1. What is the Initiative?

The iniative is to provide for weed suppressant bark/chippings to prevent future weed invasion of communal planters on College Estate. These large planters were put in place some time ago by Wiltshire Council however there are no resources to maintain them.

2. Where is the initiative taking place?

College Estate Trowbridge

3. When will the initiative take place?

March 2016

4. What is the Community benefit/evidence of need/links to Community Plan/Community Issue?

Weed growth cloggs up the planters growing through the shrubs and becoming an eye sore. Residents have complained that once the planters become overgrown they are more likely to attract other litter such as crisp packets and tin cans. Once the planters are free from weed invasion they will reinforce civic pride and people will be more encourged to keep them free of litter. This initiative also links in with 'Clean for the Queen' and improving the image of our streets and neighburhoods.

5. What is the desired outcome of this initiative?

Tidy planters with no weed growth. Any future weed growth can be easily managed by residents.

1. What is the Initiative?

Project Title/Name

Land Survey for Paxcroft Mead Skatepark, a Community Initiative by Paxcroft Mead Residents' Association, formerly Paxcroft Mead Community Forum.

The application is to pay for a site survey for a skate park to provide a much needed leisure facility for youth on Paxcroft Mead and Castle Mead. The number of households in this area is now 2250, many including children and young people.

Working with young people, PMRA has identified a skatepark as a popular facility to give youth a focus, with a designated space, a challenging, enjoyable activity, and an exciting spectacle for non-participants. In a playing-field location, adjacent to the Community Centre and distant from housing, the concrete surface will be quiet and hardwearing. Chosen in consultation with local youth and experience skateboarders, the Maverick design will be landscaped to complement the park.

In readiness for planning application, it is mandatory to supply a professional site survey of existing and proposed ground levels, to show how the land levels will change and details of the dimensions of the proposed bunds around the skatepark and how they will blend into the wider landscape of the park.

2. Where is the initiative taking place?

Located on Paxcroft Mead—corner of the playing field adjacent to the Community Centre car park.

3. When will the initiative take place?

Planning permission end 2015; funding 2016-2017; skatepark 2017-18

4. What is the Community benefit/evidence of need/links to Community Plan/Community Issue?

The skatepark is a project which might well have been expected to be undertaken by the council. Funding for the land survey is but a small element of its total cost. The land survey is mandatory to the planning application and it is difficult to imagine any other source of grant funding for this purpose.

5. What is the desired outcome of this initiative?

A skatepark will give children and young people the chance to engage in an energetic leisure activity which is popular, accessible to a wide range of ages and abilities and free to anyone who owns a skateboard, scooter, bike

or roller blades.

It will also provide a focus for youth on the country park. Leisure facilities for young people on the park are very limited. Young people congregate in groups in public areas which can be intimidating to vulnerable adults and sometimes leads to anti-social behaviour. A designated space for young people will give neighbourhood police a destination for groups congregating in unsuitable areas and a good point of contact with local youth.

The outcome of the project will be to deliver a skatepark on Paxcroft Country park of hard wearing, low maintenance poured concrete construction, created to a bespoke design agreed in consultation with local youth and experienced skateboarders. The outcome of this funding application is the completion of the land survey which will complete the requirements for planning application.

6. Who will Project Manage this initiative?

The project will be managed by the committee of Paxcroft Mead Residents' Association, in consultation with Maverick Skateparks Ltd.

1. What is the Initiative?

This is an application to the area board **11-19 funding** (separate from the LYN funding). The iniative is an intergenerational project to be undertaken with school children and older people from Studley Green Luncheon Club.

2. Where is the initiative taking place?

Studley Green Luncheon Club

3. When will the initiative take place?

April-June 2016

4. What is the Community benefit/evidence of need/links to Community Plan/Community Issue?

The community plan/JSA for our area identifies support for older people, child poverty and community cohesion as key priorities in our area.

This initiative aims to

- Break down barriers between older and young people in the community, strengthening community links and bonds
- Develop lasting links between the school and the luncheon club which will lead to ongoing
 volunteering opportunities for young people, supporting the sustainability of the lunch club
 which relies on volunteers and also providing shared experiences into the future such as
 Christmas carol concerts etc.
- Provide stimulating activity for older and opportunities for both older people and young people to share skills and knowledge
- Provide a record of older people's life stories and musical memories which will serve as a learning tool for young people and something which older people can share with family and carers
- Musical memories in particular have been shown to support older people through their future care journeys, particularly for those who may be living with dementia
- Provide IT equipment which older people can use on an ongoing basis to maintain links with family and friends

5. What is the desired outcome of this initiative?

A booklet showing members of the luncheon club both now and in former days, supported by photographs and quotations accompanied by CD's of their musical memories. Young people will collate life memories and experiences, supported by technology including tablet computers. Older people will be encouraged to familiarise themselves with tablet computers which can then be used to provide other activities and supported learning at the lunch club. Many older people have relatives and grandchildren far away. Use of this technology will enable them to keep in touch with families more easily.

Area Board Project -Cllr John Knight

1. What is the Initiative?

The initiative is a project designed to help tackle the issue of teenage pregnancy which is a key issue in Trowbridge, a priority from the JSA and a key issue identified for action from the Child Poverty Workshop held by Trowbridge Area Board. The initiative follows on from discussions after the Child Poverty Workshop and an approach by the Community Enagagement Manager to John A Gaunt School to develop a project aboove and beyond that which the school would normally deliver as part of the PHSE curriculum.

The initiative is a new and innovative approach to tackling the issue by working with teenage boys. It is widely acknowledged in research literature that this is an important but generally neglected area of work.

The pilot project will see work with year 9 boys over a period of 1 term initially, using mentors from the fire/police service, taking them out of school and delivering a programme around relationships, sexual health and the realities and implications of fatherhood. Positive male role models will be instrumental in supporting and encourge the boys in understanding the issues and how their actions at a young age can affect their own and other people's lives both now and into the future.

To this end, baby simulator dolls will be used to support their learning. These dolls are invaluable in giving young people a hands on experience of parenting with all its pressures.

The training materials developed as part of the project and the dolls can be used as a resource for schools across our community area and the initiative can move to other schools at the end of the pilot period, incorporating lessons learnt.

2. Where is the initiative taking place?

John A Gaunt School, Trowbridge Rugby Club or other suitable venue

3. When will the initiative take place?

April 2016

4. What is the Community benefit/evidence of need/links to Community Plan/Community Issue?

As above, the community area of Trowbridge scores very highly against most other areas of Wiltshire for rates of teenage pregnancy.

5. What is the desired outcome of this initiative?

The desired outcome is increased knowledge and understanding amongst year 9 boys around sexual health, relationships and the realities and implications of fatherhood. It is envisaged that the messages will spread widely amongst peer groups and that ongoing work can be done using the baby simulator dolls, to also include work with girls. Another outcome will be a range of materials and resources that can be used by other schools across the community area. Once the pilot project has been evaluated, lessons learnt will be incorporated to ensure that the project can be replicated in other schools.
