Wiltshire Employment Support Team

Better known as WEST is a supported employment service for young people and adults with special educational needs and disabilities, including autism spectrum conditions. We aim to support our customers to find and keep a job.

We are part of the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Service at Wiltshire Council. We also provide support to Adult Care customers, so we support people from 14+.

What is Supported Employment?

A well defined approach to helping people with disabilities participate in the competitive labour market, helping them to find meaningful job and providing ongoing support from a team of professionals.

Where do we work?

All over wiltshire, if you meet eligibility and have a Wiltshire post-code, we can work with you.

Working with employers local to Wiltshire or within reasonable travelling distance, that could be in Hampshire, Swindon or other neighboring towns or counties.

What do we want?

For as many people to know of our service and that there is a pool of untapped talent and willing workforce in Wiltshire that could be of great benefit to employers.

We want the opportunity to meet with local employers to talk about their business and recruitment needs and negotiate positive employment opportunities for our customers.

Most of all we want to do what we can to level the playing field for people with higher support needs so they can compete to get jobs.

Research shows that only 6% of people with a learning disability and 15% of people with autism, are in paid employment, yet most want to work (Mencap).



The Team

We choose our Job Coaches for lots of different skills. Most of all their work ethic and what they can do to negotiate work opportunities with local employers. We know our stuff. We don't know everything, but we have a strong reputation.

The team are supportive, but they are not support workers.

Job Coaches specialise in employment, with the added bonus of previous backgrounds ranging from education to business.

Our priorities

Everyone has the right to work

and we are committed to helping people with higher support needs do that.

Getting a job is the top priority

supporting applications, interviews and on the job support. Speaking to employers and negotiating opportunities

The right support supporting customers in a person centred, but realistic way

Employer relationships employers in Wiltshire are our customers too and we value how pro-active and inclusive they can be. We work to maintain positive relationships and are on hand to provide support to them in making employing someone through our service smooth.

We only deal in paid work

If a paid job isn't what you are looking for then we are not the right service for you

We can signpost you to other places if you need it but we cannot support you with anything that isn't paid work. We don't want to lose our focus.

Community Connecting is another part of our wider team and they specialise in supporting people with inclusion to their local community, including joining a club, travel training and volunteer work.



Wiltshire Supported Internships

Supported Internships are designed for young people who really want to move into employment from education.

A study programme for a young person with learning disabilities or autism that want to move into employment and need extra support to do so. An important element is the opportunity for an extended work placement with the potential for a job offer at the end. We call these 'Working Interviews'. 'Aim to equip young people with the skills needed for work so they can achieve sustainable paid employment. The programme includes on-the-job training, backed by expert job coaches and college based learning'

Department for Education

What do we want from employers in Wiltshire?

a carved position that matches the intern where a paid position can be given when they display the skills required consistently

regular feedback that includes gaps in knowledge (support can then be put in place for this learning)

- hours can be flexible and could start on lower hours gradually increasing

PSPOs

Public Spaces Protection Orders (PSPOs) are one of the tools available under the Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing 2014 Act and replace Designated Public Place Orders (DPPO). New Guidance issued by the Local Government Association stated that any Orders in existence post 21 October 2017 would automatically be transferred to include any conditions covered by the DPPO. This applies to orders in: Trowbridge, Salisbury, Calne, Chippenham, Devizes, Durrington, Malmesbury and Warminster.

The legislation recognises that councils are often best placed to identify the broad and cumulative impact that ASB can have and additional conditions can be applied for. They must be evidence based and must not be covered by other primary legislation.

Councils can use PSPOs to prohibit specified activities, and/or require certain things to be done by people engaged in particular activities, within a defined public area. PSPOs differ from other tools introduced under the Act as they are council-led, and rather than targeting specific individuals or properties, they focus on the identified, evidence based problem behaviour in a specific location. Any conditions must be consulted on.

The legislation provides for restrictions to be placed on behaviour that apply to everyone in that locality (with the possible use of exemptions). Breach of a PSPO without a reasonable excuse is an offence. The enforcement will be managed by Wiltshire Police, they will issue fixed penalty notices which can incur fines of up to £1000. Alcohol conditions covered by the Orders can incur £500 fine if breached.

