	The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting of the Westbury Area Board.

5.	Chairman's Announcements
	The chairman gave the following updates:
	• Area Board Model May 2021 Graeme Morrison, Community Engagement Manager, outlined the new annual Area Board model of four Area Board Business meetings, with multiple Area Board engagements at other times of the year focused on specific Area Board priorities for example, Youth or Health and Wellbeing. Additionally, the announcement informed that working groups of the Area Board such as youth networks, health and wellbeing groups and community area transport groups will continue to meet and link with the Area Board.
6.	Partner and Community Updates
	Updates were received from the following partners:
	• Wiltshire Police The Area Board received a verbal update from Sergeant Kevin Harmsworth. The update covered the following issues:
	Sergeant Harmsworth updated that Inspector AI Lumley, a new inspector

<ul> <li>to the Westbury Area and will be attending the Area Board going forward.</li> <li>A suspected arson took place at Coach Road Farm on 6 May. An investigation has been led by the CID team and a 13-year old male is set to be seen through the youth restorative justice panel to determine whether the matter should be dealt with in court.</li> <li>On 28 and 29 June a spate of tyre slashings took place in the town area. Police are appealing for witnesses, dashcam and doorbell footage.</li> <li>The Police have been aware of community tension regarding the Westbury incinerator protests. Patrols have been taking place as well as working with Hills Waste. The public were encouraged to bring to Police attention if they have any knowledge of protests.</li> <li>Speedwatch has taken place 6 times over the past month and a half. A new online training package has also been made available for those wanting to partake. A 2-week national speed enforcement event will be taking place.</li> <li>There has been a drive on E-scooter education, as there has been an increase in numbers locally. These can be used on private land but are illegal to be used on the road unless part of a rental scheme.</li> </ul>
ollowing the verbal update there was time for the following questions and pints to be raised:
<ul> <li>It was clarified that there was a small rally relating to the Westbury incinerator in the Market Square at 9:30am. This was peacefully attended with social distancing.</li> <li>It was queried whether the police would be supporting or endorsing the use of Auto Speedwatch. Sergeant Harmsworth stated that the Police aren't currently supporting it due to a lack of clarity with data protection and how data is shared.</li> <li>It was questioned what happens when the Police see an E-scooter on the road. Sergeant Harmsworth clarified that the pursuit policy doesn't contain information on how to deal with E-scooters if they don't stop. In the majority of cases users have stopped. To note there has been an incident where an E-scooter took off, however this was caught and taken.</li> <li>It was brought to Sergeant Harmsworth's attention that a number of people in Oldfield park have experienced car tyres slashed and catapults used, as well as wildlife reported to have been injured. Sergeant Harmsworth stressed that such issues should be reported as the Police can then work from the collected data.</li> </ul>
• <b>Dorset &amp; Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service</b> ne Area Board received a verbal update from Ray Bridgman, Station Manager. ne update covered the following issues:
<ul> <li>Regarding fire prevention, Safe and Well visits have taken place recently and can be requested through the Fire Service website.</li> <li>Westbury Station has been three members short of a full workforce,</li> </ul>

however proactive recruitment has been taking place to fill these spaces. Between May and June, there have been 39 incidents in Westbury. Including 9 fires, 8 alarms and the remainder for gaining entry. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=UGu-TI6kkmA – Mr Bridgman referred to the linked video, which referenced working with partners, firefighters working at vaccination clinics and driving ambulances. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=MFlq3WEkn A – Reference was drawn to the linked Wareham fire video, which highlighted the importance of taking picnics to forests rather than a BBQ. Healthwatch Wiltshire The Area Board noted a written update attached to the agenda. BaNES, Swindon & Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group (BSW CCG) The Area Board noted a written update attached to the agenda. It was also noted that as the information related to 16 June 2021, these figures would have since substantially improved. Town and Parish Councils Nominated Representatives The Area Board received a verbal update from Westbury Town Councillor, Jane Russ. The update covered the following issues: Westbury now has a new Council, with Sheila Kimmins as Mayor and Will Jones as Deputy Mayor. There have been three councillor vacancies as well as space for a further three councillors to be co-opted. The Westbury Town Council Mid-Term Strategy has now been approved and has been displayed on the Council Website. Westbury Town Council have been approached by David Wilson Homes in relation to potentially taking over the Vivash Park green space, north of The Ham. A feasibility study was initiated to assess this. • The Town Council now has 12 elected members and a clerk, which will now allow for greater flexibility. • Two new committees have been set up, Climate Emergency and Vision for Westbury. Both have been set up to drive projects forward and the Town Council would welcome public involvement. Following the verbal update there was time for the following questions and points to be raised: It was queried what would happen if the Town Council were to decide not to adopt the Vivash Park green space. It was clarified that there is no obligation to adopt the land, however the developer could form a development company or charity for the space to be looked after. • POPCAN (Penleigh Park Group)

The Area Board received an update from Sheila Kimmins on behalf of POPCAN.

