55 <u>Carers Support Wiltshire</u>

Catharine Hurford gave a presentation on the work of Carers Support.

Issues highlighted included: the role of carers and the challengers they face, including ill-health, depression and isolation, through the pressures of caring for loved one; the information, training and practical support that is available to carers in the Malmesbury community area; the support given to GPs to train them to provide better support to carers; the support given to employers to understand how they can understand their workers who also have caring responsibilities; how carers support is funded through local councils and fundraising; and the work identifying younger carers and the impact that has on their life-chances.

56 Food Banks

Richard Payler, from the Malemsbury & District Foodbank gave an update on their work locally.

Issues highlighted included: that the Foodbank started in 2014 by a cooperative of Churches Together and the Rotary; that the group is part of the Trussel trust network; the ways in which support is given including vouchers and physical donations; the extra support provided during summer holiday to supplement the loss of free-school-meals; how people are referred to the foodbank by professionals/representatives in the community; that repeat referrals may result in a conversation to see what additional support could be made to help assist them more; the training and support provided to volunteers; the multiple places where food can be donated, and how money can be donated; how other household and hygiene items may be required; how people in the villages can make contact with the group – and how more information about food poverty can be collected from the community; that parcels can be transported to people in the rural communities; the impact of universal credit on the use of foodbanks; and how links to other organisations can be expanded including community transport and local shops.

57 <u>The Challenges Ahead</u>

The Chairman, Councillor John Thomson, gave an update on the issues and challenges for Wiltshire Council and the wider community in the future.

Issues highlighted included: that meetings had taken place across the county to discuss with the community about the challenges faced by the Council; that some services are protected by increasing the volunteer support and partnerships with towns and parish councils; the activities that had taken place

in the community area that have prevented people from using more expensive services; how towns and parishes can consider how they designate funding from their precept to support priority areas where there will be more demand; how the community area transport group can be seen as a model for co-funding; how parishes can identify priorities and how the county can support them; that on the 17th December there would be a training session and discussions at County Hall to start that debate; and how the policy for asset and service transfer has been simplified.

Local Youth Network Update and Applications for Youth Funding

The meeting considered the report from the Local Youth Network which asked the Area Board to note the financial position of the Youth Funding allocation, and note the update on the Local Youth Network Management group work.

The meeting also considered one applications detailed in the report together with the recommendations of the Local Youth Network (LYN) Management Group.

Richard Williams, Local Youth Facilitator, presented the report and gave a summary of local issues, including: that he was happy to come and visit town and parish councils to discuss their needs assessments to identify what is required in the area, and that all parishes are welcome to attend the LYN meetings; that the current budget allocation would be expended if all the grants were approved; how young people are involved in partnership and the desire to expand the network to other community representatives to facilitate youth provision; how provision for young people identifying as LGTBQ+ in the community; the partnership approach taken to provision.

With regard to the applications: the meeting heard that the GuazeBrook Group provided support in the Luckington village area through a drop-in group; and that two other applications had been approved under delegated authority powers by the officers, and were included in the report for the Area Board to noted.

At the conclusion of the discussion, and having been put to the vote, the meeting;

Resolved

To award £500 to the Guazebrook Group to support the weekly drop in youth café in Luckington

To note the following awards made under the delegated authority powers by the officer:

- The award of £1,000 to CMAS for Outreach work; and
- The award of £1,500 to support LGTBQ+ support work.

59 Community Updates

Along with written reports, the meeting received the following updates from the community:

Chris Harvey, the Fire Service watch manager in Malmesbury, updated the meeting on activities in support of safety and prevention; the fire safety officer working with the business to reduce extra call outs; how response times have changed due to incidents in more rural localities; the free visits available to help reduce fire risks; the active recruitment for extra cover staff.

The Chairman thanked the officer for the updated and paid thanks to the service for its work in response to the Grenfell tragedy.

The Riverside Centre gave an update on their activities including: the efforts made to increase access to groups from more rural locations; the work to support the repair café; the fundraising projects and events, including music concerts and the ambition to have other entertainment events; plans for future events including a Craft Fair, a Health & Wellbeing Day and Children's Birthday Party Fayre; and the ambitions to connect with other groups in villages and share knowledge of activities to other village halls.

The Chairman expressed his thanks for the update and hoped it would encourage more to contribute to their community by volunteering.

