LICENSING COMMITTEE

PROCEDURAL RULES FOR THE HEARING OF LICENSING ACT 2003 APPLICATIONS

1 Purpose

- 1.1 These rules have been prepared to facilitate proper consideration of licence applications, made under the Licensing Act 2003, by the Licensing Committee and its Sub Committees.
- 1.2 The rules set out a framework for how applications are to be heard and explain the role of the participants at the Hearing.

2 Definitions

- 2.1 The following definitions describe the participants at and the subject matter of a Hearing:
 - "Applicant" means the person who has submitted an Application for consideration by the Committee.
 - "Applicant's Premises" means premises subject to the Application.
 - "Applicant's Representative" means a person attending a Hearing to assist or represent an Applicant including a lawyer.
 - "Application" means an application for the Grant/Variation/Transfer/Review and any other decision to be made by the Committee/Sub-Committee in respect of a Licence.
 - "Chairperson" means the Member who is the Chairperson of the Committee for the particular Hearing.
 - "Committee" means the Council's Licensing Committee and includes any Sub Committee of the Licensing Committee.
 - "Committee Lawyer" means the Council's Lawyer (including an external Lawyer instructed by the Council's Legal & Democratic Services Manager) who is present at a Hearing to advise the Chairperson and the Members.
 - "Committee Manager" means the Council's Officer who is present at a Hearing to take minutes.

- "Committee Report" means the Licensing Officer's written report to the Committee concerning an Application, a copy of which has been previously made available to the Applicant or their Representative, a Responsible Authority or their Representative or an Interested Party or their Representative.
- "Hearing" means a meeting of the Committee at which an Application is considered.
- "Licence" means a Licence which the Committee has the power or duty inter alia to grant, transfer, suspend or revoke.
- "Licensing Officer" means the Council's Licensing Officer(s) who is/are present at a Hearing to present reports in respect of an Application and to give technical advice in respect of an Application to the Committee when requested.
- "Licensing Authority" the Council in whose geographical area the subject matter of the Application relates to, and includes the Council's Licensing Committee, any Sub Committee of the Licensing Committee and a Licensing Officer.
- "Member" means a Member who is a Member of the Committee that is considering an Application.
- "Responsible Authority" means a person who is present at a Hearing to make representations in respect of an Application in their capacity as Responsible Authority and includes any person who is present to assist or make representations on behalf of the Responsible Authority including a Lawyer.
- "Interested Party" means a person who is present at a Hearing to make representations in respect of an Application in their capacity as an Interested Party, and includes any person who is present to assist or make representations on behalf of the Interested Party including a Lawyer.

3 Key Principles

- 3.1 The principles of 'natural justice', and Article 6 'Right to a Fair Trial', which is one of the Convention Rights in the Human Rights Act 1998, require that there is a fair Hearing of Applications.
- 3.2 Natural justice is an umbrella term for the legal standards of basic fairness. This will include that:
 - 3.2.1 the Applicant has an opportunity to make representations before a decision is made;
 - 3.2.2 those making representations have an opportunity to voice their representations before a decision is made;

- 3.2.3 the Applicant has an adequate opportunity to consider and respond to any submissions made by a Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties;
- 3.2.4 the Committee does not exclude an Applicant from a Hearing in order to consider submissions from a Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties.
- 3.3 It is also fundamental that there is an orderly presentation of submissions at a Hearing so that the relevant issues are properly understood, evidence is tested and that oral statements made at the Hearing are accurately recorded.
- 3.4 Ultimately the Chairperson determines the application of these rules, having regard to any submissions being made by those present and in particular the Committee Lawyer.

4 The Hearing

- 4.1 The Hearing shall take place in public.
 - 4.1.1 The Committee may exclude the public from all or part of the Hearing where it considers it to be in the public interest to do so and, in accordance with the Local Government (Access to Information) Act 1985, as amended. Public includes a party and any person assisting or representing a party.
 - 4.1.2 The Committee may require any person attending the Hearing who, in its opinion, is behaving in a disruptive manner, to leave the Hearing and may:
 - a refuse to permit them to return;
 - b permit them to return only on such conditions as the Committee may specify;
 - c in the event that a person is required to leave a Hearing that person may, before the end of the Hearing, submit to the Committee in writing any information which they would have given orally.
- 4.2 Prior to the Hearing commencing, the Chairperson shall advise the parties of the procedure it proposes to follow at the Hearing.
- 4.3 Where a party has previously requested permission for a person(s), other than their representative, to appear at the Hearing then the Committee shall consider whether to permit that request.
- 4.4 The Committee will allow the parties an equal maximum period of time in which to exercise their rights.

