LICENSING COMMITTEE

PROCEDURAL RULES FOR THE HEARING OF LICENSING ACT 2003 APPLICATIONS

1 Purpose

- 1.1 These rules have been prepared to facilitate proper consideration of licence applications, made under the Licensing Act 2003, by the Licensing Committee and its Sub Committees.
- 1.2 The rules set out a framework for how applications are to be heard and explain the role of the participants at the Hearing.

2 Definitions

- 2.1 The following definitions describe the participants at and the subject matter of a Hearing:
 - "Applicant" means the person who has submitted an Application for consideration by the Committee.
 - "Applicant's Premises" means premises subject to the Application.
 - "Applicant's Representative" means a person attending a Hearing to assist or represent an Applicant including a lawyer.
 - "Application" means an application for the Grant/Variation/Transfer/Review and any other decision to be made by the Committee/Sub-Committee in respect of a Licence.
 - "Chairperson" means the Member who is the Chairperson of the Committee for the particular Hearing.
 - "Committee" means the Council's Licensing Committee and includes any Sub Committee of the Licensing Committee.
 - "Committee Lawyer" means the Council's Lawyer (including an external Lawyer instructed by the Council's Legal & Democratic Services Manager) who is present at a Hearing to advise the Chairperson and the Members.
 - "Committee Manager" means the Council's Officer who is present at a Hearing to take minutes.
 - **"Committee Report"** means the Licensing Officer's written report to the Committee concerning an Application, a copy of which has been previously made available to the Applicant or their Representative, a Responsible Authority or their Representative or any person who has made a Relevant Representation or their Representative.
 - "Hearing" means a meeting of the Committee at which an Application is considered and includes virtual hearings.



- "Licence" means a Licence which the Committee has the power or duty inter alia to grant, transfer, suspend or revoke.
- "Licensing Officer" means the Council's Licensing Officer(s) who is/are present at a Hearing to present reports in respect of an Application and to give technical advice in respect of an Application to the Committee when requested.
- "Licensing Authority" the Council in whose geographical area the subject matter of the Application relates to, and includes the Council's Licensing Committee, any Sub Committee of the Licensing Committee and a Licensing Officer.
- "Member" means a Member who is a Member of the Committee that is considering an Application.
- "Person making a Relevant Representation" means a person who is present at a Hearing to make representations in respect of an Application and includes any person who is present to assist or make representations on behalf of that person including a Lawyer.
- "Responsible Authority" means a person who is present at a Hearing to make representations in respect of an Application in their capacity as Responsible Authority and includes any person who is present to assist or make representations on behalf of the Responsible Authority including a Lawyer.

3 Key Principles

- 3.1 The principles of 'natural justice', and Article 6 'Right to a Fair Trial', which is one of the Convention Rights in the Human Rights Act 1998, require that there is a fair Hearing of Applications.
- 3.2 Natural justice is an umbrella term for the legal standards of basic fairness. This will include that:
 - 3.2.1 the Applicant has an opportunity to make representations before a decision is made;
 - 3.2.2 those making representations have an opportunity to voice their representations before a decision is made;
 - 3.2.3 the Applicant has an adequate opportunity to consider and respond to any submissions made by a Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation;
 - 3.2.4 the Committee does not exclude an Applicant from a Hearing in order to consider submissions from a Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation.
- 3.3 It is also fundamental that there is an orderly presentation of submissions at a Hearing so that the relevant issues are properly understood, evidence is tested and that oral statements made at the Hearing are accurately recorded.



3.4 Ultimately the Chairperson determines the application of these rules, having regard to any submissions being made by those present and in particular the Committee Lawyer.

