#### PROCEDURAL RULES FOR THE HEARING OF LICENSING ACT 2003 APPLICATIONS

#### 1 Purpose

- 1.1 These rules have been prepared to facilitate proper consideration of licence applications, made under the Licensing Act 2003, by the Licensing Committee and its Sub Committees.
- 1.2 The rules set out a framework for how applications are to be heard and explain the role of the participants at the Hearing.

#### 2 Definitions

- 2.1 The following definitions describe the participants at and the subject matter of a Hearing:
  - **"Applicant"** means the person who has submitted an Application for consideration by the Committee.
  - "Applicant's Premises" means premises subject to the Application.
  - "Applicant's Representative" means a person attending a Hearing to assist or represent an Applicant including a lawyer.
  - "Application" means an application for the Grant/Variation/Transfer/Review and any other decision to be made by the Committee/Sub-Committee in respect of a Licence.
  - "Chairperson" means the Member who is the Chairperson of the Committee for the particular Hearing.
  - **"Committee"** means the Council's Licensing Committee and includes any Sub Committee of the Licensing Committee.
  - "Committee Lawyer" means the Council's Lawyer (including an external Lawyer instructed by the Council's Legal & Democratic Services Manager) who is present at a Hearing to advise the Chairperson and the Members.
  - **"Committee Manager"** means the Council's Officer who is present at a Hearing to take minutes.
  - **"Committee Report"** means the Licensing Officer's written report to the Committee concerning an Application, a copy of which has been previously made available to the Applicant or their Representative, a Responsible Authority or their Representative or an Interested Party or their Representative.

- "Hearing" means a meeting of the Committee at which an Application is considered.
- "Licence" means a Licence which the Committee has the power or duty inter alia to grant, transfer, suspend or revoke.
- "Licensing Officer" means the Council's Licensing Officer(s) who is/are present at a Hearing to present reports in respect of an Application and to give technical advice in respect of an Application to the Committee when requested.
- "Licensing Authority" the Council in whose geographical area the subject matter of the Application relates to, and includes the Council's Licensing Committee, any Sub Committee of the Licensing Committee and a Licensing Officer.
- **"Member"** means a Member who is a Member of the Committee that is considering an Application.
- "Responsible Authority" means a person who is present at a Hearing to make representations in respect of an Application in their capacity as Responsible Authority and includes any person who is present to assist or make representations on behalf of the Responsible Authority including a Lawyer.
- "Interested Party" means a person who is present at a Hearing to make representations in respect of an Application in their capacity as an Interested Party, and includes any person who is present to assist or make representations on behalf of the Interested Party including a Lawyer.

#### 3 Key Principles

- 3.1 The principles of 'natural justice', and Article 6 'Right to a Fair Trial', which is one of the Convention Rights in the Human Rights Act 1998, require that there is a fair Hearing of Applications.
- 3.2 Natural justice is an umbrella term for the legal standards of basic fairness. This will include that:
  - 3.2.1 the Applicant has an opportunity to make representations before a decision is
  - 3.2.2 those making representations have an opportunity to voice their representations before a decision is made;
  - 3.2.3 the Applicant has an adequate opportunity to consider and respond to any submissions made by a Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties;
  - 3.2.4 the Committee does not exclude an Applicant from a Hearing in order to consider submissions from a Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties.
- 3.3 It is also fundamental that there is an orderly presentation of submissions at a Hearing so that the relevant issues are properly understood, evidence is tested and that oral statements made at the Hearing are accurately recorded.
- 3.4 Ultimately the Chairperson determines the application of these rules, having regard to any submissions being made by those present and in particular the Committee Lawyer.

#### 4 The Hearing

- 4.1 The Hearing shall take place in public.
  - 4.1.1 The Committee may exclude the public from all or part of the Hearing where it considers it to be in the public interest to do so and, in accordance with the Local Government (Access to Information) Act 1985, as amended. Public includes a party and any person assisting or representing a party.
  - 4.1.2 The Committee may require any person attending the Hearing who, in its opinion, is behaving in a disruptive manner, to leave the Hearing and may:
    - a refuse to permit them to return;
    - b permit them to return only on such conditions as the Committee may specify:
    - c in the event that a person is required to leave a Hearing that person may, before the end of the Hearing, submit to the Committee in writing any information which they would have given orally.
- 4.2 Prior to the Hearing commencing, the Chairperson shall advise the parties of the procedure it proposes to follow at the Hearing.
- 4.3 Where a party has previously requested permission for a person(s), other than their representative, to appear at the Hearing then the Committee shall consider whether to permit that request.
- 4.4 The Committee will allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights.
- 4.5 This equal maximum time may have been notified in advance of the Hearing;
- 4.6 Where there is a multiple of Interested Parties who have attended the Hearing to make the same representation then the Committee would normally require that a spokesperson be appointed by them to make the representations on behalf of all of those Interested Parties.

#### 5 Presentation of Submissions

- 5.1 The Chairperson will introduce the Application.
- 5.2 In the event that the Licensing Authority has given notice to a party requiring clarification on a point(s) then that party shall respond to the points raised by the Licensing Authority.
- 5.3 Submissions shall be made in the following order unless the Chairperson directs otherwise:
  - 5.3.1 The Licensing Officer will orally present the Committee Report and will in particular advise the Committee as to:
    - a the options available to it;
    - b the considerations that are relevant in reaching its decision.
  - 5.3.2 The Applicant (or the Applicant's Representative) may orally present its submission which may include:

- a presenting their case in accordance with the papers, which will have been circulated with Agenda papers;
- b confirming key information and answer pertinent questions; and
- c calling witnesses in support of the Application (see paragraph 4.3).

A Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties will orally present their representations in turn which shall include:

- a the grounds of the representation to the Application; and
- b any condition(s) that the Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties would be happy to have the Application granted subject to which would cause the representation to be withdrawn.

#### 6 Questioning of Submissions

- 6.1 The Chairperson will regulate the order in which questions are asked by Members.
- 6.2 The Chairperson and Members, voiced through the Chairperson, may question any party following the completion of their submission.
- 6.3 The Chairperson will normally permit the Applicant, a Responsible Authority/Authorities or an Interested Party/Parties to ask questions through them of the other parties
- 6.4 The Chairperson may direct that questions which are not relevant to the Application or one of the four Licensing Objectives are not formally put or answered.

#### 7 Documentation

7.1 No party shall present new documentation to the Committee at the Hearing other than with the consent of all of the other parties. This does not preclude the Licensing Officer from correcting errors, providing updated information or an extract from a local map showing the Applicant's Premises in the context of the surrounding premises and any Interested Party's premises. If any party is granted permission to present supplementary papers at the Hearing they shall provide at least 10 copies at the start of their submission.

#### 8 Intervention

The Chairperson shall permit the following interventions at any point in the Hearing:

- 8.1 The Committee Lawyer to advise the Committee on issues of law, procedure and relevant considerations on decision making. If necessary, the Chairperson may require the Committee, the Committee Lawyer and the Committee Manager to leave the Hearing so that advice can be given.
- 8.2 The Committee Manager to advise the Committee on procedure generally, or to request that statements made are repeated for reasons of clarity and so that they can be properly recorded.
- 8.3 The Licensing Officer to seek to clarify statements that have been made in light of information held on their file.

#### 9 Failure of Parties to Attend Hearing

- 9.1 If a party has informed the Licensing Authority that it does not intend to attend or be represented at a Hearing, the Hearing may proceed in its absence.
- 9.2 If a party has not indicated that it does not intend to attend or be represented at a Hearing and fails to attend or be represented at the Hearing then the Licensing Authority may:
  - 9.2.1 where it considers it be necessary in the public interest, adjourn the Hearing to a specified date; or
  - 9.2.2 hold the Hearing in the party's absence.
- 9.3 Where the Licensing Authority holds a Hearing in the absence of a party, it shall consider at the Hearing the application, representations or notice made by that party.

#### 10 Closing Submissions

10.1 The Chairperson shall allow first, the Responsible Authority/Authorities and the Interested Party/Parties to make a closing oral submission(s) and secondly invite the Applicant or the Applicant's Representative an opportunity to make an oral closing submission in support of the Application

#### 11 Decision

- 11.1 The Committee, the Committee Lawyer and the Committee Manager, shall retire so that the decision may be considered in private, and to consider any legal issues raised by the Members.
- 11.2 The decision, and reasons for the decision, of the Committee shall be communicated orally by the Chairperson to the parties after the Committee has deliberated in private on the Application.
- 11.3 Written reasons shall be provided soon after the deliberations of the Application and in any event within the statutory time limits.

#### **Hearing Procedure Summary**

- 1. The Chairperson welcomes all those present and introduces the Application.
- 2. The Chairperson introduces the Applicant, Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or Interested Party/Parties.
- 3. The Chairperson outlines the Hearing Procedure.
- 4. The Licensing Officer presents the Committee Report.
- 5. The Applicant addresses the Committee.
- 6. Questions to the Applicant by Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or Interested Party/Parties.
- 7. Questions to the Applicant by Members of the Committee.
- 8. Comments by Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or Interested Party/Parties.
- 9. Questions by Applicant.
- Questions to Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or Interested Party/Parties by Members of the Committee.
- 11. Summing up by Parties who have made representations.
- 12. Summing up by Applicant.
- 13. Committee retires with the Committee Lawyer and Committee Manager to consider its decision.
- 14. Committee returns and the Lawyer gives a summary of any legal advice that may have been given to the Committee, and invites the parties present to make any comments on that advice.
- 15. The Chairperson either gives the decision with reasons, or advises that it will be released in writing with reasons within the statutory time limits.

#### 5. Background information from other Departments of the Council

Following complaints from one local resident concerning noise disturbance from performances of live music at Trowbridge Cricket Club, the Wiltshire Council's Pollution

Team carried out an investigation and subsequently on the 13 May 2010, served a Noise Abatement Notice on the Club.

# 6. Conditions to be added to the Operating Schedule

Prior to the end of the 28 days consultation period and following discussions between the Applicants and Environmental Health Officer, Guy Sharp, from the Wiltshire Council's Pollution Team (a Responsible Authority named under the Licensing Act 2003), the following are to be added as conditions to the premises licence, should the application be granted by the Committee:

- A noise limiting device shall be fitted on the first floor and all live music
  provided on this floor shall be played through this device. The noise limiter
  shall be connected to the mains supply and prior to any live music being
  provided, the limiter shall be set at a level agreed with officers from the
  Environmental Protection Department of Wiltshire Council. This level shall not
  be altered and once agreed, access to the limiter shall be restricted to senior
  members of staff only for resetting purposes.
- The applicant shall submit a noise management plan. The plan shall include
  a suitable monitoring regime when live music is being provided on the first
  floor, including exact locations, frequency and documentary evidence that
  monitoring is being carried out. The plan shall be agreed by the Council's
  Environmental Protection Department in writing before any regulated
  entertainment takes place at the premises. Any minor alterations to the noise
  management plan shall be submitted to and agreed in writing, by the
  Council.
- Live music on the first floor shall be limited to two events per calendar month.
- Live music on the first floor shall cease at 2330 hours.

