

Summary of Surface Improvement Proposals

- We will assemble a Monitoring Group to push forward progress of the proposals below and to monitor this progress against a defined timetable.
- We will thoroughly survey vehicle usage, looking at agricultural, access and
 recreational use. The data will be assessed against records of physical damage at
 selected points to provide objective measures of damage related to use.
- 3. Areas of previous major repair work will be re-assessed both on the ground and using photographic records to provide a qualitative measure of efficacy against time.
- 4. We will look for and, where appropriate, implement novel management techniques.
- Segregation of users may be the best option on some stretches. We will identify such stretches and implement segregation where appropriate.
- We will work with farmers to identify and develop alternative agricultural access options.
- A simple decision making protocol will be drawn up to guide the specification of future surface repairs.
- We will regularly monitor areas of major works and introduce a follow-up patching programme.
- 9. As a priority we will draw up costed proposals for the repair of all areas currently below the quality standard.
- 10. We will work immediately to secure finance for the repair of sub-standard sections based on a three year programme. Implementation of the programme will begin in Spring 2003¹.
- 11. We will review the policy of non-maintenance of road crossings at the next meeting of the Management Group.
- 12. In addition to funds for repair, we will be working to secure adequate finance to implement a rigorous on-going maintenance programme.
- 13. We will ensure that all signing to and from The Ridgeway is accurate.
- 14. The Code of Respect will be reviewed and simplified.
- 15. We will liaise with the Police regarding Access Specialists, to be trained in the relevant law and able to advise colleagues, and general policing of the National Trail.

16. We will implement the following experimental measures to compare the effects of statutory restraint, voluntary restraint and no restraint in reducing surface damage:

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RIDGEWAY NATIONAL TRAIL

I am sure colleagues will have let you know about the outcome of the meeting with Alun Michael on the 8 April 2003. I promised at that meeting that the Agency would take a lead in pulling together a plan for the Ridgeway National Trail as a whole, which would be practical to implement, readily understandable by users, and above all cost effective in making the Ridgeway a high quality experience for walkers, cyclists and horse riders.

In order to ensure a better quality experience for these users we are requesting that each highway authority along the length of the National Trail assesses the following methods and applies them as appropriate to their stretch of National Trail;

- Traffic Regulation Orders (permanent and or seasonal)
- Repair of National Trail to the standards as set out in Surface Standards Document (April 2001)
- · Seek policing of Ridgeway National Trail to deter illegal use
- Seek alternative routes for agricultural vehicles
- Segregation of users where appropriate

By 16 June, please could you let me know what you are prepared to do on your stretch of the trail, and your proposed timetable for implementation. We can present Alun Michael (Minister of Environment Rural Affairs & Urban Quality) and the interested MPs of the overall course of action that is being taken. We encourage you to liaise closely with neighbouring authorities across the route, through the Ridgeway Management Group, to ensure consistency across the length of the National Trail.

As part of the process of implementation, if you think it helpful, we will set up a working group to oversee and advise on the way forward. The working group will be made up of a member



from each local highway authority across the Ridgeway, representatives from the Ridgeway National Trail Management Group and the Ridgeway Forum, the Ridgeway National Trail Officer, Defra, LARA and Friends of the Ridgeway.

I do hope that you will be able to send a map, which collates details and provides a timetable for all of the actions for your section of the trail to Hazel Fleming, Dacre House, 19 Dacre Street, London, SWIH 0DH by 16 June 2003.
