Leafy Lane Playing Fields provides football pitches for both adult and youth teams. During the last couple of years there have been a number of deaths of young people whilst playing football. Within the last 18 months a local player's life was saved because the local Parish Council had purchased an AED. Safety is paramount when dealing with young people and a number of the AFC Corsham coaches have expressed concerns that Leafy Lane Playing Fields does not have an AED. Reducing risk for coaches is one way of helping to retain them coaching in football. Retention of coaches is a major issue in football. Purchase of an AED would help to make Leafy Lane Playing Fields one of the safest places to play football in the county. The second part of the grant is to replace our last set of fixed goals with movable goals. Movable goals are now required because over the last few years the local youth football club AFC Corsham who is the major user of Leafy Lane Playing Fields has grown its membership from 175 to around 260 players over the last 3 seasons. This is putting more pressure on the existing pitches meaning that Leafy Lane Playing Fields now need more flexibility than we presently have with regards to layout of football pitches on the ground. AFC Corsham has now started to look at how they could have a girls section. This would put more pressure on existing facilities. The purchase of a set of goals would enable Leafy Lane Playing Fields to make best use of its facilities and helping AFC Corsham to grow.

11. How will you monitor this?

Leafy Lane Playing Fields will work closely with AFC Corsham to track membership numbers and retention of Coaches. Leafy Lane will also monitor the condition of the pitches to check that they are getting even wear.

Local families - an increase in toilets allows for a greater intake of children (up to 40). This offers a preschool education, with close links to the primary school, to more local children and provides families with better access to affordable childcare. This fulfils our community aspiration for better access to childcare. Disabled persons - complying with the Disability Discrimination Act and allowing the preschool to be as inclusive as possible, the new disabled toilet would ensure the facilities were suitable for families and children requiring wheelchair access. This improves childcare access for local families with disabled children. Preschool children - children still wearing nappies would be provided with suitable hygienic changing facilities in line with Early Years Foundation Stage standards. Child size toilets and washbasins would make it easier for toilet trained children to meet their developmental targets of managing their own needs e.g. using the toilet independently. Staff - an enhanced environment with modernised facilities and an improvement to health and safety with appropriate changing area, negating the need to change children on the floor. Community - The preschool provides a local service and the project would help to ensure its sustainability in the future in line with the community priority to protect local services. The increase in intake of children will also necessitate the recruitment of more staff, improving local employment opportunities. The building is a village facility and the project will assist with its maintenance and ensure its longevity for the community at large. Box Kids, before and after school care - offering childcare for children aged 3-11 years is also provided in the building. This service would also benefit from the improved facilities again enhancing the local childcare options for families.

11. How will you monitor this?

The success of the project can be quantified by the increase in numbers of children using

the childcare facilities. The preschool also carry out annual parent and staff surveys, which last year highlighted the need to improve the toilet facilities. Therefore, community satisfaction can be assessed through the responses.

Corsham Primary School are willing allow the use of their facilities in kind as a donation towards our community group. The marquee/tent we are applying for funding for will provide a central meeting space for the children and families and also a shelter in the event of inclement weather. We would be happy to allow others to use the marquee/tent for community events if they wished.

11. How will you monitor this?

All adults and children in the event will be given wrist bands to wear to identify them. The project will be advertised in the community. There will be 24 hour first aid provided and also adults will be available all night in case of emergency. A full register of all adults and children will be taken along with addresses and phone numbers. This will help us work out how many members of the community attended, and from where in the area which will help when planning future events. We will ask all those who attended to complete a feedback questionnaire at the end.

The project has been created in direct response to community need as we have been approached by parents and other members of the community in order to provide adult learning classes, particularly in the evening, to support them with their children's learning - e-safety in particular. We are unable to use the school's current ICT hardware as the adult learning devices will need specific formatting to suit adult provision and also cannot be linked to the school's servers with direct access to pupil learning for security purposes. We are aware that the Corsham School is also applying for a grant and we have discussed this with them to as we will be providing a different provision on alternative days and times in order to maximise the opportunities for the community.

11. How will you monitor this?

We will be providing a qualified member of staff to run the project and we will conduct an audit of needs when discussing the project with community members. Participants will complete an initial introductory questionnaire and will then repeat this at the completion of the course to assess for learning. We will also seek feedback on the content of the course in order to improve the provision for future sessions.

This project will benefit the community as a whole, targeting individuals, groups, businesses, education, services and businesses. It will support people with limited funds to develop their learning, take part in groups or complete relevant training that they would not have otherwise had access to. It will support disengaged members of the community by putting them in touch with music groups as well as support structures that they do not currently access.