# 7. Legal Implications

It should be noted that both the Applicant and the Interested Parties may appeal the decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee. The decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee, however, takes immediate effect.

The Applicant and all Interested Parties have been informed of the date, time and location of the Hearing and their right to be represented.





#### RE: LICENSE APPLICATION – TROWBRIDGE CRICKET CLUB

I live in the vicinity of the premises and object to the application because I think the proposals will be detrimental to the public good. The application does not promote the following 3 licensing objectives.

- The prevention of public nuisance
- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety.

The application is such that it will increase the cliental volume, change the demographic, and extend the operating hours of the club which will intensify its use. This will have severe repercussions for residents' well being, as the exposure to public nuisance, anti social behaviour, criminal damage, and potential violent crime will increase as a direct result of this application.

#### Public Nuisance - Existing Noise Abatement Order.

Since January 2010 the Cricket Club have held live music events on the first floor of the club which have started at 9pm and finished between 2300 and 0000 hours. The levels of noise have been assessed by Environmental Health officers at Wiltshire Council. The council served the Cricket Club with a noise abatement order on 13<sup>th</sup> May 2010 because the current noise levels are a public nuisance.

From May 2010 (six months ago), the Cricket Club have been perfectly aware of the public nuisance they are causing from live music events. One may have thought that over the last six months the Cricket Club would have taken some positive action to mitigate the impact of these events. In actual fact they have breached the noise abatement order on **three** occasions and this was evidenced by the council on :14<sup>th</sup> August 2010; 23rd November 2010; 6<sup>th</sup> November 2010. There have been two other occasions when I believe excessive noise was being generated by the Cricket. However, Environmental Health Officers were unable to witness these events due to pressures of workloads.

#### Consequently, the noise abatement order remains in force.

I have enclosed witness statements that I prepared for a magistrate's hearing when the Cricket Club were minded to appeal the council's decision. In actual fact no appeal took place. These statements are enclosed as an appendix to this letter and set out the frequency of events and their impact on myself and my family.

The fact that there is a noise abatement order served on the Cricket Club clearly demonstrates that the current situation is not acceptable. Clearly, licensing the premises to play music every night of the week, and until 0200 hours at the weekends would make it significantly worse.

Any attempts by the Cricket Club to mitigate the negative impact caused by the live music over the last six months have failed. I believe six months is a reasonable amount of time for the Cricket Club to take positive action to mitigate their impact. This has not happened – therefore it seems to be a problem that cannot be resolved – possibly due to the fabric of the building. Consequently, the application is contrary to the prevention of public nuisance. If allowed, it would only exacerbate the currently unacceptable situation by allowing the nuisance to take place until later in the evening.

I note in the application that live music is to be restricted to twice per month on the first floor plus unspecified special events. It should be noted that the problems we have suffered started since the live music events have taken place on the first floor of the Cricket Club. I believe this is when the statutory public nuisance has occurred. I understand that on the 20<sup>th</sup> November a live music event took place on the ground floor of the Cricket Club under a Temporary Event Notice. In my opinion, when the music was on the ground floor there did not seem to be a significant noise problem on that occasion.

#### Public Nuisance – wording of the application

I do not believe that the monitoring processes laid out in the appendix to the application entitled 'Agreed Sound Levels/Monitoring /Actions' would be effective.

Points one and two relate to noise levels within the club but do not demonstrate that these levels will ensure that the noise abatement order is not breached for a fourth time!

Points 3 to 9 make little sense and consequently, are unlikely to mitigate any public nuisance.

I note in that the application includes exemptions for New Years Eve, and 'other special events'. 'Other events' is an ambiguous term and should not be allowed. This is because the interpretation can be far reaching and consequently could mean that live music could take place every weekend. The applicant should stipulate what constitutes a special event other than Christmas and New Years Eves.

I note the intention to have balcony doors closed. Whilst it is easy to say, this would be difficult to enforce, particularly on a hot summers evening or when a large crowd are present at an event. I suggest that the doors and windows be locked and air conditioning units be used to regulate internal temperature of the building.

#### Public Nuisance - likely to increase if license is granted

The only access to the club is via Lower Court. A public license will certainly lead to an unwelcome increase in vehicle movement along Lower Court – a quiet residential cul-de-sac - in the early hours of the morning from taxis and cars. No doubt taxis honking their horns will be a serious blight for me and other residents. The intensification of use in terms of public license and operating times are inconsistent with neighbouring residential properties. The application does nothing to address this type of public nuisance from occurring – only exacerbates its likelihood.

The pedestrian route for all clients will also be along Lower Court. The type of cliental will no doubt change as the license changes from members only and so will the number of clients and the times they will be arriving and leaving. I have no doubt that I, my family and other residents will be negatively affected by drunken, loud and antisocial behaviour as members of the public leave the premise in the small hours of the morning.

#### Public Safety

The premises are located in a residential area outside of the commercial boundary of Trowbridge as described in the council's Local Plan. Access to the premises is limited to a single point off the highway network for vehicles and pedestrians alike. Whilst there is a car park for the club, intensification of use will lead to pressure on car park capacity.

