	The Area Board received and noted the following updates from key partners:-
	 Wiltshire Police Inspector Mark Luffman presented his report as circulated in the agenda pack. Attention was drawn to the apparent increase in crime statistics in the Calne area but it was noted that this was due to the way in which crime had been recorded. Inspector Luffman informed the meeting that a more accurate comparison would be available when statistics for 2017 and 2018 had been compiled and compared.
	Inspector Luffman reported that Calne would shortly be have its full

compliment of three Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) shortly. In addition, the Force was recruiting additional Special Constables and it was hoped that they would be allocated to areas at the end of January 2018.

- Dorset and Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service The written report was received and noted.
- Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group The written report was received and noted.
- Healthwatch Wiltshire The written report was received and noted.
- Calne Town Council The following points were noted:-
 - ➤ The Calne Community Neighbourhood Plan would be the subject of a referendum to be held on 1 February 2018.
 - ➤ Calne had received gold for the fourth year in a row in the South West in Bloom Portman Cup competition in 2017.
 - Cllr Howard Marshall had resigned as Deputy Mayor for family reasons and Cllr Glenis Ansell had subsequently been elected in his place.
 - ➤ There was a town council vacancy in the north ward which would be the subject of a bi-election in January 2018.
 - The Town Council had agreed its precept which was not set to rise in 2018.
- Cherhill Parish Council It was noted that sadly the Clerk to the Parish Council had recently died and consequently the Council was in the process of recruiting a new Clerk. Plans were being developed for a new village hall which would be available to view next year.
- Compton Bassett Parish Council The Speedwatch Campaign had been very successful with a drop of speeding motorists caught from 12 to about four per hour. The new village sign had been erected and super fast broadband was now available so far in half the village.
- Calne Area Parish Forum An update was received on plans to create a
 copse to commemorate the centenary of the end of World War One, with
 the signing of the Armistice in November 2018. It was planned to plant a
 tree for each person in the Calne Community Area who had been killed in
 this conflict.

58 Our Community Matters

The Area Board was provided with an update on community issues and progress on Calne Area Board working groups as follows:-

• Local Youth Network (LYN) Consideration was given to a report by

Helen Bradley, the Locality Youth Facilitator in which councillors were asked to consider an application for funding.

On hearing from Helen Bradley and after some discussion, it was noted this application was slightly more than was normally permitted under the Community Area Grant scheme. However, it was unanimously agreed an award be granted under exceptional circumstances in order to ensure the group was able to provide maximum positive impact for the group.

Resolved:

To approve a recommendation from the LYN Management Group that a grant of £5,200.00 be made to A Place for Us (Calne Disability Youth Club) for a continuation of their work.

- Older People/Carer's Champion Diane Gooch gave a verbal update and reported the success of a tea party held in October. She also reported that a Christmas Party was being organised to take place in the Hub on 13 December 2017 from 1.30pm until 3.30pm. More volunteers would be most welcome to help arrange future activities.
- Health and Wellbeing Group David Evans gave a brief update and reported that the Calne Health and Social Care Forum had met on 17 October 2017 when they had discussed Side by Side, a new national service funded by the Alzheimer's Society for those with a dementia diagnosis.

Olga Tuffery, HACCA (Healthy & Active Calne Community Area) informed the meeting that the HACCA was currently exploring the link between poverty and obesity in young people and she would report back in due course. She also stated that Priestley Primary School, Calne would shortly be starting an after school club which initially would be able to take up to six children at a time.

- Dementia Friendly Calne Community Working Group The Chairman reported that the Working Group was currently working on a project to recruit local business people to be more dementia friendly. A start had been made with recruiting local hairdressers and she would report on progress in due course.
- Air Quality Working Group Cllr Alan Hill reported that various informal conversations had been taking place and he would report further in due course.
- S. 106 Working Group Cllr Tony Trotman reported that the Group was investigating pedestrian and cycleway safe routes to schools. He drew attention to the likely increase in traffic on Abberd Way to the link road. The Group was also investigating the possibility of constructing a cycleway

in Calne Recreation Ground and he hoped to be able to report further on this initiative in due course.

