15	<p><u>Welcome and Introductions</u></p> <p>The Chairman, Cllr Richard Britton welcomed everyone to the meeting of the Southern Wiltshire Area Board.</p>
16	<p><u>Apologies</u></p> <p>Apologies for absence were received from:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Inspector Pete Sparrow
17	<p><u>Minutes</u></p> <p>Mr Rodgers noted that under Item 11 - Waste and Recycling, a question had been asked and answered, which had not been included in the minutes, which related to a high proportion of waste going out of county, to Slough for incineration.</p> <p>The minutes of the previous meeting were agreed a correct record and signed by the Chairman.</p>
18	<p><u>Declarations of Interest</u></p> <p>There were none.</p>
19	<p><u>Chairman's Announcements</u></p> <p>The Chairman handed over to Cllr Clewer, who gave an update on the Boundary Review.</p> <p>The Boundary Review would set the number of Councillors we should have and where the boundaries should be. It is likely that Wiltshire Council would remain at 98 Councillors, which meant that the Area Boards could continue unchanged.</p> <p>The Council now had to decide on the boundaries to provide for equal representation and produce a framework of where we think the boundaries should be. Parishes should consider making recommendations, if they had strong feelings of who they wish to be in a division with.</p> <p>The Council submits its preferred preferences and the boundary commission makes the decision.</p>

	<p>Have a look at it and talk to your local member, submit any suggestions into the consultation which runs until 5th November 2018.</p> <p>Cllr Britton noted that it was a victory that it seems likely we shall be able maintain the 98 Councillors.</p>
20	<p><u>To note the written reports and updates in the agenda pack or distributed on the night</u></p> <p>The Board noted the following written reports attached to the agenda:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Fire & Rescue – circulated at the meeting and attached to the minutes • Wiltshire Council updates • Healthwatch Wiltshire
21	<p><u>Youth Leader Update</u></p> <p>Tom Bray, Community Engagement Manager gave an update.</p> <p>The Board had been working with the voluntary supported Youth Clubs across the area to find ways of providing additional support to plug some of the gaps in service that had cropped up. The Board wished to allocate some of the youth funding budget to support these clubs where possible with a paid worker, as it was felt that without support some of the clubs would be unable to continue.</p> <p>Tom explained that this initiative was in the early stages of development and further work would take place to establish the way forward, before coming back to the Board for consideration.</p> <p>The Board welcomed any comments, suggestions or proposals to be fed back to Tom outside of the meeting. Tom, urged input as he was anxious that the issue was addressed to enable the local initiatives and clubs to be sustained.</p> <p><u>Question:</u> Cllr Devine asked if Whiteparish was struggling for a youth worker, did that mean money was available in the pot? <u>Answer:</u> Tom noted that a small amount of funding was available, approximately £1100, we can use this to get it off the ground. The key aim was to keep Whiteparish going, and help get West Dean re-started.</p>
22	<p><u>Matters of Community Wide Interest</u></p> <p>Parish Councils and Community groups:</p> <p>Questions:</p>

- With regards to the Area Board security camera used to detect fly tipping, how often is it used, and had anyone been prosecuted over the last 6 months. Did the Board have any statistics, and who sets it up?
Answer: The camera was in constant use in a particular hotspot, 2 arrests had been made quite recently and were being pursued. One small problem was that a court order must be acquired before the camera could be positioned in a new location. There were similar hotspots in many areas, across southern Wiltshire. The Board was keen to see the camera in constant use.
- With regards to flytipping, in Alderbury, we had a couple of large heaps left, and one resident went through and found 3 pieces of evidence, which was then taken away by a Police Officer. We were later told that the person identified in the evidence, could not be traced as they had moved.
- Was there an update on the absence of salt this winter and having it delivered rather than parishes having to collect supplies in cars?
Answer: Salt would be available from the Highpost and we are working on getting salt bins filled up. A letter would be sent out to parishes shortly informing them of the new system.

Community Policing Team

A written update was circulated at the meeting and attached to the minutes. Inspector John Hutchings and Police and Crime Commissioner Angus Macpherson were in attendance.

There had been a series of attempted burglaries in the South of late, a suspect had been identified and an arrest made, we hope to be in a position to give a proper update at the next Area Board.

Visibility remained a key focus, it was paramount that Officers were out in the communities where possible. Where there were community events if you contact us we will do our best to have an Officer attend where possible.

This time of year, we see an increase in the level of hare coursing in the rural areas. This was something the force was trying to get a grip of, across the whole of the county.

We have 40 Special Constables on the books at present, with the South of the county being the busiest area for our Specials' activity. These Officers have put in 2329 hrs which equated to £22k saved as a result of that volunteer activity.