Wiltshire Council is keen to work with individuals to change their behaviour. Working with our drug and alcohol service, recipients of fines will now have the option to attend a drug and alcohol course to waiver the fine payment.

New signage is on order and the webpages will be updated to reflect this recent change in legislation.

Fixed Penalty Notices

A Police Officer may issue an FPN to anyone they have reason to believe has committed an offence and breached the PSPO without reasonable excuse under section 67 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing 2014 Act. The FPN should only be issued to over 18s.

This also applies in the case of orders that prohibit alcohol consumption, where it is reasonably believed that a person has been or intends to consume alcohol. It is an offence under section 63 either to fail to comply with a request not to consume or to surrender alcohol (or what is reasonably believed to be alcohol or a container for alcohol).

The front copy should be handed to the recipient and the second retained for your records. Wiltshire Council must be notified via <u>ASB@wiltshire.gov.uk</u> with a scanned copy of the FPN. This will enable the Council to prosecute if necessary.

There will also be an option to attend a Wiltshire substance misuse service course to waiver the fine. The information is contained on the back page of the FPN and should be handed to the recipient at the time of issue. The Officer should make the recipient aware that this option would waiver the fine payment.

Officers should consider circumstances where there may be a 'reasonable excuse' for breaching the Order. It may also provide a further opportunity, to recognise that those responsible may themselves be vulnerable and in need of support. They should therefore consider appropriate referral pathways where there are any safeguarding concerns.

Subject:	The new one-stop shop Work Wiltshire website

Key message:

On the 4th July, the new Work Wiltshire website launched. This is a unique website containing a huge range of education, employment and skills information which would normally have been located on several different sites and can now be found in one location with signposting to other relevant sites.

This website has been made to be accessible, attractive and a professional information hub. By having a one-stop-shop website, it will enable us to become the go-to place for career information, advice and signposting to relevant sites that the customers are looking for.

Work Wiltshire website contains information and links for: next steps in education, apprenticeships, information for employers, support available for those with barriers to work, information for those looking for work or wanting to upskill, financial support, further and higher education, local projects, support for schools and policies and data.

Questions:

How we set it up?

The Work Wiltshire website was originally created to support employers, employees and those looking for work. It then expanded to cover the programmes that the Employment and Skills Service were running, as well as providing career information, labour market intelligence, Wiltshire statistics, news and events and the services strategy.

The Employment and Skills service decided expand the website further and extend the range of audiences it catered for and allow them to access all the information they may need in one location. The redevelopment of the website was funded by Action 4 Wiltshire and has engaged with key stakeholders throughout the development to make sure that the website will work as effectively as possible and include tailored information to the different users.

Who were involved?

The main development of the website was conducted by the Employment and Skills Service at Wiltshire Council with stakeholders from Children's Services, Employment and Community Skills, local schools, Carer Support Wiltshire, Community First as well as others, contributing content and feedback to ensure the website is relevant, engaging and accessible.

What we are hoping to achieve?

A helpful and creditable website which enables local people and employers to find the key information and links they would like to know in one location.

Is this a model used elsewhere?

Other websites focus on specific sections which are included on the Work Wiltshire, but to our knowledge the combination of having all education, employment and skills information for young people, the general public, those with barriers to work and employers, all in one location is unique.

What has been the website take-up so far?

Since its launch we have had over 3,540 people use our website looking at 13,175 pages, with a wide variety of age demographics. The most popular pages so far being apprenticeships information for employers, apprenticeships, support for schools, and young people's next steps.

What can it do for people?

People will be able to search through the different sections on the website to find out education, employment and skills information. There is also a news section and events page, which shows the Employment and Skills service blog, local vacancies, Higher Education open days and much more.

It will help employers with find information and support for their business including how to set up an apprenticeship, free HR support, how business can get involved in local programmes, grants and other information.

It also has a dedicated section to help schools with careers education, giving information of local support, provision, the Wiltshire Careers Education Programme and support helping them arrange careers events.

It also has a section for those with complex needs and barriers to work; which highlights what support there is for them.

