

As at 24/11/18, Footfall in Salisbury was down 16.3% compared with 2017. Nationally, town centre footfall is down by -6.8% change on 2017. What is also important to consider is the very low level of footfall in Salisbury for this period in 2017, further demonstrated when comparing footfall for 2017 with 2016 (-11.2% reduction for 2017 compared to 2016). Part of this decline could be due to the shift to online sales for Black Friday (23/11/18) and possibly due to the aring of the BBC panorama programme about salisbury poisonings on 22/11/2018, causing a drop in footfall. Footfall on the day of 24/11/18 was down -26% comapred to 2017, with a national drop of only -5.6%. Since the first incident on the 4th of March 2018, Salisbury has seen an actual drop of -902,767 visitors compared to the same period in 2017 (04/03 - 24/11).