When this situation occurs and the car park is full, cars will inevitably park on the access road. There are no parking restrictions on Lower Court. This could result in access difficulties for emergency services when they are required to attend incidents at the club and could hinder emergency access to residential properties on Lower Court. This does not meet the public safety objective.

#### Crime and Disorder

The Cricket Club is located at the end of a cul-de-sac. Consequently, there is a significant detour on the route home for pedestrians living on the Seymour estate and other residential areas towards Canal Road. There is a significant risk of clients choosing to use inappropriate short cuts to get home through residents' back gardens to gain access to Palmer Road and over the Cricket Club's own fences to access Seymour Road. The club will have no influence over the behaviour of those leaving the club or the routes they choose to take. This occurrence will be a public nuisance and may lead to fences and property being damaged. It would be interesting to know if the Cricket Club have even considered this possibility, particularly as it is highly likely to negatively affect their own property.

There is also a significant risk of an increase in criminal damage to property, particularly to cars, along Lower Court from those leaving the club late at night. Again, in this respect the application does nothing to limit this from occurring. Residents along Lower Court have already experienced crime and disorder issues. I have spoken to many residents who are concerned that this

activity could increase and become more severe as the club operates longer hours and is open to the general public.

The inability of existing management at the club to mitigate impact on public nuisance, prevention of crime and disorder, and public safety In early 2010 the Cricket Club management decided to hold live music events on the first floor. Surprisingly, they were unaware that they needed a license for this activity. This demonstrates the inadequacies of the management structure at the club.

Within a 'members only' license environment, (as is the current situation), tests of these management shortcomings are probably few and far between. However, with a public license that allows anyone to drink, the challenges become for more major and inabilities to deal with this could lead to serious crime and disorder issues in the club itself and the route to and especially from it. Past experience indicates that the club management structure has neither the knowledge or experience to deal with the different and significant challenging issues that a full public license will bring coupled with the later opening hours – and consequently longer drinking times. This is an area of concern.

In addition, the club have had over 6 months to deal with the noise problems they are responsible for and have been unable to do so. But instead of stopping or adapting the offending elements of their business, they have chosen to continue and have breached the noise abatement order on three occasions. This clearly demonstrates the management's attitude towards managing their impact on the public good.

#### My proposals

Having made those points above, I would like to offer some suggestions.

#### Sale of alcohol

Many of the negative issues can be minimised by conditioning the licensing activities for the sale of alcohol to 2300 every night and retaining the current members only license.

#### Noise

Live/recorded music should be confined to the **ground floor only** until 23:00, with appropriate conditions relating to noise being agreed with the relevant authority. This should include the use of automatic noise limiters alluded to by the applicant, and an agreement to lock balcony doors and all windows, as mentioned above.

Clear monitoring arrangements and sanctions need to be in place to ensure that conditions are met. The club have demonstrated a disregard for such suggestions, throughout the recent noise abatement process.

No live or recorded / amplified music or discos are appropriate on the first floor without causing further public harm – therefore no license should be granted for this.

Any music license given should impose a limit to the frequency of events held, e.g. one per month. This would help to mitigate any negative impact on local residents.

#### Conclusion

Granting a license for live/recorded amplified music on the first floor is unacceptable for these reasons:

- 1) The existing noise abatement order served on the club
- 2) The demonstrable inability/unwillingness of the club to mitigate the public nuisance they already have caused over the last six months
- 3) Three breaches of the noise abatement order, showing either an apparent disregard for neighbour's well-being and legal processes, or an unsolvable problem that cannot be overcome.

In these circumstances, i.e. where a current noise abatement order is in effect which has been breached three times, it seems inconceivable that a license for live music and recorded / amplified music could be granted for the first floor of the premises for any time period or any day of the week. The operating times applied for are much later than currently exist. This would make the existing noise problem even more acute and unbearable for local residents.

I have nothing personal against the cricket club and I understand the sporting asset and cultural value it brings to our community. However, I believe that this license application, as it stands, would have a detrimental impact upon my life and on other residents. Therefore, I am making formal representation to you to consider my objections as outlined above. In addition, I have made several proposals as to how a license could still be granted, whilst minimising negative impact.

## Statement of Martin Aldam

- We have lived at: Trowwbridge for around three years. It is a detached, two storey house built circa 1900. The ground floor has single glazed windows. The first floor has double glazed windows. The house faces the cricket club and is approximately 50m away from the pavilion. There are no other buildings between the pavilion and our house. The space between the pavilion and our house is set to garden and is currently part of the Shaw Trust garden centre. Therefore, there is no physical structure between the pavilion and our house. In addition, I believe that the pavilion is a wooden structure with very poor sound insulation properties. Consequently, the noise made in the pavilion carries to our house without any significant impediment. Whilst the position of our house screens most of the noise from other properties on Downhayes Road, the noise does travel to properties on Palmer Road and Seymour Road which face onto the cricket field. I know of several families who have found this to be a problem although for reasons of their own they have not complained to the council or responded to the Cricket Club's recent letter.
- 2. From time to time over the past three years we have experienced noise from Trowbridge Cricket Club, such as cricket matches, early evening training sessions etc. But I believe these noises are reasonable and to be expected. I want to make it clear that I am not complaining about the cricket club in general (as implied by the letter sent from the cricket club to its neighbours), or indeed this type of noise. In addition, there is often noise caused by people leaving the club premises after an evening in the bar whilst mildly annoying, we have not complained about this. It is not our intention to cause trouble or to be unreasonable. However, there has been a material and significant change in the nature, volume and frequency of noise being emitted