Subject:	Eat Out Eat Well Award Scheme

Public Protection is looking to work with Area Boards to increase coverage of the Eat Out Eat Well Scheme; targeting high street businesses and village locations.

The Eat Out Eat Well Award is included in the Wiltshire Obesity Strategy implementation plan and is offered free of charge to most types of food business that have achieved a Food Hygiene Rating of three stars or above.

The aims of the award:

- To encourage and assist caterers to increase the range and promotion of healthier options on their menu.
- Assist caterers in meeting the rising demand for healthier food via advice and low cost nutrition training.
- Acknowledge and promote caterers who make it easier for customers to eat healthily.
- Increase customer choice and help consumers make more informed choices.

The over arching aim is to increase choice for customers and profitability for businesses. It is not about removing 'unhealthy food' but making easily achievable adaptations, in some cases to make existing favourites healthier without compromising on sales and introduce new products. Experience to date has shown that this is realistic and achievable.

The award has three levels bronze, silver and gold and is open to most types of catering establishments including cafes, takeaways, schools, restaurants and workplace canteens that have been assessed as broadly compliant in terms of food safety and food standards and achieved a Star rating of three or more.

Achievement is determined via a points system that rewards healthier catering and reflects Government obesity messages; the increased use of fruit & vegetables, reductions in sugar and fat, increased fibre, reductions in refined and processed ingredients, use of healthier cooking techniques, portion control, marketing and pricing policies that encourage healthier choices.

An experienced assessor will visit the business to guide the food business operator through the process.

To date 261 businesses have signed up and are benefiting from the competitive edge that the award provides. Many businesses have reported cost savings as well.

Participating businesses are provided with a window sticker similar to those displaying a food hygiene rating and their details are entered on to the Eat Out Eat Well website.

Most types of food business that have a Food Hygiene Rating of three or above are eligible and can apply for an advisory visit and assessment to achieve a Gold, Silver or Bronze classification.

Residents asked if they would pay an extra £1 a month to protect local policing

"Would you be prepared to pay an extra pound a month to protect our police Force?" That's the question being asked by Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon Angus Macpherson.

The policing precept consultation which launches 2 January is looking for the views of Wiltshire residents on the proposed increase of £12 a year.

Currently the average band D household contributes £14.19 per month to local policing, but if residents back the proposal then this would rise to £15.19 per month.

Angus Macpherson said, "As a Force, Wiltshire Police has seen the second highest increase in demand across the country in the last year yet the funding we receive from central government doesn't recognise the increasing pressures our service is under.

"In fact we receive the fourth lowest funding per head of population in England and Wales.

Since 2010, Wiltshire Police has received £19 million less but have been responding to more crimes and supporting more members of the public year on year.

Mr Macpherson added, "Whilst we live in an incredibly safe county, there's only so far the budget will stretch and we're streamlining our services to ensure they're as efficient as possible at the same time as keeping the public safe, but we are feeling the squeeze more than ever.

"Without this increase Wiltshire Police will have to look at further reductions in officers and staff to close a budget gap of around £3m.

"That's why I'm asking whether residents in Wiltshire and Swindon would be prepared to pay an extra £1 a month to help bridge this gap.

"This increase will mean that I can protect frontline services from further reductions and maintain the current level of service."

The consultation which runs from 2nd January 2018 to midday 31st January 2018 wants to hear your views on the proposed increase.

LOCAL ISSUES/CRIMES

Burglaries - Chippenham remains a very safe place to live even though we have had a number of dwelling burglaries in particular in Cepen Park North and South also on the Pewsham estate and in rural villages. Our Community Tasking Team carried out high visibility patrols and covert patrols supported by the Community Policing Teams, Crime Prevention leaflets and advice were hand delivered by the local Police Community Support Officers, also assistance was provided from a local Councillor and the Residents Association with the delivering of the leaflets to the affected estates, this was appreciated and a fine example of working with our local community to help tackle a local problem. I am pleased to report that since this pro-active work has been carried out, the number of reports have ceased.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind members of the public to keep their properties secure and valuables safe, leave lights on if you are going to be out during the hours of darkness. Do keep serial numbers of high value goods and or photos of the items in particular jewellery. Often stolen items are more easily identifiable if they are uniquely marked. Do be vigilant and report any suspicious activity to the Police at the time of happening to ensure that they can attend.