- Calne Our Place The Community Engagement Manager gave a brief verbal update at the meeting. She was pleased to announce that new *Welcome to Calne* signs had recently been received and would be installed very shortly. She also reported the award of £5,000.00 to Calne Library.
- Calne Community Safety Forum In the absence Cllr Glenis Ansell, this item was deferred until the next meeting.
- Calne Community Area Transport Group (CATG) The Chairman presented notes of the Calne Community Area Transport Group meeting held on 12 October 2017.

Resolved:

To note and approve the contents of the report.

• **Training & Skills Working Group** Cllr Ian Thorn reported the success of the workshop which had immediately preceded this meeting.

Subject:	Eat Out Eat Well Award Scheme

Public Protection is looking to work with Area Boards to increase coverage of the Eat Out Eat Well Scheme; targeting high street businesses and village locations.

The Eat Out Eat Well Award is included in the Wiltshire Obesity Strategy implementation plan and is offered free of charge to most types of food business that have achieved a Food Hygiene Rating of three stars or above.

The aims of the award:

- To encourage and assist caterers to increase the range and promotion of healthier options on their menu.
- Assist caterers in meeting the rising demand for healthier food via advice and low cost nutrition training.
- Acknowledge and promote caterers who make it easier for customers to eat healthily.
- Increase customer choice and help consumers make more informed choices.

The over arching aim is to increase choice for customers and profitability for businesses. It is not about removing 'unhealthy food' but making easily achievable adaptations, in some cases to make existing favourites healthier without compromising on sales and introduce new products. Experience to date has shown that this is realistic and achievable.

The award has three levels bronze, silver and gold and is open to most types of catering establishments including cafes, takeaways, schools, restaurants and workplace canteens that have been assessed as broadly compliant in terms of food safety and food standards and achieved a Star rating of three or more.

Achievement is determined via a points system that rewards healthier catering and reflects Government obesity messages; the increased use of fruit & vegetables, reductions in sugar and fat, increased fibre, reductions in refined and processed ingredients, use of healthier cooking techniques, portion control, marketing and pricing policies that encourage healthier choices.

An experienced assessor will visit the business to guide the food business operator through the process.

To date 261 businesses have signed up and are benefiting from the competitive edge that the award provides. Many businesses have reported cost savings as well.

Participating businesses are provided with a window sticker similar to those displaying a food hygiene rating and their details are entered on to the Eat Out Eat Well website.

Most types of food business that have a Food Hygiene Rating of three or above are eligible and can apply for an advisory visit and assessment to achieve a Gold, Silver or Bronze classification.

Subject: The new one-stop shop Work Wiltshire website

Key message:

On the 4th July, the new Work Wiltshire website launched. This is a unique website containing a huge range of education, employment and skills information which would normally have been located on several different sites and can now be found in one location with signposting to other relevant sites.

This website has been made to be accessible, attractive and a professional information hub. By having a one-stop-shop website, it will enable us to become the go-to place for career information, advice and signposting to relevant sites that the customers are looking for.

Work Wiltshire website contains information and links for: next steps in education, apprenticeships, information for employers, support available for those with barriers to work, information for those looking for work or wanting to upskill, financial support, further and higher education, local projects, support for schools and policies and data.

Questions:

How we set it up?

The Work Wiltshire website was originally created to support employers, employees and those looking for work. It then expanded to cover the programmes that the Employment and Skills Service were running, as well as providing career information, labour market intelligence, Wiltshire statistics, news and events and the services strategy.

The Employment and Skills service decided expand the website further and extend the range of audiences it catered for and allow them to access all the information they may need in one location. The redevelopment of the website was funded by Action 4 Wiltshire and has engaged with key stakeholders throughout the development to make sure that the website will work as effectively as possible and include tailored information to the different users.