Community Speedwatch was regularly supported by Police

Questions:

- Alderbury – We still have not seen our PCSO since he first came. When we had Tina she would try and attend a Parish Council meeting, or she

	<p>would often just pop in, she was seen to be around. We have not seen our current PCSO. <u>Answer:</u> You have got one, he is there and he does work on your patch.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Winterslow – We invited the new PCSO to come to our Parish Council meeting, but he did not attend. <u>Answer:</u> Unfortunately attending Parish Council meetings has been put on the back burner, staffing issues have meant that we have been under pressure. You will be getting a better service with regards to visibility. • Winterslow – Could your dog handler, who lives in the village exercise his dog in uniform? <u>Answer:</u> Lovely idea but not possible. • The PCC Angus Macpherson noted that he was in attendance to hear how the local teams were interacting with the Parishes and the Area Board. It had been a very troubling time for Wiltshire Police especially in the South of the county. Good to hear about the support the Specials are giving to the provision of cover for the county. <u>Answer:</u> The Chairman noted that the main issue was the lack of visibility, however the Area Board has a good level of communication with our local Policing Team. • Could Tina be asked how she managed to get around to us all on the same hours, and how could that good practice be copied? • Cllr Devine – A couple of years ago there was an outbreak of rural crime and there was not much patrolling at the time. This was at a time when we had rural Police stations in operation. Now we have Salisbury Police station only, we do not see the Officers in the rural locations from one month to the next. The criminals are not stupid, they will pick up on the areas with no Police presence. <u>Answer:</u> I hear what you are saying, most of our resources at 2am on a Saturday are focused around Salisbury, if we draw our Officers away to rural areas, this could result in an incident where we do not have the Officers where we need them during incidents of crime and disorder. It was a fact of life that we do not have the luxury of having the Community Bobby on your doorstep. <p>To contact Inspector Hutchings: John.hutchings@wiltshire.police.pnn</p>
23	<p><u>Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG)</u></p> <p>The Chairman explained that for the past four months, the Board had tried to organise a speaker from the CCG to attend, to explain were they fit in the overall provision of healthcare.</p> <p>Linda Prosser, Interim Chief Officer for CCG gave a presentation. A copy of the</p>

slides are attached to the minutes.

The CCG was formed so that the GPs that first see you when you are unwell can direct you to a service. They are also the ones who hold the money.

We have a governing body with representation from 3 groups – North East Wiltshire, Sarum & West Wiltshire.

We are here to make sure we get the best health care outcomes for our money.

With £600 million in allocated funds for the entire populations healthcare.

We spend a lot of time trying to create alternatives for people which can be less costly.

We choose how best to spend our money, with half of the money going to hospitals, primary care getting 14% of the budget, and community nurses and podiatry receiving only 7%, which equates to £40 million.

We want to invest more in helping people take care of themselves were possible.

We currently have 49 GP practices, where a year ago we had 54. Some smaller practices are starting to join up with others to survive. Joining up practices can save time on administration and business practices, freeing up time of the doctors to see more people. It's important to bear in mind that GP Practices are privately-owned businesses.

More people are able to access care in their own homes now than ever before, partly because of the technology we now have available to us.

Salisbury A&E was one of the best in the country last year, this year, over the last few months it has been getting harder to meet targets.

Questions included:

- Where does Healthwatch fit in? Answer: Part of our duty is that we engage the public for an informed opinion. We previously paid Healthwatch to engage the public on our behalf, whereas now, we have started to do some of this work ourselves. We are spread more thinly so we need to find new ways to reach out to harder to reach groups and individuals.
- It is a surprise that Three Chequers was rated as outstanding, as they are going through a difficult phase at the moment. Winterslow surgery has been closed recently without notice and prescriptions have not been released. This has meant that some people have to travel to Porton to collect half a prescription. When surgeries combine, there is past expertise, which could be shared in the process to improve the transition. Answer: These are independent businesses who we have a contract

