Early Years Reference Group Meeting

Wednesday 4 November 2020

1. Welcome and introductions

Bid Lillywhite from Bellefield Primary School was welcomed as the new maintained school representative for the group.

2. Apologies

3. Minutes of last meeting (30 September 2020)

The group approved the minutes as a true and accurate record.

4. Matters arising

Item 3 – LAB/EC confirmed Bid Lillywhite had been successfully appointed as the new maintained school representative for the group, whilst private providers representatives were still being sought.

Item 4 – EW confirmed the new Provider Establishment Portal was launched on Friday 31 October 2020. 389 providers have been sent their registration and login email with a further 74 providers being held back as a result of an issue with some of their children's 30 hour eligibility codes. These issues have now been rectified, and these 74 providers received their registration and login emails on Monday 2 November 2020. A small group of providers have so far been unable to log in to the portal, and these issues have been logged with Liquidlogic. However, 250+ providers have been able to successfully log in and start using the portal. EW also confirmed that if the login issue isn't resolved for this group of providers soon, then there is an alternative way that they will be able to submit a headcount for Autumn 2020. SH raised an issue about a parent's date of birth being required in the portal. EW confirmed that a parent date of birth is only required for an EYPP check, and there is already a section to capture this data on the reverse of the Parent Declaration form.

Item 4 – LAB confirmed that the sector have been contacted for feedback on the format of the new newsletter via this week's weekly attendance survey. Group feedback was positive. Some members of the group hadn't received their newsletter email so LAB will look into this.

Item 4 – JP thanked MT for forwarding him a copy of her summary report and DfE response. JP confirmed he had written to the DfE with all Wiltshire MPs copied in. Despite sending a chasing email, JP has received no acknowledgement from the DfE other than to say the person being contacted was on leave. JP also confirmed that he had received automatic acknowledgments from all MP's, with the exception of John Glen. Michelle Donelan sent a personal response and said she would help where possible. JP was very disappointed in the overall response and will write again shortly.

ACTION: LAB to check the newsletter mailing list for those members who haven't received it.

5. Impact of COVID on settings

LAB confirmed there are 2 providers with very low numbers who are planning to mothball provision and reconsider opening in September 2021. They are small village pre-schools who

are only able to offer funded hours on a term time only basis. JP asked about staff redeployment of these provisions, and LAB confirmed these routes are being considered. There are also some providers expanding as well as new provision opening in the county.

LAB confirmed that Wiltshire Council has an increasing list of newly eligible funded 2 year olds requiring places. The Communications team is due to run a campaign with a slightly different message than previous campaigns encouraging parents to recognise the importance of childcare as well as informing parents that Covid-19 transmission rates within settings are extremely low.

JB confirmed that they are experiencing increased referrals for children with approximately 75% falling in the 2 year old age range. JP queried those children who were held back from starting school in September 2020 and the impact. JB confirmed this is a significant issue as more places are required for the increased 2 year olds and the held back 4-5 year olds are accessing the full 15 hours per week so there is very little capacity. JB informed the group that the bigger issue to be considered is the fact that therapists and OT services/checks currently aren't available to children, and this is and will cause further delays for the children as well as being a barrier to inclusion. If the situation continues, this could cause a need for the potential development of centre staff to temporarily cover these services.

Following the Prime Minister's second lockdown announcement last Saturday, MT read that new guidance from the DfE is in development, and that other forms of support might become available, especially for closed/closing provision. MT also confirmed that other council discretionary funding might also become available, and she will try to ensure that the EY sector is considered as recipients.

ACTION: LAB and EC to take capacity DSC capacity issue to EY cell.

6. Funding Autumn 2020

MT provided a brief synopsis of the current funding situation for Bid Lillywhite as a new member of the group

MT confirmed that directors do not want any significant underspend of the Early Years Entitlement grant at the end of the financial year as it is there is ensure sufficient childcare provision across the county. Current spending on the latest Autumn 2020 round of additional funding payments for providers currently stands at £46,710 (2 year olds) and £376,520 (3&4 year olds). The final round of additional funding applications are due in by 9th November, so these figures will increase.

MT confirmed that current guidance stipulates that from January 2021, providers can only be paid for actual children present, therefore any underspend needs to be actioned before the end of Autumn 2020 (31 December). LAB has submitted a question about this guidance to the DfE and is awaiting their response. Other guidance to be considered is that which states that providers cannot be double funded if they are in receipt of funding from other government schemes. This is especially important as the original furlough scheme has reopened until 1 December 2020, and CJRS has been extended until the end of December 2021. JP noted that if an existing or new staff member has never been furloughed, then they could be now.

JP raised the issue of waiving business rates for the EY sector. MT stated that she will see if she is able to progress this issue.

In advance of the meeting, MC raised the issue of settings being paid broadly in line with 2019 figures and that Wiltshire Council had calculated a 1472 hours average deduction. He questioned how this figure had been calculated as he understood it to be an average loss over the last 3 years, but it appears to be a sector average.

