Local Priorities & Updates

Priority	Update
Farewell to some of the team...for now.	<p>Since the last Area Board we have had to say farewell to some of the neighbourhood team. Inceptor Al Lumley has been promoted to Chief Inspector and has moved to Swindon .</p> <p>Sgt Louise Oakley has stepped up to the Inspector role until Jan 2023- when a new Inspector will be appointed</p> <p>Neighbourhood policing is a force priority and there will be uplift posts so there will be recruitment for more PCs for NPT and they need to be in place by April 2023 – we currently hold three PC post this will increase to 5 .</p>
ASB / Scooters – YOUTH CRIME	<p>***MAIN PRORITY*** NPT are aware that ASB and youth crime has escalated since the summer in both Warminster and Westbury , and the team are working hard to tackle this –</p> <p>We have reports of general ASB , Public order offences, theft and Damage – and youths still on scooters</p> <p>PC MIKE OBERN is working hard with the response teams to robustly deal with youths – but its not as easy as it seems.</p> <p>A/INSP 2413 OAKLEY WILL GIVE A FURTHER VERABL UPDATE AT THE MEETING</p>
Westbury Police station	<p>Back in September We had someone move into the back of Westbury police station with his caravans which has attracted some trouble. Due to this land being owned still by PCCS office we had to wait for them to take action , formal notice was given back in October and Male has refused to vacate so court proceedings for eviction are in hand, the local policing team are patrolling and dealing with any matters at the location – 7th November the gates to the back yard have been removed by police, as the male ws locking the gate and padlocking himself in .</p>
Speed Enforcement & CSW	<p>The latest stats provided by the various Community Speed Watch teams show that over the last quarter, the Upper Deverill's have consistently the highest proportion of speeding motorists (approx. 1 in 10). In response, the local teams in conjunction with the roads policing units are increasing their presence in the area wherever possible. As a large proportion of speeders are statistically from the local area – this is a polite reminder to watch your speed.</p>
PEEL Inspection Progress	<p>Following on from the previous Area Board update and the input on the PEEL inspection by HMICFRS (where Wiltshire Police were placed into 'special measures') We are please to say that progress in improving the areas most critical are well underway. Significant changes to team structures have been made to ensure serious and complex criminal investigations get a more consistent service, as well as a review underway for the structure of uniformed policing across the county. I would like to point out and direct everyone to our Wiltshire police website which is the central point for updates on PEEL progress and will be updated after each meeting of the PPOG.</p>

Shared Lives has flourished in Wiltshire for over 40 years. Its purpose is to offer the **care and support for up to three people, in the home of a recruited Shared Lives carer.**

The Scheme provides **short term, respite and home from hospital placements, long term and sometimes daytime support.**

- As a Shared Lives carer, you would welcome an adult with care or support needs into your home. You would support them to develop their skills, independence, and social inclusion.
- Carers can be families, couples or individuals, and we recruit people with a wide range of skill sets and life experiences.
- No qualifications are needed, and carers could combine this role with other work commitments. However, a willingness to share your life with others, and provide care and support with enthusiasm, motivation and commitment is important.
- You will receive guidance and support from our team when you are matched with someone who suits your circumstances and lifestyle. This is to ensure that Shared Lives is an enjoyable, fulfilling and valuable experience for all.

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Banding, Fees and Placement Set-up

As a Shared Lives carer, you could make a **real difference** to the people you support.

Following an approval process, you will receive a weekly fee [**£385- £593 per week**] and work as a self-employed professional.

These 3 bands are based on the needs of the customers. This is a **WEEKLY FEE** paid to the carer

Band 1: £385.84 (paid breaks £13.10)

Band 2: £462.80 (paid breaks £17.53)

Band 3: £593.84 (paid breaks £25.07)

What will you provide to the customer?

- Board and lodgings – 3 meals a day
- Furnished bedroom
- Access to whole of the house (except others bedrooms and any out of bounds areas such as work office etc).
- And support with...

Personal care
Taking medication
Budgeting
Inclusivity in family life

Planning activities
Laundry
Access to health care and community
Companionship and ongoing relationships.

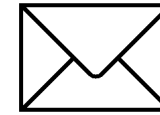

CURRENT PICTURE

Key areas of demand:

- SEND
- ASD pathway
- Behaviour (home & school)
- Emotional well-being
- Gaps & social mobility

Also practice/system issues:

- Insufficient Lead Professionals
- Inconsistent holistic whole family practice
- Unclear EH offer
- Limited flexibility in how/when/where to access support
- Degree of lack of family confidence in some services
- Lack of coherence between 'youth offer' & Early Help



What families have told us...

I don't hit any anybody's threshold
– no one can help me

It is overly complicated
when trying
to access help and support

I have to keep repeating
my family story

I didn't know where
to go or who to speak
to

There is no 'whole' family support
available when you are
facing multiple issues

If a family early support service was available in
Calne, I would have used it and I think it could
have prevented my family needing statutory
services

I can't get the help my
autistic child needs, so
I am funding this myself

services are good at focusing on the
child but fail to focus on the family as
a whole, supporting mum will help to
keep the family going

Consistency is key – information
and/or advice given by professionals
doesn't always match

Give ownership back to families, make
them take responsibility by giving them
the tools they need to help themselves

WHAT IS FAMILY HELP?

Wiltshire's multi-agency Family Help arrangements enable children, young people and families to access the right help at the right time through a co-ordinated approach to prevention and early intervention through:

- a co-ordinated approach at a whole population/universal level to prevent needs from arising and to build resilience across all residents
- a robust multi-agency approach to spotting any additional needs at the earliest point and providing effective joined-up support that prevents the needs from escalating further

Across Wiltshire, the project will deliver:

- A clear unifying brand for Family Help
- Online database of services, community resources & activities – via Wiltshire Together platform
- Co-ordinated whole system workforce development offer
- Consistency of core approaches across the Early Help workforce

The Warminster & Westbury pilot will also develop & test the benefits of:

- Wrapping services/groups around local cluster(s) & communities
- Local case consultation
- More flexible/responsive practice model
- Local community of practice
- Working with sibling groups across phases
- Local training & sharing
- Local 'voice' activity
