22 <u>Chairman's Announcements</u>

The Board received the following announcements:

Wiltshire Libraries are supporting residents to stay online during the cost-of-living situation.

Cllr Elizabeth Threlfall stated that Wiltshire Libraries were helping residents to have the skills and internet access they need to get and stay online during the cost-of-living situation. If residents liked to know more, they were encouraged to contact their local library, with it also noted that Wiltshire Libraries were also working with the Good Things Foundation to distribute free SIMs and mobile data to people in need. Further details could be found in the agenda pack.

Cost of Living Update

Cllr Gavin Grant stated Malmesbury Area Board were particularly active in supporting vulnerable people and assisting Parish Councils in providing that support. Thanks were given to Andrew Jack the Strategic Engagement Partnership Manager (SEPM) for securing a grant from Wiltshire Council to provide food.

It was also noted that Wiltshire Council received funding from central government for food organisations and that the Engagement and Partnerships Team had doubled the amount requested from Wiltshire Council. This is available to all community food providers and can be spent on food and also putting on advice and information to clients and to provide them with ways to reduce their energy costs, such as providing slow cookers.

Additionally, within the agenda pack was a briefing note that outlined the current support offered to Wiltshire residents by Wiltshire Council to support them through the cost-of-living crisis. Details included information about Energy Support, the Household Support Fund, Interactive Directories and the Work of Area Boards as well as much more. Further details could be found in the agenda pack.

• Independent Visitor Scheme promotion for volunteers

Cllr Chuck Berry praised the Scheme and that there was a need for more volunteers for the Independent Visitor Scheme. Independent Visitors are adult volunteers who are matched with young people in care to visit, advise and befriend them. Volunteers are asked to give a long-term commitment to visit a young person every 3-4 weeks, for a couple of hours, to have fun, try new things and build a strong and lasting relationship. Training and ongoing support is provided, with all expenses covered. Further details could be found in the agenda pack.

23 <u>Partner Updates</u>

The Board received the following updates:

• Wiltshire Police

Inspector Gareth Edwards, who is the area's new Inspector, provided a verbal update on the priorities and statistics in the local area. The full report and presentation from Wiltshire Police was attached to the agenda pack as well as a road safety update included within the agenda supplement.

Further points included information regarding:

- Local Drugs Problem and Nitrous Oxide.
- The Community Safety Partnership and how bringing this back would be an important initiative for stopping crime.
- There was a slight increase in knife crime in the Malmesbury Area and crimes involving Violence Without Injury. However it was stressed that the numbers are still very low.
- What local communities and parishes can do to support the police.

Following the update, clarification was provided about emergency calls and when to call 999, and it was noted that a white van has been spotted driving around and committing thefts. The police were aware of crime groups using such vehicles and are always grateful for information received.

24 <u>Area Board End of Year Report</u>

Part I – Looking Back

The Board received the Area Board End of Year Report from Andrew Jack (Strategic Engagement Partnerships Manager). The full report was attached to the agenda pack.

It was noted that Malmesbury Area Board had worked well with the town council, 19 parish councils and numerous community groups and organisations that serve the community area and had often joined together to work collectively on key local priorities, significantly influenced by dialogue and action facilitated by the Malmesbury Area Board. Additionally, small investments by the board had often become part of a large project amounting to large sums of money being invested into the community.

Each of the following Local Priorities were covered:

Youth Engagement

The Board had supported summer activities and worked with Rise Trust to deliver Safe Spaces youth club & outreach work. There had also been work with students & parents to keep people safe online with Stay Safe Initiative

Climate Change and the environment

The Board had worked to deliver new EV charging points in Malmesbury & Sherston and supported eco awareness events, such as Sherston Apple Day. Assistance was provided by the board in promoting and establishing an environmental hub at RENEW Via the LHFIG and the board had helped create new cycle & active travel routes into town. Other activities included funding a Community Fridge to help cut food waste and supporting allotments.

Reducing Isolation and Loneliness

Through the Health & Wellbeing Forum, the Board had been reducing Isolation and Loneliness by supporting services and events, like the Carers' Café & the "Malmesbury Chinwag" and bringing Celebrating Age events to older people across the area. The board had also supported The Riverside Centre and the events and activities there.

Highway Safety

The Board had continued to improve Highway Safety through the Local Highway Footpath Improvement Group (LHFIG).