- 4.5 This equal maximum time may have been notified in advance of the Hearing;
- 4.6 Where there is a multiple of Interested Parties who have attended the Hearing to make the same representation then the Committee would normally require that a spokesperson be appointed by them to make the representations on behalf of all of those Interested Parties.

5 Presentation of Submissions

- 5.1 The Chairperson will introduce the Application.
- 5.2 In the event that the Licensing Authority has given notice to a party requiring clarification on a point(s) then that party shall respond to the points raised by the Licensing Authority.
- 5.3 Submissions shall be made in the following order unless the Chairperson directs otherwise:
 - 5.3.1 The Licensing Officer will orally present the Committee Report and will in particular advise the Committee as to:
 - a the options available to it;
 - b the considerations that are relevant in reaching its decision.
 - 5.3.2 The Review Applicant (or the Applicant's Representative) will orally present its submission which may include:
 - a presenting their case in accordance with the papers, which will have been circulated with Agenda papers;
 - b confirming key information and answer pertinent questions; and
 - c calling witnesses in support of the Application (see paragraph 4.3).

A Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties will orally present their representations in turn which shall include:

- a the grounds of the representation to the Application; and
- b any condition(s) that the Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties would be happy to have the Application granted subject to which would cause the representation to be withdrawn.

The Premises Licence Holder and/or their representative will orally present their representations which shall include;

a The response to the representations made by the Review Applicant, a Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties; and

b Whether they would be happy to accept any modifications to the Licence as suggested by the Review Applicant, a Responsible Authority/Authorities and/or an Interested Party/Parties.

6 Questioning of Submissions

- 6.1 The Chairperson will regulate the order in which questions are asked by Members
- 6.2 The Chairperson and Members, voiced through the Chairperson, may question any party following the completion of their submission.
- 6.3 The Chairperson will normally permit the Applicant, a Responsible Authority/Authorities or an Interested Party/Parties to ask questions through them of the other parties.
- 6.4 The Chairperson may direct that questions which are not relevant to the Application or one of the four Licensing Objectives are not formally put or answered.

7 Documentation

7.1 No party shall present new documentation to the Committee at the Hearing other than with the consent of all of the other parties. This does not preclude the Licensing Officer from correcting errors, providing updated information or an extract from a local map showing the Applicant's Premises in the context of the surrounding premises and any Interested Party's premises. If any party is granted permission to present supplementary papers at the Hearing they shall provide at least 10 copies at the start of their submission.

8 Intervention

The Chairperson shall permit the following interventions at any point in the Hearing:

- 8.1 The Committee Lawyer to advise the Committee on issues of law, procedure and relevant considerations on decision making. If necessary, the Chairperson may require the Committee, the Committee Lawyer and the Committee Manager to leave the Hearing so that advice can be given.
- 8.2 The Committee Manager to advise the Committee on procedure generally, or to request that statements made are repeated for reasons of clarity and so that they can be properly recorded.
- 8.3 The Licensing Officer to seek to clarify statements that have been made in light of information held on their file.

9 Failure of Parties to Attend Hearing

- 9.1 If a party has informed the Licensing Authority that it does not intend to attend or be represented at a Hearing, the Hearing may proceed in its absence.
- 9.2 If a party has not indicated that it does not intend to attend or be represented at a Hearing and fails to attend or be represented at the Hearing then the Licensing Authority may:
 - 9.2.1 where it considers it be necessary in the public interest, adjourn the Hearing to a specified date; or
 - 9.2.2 hold the Hearing in the party's absence.
- 9.3 Where the Licensing Authority holds a Hearing in the absence of a party, it shall consider at the Hearing the application, representations or notice made by that party.