The Malmesbury Area Health & Wellbeing Champion gave an update on local projects including: the success of the local lunch clubs, and the need for more volunteers; the expansion of men shed projects and the possibility of getting on started in Malmesbury; that the drop-in sessions in the library may move to the surgery to increase attendance; that some parishes had offered funding for the co-ordinator, enabling them to make better links to rural people; and the grants available for those in fuel poverty and how people can apply for the money.

Cllr Richard Moody, Oaksey Parish Council, gave an update on issues of importance in the community including the neighbourhood plan, and the creation of affordable homes.

In response to issues raised, the Chairman and Councillor Sturgis stated that they recognised that the local plan process for allocating housing was frustrating and reiterated the importance for large villages establishing robust neighbourhood plans and encourage communities to continue to engage positively with consultations.

60 Community Grant

The meeting considered two community grant applications

The first application was from the Friends of Ashton Keynes Primary School for

a multipurpose play area. Representatives from the applicants gave a short presentation to the meeting clarifying that facility available to the school and for community and club use.

Councillor Chuck Berry proposed that as a grant for another play area in the village had already been given that £2,500, representing 50% of the application, should be awarded.

The second application was from the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust for £2,484 for resources and equipment to improve access and the use of the local nature reserve near Hankerton. A representative from the trust gave a short presentation outlining the works proposed.

The Chairman proposed that the full grant should be awarded on the condition that the organization continue to work with local health and wellbeing partners and ask for a report back on how this has been achieved.

At the conclusion of the debate, and after having been put to a vote, the meeting;

Resolved

- 1. To award £2,500 to Friends of Ashton Keynes Primary School for a multipurpose play area; and
- 2. To award £2,484 for resources and equipment to improve access and the use of the local nature reserve near Hankerton on the condition that the organization continue to work with local health and wellbeing partners and ask for a report back on how this has been achieved.

Wiltshire Employment Support Team

Better known as WEST is a supported employment service for young people and adults with special educational needs and disabilities, including autism spectrum conditions. We aim to support our customers to find and keep a job.

We are part of the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Service at Wiltshire Council. We also provide support to Adult Care customers, so we support people from 14+.

What is Supported Employment?

A well defined approach to helping people with disabilities participate in the competitive labour market, helping them to find meaningful job and providing ongoing support from a team of professionals.

Where do we work?

All over wiltshire, if you meet eligibility and have a Wiltshire post-code, we can work with you.

Working with employers local to Wiltshire or within reasonable travelling distance, that could be in Hampshire, Swindon or other neighboring towns or counties.

What do we want?

For as many people to know of our service and that there is a pool of untapped talent and willing workforce in Wiltshire that could be of great benefit to employers.

We want the opportunity to meet with local employers to talk about their business and recruitment needs and negotiate positive employment opportunities for our customers.

Most of all we want to do what we can to level the playing field for people with higher support needs so they can compete to get jobs.

Research shows that only 6% of people with a learning disability and 15% of people with autism, are in paid employment, yet most want to work (Mencap).



The Team

We choose our Job Coaches for lots of different skills. Most of all their work ethic and what they can do to negotiate work opportunities with local employers. We know our stuff. We don't know everything, but we have a strong reputation.

The team are supportive, but they are not support workers.

Job Coaches specialise in employment, with the added bonus of previous backgrounds ranging from education to business.

Our priorities

Everyone has the right to work and we are committed to helping people with higher support needs do that.

Getting a job is the top priority supporting applications, interviews and on the job support. Speaking to employers

and negotiating opportunities

The right support supporting customers in a person centred, but realistic way

Employer relationships employers in Wiltshire are our customers too and we value how pro-active and inclusive they can be. We work to maintain positive relationships and are on hand to provide support to them in making employing someone through our service smooth.

We only deal in paid work

If a paid job isn't what you are looking for then we are not the right service for you

We can signpost you to other places if you need it but we cannot support you with anything that isn't paid work. We don't want to lose our focus.

Community Connecting is another part of our wider team and they specialise in supporting people with inclusion to their local community, including joining a club, travel training and volunteer work.











Wiltshire Supported Internships

Supported Internships are designed for young people who really want to move into employment from education.

A study programme for a young person with learning disabilities or autism that want to move into employment and need extra support to do so. An important element is the opportunity for an extended work placement with the potential for a job offer at the end. We call these 'Working Interviews'.

