Councillor Ridout remained in the meeting, spoke on the funding request but did not vote. 	
5.	Wiltshire and Swindon Police and Crime Commissioner	
	The Area Board heard from Mike Prince, Treasurer to the Police and Crime Commissioner, about the Police and Crime Plan.	
	He explained that the Plan would set out the strategic direction of policing in Wiltshire and Swindon and that there would be a public consultation on the draft plan between mid February and mid March 2013 with the final Plan being published at the end of March 2013. Partners, public and Parish and Town Council's were encouraged to become involved in the consultation on the Plan.	
	Questions and points raised from the floor included: • The major objectives of the Plan • Mike Lewis, representing Chitterne Parish Council, explained that	

Chitterne was a small rural community that suffered from speeding traffic and questioned whether speeding was considered as anti-social behaviour.

The Vice-Chairman thanked Mr Prince for his presentation and encouraged the Town/Parish Councils and public to become involved in the consultation exercise.

The Vice-Chairman drew the Boards attention to the update which gave information about the success of community events during 2012 and detailed the challenge to keep the spirit and sense of achievement and pride alive into 2013.

The Community Area Manager explained that there were a number of community evening events which would focus on what could be done in 2013 to keep the momentum from 2012 going. The events were being held at the following venues:

7. Warminster Area Our Community Matters Website

This item was deferred to a future meeting as Matthew Woolford, Communications team was unwell and unable to attend the meeting to make the presentation.

8. Winter Update

The Area Board received a presentation from Bill Parks – Head of Service, Highways and Streetscene and Simon Rowe – Weather and Emergency Services Officer (Operations) and Lead Duty Engineer about how Wiltshire Council responds to changing winter weather patterns.

The following issues were raised during the presentation:

- The duty placed on the Council by legislation to treat the highway
- How the Council plans with detailed weather forecasts
- The data received by the Met Office and how it is interpreted
- Information received from weather stations located around the County
- The staff that run the service and the routes where operations are undertaken
- Details about operating centres and the fleet of vehicles ready to respond
- The amount of salt used over the last few years and how the data can be interpreted so as to make predictions about how much salt could be needed in any one year
- How the Council respond to snow situations and the areas most affected by snow falls
- The resources available to treat roads and how the Council calls on famers to help keep rural roads clear
- How salt bins are used and how residents and the Council work together

The Vice-Chairman thanked the officers for their presentation and the Parish Council expressed their thanks for the way in which the Council service maintains the highways during changing weather conditions.

Decision:

That the presentation be noted

9. Your Local Issues Update

The Community Area Manager introduced her report including new issues since the last meeting, on-going issues and those issues since resolved. She invited people to contact her should they have any issues to raise.

Isabel Buckingham, Warminster Supporters Group, Wiltshire Wildlife Trust spoke about the consultation on street lighting and explained that the Trust supported the proposal to operate a number of street lights in the County for only part of the night and that these lights would be turned off between midnight and 5:30am. However, Ms Buckingham asked if consideration could be given to street lights remaining on in areas where there are sheltered housing properties and during the week between Christmas and the New year.

Decison:

That the report be noted and comments on Street Lighting being passed to the Council's Consultation Team.

Further comments were made by:

- Warminster and Villages Community Partnership Michael Mounde reported that the Partnership was holding a consultation event on 26 January 2013 at the Warminster Civic Centre about the WVCP Community plan. He encouraged everyone to come along to the event to air their views and make comments on the Plan.
- Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service Mike Franklin reported on the following additional issues:
 - o That he had written to all the Parish Councils in the Warminster

- area offering the Fire and Rescue Services help with the preparation of Emergency Plans
- That the Fire and Rescue Service had purchased 30,000 reflective arm bands. 20,000 were available for school children to wear during the dark evenings and 10,000 were available for the general public to pick up free of charge from local fire stations
- The Fire and Rescue Service were developing their 2013-16 Safety (Business) Plan and welcomed any organisation, Parish Council or individual to register as a stakeholder in order that the Service could engage with them during the plan building and formal consultation phases.