- from the Cricket Club since January 2010, about which we have exercised our right to seek help from our local authority.
- 3. Since January 2010 the noise levels have risen dramatically from 9pm to midnight when live music has been played in the pavilion. The noise levels during these events are at a level which can only be described as excessive and intrusive. The noise is so loud that we can hear the words of songs inside our home, both downstairs (audible even when we have music/television on) and upstairs where there is double glazing! The local council has been informed of the situation and in the first instance requested that a log of events be collated. (Please refer to the enclosed log at Exhibit MA1 for details). Subsequently, the council conducted their own independent assessment of the noise level and have concluded that the noise from the Cricket Club is so loud and intrusive that it falls in to the category of 'statutory nuisance'. This has culminated in the council issuing a noise abatement order on the Cricket Club.
- 4. It is a person's lawful right to be able to enjoy their home and garden. We believe that the excessive and intrusive nature of the noise from the Cricket Club is compromising this right. This fact is supported by the council's decision to issue a noise abatement order on the Cricket Club.
- 5. The negative impact of the noise manifests itself in several ways; including the loss of sleep and interference with our relaxation. We have young children, who have experienced disturbed sleep (since they are at an age when they need to go to bed before the noise generally starts). Whilst for us, it is simply not possible to go to sleep because of the volume and nature of the noise being made by the Cricket Club. In essence, the choice of when we are able to go to sleep is being dictated by the Cricket Club. In addition to sleep loss, the noise levels from the Cricket Club significantly reduces our ability to relax in our home and garden. The volume of noise means that we have to increase the volume on the TV, or our own music to drown out the Cricket Club's excessive noise. When there is live music on at the Cricket Club, sitting outside in our garden is very unpleasant because the noise levels are intrusive. This situation is clearly not reasonable. There is also a psychological impact arising from the Cricket Club's excessive noise. It is

stressful not knowing when the noise will start, how long the noise will last for and when it will finally stop and allow us to go to sleep. This is a source of worry.

- 6. It is my belief that it is incumbent on a reasonable and responsible person to behave in a reasonable manner. We believe that the Cricket Club has completely ignored the negative impact they are causing and consequently are not behaving in a reasonable manner. This is borne out by the fact that the Council have notified the Cricket Club of their part in a noise problem, and to my knowledge, the Cricket Club have made no effort to mitigate their impact. In a recent letter from the Cricket Club to neighbours the Cricket Club stated that the noise would stop at 11.30pm and that noise never exceeded this time. In fact, the very same weekend the Cricket Club made excessive noise until 11.45pm and the enclosed log of events show that the usual time for events to terminate is actually midnight.
- 7. Three years ago, live music from the Cricket Club disturbed us until the early hours of the morning. After the disturbance I directly contacted the Cricket Club in person to complain about the level of noise they had made and how late it went on for. The lady's reaction I spoke to can only be described as rude and dismissive. I asked if the club had an appropriate licence for the event they had just had and I was told (by a vulgar phrase) to leave the premises. It is now clear that the Cricket Club were operating without an appropriate licence. When the new series of disturbances began I felt there was little point in contacting the Cricket Club directly due to their previous dismissive and rude behaviour towards an earlier complaint.
- 8. It is our belief that the Cricket Club are acting in an unreasonable manner and that the level of noise they are emitting is a nuisance which is having a detrimental effect on our legal right to be able to enjoy our home and garden.
- 9. The contents of this Statement are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

### Statement of Martin Aldam

- 1. I have prepared a witness statement up to and including July 2010. This statement covers the intervening period.
- 2. The Council served a noise abatement order on 13<sup>th</sup> May 2010 on Trowbridge Cricket. From this date the Cricket Club were well aware of the problem they were causing. By the 6th August 2010 the Cricket Club had also been provided with witness statements which clearly describe the negative impact their actions are having.
- 3. After being served with the noise abatement notice and witness statements, I find the attitude of the Cricket Club astonishing. One might have expected the Club to use this time to employ suitable mitigation measures as suggested by Council officers. Unfortunately, there seems to have been little effort made to mitigate their impact. The updated log shows further events that have taken place which have had a negative impact on us.
- 4. I would reiterate that it is a person's lawful right to be able to enjoy their home and garden. We believe that the excessive and intrusive nature of the noise from the Cricket Club is compromising this right. This fact is supported by the council's decision to issue a noise abatement order on the Cricket Club based on evidence they have collected themselves and notwithstanding the lack of negative responses to the Cricket Club letter to neighbours.
- 5. It is still our belief that the Cricket Club are acting in an unreasonable manner and that the level of noise they are emitting is a nuisance which is having a detrimental effect on our legal right to be able to enjoy our home and garden.
- 6. The contents of this Statement are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

In the event that members of the Sub-Committee not being fully cognisant of Trowbridge Cricket Club, may I take a little time to say who we are, what we do, and why we need this licence.

What is Trowbridge Cricket Club??

Trowbridge Cricket Club was founded in 1847 and is therefore some 163 years old.

In 1894 a cricket pavilion was built on the current site. It being only the second to be built in the UK of its style and stature. It is still there and in existence TODAY.

At This time it proudly became the 'County of Wiltshire' ground, and remains so to this very day.

The home of British cricket, 'Lords' in London of course being the first such building preceding Trowbridge and Trent Bridge, Nottingham the third such iconic building to be built.