10 Closing Submissions

10.1 The Chairperson shall allow first, the Responsible Authority/Authorities and the Interested Party/Parties to make a closing oral submission(s) and secondly invite the Applicant or the Applicant's Representative an opportunity to make an oral closing submission in support of the Application.

11 Decision

- 11.1 The Committee, the Committee Lawyer and the Committee Manager, shall retire so that the decision may be considered in private, and to consider any legal issues raised by the Members.
- 11.2 The decision, and reasons for the decision, of the Committee shall be communicated orally by the Chairperson to the parties after the Committee has deliberated in private on the Application.
- 11.3 Written reasons shall be provided soon after the deliberations of the Application and in any event within the statutory time limits.

Review Hearing Procedure Summary

- 1. The Chairperson welcomes all those present and introduces the Application.
- 2. The Chairperson invites the Sub-Committee Members, Council Officers, the Review Applicant and/or their representative, any Responsible Authorities and/or Interested Parties and the Premises Licence Holder and/or their representative to introduce themselves.
- 3. The Chairperson outlines the Hearing Procedure.
- 4. The Licensing Officer presents the Committee Report and outlines the application.
- 5. The Review Applicant and/or their representative address the Sub-Committee to present their case.
- 6. Questions to the Review Applicant by Members of the Sub-Committee, any Responsible Authorities and/or Interested Parties and the Premises Licence Holder.
- 7. Responsible Authorities and/or Interested Parties who have made relevant representations address the Sub-Committee.
- 8. Questions to any of the Responsible Authorities and/or Interested Parties by Members of the Sub-Committee, the Review Applicant and the Premises Licence Holder
- 9. The Premises Licence Holder and/or their representative address the Sub-Committee to present their case.
- 10. Questions to the Premises Licence Holder by Members of the Sub-Committee, any Responsible Authorities and/or Interested Parties and the Review Applicant.
- 11. Summing up by the Responsible Authorities and/or Interested Parties who have made relevant representations.
- 12. Summing up by the Premises Licence Holder.
- 13. Summing up by the Review Applicant.
- 14. The Sub-Committee retires with the Committee Lawyer and Committee Manager to consider its decision.
- 15. Sub-Committee returns and the Lawyer gives a summary of any legal advice that may have been given to the Sub-Committee, and invites the parties present to make any comments on that advice.
- 16. The Chairperson either gives the decision with reasons, or advises that it will be released in writing with reasons within the statutory time limits.

<u>Application for Review of a Premises Licence; Guildhall Bar, 9 Oxford Street,</u> <u>Malmesbury, Wiltshire, SN16 9AX</u>

1. Purpose of Report

1.1 To determine an application for a Review of a Premises Licence in respect of the Guildhall Bar, 9 Oxford Street, Malmesbury, Wiltshire, made by Ms L Penfold, a local resident living in the vicinity of the premises.

2. Background Information

- 2.1 An application for the Review of the Guildhall Bar Premises Licence has been made by Ms L Penfold. Following advertisement of the application 7 relevant representations have also been received.
- 2.2 Wiltshire Council (as the Licensing Authority) must hold a hearing to consider the review application and any representations received. In accordance with Section 52 (3) of The Licensing Act 2003 the Licensing Sub Committee is required to take such steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 2.3 The licensing objectives are:
 - i) The Prevention of Crime and Disorder;
 - ii) Public Safety;
 - iii) The Prevention of Public Nuisance; and
 - iv) The Protection of Children from Harm.

2.4 Such steps are:

- i) To modify the conditions of the licence.
- ii) To exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence.
- iii) To remove the designated premises supervisor.
- iv) To suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months.
- v) To revoke the licence.
- vi) To determine that no steps are necessary

Government Guidance issued under s.182 of the Licensing Act 2003 states that:

"Licensing Authorities should also note that modifications of conditions and exclusions of licensable activities may be imposed either permanently or for a temporary period of up to three months. Temporary changes or suspension of the licence for up to three months could impact on the business holding the

licence financially and would only be expected to be pursued as a necessary means of promoting the licensing objectives. So, for instance, a licence could be suspended for a weekend as a means of deterring the holder from allowing the problems that gave rise to the review to happen again. However, it will always be important that any detrimental financial impact that may result from a licensing authority's decision is necessary and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives"

- 2.5 The premise benefits from a Premises Licence issued under the Licensing Act 2003 since 24th November 2005 and this is attached as **Appendix 1**.
- 2.6 A review of this premises licence has taken place previously on 16th June 2008. The decision notice from this hearing is attached at **Appendix 2**.
- 2.7 Since the hearing in 2008, Wiltshire Council has not received any complaints in relation to the premises until such time that the request for review of licence was received.

