Homes of Our Own is a newly formed Community Led Housing Hub, operated by Wiltshire Community Land Trust, Community First, Wiltshire Council and Swindon Borough Council.

Community Led Housing offers an opportunity for a community to take an active role in delivering the housing that is needed in their local community. Seend CLT recently submitted a planning application for 10 new affordable homes in Seend, which will be delivered through White Horse Housing.

Seend and White Horse Housing will be speaking at an event about their experience of working with Homes of Our Own to deliver the new homes. This event may be of particular interest to parish and town councils and details are included below.

Developing a Community Led Housing approach to meet the need within your community, enables much greater control over what housing is delivered and where.

#### Chair's announcement

Our foster carers do an amazing job, making a massive difference to the life chances of some of Wiltshire's most vulnerable children and young people. Foster carers provide a safe and nurturing home for our children who have experienced abuse, trauma and loss.

We are currently seeking to recruit 100 new foster carers over three years so that our children can continue to live in their local communities, within Wiltshire. We started a campaign back in May 2020 at the start of Foster Care Fortnight to encourage more applications to foster. To date, we have successfully recruited 26 new fostering families towards our target. This is great news, but we still don't have enough to keep all our children in care within Wiltshire, especially for our teenagers.

With more Wiltshire Council foster carers, our children and young people can remain living locally, which means they are more readily able to remain in the same school, see friends and maintain relationships with their family.

We are sharing our message with each area board, with the hope you can encourage people to support and promote our recruitment campaign and highlight the importance of foster care in your local communities.

In all areas, we require more fostering families to look after our children in care. We know that some areas may need a significant increase whereas a few others may only need a few more. We would like our fostering service to get to the position where we are able to offer children a choice of foster carer to best suit their needs.

We especially need more foster carers who want to care for our teenagers and specialist carers, able to look after a parent and child and /or provide an emergency home at a time of crisis and/or look after children with complex medical needs and/or disabilities.

Louise, a 14 year old young person who lives in foster care, who has explained below how foster carers can help teenagers deal with the ups and downs of growing up.

"When I've been upset, they've cheered me up. They also help me understand my feelings and help me with my worries. They are also good fun too and don't take things too seriously. Children need foster carers who have lots of time. They listen to what I have to say and are interested in my thoughts. The three things I think are most important for foster carers are: listen to what I say, make me feel like I am a part of their family and get along with me in general."

To become a foster carer, people need to be over 21 years of age and have a spare bedroom. More details are available on the fostering website: <u>www.fosteringwiltshire.uk</u>

Fostering payments vary depending on the skills and experience of the foster carer, starting at £350 per week per child up to a maximum of £1300 per week for a specialist parent and child carer providing an assessment.

Crime down 17% (compared Jan 2020)			
Burglary down 36% - 8 month all time low			
<ul> <li>COVID-19 - Due to regular patrols by Officers there have been very few FPN tickets issued. Officers have been very robust in dealing with repeat offenders, this message has spread to the wider public and has had a very positive effect.</li> </ul>			

- Only 6 incidents of Anti-Social Behaviour reported to Police for December and January.
- 2 areas of concern for drug use/dealing and these are Drummer Lane and Zouch Park. The Neighbourhood Policing Team are going to request streetlights be installed to attempt to alleviate the issue. A patrol strategy has been put in place.
- Drug offences remains a priority for the Policing teams. Following numerous successful warrants at the end of 2020 and targeted patrols there has been reduced activity from individuals and some evidence it has been displaced out of county.

We are committed to making a real difference to the lives of people in Dorset and Wiltshire. Our aim is to reduce the level of risk and harm to our communities from fire, targeting those most at risk. We do this primarily through our Safe and Well visits.

A Safe and Well visit is **FREE** and normally lasts about one hour covering topics such as:

- Using electricity safely
- Cooking safely
- Making an escape plan
- What to do if there is a fire
- Keeping children safe
- Good practice night time routine and other points relevant to you
- Identifying and discussing any further support the occupier may need

Are you or anyone you know: -

- Over the age of 65?
- Need a smoke detector?
- Have a long-term health condition?
- Suffer from poor hearing or sight loss?
- Would you struggle to escape in the event of a fire?