4 The Hearing

- 4.1 The Hearing shall take place as a virtual hearing via Microsoft Teams. Those who are a party to the hearing will be invited to attend the virtual hearing by an email link and members of the public will be able to watch the hearing as it takes place being streamed to the internet or watch the hearing at a later date.
 - 4.1.1 The Committee may exclude the public from all or part of the Hearing where it considers it to be in the public interest to do so and, in accordance with the Local Government (Access to Information) Act 1985, as amended. Public includes a party and any person assisting or representing a party.
 - 4.1.2 The Committee may require any person attending or taking part in the virtual Hearing who, in its opinion, is behaving in a disruptive manner, to leave the Hearing and may:
 - A refuse to permit them to return to the virtual Hearing;
 - B permit them to return to take part in the virtual Hearing only on such conditions as the Committee may specify;
 - C in the event that a person is required to leave a Hearing that person may, before the end of the Hearing, submit to the Committee by email any information which they would have given orally.
- 4.2 Prior to the Hearing commencing, the Chairperson shall advise the parties of the procedure it proposes to follow at the Hearing.
- 4.3 Where a party has previously requested permission for a person(s), other than their representative, to appear at the Hearing then the Committee shall consider whether to permit that request.
- 4.4 The Committee will allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights.
- 4.5 This equal maximum time may have been notified in advance of the Hearing;
- 4.6 Where there are a number of people who have attended the Hearing to make the same representation then the Committee would normally require that a spokesperson be appointed by them to make the representations on behalf of all of those who have made Relevant Representations.

5 Presentation of Submissions

- 5.1 The Chairperson will introduce the Application.
- 5.2 In the event that the Licensing Authority has given notice to a party requiring clarification on a point(s) then that party shall respond to the points raised by the Licensing Authority.



- 5.3 Submissions shall be made in the following order unless the Chairperson directs otherwise:
 - 5.3.1 The Licensing Officer will orally present the Committee Report and will in particular advise the Committee as to:
 - A the options available to it:
 - B the considerations that are relevant in reaching its decision.
 - 5.3.2 The Applicant (or the Applicant's Representative) will orally present its submission which may include:
 - A presenting their case in accordance with the papers, which will have been circulated with Agenda papers:
 - B confirming key information and answer pertinent questions; and
 - C calling witnesses in support of the Application (see paragraph 4.3).
 - 5.3.3 A Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation will orally present their representations in turn which shall include:
 - A the grounds of the representation to the Application; and
 - B any condition(s) that the Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation would be happy to have the Application granted subject to which would cause the representation to be withdrawn.

6 Questioning of Submissions

- 6.1 The Chairperson will regulate the order in which questions are asked by Members.
- 6.2 The Chairperson and Members, voiced through the Chairperson, may question any party following the completion of their submission.
- 6.3 The Chairperson will normally permit the Applicant, a Responsible Authority/Authorities or any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation to ask questions through them of the other parties.
- 6.4 The Chairperson may direct that questions which are not relevant to the Application or one of the four Licensing Objectives are not formally put or answered.

7 Documentation

7.1 No party shall present new documentation to the Committee at the Hearing other than with the consent of all of the other parties. This does not preclude the Licensing Officer from correcting errors, providing updated information or an extract from a local map showing the Applicant's Premises in the context of the surrounding premises and any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation. If any party is granted permission



to present supplementary papers at the Hearing they shall provide this by email at the direction of the Chairperson.

8 Intervention

The Chairperson shall permit the following interventions at any point in the Hearing:

- 8.1 The Committee Lawyer to advise the Committee on issues of law, procedure and relevant considerations on decision making. If necessary, the Chairperson may require the Committee, the Committee Lawyer and the Committee Manager to leave the Hearing so that advice can be given.
- 8.2 The Committee Manager to advise the Committee on procedure generally, or to request that statements made are repeated for reasons of clarity and so that they can be properly recorded.
- 8.3 The Licensing Officer to seek to clarify statements that have been made in light of information held on their file.

9 Failure of Parties to Attend Hearing

- 9.1 If a party has informed the Licensing Authority that it does not intend to attend or be represented at a Hearing, the Hearing may proceed in its absence.
- 9.2 If a party has not indicated that it does not intend to attend or take part or be represented at a Hearing and fails to attend or be represented at the Hearing then the Licensing Authority may:
 - 9.2.1 where it considers it be necessary in the public interest, adjourn the Hearing to a specified date; or
 - 9.2.2 hold the Hearing in the party's absence.
- 9.3 Where the Licensing Authority holds a Hearing in the absence of a party, it shall consider at the Hearing the application, representations or notice made by that party.