3. Details of the Grounds for Review

- 3.1 The review of the licence has been requested on the grounds that the premises have been conducted in such a manner as to prejudice the licensing objectives. The grounds for review are:
 - Prevention of Crime and Disorder: the patrons of the premises stand and drink on the street, fight, break windows and behave in a threatening manner
 - Public Safety: the patrons of the premises stand in the street and present a danger to late night traffic.
 - Prevention of Public Nuisance: the noise levels from the premises and its patrons are very high.
- 3.2 The application for review is attached as **Appendix 3**

4. Consultation and Representations

4.1 The review process requires a public notice to be posted on the premises for a period of 28 days together with a copy of the notice posted at the offices of Wiltshire Council, Monkton Park, Chippenham. During the consultation period 7 relevant representations have been received. Four (4) from residents living in the vicinity of the premises (interested parties), one (1) from the local residents association, one (1) from a local Councillor and one (1) from Wiltshire Constabulary (responsible authority).

All representations support the issues raised in the application for review of the premises licence.

A location map of premises and surrounding area is attached as **Appendix 5**.

A list of other licensed premises in the town of Malmesbury and their hours for supply of alcohol is attached at **Appendix 6.**

- 4.2 The Sub Committee can take into account documentary or other information presented at the hearing with the consent of all other parties.
- 4.3 The representations included the following suggestions on how to address the concerns raised.
 - Hours of opening are restricted to closure at 11pm on all nights of the week.
 - Licensee formally warned that disturbances of any kind will result in immediate withdrawal of the licence.
 - Withdrawal of the Licence
 - Restriction on opening hours.
 - Revocation of the Licence.
 - Engage constructively with local police to address issues mentioned in representations.

5. Legal Implications

5.1 This hearing is governed by the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations. These provide that hearings should be held in public unless the Licensing Authority considers that the public interest in excluding the public outweighs the public interest in the hearing taking place in public.

6. Officer Recommendations

6.1 Officers are not permitted to make a recommendation – the decision is to be reached by the members of the Licensing Sub Committee.

7. Right of Appeal

7.1 It should be noted that the Premises Licence Holder, the party that applied for the review and any Responsible Authority or Interested Parties who have made representations may appeal the decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee to the Magistrates Court. The appeal must be lodged with the Magistrates Court within 21 days of the notification of the decision.

- 7.2 The decision of the Licensing Sub Committee does not take effect until the end of the period for appealing against that decision. In the event of an appeal being lodged, the decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee does not take effect until any appeal is heard and finally determined.
- 7.3 The Premises Licence Holder and all Interested Parties have been informed of the date, time and location of the hearing and their right to attend and be represented.

ANNEX 1 - MANDATORY CONDITIONS

Door Supervision

Where this Premises Licence includes a condition that one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, those individuals who are present to guard against a, b or c must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority:

- Unauthorised access or occupation (eg through door supervision)
- Outbreaks of disorder b.
- Damage C.

Supply of Alcohol

Where this Licence authorises the supply of alcohol:

No supply of alcohol may be made under this licence:

- At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of it
- At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended"

Every retail sale or supply of alcohol made under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a Personal Licence.

Exhibition of Films

Where this Licence authorises the exhibition of films:

The admission of children under the age of 18 to film exhibitions permitted under the terms of this licence shall be restricted in accordance with any recommendations made:

- By the British Board of Film Classification (BBFC,) where the film has been classified by that Board
- By the Licensing Authority where no classification certificate has been granted by the BBFC or, where the Licensing Authority has notified b. the licence holder that section 20 (3) (b) (74 (3) (b) for clubs) of the Licensing Act 2003 applies to the film.