'Aim to equip young people with the skills needed for work so they can achieve sustainable paid employment. The programme includes on-the-job training, backed by expert job coaches and college based learning'

Department for Education

Subject: Public Space Protection Orders

PSPOs

Public Spaces Protection Orders (PSPOs) are one of the tools available under the Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing 2014 Act and replace Designated Public Place Orders (DPPO). New Guidance issued by the Local Government Association stated that any Orders in existence post 21 October 2017 would automatically be transferred to include any conditions covered by the DPPO. This applies to orders in: Trowbridge, Salisbury, Calne, Chippenham, Devizes, Durrington, Malmesbury and Warminster.

The legislation recognises that councils are often best placed to identify the broad and cumulative impact that ASB can have and additional conditions can be applied for. They must be evidence based and must not be covered by other primary legislation.

Councils can use PSPOs to prohibit specified activities, and/or require certain things to be done by people engaged in particular activities, within a defined public area. PSPOs differ from other tools introduced under the Act as they are council-led, and rather than targeting specific individuals or properties, they focus on the identified, evidence based problem behaviour in a specific location. Any conditions must be consulted on.

The legislation provides for restrictions to be placed on behaviour that apply to everyone in that locality (with the possible use of exemptions). Breach of a PSPO without a reasonable excuse is an offence. The enforcement will be managed by Wiltshire Police, they will issue fixed penalty notices which can incur fines of up to £1000. Alcohol conditions covered by the Orders can incur £500 fine if breached.

Wiltshire Council is keen to work with individuals to change their behaviour. Working with our drug and alcohol service, recipients of fines will now have the option to attend a drug and alcohol course to waiver the fine payment.

New signage is on order and the webpages will be updated to reflect this recent change in legislation.

Fixed Penalty Notices

A Police Officer may issue an FPN to anyone they have reason to believe has committed an offence and breached the PSPO without reasonable excuse under section 67 of the Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing 2014 Act. The FPN should only be issued to over 18s.

This also applies in the case of orders that prohibit alcohol consumption, where it is reasonably believed that a person has been or intends to consume alcohol. It is an offence under section 63 either to fail to comply with a request not to consume or to surrender alcohol (or what is reasonably believed to be alcohol or a container for alcohol).

The front copy should be handed to the recipient and the second retained for your records. Wiltshire Council must be notified via ASB@wiltshire.gov.uk with a scanned copy of the FPN. This will enable the Council to prosecute if necessary.

There will also be an option to attend a Wiltshire substance misuse service course to waiver the fine. The information is contained on the back page of the FPN and should be handed to the recipient at the time of issue. The Officer should make the recipient aware that this option would waiver the fine payment.

Officers should consider circumstances where there may be a 'reasonable excuse' for breaching the Order. It may also provide a further opportunity, to recognise that those responsible may themselves be vulnerable and in need of support. They should therefore consider appropriate referral pathways where there are any safeguarding concerns.

Subject: The new one-stop shop Work Wiltshire website

Key message:

On the 4th July, the new Work Wiltshire website launched. This is a unique website containing a huge range of education, employment and skills information which would normally have been located on several different sites and can now be found in one location with signposting to other relevant sites.

This website has been made to be accessible, attractive and a professional information hub. By having a one-stop-shop website, it will enable us to become the go-to place for career information, advice and signposting to relevant sites that the customers are looking for.

Work Wiltshire website contains information and links for: next steps in education, apprenticeships, information for employers, support available for those with barriers to work, information for those looking for work or wanting to upskill, financial support, further and higher education, local projects, support for schools and policies and data.

Questions:

How we set it up?

The Work Wiltshire website was originally created to support employers, employees and those looking for work. It then expanded to cover the programmes that the Employment and Skills Service were running, as well as providing career information, labour market intelligence, Wiltshire statistics, news and events and the services strategy.

The Employment and Skills service decided expand the website further and extend the range of audiences it catered for and allow them to access all the information they may need in one location. The redevelopment of the website was funded by Action 4 Wiltshire and has engaged with key stakeholders throughout the development to make sure that the website will work as effectively as possible and include tailored information to the different users.

Who were involved?

The main development of the website was conducted by the Employment and Skills Service at Wiltshire Council with stakeholders from Children's Services, Employment and Community Skills, local schools, Carer Support Wiltshire, Community First as well as others, contributing content and feedback to ensure the website is relevant, engaging and accessible.

What we are hoping to achieve?