11. <u>Warminster Villages Community Partnership and Youth Development Centre - Transport Funding Update</u>

The Area Board received an update report from Sandra Samuels, Youth Development Officer, on behalf of the Warminster and Villages Community Partnership and the Youth Development Centre in relation to transport funding awarded by the Board in November 2011 of £4045.

Sandra explained that £2,000 was transferred to the Warminster Youth account in June 2012 and reported on the activities undertaken between June and December 2012 and how the funding was spent during this time. It was noted that the original proposal of collecting young people from the villages and driving them to Warminster was proving very difficult to implement as the picking up was very time consuming and therefore a revised proposal was worked up by Sandra Samuels, Sarah Jefferies (parish Clerk for a number of Parish Councils in the Warminster Area) and Councillor Pip Ridout. The new proposal was to open a satellite youth centre in Horningsham, picking up from surrounding villages. However setting up the youth provision in Horningsham was proving to be a challenging process.

Various outreaches were undertaken during the summer time and resulted in over 50 young people in the Warminster area accessing activities during that time. It was noted that a youth centre provision would be started in Horningsham during the February half term school holidays.

Sandra Samuels suggested that the remaining balance of funding of £1753.74 could be used for the following projects:

- Horningsham satellite provision, transporting young people from surrounding villages to access the youth provision
- Job Club transport for young people living in the villages
- · Summer activities

Members expressed concern that the funding was not used for its original purpose, however, they appreciated the reasons why the funding was spent in the way it was. It was suggested that in future, funding used for trips should target a different group of young people for each trip.

Decision:

- 1. That the update be noted
- 2. That the request to use the remaining balance of the Transportation Project fund of £1753.74 for the following projects be agreed:
 - Horningsham satellite provision, transporting young people from surrounding villages to access the youth provision
 - Job Club transport for young people living in the villages
 - Summer activities

12. Community Area Transport Group - Budget Allocation Proposals

The Area Board received the following two budget allocation proposals from the Community Area Transport Group for the Warminster Community Area:

- Bishopstrow bollards for pavement. Funding request for £600 from the CATG fund with a further £500 to be funded by the Bishopstrow Parish Council
- 2. Longbridge Deverill Removal of a 'no vehicles' Traffic Regulation Order and replace it with a 'No Entry' order on Marsh Farm Lane. Funding request of £850 from the CATG fund with a further £850 to be funded by the Longbridge Deverill Parish Council

Decision:

That the requests for CATG expenditure detailed above be approved.

13. <u>Area Board Funding - Community Area Grants</u>

14. <u>Deverills Players</u>

The Community Area Manager explained that the proposal was for an amateur dramatic production of Entertaining Angels which was open to everyone in the Deverill Valley and Crockerton and surrounding villages.

Decision:

To award the Deverill Players £581 towards the production of Entertaining Angels.

Reason:

The application met the 2012/13 grants criteria, would benefit many people in the area and demonstrated a link to the Community Plan.

15. Warminster and Surrounding Villages Job Club

The Community Area Manager explained that the proposal was for a Councillor led project for a job club in Warminster for the those living in Warminster and the surrounding villages.

Decision:

To award the Warminster Job Club £2500 towards the Job Club.

Reason:

The application had been verified against the 'Area Board led project triage checklist', would benefit many people in the area and demonstrated a link to the Community Plan.

16. <u>Maiden Bradley Village Hall</u>

The Community Area Manager explained that the proposal was for a foody fundraiser for the purchase of security lighting and tables as part of the Maiden Bradley Village Hall refurbishment.

Decision:

To award Maiden Bradley Village hall £984 toward the foody fundraiser.

Reason:

The application met the 2012/13 grants criteria and would enable the Village Hall to increase its fundraising for the Halls refurbishment project.

17. Deverills Cricket Club

The Community Area Manager explained that the proposal was for replacement of grass cutting equipment.