“Develop better understanding of what services are available and plans for expanding capacity and outreach to isolated areas.” It will de-mystify instrument learning and local music groups for the less confident by hosting an event for people to attend with their instruments. Community members will have the chance to hear or play their instrument, receive a health diagnosis for repair or pass it on for another community member. They will also have the chance to receive information about music groups to join as well as a chance for setting a group up. Target groups: • Children and young people • Older members of the community • ALL Community members • Isolated community members • Single parents • Promote well being • Formal and informal groups • Health services/surgeries • Self esteem • Confident • Financially unstable • Community cohesion “Encourage ‘self help’ through what is available in the community including social and exercise facilities” Learning an instrument can play a key role in supporting individuals to access networks in their area. It will support the community as a whole to make connections with one another, sharing, re- sharing, recycling and supporting one another. A key element of this work will be to “track” valuable

instruments (both financially and emotionally) with a badge for its re homing- so its giver can attend performances, events where the badge is placed and thus creating a wider legacy.

11. How will you monitor this?

We will work with existing providers and individuals in the community to map target areas/group to pool resources and knowledge. We will set up evaluation processes to document, log and track the project and its legacy. We will work with the Music service Hub to support connecting and reconnecting people in the community with projects, courses and music that they may wish to access.

This start up project aims to ignite the community and promote community cohesion. The project aims to support the community to sustain this way of working by making links with new musicians, new learners and experts in the area. This project will engage the community to share their own resources be it instruments, knowledge or support. It will work with partners to develop a comprehensive legacy and be a case study evaluation to be used elsewhere in the county.

To restore the War Memorial at St Bartholomew's Church which records the names of 92 men who gave their lives in the Great War. Funded by public subscription it was erected shortly after the war, however erosion of the memorial's carved stone facings means some names are in danger of becoming illegible. This restoration will clean and smooth the letters prior to repainting with an undercoat and two coats of enamel, thereby preserving them for future generations. This work will be undertaken by a local craftswomen who was responsible for a similar restoration work on the principal Corsham War Memorial.

Corsham has strong links with the military from WW1 up to the present day; therefore the restoration of this important memorial is a particularly worthy project during this WW1 Centenary Year. The restored memorial will provide an enduring legacy for the local families whose relatives made the ultimate sacrifice; it will demonstrate the continuing gratitude felt by the Corsham community of today, whose predecessors raised the original funding; and show our appreciation to those serving in our garrison community today. The restored memorial should form part of the Town's WW1 commemoration events and be advertised both regionally and nationally. Much is known of these brave soldiers and this should feature on local information literature and web-sites, thereby attracting historians, genealogy researchers, walkers and other visitors to the Town, all of which has the potential to benefit local businesses.

11. How will you monitor this?

In support of the restoration a special commemoration Visitors Book will be provided in the church; together with a narrative display highlighting the bravery and sacrifice of the 92 men. This Book will subsequently form part of the Town's historical record in perpetuity. The restored war memorial will be featured on, and linked to, many local and regional web-sites where it should be possible to monitor the interest it generates. The Tourist Information Office and Town Council will also be able to monitor how many enquires are received concerning the restored War Memorial and local businesses canvassed on the additional footfall generated.

The objective is to involve local youth and adults groups in the sports and cultural exchanges with Sorigny in France. There will also be the added benefit for local business people to form links with similar in Sorigny and the surrounding area. So far we have positive interest from local scout/cubs, football, boules/bowls, and the Green Room (youth group) who are all keen to arrange exchange visits in an inexpensive way with the Sorignese. They have all made it clear that return accommodation is available for visitors from France ensuring that the visits are kept to an affordable level for all involved.

11. How will you monitor this?

We hold a monthly committee meeting at which reports from those groups participating are discussed and may also be invited to attend and discuss their experiences. The committee members themselves have strong contacts with most of the interested parties as well.

12. If your project will continue after the Wiltshire Council funding runs out, how will you continue to fund it?

We have ideas for a planned programme of fund raising events but need to publicise the project through meetings with local groups and other interested parties - hence the need for a projector. Recently two committee members visited Sorigny, at their own expense, and have produced a short video of the village which is being used to promote the project. The whole community is aware of the memorial and its importance and relevance to Corsham and this will only be strengthened over the next four years. Corsham is a town that is hugely appreciative of the Armed Forces, whether that is today's military at MOD Corsham, or those who have fallen in two World Wars and other campaigns since. This is evidenced by the crowd numbers on Armed Forces Day and when 'All Armed Forces Units, Corsham' received the Freedom of the Town, and at the Remembrance Day Parade and wreath-laying where the numbers of those wishing to pay their respects increases every year. As a result, the war memorial is a monument that means much to the whole community, both young and old alike. Many of the town's young people are basing WW1 commemorative projects around the war memorial and discovering as much as they can about Corsham's WW1 war dead, as are members of the Civic Society and, of course, the Royal British Legion. By working together across the generations, all these groups are educating not only each other but the people of the town, including the ancestors of those who died. It is also hoped, as part of the WW1 Commemorations, to create a Memorial Trail which will encourage residents and visitors to walk around the town finding various places that have a WW1, and WW2, connection. An increase in visitors will help the local economy and, if the repairs and renovations are undertaken, then Corsham-based conservation stonemasons will be used.