ANNEX 2B - OPERATING SCHEDULE

PREVENTION PUBLIC NUISANCE

- All supply/sale of alcohol shall comply with the Portman Group Code of Practice.
- There shall be no external flashing neon lighting.

PUBLIC SAFETY

None

PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

A recognised proof of age, which includes a photograph, is to be required for anyone who appears to be under the age of 21 and who wishes to purchase or consume alcohol.

PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

- Staff will take all reasonable precautions to ensure that people entering the premises are not carrying illegal drugs.
- The Premises shall register as a member of the Pubwatch Scheme in the locality and a representative of the Management Team shall attend all meeting.
- A minimum of one search of the premises is to be carried out each day when licensable activities are taking place for illegal drugs and drug paraphernalia.
- Should any person be found in possession of illegal drugs they are to be asked to leave the premises and the police informed as soon as practicable.
- All incidents involving the use of illegal drugs and/or criminal activity are to be reported to the police as soon as practicable.

ANNEX 3 - HEARING

- No person under the age of eighteen years may be on the premises at any time during licensed hours for a period of three months, to commence from the date that the premises has re-opened following the suspension.
- All staff serving alcohol on the premises shall have undertaken the BII Social Responsibility Course at the cost of the Designated Premises Supervisor.
- Records shall be maintained on the premises detailing the training of staff in relation to licensing law, with particular emphasis on the prevention of under age sales and the legal requirement not to serve persons who are intoxicated. Such records are to be available for inspection by the Police or Licensing Officer on request.
- The premises shall implement and operate a Think 25 Policy.
- A risk assessment of the requirement for SIA staff is to be carried out by the Designated Premises Supervisor. Upon completion this risk assessment should be provided to the Licensing Officer. This risk assessment should be reviewed annually.

- CCTV will be installed at the premises to the satisfaction of the Police. The cameras will cover all areas accessed by the public including
 entrances and exits. The quality of recorded images will be of sufficient quality so as to allow identification. The images will be retained
 securely for a minimum of 28 days and will be presented on demand to the Police Authority.
- Mr Colin Pike is to be removed as the Designated Premises Supervisor and a new Designated Premises Supervisor appointed prior to the
 re-opening of the premises Condition complied with on 3rd July 2008.

Details of Determination

Determination of hearing

In reaching our determination we have taken into account the Council's Licensing Policy and Government guidance, including the licensing objectives. We have also taken into account the Review Applicant's submission the relevant representations received and the comments made by all parties at the hearing.

We have determined that:

- (1) The premises licence is to be suspended for a period of up to two calendar months to enable the premises to reposition itself within the night time economy of Malmesbury and carry out required staff training. If the licence holder can satisfy the Police and Licensing Officer that all of the required conditions set out in (2) below have been successfully implemented, then permission may be granted in writing by the Licensing Officer for the premises to open prior to the end of this two month period.
- (2) The following additional conditions are to be imposed on the premises licence:
 - (a) No person under the age of eighteen years may be on the premises at any time during licensed hours for a period of three months, to commence from the date that the premises has re-opened, following the suspension in (1) above.
 - (b) All staff serving alcohol on the premises shall have undertaken the BII Social Responsibility Course at the cost of the designated premises supervisor.
 - (c) Records shall be maintained on the premises detailing the training of staff in relation to licensing law, with particular emphasis on the prevention of under age sales and the legal requirement not to serve persons who are intoxicated, such records to be available for inspection by the Police or Licensing Officer on request .
 - (d) The premises implements and operates a think 25 policy.
 - (e) A risk assessment of the requirement for SIA staff be carried out by the designated premises supervisor, Upon completion, this risk assessment should be provided to the Licensing Officer and Police. This risk assessment should be reviewed annually.
 - (f) CCTV will be installed at the premises to the satisfaction of the Police, The cameras will cover all areas accessed by the public including entrances and exits. The quality of recorded images will be of sufficient quality so as to allow identification. The images will be retained securely for a minimum of 28 days and will be presented on demand to the Police Authority.
- (3) Mr Colin Pike is to be removed as the designated premises supervisor and a new DPS appointed prior to the reopening of the premises.