Six LHFIG projects have been completed including:

- Malmesbury Bristol Street Introducing a 20mph limit.
- Malmesbury Cross Hayes car park erecting a 'no entry' sign and placing road markings.
- Malmesbury Mill Lane Converting to a 2-way cycle track.

 Ashton Keynes – Happyland/ Waterhay Lane - erecting warning signs and placing road markings.

Community Resilience

The Board had coordinated work across the area to establish Warm Spaces and other services which had helped to ease cost of living pressures and contributed through putting funding into those venues to help with their own increased costs and helping to fund advice sessions. The board has also supported the 'Creative Conversation' and 'Noticing Nature' sessions from Caerbladon Gallery.

During debate, it was clarified that the term "active travelling" was used to describe the aim of promoting walking/cycling etc and reducing the use of cars where possible. It was further stated that this didn't mean less priority was being afforded to bus travel, and funding and initiatives were being shared with Gloucestershire due to some bus journeys travelling across the border between them.

The Board reiterated its desire to ensure that it is aligned with parishes with regards to funding goals. Buses and cycling routes are at the forefront of this and emphasis was given to the need to understand geographical challenges and that projects should reflect them.

Deprivation in the Local Area

The Board received a presentation from Andrew Jack the Strategic Engagement Partnerships Manager, on Deprivation in the local area. The presentation outlined that Wiltshire Council was starting to put more emphasis on statistics relating to geographical deprivation. In addition, Wiltshire's leadership stressed it was looking for ABs to invest more of their funding into deprived areas and find ways to support the people who live there.

The Board highlighted the use for the maps as an aide but warned of the slightly misleading criteria of which areas are "deprived" and therefore emphasised the need to not solely rely on the map and to include other useful metrics. Additionally, the Board stated that new grants for places like scouts, sports clubs etc would need to show how the funding will benefit the wider community.

26 <u>Lyneham Banks Update</u>

The board received an update on the progress made towards repair work at B4069 at Lyneham Banks presented by Cllr Elizabeth Threlfall. The presentation included the following points:

- An outline of the main areas of required remediation:
 - Upper slope (main body of landslip)
 - o Road corridor (B4069)
 - Lower slope
- An outline of the Secondary areas of required remediation:
 - Area west of main landslip Road is still intact but area of previous road cracking.
 - Area east of main landslip Road is still intact but built on relict slip (pre-1991 mapping) and land has been raised by developer.
- It was stated that the current timeline indicated that construction would take place between Quarter 2 of 2024 and Quarter 1 of 2025.

1) CHAIR'S ANNOUNCEMENT FOR AREA BOARDS TAKING PLACE BEFORE CONSULTATION EVENTS BEGIN

The consultation for the Wiltshire Local Plan will be held from Wednesday 27 September until Wednesday 22 November, with in-person and an online event being held across the county to enable people to find out more and have their say.

The council is holding 16 drop-in events at libraries and leisure centres around Wiltshire between Monday 2 October and Wednesday 18 October along with a live webinar-style event on Thursday 10 October on Microsoft Teams.

The in-person events are informal drop-in sessions where people can meet officers and find out more about the Local Plan and how to respond to the consultation. There is no need to book for the in-person events, anyone can just turn up and speak to officers. The online session will feature a presentation, followed by an opportunity to ask questions; people should sign up for the online event beforehand on the council website and are encouraged to submit questions in advance.

The Local Plan sets out the vision and framework for housing, infrastructure and land for employment growth for the next 15 years. Once adopted, all planning applications will be determined against the plan, making it the most important place-shaping document for Wiltshire.

BSW ICB celebrates first anniversary

BSW ICB has celebrated its first twelve months of working to improve health and wellbeing outcomes for local people. There have been numerous examples of joint working, from tackling winter pressures, to helping people get home from hospital more quickly. Other achievements include:

New state of the art health centre in Devizes

Opened in February, it's one of the first integrated health care centres in the region. The centre offers local residents a wide range of health and wellbeing services under one roof and provides primary care services, such as those traditionally found in GP practices, along with hospital outpatient services, physiotherapy, audiology, blood tests, and mental health support. It is a leading NHS net zero building with an energy EPC rating of A+, which utilises green technology, such as heat pumps and solar panels, to generate electricity and heat to serve the building.

Integrated Care Strategy sets out health and care ambitions for BSW

The strategy sets out BSW Together's ambition as partners working across the health, social care, voluntary and other sectors to support the people of BSW to live happier and healthier for longer.