Who were involved?

The main development of the website was conducted by the Employment and Skills Service at Wiltshire Council with stakeholders from Children's Services, Employment and Community Skills, local schools, Carer Support Wiltshire, Community First as well as others, contributing content and feedback to ensure the website is relevant, engaging and accessible.

What we are hoping to achieve?

A helpful and creditable website which enables local people and employers to find the key information and links they would like to know in one location.

Is this a model used elsewhere?

Other websites focus on specific sections which are included on the Work Wiltshire, but to our knowledge the combination of having all education, employment and skills information for young people, the general public, those with barriers to work and employers, all in one location is unique.

What has been the website take-up so far?

Since its launch we have had over 3,540 people use our website looking at 13,175 pages, with a wide variety of age demographics. The most popular pages so far being apprenticeships information for employers, apprenticeships, support for schools, and young people's next steps.

What can it do for people?

People will be able to search through the different sections on the website to find out education, employment and skills information. There is also a news section and events page, which shows the Employment and Skills service blog, local vacancies, Higher Education open days and much more.

It will help employers with find information and support for their business including how to set up an apprenticeship, free HR support, how business can get involved in local programmes, grants and other information.

It also has a dedicated section to help schools with careers education, giving information of local support, provision, the Wiltshire Careers Education Programme and support helping them arrange careers events.

It also has a section for those with complex needs and barriers to work; which highlights what support there is for them.

PSPOs

Public Spaces Protection Orders (PSPOs) are one of the tools available under the Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing 2014 Act and replace Designated Public Place Orders (DPPO). New Guidance issued by the Local Government Association stated that any Orders in existence post 21 October 2017 would automatically be transferred to include any conditions covered by the DPPO. This applies to orders in: Trowbridge, Salisbury, Calne, Chippenham, Devizes, Durrington, Malmesbury and Warminster.

The legislation recognises that councils are often best placed to identify the broad and cumulative impact that ASB can have and additional conditions can be applied for. They must be evidence based and must not be covered by other primary legislation.

Councils can use PSPOs to prohibit specified activities, and/or require certain things to be done by people engaged in particular activities, within a defined public area. PSPOs differ from other tools introduced under the Act as they are council-led, and rather than targeting specific individuals or properties, they focus on the identified, evidence based problem behaviour in a specific location. Any conditions must be consulted on.

The legislation provides for restrictions to be placed on behaviour that apply to everyone in that locality (with the possible use of exemptions). Breach of a PSPO without a reasonable excuse is an offence. The enforcement will be managed by Wiltshire Police, they will issue fixed penalty notices which can incur fines of up to £1000. Alcohol conditions covered by the Orders can incur £500 fine if breached.

Wiltshire Council is keen to work with individuals to change their behaviour. Working with our drug and alcohol service, recipients of fines will now have the option to attend a drug and alcohol course to waiver the fine payment.

New signage is on order and the webpages will be updated to reflect this recent change in legislation.

Fixed Penalty Notices

A Police Officer may issue an FPN to anyone they have reason to believe has committed an offence and breached the PSPO without reasonable excuse under section 67 of the Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing 2014 Act. The FPN should only be issued to over 18s.

This also applies in the case of orders that prohibit alcohol consumption, where it is reasonably believed that a person has been or intends to consume alcohol. It is an offence under section 63 either to fail to comply with a request not to consume or to surrender alcohol (or what is reasonably believed to be alcohol or a container for alcohol).

The front copy should be handed to the recipient and the second retained for your records. Wiltshire Council must be notified via ASB@wiltshire.gov.uk with a scanned copy of the FPN. This will enable the Council to prosecute if necessary.

There will also be an option to attend a Wiltshire substance misuse service course to waiver the fine. The information is contained on the back page of the FPN and should be handed to the recipient at the time of issue. The Officer should make the recipient aware that this option would waiver the fine payment.