The Boundary Commission for England has recently published its initial proposals for new constituency boundaries. The proposals and maps for the nine English regions have been published on the website. The eight-week public consultation period has commenced. This will be the first time the public will get a chance to see what their new constituencies might look like and give the Commission their views on the proposals.

For the 2023 Review, the Commission is promoting use of a specifically designed consultation website as the primary tool for displaying our proposals and receiving comments on them.

Area specific information is available at <u>www.bcereviews.org.uk</u> by entering a post code or region. You can use this website to:

- view current constituency and local authority boundaries;
- view our proposals for new constituency boundaries; and
- submit a response directly to us about our proposals (during a defined consultation period).

From the second consultation period onwards, you will also be able to:

- view the responses submitted by others; and
- submit a comment directly to us, supporting or contesting a response from somebody else.

Consultation is currently open until Monday 2nd August 2021 – responses received after that date will not be considered.

The number of cases in Wiltshire continues to be below the national average but has increased this week.

The rate of cases per 100,000 has gone from 11.4 to 28.2. We expected numbers to increase as restrictions were lifted. Please continue to play your part to help keep case numbers low.

## Don't forget to book your COVID-19 vaccine

People aged 18 and over are now eligible to book their COVID-19 vaccine. You do not need to wait to be contacted by your GP practice to book and should use the National Booking Service. This is available <u>online</u> or for those who do not have access to the internet they can book by calling 119 (always put web link first).

Appointment slots for first and second doses are available at all location vaccination sites.

The NHS appreciates that, at times, the system can be busy and some people's first choice vaccination site may not be listed, but please be assured there are enough appointment slots to go around, so keep trying.

New clinics in locations such as community pharmacies are being set up all the time, and this will help make it easier to book appointments closer to home and places of work or education.

As of 17 June, a total of 579,056 first and second doses have been administered in Wiltshire (excluding Swindon).

Subject:	Ash Dieback

Key messages:

- This is a serious public safety issue and landowners are responsible for dealing with it on their land.
- There is an urgent need for all landowners to identify ash trees growing alongside the highway, public rights of way and in public spaces that are showing signs of this disease and take action.
- Trees on private land away from public access can be left, the resulting dead wood, will continue to provide essential habitat for a range of wildlife including insects, nesting birds, roosting bats and a whole range of other small mammals.
- It is important that we replant our woodlands, hedgerows and parklands
- There is a range of local and national funding opportunities available for replanting
- Our ecologists and landscape officers can offer advice to landowners on tree management and replacement, including replacement funding opportunities.

#### Video:

The Ash Dieback <u>video</u> explains why ash dieback is an issue that ALL landowners in Wiltshire need to take action to address. It outlines the help available from Wiltshire Council and signpost to other national organisations that can offer advice and funding to plant replacement trees.

#### Background:

Ash Dieback or Chalara Dieback of Ash is a disease which is expected to lead to the decline and death of most of the ash trees in Britain. 90% of woodland Ash trees nationwide are likely to be affected over the next five to 15 years.

Ash Dieback is already affecting trees in all parts of Wiltshire, and the council, along with other large landowners is working to address the impacts of the disease.

In trees alongside the highway, rights of way and in public spaces, this can pose a risk of injury to people and damage to property. There is an urgent need for all landowners to identify Ash trees growing alongside the highway, public rights of way and in public spaces that are showing signs of this disease and remove or significantly reduce these trees in order to avoid risks to the public or to property.

Once infected, trees decline quickly, often dying within two growing seasons. Trees rapidly lose timber strength, leading to branches and trees falling.

The loss of so many ash trees will have a dramatic impact on our landscape, both visually and from the numerous benefits they provide. It will affect our

carbon cycling and water cycle, will leave crops and housing more exposed to the effects of weather and result in a direct loss of wildlife species that rely on trees and woodland areas.

It is important that we replant our woodlands, hedgerows and parklands with the most appropriate, alternative species of native trees and shrubs, in order to maintain the unique landscape character of Wiltshire, and to ensure that sufficient habitat continues to support the varied range of wildlife species that rely on these for food and shelter.

There is a range of local and national funding opportunities available for planting whole woodlands, or just sections of hedgerow with standard trees, or small copses.

Our ecologists can help landowners with land that could accommodate trees, to assess its suitability for planting and the most appropriate tree species.

The council is developing a Green and Blue Infrastructure Strategy for the county as well as a Nature Recovery Strategy. They will identify the existing natural areas of high value for people and wildlife, but also where further planting would be of most additional benefit.