A helpful and creditable website which enables local people and employers to find the key information and links they would like to know in one location.

Is this a model used elsewhere?

Other websites focus on specific sections which are included on the Work Wiltshire, but to our knowledge the combination of having all education, employment and skills information for young people, the general public, those with barriers to work and employers, all in one location is unique.

What has been the website take-up so far?

Since its launch we have had over 3,540 people use our website looking at 13,175 pages, with a wide variety of age demographics. The most popular pages so far being apprenticeships information for employers, apprenticeships, support for schools, and young people's next steps.

What can it do for people?

People will be able to search through the different sections on the website to find out education, employment and skills information. There is also a news section and events page, which shows the Employment and Skills service blog, local vacancies, Higher Education open days and much more.

It will help employers with find information and support for their business including how to set up an apprenticeship, free HR support, how business can get involved in local programmes, grants and other information.

It also has a dedicated section to help schools with careers education, giving information of local support, provision, the Wiltshire Careers Education Programme and support helping them arrange careers events.

It also has a section for those with complex needs and barriers to work; which highlights what support there is for them.

Subject:	Clean-Up Wilts campaign and the Great British Spring Clean

This year phase two of the county-wide Clean-Up Wilts campaign will be implemented.

The campaign, which was launched last October, focused on targeting fly-tipping across the county as its first phase.

This year the campaign focuses on litter from food-on-the-go, chewing gum and cigarette butts and community litter picks as part of supporting the national Great British Spring Clean, which takes place on the weekend of 2 to 4 March (2018). Over the last two years — communities across Wiltshire have participated in the litter picks and more than 30 tonnes of litter has been collected.

As a result of this participation, Wiltshire Council has been shortlisted as a finalist in the Keep Britain Tidy Network Awards – Local Authority Award category. The shortlisting is based on the evidence of the strong community spirit that prevails in Wiltshire, which was clearly demonstrated last year on the weekend of the 2017 Great British Spring Clean (Friday 3 to Sunday 5 March).

More than 3,200 volunteers took part in litter picks across the county, giving up their time to help make their communities a better place to live. In all, 152 litter picks took place throughout the county during the weekend, and the volunteers collected 3,025 bags of rubbish, with 18.15 tonnes collected in total.

The award winner will be announced on 8 February. Just being a finalist is recognition of what makes Wiltshire unique. It would be great if this year's Great British Spring Clean event could be another success.

It would of course be much better if people didn't drop litter in the first place and that we didn't have to spend more than £2.5 million each year collecting this rubbish. Wiltshire is a beautiful county and we want to keep it that way.

We will hear more about the Clean-Up Wilts campaign and this year Big Spring Clean on tonight's agenda.

Subject: Policing Precept 2018/19

Happy New Year,

I wanted to inform you about the launch of my consultation on the policing precept for 2018/19. I would be grateful if you could share this and make residents aware of opportunities for consultation. The details are set out below or you can access a video of me outlining the proposals at https://youtu.be/lskkPmUd1Nc

The policing precept consultation which launches today (2/1/2018) is looking for the views of Wiltshire residents on the proposed increase of £12 a year.

Currently the average band D household contributes £14.19 per month to local policing, but if residents back the proposal then this would rise to £15.19 per month. As a Force, Wiltshire Police has seen the second highest increase in demand across the country in the last year yet the funding we receive from central government doesn't recognise the increasing pressures our service is under.

In fact we receive the fourth lowest funding per head of population in England and Wales.

Since 2010, Wiltshire Police has received £19 million less but have been responding to more crimes and supporting more members of the public year on year. Whilst we live in an incredibly safe county, there's only so far the budget will stretch and we're streamlining our services to ensure they're as efficient as possible at the same time as keeping the public safe, but we are feeling the squeeze more than ever. Without this increase Wiltshire Police will have to look at further reductions in officers and staff to close a budget gap of around £3m.

That's why I am asking whether residents in Wiltshire and Swindon would be prepared to pay an extra £1 a month to help bridge this gap.

This increase will mean that I can protect frontline services from further reductions and maintain the current level of service.

The consultation which runs from 2nd January 2018 to midday 31st January 2018 wants to hear your views on the proposed increase.

Small changes can help you and your loved ones stay well this Winter

Helping people to look after their own health, and their families' health, especially during the colder weather can help you stay well and it also helps to manage demand on health services.