Reason/s for decision

The Hearing has considered the concerns of the police and interested parties in relation to the protection of children from both physical and moral harm and the prevention of public nuisance and is satisfied that the conditions set out above are proportionate and necessary to address these concerns.

The Guildhall Bar is a pub in Oxford Street in Malmesbury which is very popular with youngsters. Local police tell us that because of its late licensing hours on Fridays and Saturdays, it attracts people who first frequent other pubs with earlier closing times

The landlords do not appear to exercise any control over their clientele, neither while the pub is open nor after closing time. As a result, in the small hours of Saturday and Sunday mornings the street is often full of people on the pavements and in the road; these people are always drinking, shouting and swearing. Fights occasionally break out and damage has been caused to neighbouring properties. This can continue until 2 a.m. and beyond.

The applicants have been threatened by these people. For example, I have telephoned my husband to warn him not to come home down Oxford Street while fighting was going on in the street. Our doorbell was rung in the early hours. People sit on our windowsill and shout. The neighbouring café (Amanda's) and the kitchen shop by the Market Cross had their windows broken. For several years windows on the empty property directly across from the pub have been boarded because of breakages (the property owner tells us) by drunken customers of the pub. As well as the noise and disturbance in the street, the noise from the pub itself is frequently unbearable. The volume at which the pub plays its music is very loud indeed, and the people's shouting is very disturbing. I and some of my neighbours, including the applicants from Tower House, have had to install secondary glazing to attenuate the noise, and despite shutting ourselves in the back of our house during these night time disturbances we find we are always aware of the noise and — when we do mange to get to sleep - we are woken up regularly by the noise these people make.

Sometimes cars will pick up people from the pub and the drivers will stop outside and sound their horn, regardless of the late hour. People spill out onto the street, which makes it dangerous for drivers. Visitors to my house have felt unsafe when leaving my house after a visit.

On Saturday and Sunday mornings it is not unusual to find half full beer glasses in the street, along with broken glass and rubbish; evidence of vomit is not uncommon. I have taken photographs which illustrate the problem, and I am happy to present these as evidence. I have recorded that:

- On 10th June 2011 between 11 p.m. and 00:30 a.m. there was music blasting out of the Guildhall, and about 12 people shouting in the street and going in and out of the pub.
- On 17th June 2011, at 00:30 a.m. the street outside the Guildhall was full of people drinking and shouting, and this continued beyond 1:00 a.m.
- On 25th June 2011young people were in and out of the Guildhall, making much noise which we could hear from our bedroom with all the doors closed. The applicants have called the police a number of times when the noise and/or threatening behaviour has been particularly bad. Police records will show the frequency of these calls. That said, not a weekend goes by without there being a problem so the absence of a call to the police, or the absence of a written record, does not signify a quiet night.

The problem is not new. Applications to the licensing authority to amend the licence have been made before and I understand that they failed because the Guildhall is next door to another pub — the Borough Arms - and the applicants could not identify which pub was causing the problem. We are therefore filing an application for each pub with the same complaint and the substantially the same evidence, which we can corroborate with photos. From our vantage point directly across the street, we see both pubs being treated by the young customers as a single hostelry, with customers constantly leaving one pub, entering the other and then congregating outside both pubs. Succeeding with an application to restrain the licence of one pub while leaving

the other unaffected will simply transfer the problem. Council records show that complaints were made in years gone by. The licensing sub-committee decided in 2008 to impose a two month closure on the Guildhall Bar and certain other conditions, but it seems that there has been no change; indeed letters of complaint drafted years ago could have been written today. We believe that the reputation of the pubs have made this area of Malmesbury into a "no go" area. When my husband and I were planning to buy 8 Oxford Street a year ago, residents of Gloucester Road queried whether we really wanted to move into the area. A number of premises in Oxford Street have been up for sale, and prospective buyers are reluctant to invest in this problem street. As a result, the area is becoming derelict. We believe restricting the licence to 11 p.m. is essential for public safety, the prevention of crime and disorder, the prevention of public nuisance, an end to antisocial behaviour at anti-social hours and a general improvement in the quality of life in the area.