Our ecologists and landscape officers are available to offer advice to landowners on tree management and replacement, including replacement funding opportunities.

#### Climate Strategy

This strategy has been developed after Wiltshire Council acknowledged a climate emergency and pledged to become carbon neutral as an organisation by 2030. The document has deliberately been kept simple to encourage a wide readership. The UK Climate Change Committee estimates that local authorities can influence one third of emissions in their area. This makes public engagement and buy-in from organisations and businesses critical to tackling the other two thirds – as well as advocating for strong government action. This high level strategy sets out our objectives and areas of focus while remaining flexible. As the world around us evolves in terms of knowledge, legislation and policy, technology and the market, we will adapt to take advantage of these opportunities. Detailed delivery plans will be developed, and in recognition that we are facing an emergency, we are already taking action on a number of fronts.

#### Our Natural Environment Plan - Green and Blue Infrastructure (GBI) Strategy

This strategy looks at the future for Wiltshire's natural environmental assets focussing on the need to address climate change adaptation and mitigation, halt and reverse biodiversity loss and contribute to the health and wellbeing of Wiltshire's residents.

'Blue infrastructure' means water courses such as rivers, lakes, canals, ponds and wetlands, while 'green infrastructure' covers plant life such as fields, woodlands, hedgerows and parks, and the GBI Strategy will set a clear vision, goals and principle to guide delivery through partnership working. Having a strong GBI will help mitigate against the effects of climate change through nature-based solutions such as, increased water retention in the land to

reduce the risk of flooding, maintain and improve biodiversity, and help to provide improved access to the countryside.

The GBI strategy will inform the development of new polices in the emerging Local Plan and other council documents such as the Local Transport Plan and set the framework for a new Local Nature Recovery Strategy that will identify biodiversity net gain sites (a new requirement in the Environment Bill).

- Wiltshire Police has had a decrease in the volume of recorded crime by 8.0% in the 12 months to July 2021 and continues to have one of the lowest crime rates in the country.
- Wiltshire Police has seen a 20% reduction in vehicle crime and a reduction of 36.4% in residential burglaries in the 12 months to July 2021.
- Our service delivery remains consistently good.
- In July 2021, we received:
- 10,020 '999' calls, (answered within 11 seconds on average);
- 11,714 '101' calls, (answered within 16 seconds on average);
- 12,304 'CRIB' calls, (answered within 2 minute and 14 seconds on average).
- In July 2021, we also attended 1,908 emergency incidents within 10 minutes and 11 seconds on average.

### Stop and Search information for Warminster CPT

During the 12 months leading to June 2021, 67 stop and searches were conducted in the Warminster area of which 73.1% related to a search for controlled drugs.

During 64.4% of these searches, no object was found. In 34.7% of cases, an object was found. Of these cases 79.1% resulted in a no further action disposal; 17.9% resulted in police action being taken; 10.4% resulted in an arrest.

Of the stop and search subjects who defined their ethnicity:

- White 52 stop and searches.
- Black or Black British 3 stop and searches
- Asian or Asian British 1 stop and search



## Local Priorities & Updates - Westbury

Priority	Update
Speed Enforcement	As the country continues to return to 'normal' following the lifting of restrictions, we continue to see a rise in vehicles using the roads. Our local teams have been out conducting speed enforcement activity and supporting the community speed watch teams wherever possible. Please continue to feed in areas of concern to local teams.
Car MeetsWe have had a number of large gatherings of car enthusiasts over the past quarter, resulting in a need for police a and dispersal where appropriate. Although we have no issue with cars and the drivers/passengers meeting to sha like-minded interests, we have had incidents of cars driving dangerously within and around the meeting locations people in danger and causing a disturbance to local businesses and residents. We continue to attend and educate 	
E-Scooters	With the rise in popularity of this mode of transport we have been raising awareness around the legalities of their use. It is a divisive subject throughout the community and so an appropriate stance is required. We will look to educate before taking enforcement action as we do not want to criminalise unsuspecting people who are unaware they are committing offences. However, for repeat offenders or for those that refuse to accept our advice, they can expect seizure of the vehicle and prosecution for offences.
Rural Crime	Promotion of crime prevention tactics and raising awareness through social media. Specifically raising awareness on the rise in thefts of GPS equipment from farm machinery nationally. We have seen a few thefts across Wiltshire of this nature but at the time of writing thankfully none within this specific area.
Protests	The Westbury Incinerator protests continue as you will be aware. The Police continue to monitor this activity to ensure they remain lawful. It is important that we are able to facilitate the public's right for peaceful protest but balance this against the need for the general public to go about their day to day business. We will continue to engage with protest organisers and participants to ensure that only lawful activity continues.