Officers should consider circumstances where there may be a 'reasonable excuse' for breaching the Order. It may also provide a further opportunity, to recognise that those responsible may themselves be vulnerable and in need of support. They should therefore consider appropriate referral pathways where there are any safeguarding concerns.

Subject: Community Campus Update – Calne Leisure Centre

At the end of last year (December 12) Cabinet approved the final delivery phase for its community campus programme, which included Calne Leisure Centre. This investment is the final element of Calne Community Campus which has seen investment in Beversbrook and the central library to create a new community hub. The investment will improve the infrastructure of the building and the facilities to enhance the customer experience.

Since the transfer of the centre from Calne Leisure Limited, Wiltshire Council has invested in the following improvements:

- Sports Hall Lighting £12,000
- Dance Studio Air Conditioning £8,000
- Swimming pool lighting £8,000
- General Lighting £29,000
- New Biomass Boiler £150,000

A revised condition survey on the centre will be undertaken shortly to inform what needs to be done and to help define the scope of works. Design plans will then be drafted and work on the refurbishment is planned to start this year. Regular progress updates will be provided to the Area Board.

Calne - 'Our Community Matters' Local issues: local action

1. Purpose of the Report

To update members on the progress made to address the priorities identified by the community at the 'Our Community Matters' Joint Strategic Assessment event held on 30th November 2016.

2. Background

The Calne 'Our Community Matters' event was held on 30th November 2016 at the Calne Community Hub and Library. Over 100 members of the public and partner agencies attended and participated in the event, which focused on the data set out in the *Community Area Joint Strategic Assessment 2016-17*.

The JSA brings together the results of the latest research conducted by the major agencies and public sector bodies in Wiltshire. The project was initiated by the Wiltshire Health and Wellbeing Board and the Wiltshire Assembly. These bodies will use the priorities emerging from the events to focus and support strategic projects, activities and services across Wiltshire.

Participants at the events used the data to inform themed roundtable discussions and to identify local priorities underpinned by the research. All participants had the opportunity to vote on the priorities and the results are now available online. Following agreement on the priorities, the themed roundtables then looked at practical community-led actions that could be taken to address the issues identified.

The purpose of the event was to:

- Gain a consensus around priorities for the area
- Provide the basis for community-led action and projects over the next two years
- Develop a community plan for the area
- Provide the Council and partners with a clear focus for local actions

The Calne Area Board adopted these priorities on 6th December 2016 and has since focused on supporting and facilitating local actions to tackle these priorities.

3. Priorities identified

The following documents set out the JSA analysis presented to the 'Our Community Matters' conference and the priorities identified by the community on the night. The following documents are available to view online:

- Summary of issues identified by the research.
- Priorities agreed at the event.

4. Moving forward with community-led action

To address the priorities, the Calne Area Board has been using its local budget, strategic influence and delegated powers to shape the delivery of local services and actions. It has also used its delegated resources to facilitate and support community-led projects. The community engagement manager and the local youth facilitator have been working with local community groups and partners, using the local priorities to focus work priorities. Some of the actions are easier to address than others and work has focussed on areas where tangible outcomes and progress can be delivered. This has helped to capitalise on the enthusiasm and momentum generated by the event.

5. Impact

Appendix 1 sets out the actions achieved since the 'Our Community Matters' event took place. This is a two-year programme and the first quarter figures represent the period between April – October 2017. The report shows the actions that have been delivered to address the priorities in the 10 JSA themes and the 30 key priorities selected. It is important to note that these actions have been delivered by a wide range of agencies and are not solely the actions of the area board. The area board may have funded some actions or offered support to others. Some may have been developed independently by the groups concerned, but all help to address the priorities identified by the community.

Further action is needed on local economy and housing. This will be a priority for Q2.

6. Recommendations

- (1) That the area board notes the JSA Quarter 1 update report.
- (2) That the area board expresses its thanks to the organisations, groups and partners who have contributed actions that address the local priorities set by the community.