MT confirmed that Wiltshire Council could not use a three year average on a setting by setting basis because there were a significant number of settings with very particular bases which could not provide reliable averages. When a few examples were modelled where the Council operational staff knew that a setting was growing, had contracted due to market forces or taken a decision to reduce in size or close and re-open for another reason, using the individual averages wasn't fair.

Instead, Wiltshire Council has opted for two overall average for a childminder and group settings with a further split of 2 year old and 3&4 year old funding averages. Settings continue to have the option to apply for hardship payments. This seemed the fairest way possible within the confines of the grant available, and the terms of the grant. The only children we are able to support under the terms and conditions of the grant are those entitled to 2, 3 & 4 year old grant and so reductions in private children could be supported at local level. MT confirmed that local authorities have been instructed not to "double fund" as a result of the various national self-employment and furlough schemes. Again, care was needed in limiting the rewarding of childminders and group settings where numbers were purposefully reduced. Where providers felt they were at a disadvantage, they could provide the relevant information in their hardship application so the local authority could reassure itself that double funding was not in place. Wiltshire Council has funded 100% of all children in settings. The "top up" funding which funds above average losses is paid for children who are not attending, and the hardship fund is there to support those who are in need of additional support for Autumn.

MC also questioned that whilst the government are paying local authorities on the January 2020 census figure and not September 2019 figures, he understood that Wiltshire's available funding calculation is based on September funding and not the increased January funds. MT confirmed that EY funding is always calculated on the January census data. If the January 2021 census is lower than the 2020 census then, the funding adjustment will have a detrimental impact on Wiltshire. Modelling work can be done but only once all Autumn hardship applications have been received and processed.

ACTION: MT to investigate possibility of waiving of business rates for EY sector.

MT to liaise with Fay Sissins on grant reduction modelling

7. Sector Work Academy Programme for Early Years

LAB welcomed Mandy Timbrell, Head of Employment and Skills at Wiltshire Council to the meeting. Employment and Skills have identified that the impact Covid-19 has and is having on the EY sector means limited opportunities and skill gaps in the immediate and longer term future. Mandy gave the group a presentation on the possible routes and funding available to the sector to increase opportunities for young people wanting to join the Early Years profession. A copy of her presentation is attached to these minutes.

ACTION: Providers to consider if they would like to use these routes to employ staff

8. AOB

MT informed the group that the FACT board are looking for an Early Years representative. The setup of these meetings is changing so whilst the meetings are monthly, some representatives will only be invited to meetings when agenda business requires. The next meeting is scheduled for 10 December, 11.30am – 1pm, so please contact MT if you are interested.

JP thanked all EY providers and their employees, as well as the whole EY team at Wiltshire Council for all their efforts since the start of the Covid-19 pandemic. LAB echoed these

sentiments and said that during the online public meeting held last night (Tuesday 3 November 2020) by Philip Whitehead, Leader of the Council, Terence Herbert, Chief Executive, and Kate Blackburn, Director of Public Health, the EY sector were thanked for remaining open and keeping children safe during this unprecedented time.

JP informed the group that Oxford University have cautiously stated that a vaccine could be released for Christmas. We await further confirmation

Early Years Reference Group Meeting

Friday 4 December 2020

1. Welcome and introductions

2. Apologies

3. Minutes of last meeting (4 November 2020)

The group approved the minutes (those including the addendum) as a true and accurate record.

4. Matters arising

Item 4 – JP confirmed he has still not received any response from MP John Glen. LAB and MT informed the group that Helean Hughes, Director of Education & Skills is meeting with him today to discuss a range of issues including lack of funding to specifically support the EY sector through the pandemic.

Item 5 – LAB and EC confirmed they are continuing to work on the DSC capacity issue with the EY cell.

Item 6 – MT confirmed she has received no response to date relating to her query on waiving of business rates for EY providers but will follow up.

Item 6 – MT confirmed that the remodelling has been completed and will discuss under item 6 of these minutes.

Item 8 – MT forwarded contact details to JB regarding EY representation on the FACT board. JB confirmed she has emailed but has not heard anything back to date.

ACTION: LAB and EC to continue progressing DSC capacity issue MT to follow up waiving of business rates for EY sector

5. Impact of COVID on settings (All)

MT stated that F40 have been meeting with the DfE and have raised the issue of loss of private income for EY providers.

The DfE are now planning regular meetings with local authorities. MT, LAB and Gary Binstead, Head of Commissioning Families & Children recently met with Sharon Muir, DfE representative and relayed their frustration about the lack of additional funding for the EY sector as well as seeking confirmation on Spring 2021 payments and possible funding reductions as a result of fewer numbers.

EC confirmed there had been 5 complete closures this week as a result of Covid-19, and that 59 providers have had a closure of some sort since 1 September 2020. Not all of these 59 have been as a result of a positive case within the provision; a lot are linked to families or members of staff having to self-isolate as an identified person through the track and trace system.

MC queried how many permanent setting closures there had been since 1 September 2020 and EC confirmed there had been 3 - 1 due to planned retirement and 2 as a result of declining numbers over the last few years. EC and LAB confirmed these closures have had little impact on sufficiency in the area.

