**Application for a Variation of a Premises Licence; Pace Show Meadow,
Swindon Road, Royal Wootton Bassett**

1. Purpose of Report

- 1.1 To determine an application for a variation of a Premises Licence in respect of Pace Show Meadow made by Pace Petroleum Limited.

2. Background Information

- 2.1 An application for a variation of a Premises Licence in respect of Pace Show Meadow has been made by Pace Petroleum Limited for which 22 relevant representations have been received.
- 2.2 Wiltshire Council (as the Licensing Authority) must hold a hearing to consider the application having regard to the representations. In accordance with Section 35(3) of The Licensing Act 2003 the Licensing Sub Committee is required to take such of the steps listed in 2.4 below as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. In considering the application and the relevant representations, the Sub Committee must also have regard to relevant Government guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.
- 2.3 The licensing objectives are:
- i) The Prevention of Crime and Disorder;
 - ii) Public Safety;
 - iii) The Prevention of Public Nuisance; and
 - iv) The Protection of Children from Harm.
- 2.4 Such steps are:
- i) To modify the conditions of the licence
 - ii) To reject the whole or part of the application.
- 2.5 On 16th February 2012 an application for a variation to the premises licence at Pace, Show Meadow, Swindon Road, Royal Wootton Bassett was received and accepted as a valid application.
- 2.6 The variations applied for are summarised as follows:

A copy of the application from Pace Petroleum Limited is attached as **Appendix 1**.

- 2.7 The premise has been licensed under the Licensing Act 2003 since 2005, when the licence was granted under Grandfather Rights from the previous magistrate system. The hours of alcohol off sales have remained consistent with the Justices Licensing Hours under the 1964 Act until this variation application was applied for.
- 2.8 The premises is a Petrol station with a retail shop on the main Swindon Road out of Royal Wootton Bassett
- 2.9 No Responsible Authority associated with Wiltshire Council has any complaint history relating to this premise as a licensed premise.

3. Consultation and Representations

- 3.1 The application process requires a public notice to be posted on the premises for a period of 28 days together with a copy of the notice posted at the offices of Wiltshire Council, Monkton Park, Chippenham, Wiltshire. During the consultation period 22 relevant representations have been received from Interested Parties, and none from Responsible Authorities.

4. **Legal Implications**

4.1 This hearing is governed by the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations. These provide that hearings should be held in public unless the Licensing Authority considers that the public interest in excluding the public outweighs the public interest in the hearing taking place in public.

4.2 The Applicant and all Responsible Authorities and Interested Parties who have made representations have been informed of the date, time and location of the hearing and their right to attend and be represented.

4.3 At the hearing all those Responsible Authorities and Interested Parties who have made representations are entitled to address the Sub Committee and to ask questions of another party, with the consent of the Sub Committee.

5. Recommendation

5.1 Members are asked to determine the application.

6. Right of Appeal

6.1 It should be noted that the Premises Licence Holder, the Responsible Authorities and Interested Parties who have made representations may appeal the decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee to the Magistrates Court. The appeal must be lodged with the Magistrates Court within 21 days of the notification of the decision.

6.2 In the event of an appeal being lodged, the decision made by the Licensing Sub Committee remains valid until any appeal is heard and any decision made by the Magistrates Court.

6.3 A Responsible Authority or an Interested Party may apply to the Licensing Authority for a Review of a Premises Licence. Whether or not a Review Hearing takes place is in the discretion of the Licensing Authority, but, if requested by an Interested Party will not normally be granted within the first 12 months except for the most compelling circumstances.