	<p>with. There are some teething problems. We can make some enquiries as to why the pharmacy has been closed.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Talking about keeping people in the community, what is the potential with Adult Social Care and CCG working together? <u>Answer:</u> The relationship between CCG and the Council is the best it has been in years. We are looking at joint posts between us. • Only 8% of funding is available for Mental Health services. The GPs take is that there is nothing available, so the burden then falls on families to try and help support their loved one. <u>Answer:</u> This is recognised as an issue locally and nationally. Each year we have to get closer to the target, in Wiltshire we exceed that. We are working closely with AWP, mental health provider with adults. We will want to try and get some feedback from groups like this. • Preventative medicine was mentioned but it was not shown on the pie chart. <u>Answer:</u> This is because it was moved to the local authority. • Contracts are coming to an end in March for Social Health Care. It is really important that the lessons learnt are taken forward. <u>Answer:</u> We will not decommission it but we will re-commission it. • You are keen to offer the best health care for every pound spent, so if we had ideas about how money could be better spent, how do we communicate these to you? <u>Answer:</u> Tom will give me your contact and I will respond.
24	<p><u>Adult Social Care in Wiltshire</u></p> <p>One of Wiltshire Council's strategic priorities is to protect the vulnerable within the community, and one important thread in providing this is the provision of Adult Social Care. Cllr Jerry Wickham, Cabinet Member for Adult Social care and Public Protection gave a presentation, some of the key points were:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In Wiltshire the average life expectancy for a man is 81, down in the south of the county it is 83, for women the average is 84, and in the south it is 88. • The important thing is to have a healthy life. The average age to encounter a health problem, for men is 64 and women 67. • We have a time bomb, with more and more people moving in to those age categories, this is an issue that WC has to address. • £20 billion is given to the NHS over a period of years, whereas local councils got nothing. • The pressure is on in terms of how we pay for adult social care. 38p from every £1 collected in council tax will be spent on Adult Social Care, in Wiltshire we are already spending that.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Council has a business plan, one of our main aims set out in the plan is to protect children and the vulnerable. • We are limited in what we can do to squeeze the budgets. A survey stated that in Wiltshire, we were third best at hourly pay for care workers across the country. We struggle to get enough care workers, especially in this part of the County. • We are trying to keep as many people as possible at home, as we know that people do better in their own homes. • In 2017/18, there were 1,722 individuals in residential and nursing care, with 811 service users receiving a direct payment. 6,811 individuals received a social care service. 557 individuals living in extra care or supported living placements. 9,449 requests for adult social care support of which 5,240 resulted in no further support. <p>Questions included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Over half of the people that come for services do not need it and waste time, do these people deteriorate quickly and then become costlier to care for? <u>Answer:</u> We cannot afford the gold standard anymore, so if you were a self-funder, you would be signposted off to somewhere you can get your own care. Where there is a need for someone to be assessed they will be. • When someone is in a home, and they run out of money, or get down to the last £23.5k, and then there is a short fall due to the room they are in, would they be prevented from using their own money to top up? <u>Answer:</u> There is a new charging policy. If you are in a residential home, then all of your assets are included. There is also a middle bracket of people whose families are topping up. • A when it comes to the more critical side of things we have the trust. We work closely with groups, but no doubt that more money could be spent on mental health. The closing of Fountain Way in Salisbury and the moving people in custody with mental health issues to Devizes now. <u>Answer:</u> We are in a position of trying to split our money accordingly, always trying to make things more efficient.
25	<p><u>Community Area Transport Group (CATG) Update</u></p> <p>The Board noted the minutes of the last CATG meeting held on 22 August 2018, and considered the recommendations arising from it.</p> <p>The Chairman noted that the issue of improvements to highway 10, Milford Mill Road, was a project that had been started to be discussed some years ago. This project would finally be complete in the next three weeks.</p>

	<p><u>Decision</u> The Southern Wiltshire Area Board approved the recommendations of the CATG as detailed in the report.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Issue 5541 - £1500, for additional signage in Coombe Bissett (with a £500 contribution from the PC) • Issue 6522 - £717, for a SID for Landford & Whiteparish • Issue 6523 - £300, for a 20mph roundel and repainting of a white line on the Coombe Bissett to Homington Road <p>The Chairman noted that there was still over £12,000 remaining, so if any parish had a scheme, he urged them to come forward.</p>
26	<p><u>Community Area Grants</u></p> <p>The Board considered 3 applications for funding from the Community Area Grant Scheme for 2018/19, as details in the report attached to the agenda.</p> <p>Winterslow Village Hall applied for £2,100 towards a projection screen. It was confirmed that the money shown as reserves on the application form was to repay a solar panel loan.</p> <p><u>Decision</u> Winterslow Village Hall was awarded £2100 towards a projector screen. <i>Reason</i> <i>The application met the Community Area Grants criteria for 2018/19.</i></p> <p>Coombe Bissett Parish Council applied for £307.50, to replace the seat on the Homington Triangle.</p> <p>It was confirmed that the Parish Council would be paying half of the total project cost.</p> <p><u>Decision</u> Coombe Bissett Parish Council was awarded £307.50 for a replacement seat on Homington Triangle. <i>Reason</i> <i>The application met the Community Area Grants criteria for 2018/19.</i></p> <p>Downton Parish Council applied for £8,000 for an audio and visual hearing loop set up for the new Memorial Hall.</p> <p>It was confirmed that this was nearly a 10-year project at a cost of approximately £1.2 million. Funding had predominantly come from S106 moneys from the local housing development.</p>

