Partnership for Older People in the Pewsey Area (POPP) – 24 March 2016

Summary

Age UK Wiltshire, in partnership with Wiltshire Council, organised a *'Partnership for Older People'* event at Bouverie Hall on 24 March 2016 bringing together organisations and groups supporting older people across the Pewsey community area.

The purpose of the event was to discuss issues and gaps in services and to identify priorities to take forward to deliver improved outcomes for older and vulnerable people. The question was asked whether a partnership between organisations and groups would be beneficial.

Over 40 people attended the event representing a variety of organisations and interests. Presentations were received from Olly Spence (Community Commissioner, Wiltshire Council) on 'Prevention in practice; Wellbeing and developing communities' and from Brian Deeley, Chief Executive, Age UK on 'Growing old well in Wiltshire'

Kevin Gaskin, Healthwatch Wiltshire provided a tutorial on the <u>Your Care</u> Your Support website and facilitated a community asset mapping exercise.

Groups were asked to discuss gaps in services and actions for the future. The main themes from the discussion focused around local transport schemes, sharing information across organisations, identifying people who need support, supporting older people to get on line, improving access to advice and information and support for carers.

The new partnership will meet 3-4 times a year and project groups will be formed to focus on the priority areas.

- Wellbeing it's everyone's priority
- Wiltshire Council objective to bring communities together to enable them to do more for themselves (Resilient Communities)
 - Countywide Health and Wellbeing Board
 - Investment in Health and Wellbeing Centres
- Devolved funds to Area Boards to facilitate wellbeing Health and Wellbeing groups
- The Care Act (2014) legal duties on Authorities to consider wellbeing, deliver prevention and facilitate information and advice.
- Prevention Priorities (reduce levels of social isolation, reduce the burden of ill-health and impact on wellbeing of incontinence and urinary tract infections, prevent falls, minimise health and social harms whilst ensuring older people enjoy alcohol safely and responsibly.
- Asset Based Community Development what are Pewsey's priorities? What's available locally to achieve this? How can statutory services help to meet these gaps?
- Looking ahead Council /CCG to work with the voluntary sector to facilitate community based prevention services. Developing a strategic and coordinated approach to information and advice. Building links between communities and central groups (e.g. prevention board)
- Changing demographics: 11,900 people aged 85+ yrs, a 32% increase between 2001 and 2011
 - Dependency Ratio of 65.44 (England and Wales is 59.11)
 - Key Rural issues:
 - Loneliness and isolation
 - health and care.
 - Good Neighbourliness checking on elderly neighbours
 - Transport to local activities
 - Handy Help odd jobs
 - Support for carers & support with Dementia or Alzheimer's
 - Local volunteers to assist people to access community events
- Moving forward Optimise the use of all community resources, address disadvantage, build social capital and community capacity, develop services that meet real needs, collaborate with partners

- Transport buddying system giving people confidence and means to get out and about

- Practical and emotional support for carers e.g. support groups, respite

- LINK volunteers who are they, is link oversubscribed?
- Amesbury model using fleet of local buses (i.e. schools) and developing an informal volunteer driver scheme (funding for MIDAS training) to complement the link scheme.
- Safe access to bus stops an issue refer to parishes and community transport group

- Volunteers play a vital role explore ways of recruiting new volunteers
- Identifying carers and providing support
- Better sharing of information and advice (not all on line)
- Support older people to get 'on line' Digital champions
- Finding out who the older and vulnerable people are in the community. Better sharing of information across organisations
- Address lack of engagement of doctors surgeries

Ideas, actions and taking the partnership forward

- Promote one an other's roles within the partnership so people can connect with one another easily
- Explore potential for memory café at Upavon
- Grow partnership get others on board, Local Neighbourhood Policing Team for example
- Build on community asset mapping and ask the community to fill in the gaps
- Include a 'spotlight on' item or guest speaker at each partnership meeting to show case the work of different organisations and projects
- Learn from other rural communities how are they addressing challenges?
- Introduce themed meetings e.g. Dementia / Transport
- · Meetings / Task Groups to align with priorities
- Explore funding opportunities
- Ensure older people are at the heart of designing and delivering new services
- Have we got the priorities right? Need to test with older people and carers
- Outline vision / partnership objectives and outcomes
- Explore funding opportunities