10 Closing Submissions

10.1 The Chairperson shall allow first, the Responsible Authority/Authorities and any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation to make a closing oral submission(s) and secondly invite the Applicant or the Applicant's Representative an opportunity to make an oral closing submission in support of the Application.

11 Decision

11.1 The Committee, the Committee Lawyer and the Committee Manager, shall retire from the public meeting so that the decision may be considered in private, and to consider any legal issues raised by the Members. At this point the Chairperson will give an indication of the time that the meeting will resume for the announcement of the decision and all parties to the hearing will be asked to indicate if they intend to return for the announcement of the decision.



- 11.2 The decision, of the Committee shall be communicated orally by the Chairperson to the parties present at the virtual hearing after the Committee has deliberated in private on the Application.
- 11.3 The full decision notice shall be published on the Council's website within 5 working days of the hearing.



Hearing Procedure Summary

- 1. The Democratic Services Officer will request nominations for a Chairman for the Hearing.
- 2. The Chairperson welcomes all those present and introduces the Application.
- 3. The Chairperson introduces the members of the Sub Committee and invites all parties present (Applicant, Responsible Authority/Authorities, any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation and Council Officers) to introduce themselves.
- 4. The Chairperson outlines the Hearing Procedure as set out in the Agenda, makes any relevant announcements and asks for any declarations of interest.
- 5. The Licensing Officer is asked to present their Committee Report.
- 6. The Applicant/their representative is invited to address the Sub Committee in support of their application.
- 7. Questions to the Applicant by Members of the Sub Committee.
- 8. Questions to the Applicant by Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation which are to be directed through the Chairperson.
- 9. Any Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or any person/s who have made a Relevant Representation are invited to address the Sub Committee in support of their representations.
- 10. Questions to the Responsible Authorities/those who have made a Relevant Representation by Members of the Sub Committee.
- 11. Questions to the Responsible Authorities/those who have made a Relevant Representation by the Applicant, which are to be directed through the Chairperson.
- 12. Closing submissions by those Parties who have made a Relevant Representation in reverse order.
- 13. Closing submissions by the Applicant.
- 14. Sub Committee retires with the Committee Lawyer and Committee Manager to consider its decision.
- 15. Sub Committee returns, and the Lawyer gives a summary of any legal advice that may have been given to the Sub Committee.
- 16. The Chairperson either gives the decision with reasons or advises that it will be released in writing with reasons within the statutory time limits (5 working days).

1. Purpose of Report

1.1 To determine an application for a variation of a Premises Licence in respect of Green Hill Farm Caravan and Campsite, New Road, Landford made by Lovat Parks LTD.

2. Background Information

- 2.1 An application for a variation of a Premises Licence in respect of Green Hill Farm Caravan and Campsite has been made by Lovat Parks LTD for which five relevant representation has been received.
- 2.2 Wiltshire Council (as the Licensing Authority) must hold a hearing to consider the application having regard to the representations. In accordance with Section 35(3) of The Licensing Act 2003 the Licensing Sub Committee is required to take such of the steps listed in 2.4 below as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. In considering the application and the relevant representations, the Sub Committee must also have regard to relevant Government guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.
- 2.3 The licensing objectives are:
 - i) The Prevention of Crime and Disorder;
 - ii) Public Safety;
 - iii) The Prevention of Public Nuisance; and
 - iv) The Protection of Children from Harm.
- 2.4 Such steps are:
 - i) To grant the licence as applied for.
 - ii) To modify the conditions of the licence.
 - iii) To reject the whole or part of the application.
- 2.5 On the 12th February an application for a variation to the premises licence was received and accepted as a valid application.