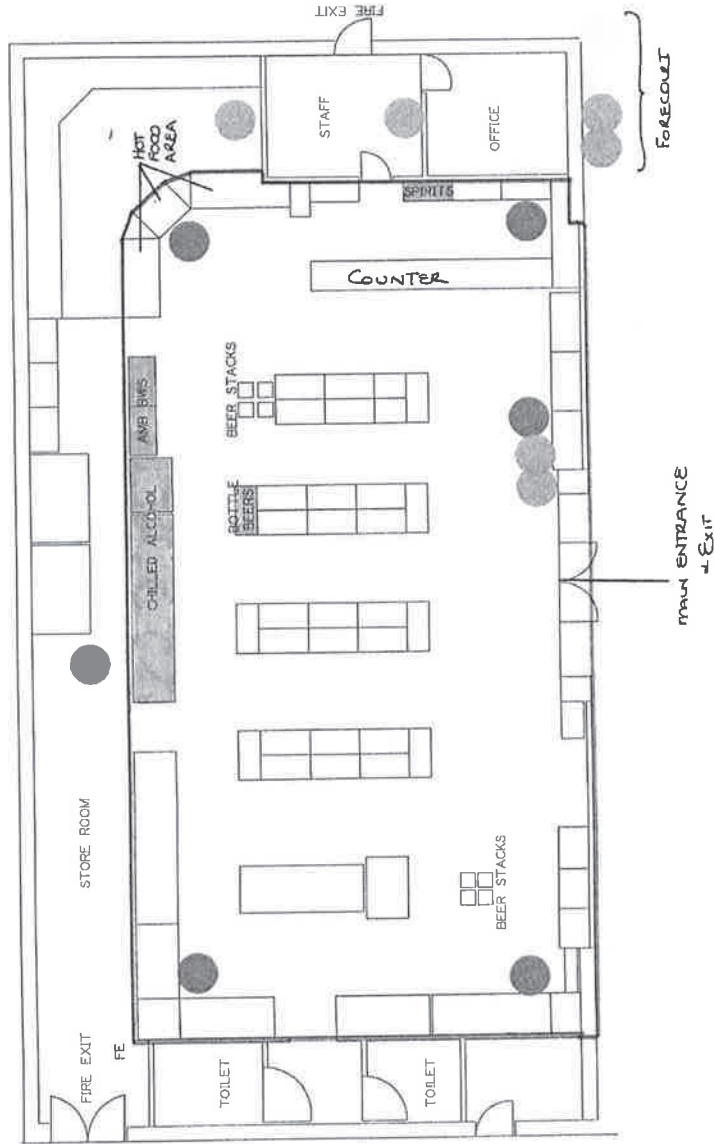

We are appalled that the Council would even consider an application to vary the licence to allow 24 hour services at Pace Showmeadow.
We strongly object to this proposal for the following reasons.

Anti social behaviour is already rife in the vicinity during the usual opening hours and this would increase. If challenged the offenders are often abusive / aggressive. On one occasion eggs were thrown at a window. Alcohol is too readily available now and as staffing levels may be at a minimum during the late night and early morning hours the monitoring of sales to minors would be reduced.

There are both young children and very elderly people living in the immediate area (including our 92 years old father) who would be distressed at the probable noise levels which would increase. We are already disturbed nightly by shouting, swearing, cars revving and music blaring from vehicles.

We already have a serious litter problem. Food wrappings and empty cans and glass bottles are thrown on both our back and front gardens and in the forecourt area.

The forecourt is also used by young people as a sports ground with footballs being kicked around and these are thrown against our house walls and often into the garden. Children skateboard, cycle and play with remote control toys both during and after opening hours. No attempt appears to be made by the staff to stop this although they must see and hear it as well as we do.

We are also concerned about the number of heavy vehicles which pass through the streets all day and fear that this will continue well into the night if 24 hour fuel, food and drink are available.

We cannot see that 24 hour opening will benefit anyone except the garage owners who will profit from extra revenue.

Reasons for objections to the variation to the licence at Pace Show Meadow, Swindon Road, Royal Wootton Bassett.

Prevention of harm to children

Risk of sales of alcohol to under age persons is increased due to lack of opportunity to monitor sales.

Risk of increasing the noise nuisance to young children residing in the area through night time noise disturbance and anti-social behaviour.