<u>Vehicle Crime</u> – There has been a number of reports of thefts from motor vehicles in particular from vans containing tools/equipment. The Community Tasking Team along with the Community Policing Teams carried out pro-active patrols of those areas targeted and the number of reports has reduced significantly. Crime Prevention advice was circulated using social media.

<u>Theft</u> – There has been a number of thefts from shops. Alcohol, gifts sets and mobile phones are the items targeted mainly. Officers carried out high visibility foot patrols of the shops reassuring the community and to prevent further offences.

The festive period is traditionally the busiest time of the year for shopping unfortunately, there are those who exploit the festive period for the wrong reason and there has been a couple of purse thefts reported to us. Police highlighted this using social media and gave advice to shoppers to close their bags at all times ensuring that their purse or wallet was not easily accessible when not being used and not to leave their bags unattended in shopping trolleys when selecting their shopping.

<u>Other</u> - A 19 year old male was arrested and charged and appeared at Swindon Magistrates Court where he pleaded "guilty" to the following charges: Arrest by a constable for breaking/likely to break bail conditions, Burglary dwelling and theft - no violence, Aggravated vehicle taking and vehicle damage under £5000, Use a motor vehicle on a road/public place without third party insurance. He is on bail with conditions.

A local male who is a prolific shoplifter was sentenced to 16 weeks in Prison.

<u>Warrants</u> – We continue to develop intelligence to assist with the preparation of further warrants in the future, so they may be executed in line with the Force Control Strategy.

Drugs - Police stopped a grey Vauxhall Zafira on Malmesbury Road, a Section 23 Misuse of Drugs Act search of the vehicle was carried out and a quantity of suspected class A drugs were found and the driver subsequently arrested and was later released from custody under investigation.

Two local males were stopped and searched on Dallas Road, they were both arrested on suspicion of possession with intent to supply, Cannabis, and Class A drugs, their black Honda CBF125 was seized for having no insurance. They were later released from custody under investigation.

A number of Cannabis Street Warnings have been issued by officers as a result of Section 23 Misuse of Drugs Act stop searches.

Drink Drive Campaign – The Community Policing Team have been pro-active during the month of December as part of the Drink Drive Campaign. Thirty-five motorists in Wiltshire have been arrested since 1 December as part of Wiltshire Police's Christmas anti drink-drive campaign.

More than 1,700 roadside tests have been carried out with 31 drivers arrested for providing a positive test and four failing to provide a sample.

Chippenham Officers have issued tickets for speeding, defective tyres and seized a number of vehicles with no insurance. More importantly we provided community reassurance and raised awareness about the dangers of getting behind a wheel when not fit to do so.

<u>Pubwatch</u> - Officers have been encouraged to continue with Licensed Premises Checks in Chippenham and rural locations in particular to focus on this over the festive period. 'Pubwatch' has been successfully re-launched in the town and PCSO Barbara Young who has many years of experience working within Chippenham, will be the single point of contact for the Licensed Premises and the Police.

The deployment of the mobile CCTV van has proved valuable in particular during night time economy and officers are encouraged to use this resource.

Rough Sleepers/Street Drinkers - Chippenham CPT focused on rough sleepers as an ongoing sector priority to continue to approach rough sleepers, to engage and tackle their drinking/drug issues. There are only a handful of people actually sleeping rough in the town. Previously we have had a group of approximately 12-15 adults who meet in various locations where alcohol/drugs may be used, most recently St Andrews churchyard. This was impacting on the residents nearby, the local shops and those who use the church. This was a Sector Priority and pulse patrols were introduced throughout the shifts, officers engaged with individuals at this location. Officers used DPPO powers to confiscate alcohol (Designated Public Place Order), identified any substantive offences and moved them on from the area. Prevention and longer term strategies with partner agencies were discussed eg. Turning Point, we adopted a joint problem solving approach and we have not received any further complaints since. We continue to have close contact with the Outreach Worker, Probation, Housing Options and Unity House. The DPPO has now been replaced with a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO).