It is hoped that the Recruitment Office Re-Enactment will benefit the whole community. Local residents, and particularly young people, will be encouraged, via the usual publicity sources, to come along and take part to discover not only what life was like in Corsham as Britain went to war in 1914, but what happened to the men of the town when they enlisted. It is envisaged that the creative, educational and fun aspect of the project will help bring home the historical facts in a memorable way and strengthen the interest in the World War One Commemorations. Many local community groups will come together to run the event. The Civic Society will bring their historical knowledge; the Youth Theatre are keen to create some street theatre around the event, so there is a cultural element to the project, and the Army Cadets wish to take part to underline the research work they have been doing on the names of those Corsham men who died in the Great War and are listed on the town's war memorial. The Recruiting Office project will help to bring these people to life for the Cadets, and everyone who takes part. We hope that the publicity will also encourage visitors to the town on the day and the resulting media coverage (press, radio and TV) will also encourage visitors to come to Corsham at other times, thus helping the local economy. At least one local business, The Flemish Weaver, which is next door to the Town Hall/Recruiting Office, has already indicated their involvement in the project. The new 'recruits' will be able to get the drink they would have been awarded as an enlisted man there. It is envisaged that other businesses will join in on the day and that the increase in visitor numbers will have a positive impact on the town centre. Taking part in the Recruitment Office event will be free, making it accessible to all. As with the Suffragist March Re-Enactment in 2013, it is hoped that local care home facilities will bring their residents along to experience the event, and with good disabled access to the Town Hall, this will all help to make a wholly inclusive event. The event also feeds into Wiltshire's commemorations and the continuing Legacy for Wiltshire that has come out of the 2012 Olympic Legacy, supported by both Wiltshire Council and the Area Board. It is hoped that the Recruiting Office Re-Enactment will be of interest to the whole community and will ignite four years of support for World War One Commemorations in and around the Corsham area. We also hope to capture people's feelings on being

'enlisted', either on film or with sound recordings, and use the recordings as part of an oral history project that will capture the centenary commemorations over the next four years.

The project intends to engage young people and their parents in the Corsham community who may be deemed as 'vulnerable'. Making the transition from primary to secondary school is an anxious time for many young people and their parents. Many parents worry about the demands of the secondary school curriculum on their child and how their child may cope,

how they might access support and how they can understand the study demands on their child and support them adequately at home. Linked to this may be underlying anxieties about the adequacy of their child's literacy skills to support their access to the curriculum at secondary school. The aim of the project is to support vulnerable young people and their parents in making this transition through a focus on developing literacy and study skills. The programme is being run in conjunction with Wiltshire Family Learning Service and intends to support young people and their parents in understanding 'what makes an effective learner' and how literacy skills can be developed to support this. The intention is that the programme will aim to engage parents and their children in developing their literacy skills further with an immediate focus on the transition to secondary school but also to engage adults in understanding that learning is a lifelong experience and it is never too late to focus on enhancing their own literacy skills. The project intends to deliver aspects of the programme through ICT but also to use ICT as a tool to engage attendees in understanding how it can support them in developing their literacy skills. The intention is for the young people and parents in attendance to have access to their own tablet on loan and to learn how this can support them to develop their reading and writing skills. It is hoped that with this access to ICT which, may not otherwise be available, young people and their parents will engage to a greater degree in developing their literacy skills. The course will also increase participants' awareness of the Wiltshire Family Learning Service and also raise awareness of the roles of key personnel in school eg. Parent Support Advisor, which will help to enhance communication and increase vulnerable families' access to external agency support through signposting. Once the programme has been run, it is hoped that there will be repeat and follow-up programmes.

11. How will you monitor this?

Participants will be identified through liaison with local feeder primary schools. The project will be monitored through entry and exit questionnaires and evaluations in liaison with Wiltshire Family Learning Service. Also, through the monitoring of the progress of literacy skills of those students involved and their engagement in school ie. attendance, participation, independence as monitored through school systems.