To prevent public nuisance

The premises are located in an overwhelmingly residential area. Additionally, the premises currently operate in extremely close proximity to residential premises - three yards from residential houses at the rear of the premises. (Photo attached)

The proposed hours on the license variation will lead to an increase in noise due to the

frequency of cars stopping, starting, engines running, doors closing/slamming, pedestrians shouting to one another, etc.

This would offer a severe nuisance of noise which does not currently exist and would adversely affect the quiet enjoyment entitlement of the numerous residential properties during the night hours. It is a known fact that noise carries much further during the night time hours. Residents have reported a current noise intrusion of the use of a 'Tannoy' system at the premises as late at 22.50, there is a danger this would be used during the night time hours. There would be a severe nuisance of light intrusion to numerous residents in the vicinity during the night time hours not only from the premises but also from the vehicles using the facility. Residents in Meadow Close, RWB report a constant intrusion of light emanating from the use of a blue light at the premises. This would increase with additional operations and the use of additional lighting.

To prevent crime and disorder

Government findings have identified there is a direct link between alcohol and its ease of availability, relative cost, excessive consumption to social disorder offences. Alcohol would be sold from these premises at supermarket prices, outside of regular retail hours, prices would be less than regular licensed premises.

Within half a mile of there are numerous licensed premises with closing times well into the night hours. There is a distinct danger this will become a natural 'refuelling stop' for drinkers to top up. This also carries a high risk of anti-social behaviour and noise occurring during the licence variation hours.

Petty crime –criminal damage to cars, property etc., has already occurred during the past four years in this area and reported to local police.

Residents have already experienced bouts of criminal damage, graffiti, damage to cars, and burglary over the past four or five years. These incidents have been reported to the police. Premises operating during these night hours carry an additional risk of increasing the attraction to the area of persons likely to carry out these crimes. Within the past six months or so a robbery/raid on the cash machine took place at these premises. This trend may be made worse by the attraction of an open retail venue selling alcohol and food during the night hours when policing are stretched even further.

Anti-social behaviour could be increased due to the potential for young people to congregate in the locality and to consume alcohol or food during these licence variation hours. There have been already been several incidents of large groups of young people congregating in the green bank area close to the premises creating a nuisance through noise and anti-social behaviour. When confronted by residents they become very aggressive and abusive. These incidents have been reported to the local police. One resident in Meadow Close has reported eggs being thrown following the reporting of incidents.

Public Safety

There would be increased pollution due to 24 hour operation on the premises.

This licence variation could increase the amount of litter left in the area through individuals discarding food receptacles and empty alcohol bottles.

There have been many occurrences of empty spirit bottles, cans left in the road and on the pathways directly opposite the premises already evidenced by residents in Kingsley Ave, RWB. Additional opening hours would only increase these incidents.

These aspects carry a high potential for threats to public safety through litter and broken bottles.

An environmental risk has been cited by residents in Meadow Close concerning the closeness of fuel tank vents to adjacent residents' property.

Additional volume sales of fuel would increase this pollution via fumes, noise and light intrusion. Examples of tanks being filled during the very early hours are already experienced and the availability of additional times of operations may intrude into the night hours for refilling tanks.

Prevention of harm to children.

Difficult to monitor sales of alcohol to under age persons and thereby this will increase the noise nuisance for young people residing in the area and who are trying to sleep. Also there will be a risk of increase noise disturbance and anti-social behaviour generally.

To prevent public nuisance

The premises are in a very residential area, and are close to residential properties. Twenty four opening will result in increased noise especially at a time when residents and their children are trying to sleep. Noise from cars and lorries stopping and starting, doors opening and closing and individuals shouting to one another. Whilst all this can be tolerated during daylight hours it is unacceptable during night time hours when sounds seem to carry much further, especially if it becomes a pit stop for lorries/vans passing through during the night.

There would also be the problem of light emanating from the premises and from vehicles using the premises because they are open. It maybe that the additional lighting is planned to be used during the hours of darkness which would cause problems for individuals trying to sleep, particularly for those living near the premises.