Dear Trustees of the Warden and Freemen of Malmesbury,

As the local Sergeant in charge of the Neighbourhood Policing teams in Malmesbury I write to you fresh from a full Town Council meeting that I attended this evening in Malmesbury town hall. I was advised to write to you in relation to ongoing issues we have with premises that I understand you own in Oxford Street and lease to a Mr Colin Pike, the premises trading as The Guild Hall Public House.

My job that I take very seriously and with great pride is working with the Community and our partners in reducing crime and the fear of crime. This involves working with all licensees in Malmesbury. Over the past three years I have been working closely with Mr Pike in reducing crime and anti-social behaviour (ASB). I am pleased to report that the number of violent crimes that we were receiving from within the premises has significantly reduced and these matters are not coming to our attention. However despite advising and working with Mr Pike I find it increasingly frustrating that nearby residents and users of the highway are still being subjected to unacceptable levels of ASB.

The situation at the premises is not helped by the apparent reluctance of Mr Pike to work with us to solve this issue. It is not acceptable for the customers of The Guildhall to go onto the highway with or without drinks, create unacceptable levels of noise, and obstruct innocent members of the public driving along the road and cause disruptions to nearby residents.

I, as have my colleagues, have had many occasions to visit Mr Pike and advice him of this, sadly Mr Pike adopts the attitude that we are harassing him and the issues lie with the neighbouring premises of the Borough Arms. I can say from evidence gathered on patrol that Mr Newman, Licensee of the Borough Arms spends many hours on the door of his premises, or another family or staff member ensuring that his customers behave in an orderly fashion. I have no issues with the Borough Arms and the running of their establishment (Another premises owned by you)

In summary the current issues we are experiencing with your property are;

- Allegations of underage drinking
- Drug use/possession(3 seizures of a class B drug from customers in one night)
- Obstruction of the highway causing intimidation to motorist by customers
- ASB linked to the premises causing distress to nearby residential premises.


Following continual disturbances again from the Borough Arms pub and The Guildhall Bar in recent months and in support of Lyn Penfold's request for a Licence Review, I have enclosed a Representation form for each of the two premises with attachments for your consideration.

I wish to express my extreme concern about the lawlessness of the customers of these two establishments and the continued lack of control shown once again by the Licensees.

It has been 3½ years since these two premises' licences were reviewed and actions to correct the antisocial behaviour and criminal activities were required.


Regrettably, there was only a temporary improvement in the situation and, in fact, the impact of the continuing problems has exacerbated the commercial and residential quality of the street. We have had recent discussions with local people who have been put off purchasing properties for sale on the street because of the problems with this bar and pub.

Residents and cars driving down Oxford Street have experienced intimidating crowds of up to 40 people spilling across the street and who are noisy, drunk, vomiting and urinating, all of which have been witnessed on recent occasions; breaking drinking glasses and windows in adjacent premises. They are extremely threatening as they refuse to move out of the road.

However, additional information in support of your Representation may be considered if all parties at the Hearing agree. We advise that you detail all matters that you wish to be considered on this initial Representation, attaching additional sheets if necessary.

If you do make a Representation you will be invited to attend the Licensing Sub-Committee Hearings and any subsequent appeal proceedings relevant to your Representation.

All Representations in their entirety, including your name and address, will be disclosed to the Premises Licence applicant.

The problems with the Guildhall Bar have been ongoing for many years. Three and a half years ago in 2008 the police brought this to the attention of the Licensing Authority and the premises were required to carry out remedial action including a 2 month closure, CCTV installation, new supervisor etc. There was a brief lull and then problems restarted.

Local people are victims of this antisocial and sometimes criminal behaviour.

The Guildhall Bar had an opportunity to mend its ways three years ago but continues to perpetuate its abuse.

I have no hesitation in recommending the licence for these premises should be revoked. The Guildhall Bar has shown that it is irresponsible in managing the behaviour of its customers and has become a focal point for excessive drinking; antisocial behaviour; drug abuse and sometimes criminal behaviour. The behaviour has resulted in an enormous drop in the quality of life in the neighbourhood with constant feelings of intimidation for all who live in the area.

Having spoken to the police on many occasions we would ask that they give evidence in this licence review.

Most recent contacts with the police: Friday 28th October 2011 at 1.20 am: large group causing antisocial behaviour, noise, people in the street etc.