### Covid-19 vaccination programme: Stakeholder briefing

### Thursday 19 August 2021



Gill May, Director of Nursing and Quality "As we continue to provide adults over the age of 18 with their allimportant second doses, our vaccination centres are also turning their attention to children and teenagers, who are now eligible to be vaccinated against coronavirus.

"In just a few days, we have managed to vaccinate approximately 10 per cent of all those who are either 16 or 17-years-old across Bath and North East Somerset, Swindon and Wiltshire.

"This number will only go up over the next few days, with more of our vaccination centres, including Bath Racecourse and Salisbury City Hall, as well as smaller sites in Melksham and Devizes, now offering the vaccine to these young people.

"We know that some areas in our region, including Swindon, are currently without a vaccine centre that can provide the jab to 16 and 17-year-olds.

"However, we expect this to change by the end of this week, with both the Great Western Hospital and the Steam Museum commencing their vaccinations of 16 and 17-year-olds, but we do kindly ask our communities for their patience as we work to bring the vaccines to where they are needed.

"While it may seem from the outset that vaccinating children is no different from vaccinating adults, there are many processes, particularly relating to safeguarding, that need to be followed and applied.

"We have also begun to vaccinate younger children, aged between 12 and 15-years-old, who have specific underlying health condition or are living in a household where someone has a weakened immune system.

"Some of the children in this age group will be vaccinated at home, due to their medical condition, but many will be invited to bespoke clinics.

"We know people will be keen to get their child vaccinated but we again ask for patients as families will be contacted directly."

### At a glance: the latest coronavirus vaccine developments in BSW

- So far, more than 1.3 million vaccines have been given out across Bath and North East Somerset, Swindon and Wiltshire
- This figure is made up of 714,722 first doses and 603,341 second doses

- More than 92 per cent of all people in the top nine most at-risk age groups have been fully vaccinated against coronavirus
- Approximately 70 per cent of all adults aged between 18 and 29 have now had a first vaccine, with around 20 per cent having had both doses
- We remain on track to deliver booster vaccinations throughout September and the autumn, and this will coincide with the annual winter flu programme
- All vaccination centres, including those that offering walk-ins, are now listed on NHS England's national <u>Find My Nearest Walk-in Vaccination</u> service
- Those using the online tool will be able to see a list of the vaccination centres closest to them by entering their postcode in the search box
- Over the next few days, NHS England will be writing to approximately one million 16 and 17-year-olds to invite them to either book their coronavirus vaccine or visit a centre that is offering a walk-in service
- Currently, the guidance from the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation stats that those aged under 18 are only required to have one dose of a coronavirus vaccine



#### TOTAL % OF THE ADOPTED NETWORK REQUIRING MAINTENANCE




A 5 year average is used to monitor the condition of the network due to the surveying regime of undertaking a 50% network length

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#### **Project Summary:**

We want to offer Benefits Advice for older people and people of any age with a disability in a sustainable way with expert staff and volunteers to ensure we can support as many people as possible in a sustainable way. Applying for a Personal Independent Payments can be a complex and difficult process. The payments enable people with significant disabilities to get help with things like transport, shopping, cooking and cleaning, and enable them to live independently. The ILC has been delivering a benefits support service for people with disabilities in Wiltshire since 2009 and in that time we estimate that we have supported around 5,000 people and secured over £4 million pounds in benefits, by supporting people to claim what they're entitled to. We sadly needed to stop this service due to our benefits Advisor retiring and funds having run out to re appoint in March 2021. There are no other charities in the area who are able to provide specialist advice to people of all ages who are entitled to Personal Independent Payments. We understand what a tremendous difference that these can make and are really keen to begin this vital service again, with a sustainable model by training a team of expert volunteers. We are really thrilled that our former Advisor Sheila Bluer, who is widely acknowledged as an expert in this field (the CAB send clients to her due to her specialist knowledge) has agreed to come back to the ILC to help us develop this new model. We are proposing to employ Sheila, or specialist advisor two days per week for a 12 month period, to train an advisor/volunteer coordinator, working two days per week. In year 2 Sheila will drop to one day per week and with the advisor/volunteer coordinator, we will recruit two advisor volunteers, each working one day per week. In year three the service will be provided by the advisor/volunteer coordinator, plus the two volunteers. This arrangement will provide a sustainable and cost effective benefits advice service, running 4 days per week and with a capacity to see up to 100 clients per year. With administrative support and overheads, by year three the service will cost £26232 p/a. which we believe we will be able to fund through general donations. This would be the key steps to us delivering this project: Step 1: Appoint our former expert advisor for 2 days per week and begin offering clients direct support. Step 2. Advertise and appoint a Trainee Advisor to support the Benefits Advisor Step 3. Appoint volunteers who will be trained and support by the Benefits and Trainee Advisor.

### 1. Background