To prevent crime and disorder

The garage being open for twenty-four hours will mean that during the night time hours it will be a place where young people will congregate and the potential for anti-social behaviour will increase. At the present time groups of young people are seen congregating on the green bank area opposite the garage and if food and alcohol are available late into the night this will not only increase the litter that is now left but will also lead to increased disturbance for the many residents in the area.

Over the past three years that we have been here there have been incidents of graffiti on house walls, criminal damage to cars and burglary all of which have been reported to the police. Twenty-four hour opening and increased sales of alcohol only increases the likelihood of these kinds of things happening more frequently together with anti-social behaviour, noise and nuisance caused by drunkenness.


Public safety

Over the past three years we have seen an increase in the amount of litter in the area being left caused by individuals discarding food containers and empty alcohol bottles. This will only increase if opening hours are extended..

Empty (broken) bottles and discarded food cartons provide potential health hazards for residents living in the area as well as those passing through. They also lead to unsightly areas for visitors to our town as they visit us.

Increased sales of petrol and diesel mean more visits by petrol tankers, mostly early in the morning, with increased fumes, dangers of spillage and noise for sleeping residents.

Objection to the application to: *extend the hours for the sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises between the hours of 00.00 to 24.00, add the provision of late night refreshment between the hours of 23.00 to 05.00*

We are writing as residents of Kingsley Ave to object to the above application. If allowed, this application would have an adverse effect on our family and our community. We object on the grounds of the prevention of public nuisance, preventing crime and disorder and to maintain public safety. Importantly, as parents we seek to prevent harm to children by sending this objection.

We live directly opposite these premises and are already affected by the intrusion of light, noise and significant amounts of litter emanating from these premises during their current operating hours. We believe we should not be subjected to increased levels of noise, light and litter during extended opening hours under this application.

We currently experience the glare of the lights from the premises and as there are no barriers such as trees or shrubs to reduce the light glare from the premises currently. Under this application the required lighting would increase significantly to unacceptable levels and would consequently be considered as a light intrusion nuisance.

Noise levels would increase to unacceptable levels whereby customers arriving and leaving the premises during the application hours. We do not believe we should be subjected to noise from pedestrians, cars, lorries and trucks starting and stopping engines, running engines, slamming doors, loud music from car radios at these night hours. These examples are already happening in the current hours of operating at these premises which are already a nuisance in the current operating hours but would be totally unacceptable in the night hours. We believe this would be a significant noise nuisance which can and should be prevented through rejecting the application.

We have already experienced anti-social behaviour around this area. Many young people in groups, after visiting the applicant's premises regularly congregate on the green bank directly outside our home. With extended opening there would be an increased attraction, knowing alcohol and food can be purchased well into the night. This would create a 24 hour problem and bring with it an increased level of crime and disorder through anti-social behaviour so should be prevented.

Together with neighbours we regularly experience broken bottles, cans and litter discarded just outside our houses which are a matter of public safety. This application would increase the opportunity for this to occur. We have discussed the application with our neighbours and have collectively raised the issues on the enclosed and ask you review these matters also. Although the Town Council has not met formally to consider the above application, as we are not a statutory consultee, a majority of Town Council members have contacted me to express their serious concerns about the above.

Some years ago the Town experienced significant public safety issues arising out of late night drinking. In particular people would leave licenced premises and head for one of the food outlets which in affect created a "hot spot" for anti social behaviour which was of enormous concern to the Police. As part of the response the Town Council was successful in receiving funding from the Home Office and others to install a town centre CCTV system which has been largely successful in addressing this issue. With the deterrent of CCTV people disperse from the High Street in a quiet and orderly fashion.

The concern regarding this application is that it will become a "hot spot" with people leaving the High Street late at night and heading to the garage to buy food and alcohol. The garage is outside the range of our CCTV cameras and so the measures we have put in place to promote public safety will be ineffective at this location.

Town Councillors are therefore deeply concerned about this matter, their concern in turn reflecting dozens of members of the public who have contacted them. Members hope that you will be able to take these concerns into account when considering this application.