Trowbridge Cricket Club pavilion is largely as it was built in 1894. But with some significant improvements to reflect current standards of 'Noise levels and other health and Safety issues' Due in no small measure to the loving care and attention given to fabric of the building and its environs by the current management team, Miss Davies and Mr Scrine. Who saved the club from almost certain bankruptcy some 9 years ago and the pavilion's possible demolition due to its poor condition at that time.

After taking over, together they set about a major restoration of the building to return it to the magnificent iconic structure it is today.

Currently we are planning a £250,000 refurbishment of our changing rooms and toilet facilities, and have plans to provide additional sporting facilities for disabled adults and children. Those plans are well underway and the project will be completed in December 2011.

Trowbridge Cricket Club has a wonderful history with many International cricket matches being played on its grounds up to about 15 years ago, when sadly it's changing rooms and general facilities fell far short of modern International cricketing standards. The moves above will not however return us to those happy days, cricket has moved on.

From 9 years ago when the club was at its lowest ebb to now there has been a remarkable change in its fortunes due in no small measure to the management and input of Miss Davies and Mr Scrine.

Indeed without their taking the reins and the responsibility for taking to club forward our fortunes would have very different. The result is the club now has:

Four Senior cricket teams.

Eight Youth cricket teams.

Six Junior soccer teams ( until recently ).

Working towards 2 female girls cricket teams.

Plus 'Cricket for the disabled'.

We were the first club in the **West Country** to be awarded the coveted 'Club Mark' an International standard of excellence in, nurturing youth sports and cricket/coaching to the highest stands, and putting a lot back in to the social sports scene in Wiltshire as a whole, and our local community in particular.

We have 18 (eighteen) qualified cricket coaches.

1 (one) International cricketer to support our adult teams and help to bring along the youth teams.

This is a MAJOR and visible commitment to the youth of today, they being the adults of tomorrow. And is possibly the most massive commitment to youth sport in Wiltshire as a whole.

#### Wiltshire County Cricket Team.

The club is the home to The County of Wiltshire Cricket Team, and currently we have just started a major redevelopment of the changing rooms areas, and general facilities to make it fit for the 21<sup>st</sup> century and to be a credit to Trowbridge and Wiltshire well into the future.

#### Why do we need this licence?

Surprising though it may seem, Trowbridge Cricket Club does NOT receive ANY monies from our local authority or the (ECB) England and Wales Cricket Board or any other external organisation. We have to rely solely on money generated by cricketing events-social functions-such as weddings, funerals, private parties, live music evenings and the takings over the bar. WE have no other source of income. Additionally these are some of our regular guests/users.

The Women's Institute (monthly) The Lions (twice monthly) Trowbridge Flying Club (monthly) Trowbridge Bridge Club FOUR Times (weekly) Slimmer's World (weekly) 40 Wiltshire schools ASDA quick cricket over 2 days annually. There are quite a few others.

You may ask, how can you afford a major rebuild of our changing rooms? quite simply the trustees of the cricket ground permitted us to sell a corner section for three private houses, and to keep the proceeds solely for this use.

Having given you a flavour as it were of Trowbridge Cricket Club I now wish to turn to certain aspects of this application that candidly the club finds both disturbing and distasteful, and destructive.

Summation of Events in chronological order.

Conduct of Club and History prior to February 2010.

 No known adverse behaviour or summons or refusal of any licensing applications, had no problems registered with Wiltshire Constabulary, the Wiltshire Fire Brigade, Wiltshire District Council, and now Wiltshire County Council, to our certain knowledge for close on FIFTY years.

That is UNTIL 13<sup>th</sup> May 2010 when Trowbridge Cricket Club was served with a 'Noise Abatement Notice'

This followed various discussions with environmental officers and letters passed each to the other, no physical sound monitoring had taken place by the council which we felt was odd, merely a complaint from one individual, a Mr Aldham who later turned out to be a senior council officer.

- 2.1 The club decided to closely monitor the situation, and to ask ALL the local residents to complete a very simple form asking them if the playing of live music, did interfere with the enjoyment of home and garden, as suggested by ( Mr Aldham ) and should the club be allowed to continue with 'Live' music.
- 2.2 The location of each house / distance from the stage in the clubhouse was duly recorded on an official Ordnance Survey map licence number 100007092 Obtained for planning permission purposes.

The Cricket Club presented this information to the County Council and requested that the County Council withdraw the 'Noise 'Abatement notice.

This was not forthcoming and the club started an action against the Council to 'Appeal' said notice. This was subsequently withdrawn because of concerns for the health of Mr Poplett.

The Cricket Club, purchased sound monitoring equipment, and started to monitor all live music events. And agreed to check monitor same with the Council and their equipment.

Full records have been kept since August 2010. ( Using the sound measuring equipment ).

IN ALL INSTANCES LEVELS are taken outside or close to Mr Aldham's property.

We now turn to letters that Mr Aldham has put out to the r4esidents of Lower Court, Downhayes Road, Palmer Road, and Seymour Road, Trowbridge.

They are evidenced.

- AL/1 Which is clearly designed to mislead and is untruthful? (Not till 2.00am, or Every Friday And Saturday night ).
- AL/2 This letter has been taken by persons NOT reacting to AL/1 to seemingly come from the Council and carries a style and air of authority with it that does support the view that this has origins in the Council. IT ALSO ONCE AGAIN lies about the hours and frequency of Events.

In response to the above letters the Cricket Club, mailed out a letter (copy attached) to all the residents of Lower Court, Mailed and obtained proof of posting to all those who had complained following Mr Aldham's letters.

