Title: Waste and Recycling Review – First Interim Report

Purpose

To keep Cabinet informed about progress with the review of waste and recycling and to consider options for suspending green waste collections during the months of July and August.

Background

The existing twin bin and black box system was introduced across the District in stages between 2004 and 2006. In general it has been very successful, raising our annual recycling rate to 40%.

A change to remove cardboard from the green waste collection was made in April this year. This was necessary to address the contamination of the green waste and the failure of the resulting compost to meet the relevant British Standard.

At the same time, about 30 out of the 60 mini recycling sites were converted to provide for recycling cardboard and plastic bottles. These have proved very popular and additional bins have been installed to cope with demand.

A review of these changes over the summer months had always been planned. Additionally, a motion to Council on 11 April 2007, called for a full review of all options for waste collection and recycling. The motion was referred to Cabinet for consideration but this had not delayed the commencement of the review.

Alongside the review, the new Cabinet has requested that options be brought forward for suspending green waste collections and reverting to weekly grey bin collections during the months of July and August.

Scope and Timescale of the Review

The proposed scope and timescale of the review is outlined in Appendix 1. The review will be based on objective data, will include studying best practice elsewhere, and will be informed by consultation with Members, stakeholders and the public.

The review will be carried out in close liaison with the Wiltshire Waste Partnership. Black box recycling, the bring sites and the household recycling centres are provided by Hills Waste under contract to the County Council. In these areas in particular, the Council is not in a position to make changes without the agreement of its partners.

Suspension of green waste collections during July and August

Last summer was a challenging time for the alternate weekly collection system, when hot weather was combined with protracted industrial action taken by Cleanaway staff.

The replacement of alternate weekly collections with weekly grey bin collections in July and August is a possible response to this but will bring with it a number of other implications. Various options, together with their advantages and disadvantages are outlined below.

Option 1

To suspend green bin collections over the months of July and August and move to weekly residual waste collections for the two months.

Option 2

To relax current restrictions on leaving bins lids up and leaving side waste over the months of July and August

Option 3

To suspend green bin collections over the months of July and August and move to weekly residual waste collection for the two months on a trial basis in Trowbridge only.

Option 4

To keep a green waste collection every 3 weeks over the months of July and August and a residual waste collection on the other weeks (i.e. grey / green).

Option 5

To add an additional collection of residual waste and maintain green waste collections over the months of July and August.

Option 6

A final option would be to defer any further changes to waste and recycling arrangements until the review had been completed. This could be combined with highlighting guidance on how to manage grey bins to avoid problems.

Effects on Strategies and Codes

The suspension of green waste collections in July and August would reduce the Council's recycling rate. This would run contrary to the corporate plan aim of recycling more waste and targets for recycling and waste minimisation.

Risk Management

Some options mitigate the risk of losing significant recycling tonnage and hence the impact on the Council's recycling rate.

Financial Implications

Option 5 has a significant financial implication. The funding for this would need to be clearly identified and would be a key decision. Any changes to the current arrangements may incur additional publicity costs.

Legal and Human Rights Implications

There are no direct legal or human rights implications.

Recommendations

It is recommended that Cabinet:

- a) Agrees the format and indicative timescales and milestones of the proposed waste and recycling review.
- b) Considers and agrees an option for collections over July and August 2007.