Acute Health Alliance

NHS England announced its new Provider Collaborative Innovators scheme earlier this year. BSW AHA is the only collaborative from the South West to form the first wave of innovators, working closely together to tackle local challenges, improve patient outcomes, and enhance resilience.

- 15-18 years old who are at risk of becoming NEET (Not in Employment Education or Training).
- 15-18 years old who are NEET.
- 15-18 years old who are engaging with Swindon Youth Justice Service.
- 15-18 years old who are Care Experienced.
- 15-18 years old with an Education, Health & Care Plan.

We are in discussion with other funders to try to establish a programme to support people aged over 19 in Swindon and will give further details of this as soon as we can.

Building Bridges multiplies maths life skills

Did you know that 49% of adults of working age have the maths skills of a primary-aged child and 78% are working at below a Level 2 (GCSE C/4) grade? Maths anxiety is one of the reasons why many people avoid revisiting their maths. They may shy away from talking about their maths skills due to a bad experience in school or feel that they are 'not a maths person.'



Multiply is a new government-funded programme to help adults improve their numeracy skills.

People aged 19 and over that don't have maths GCSE at grade C (or equivalent), can access free courses through Multiply to build their confidence with numbers and perhaps gain a qualification.

All Building Bridges Support Workers have been trained and qualified as National Numeracy Champions via a CPD-accredited programme. This gives

them the knowledge and understanding needed to support adults who have low confidence with Numeracy so that individuals, children, parents, and families in the community can develop positive attitudes towards maths learning.

Some Maths Life skills that may be supported include:

- Money, savings, debts and benefits
- Using public transport or learning to drive
- Income and household budgeting
- Shopping for less
- · Saving energy and money on bills
- Childcare costs

The Building Bridges Programme is working in partnership with Wiltshire Council to deliver life skills, maths learning and support individuals to gain accredited qualifications to help improve their confidence and chances of education, employment or job prospects and security.







Youth Action Wiltshire - Summer activity programme

We have created an exciting programme of summer activities for young carers and people facing challenges in their lives. The free-to-access activities are offered by Community first (Youth Action Wiltshire) during school holidays with the aim of offering respite and opportunities for young people to make friends and access support from our specialist team of trained youth workers.

In addition to free-to-access group activities, Community First also offers free transport for young people to and from the various locations where activities are delivered. This includes our dedicated Outdoor Education Centre at Oxenwood.

PCCs across the South West launch new rural crime survey

Police and Crime Commissioners across the South West have come together to launch a survey to explore how crime is affecting rural communities.

Wiltshire Police and Crime Commissioner, Philip Wilkinson and his counterparts in Dorset, Devon and Cornwall, Avon and Somerset and Gloucestershire are hoping the survey will help them to understand how their county's rural communities are affected by crime.

Mr Wilkinson said: "In an agricultural county like Wiltshire, it's so important to keep on top of how Wiltshire Police are responding to and dealing with all forms of rural crime. A lot of work has gone into improving this as a police force and I included it in the priorities set out in my Police and Crime Plan.

"I'm keen to understand what improvements have been made since the National Rural Crime Network ran a similar survey in 2018, and what we still need to put more resource into. By taking a couple of minutes out of your day to complete this survey you will be helping me to understand how I can continue to make Wiltshire safer."

In Wiltshire, the Rural Crime Team cover all heritage and wildlife crime including theft of livestock and machinery, fly tipping, poaching and hare coursing to name a few.

The survey asks rural residents if they have been the victim of any crimes in the last 12 months as well as asking what rural crimes concern them the most.

Our organisations have a long history of providing vital services and support to older people to help improve their quality of later life. By combining our resources and expertise, we believe we can have an even greater impact on the lives of our clients. This expansion enables a strengthened service provision, shared learning, and the potential to develop new and important services, identified by older people within their local communities. The collaboration will ensure that the rising demand for frontline services and support will be met, not only in the Wiltshire and Swindon area but across the Southampton area.

We are committed to ensuring a smooth transition and to keeping all stakeholders informed throughout the process. We believe this merger will create new opportunities for growth and collaboration, and we are excited to embark on this new chapter together.

The Merger took place on the 1st April 2023 and our gratitude goes to all our supporters, volunteers, and staff who have helped make this merger possible. We look forward to continuing to work together to make a positive impact in the lives of older adults.

Our future development plans for this year

We have ambitious plans to open **three charity retail shops**, which will become hubs across Wiltshire! We're working in partnership with another charity to use their expertise as consultants to help us build a sustainable model.