- 2.6 The details of the variation applied for, are summarised below:
 - Consolidate two premises licenses in to one LN/8223 and LN/42197
 - Extend the licensable area
 - Extend current alcohol trading hours
 - Include the addition of Film Indoor

A copy of the application form including the updated plan is attached as **Appendix 1.**

Since 27/02/2014 (LN/08223) and 01/06/2009 (LN/42197) the premises have benefited from a premises licence issued under the Licensing Act 2003. The current licences authorises the following:

3. Consultation and Representations

- 3.1 The application process requires the application to be advertised, by the Applicant, in a local news publication within 10 working days, starting on the day after the authority receives it and for a public notice (on blue paper) to be posted on the premises. In addition the Licensing Authority advertises the application on its website, for a period of 28 consecutive days, starting the day after the authority receives the application.
- 3.3 During the consultation period 6 relevant representations were received; 6 from local residents. Following a discussion with the applicant 1 local resident withdrew their representation as their concerns had been alleviated.

4. Legal Implications

- 4.1 This hearing is governed by the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations. These provide that hearings should be held in public unless the Licensing Authority considers that the public interest in excluding the public outweighs the public interest in the hearing taking place in public.
- 4.2 The Applicant and all Responsible Authorities and Interested Parties who have made representations have been informed of the date, time and location of the hearing and their right to attend and be represented.
- 4.3 At the hearing all those Responsible Authorities and Interested Parties who have made representations are entitled to address the Sub Committee and to ask questions of another party, with the consent of the Sub Committee.

5. Officer Recommendations

5.1 Officers are not permitted to make a recommendation – the decision is to be reached by the members of the Licensing Sub Committee.

6. Right of Appeal

- 6.1 It should be noted that the Premises Licence Holder, the Responsible Authority(ies) and Interested Parties who have made representations may appeal the decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee to the Magistrates Court. The appeal must be lodged with the Magistrates Court within 21 days of the notification of the decision.
- 6.2 In the event of an appeal being lodged, the decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee remains valid until any appeal is heard and any decision made by the Magistrates Court.
- A Responsible Authority or an Interested Party may apply to the Licensing Authority for a Review of a Premises Licence. Whether or not a Review Hearing takes place is in the discretion of the Licensing Authority, but, if requested by an Interested Party will not normally be granted within the first 12 months except for the most compelling circumstances.








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






Requested licensable area for Shop reception.





ANNEX 1 - MANDATORY CONDITIONS

Supply of Alcohol

Where this Licence authorises the supply of alcohol:

No supply of alcohol may be made under this licence:

- (a) At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence.
- (b) At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended.

Every retail sale or supply of alcohol made under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a Personal Licence.

Exhibition of Films

- Where a premises licence authorises the exhibition of films, the licence must include a condition requiring the admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted in accordance with this section.
- 2. Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless subsection (3)(b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation by that body.
- 3. Where:-
 - (a) The film classification body is not specified in the licence, or
 - (b) The relevant licensing authority has notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question; admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.
- 4. In this section "children" means any person aged under 18; and "film classification body" means the person or persons designated as the authority under Section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984(c39) (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification).

Irresponsible Promotions

- 1. The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—.
 - i. drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or,
 - ii. drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);.
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability

Free Tap Water

1. The responsible person must ensure that free potable tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available. (This means that responsible persons at all premises must ensure customers are provided with potable (drinking) water for free if they ask for it.)

Age Verification Policy

- (a) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (b) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (c) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either
 - i. a holographic mark, or.
 - ii. an ultraviolet feature.

Drink Volume Measures

- 1. The responsible person shall ensure that:
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:
 - i. beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - ii. gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - iii. still wine in a glass: 125 ml.
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Permitted Price

1.