Decision:

To award the Deverills Cricket Club £4000 towards the purchase of replacement grass cutting equipment subject to a further £2000 of match funding being identified by the Club.

Reason:

The application met the 2012/13 grants criteria, would benefit many people in the area and demonstrated a link to the Community Plan.

Summary of Announcement:

The Wiltshire Online Programme aims to bring availability of standard and superfast broadband to homes and businesses across the county.

The main aims of the programme are:

- A minimum of 85%, hopefully up to 95% of premises being able to access superfast broadband by 2015
- All premises to have access to a minimum broadband service of 2Mbps by 2015.

The procurement for superfast broadband was launched on 2 July with British Telecom being announced as preferred bidder on the 12 November. Following a period of contract finalisation and final approval by the government, Wiltshire Council is anticipating signing the contract at the end of January.

In February, the Wiltshire Online Programme should then be able to provide details about the overall percentage coverage of superfast broadband, the technologies to be used and high level information about the rollout plans. An update will be given to Area Boards either by providing a chairman's announcement and links to the Wiltshire Online Web site, or by a presentation.

Once the contract has been awarded, BT will build their delivery team and start upon their detailed surveying of the infrastructure across Wiltshire. Surveying will occur in phases across Wiltshire with the network rollout following shortly afterwards in that area. The timescales for this and the number of surveys to be completed will be shared after the award of the contract.

Though specific information about each community area will not be available from February, the Wiltshire Online Programme will be able to provide more specific information as the project progresses through the phases of implementation. Ahead of each phase each Community Area affected will be provided with detailed information about the forthcoming rollout particulars, including, practical advice and also guidance on how to respond to any questions.

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'Understand autism'

Wiltshire Area Boards 2012/13

"Treat me the way they would like to be treated. Take into account my disability but remember me and my rights" (Wiltshire resident)

Introduction – What is autism?

Autism is a lifelong condition that affects how a person communicates with, and relates to other people and the world around them.

Autism is a spectrum condition, which means that, while all people with autism share certain difficulties, their condition will affect them in different ways.

The three main areas of difficulty which all people with autism share are sometimes known as the 'triad of impairments'. People have difficulties with:

- social communication (e.g. difficulty with both verbal and non-verbal language, interpreting comments very literally, while thinking that people always mean exactly what they say)
- 2. social interaction (e.g. difficulty recognising or understanding other people's emotions and feelings, and expressing their own, which can make it hard to fit in socially)
- 3. social imagination (e.g. difficulty understanding and predicting other people's thoughts or behaviour and making sense of abstract ideas or situations outside of the immediate daily routine).

"The complexities of communication with people with autism are more than just a noisy room and speaking plainly" (Wiltshire resident)

Why are we going to area boards?

"they feel alone and alienated as people will often give them a wide birth" (Wiltshire resident)

- 1. It can be hard to create awareness of autism as people with the condition do not 'look' disabled: parents of children with autism often say that other people simply think their child is naughty; while adults find that they are misunderstood. We would therefore like to share how autism affects individuals in Wiltshire so there is more understanding about the condition.
- 2. We have worked with a lot of local people with autism and their families to form a plan about how changes will be made. We would like to share this with you and see where your local area can support any improvements.

Why this area is important?

Autism is not uncommon

It is estimated that 1 in every 100 people have autism and therefore in Wiltshire, we estimate that over 4,500 individuals are affected by the condition.

In Wiltshire, we know about (a little over) one thousand children and adults with the condition. Many of these people will also have a learning disability or mental health problem (autism, in itself, is neither).

We therefore believe that there are over 3,500 people in Wiltshire with autism who are unknown and may not get any support from other means.

This may well be appropriate as many people with autism can live relatively independent lives, however, because of the hidden nature of the condition, many people have also said that they find it difficult to get the right understanding and support, at the right time, from the same local services as everyone else.