I am writing as the ward councillor for Royal Wootton Bassett Town Council (north ward) to object to the above application on behalf of residents within the north ward. 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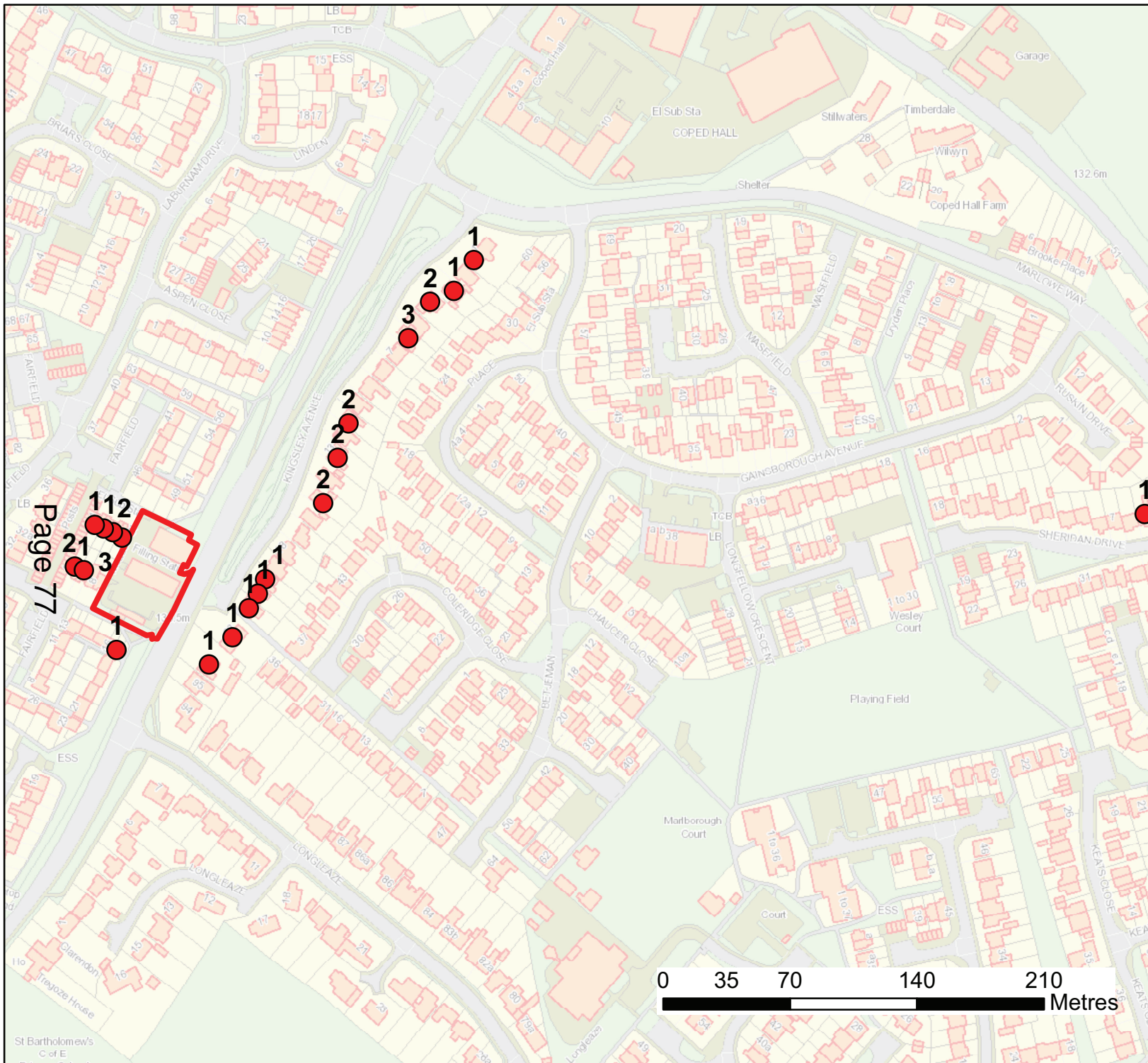