- (a) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- (b) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1—
- A. "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- B. "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula—

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

where-

i. P is the permitted price,

- ii. D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- iii. V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- C. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
 - i. the holder of the premises licence,
 - ii. the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - iii. the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- D. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- E."value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 2. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph B of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph B of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2)The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Door Supervision (except theatres, cinemas, bingo halls and casinos)

- 1. Where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, each such individual must:
 - (a) be authorised to carry out that activity by a licence granted under the Private Security Industry Act 2001; or
 - (b) be entitled to carry out that activity by virtue of section 4 of the Act.
- 2. But nothing in subsection (1) requires such a condition to be imposed:
 - (a) in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films); or
 - (b) in respect of premises in relation to:
 - i. any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
 - ii. any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act.
- 3. For the purposes of this section:
 - (a) "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and, which is licensable conduct for the purposes of that Act, (see Section 3(2) of that Act) and
 - (b) paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.





Representation

1. Mrs Lisa and Mr Richard Higgins,

Forest Springs Farm, New Road, Landford, Salisbury, SP5 2AZ

My family and I live at Forest Springs Farm, New Road, Landford, Salisbury, SP5 2AZ. At the closest point, our boundary is only a matter of 20 - 30 metres or so from the boundary of Green Hill Farm. We are one of a group of residential homes that are within close proximity of Green Hill Farm and we also now (owing to the removal of huge areas of trees and scrub by Lovat Parks) now directly overlook the site and (vice versa) they also have eroded our privacy and at many points along the boundary, now overlook our home.

I would like to raise our concerns regarding the application to vary premises:

- 1. Noise Pollution: The camp site is applying to extend trading hours to longer hours that we consider to be not in keeping with a quiet, rural, residential area. We consider extending trading hours of the Cabin Bar to 11pm every day (Monday - Sunday), every day of the year (1st January - 31st December) to be antisocial and inconsiderate of the local residential community, many of whom have young children (including us). A bar being open so late in such close proximity to residential homes is undoubtedly going to create extra noise and disruption and will have a direct impact on us given our (and other residents) extremely close proximity to the camp site. We live in a rural area with very little between us and the camp site to dampen noise (very few trees and vegetation due to the land between being open field, and even fewer trees since the camp site have removed those that previously blocked our view of the site). Any noise from the camp site carries incredibly far and is easily audible by us at any point on our property. We have experienced enormous problems with noise emitted by the camp site over the past nearly 12 months, due to the development work - from the vehicles, diggers, lorries, drilling, etc. It has been incredibly stressful especially during long periods of lockdown where we are unable to remove ourselves from our property to escape the noise and whilst I have been attempting to home school my young children with constant machinery / drilling noise easily audible. We also have not had easy access to the usual agencies to whom we could raise concerns during lockdown, which has (combined with other impacts of lockdown) made raising concerns very difficult. We are incredibly concerned that extending the licensing permissions and trading hours will increase the amount of noise pollution that is created by the campsite.
- 2. First Step towards further development not in keeping with the area: We are concerned about the trustworthiness of Lovat Parks and believe that extending licensing permissions and trading hours will be the first step towards incremental deviation from the original planning application for the development of the camp site and for extending the scope of the site beyond what is reasonable and in keeping for our small community. We have already experienced deviations from the original plans which were approved and a blatant pushing of boundaries (i.e. cutting down of trees and vegetation to such an extent that the site that was previously not visible from New Road is now an obvious eye sore, etc.). We are pursuing these issues separately, however, given this and other examples of blatant disregard for plans and the local residents, we are concerned that approving the variation to licensing will open the door for more development. Landford and New Road, are both a rural, quiet, small community. The camp site that existed previously at Green Hill Farm was run by local residents, unobtrusive and small in scale. Lovat Parks is none of these and we believe they intend to develop the site to the absolute maximum, regardless of the local community.
- 3. Impact on local businesses: We are concerned for the impact on local business should the trading hours of the bar and shop be extended. Should the trading hours of the Cabin Bar extend, the few local recreation and food businesses in Landford and nearby villages (such as The Lamb Inn in Landford, the Cuckoo near Hamptworth, Mirabelle in Landford), will undoubtedly suffer. These local, often family run businesses, have suffered hugely during the past 12 months of the pandemic and extending trading hours for a large, developed, village of lodges that is run by a non-local 'big business' firm will be incredibly damaging to any chances that these local businesses have of recovering after the pandemic. Previously, visitors to the camp site would naturally turn to the local pubs and restaurants for meals etc. An on-site bar