This year phase two of the county-wide Clean-Up Wilts campaign will be implemented.

The campaign, which was launched last October, focused on targeting fly-tipping across the county as its first phase.

This year the campaign focuses on litter from food-on-the-go, chewing gum and cigarette butts and community litter picks as part of supporting the national Great British Spring Clean, which takes place on the weekend of 2 to 4 March (2018). Over the last two years — communities across Wiltshire have participated in the litter picks and more than 30 tonnes of litter has been collected.

As a result of this participation, Wiltshire Council has been shortlisted as a finalist in the Keep Britain Tidy Network Awards – Local Authority Award category. The shortlisting is based on the evidence of the strong community spirit that prevails in Wiltshire, which was clearly demonstrated last year on the weekend of the 2017 Great British Spring Clean (Friday 3 to Sunday 5 March).

More than 3,200 volunteers took part in litter picks across the county, giving up their time to help make their communities a better place to live. In all, 152 litter picks took place throughout the county during the weekend, and the volunteers collected 3,025 bags of rubbish, with 18.15 tonnes collected in total.

The award winner will be announced on 8 February. Just being a finalist is recognition of what makes Wiltshire unique. It would be great if this year's Great British Spring Clean event could be another success.

It would of course be much better if people didn't drop litter in the first place and that we didn't have to spend more than £2.5 million each year collecting this rubbish. Wiltshire is a beautiful county and we want to keep it that way.

We will hear more about the Clean-Up Wilts campaign and this year Big Spring Clean on tonight's agenda.

Residents asked if they would pay an extra £1 a month to protect local policing

"Would you be prepared to pay an extra pound a month to protect our police Force?" That's the question being asked by Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon Angus Macpherson.

The policing precept consultation which launches 2 January is looking for the views of Wiltshire residents on the proposed increase of £12 a year.

Currently the average band D household contributes £14.19 per month to local policing, but if residents back the proposal then this would rise to £15.19 per month.

Angus Macpherson said, "As a Force, Wiltshire Police has seen the second highest increase in demand across the country in the last year yet the funding we receive from central government doesn't recognise the increasing pressures our service is under.

"In fact we receive the fourth lowest funding per head of population in England and Wales.

Since 2010, Wiltshire Police has received £19 million less but have been responding to more crimes and supporting more members of the public year on year.

Mr Macpherson added, "Whilst we live in an incredibly safe county, there's only so far the budget will stretch and we're streamlining our services to ensure they're as efficient as possible at the same time as keeping the public safe, but we are feeling the squeeze more than ever.

"Without this increase Wiltshire Police will have to look at further reductions in officers and staff to close a budget gap of around £3m.

"That's why I'm asking whether residents in Wiltshire and Swindon would be prepared to pay an extra £1 a month to help bridge this gap.

"This increase will mean that I can protect frontline services from further reductions and maintain the current level of service."

The consultation which runs from 2nd January 2018 to midday 31st January 2018 wants to hear your views on the proposed increase.

New Fire Officer for Calne

Following a small organisational restructure of Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service, the Calne area now has a different Fire Officer. Ade Hurren is now the responsible Officer for the North Wiltshire area which includes Calne, Chippenham, Corsham and Malmesbury. Ade is an experienced Fire Officer who was already responsible for Chippenham, Corsham and Malmesbury. Ade's contact details are at the bottom of this report.

Fire Service raises concerns over bioethanol fires

Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service (DWFRS) is asking owners of bioethanol real flame fires to ensure that they are fully aware of the fire risks they present.

Bioethanol real flame fires are becoming a popular feature in the home, especially at this time of year. They are easily affordable, provide the visual attraction of a real flame but don't require the installation of a flue or chimney.

There are two types of bioethanol real flame fires – those fuelled by bioethanol gel, and those that take liquid bioethanol fuel. Despite creating a homely atmosphere, these open flame heaters present a serious fire risk, despite only putting out a moderate amount of heat.