<u>ASB – Toilet, Bath Road car park</u> - Chippenham Town Council have had a number of reports where the toilet in Bath Road car park has had damage caused to it, blood and bodily fluids evident, discarded needles left in situ. They have contacted Wiltshire Council and requested that the canopy overlooking this location is demolished as this is potentially an aggravating factor. A meeting is due to take place on 12th January with various agencies, meanwhile the Police will carry out checks of the location when time permits to disrupt any activity other than the purpose it should serve!

<u>ASB</u> - Officers have been carrying out targeted patrols in the locations listed below due to a number of reports of ASB in these locations. Our Youth Offending Team (YOT) encouraged officers to inform YOT of youths coming to our attention even though they have not entered the Criminal Justice system so they may assist with early intervention if necessary.

Fire Service raises concerns over bioethanol fires

Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service (DWFRS) is asking owners of bioethanol real flame fires to ensure that they are fully aware of the fire risks they present.

Bioethanol real flame fires are becoming a popular feature in the home, especially at this time of year. They are easily affordable, provide the visual attraction of a real flame but don't require the installation of a flue or chimney.

There are two types of bioethanol real flame fires – those fuelled by bioethanol gel, and those that take liquid bioethanol fuel. Despite creating a homely atmosphere, these open flame heaters present a serious fire risk, despite only putting out a moderate amount of heat.

To ensure that owners remain safe while using their bioethanol fires, the Service is offering these top tips:

- Beware of cheap sub-standard products.
- Follow manufacturer's safety advice.
- Remember that bioethanol fuel is highly flammable.
- Flame can be almost invisible, especially when the fuel level becomes low.
- Refuel only when the fire has been extinguished and is cold.
- Use approved small containers to refuel.
- Wipe up any spillages before igniting the bioethanol. Keep fuel away from clothes. Don't refuel when under the influence of alcohol – spillages of fuel could more easily happen and go unnoticed.
- Light with a manual or electric taper. Don't use a lighter, match or lit rolled-up paper.
- Keep children and pets away from the fire.
- Don't move the appliance with the fuel lit.
- Store bioethanol in appropriate containers away from any naked flame and carefully consider where to keep fuel safely.
- Do not use fires in a room with poor ventilation.
- Installing a CO detector in room is recommended.
- Make sure the fire is out before leaving the room or going to sleep.

The Service were called to deal with a fire in Chippenham's cinema on Boxing Day. The fire involved batteries in the projection room. The fire was quickly dealt with and nobody was hurt.

Honest and open opinions from patients help to shape hospice care

Patients, their families and healthcare professionals at a leading hospice in Wiltshire are continuing to help shape the way services are run - thanks to a new group set up by Healthwatch Wiltshire.

Local volunteers from the county's independent health and care champion Healthwatch Wiltshire have spent the last 12 months meeting with patients and their families, unpaid carers and health professionals at Dorothy House Hospice Care.

The hospice commissioned Healthwatch Wiltshire to set up a User Advisory Group in September 2016 to provide an opportunity for those who use its services to give their open and honest opinions. This feedback has now helped to shape strategy and future plans for services at the hospice.

Through talking direct to patients, families and unpaid carers, Healthwatch Wiltshire's User Advisory group found:

- Dorothy House's services are highly valued but increased awareness and understanding of the range of services the hospice provides is needed.
- At the point of referral, patients want to talk to skilled staff with the time to talk to them in a personal way.
- It is important for carers and families to be heard and to be asked 'what would help you at the moment?' so that care is led by them.
- Enable people of working age and those at school or college to have access to groups at appropriate times of the day.

Susanna Watson, family support services manager at Dorothy House Hospice Care, said: "I found the feedback I received from the group very helpful. They had some very robust things to say about the whole language around 'assessments' and 'eligibility.'

"Someone commented that they did not want to be 'assessed' but wanted a more human approach where they were simply listened to. It reminded me just how easy it is to slip into bureaucratic jargon when you work in a health or social care setting."

Lucie Woodruff, Healthwatch Wiltshire Manager, added: "The User Advisory Group has given patients, families and carers the opportunity to be a critical friend and has offered a fresh pair of

eyes to help Dorothy House continue to develop its services in ways that work for the people that use them.