and shop at the camp site with extended trading hours will provide visitors with far fewer reasons to frequent local pubs and restaurants. Regarding the extended trading hours of the camp site shop, the same principle applies regarding diverting business from local (small, family run) shops - Landford Stores (and post office) and also Nisa Wellow (on the A36). Our family owns the Nisa Wellow and we employ approx. 250 people in and around Hampshire across 5 small convenience stores. We are proud to employ local people and to have sponsored local communities in many ways over the past 20 or so years (we sponsor the Wellow children's football club and have previously sponsored Nomansland Pre-School for several years, as a few of many examples). Whilst only one of our stores (at Wellow) would potentially suffer from extended trading hours at the camp site shop, being experienced in the business, we are all to aware of the damage that it will do to smaller enterprises such as Landford Stores. Regarding our store at Wellow, should we suffer a significant dip in revenue, this may unfortunately equate to reducing staff numbers, which would have a direct impact on the local community as all our employees are local to the stores. I do not believe that the small numbers of staff that the camp site would employ locally would off-set this.

- 4. Impact on traffic and road safety: Previously, the camp site was seasonal. The season ran, roughly, from April to November. This was roughly in keeping with most of the New Forest and enabled locals to resume a 'normal' life in the off-season period. Lovat Parks had previously assured us that their season would also run from April to November. However, this application to extend premises licencing to every day for the whole year, is completely contrary to their initial claim. It also has the potential to increase traffic flow (on New Road in particular) and on the country lanes in the surrounding villages during off-season. The roads in Landford are frequently used as a 'rat run' from more populous areas to the New Forest. The roads that run almost directly from the end of New Road (on the Forest side; to Nomansland and Bramshaw) are all subject to 'commoning' and frequently have animals walking along them. The number of animals killed by traffic increases exponentially during the holiday season due to the increased non-local traffic. Visitors to camp site will most likely have large camper van- type vehicles, which can cause immense damage to animals. If the season at Green Hill Farm were to extend throughout the year, I have no doubt that the current traffic issues would also increase in line with this. As a point of reference, New Road is regularly subject to locally-run speed traps and speed measuring due to it being a common through road from the A36 for large amounts of traffic. Bramshaw village council in the last few years has put speed control measures in place due to the enormous problem that was being experienced with traffic and speeding. An additional point regarding New Road is that many horse riders use New Road to access the Forest (New Road is home to Landford Common Stud, a large equestrian livery and to local Farriers and the majority of residents own horses). The increase in traffic that extending bar and shop opening hours at the camp site would create would have a detrimental effect on the any horse riders that have to compete with large amounts of traffic, large vehicles and speeding (especially from non-local visitors who are not aware of the area).
- 5. Finally, we believe that the development of the camp site from an unobtrusive small, rural space for low key camping, to part of a nationwide leisure business, now very much a 'village' of lodges, totally visible from the road (where previously it was not), a source of huge noise pollution (where previously it was not), is not in keeping with maintaining the integrity of our small, rural, local community. We believe that this application to extend the premises licence is a step in the wrong direction.

Please take this email as objection to the application for variation of licenses at Greenhill Farm Caravan and campsite - New Road, Landford, SP5 2AZ

As a resident of New Road for 10 years and resident of the New Forest for 40 years I raise objection to the application.

The application to consolidate 2 licenses to 1 – LN000008223

Extension to current trading hours – extends the year, as applying to go from seasonal, and also extending hours.

This will bring additional noise – last year is the noisest I have ever known – with noise heard past 23:00 most nights in the summer. – yet they state no noise past 22:00 – blatantly no way of enforcing this – yet they state it as a term of control

They apply to have a license to sell up to 23:00, yet state the building will close at 23:00 – contradiction of application.

Sales now to take place on a Sunday also.