We think that this could affect around 2000 in Wiltshire who have a form of autism (aspergers or high functioning autism) which is 'hidden' but nevertheless, may still struggle in life.

Very often, without low level natural and community support or understanding, these individuals tend to come to the attention of statutory services later on in life; this is usually at crisis point which has a negative impact on the individual and tends to be much more intensive and costly.

"Bewildered, not knowing where to turn" (Wiltshire resident)

"Prevention and support is much better than trying to pick up pieces afterwards" (Wiltshire resident)

Poor outcomes

People with autism tend to have significantly poorer outcomes than others. As an example, national research shows that only 15% of adults with autism have a job. In comparison, the employment rate for disabled people, as a whole, is 48% indicating the low rates. This is despite the fact that many people with autism have unique skills and abilities that can help a business thrive (ie. problem solving skills, attention to retail, ability to retain detailed factual knowledge, excellent memory, technical abilities etc).

"Use of careful planning, strategy and therapeutic relationships can steer them through this [work] successfully developing their self awareness and ability to cope" (Wiltshire resident)

• The Autism Act 2009 places duties on local areas

"It seems that there is the assumption that at 18, all problems cease"

(Wiltshire resident)

In March 2010, the first ever strategy for improving the lives of adults with autism in England was published.

This strategy set out a number of key actions and recommendations which the government decided were the most important:

- 1. Making sure that more people understand about autism.
- 2. Making it easier for adults to get a diagnosis of autism. A diagnosis is when a doctor tells someone that they have autism.
- 3. Making it easier for adults with autism to choose how they live, and get the help that they need to do this.
- 4. Helping adults with autism to find jobs.
- 5. Helping local councils and health services to write plans so that the adults with autism who live in their area get the help that they need.

The Wiltshire Autism Partnership

To help Wiltshire plan how to make these key priorities happen, a 'Wiltshire Autism Partnership' meet five times per year. This group includes people with autism, parent/ carers and professionals from different teams, agencies and organisations.

"Awareness that certain groups in our communities are more sensitive and vulnerable.....gives me faith that this can be extended to those on the autistic spectrum" (Wiltshire resident)

To promote more understanding and acceptance about the nature of autism in the local area: improved recognition, awareness and minor adjustments in the community would alone, contribute significantly. We would therefore welcome the opportunity to hear your views and ideas for improvements as the success of this work will be limited if there is a 'standalone' approach.

Warminster Area Board Issues Report for 7 March 2013

New issues since last meeting:

1. Speeding Victoria Road

This site is part of the Speed Indicator Device scheme and the Community Area Manager will alert the group regarding the exact location prior to the SID being used in Spring.

2. Dropped kerbs

An issue has been raised regarding the difficulty for wheelchair users to access some parts of the town. This issue was on the agenda at the CATG meeting on 5 February and officers have viewed the route. The next CATG meeting will look at potential implementation, depending on costings.

3. North Farm Road, Heytesbury

A lack of passing places has been reported on this road. The difficulties have increased following the installation of the green recycling site at North. It seems that the number of users of the road is increasing because more people from Warminster are using it.

The Community Area Manager is working with Area Highway Engineer to assess issue. The issue will also be brought to the next Community Area Transport Group.

Issues Resolved and Closed since last meeting

4. Dog fouling Upper Marsh Road

This has been reported to Clarence and cleaned.

5. Junction to Upton Scudamore A350

The work on this has been agreed and funded and due to be implemented in the New Year. Funding by Warminster Area Board Community Area Transport Group (CATG) and the Parish Council.

6. Parking on junction of Smallbrook / Boreham Road

Consultation letters have been delivered prior to implementing proposal of hatched white lines. The consultation results showed that the overwhelming majority were in favour of the hatching and the plans will now be implemented

as funding has been provided by the Warminster Area Board Community Area Transport Group (CATG)

7. Boreham Road / Bishopstrow junction

Works have been implemented to improve this junction including new signs and lining.