To ensure that owners remain safe while using their bioethanol fires, the Service is offering these top tips:

- Beware of cheap sub-standard products.
- Follow manufacturer's safety advice.
- Remember that bioethanol fuel is highly flammable.
- Flame can be almost invisible, especially when the fuel level becomes low.
- Refuel only when the fire has been extinguished and is cold.
- Use approved small containers to refuel.
- Wipe up any spillages before igniting the bioethanol. Keep fuel away from clothes.
 Don't refuel when under the influence of alcohol spillages of fuel could more easily happen and go unnoticed.
- Light with a manual or electric taper. Don't use a lighter, match or lit rolled-up paper.
- Keep children and pets away from the fire.
- Don't move the appliance with the fuel lit.
- Store bioethanol in appropriate containers away from any naked flame and carefully consider where to keep fuel safely.
- Do not use fires in a room with poor ventilation.
- Installing a CO detector in room is recommended.
- Make sure the fire is out before leaving the room or going to sleep.

Winter Pressures guidance issued from NHS National Emergency Pressure Panel

NHS England has issued guidance in line with the new Winter Pressures Protocol. The guidance, which is issued to hospitals, extends the deferral of all non-urgent inpatient elective care to free up capacity for the sickest patients to January 31. The panel reiterated that cancer operations and time-critical procedures should go ahead as planned. Over and above this, day-case producers and routine outpatient appointments should also be deferred where this will release clinical time for non-elective care.

Out of hours service for children in South Wiltshire

An out of hours GP service for children aged 0-10 years in Salisbury and South Wiltshire means parents can now book a same day appointment to see a GP at the Salisbury Walk in Health Centre.

This extended service will provide out of hours GP health advice and treatment for minor illnesses and injuries from Monday to Friday between 6.30pm – 10pm, and will provide partners with a local alternative to A&E when their child is ill.



Parents should ring NHS 111 to access the service. If necessary, the call handler will then advise parents to contact the Salisbury Walk in Health Centre to make a same day appointment.

Urgent GP appointments – where would you go?

If you need a same day urgent GP appointment – this could mean that you might not be able to see your usual GP and you may have to travel to a different practice.

Urgent GP appointments are booked on the day and are for patients who have health problems which cannot wait for a routine appointment.

No Limits youth club is a club night at Canberra Youth Centre in Melksham, run by Young Melksham. It has been identified that some young people are attending from Calne transported by Springfield school or independently travelling. 6 young people have been identified at present in a club of up to 25 young people.

Young Melksham are requesting a contribution towards the cost of the club to reflect the young people attending.

Recommendation of the Local Youth Network Management Group

The local youth network recommends that £1000 be granted to Young Melksham to assist the club in supporting young people who attend from Calne for this current year.

The LYN have recently supported a Calne SEND youth club with an extension grant to increase their capacity. It is understood that these places are being allocated from a waiting list and that the young people attending Melksham may be attending because it is a different style of club and friendship groups have formed.

The full amount has not been recommended because they felt the Calne funding should primarily go to supporting Calne based initiatives, instead the LYN would like to explore options over the next year to support and increase the capacity of groups in the Calne area to make them more inclusive and accessible. Devizes area board have also expressed an interest in this as young people from Devizes are also accessing Melksham.



To upgrade the current toilet facilities, which have been in place for more than 30 years and to provide an accessible toilet facility.

Input from Community Engagement Manager:

Goatacre Village Hall is a vibrant local facility offering social and health and wellbeing opportunities to the local community. It hosts approximately 15 local community groups and the committee reports an increase in demand since the closure of Calne's Woodlands Club.

The Committee, made up of volunteers, is working hard to provide a quality facility and is exploring opportunities to attract events such as business meetings, weddings dinner dances etc. to help make it more sustainable as an ongoing venue at the heart of the community.