This affects local business pubs and shops – at least 4 local pubs would have benefitted form the previous campers, all within walking distance of camp.

Extending area to comply with Covid 19 social distancing.

This requirement by law will soon be removed, and subsequently extension of area should only be on temporary timescales, extension of this area is not a legal requirement.

Applying to show films outdoors – object under noise and light pollution, as they advertised and held a drive through cinema event last year, - bringing additional noise pollution, lights and cars into an area where they advocate to be surrounded by nature – yet show no consideration as the event was held in a former agriculture field which had no previous camping or camping associated events taking place.

All of this application is for "residents" of the park only and even if I agreed with it, brings nothing to the local community except additional noise and footfall to what should be kept a to a small quiet campsite as in previous years.

The Old Orchard, New Road, Landford SP5 2AZ

I would like to object to the variation of premises licence application made by Greenhill Farm, New Road, Landford, Wiltshire under the above reference/notice ID.

This is a very quiet, dark residential road. With little night-time traffic, no night-time light, and little noise. That's why I chose to live here.

Allowing an extension of licensing hours for this site will encourage noise and late night traffic. Noise travels great distance here because there is none and it will interrupt the quiet enjoyment of my property. Last year we had horrendous litter from this site, with rowdy walkers from the site dropping beer bottles etc. This happened on New Road as well as the open forest that it backs onto.



Excuse the ramblings, it just makes people feel that their homes are no longer as they wanted them to be, with such big changes on our doorstep.





Thankyou for the list of representation in relation to the Variation of premises license for Green Hill farm.

To support the application and the representation challenges, I have prepared this document that will give some clear facts and to show that as a business we have followed the four Licensing objectives.

- the prevention of crime and disorder.
- public safety.
- the prevention of public nuisance.
- the protection of children from harm

In the main, the representation for **Rep 1** will cover most of the challenges across all 5 representations but I will however respond to all 5 individually.

Please can you pass this document to the panel that will decide the application outcome in advance of the hearing.

Rep 1.

I know and have met with **Rep 1** over 3 times on park in the past 6 months and sent numerous emails, and have worked with them to ensure that our rightful development does not impact on them.

Points to address in reply:

- We have removed the option to screen outdoor film.
- Our Current license already allows us to sell alcohol until 23.00pm in our café bar.
- Considering the reduced guests and pitches, we believe we have decreased the opportunity for noise pollution and for risk to public safety. Considering our current license was based on more guests attending the park, we believe that current decrease in guests would further improve compliance in both the objectives above.
- The park has traded as a 12-month holiday park before LOVAT purchased the park in 2019. This is in our park license and is still the case. The comment from the representation is incorrect.
- The residents of our park have always had the option to purchase alcohol on their Holiday or in their holiday home and be able to purchase this onsite from March to November. We believe this option should be available to our guests all year round.
- Our park signage and customer literature enforce good behaviour and noise restrictions between 23.00pm and 07.00am. (see document 1)
- Bought Lovat Parks bought Green Hill Farm in June 2019, the previous owners allowed group bookings. We do not allow

- anyone greater than 2 pitches per guest so that we can ensure that noise levels are low.
- We have added holiday homes that have replaced many of our touring pitches reducing the traffic coming to and from the park.
- Our Holiday Homeowners sign a license agreement with park rules that agree that noise and bad behaviour will not be accepted and may lead to termination of contract. (see document 2)
- In terms of anti-social behaviour in 2020, we did not require the police to attend to any incident.
- We also did not receive any noise complaints from any of our neighbours, nor from the representations for this application.
- We promote and support local licensees and businesses. (see document 3)
- Although the park does contribute to traffic and always has, I refer initially to the reduced pitch and visitor numbers reduction. The representation states that New Road is a local cut through. The owner of Lovat parks is in talks with the local community forum (John Elkins) to provide funding for a speed measuring warning device to reduce speeding by any driver be it local, business or tourist.
- The Park Manager & his partner are local and reside on the park in the house on the park.
- We have reduced our number of customers significantly in 2021 by the following:
- 1. Reduced out touring pitches from 110 to 30.