Ongoing Issues under investigation

8. Caravans entering Longleat via Geys Hill, Lane End, Corsley

An issue has been raised regarding caravans entering Longleat to and from the A362 at Lane End Corsley via Geys Hill. Residents and workers are affected by this traffic which blocks the roads and causes potential danger according to the complainant.

This issue was discussed at the Community Area Transport Group meeting (CATG) on 5 February.

Members of the Parish Council and residents were in attendance.

It was agreed that:

Wiltshire Council Highways team continue to make representations to Longleat with a view to holding a meeting to resolve the issue. The Community Area Manager will support this process.

The issue would be discussed at the next Community Area Transport Group meeting.

9. Signage in Warminster Town

Issues raised by Economy and Tourism Group of Warminster and Villages Community Partnership.

A walk around the town took place on Wednesday 6 February 2013. Wiltshire Council Highways team, the Community Area Manger, member of the Tourism Group and the Town Clerk covered the whole of the central area and checked all of the street signs.

Wiltshire Council to now draw up a plan of action to improve the signage. This will be reported to the next Community Area Transport Group meeting.

10. Warminster Pleasure Gardens

Issues regarding the former tennis pavilion and maintenance are ongoing and constructive meetings have been held. Neil Ward (Head of Strategic Property Services) has provided costings regarding refurbishment of the pavilion and some funding has been found from the Council. Friends of Warminster Park will also be applying for grants. More detail is needed including detailed

costings is required from Wiltshire Council in order to proceed with funding applications and to progress the project. Neil Ward and the Town Clerk, Heather Abernethie have discussed the next steps and definite progress is being made.

11. Several overgrown footpaths in Warminster

Community Area Manager has raised with officers who are investigating. This is a general issue in the summer months in Warminster. The Town Clerk has co-ordinated a successful meeting and a map of responsibilities completed. Further meetings to take place and a range of actions are in progress.

March 2013 update

This update will be the last from NHS Wiltshire; from April 1st 2013 the commissioning of local health care services will be managed by Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group, who will provide the first of their updates to Local Area Boards next month. In the meantime, a message from NHS Wiltshire's Chairman, Tony Barron, as the PCT hands over the baton of responsibility:

In 2006, I took the helm of NHS Wiltshire, a new Primary Care Trust merging three smaller organisations. Today, as we move towards a new model of NHS commissioning, I would like to record some of the ways in which NHS Wiltshire has made a difference.

When the new board first met, we had a £63million debt and a system that provided patchy and uneven care to a widely dispersed population. Some areas were very well served but others, including some of the most deprived parts of Wiltshire, were underresourced. Unlikely as it may have seemed at the time, we managed to tackle this debt while improving services across the county.

Doing this meant keeping tight control of our purse-strings, driving a hard bargain with those providing the services, and a remorseless focus on getting the best value for every NHS £. Inevitably and very publicly, this meant taking some tough decisions, but also introducing some award-winning innovations in care such as the Neighbourhood Teams and Primary Care Centres. Today, people in Wiltshire benefit from some of the most cutting-edge and innovative community health services, many of which are the envy of other parts of the UK and are now being replicated due to their outstanding success.

In 2013, Wiltshire's NHS has been 'in the black' for four consecutive years. We have new buildings providing top-notch primary care facilities. Thousands more patients are treated by NHS dentists. People can see a GP at a time that suits them, and Wiltshire was rated one of the top six PCTs for sharing health resources fairly in a national study.

Some of our legacy successes are detailed below:

Neighbourhood Teams: Introduced in 2007, Wiltshire's pioneering Neighbourhood Teams have won ringing endorsements from the patients they care for. Caring for patients mainly in their own homes, the teams bring nurses, physiotherapists, occupational therapists and others together to provide seamless, all-round care. Eleven Neighbourhood Teams cover the whole county and provide a range of services including rapid response to patients' urgent needs, rehabilitation services, and nursing and therapy services as part of a planned care package. The model of service provided by Neighbourhood Teams is being replicated across the UK to ensure that patients maintain their independence for longer and enjoy a better quality of life – by cutting down on the need to be admitted to hospital and by helping to reduce delays in patients leaving hospital.