#### **On Call Recruitment**

Have you always wondered if you could join the fire service, but haven't had the opportunity to find out more? Have you found yourself seeking your next challenge, keen to give back to the local community or wanting to learn new skills including leadership and teamwork? Then becoming an on-call firefighter is for you.

As a paid position, on-call firefighters commit anywhere between 40 to 120 hours per week, during which time they must be able to respond to the station immediately.

Many have 'normal' jobs during the day, then upon their return home make themselves available overnight or during the weekends. Some of our crew respond from their workplaces during the day, and we are very grateful to their employers for releasing them to perform their vital duties.

Anyone over 18 years old can apply (although you can also apply once you are 17½) you must be able to respond and attend the fire station within 5-8 minutes, you have a good standard of physical fitness (i.e., you are generally active), and you must have the right to work in the UK.

What is the project?	<ul> <li>The Community Area transport group (CATG) is a sub group of the Area Board that looks at local improvements to our highways. Whilst they have a small budget, there are some schemes that need to be undertaken but there are insufficient funds available.</li> <li>It is proposed that two of these projects are undertaken by allocating some of the funding remaining within the Capital Grants fund. These are:</li> <li><b>Project 1 - Enford 20mph Speed Limit Implementation</b> A request was made to the Tidworth Community Area Transport Group (CATG) by Enford Parish Council for the consideration to be given to a 20mph Speed Limit Assessment. This request was prioritised by the CATG in October 2020 and the assessment was completed in January 2021. The assessment analysed the survey data against the current DfT criteria and recommended to the Community Area Transport Group to implement a 20mph Speed Limit and associated infrastructure throughout the village. The outcome of the assessment is supported by the CATG and Enford</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>outcome of the assessment is supported by the CATG and Enford Parish Council. Funding is now required to implement the findings.</li> <li><b>Project 2 - A338 Tidworth Pedestrian Crossing Investigation</b> <ul> <li>A request was made to the Tidworth Community Area Transport Group (CATG) by Tidworth Town Council for consideration to be given to an assessment of the existing pedestrian crossing provision on the A338 Pennings Road in the north of the town. #### Headlines/Key Successes

- Following a lengthy process, improvements to the roundabout on the A338 at the junction with Brunton have been implemented. The initial bollards installed were soon demolished by passing northbound traffic and so more substantial bollards have been since installed. This still seems not to be sufficient to slow the traffic to the 30 mph limit and consideration is being given to raising the roundabout rather than the painted on one that exists at present.
- SIDs have been deployed on road side poles at the junctions with the A338 at Aughton and Mill Drove. These act as a visible encouragement to motorists in both directions to watch their speed. From observations it is obvious that these alone are not enough with motorists having recorded 57mph within the 30mph zone. Consideration is being given to SIDs which record speed data which can be used by police to petition for extra road safety measures.
- Village Gates have been installed at the northern and southern bounds of the village again to denote to motorists the boundaries of the village and the speed limits.
- Extensive work has been done to refurbish the numerous bench seats around the village and two surrounding hamlets. As part of this a comprehensive assessment has been made of the state of the various footpaths and rights of way as regards to signage and general accessibility.

#### **Projects**

• The village playground has been closed since last March due to the Covid-19 situation. During last year repairs were made to some of the equipment and we intend to reopen it this Spring and are currently looking at the control measures necessary to achieve this.

#### Forthcoming events/Diary dates

• Consideration is being given to organising a village fete, along the lines of the very successful fete of 2018, but clearly, this event is subject to the prevailing Covid-19 situation.

• Wilts Council have agreed speed limit changes on Marlborough Road (MR) in Everleigh as follows: MR South: From the A342 up to and including Coombe Cottages – Reduce to 40 mph; MR North: From Coombe Cottages northwards – remains 50mph, and extend this zone to the KK tank crossing.

Wilts Council have approved Traffic Regulation Orders and have issued a works order to implement change. We are hopeful for implementation in the Spring.

#### Projects

- The enhancement of Everleigh Centre, opposite The Crown bus shelter, is currently our main focus. Roses have been planted and a bench is planned.