	<p>The Chairman noted that this was a worthwhile project, and a good example of providing new facilities to the community. The Board agreed that this project was an exception to the usual £5,000 maximum allocation.</p> <p><u>Decision</u> Downton Parish Council was awarded £8,000 towards audio and visual hearing loop equipment.</p> <p><i>Reason</i> <i>The application met the Community Area Grants criteria for 2018/19.</i></p>
27	<p><u>Close</u></p> <p>The Chairman thanked everyone for coming and closed the meeting.</p> <p>The next meeting of the Southern Wiltshire Area Board is scheduled for Thursday 29th November 2018, 7.00pm at Trafalgar School, Downton.</p>



South West Wiltshire Area Board 21st November

A busy period for everyone following a very hot and dry summer, seeing crews dealing with large heath fires in very demanding conditions.

Despite this the teams that form part of South Wiltshire continue to strive forward in making gains in their activities in and around their community. Some examples for you:

- Safe & Well-Being Visits increase on a monthly basis
- Members of Red Watch will attend Salisbury Cathedral in Nov in recognition of their efforts during the chemical attacks.
- Hosting NHS Blood Donation at the fire station in Salisbury in October and the New Year
- Working with local Parishes with their operational Flood Working Group
- Amesbury Fire Station will host a Recruitment Drive at a local supermarket
- Teams will attend local events such as Cancer Awareness Event at Salisbury, Wiltshire Council continue to supply event details for community events.
- Remembering those that were lost on Remembrance Sunday

With unseasonable highs and a possible expectation of cold snaps through the winter months it's time to think about how to stay safe in your home.



Chimney Safety



A clean chimney can help prevent fires and structural damage to your property. Regular cleaning of your chimney or flue will eliminate the build-up of soot and clear obstructions such as bird or animal nests, leaves and debris.

It is not enough to use a vacuum cleaner and you should make sure that your chimney or flue is inspected regularly.

Chimneys should be swept:

- At least once a year when using smokeless fuels
- At least once a year when using bituminous coal
- Every three months when burning wood
- Once a year when using oil
- Once a year when using gas

The following safety advice should always be followed when lighting an open fire or woodburning stove:

- Don't use flammable liquids such as petrol or paraffin to light your fire.
- Don't burn excessive amounts of paper or rubbish.
- Don't overload the fire with fuel.

When the fire is alight, check the loft space occasionally to make sure there is no smoke leaking from cracks, defective brickwork or mortar joints.

Keeping Warm in the Winter

Keeping warm in the winter means using portable heaters, electric blankets or wheatbags – but all of these carry a fire risk.

Portable heaters



- Keep heaters at least one metre (3ft) away from curtains and furniture.
- Never use portable heaters for drying clothes.
- Always unplug portable heaters before going to bed or leaving the property.
- Only use gas and paraffin heaters in well ventilated areas.

Open fires



- Keep chimneys and flues clean and well maintained, ensuring that they are swept at least once a year.
- Make sure you always use a fireguard to protect against sparks and hot embers.
- Don't hang laundry too close to the fire in case of sparks.
- Ensure that the fire is fully out before you go to bed or leave the property.

Gas fires



- A Gas Safe registered engineer should carry out installation and maintenance.
- Ventilation is essential – vents should never be blocked or obstructed.
- Do not turn any electrical switches on or off if you can smell gas.
- If you can smell gas, get out of the property and call 999.

Electric blankets



- When buying an electric blanket, go to a reputable retailer and make sure the product meets the current UK and European safety standards – for example, BEAB Approved.
- Always read the manufacturer's instructions before use.
- Never use a hot water bottle in the same bed as an electric blanket, even if the blanket is switched off.
- Unplug blankets before you get into bed unless they have a thermostat control for safe all-night use.
- When storing an electric blanket, don't fold it as this may damage the internal wiring. Store flat or rolled up.
- Examine the blanket regularly for signs of wear and tear – for example, worn or frayed fabric, scorch marks, wires poking through the material, any damage to the flex. If you find an issue, get the blanket replaced.
- Get your blanket tested by a qualified electrician at least every three years and replace blankets every ten years.