Primary Care Centres: Doctors, nurses, therapists, pharmacists, working together in modern buildings ... all but one of the five developments we envisaged in 2007 are up and running: Malmesbury (opened 2008), Westbury White Horse Health Centre

(opened 2012), Salisbury (new replacement surgery at Avon Approach, and Primary Care development at Old Manor underway), Trowbridge (new replacement surgery development underway, hospital refurbished). Progress on the Devizes Primary Care Centre is far less advanced. It has been difficult to find a site that everyone can agree on and which is affordable, but the CCG will continue to work to a successful conclusion.

Dentistry: A huge turn-round in access to NHS dentistry has been one of NHS Wiltshire's biggest achievements. Consistently number one on the 'wish list' expressed by Wiltshire people at our regular Stakeholder Assemblies, access to an NHS dentist has gone up by a third in the lifetime of NHS Wiltshire. Thanks to an investment of £3.1m, NHS Wiltshire expanded dentistry overall, but also invested in measures to shorten waiting times for orthodontic treatment and a highly successful programme to improve the oral health of under-fives, setting a foundation for a lifetime of healthy teeth.

Stroke: Wiltshire is one of the country's top performers in the care and treatment of people who have had a stroke, according to the CQC in 2011.

Cancer: People diagnosed with cancer in Wiltshire do better than the national average, according to the ONS figures. Better screening services and encouraging a healthier lifestyle are the two prongs of the county's Cancer Reform Strategy.

Cleaner hospitals: Wiltshire Community Health Service was commended by the CQC for its effectiveness in tackling hospital-acquired infections (figures produced prior to management of WCHS transferring to Great Western Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust).

Stop smoking: Wiltshire's Stop Smoking Service has consistently smashed through its targets, helping thousands of smokers to quit.

These and many more success stories make me proud of what we've done at NHS Wiltshire. I'd like to thank the extraordinary team of people who have worked so hard to make this happen, and send Wiltshire CCG the very best wishes for continued success as the National Health Service moves towards a new era of delivering health care.

- 1. <u>WVCP Top Priorities</u>. The AGM was held on 26th January 2013. The WVCP's top 3 priorities continue to be as follows:
 - Maintain a fit-for-purpose Community Area Plan
 - Build capacity by fostering and supporting Pillar and Theme groups
 - Work closely with Local Government and Official Services to achieve mutual objectives

2. <u>Headlines/Key Successes</u>

- A consultation survey for the updated Community Plan was distributed in October to over 9,000 households and businesses within the WVCP area. Also available online, the deadline for responses was 7th December 2012.
- Over 1,000 responses were received (10.9% return rate) of which 113 were submitted online.
- The analysed survey results were presented at a consultation event hosted by WCVP on 26th January 2013 at the Civic Centre. This enabled further group discussions to finalise priorities under the eight community plan pillars. This feedback is currently being collated, and the updated Plan to be published March/April 2013.
- Signage survey completed in Warminster by the Economic and Tourism Group is now being taken forward by the Town Council and Wiltshire Council.
- Enterprise Warminster sub-group set up in partnership with Warminster Town Council is now supporting five projects that focus on the tourism and retail sectors.
- Partnership working links continue to be strengthened by WVCP with Area Board and others through sub-groups, committees, panels and forums.
- 2nd tranche of core funding for 2012/13 granted by the Area Board in November.

- Economic and Tourism Group signage survey report completed and monitoring of town scene and empty buildings ongoing. The group are active in carrying out a business confidence survey and developing 'Welcome to Warminster' and 'Buy Local' leaflets.
- Enterprise Warminster Group five projects: online retail click and reserve community through MyHigh.St; Hidden Britain event on 26th February to promote tourism; AMTi Metamorphosis event for independent retailers on 12th March; Job Club and Job Fair events.
- Youth Transport scheme currently enables youngsters from rural villages access to Warminster Town facilities.
- Warminster in Bloom will continue its' work under the Civic Trust's remit.

