

## Chronology – Development of the Salisbury Vision:

### 2004

December Salisbury District Council Cabinet agree to include the development of a Salisbury Vision as a key project for 2005

### 2005

July South West Regional Development Agency agree to part fund the development of a Salisbury Vision

September Approval of PID for development stage of Salisbury Vision; project includes five key priority areas:

- Maltings and central car park
- Market Place
- Salisbury Guildhall
- Southampton Road
- Churchfields Industrial Estate

Project Brief approved for the appointment of consultants

Funding for the development of the Salisbury Vision agreed.

### 2006

February Gillespies appointed as lead consultants to develop the Salisbury Vision

June Baseline Review completed

September Options testing: three day public exhibition and consultation exercise

October Options development stage completed

### 2007

January Gillespies deliver draft document:

April Gillespies deliver final document - Vision for Salisbury: Area Development Framework

July Start of major public consultation exercise (Our Place in the Future) in conjunction with LDF  
Approval of PID for delivery stage of Salisbury Vision

September Salisbury Vision project director appointed

October End of Our Place in the Future consultation

November Gillespies final document considered by Salisbury District Council City Area Community Committee

### 2008

January Salisbury District Council draft final Salisbury Vision document produced incorporating changes following public consultation; approved by steering group

Draft final Salisbury Vision document considered by Salisbury District Council City Area Community Committee and informally by Cabinet

April Revised draft final Salisbury Vision document considered by steering group, Salisbury District Council City Area Community Committee and by Planning and Economic Development Overview & Scrutiny Panel

Salisbury Vision approved by Salisbury District Council Cabinet

May Salisbury Vision adopted by Salisbury District Council as a key strategic document