Members will recall that, the former Village Halls Fund, designed to support development of such community facilities, was brought under the Area Board Community Area Grant scheme several years ago.

This application can be seen to link to JSA and Community priorities to promote diversity and inclusion, active lifestyles and participation in cultural activities. It could also provide opportunities to address the social isolation and loneliness priority.

The amount requested represents approximately 12% of the total project cost and can be seen to be drawing down a significant level of external funding to the Calne Community Area.

Project Description:

To provide two stiles with kissing gates to make them more accessible.

Input from Community Engagement Manager:

This application represents an application for a Pavement Improvement Grant (PIG). PIGS were recently relaunched and, from now on, will be run differently to previous years. Schemes will continue to be developed by Wiltshire Council's Rights of Way and Countryside team in partnership with local communities. However, the funding will come from the Area Boards.

This is the first PIG application that has been submitted to the Calne Area Board. The applicant is the Parish Council and Officers from Wiltshire Council Rights of Way and Countryside team have worked with the applicant to ensure that the proposed scheme is appropriate.

Landowners have given permission for the scheme to take place and will maintain the structure with a contribution of 25% from the Local Authority.

This is a well-used footpath, the initial request for an improvement scheme came from an elderly resident who could no longer climb over the existing stiles.

This application can be seen to link to JSA and Community priorities to promote active lifestyles. It could also provide opportunities to address social isolation and loneliness.

An award to this scheme would represent 100% of the total project costs.

Project Description:

To remove dangerous landscaping features from area of open space provided by developers at Tench Road, Calne and return area to an appropriate condition for ongoing community use by local residents.

Input from Community Engagement Manager:

This project emerged from concerns about experiences of anti-social behaviour and poorly maintained landscaping features reported by local police and residents in the Tench road area of Calne. The local Wiltshire Councillor, Tom Rounds, the Community Engagement Manager, Town Councillors and local residents held a 'Community Conversation' on site in September 2017 – this provided an

opportunity for local residents to get together and discuss and share ideas about how they would like to use the space as a community.

This event led to the formation of an informal residents group which, if the area is returned to a more manageable state, would be interested in holding social community gatherings on the land, joint litter picking activities etc.

Highways Streetscene engineers have advised that facilitation of the work required cannot currently be funded from central budgets but advise that Wiltshire Council contractors undertake the work in order to meet current policy/standards etc.

Cllr. Rounds proposes the Area Board funds this work to hasten the removal of dangerous features, reduce the attractiveness of the area as a harbour of antisocial behaviour and also to enable the local residents group to start planning future community activities in time for the spring.

This proposal represents the total costs of the scheme.

It can be seen to address Community Safety JSA priorities around Anti-social behaviour, alcohol and drug abuse. It can also be seen to provide links to fly tipping, litter and social inclusion.

Project Description:

To replace the existing interpretation board at Cherhill White Horse with a new laminate sign (with new design and content), to be bolted on to an existing frame.

The new sign will include an audio descriptor and a QR code linking to further information about the White Horse and the walking trail which connects the horses across the county. The application includes installation of the new sign.

The project will form part of a larger scheme to improve the information available at each of the White Horses in Wiltshire.

Input from Community Engagement Manager:

The poor state of existing signs has been picked up by members of the public who have complained that information is difficult to read. In addition, the interpretation boards are not accessible to those who are partially sighted or blind and lack a link to more detailed information.

The local community will benefit by having easy access to good information about their White Horse. The information will be accessible to a wider range of people due to the audio descriptor and improved legibility (with larger text and a better-quality sign).

The website featured on the interpretation board will provide a map and description of a walking route between the White Horses. This will encourage people to get outside and explore the trail.

The project is part of a bigger scheme to replace signs at all of the White Horses in Wiltshire. It supports the corporate aim to increase tourism in the county.

It also addresses JSA priorities to encourage active and healthy lifestyles.

The amount requested from the area board represents 12.5% of the bigger scheme.