- Warminster Community Radio's Saturday morning slot continuing to highlight the work of the Partnership/ Area Board/Voluntary organisations etc.
- Sport 4 Warminster –rural schools sports initiative currently supports the continuation and sustainability of a jointly held annual Sports day and a Thursday club that helps integrate Primary school youngsters prior to moving to senior school.

- An advert submitted to the Wiltshire Times to highlight the profile of WVCP is pending publication.
- Information and circulars from other partners are disseminated by email to interested parties for signposting purposes.
- Further use of social media is being explored.

5. <u>Developments and Issues</u>.

- Engagement with the wider public is an ongoing issue, and being addressed through press publicity, raising the website profile, social media and the public consultation event to update the Community Plan.
- The second tranche of WVCP's core funding for 2012/13 was approved by the Area Board in November 2012.

Purpose of Report:

To ask Councillors to consider the following 3 applications seeking 2012/13 Community Area Grant funding.

1. Maiden Bradley Village Shop Association; A request for £2,500

Officer recommendation: Approve

2. Warminster Cycle Group; A request for £350 (Small Grant Programme)

Officer recommendation: Approve

3. Horningsham Youth Club; A request for £1,000

Officer recommendation: Approve

Total request if all applications are approved: £3,850

Background

- 1.1. Area Boards have authority to approve Area Grants under powers delegated to them by the Deputy Leader and Cabinet member for Adult Care, Communities and Housing (4 April 2012). Under the Scheme of Delegation Area Boards must adhere to the Area Board Grants Guidance 2012/2013.
- 1.2. In accordance with the Scheme of Delegation, any decision of an Area Board that is contrary to the funding criteria and/or the officer's recommendation would need to demonstrate that the application in question has a wider community benefit, and give specific reasons for why this should justify an exception to the criteria.
- 1.3. The emphasis in the Coalition Government's Localism agenda supports the ethos of volunteering and community involvement and the nurturing of resilient communities. With this in mind Community Area Grants (CAGs) should be encouraged from and awarded to community and voluntary groups. Likewise, Small Grants (new this year) should be awarded to similar groups, as well as un-constituted groups of people wanting to improve things near to where they live.

- 1.4. Warminster area Board has been allocated a 2012/2013 budget of £47,714 for community grants, small grants, community partnership core funding and area board/councillor led initiatives.
- 1.5. Applications of up to and including £1,000 can be made for a Community Area Grant, which will not require matched funding. Amounts of £1,000 £5000 will be required to find matched funding. The area board will rarely award more than £5,000.
- 1.6. Small Grants, new for this year will fund up to £350, where the total cost of the project does not exceed £350. This grant is aimed at enabling groups (including those not formally constituted) to implement projects, involving local people to make their community a better place to live.
- 1.7. Area boards will not consider Community Area Grant (CAG) applications from town and parish councils for purposes that relate to their statutory duties or powers that should be funded from the local town/parish precept. However this does not preclude bids from town/parish councils, encouraging community projects that provide new opportunities for local people or those functions that are not the sole responsibility of the town/parish council.
- 1.8. In addition to CAGs and Small Grants, councillors can submit an Area Board/Councillor Led Initiative. This enables area boards to tackle sticky community issues and/or community identified priorities. Cabinet have emphasised that they do not wish these to be used to avoid complying with Community Area Grant criteria or for filling gaps where there are council service shortfalls. The application process and form has been updated to bring it in line with the other grants.
- 1.9. Officers are required to provide recommendations in their funding reports (except in the case of Area Board/Councillor led initiatives), although the decision to support applications is made by Wiltshire Councillors on the Area Board.
- 1.10. Funding applications will be considered at every Area Board meeting.
- 1.11. Applicants are encouraged to contact and seek funding help from Charities Information Bureau (CIB) who work on behalf of Wiltshire Council. CIB support community and voluntary groups, town and parish councils to seek funding for community projects and schemes both from the Area Board and other local and national funding sources.