These are by way of explanation, and to specifically explain to people just how they had been mislead. In addition our letter proposed a meeting to be held on Friday 17<sup>th</sup> December at 7.15pm at the Cricket Club to openly discuss this matter in depth, and to attempt to put right the damage that has been caused by Mr Aldham's untruthful and misleading letters.

The Cricket Club will keep the Licensing department fully informed of the results of that meeting.

The licence itself.

It is our understanding that Wiltshire Police, Wiltshire Fire Brigade have no objection to the granting of this licence.

PLUS

We have previously been informed by Environmental Services Officer Mr Guy Sharp, that he will not object to the granting of this licence subject to the Cricket Club agreeing to the criteria/ and monitoring procedure and equipment that we have jointly agreed to that being.

The Cricket Club confirms that we will adhere to:

- 1. 11.30pm finish time for 'Live' Music on the Clubs 1st Floor level.
- Will only have 'Live' music as above on two days per month.

- 3. Will closely monitor all 'Live' events, having agreed specific levels of sound with the said department. Keeping records accordingly.
- 4. Will purchase as agreed the Sound Limiter / traffic light equipment as agreed following the granting of the licence.

#### Closing comments.

The Cricket Club desires that this licence be granted for the reasons stated herein. We firmly believe that we have proved we are a responsible club and management, and do all we can to protect our many thousands of visitors a year in addition to our members. We have established a safe environment the envy of many organizations in the town, and believe our activities are supremely beneficial to the County Town of Trowbridge and County.

The granting of this licence will enable the Cricket Club to prosper and thus ensure the continuation of meaningful sports activity for all age groups. And we respectfully ask that you grant said licence.

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## Copy of Letter to residents and to people who have registered a complaint following the Aldham letters.

8<sup>th</sup> December 2010

Dear Neighbour,

Re-Recent Letters from a Mr. M. Aldham of

, Trowbridge.

My Name is Brian Scrine and I am the Chairman of Trowbridge Cricket Club.

Two days ago I was handed two letters that purport to have come from Mr Aldam, the person handing them to me was extremely upset and questioned specific parts of the letters. I was asked why was the club asking for permission to play live music every Friday and Saturday night until 2.00am the following morning, EACH week. Or, has he put it some 8 to 10 times per month.

I told him that was <u>NOT</u> the <u>case</u>, we had asked for 2 (TWO) nights per month only, and would only be granted two nights per month.

I was then shown the letter from Mr Aldham that said quite the opposite and had mislead him. And it did state:

"And I quote.

Friday until 1.30am (On the next page he STATES) (EVERY FRIDAY AND SATURDAY)

Saturday until 2.00am "

Mr Aldham has not been completely open with you, has he for instance disclosed that he is a Senior Wiltshire County Council officer in charge of road and highways (part of the Environmental Dept). This explains his knowledge of this application and events surrounding it. We also know that he is the original complainant to the cricket clubs playing of live music, which resulted in the Noise Abatement Order being imposed in the first instance.

Mr Aldham knows full well that the environmental department public protection service have the final say on this licence and they have agreed the following subject to confirmation and final parmeters.

All of which has been known by Mr Aldham for some weeks now.

- Live music to be allowed TWICE per month until 11.30pm (NOT EVERY FRIDAY AND SATURDAY)
- 2. Music to be monitored by special equipment.
- 3. Monitoring to take place at SPECIFIC points (including close to Mr Aldham's house) before and during the performance taking place.
- 4. Sound parameters INSIDE the building likely to be restricted to 90db's

The licensing authorities have suggested that we write you the known complainants and also any other interested parties, which is of course what we are doing.

We believe that Mr Aldham is using his considerable ability as a "report writer" to mislead and Mis-inform you as to the true issues in this instance.

If we are to believe him every person on the streets after 11.00pm is a potential thug and hooligan, I must remember to be in before 11.00pm in future otherwise I too could be re-categorised. We are led to believe they will all be stampeding through our hedges, tearing down our fences, damaging property of all types. We will only be safe in our beds, perhaps??

On a more serious note, you may say where the 1.30am does and 2.30am come from, specifically these hours were suggested by the <u>Wiltshire County Council Licensing Department</u> for our application for a new licence one which is seen by THEM to be more in keeping.

The licence is only the same as that of the majority of other licence public house/hotels in Wiltshire. Some do indeed have longer hours. It IS <u>NOT</u>, and <u>NEVER</u> has been our intention to play live music until these hours. And Mr Aldham knows it.

For instance we have been monitoring all the 'Live Music' events under scrutiny since August 2010 with full documentation against agreed levels. Our monitoring equipment is as the councils.

And in fact on the evening of 23rd October 2010 together with my Graham Steady the senior officer in charge of the environmental department public protection service we carried out sound recordings at the agreed points during a 'Live' performance. This included taking levels <u>OUTSIDE Mr Aldham's property</u>. Following this exercise Mr Steady said to me personally and Mrs Christine Davies and I quote, "there is not a problem", obviously he was referring to that particular evening. BUT the records show that evening to be as others recorded, NOT different to the 23<sup>rd</sup> October.

We are in very close touch with Mr Guy Sharp of Wiltshire County Council Environmental Department Public Protection department who is the officer dealing with this. I invite you to check out with him anything that I have said in this letter.

You should also be aware that we have written to both Wiltshire Councils Chief Executive, and the Councils legal director, expressing our concerns about the way/manner in which Mr Aldham is objecting to this application.

There are many points within Mr Aldham's letters that you may wish to have clarification on, that being the case we intend to hold a meeting at the club for all interested parties, and we are suggesting a date of Friday 17th December at 7.00pm.