By following eight simple self-care health steps, you and your loved ones can stay well this winter:

S – see your pharmacist at the first sign of illness

Pharmacists are not only medical experts; they can also offer advice and information on a range of minor illnesses and injuries. If you start to feel unwell this winter, even if it is just a cough or cold, get advice from your pharmacist before it gets more serious.

E - eat plenty of fruit and vegetables

A healthy diet is vital for your wellbeing, so try and eat five portions of fruit and vegetables every day.

L - learn more about around the clock healthcare services in Wiltshire

In Wiltshire there are many options available for when you need medical advice and treatment. Consider all the choices available to help you make the right decision about where to go.

F - find out if you're eligible for a free flu vaccine

People who are eligible include those who are aged 65 years, pregnant women, anyone who is the main carer for another person or who is in receipt of a Carers' Allowance, and those with a long term condition such as diabetes or asthma.

C - check in on your neighbours

Winter can be dangerous for elderly people, so checking they have enough supplies will mean they don't need to go out in bad weather.

A – arrange to pick up your prescription

Many pharmacies and GP surgeries will be closed or have reduced working hours over the festive period. If you require a repeat prescription, make sure you order it in plenty of time.

R – restock your medicine cabinet

Looking after yourself when you're feeling under the weather with a minor illness is easy if you already have a stocked medicine cabinet.

E - ensure you stay warm

Cold weather can be very harmful and increase the risk of heart attack, stroke and chest infections. Try and heat your home to at least 18 degrees and have at least one hot meal a day.

Honest and open opinions from patients help to shape hospice care

Patients, their families and healthcare professionals at a leading hospice in Wiltshire are continuing to help shape the way services are run - thanks to a new group set up by Healthwatch Wiltshire.

Local volunteers from the county's independent health and care champion Healthwatch Wiltshire have spent the last 12 months meeting with patients and their families, unpaid carers and health professionals at Dorothy House Hospice Care.

The hospice commissioned Healthwatch Wiltshire to set up a User Advisory Group in September 2016 to provide an opportunity for those who use its services to give their open and honest opinions. This feedback has now helped to shape strategy and future plans for services at the hospice.

Through talking direct to patients, families and unpaid carers, Healthwatch Wiltshire's User Advisory group found:

 Dorothy House's services are highly valued but increased awareness and understanding of the range of services the hospice provides is needed.

- At the point of referral, patients want to talk to skilled staff with the time to talk to them in a personal way.
- It is important for carers and families to be heard and to be asked 'what would help you at the moment?' so that care is led by them.
- Enable people of working age and those at school or college to have access to groups at appropriate times of the day.



"Someone commented that they did not want to be 'assessed' but wanted a more human approach where they were simply listened to. It reminded me just how easy it is to slip into bureaucratic jargon when you work in a health or social care setting."

Lucie Woodruff, Healthwatch Wiltshire Manager, added: "The User Advisory Group has given patients, families and carers the opportunity to be a critical friend and has offered a fresh pair of

eyes to help Dorothy House continue to develop its services in ways that work for the people that use them.

"We've appreciated the time given by Dorothy House staff to present topics to the group, which enabled informed, productive discussions. The role of a local Healthwatch is to enable the community to help influence the way services are run and this engagement exercise has been a great example of this."

The group will continue to meet in 2018 to ensure the views of patients, families and their carers are reflected in the design and development of services provided by Dorothy House.

MALMESBURY 'Our Community Matters' Local issues: local action

1. Purpose of the Report

To update members on the progress made to address the priorities identified by the community at the 'Our Community Matters' Joint Strategic Assessment event held on 11 January 2017.

2. Background

The Malmesbury 'Our Community Matters' event was held on 11 January 2017 at Malmesbury Town Hall. Over 100 members of the public and partner agencies attended and participated in the event, which focused on the data set out in the *Community Area Joint Strategic Assessment 2016-17.*

The JSA brings together the results of research conducted by the major agencies and public sector bodies in Wiltshire over the last six months. The project was initiated by the Wiltshire Health and Wellbeing Board and the Wiltshire Assembly. These bodies will use the priorities emerging from the events to focus and support strategic projects, activities and services across Wiltshire.

Participants at the events used the data to inform themed roundtable discussions and to identify local priorities underpinned by the research. All participants had the opportunity to vote on the priorities and the results are set out in this report. Following agreement on the priorities, the themed roundtables then looked at practical community-led actions that could be taken to address the issues identified.