- 3. We now have only 2 dedicated check in days which will reduce traffic on new road.
- 4. Our average weekly customer number has dropped from 1000 to 600.
- 5. Our lodge holiday homeowners do not have touring caravans and will mainly use their holiday homes at the weekend.

- Lovat Parks bought Green Hill Farm in June 2019, the previous owners allowed group bookings. We do not allow anyone greater than 2 pitches per guest so that we can ensure that noise levels are low.

Representations in respect of the new off-licence building and variation to the premises licence.

I wish to make representations on behalf of my wife and I against the variation application which seeks to create a new off-licensed building in its proposed new location. We are not making any representations against the application in respect of the existing on- and off-licence building sited elsewhere on the caravan park.

Prevention of public nuisance

My wife and I have lived here for twenty years and for all that time, until recently, we were unaware of the existence of the caravan park on a day-by-day basis and only exceptionally could we hear any people noise. There is a very good reason for that. The operators have recently started to clear the land between our house and the new proposed location, and over the last five months trees, shrubs and dense vegetation has been removed, which afforded a natural acoustic barrier between us and the site.

This thinning of the vegetation is demonstrated by photos 1, 2, 3 and 4. Photo 1 shows that we could see nothing at night previously, Photo 2 highlights the removal of trees and shrubs as the light pollution is now significant. Photo 3 was taken shortly after they had commenced removing this natural sound barrier, and photo 4 shows the current situation, we have been informed by the operator that they are planting a laurel hedge (photo 4 and 5) but that will take years to come to maturity and be an effective sound barrier. That photo (photo 4) also shows our house, and the intervisibility is new, following the removal of the intervening trees.

The off-licence seeks to operate later in the evening than currently, and the building will be closer to our house than before. This is shown on the aerial photograph 6. This photo also really highlights the amount of vegetation there used to be between the old off licence and the surrounding neighbours that has now gone. Background noise levels are lower in the evening than in the daytime.

We are concerned that the off-licence will operate later into the evening and closer to our house than has previously been the case, and that without the imposition of strict conditions there will be a nuisance from customers using the facility.

We consider that conditions are necessary as it is our experience that we cannot always rely on the promised goodwill of the operators. For example, Green Hill Park advises in its

supporting documentation that they have engaged with local residents (specifically us), but we can advise that communication with them has only ever been initiated by us and has been incredibly limited on their part. We have never been approached by GHP or consulted on any matter that impacts on us. We were not invited to any open days, despite having provided GHP with our contact details and made them aware of our address and proximity to the site. Recently (on Sunday 28th March), trees on our property cut back in order to facilitate fibre internet being connected to GHP. We were not notified of the tree surgeon accessing our property or cutting our trees (despite the tree surgeon's admission when questioned that we should have been notified).

When we initially complained about the screening, we were ignored. On subsequent attempts to communicate with Green Hill Farm, we were told that screening would be put in place around the re-sited car park and reception building by November 2020. As of March 2021, no screening had been put in place and we were continuously told that screening had been delayed. However, as you can see from Picture 5, the screening is completely ineffectual in terms of noise pollution. It is also in no way a replacement for the metres of thick vegetation and mature trees that existed there previously.

We would ask the Members to consider some or all of the following conditions, or others which Members consider will be:

- 1. Provide an acoustic barrier to prevent noise reaching neighbours' property. There needs to be directions as to the location, height, specification and so on, and the authority's own environmental health officers can provide the technical input. Given that GHP have moved the location of the off-licence for their own commercial benefit, ensuring the status quo of the previous location should be a condition of granting the licence.
- 2. Reducing the hours sought in the evening. The other licensed premises on site has an on- and off-licence and customers can access those premises until late in the evening.
- 3. Using security staff to monitor the behaviour of customers and as a reminder of the need to act with consideration to other park users and neighbours.

We are not opposed to the off-licence facility. We are concerned only to ensure that its operation also respects our right not to be disturbed and our enjoyment of our home is protected.