We will fit free smoke alarms where required and offer advice to make you and your family safer and healthier in your home. The appointment normally lasts about one hour and covers topics such as:

- Using electricity safely
- Cooking safely
- Making an escape plan
- What to do if there is a fire
- Keeping children safe
- Good practice – night time routine and other points relevant to you
- Identifying and discussing any further support you may need if necessary

How to register for a S&W Visit

Anyone applying for a FREE Safe and Well visit will be assessed and prioritised. On the outcome of a few simple questions the service will be able to determine those most at risk and a visit will be arranged. Some simple questioning might be:

Does only one adult live at the property?

Would anyone living in the property have difficulty in escaping the property in the event of a fire?

Does anyone living within the property have any impairments (Physical or Mental)?

Does anyone within this property hoard?

Has the occupier been discharged from hospital in the last 4 weeks or use medical oxygen?

Does this property have no smoke detectors or old smoke detectors?

Is anyone living at the property a smoker?

Is anyone living at the property over 65 years old?

Is anyone living at the property over 85 years old?

Are portable/plug in heaters used in the property?

Do you consider yourself or anyone in the property as vulnerable?

Thatched Properties



The counties of Dorset and Wiltshire have thousands of thatched homes – although there is no increased risk of fire within thatched properties, the impact of a fire is far greater.

Thatch fires are typically attended by in excess of 50 firefighters, at least eight appliances and often for over 24 hours. The National Society of Master Thatchers estimate that the average cost of a thatch fire is in excess of £45,000.

Recruitment

On-Call Recruitment(RDS)

Recruitment is still in progress due to the continuing ebb and flow of staff. Reports that there are no major concerns is promising but Amesbury (RDS) staffing levels could be higher. A positive drive is underway to try and resolve this shortfall. Currently Amesbury provide fairly good coverage throughout the day.

Salisbury (RDS) have a good working relationship with the Wholetime Duty System(WDS) and still maintain a very good level of availability whilst displaying a very healthy attitude towards their work. Wilton (RDS) continue to provide good coverage but still need to recruit a few more people so that they reach capacity.

The service is still moving to new method of payment for its on-call staff. This will be a salary based scheme rather than utilising a retaining fee. This means on call staff will be rewarded for the cover they give rather than the incidents they attend. It will cost the service more money, but it is believed that it will result in better appliance availability.

Recruitment campaign

Your local station is recruiting On-call (retained) firefighters are ordinary people doing extraordinary work – they are men and women who may have other jobs or responsibilities as well as their vital role with the Fire & Rescue Service. On-call firefighters are part-time staff who make themselves available for emergency call-outs depending on their other commitments. They are usually contracted for between 48 and 120 hours per week, but this can vary. Between them, each fire station team will provide cover for weekdays, evenings, nights and weekends.

How many firefighters are on-call?

Some 60% of firefighters in Dorset and Wiltshire work on an on-call basis, making them hugely important to both the Service and the communities that they serve. Of our 50 stations, the majority are crewed only by on-call firefighters and on-call staff work alongside their wholetime colleagues at many of our other stations.



Who can be an on-call firefighter?

Our on-call staff come from all walks of life: they may be employed, self-employed, parents at home or students. Some work in building or allied trades, whilst others are shop assistants, farmers, typists, factory workers or managers.

What they all have in common is self-reliance, confidence, respect, enthusiasm, team spirit and a willingness to be ready for anything when they are alerted to an emergency. On-call and wholetime firefighters are expected to meet the same entry standards and they receive the same training and development to enable them to work to common standards.

Who can apply?

You can find out more about the role and current vacancies through these pages, but key requirements for applicants are:

- You must be at least 18 years old when you join us (you can apply once you are 17½)
- You must be able to respond and attend the fire station within five minutes (this can vary slightly dependant on location)
- You must have a good standard of physical fitness
- You must have the right to work in the UK If you are unsure if you can apply

Community Engagement



Salisbury Fire Station continues to proactively use our Pinpoint programme or our Community Map which allows us to see the risks to our community geographically and therefore target specific properties for High Risk Safe and Well (S&W) visits. Following incidents at domestic properties any serious concerns are dealt with through a S&W visit or referred through the Safe-Guarding process.

Wilton & Amesbury

- Delivery of the new ALP will occur in the New Year and staff will be trained in how to operate it which members becoming in-house instructors to ensure competency and professionalism.
- Delivery of the Technical Rescue Vehicle has occurred and on-going training in both Water Rescue & Large Animal Rescue will enhance the response of the station.
- Wilton will become a Wading Response Team in the New Year – training has been programmed in.
- The proposed works for a Command Training Suite has begun at Salisbury. This will ensure that Operational Commanders are trained and assessed so that they meet the demands of an Incident.
- Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary and Fire & Rescue Services (HMICFRS) They will be carrying out reality testing at most of our fire stations, and our protection and prevention offices, as well as interviewing SLT members, heads of department and other members of staff. HMICFRS update - fieldwork visit 19 to 23 November This work begins on Monday 19 November and concludes on Friday 23 November. A hot debrief will be delivered by HMICFRS inspectors on Wednesday 28 November.
- Amesbury will continue with their recruitment drive with Have a go Day planned for the New Year. An advert placed in a local magazine – Stonehenge Trader, will also advertise On-Call-Recruitment in December.

