A TRANSPARENT AND LOCAL COUNCIL:

COMMUNITY PLANNING AND THE VOICE TO CHOICE PROJECT

Purpose of Report

- 1. To report common issues identified in Wiltshire's 20 community area plans
- 2. To agree the process for developing the next phase of the County Council's approach to community planning, through the Voice to Choice project

Main Considerations for the Council

Common Issues

3. In December 2004, an analysis of the issues in 13 out of the 20 community plans was reported to Cabinet. A further 7 community plans have now been published. A summary of the issues in all 20 community plans is provided in Appendix A. This bottom-up intelligence from local communities continues to influence the priorities of the Council in its service planning and to shape the strategic analysis of Wiltshire in the Community Strategy of the Wiltshire Strategic Board. Workshops are planned in January 2006 to address key issues such as improving local engagement processes on roads, traffic and local transport planning and work is progressing within local communities on issues such as extended schools and children's centres. The Council will continue to monitor its contribution towards the achievement of the targets in the community plans.

The Next Phase

- 4. Through its participation on the consortium for Transforming Neighbourhoods, led by the Young Foundation, the Council is in a position to influence the development of this agenda both locally and nationally from the rural perspective. In December, the Council will be represented at a meeting of the consortium to discuss neighbourhood governance models; community assets and ownership; contracts and triggers (these will be new powers for local people to trigger action when they believe local public services are not up to standard); risks and regulations; and all of these issues will feature in new legislation around the Neighbourhoods agenda which is expected in the Summer 2006 to help develop:
 - More communities taking active control of their own neighbourhoods and managing and owning their local assets

- § More elected members actively leading their communities and speaking inclusively on behalf of everyone within the community
- § Local authorities, health and police services being more responsive to the priorities of local communities, taking on board major policing initiatives such as the 'Safer and Stronger Communities' project
- 5. In chiefly rural Wiltshire, the concept of neighbourhood has been reinforced at the community area level with sensitivity to the neighbourhoods and different types of communities within these areas. The Council's Corporate Plan (2005-2009) recognises the need to continue to strengthen local governance arrangements and states the organisation's intention to build on its Beacon status for getting closer to communities with the target of carrying out a pilot project for devolved decision-making. The proposed project is called Voice to Choice and it will reinforce the organisation's visibility and impact as a transparent and local Council through improved 3-tier arrangements.
- 6. It is important that new arrangements do not dissipate any energy within communities generated by the community partnerships and the community area plans. A balance also needs to be maintained between resourcing the local and the strategic levels to ensure that the Council can still deliver its high level corporate goals over the next four years, as stated in the Corporate Plan. However, overall it is intended that the proposed arrangements should achieve the following benefits:
 - § 3 tiers of local government working in partnership with the local community
 - § Cutting down complexity, confusion and the drain on everyone's time
 - § Being transparent about how decisions are made and who is making them
 - § Having a single point for consultation and communications
 - § Bringing together multiple agendas and supporting local projects
 - Making use of more focused, accessible and flexible resources
 - § Being able to address any triggers which might be raised by local people
 - § Empowering local community leaders at the heart of the process
- 7. The Portfolio Holder for Community and Staffing and the Assistant Director of Corporate Services have held initial discussions about the project with key representatives from the district councils and the Listening to Communities Project Board. The following suggestions have been made:
 - § Clarify the special position of elected members of local authorities within the community planning and partnership processes
 - § Strengthen our integrated approaches to tackle issues of most interest and concern to local people with the appropriate levels of citizen participation
 - § Ensure there is a consistent approach towards local governance arrangements at the community area level
 - S Draw up the detail of options for local decision making, including possible schemes of delegation

8. The framework for the Voice to Choice project is set out in Appendix B. Initial research has been carried out on the types of functions and services which local communities might be interested in making decisions about, in influencing or in monitoring. Questions on these issues will be included in the next People's Voice questionnaire. At its meeting on 2 December 2005, the Listening to Communities Project Board discussed these proposals and recommended that further consultation and discussions should take place within the Council and with its partners before a scheme for the pilot is presented to Cabinet. Schedule 1 for this process is presented below.

Environmental Impact of the Proposal

9. Environmental issues are identified in each of Wiltshire's 20 community areas under the themes of Environment and Land-Based Issues and Housing and the Built Environment. The whole concept of community planning is an inclusive process of partnership working which develops local ownership and sustainable approaches towards how communities engage with service providers. The outcomes of this work should contribute to the enhanced quality of life of local people and communities.

Risk Assessment

10. It is unlikely that the opportunities afforded by the Council's Beacon status to drive forward the local agenda would be realised under current arrangements for local governance.

Financial Implications

11. The financial implications of new local governance arrangements would be identified as part of the Voice to Choice project.

Reason for Proposal

12. To take forward community planning and the Voice to Choice project.

Recommendations

- 13. It is recommended that Cabinet:
- a) Notes the issues identified in the 20 community area plans and recommends that this analysis feeds into the next stage of the development of the Community Strategy for Wiltshire
- b) Agrees the way forward for the Voice to Choice project in terms of the framework and schedule and recommends any further issues which Cabinet considers should be included as part of the project at this stage