The Information & Advice service is busy helping many older people combat the cost of living with grants, advice, and benefits information, including making Surviving Winter grants. We're looking at how we can develop new I&A services across Wiltshire and Swindon, including more face-to-face information and advice.

"I couldn't have done this without you, I felt so dejected when the lady said I wasn't entitled and I'm glad you helped me see that I was. Thanks for helping with the phone call, it felt so reassuring."

The Meals+ Service is currently expanding and building on routes in Melksham, Corsham, and Chippenham. Having provided a nutritious meals service to clients in Wiltshire and Swindon, including some routes in Bath & North East Somerset for many years, we are now expanding into the South Cotswolds as a natural next step in the growth of the service.

We have also been working hard to help the NHS by providing meals for those coming home from hospital, as part of their discharge plans.

"We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for all the assistance that you have given us. It has allowed our dad to stay in his home for a great deal longer than we thought, which was his wish. Your staff have kept his spirits up and I know he has really enjoyed having a visitor each lunch time."

We started a pilot **Travel Friends service** last year which has been a great success. Volunteers have worked 1:1 with older people who needed more confidence to travel independently and have been able to support them on their journeys to shops, appointments, visiting groups and getting out and about.

We hope the pilot has shown the value of such a service and are excited about future possibilities!

"What a wonderful service. The volunteer who helped me was just great and so very helpful. I am now confident to travel on my own."

We're now working with Melksham Town Council and Melksham Without Parish Council, and are leading the Melksham Community Support service, who have a number of volunteers and are already supporting a group of older people.

We have recruited a new Melksham Community Support Senior Project Worker and can't wait to see what we can do in this area!

Last year, our **Big Knit** campaign was incredibly successful and our knitting warriors knitted an amazing 40,000 hats! We hit our target and were given £10,000 from Innocent Smoothies. We will be running another campaign this year, and will be updating our social media channels with more information soon.

On Call Recruitment

Have you always wondered if you could join the fire service, but haven't had the opportunity to find out more? Have you found yourself seeking your next challenge, keen to give back to the local community or wanting to learn new skills including leadership and teamwork? Then becoming an on-call firefighter is for you.

As a paid position, on-call firefighters commit anywhere between 60 to 120 hours per week, during which time they must be able to respond to the station immediately.

Many have 'normal' jobs during the day, then upon their return home make themselves available overnight or during the weekends. Some of our crew respond from their workplaces during the day, and we are very grateful to their employers for releasing them to perform their vital duties.

Anyone over 18 years old can apply (although you can also apply once you are 17½) you must be able to respond and attend the fire station within 5-8 minutes, you have a good standard of physical fitness (i.e. you are generally active), and you must have the right to work in the UK.

Project Summary:

Malmesbury Bowls and Social Club have experienced a surge of interest since the installation of our new artificial green a few years ago. Bowling membership and social membership have been strong and the clubhouse has experienced a variety of wider community uses. We are now improving our general facilities by re-modelling our access and changing areas. As part of this process, we will be installing a disabled toilet and the necessary facilities. In addition, to a standard disabled facilities 'pack' we would like to install appropriate hand drying equipment. Our artificial green allows bowlers of all abilities to play. As it is not grass, we can have wheelchairs, walking frames and other aids on the green without concern for damage to the surface.

Project Summary:

Sherston Drama Group is a thriving amateur dramatic society founded in 1979. We typically produce an Easter play and an Autumn pantomime in the Village Hall every year. This autumn we are planning to put on a pantomime based on the story of 'The Elves and the Shoemaker'. The cast includes a mixture of children and adults from Sherston and the surrounding area. There are many expenses involved in putting on a pantomime, including venue hire for rehearsals and performances, script printing costs, performance rights, insurance costs and the costs involved in generating the costumes, props and scenery. We have put up ticket prices recently and we are keen not to have to increase them anymore this autumn to enable the performances to be accessible for as many families as possible. We are applying for £500 which we would put towards the cost of the costumes. We would use this money to buy items which we could use for more than one production. For example we would like to buy a set of dance shoes (jazz shoes) for the children, which we can store after the production and use again in future years. We would also like to buy some leotards in different colours; these form the basis for many of the children's costumes. We would also like to buy some new dame costumes (there is always a dame in every pantomime so these will get reused), animal costumes and some plastic storage boxes, which will keep the costumes in good condition whilst they are stored in our costume trailer between productions. The costumes are not heavily used and if they are stored carefully we would expect them to last for 5-10 years.
