-Rose Rawlins lived on the new Service Families Accommodation (SFA) on the Plumer Estate, Bulford. She was inspired to take action for nature after finding a breeding pair of hedgehogs in her garden on a starlit night in April 2022.

Laura-Rose set about initiating a change in the Vivo contract mowing regime to give the flora and fauna a chance to thrive. Laura worked with Sara Marchment, Area Housing Estate Manager and Vivo's John Molumby to change the cutting regime.

She subsequently created a more enriching environment for the families living on the estate and a well-managed wildlife garden at her own SFA home to support her visiting hedgehogs and other special wildlife. Over 88 species of wildflowers were recorded on the site initially by John Moon of Salisbury Plain Training Area Conservation Group, which has now increased to 100+ species.

Laura-Rose has triggered a culture change and inspired other forces families to improve habitats in the area. This has included projects such as hedgehog highways to link gardens together.

Warminster Plan Bee is a local community initiative where the Garrison and its industry partners are working with Sustainable Warminster to enhance areas of greenspace. They are creating mini meadows and stepping stones across Warminster Garrison, linking up important areas for nature to help rare pollinators increase their distribution outside of the Salisbury Plain Training Area Site of Special Scientific Interest, which forms one the largest and widest <u>B-Lines</u> in the UK.

The project works across various DIO contracts with Vivo, Aspire and Gavin Jones Ground Maintenance, to identify and enhance the plethora of green space within the Garrison's footprint to support pollinators.

Well done 'Shabash' to the Gurkha Company, at Warminster Garrison, who have worked hard to repair fences in the old paddock in Oxendene. This allowed the paddock to be winter grazed by Warminster Saddle Club horses to maintain the flower and rare bee rich habitat, which will act as a donor site for the project.

A big thank you to all involved, including Sustainable Warminster volunteers who collected the seed and worked with service families to plant scabious plugs and sow meadow seed.

Veolia's volunteer working party spent two days undertaking scrub management to help maintain the chalk grassland at Copheap, the local MOD owned County Wildlife Site which the project hopes to enhance.

Warminster Plan Bee has been partially funded by the Conservation Group Grant. Monies have supported the purchase of an electric fence and associated materials to enable a grazing paddock to be specifically managed for pollinators.

Aspire Defence services and Amphibians... by Iain Perkins

A special mention to Shaun and Michael from Aspire Defence Services for their sensitive management of the amphibians that make the settlement tanks their breeding home at the Tank Washdown Point, Harman Lines. They manage the resettlement pond which was purpose built for amphibian rehousing from spawn to tadlet.

To name a few of the species: common toad, great crested newt, smooth newt and common frog. This site, along with other man-made water storage areas such as emergency water supply and drainage ditches can be important habitats, watering holes or feeding grounds for large mammals, bats, birds, and a host of invertebrates.

Praise Bee work at RAF Syerston

At RAF Syerston a team from Tivoli Services, working with the Praise Bee charity have created a wildflower meadow, in conjunction with the Queen's Green Canopy initiative.

A variety of slow growing grass species have been sown with a mixture of wildflowers to maximise pollen and nectar levels. The Tivoli team has also planted 1,000 trees in the adjacent meadow. More about Praise Bee and the great work they do with MOD can be found at Praise Bee Charity.

Managing Green Spaces

Many people will have heard of 'No Mow May', which encourages people not to mow their lawns throughout the month to help wildflowers and pollinating insects. However, not mowing doesn't have to be restricted to the month of May. Mowing less often (or not at all) gives plants and flowers an opportunity to bloom and provides nectar for bees and other pollinators. Moving away from manicured lawns creates a richer habitat for wildlife, with the additional benefit of less energy consumed for mowing.

When identifying key areas to mow less frequently, it is good to note that not all space will result in promoting pollinators or is suitable for long grass. Some reasons for this are that short grass may be required for health and safety or to uphold traditional front of house aesthetics and the functionality of areas needing easy and frequent access.

Bugs Matter—the UK's big bug splat count

<u>The Bugs Matter</u> citizen science survey is an important initiative measuring insect splats on vehicle number plates as a marker of insect abundance. In previous survey years, with the valuable contributions of citizen scientists across the UK, significant strides have been made in understanding the challenges facing our insect populations. To take part:

- Download the Bugs Matter App
- Clean the number plate before making your journey in a vehicle
- When you reach your destination, count the number of bug splats across your number plate
- Use the 'Virtual Splatometer' within the App to get the best photograph possible
- The photo and details must then be submitted via the App
- You don't even need to be the driver of the vehicle you are travelling in but you do need their permission
- The app also includes a tutorial and some safety advice.



Date of Area Board Meeting	12 th September 2024

Headlines/Key Issues

- The Heads of Terms for the Central Car Park Public Conveniences at a rent of a peppercorn per annum for the period to 22nd May 2030 were signed at the meeting of Full Council on 28th May 2024.
- The contract has been awarded to the successful tenderer for the installation of solar panels on the Hub Building. It was hoped to instal the solar panels in August, but the need to install a new three phase meter has caused delays.
- Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) money has been awarded as follows:
 Warminster Community Radio £28,858 purchase of equipment
 Warminster Cricket Club £6,000 renovation of the club's toilet facilities.
- A grant of £2,800 was awarded towards the costs of setting up a parkrun at Thoulstone Park.
- A Lake Pleasure Grounds Lottery Bid Working Group has been set up to bring forward proposals to inform a bid to the National Lottery Heritage Fund.
- Further free canoe lessons and tennis taster sessions were funded by the Town Council
 as part of their Youth Activities Programme during the summer. These have proved to
 be extremely popular!
- The event celebrating the hundredth anniversary of the opening of the Lake Pleasure Ground, with tribute acts Beatles with an A and Forever Elton, took place on 26th July 2024. The event was very successful, attracting three thousand people.
- Warminster's Lake Pleasure Grounds have been celebrated by the BBC as one of five ideas for free summer activities across Wiltshire.
- Quarterly markets were held on 29th June and 1st September in the Civic Centre and the town centre, in conjunction with the Warminster Business Network. The final market of the year will take place on 30th November to coincide with the Christmas Lights Switch On event. The markets have increased footfall into the town and attracted both new and returning visitors.

Partner Update

- As part of the council's partnership working with the Warminster Business Network
 Warminster Town Centre, newsletters providing useful updates for local businesses are
 being produced and circulated.
- A Warminster promotional map and leaflet have been created and distributed around the local area to attract more visitors to Warminster.
- Youth outreach workers from Warminster and Westbury Youth Club are providing detached youth work services three times per week, building relations with the young people in Warminster.
- PS Joe Sadowski joined Warminster's Neighbourhood Policing Team in July and is providing regular updates to the council about issues and priorities in the town.
- The call for sites as part of the council's work to update the Neighbourhood Plan has generated 15 responses which will now be assessed and allocated for potential development.
