2. Explanation of Procedure:

4. The King John Inn, Tollard Royal:

The Committee considered the previously circulated papers.

The Committee heard verbal representations from a representative on behalf of the applicant, an officer from Environmental Health, Salisbury District Council, Mr Mitchell, a neighbour and Mr Crane, a neighbour.

Resolved - Taking into consideration the representations made in writing and at the hearing, the licensing objectives, in particular the prevention of public nuisance, the guidance issued under Section 182, in particular section 5.65 and 5.68 and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy, the Committee resolved to substantially

grant the application subject to the following modifications and conditions:

1. The provision of live music, recorded music and the provision of facilities for dancing to terminate at midnight on all days.

And that this be subject to the following conditions:

- a) The mandatory condition as set out in Sub-Section 19 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- b) All doors and windows must be kept closed during the performance of any amplified music and at any event after midnight.

Reason: To prevent public nuisance

 Noise limiters must be used on amplification equipment used on the premises at all times.

Reason: To prevent public nuisance.

The reason for this decision was that the Committee felt that on the evidence there was the potential for noise disturbance but that this had to be balanced against the applicant's need to be a commercially viable venture.

All parties were informed that they had the right to appeal to the magistrate's court should they be dissatisfied with the decision.