The purpose of the event was to:

- Gain a consensus around priorities for the area
- Provide the basis for community-led action and projects over the next two years
- Develop a community plan for the area
- Provide the Council and partners with a clear focus for local actions

The Area Board adopted these priorities shortly after the event and has since focused on supporting and facilitating local actions to tackle those priorities.

3. Priorities identified

The following documents set out the JSA analysis presented to the 'Our Community Matters' conference and the priorities identified by the community on the night. The following documents are available to view online:

- Summary of issues identified by the research.
- Priorities agreed at the event.

4. Moving forward with community-led action

To address the priorities, the Area Board has been using its strategic influence and delegated powers to shape the delivery of local services and actions. It has also used its delegated resources to facilitate and support community-led projects. The community engagement manager has been working with local community groups and partners, using the local priorities as a work plan. Some of the actions are easier to address than others and work has focussed on areas where tangible outcomes and progress can be delivered. This has helped to capitalise on the enthusiasm and momentum generated by the event.

5. Impact

Appendix 1 sets out the actions achieved since the 'Our Community Matters' event took place. This is a two-year programme and the first quarter figures represent the period between April – October 2017. The report shows the actions that have been delivered to address the priorities in the 10 JSA themes. It is important to note that these actions have been delivered by a wide range of agencies and are not solely the actions of the area board. The area board may have funded some actions or offered support to others. Some may have been independently by the groups concerned, but all help to address the priorities identified by the community.

6. Recommendations

- (1) That the area board notes the JSA Quarter 1 update report.
- (2) That the area board expresses its thanks to the organisations, groups and partners who have contributed actions that address the local priorities set by the community.

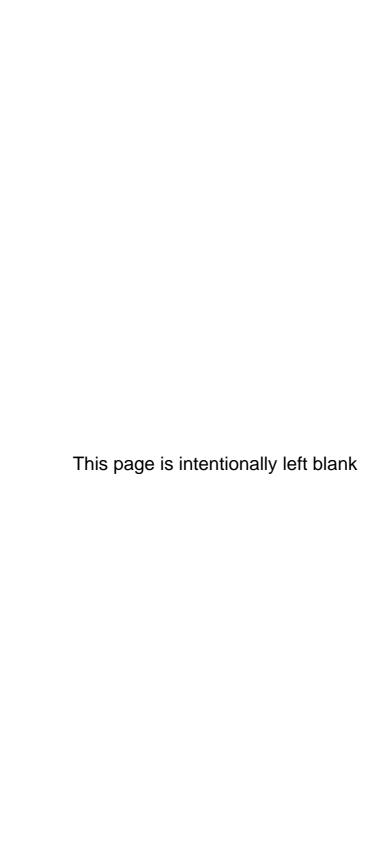

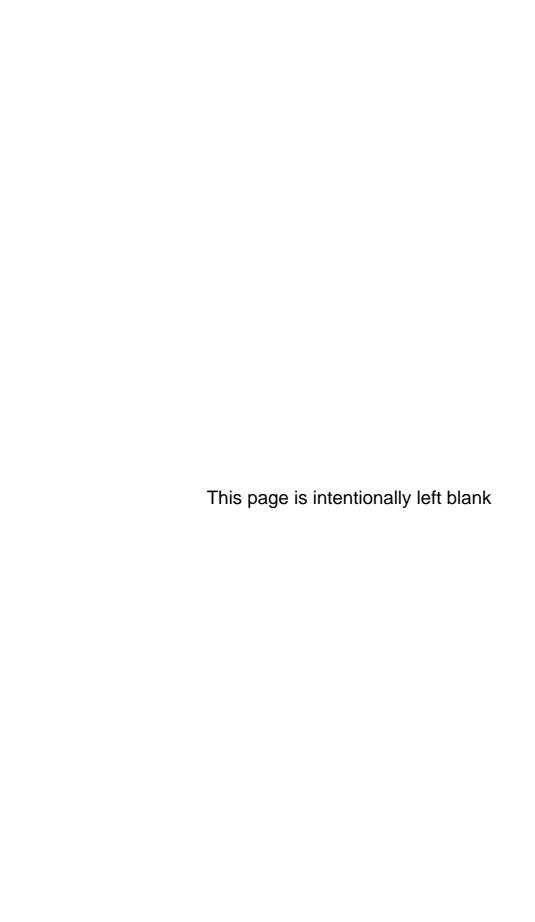