Subject: Banning of Sky Lanterns and Balloon Releases on Wiltshire Council Land.

Large scale balloon and sky lantern releases are familiar sights and are often carried out at events to remember lost loved ones or mark other special events. Wiltshire Council is the latest to pass the ban on the release of balloons and sky lanterns on its land, following a report on the environmental and wildlife impact. The ban includes biodegradable balloons, as balloons cannot degrade quickly enough to not prove a hazard for wildlife.

The council understands that there are different reasons that people may wish to take part in organised balloon / sky lantern release events, however there are other activities that can be undertaken. We hope this move by Wiltshire Council will help to raise awareness of the issue and will encourage other Town and Parish Councils to take a similar approach.



Improved access to GPs

From 1 October 2018 people registered with a Wiltshire practice are able to book routine appointments to see a GP, practice nurse or other health professional in the evenings from 6.30pm to 8pm, and at weekends and Bank Holidays.

Across the population of Wiltshire there is an additional 235 hours per week of clinical time in this move to improve access to health services.

You won't always be able to see your registered GP and may need to go to a different practice in your area to take up the after-hours and weekend appointments.

GP Alliance

The Wiltshire GP Alliance (WGPA) is a not-for-profit group made up of almost all the GPs across Wiltshire. It aims to help practices work better together to improve GP resilience, and stimulate and share improvements – for instance with availability of GP appointments – across the county.

WGPA are managing the improved access provision in Wiltshire which means surgeries are now working together to provide extra appointments in the evening and at weekends.

STAY WELL THIS WINTER

The first phase of national advertising and promotion is focusing on increasing the number of people who call 111 when they have an urgent but not life-threatening medical need. The aim is reduce the number of people going to A&E departments or calling 999. The NHS 111 campaign runs from 1 October to 25 November 2018.

The next phase is Stay Well This Winter which in October is encouraging people to get a flu vaccination, and then in November includes messaging around early and effective treatment for respiratory ailments. The November campaign will focus on older people and people with long-term health conditions.


Other campaign elements in coming months will focus on extended GP access, NHS 111 online and pharmacy.

Keep Antibiotics Working

Public Health England's 'Keep Antibiotics Working' campaign returned on Tuesday 23rd October to alert the public to the risks of antibiotic resistance with the aim of reducing patient's expectation for antibiotics.

Whilst antibiotics are vital for treating many infections, there is evidence that antibiotics are often used when they are not needed, for example, for viral infections such as colds or flu where they are not effective or for illnesses that can get better by themselves. Research has shown that this is, at least in part, due to patients expecting antibiotics, without understanding that they may not be effective for their illness.

Area Board Update November 2018

Key findings from Campervan and Comments Tour 2017

Last summer's Campervan and Comments Tour saw Healthwatch Wiltshire staff and volunteers travel 400 miles around Wiltshire to gather the views and experiences of people of all ages on health and care services.

Taking to the roads in a classic 1969 VW campervan, we parked up at a variety of locations around the county, collecting 2,077 comments during the two-week tour.

Overall, we received more positive comments than negative ones.

A full report with recommendations will be available soon.

This project was conducted under Healthwatch Wiltshire's previous provider, Evolving Communities.



What people told us...

Most people were happy with the treatment they received from their GP but were unhappy about long waiting times to get appointments.

Hospital maternity, children's and cancer services were highlighted as good, but long waits to see consultants drew negative comments.

Communication between hospitals and other services came in for criticism, and experiences of using social care services appeared to be inconsistent.

Delays in accessing mental health services were the main concern for most people, but many also said staff were helpful and treated them well.

Most people told us they were happy with their dentist and the quality of treatment they received, whether NHS or private.

Welcome to the third edition of the new South Wiltshire Community Policing Team Area Board report.

As previously stated, you will notice that it is a little more comprehensive than you are used to, as henceforth my intention is to include the entire South Wiltshire CPT within the body of a single report. The idea is that it will give a much greater understanding of the issues facing South Wiltshire as a whole community, rather than in isolation by single area.