MT asked the group about the cost pressures associated with a whole provision or bubble closure. All confirmed that the main pressure is loss of private income, costs linked with cancelling food orders at short notice and food wastage, and staff sickness costs. MT asked how a setting would cover a staff member who had to self-isolate and the group confirmed bank staff would be used along with moving other staff members around where possible.

ACTION: EC to confirm the number of children affected by bubble/provider closures

6. Funding Autumn 2020 – paper to Schools Forum (LAB/MT/All)

MT informed the group that a report has been drafted for the next Schools Forum meeting.

MC queried if providers would receive an increase in their hourly rates in 2021/22 due to Wiltshire Council receiving a proportion of £66 million next year as well as a proportion of an additional £44 million discussed by central government last week. MT said funding figures would be confirmed by the DfE around 18-24 December resulting in further remodelling, but she would passport as much funding to EY providers as she possibly could. However, the DfE will need to offer reassurance on funding reductions or minimum funding levels which could impact available funding levels.

LAB confirmed that the Autumn 2020 headcount is in its final stages, and that the local authority will be reviewing the remaining budget and look to redistribute amongst those settings who have had fewer children in Autumn 2020 than in Autumn 2019.

The group discussed a number of possible grant funding options available to providers including the LA Discretionary Grant Fund. JP confirmed this has now been replaced by the ARG fund which the local authority has the discretion to distribute. MT believes this grant would have to last 18 months. MT will update when she has more info.

ACTION: MT to inform the group of business grant funding options when more detail is available.

7. Supporting vulnerable families over Christmas (£15 per child per week)

MT confirmed the funding is an additional £1.1 million grant from central government and has just become available for spending between now and April 2021. 80% of the funding is to be spent on families with the remaining 20% for vulnerable adults.

JP stated that he is aware of a number of providers who do not wish to be involved with distributing this additional funding to vulnerable families. LAB confirmed an additional SNAP survey is being sent out to providers today informing them of the numbers of eligible children they have and the amount of funding that they could receive, and ask if they are happy to distribute the funding via a range of options to the identified families. Providers will be able to opt out if they wish. She confirmed that a large number of providers have already expressed their support in helping their most vulnerable families where possible.

Following discussion with charity accountants, JB expressed concern about the distribution of the funding and queried the legality of it as there is no agreement in place between the Local Authority and providers on handling funds in this way. The group discussed evidence required by the local authority that the funding had been distributed and the potential for fraud. MT and LAB confirmed that there is a huge element of trust and faith involved but that providers will need to indicate their agreement to passport the funding via the survey. They had hoped that

the funding could have been given in food vouchers but this could have precluded some families from being able to access the funding if they didn't have a particular named supermarket in their area. This route ensures the funding goes to the right families and providers could buy food vouchers for a supermarket local to a family.

MT confirmed the £15 per week is based on the free school meals funding that schools receive, and projected numbers have been used to calculate this weekly amount. The grant needs to be fully spent by 31 March 2021, with funding being paid to providers next week (week commencing 7 December 2020), which ideally will be passported out to identified families by the end of the following week (18 December 2020), this is based on schools term times. If a provider is unable to contact a family within the set timescale, i.e. due to self-isolation, then providers are to get the funding to the family at the next available opportunity.

JB asked about the alternative options in the event of funding not being distributed to families via EY providers. MT confirmed that the Revenues and Benefits Team operate a local welfare provision fund, and this route could be used to distribute the funding to a smaller number of families. The local authority will know those providers able to distribute the funding and those who aren't by Monday 6th December and will then look at how the funding can get to the families in areas not covered by EY providers.

The issue of fuel payments was raised, and LAB and MT confirmed that this will be reviewed in January 2021.

MC asked for a list of Wiltshire foodbanks to be added to the next EY newsletter. RM confirmed he has this list and will forward to LAB. LAB also reminded the group that Healthy Start Vouchers are also available via an online application form, and currently no Health Visitor sign off is required as a result of Covid-19.

JB raised the issue of some eligible Pupil Premium (PP) children who have stayed on at Springboard due to Covid-19, but only schools are entitled to this funding. The children also don't qualify for the Early Years Pupil Premium (EYPP). LAB will raise this issue with Paul Redford as it was felt that as the children were in attendance at Springboard then they should be eligible for EYPP.

RM informed the group that Spurgeons are offering a £25 food delivery (main meals for a family of 4) from Asda or Tesco to referred struggling families with a child aged 0-5 years old. In addition, as Spurgeons have been unable to deliver group sessions, they are offering assistance to families in accessing health and safety home equipment such as stair gates.

ACTION: RM to forward list of Wiltshire foodbanks to LAB for inclusion in next EY newsletter.

LAB to raise PP funding issue with Paul Redford

8. AOB

JP and MC raised the issue that they have been told to remain open over the Christmas break. EC and LAB confirmed that they do not want people working through the whole period. It is simply to have a member of staff check emails once a day (once a setting has closed for the break) to see if a Covid-19 notification has been received from PHE. The main concern is around the few days after a setting has closed (and maybe a few days before reopening) during which time a PH or family notification might be received, and the setting would need to confirm close contacts and to be aware that this could affect staffing in the new year.

ACTION: None
