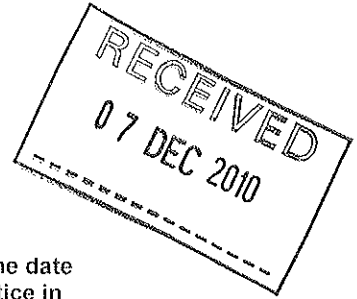

1. Noise

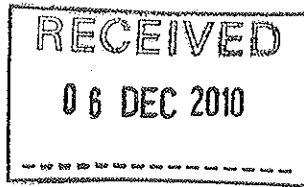

Also access is needed for emergency service when the police helicopter is used.

This is disturbing enough at 11.30 pm but at 1.30 & 2 o'clock in the morning it will be a real public nuisance. In addition to this, when cars are leaving they hoot each other & race round the corner into Lower Court.

There is also the noise level of the music which we have suffered over the summer. I

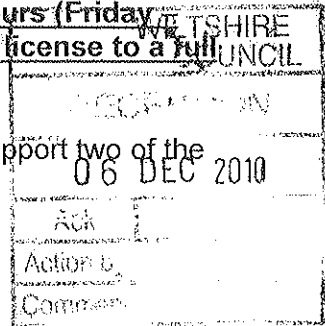
understand that the club has been served with

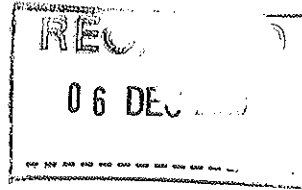

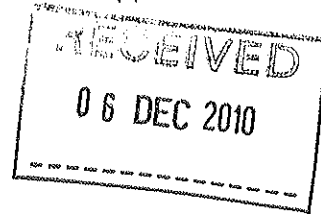

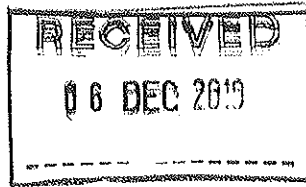

I am very concerned about the proposals to extend the licensing hours for the Cricket Club & also to enable the ~~club~~ ^{club} to open to members or the public.

My house & garden back on to the grounds of the cricket club & at times it has been impossible to get to sleep at night because of the noise from the club, especially in the summer when doors & windows are open & revellers tend to spill outside

As well as living adjacent to the club, I am a midwife at Trowbridge Hospital & work a lot of night shifts there so am subjected to the noise here as well as when I am at home.

I have previously telephoned the cricket club to complain about the level of noise & was just dismissed quite rudely. At that time I did also speak to someone at the District Council (as it was then) about the noise pollution.

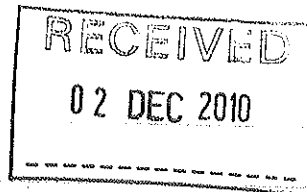
To increase the hours of licensing & to open the club to everyone will only exacerbate the situation with regard to the noise.