My policing team operate on the basis of 'One Team' and as such, resources are moved around on a daily basis according to demand. Whilst each Police Officer and our PCSO's will still retain ownership of a given area in terms of longer term problem solving approaches, the very nature of policing and answering calls for service often dictate that officers are brought together from the wider area to respond to given circumstances. This has always been and will continue to be the case.

You will note that I have this month, added a 6th item to the list below, which I will continue to report on henceforth.

We are so incredibly proud of our Special Constabulary Officers: The time they give, the effort they make, the results they produce, the confidence and support they provide to both colleagues and our communities is nothing short of incredible. There is no doubt that we would be lost without them and for that reason they deserve their own spotlight in this report.

Since the last report there has been some good news in relation to the location of the policing teams in Salisbury, as we have successfully co-located back in to Bournehill with our Council colleagues. This is a great feeling, as the refreshed premises are brighter and airier than we previously had and it has been significantly de-cluttered which is always a good thing!

All being well the policing activity as a result of Operation Fairline and Fortis are drawing to a close and some normality will return to operations accordingly. Throughout the incidents, I am very proud of the fact that despite being only a small force, we managed to maintain business as usual with our

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policing teams, despite the significant demands placed upon them and this was helped greatly by the support shown by the South Wiltshire communities whom we serve and we would like to thank everyone for that support.

Staffing

With the recent changes in CPT boundaries I am proud to say that I now have available some 147 officers and staff under my command. This does not include over 40 members of our Special Constabulary. These consultations are a great way to meet and greet my staff that are local to you and are a great way for you to raise any issues that you may have directly with an officer or PCSO at that time.

Neighbourhood Tasking Meetings

The next Tidworth/Ludgershall NTG is planned for 6th November at 14.30 hours in Ludgershall at the Town Council Office, with the next planned for February 5th 2019 at 1430hrs.

The next Amesbury/Durrington/Bulford/Larkhill/ Figheldean NTG is planned for 10th January 2019 at 1900hrs at Amesbury Police Station.

Amesbury Rural's next meeting is planned for 20th March 2019.

Independent Advisory Group (IAG)

This year has seen the development and setting up of the first IAG for the South of the County which sits 4 times a year. This group is made up of members of the public from a diverse background to assist us as an organisation with advice from the ground on certain aspects of our work. This has included consultation on the use of Spit Hoods for example to see how such items of equipment might be viewed by our communities and this source of feedback has proved very useful.

Particular Issues and Crime Series

Salisbury City.

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Dangerous Drug Networks (DDN's) - Despite significant disruptions through proactive policing, gangs are continuing to infiltrate the south of the county peddling drugs and preying on our most vulnerable within the community. The war against drugs is a long fought one and we will continue in our efforts to disrupt activity, arrest offenders and bring them to justice whilst protecting the vulnerable in the process.

We cannot be complacent in our effort and attention to this area of our business, as the tendrils of drug addiction and the destructive behaviour that it breeds are prevalent in every town on our area.

Closure orders continue to be an effective tool to assist in the prevention of crime and safeguarding of the vulnerable within the City Centre. The most recent has been achieved only this week commencing 5th November.

Any intelligence in this regard is always welcome and can be fed in to the system via speaking to an officer or member of staff, e-mail or through **Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111**.

Purple Flag

The Chief Constable accompanied officers on patrol over the weekend of 27th October in support of Salisbury Purple Flag. He visited several licenced premises and areas of the city where the vulnerable can be found. He also assisted in the arrest of a male found committing criminal damage in the City.

Harnham

Ongoing multi-agency work continues - in Essex Square to support 'sensitive let' scheme which has been successful in tackling issues of ASB and misuse of drugs. PCSO WARD will continue to work closely with Wiltshire Council colleagues and our Teams will support with targeted patrols and enforcement action where appropriate.

Catapult related damage and ASB - We have continued with targeted patrols in response to recent reports of young people behaving in an antisocial way, using catapults to injure birds and cause damage. Hotspots include Harnham recreation ground, Town path, Middle and Lower Street. Regular 'PULSE' patrols have been undertaken by my teams and the reports have subsequently decreased. The hot weather and summer holidays has no doubt contributed to this developing situation, but I am pleased to report that a swift and robust patrol strategy does seem to be working and these will continue throughout the holidays at least.

South Rural

- **Vehicle crime**
Targeted patrols of hotspots. Vehicles targeted at 'beauty spot' locations and works vans targeted for power tools
- **Patrols to target Rural crime and Poaching**
Patrols by Police officers and PCSOs to target both daytime and night poaching at identified hotspots. Ongoing liaison and intelligence sharing with Hampshire Police to target cross border

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offending. Local PCSOs will continue to run targeted rural operations with support from our Rural Crime Team, Rural Special Constables and local farmers and landowners (latest Operations were conducted on the nights of Thurs 11th and 26th Oct).