The meeting will take place in the downstairs function room of the club and will commence at 7.15pm sharp. Please do try to attend if you have any concerns whatsoever, or you may write to me at the cricket club, leave me a telephone number and I will call you back.

On behalf of the cricket club I thank you for your time, and do assure you that we will continue have great consideration for our neighbours as we always have.

Please also note that Wiltshire Police and Fire Brigade, and the environmental department ITSELF have NO objection to this application. It is merely Mr Aldam and now a few others following his two inflammatory letters. Finally, you might wonder how common is the use of noise limiting equipment in Wiltshire that we will be required to install. THERE IS ONLY one other such unit in place in Wiltshire and that is at Broughton Gifford.

We make the following comments to the two letters':

- 1. Undated.
- 2. Dated 30<sup>th</sup> November

The first letter was posted through letter boxes in Lower Court/Seymour Road/Downhayes Road/ Palmer Road. This letter was followed up by a visit after dark to the Lower Court residents, we are unable to say if or when he made house visits to others.

The second letter is a follow up based on the very little response to his first one, we cannot say when this was delivered but one presumes it was 30<sup>th</sup> November onwards.

The two contain supposed facts regarding the current licence application by the cricket club, the method and way these so called facts are shown is designed to mislead the recipient and is clearly untruthful. It is not our intention to do other than point out just how misleading these letters are, the preparation and presentation of which is designed to have the club application dismissed by devious and probably illegal methods.

- The club withdrew its appeal because Mr Colin Poplett, who was the main witness had suffered a major heart attack some years before, this continued pressure from the councils solicitors was beginning to effect his health. The Club withdrew for this reason alone.
- 5b. Total nonsense.

- 14. Never been a problem, why should it be now?
- 15a He is unable to say this.
- A problem during the period 9.00am to 5.00pm Monday to Friday due to probation service Parking, perhaps he could arrange double yellow lines for all of the Lower Court resident on this run in to the club??
- 16. The police will confirm that the cricket is one of the best establishments in Trowbridge at controlling the public/visitors. We do not have a problem.

We have no further comments, other than to re-state we believe Mr Aldham has been misleading and untruthful in his presentation of so call FACTS, his presentation as such is deplorable and made with the intent of 'leading' witnesses to say something they probably never would if in full possession of the TRUE facts.

Dear Neighbour,

I am writing to bring to your attention that Trowbridge Cricket Club is applying to change their licensing hours and who they can serve alcohol to. You can see the blue notices on lamp posts on Lower Court which give a brief description of the application. The full application can be viewed at the Council offices in Bradley Road. I have nothing personal against the Cricket Club and I do understand the sporting asset and cultural value they add to our town. But, I believe these proposed license changes will have a detrimental impact on our lives.

The Proposed License Changes are:

Longer Hours

Basically, the Club want to open longer hours and be able to play live and recorded music until the following times:

Friday until 1.30 am

Saturday until 2.00 am.

#### Public License.

I understand that currently the club operate on a member's only license. So, the general public cannot go unless they are signed in by member. The application is to allow **anyone** to go and buy alcohol. These people won't have a vested interest in the wellbeing of the club. Also, this change will mean that many more people will be going and leaving the club since it will not be restricted to members only.

Having spoken to some neighbours, there is agreement that these two changes are quite significant. Under the proposals **ANYONE** will be able to drink at the club until **LATE**. This will have severe repercussions on those who live in the vicinity of the Cricket Club.

- More people will be leaving much later having had time to drink more
- Not all of these people will be members
- There will inevitably be more anti social behaviour and potentially criminal damage to gardens and cars.
- Taxis arriving up to 0230 honking their horns
- Car doors slamming in the small hours in the car park
- General noise from those leaving in the car park and on Lower Court in the small hours
- Inappropriate short cuts taken to Palmer Road and Seymour Road through peoples gardens.

I believe it is likely that the changes will create a public nuisance and have crime and disorder issues for us, our families and property.

I have spoken to several neighbours. At the moment, neighbours do hear people leaving. This is around 11.30pm and is not intimidating. Under the proposals, this disruption is likely to be more extreme, last longer, be more frequent (i.e. every Friday and Saturday night) and take place much later probably up to 2.30 am at the weekends.

- I have spoken with Council officers about how to make comments. And as you can imagine it is not straight forward! You can only object to the four licensing objectives.
- I think these proposals could cause a public nuisance and crime and disorder issues for you and me. If you agree, then I would urge you to write to the council outlining your views. I am willing to prepare something for you to send to the council.

The closing date for any representation is the 6<sup>th</sup> December 2010.

PS: If the Cricket Club representatives say to you that they won't cause a problem and they are only asking for these operating hours just in case they need them. Be careful! Because if they didn't want to operate these hours they didn't need to apply for them! I think the only reason they are applying to open LATE and serve ANYONE is because that is exactly what they intend to do – every weekend.

You should also know that the Cricket Club have been served a Noise Abatement Order on them this summer by the Council because they are already causing a public nuisance from live music events. Whilst this may not affect you directly, it does affect some neighbours. As a responsible entity you may have thought the Cricket Club would have taken positive action to deal with their negative impact. But, the fact is, they do not seem to have done so. Amazingly, they seem to have done nothing and have breached the noise abatement order on THREE occasions!

You will have to ask yourself what the Club's attitude will be to any negative impact they cause to you, your family or your property from their proposal to open LATE and serve ANYONE.