"We've appreciated the time given by Dorothy House staff to present topics to the group, which enabled informed, productive discussions. The role of a local Healthwatch is to enable the community to help influence the way services are run and this engagement exercise has been a great example of this."

The group will continue to meet in 2018 to ensure the views of patients, families and their carers are reflected in the design and development of services provided by Dorothy House.

Small changes can help you and your loved ones stay well this Winter

Helping people to look after their own health, and their families' health, especially during the colder weather can help you stay well and it also helps to manage demand on health services.

By following eight simple self-care health steps, you and your loved ones can stay well this winter:

S – see your pharmacist at the first sign of illness Pharmacists are not only medical experts; they can also offer advice and information on a range of minor illnesses and injuries. If you start to feel unwell this winter, even if it is just a cough or cold, get advice from your pharmacist before it gets more serious.

E – eat plenty of fruit and vegetables

A healthy diet is vital for your wellbeing, so try and eat five portions of fruit and vegetables every day. L – learn more about around the clock healthcare services in Wiltshire

In Wiltshire there are many options available for when you need medical advice and treatment. Consider all the choices available to help you make the right decision about where to go.

F – find out if you're eligible for a free flu vaccine

People who are eligible include those who are aged 65 years, pregnant women, anyone who is the main carer for another person or who is in receipt of a Carers' Allowance, and those with a long term condition such as diabetes or asthma.

C – check in on your neighbours

Winter can be dangerous for elderly people, so checking they have enough supplies will mean they don't need to go out in bad weather.

A – arrange to pick up your prescription

Many pharmacies and GP surgeries will be closed or have reduced working hours over the festive period. If you require a repeat prescription, make sure you order it in plenty of time.

R – restock your medicine cabinet

Looking after yourself when you're feeling under the weather with a minor illness is easy if you already have a stocked medicine cabinet.

E – ensure you stay warm

2. Background

The recommendation from the LYN Management Group has been made in accordance with the following guidelines:

Young people have considered this application and identified it as a priority for Area Board funding.

Following two recent heart related incidents one of which proved fatal residents are keen to install heart defibrillators in three key locations enabling assistance to be provided within critical timescales. Costs including training and installation are estimated at 6995 and villagers have succeeded in raising 2703 towards this. The Parish Council will contribute further funds to enable a 50 per cent contribution overall. An Area Board grant for the balance would enable future such incidents to be dealt with rapidly and with confidence due to the high quality of the proposed equipment and professional training.

The church is used for numerous community events and currently lacks a hearing loop and suitable visual system. This system will help enhance existing groups and start new ones. We use a temporary system that is put up and taken down which is inadequate and border line unsafe. These groups include wedding preparation days, parenting courses, weekly breakfast and lunch provisions, regular use by the local primary school toddlers group, community cream teas, Christmas lunch provision, concerts, various classes, cookery, flower arranging, meeting room charity points to highlight some main ones. All will be assisted and improved by this system.

Nov 2014 - Grant of £1,000 awarded by Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust (WCHT)

Oct 2015 – Unconditional grant of £5,000 awarded by Yatton Keynell Parish Council (YKPC). This grant was as a result of funding YKPC received to distribute to local organisations from the solar farm project.

July 2016 - Priest left

March 2017 – YKPC added condition to their award; funding would only be released upon the appointment of a new Priest who supported the installation

June 2017 – Area Dean confirms full support for the project, advises that the date for the appointment of a new Priest is unknown and that funds from WCHT may be lost if the release of YKPC funding is delayed.

Oct 2017 - the final faculty for the work was signed off by the Chancellor with 1 year to complete work

Oct 2017 - No applicants to advertised vacancy for Priest

Nov 2017 – Diocese decided not to recruit new Priest until after Easter 2018, earliest start date - Sept 2018

Nov 2017 – YKPC reviewed decision but declined to lift the condition imposed March 2017

We are obliged to seek alternative funding to enable this project to proceed; in the absence of the £5,000 funding award from YKPC, other funding and permissions will expire and the project will not be able to proceed. As, when and if the £5,000 award from YKPC is released, any award from the Area Board would of course be rescinded.