Saturday 5th November 2011 at 1.30 am: large group causing antisocial behaviour, noise, people in the street etc.





I am writing in support of Mr and Mrs Penfold's application for the review of these licenses. We live close by in the Cross Hayes and have supported a previous request for the the review of the licenses which did result in some improvement for us. The spillover of the rowdiness, swearing and fighting into the Cross Hayes has reduced but not disappeared. Nonetheless I frequently have to pass the pubs at 08.00am on a Sunday morning and often find an unpleasant mess outside the pubs.

However for those living in closer proximity it is obviously a nightmare. Decent families do not deserve to have their lives wrecked by this behavior and for many this is a "no-go" area after 11pm. This area of Oxford Street has become very rundown and as it is right in the centre of the town, it has a very detrimental effect on local business and the life of the town in general. A major factor is the rowdiness and drunkenness emanating from these pubs.

I respectfully request that the Licensing Authority considers changing the license hours so that both pubs close at 11pm every day.

It is with grave concern that I write to you with reference to the re-licencing of the Guildhall and the Borough Arms Public Houses in Malmesbury. We have lived in our house in the centre of Malmesbury for over 7 years now and we have grown increasingly concerned with the behaviour and attitude of the clientele of these 2 public houses. When out visiting friends on the other side of Malmesbury, I, as a lone female, despite being in the military for 18 years, would never dream of walking along Oxford Street due to the aggressive and abusive nature of the clientele who without fail have spilled out on the road outside to smoke, chat, spit and, on occasion, scuffle. Even when with my husband, we still avoid the area as it is extremely intimidating to have to walk through such a large crowd, many of whom are not from Malmesbury itself. We believe that the late licencing hours encourage out of town visitors to the bars and we feel that if their opening hours were limited to the old closing times of 11 pm there would be less reason for these non-Malmesbury residents to visit the pubs and consequentially there would be less spill over onto the road.

On Saturday and Sunday mornings it is extremely disturbing to have to manoeuvre our 3 young children through the inevitable and frequent pools of vomit in the alleyway beside the Guildhall and the Borough Arms - Market Lane. We park behind the Library in The Cross Hayes and have noticed a significant increase in the times that we have been greeted by vomit there too when off to a rugby or football match early on a weekend morning.

We feel very strongly that the late opening of both of these bars has had a huge detrimental impact on the centre of Malmesbury. If residents feel unable to walk safely to their own properties after dark in this beautiful, ancient town then something needs to be done; we suggest very strongly that limiting the opening times of both of these public houses would be a significant start.


Licensing issues at - Guildhall Bar, Oxford Street and Borough Arms, Oxford Street, Malmesbury

The Association has been approached by a number of its members about the serious breaches of the Licence conditions of the two premises at title. We have been made aware over many months of the impact of these breaches, and the subsequent anti-social behaviour, that has, and continues to be, regularly inflicted upon local people. We feel that the foregoing situation will not improve under the present management of these establishments given the conditions associated with their Licence and hence we look to you as the Licensing Authority to take the necessary action to provide a sustainable long-term solution to this long running issue.

The landlords concerned appear unwilling to exercise any influence over their customers during their hours of opening or afterwards. This results in large numbers of people congregating late at night or early morning in the vicinity of Oxford Street continuing to drink, make excessive noise and engage in rowdy activity which often spills over into aggressive confrontational behaviour. Local commercial properties have suffered damage as a result of these unacceptable activities.

People have complained of intimidating behaviour toward them and their guests in Oxford Street and its immediate surrounds to the extent that certain times of the late evening/early morning on a Friday or Saturday are considered by local residents as a 'no go' area. The police are routinely advised of this unacceptable activity; a review of police records will indicate the frequency of the calls to report instances of this type of disturbance.

This situation will of course not be new to you as the sorts of issues described above in relation to the operation of these two establishments have been around for a long time and there is a shameful history of flouting local Licence conditions and a total disregard for the local community. The Association feels the time has come to rebalance the licensing conditions of these two establishments in favour of the local community. Sufficient opportunity has been afforded to both managements to act responsibly and get their houses in order but they have patently failed, or are unwilling, to address this matter.