- **ASB/ Catapult related Criminal Damage - Downton**
Additional foot patrols (focused on Moot Lane/ High Street) following reports of damage and ASB linked to use of catapults. Stop/ search powers to be used where grounds exist – catapults and ammunition will be seized.
- **Fly Tipping**
Following a successful operation targeting Fly Tippers in partnership with Environmental Health Officers, I am pleased to report that so far 10 persons have since been interviewed under caution and the investigations continues.

Amesbury and Tidworth

Target Patrols Tidworth/Ludgershall and surrounding areas

These continue to tackle reported ASB and drug taking.

Following complaints from the Community targeted patrol commenced to offer reassurance and gather intelligence. The concerns were around possible drug use at the location along with anti-social behaviour. To date some 112 patrols have taken place resulting in the policing team continuing to gather intelligence and refer the people causing issues to the relevant agencies for actions to be taken.

Target Patrols Amesbury and surrounding areas

Large disorder

Due to a large disorder which occurred in daylight hours in the car park at the Pavilion on Archers Gate, a target patrol commenced on 3rd November.

Tool Thefts

These continue across the area and activity to catch and disrupt offenders is ongoing. We have managed to re-unite recovered tools with their owners in recent weeks.

Shrewton

Due to complaints from the Community a new target patrol commenced on 31st August. The purpose of this patrol is to target lorries/heavy vehicles who contravene the 3.5 tonne weight limit on B3086 London Road Shrewton. The restriction is in place, and sign posted, from the Rollestone cross roads B3086 (heading into Shrewton) continues through the Village High Street and finishes at the mini



roundabout by the co-op (where it joins the A360). To date some 17 patrols were commenced and this action has now been closed for passing attention..

Community Speedwatch

Amesbury and Salisbury have now combined this priority and actively engage both in company with and independently of CSW teams. Communities have reported back positively with regard to the visible police presence this affords them and this activity will continue across the South.

Special Constabulary Update

Our SPC's continue to provide fantastic support to the local policing teams across the county and in particular the South. So far this year this equates to over 63,000 hours of service to the community and 51% of those have been spent across County Division of which South CPT forms part. Since June our SPC's have provided some 5,500 hours to supporting policing operations in the South and they will be very active again this weekend with Remembrance Parades across the area.

Concerns are continuing to be managed with our partners around the highways issues raised since the closure of the byways following Summer Solstice and this work is ongoing.

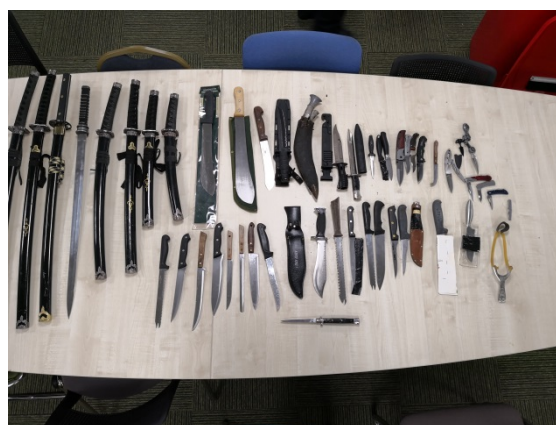
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Operation Sceptre - Update

Operation Sceptre is a national Police initiative run approximately 4 times a year. It targets knife crime and possession in the UK. It is a Home Office led initiative. The operation will start on 17th September 2018 for 2 weeks. We will look to tackle prevention and awareness amongst children and young people, whilst also dealing with criminals who carry weapons to facilitate other types of activity such as County Lines.

Events held in the Market Place Salisbury and the College were all well received and a haul of some 100 bladed weapons was handed in during the amnesty in Salisbury alone.



Salisbury City Centre

Visible patrols and public engagement in Salisbury City Centre. This priority focus is on anti-social behaviour, street drinkers and disorder. CPT are working in partnership with Venture Security, BID and pub watch. It also aims to speak with rough sleepers, some of which are vulnerable in order to check on their welfare and signpost them to other agencies via www.streetlink.org.uk which triggers intervention from the local authority/outreach service that can provide help and assistance.

Officers are also making regular welfare visits to various addresses within the City Centre and the immediate surrounding area of vulnerable residents who are drug and alcohol dependent. Some of these addresses have been targeted by drug gangs from out of the area. Officers take positive action by way of arrest.

We will continue to publicise these checks via social media.