- 1.12. Paper copies of funding applications no longer appear as part of the agenda in an attempt to reduce paper. They are however available on the Wiltshire Council web site with the area board agenda papers and hard copies available upon request.
- 1.13. The 2012/2013 funding criteria and application forms are available on the council's website (www.wiltshire.gov.uk/areaboards) and paper versions are available from the Community Area Manager.
- 1.14. A decision was been made in 2010/2011 that paper copies of funding applications will no longer appear as part of the agenda in an attempt to reduce volume of paper used. However, the application forms will be available on the Wiltshire Council web site and hard copies available upon request.
- 1.15. All recipients of area board funding are expected to complete and return an evaluation form as soon as the project or activity has been completed and this should be accompanied by receipts and invoices, as well as photographs if possible. Failure to return the evaluation requested will preclude them from being considered for any future funding from the area board. This applies to all grants made by the area board.
- 1.16. A budget ring-fenced for the needs of young people will again be made available in 2012/2013. How this will be allocated will be the decision of the area board. In Warminster, the Area Board chose to allocate this via a Participatory Budgeting event.
- 1.17. Warminster Area Board has a separate Community Area Transport Group (CATG) budget of £15,226 for 2012/13.

2. Main Considerations

- 2.1. Councillors will need to be satisfied that grants awarded in the 2012/13 year are made to projects that can realistically proceed within a year of the award being made.
- 2.2. There have been six rounds of grant funding during 2012/2013. The final round will take place at the Board meeting on 7 March, 2013

3. Environmental & Community Implications

Community Area Grants will contribute to the continuance and/or improvement of cultural, social and community activity and wellbeing in the community area, the extent and specifics of which will be dependent upon the individual project.

4. Financial Implications

- 4.1. Awards must fall within the Area Boards budget allocated to the Warminster Area Board.
- **4.2.** If grants are awarded in line with officer recommendations, Warminster Area Board will have a balance of £1,545.93 for the financial year.

5. Legal Implications

5.1. There are no specific Legal implications related to this report.

6. HR Implications

6.1. There are no specific HR implications related to this report.

8.1.1 Officer Recommendation – Approve

- 8.1.2 The application meets the 2012/13 grants criteria.
- 8.1.3 The application demonstrates a link to the parish plan as there is overwhelming support for maintain a village shop for the community. This project fits within Wiltshire Council's corporate goal of strengthening our communities.
- 8.1.4 The village shop in Maiden Bradley has been community run since 2002. It also serves the communities of Horningsham, Kilmington, Norton Ferris and the Deverills. The shop provides fresh produce to local businesses and also supports tourism via major attractions in the area.
- 8.1.5 The chillers have been malfunctioning since last Summer leaving water over the shop floor as they are now worn out. New chillers will improve the shop environment and health and safety and are integral to the running of the shop.
- 8.1.6 The overall cost of the project will be £6,000 with an amount of match funding provided of £3,500.

8.3.1 Officer Recommendation: Approve

- 8.3.2 The application meets the criteria of the grants scheme 2012/13
- 8.3.3 The funding is requested to provide skills workshops and re-launch day at the Horningsham Club and also to buy and refurbish equipment. The club will run each Friday night. The Launch Day will involve circus skills, cake decoration and an Arts and Craft demonstration. The cost of the launch day and workshops will be £700. £300 will be used for resurfacing the pool table, pool equipment, board games and games for the Xbox and Wii.
- 8.3.4 The club is staffed by 3 volunteers and it will also have the support of staff from the Youth Development Centre. The funding for the club is provided by the Horningsham Village Fair and other fund raising efforts.
- 8.3.5 Although match funding is not required for projects of £1,000 and under, match funding has been used to refurbish the venue ready for young people to use it and a number of volunteers have been involved.
