HomeRun

Introduction

This briefing note is to provide you with information about a trial we have been undertaking with a smartphone app called HomeRun, our plans for the future, and how the project links with our efforts to encourage more children to travel actively to school, and to reduce car congestion associated with the school run.

What is HomeRun?

There is a concern in many communities about the impacts of the school run which include air-pollution, a reduction in active and/or independent travel, and inconsiderate parking leading to tensions between schools and local residents. HomeRun is a smartphone app which helps parents to car share, and logs real-time information on modes of travel, distance and route travelled. Parents can connect with other parents nearby and car-pool, as well as being able to follow their child's independent journey to school. They can highlight areas of concern, such as busy roads which are difficult to cross, and receive a notification once the child has cleared this area.

What are the benefits?

There will be different benefits for children, parents, schools, and the council. By reducing the number of cars on the school commute, and encouraging active modes of travel (even if for part of the journey, such as the walk to and from the bus-stop or car park), benefits should be seen in the following areas:



The data provided can inform likely interventions, for example by revealing popular areas for parking, the average number of minutes of active travel per child, and areas for improvement such as parents who are choosing to drive from an area where there is a school bus or many others are walking.

Some examples of the findings:

- One primary school located in a market town showed that 40% of cars used in the school commute are for journeys under one mile;
- A school in a village close to a market town showed an average of 3.3 minutes exercise per pupil per commute; there is a lack of pavements within the village, and because of this children on a particular residential estate are entitled to free bus travel. However, many of these parents still choose to drive their children to school, for a variety of reasons (e.g. younger siblings);
- Parents of children attending three schools in a village location south-east of Salisbury have been encouraged to drop their children off at a park-and-ride location and use a shared use off road path to the school. However, our data shows that pupils are still being dropped off outside the school, and that those using the path are cyclists, or those travelling part of the way by bus.

Data generated by the app can be used by the school to inform their travel plan, reducing the need for more time-consuming traditional methods of data collection such as survey forms.

By having real data of actual commutes and routes used by pupils will enable the school and the local authority to look at tailored interventions to try and address activity levels, air quality and congestion.

Next steps

A procurement exemption has been approved to proceed with a three-year open licence under which the app would be free to all state-funded Wiltshire schools, and through which the council would have access to two county-wide reports and ten detailed school reports per year. Both the council and the schools taking up the app would have a data console showing metrics such as minutes of active travel, carbon emissions, and average journey lengths and times.

Other steps we need to undertake are:

- To work with one or more schools, using the data generated so far, to tailor interventions to their situation;
- To encourage further take-up with schools and to “profile” types of schools (e.g. urban secondary with good transport links, rural village school without pavements and with wide catchment) so that proven interventions can be applied to schools with a comparable profile.
- To collaborate with other council departments such as passenger transport, highways and public protection to look at how we can make better use of the app.

Wiltshire councillors are invited to contact the school travel plan advisor should they have particular schools in mind to take part.

Chairman's Announcements

Subject: Banning of Sky Lanterns and Balloon Releases on Wiltshire Council Land.

Large scale balloon and sky lantern releases are familiar sights and are often carried out at events to remember lost loved ones or mark other special events. Wiltshire Council is the latest to pass the ban on the release of balloons and sky lanterns on its land, following a report on the environmental and wildlife impact. The ban includes biodegradable balloons, as balloons cannot degrade quickly enough to not prove a hazard for wildlife.

The council understands that there are different reasons that people may wish to take part in organised balloon / sky lantern release events, however there are other activities that can be undertaken. We hope this move by Wiltshire Council will help to raise awareness of the issue and will encourage other Town and Parish Councils to take a similar approach.


What has been done so far:

What has been done so far:

1. Did you know there is a Royal Wootton Bassett Neighbourhood Watch scheme?

The RWB Neighbourhood Watch scheme is managed by co-ordinators who typically cover the road where they live and possibly adjacent roads. They meet three or four times a year, occasionally with a local Police Officer or Police Community Support Officer to learn from the police. Another purpose of the meetings is to receive information about relevant recent 'activities' within RWB and the surrounds and to report and share concerns that residents have brought to attention. These have included cold callers, scammers, burglaries and unusual or suspicious behaviour by unknown individuals with the information passing to and from the police.

Between meetings co-ordinators will disseminate information to scheme members by e-mail or personal contact and have, on occasion, been able to assist the police. Information is also available through Wiltshire and Swindon Community Messaging.

Stagecoach have upgraded their 55 Chippenham to Swindon buses and have re-introduced the 54 bus to West Swindon.

Purton Age Concern now have their new minibus vehicle, with help from the community grant scheme.

Purton and District Age Concern raised £40,000 through fundraisers and appeals to help pensioners get around town. With two buses in operation the charity is back to full strength, allowing residents to zip along to lunches, trips and doctors' appointments when they need. None of the 950 or so people benefitting from the service will be left behind either – the seven-seater vehicle comes complete with disabled access.

President of the charity Tony Price said: "The village is very kind and we're very lucky that we got it. It means people can get out.

"We've got volunteers who are a great asset to the community to give up their time. They really feel for the people they're carrying and form nice relationships with them."



Emblazoned on the new bus are the names of John Blackwell and Joe Ricketts, who were long-time supporters of the service before they died. John used to be in charge of coordinating the drivers while Joe took care of secretarial duties such as insurance.

Housing

RWB and Cricklade Community Area

What has been done so far:

1. Wiltshire Council is promoting the development of **affordable homes** in the county.

The authority has joined with Wiltshire Community Land Trust (WCLT) and Community First to set up the Wiltshire Community-Led Housing Project. The project's officers provide advice and encouragement to communities aiming to develop affordable homes in their area.

Cllr Richard Clewer, Wiltshire Council's cabinet member for housing, said: "We are seeking out communities who are keen to provide homes for people at affordable prices; to help them start their own CLTs, or explore other ways of providing new affordable homes.

"CLTs are the most common and proven way of delivering local housing schemes that are under the control of the community itself, by buying the freehold or leasehold of a development site.

"Homes provided in this way can be earmarked for local needs and cannot be sold, unless some homes are sold to help create an overall viable scheme.

"The local community does not necessarily have to be the developer and, typically, they will work with a housing association or similar body, such as the council."

There are about 225 CLTs around the country, with numbers rapidly growing in Wiltshire – including projects at Broad Chalke, Wilton, Seend and Cricklade.

Royal Wootton Bassett ,Cricklade, and Purton Community Policing Team Update



Hello and welcome to this Community Policing Team report.

Wiltshire Police have been very busy over the last couple of months, with lots of campaigns including OP SEPTRE (knife Amnesty) County Lines.

I have included an update on OP SEPTRE and there is a new item on rural crime (Poaching) which gives a flowchart on what to do.

I would just like to wish everyone a very Happy Christmas and New Year , please enjoy the festivities and stay safe.

GOOD NEWS STORY

There have been some significant arrests and results in regards to the County lines exploitation of young persons in Wiltshire. There have been weapons, drugs, and cash seized, with major disruption over the county.


Over 70 addresses identified which have vulnerable occupants living in there.

We will continue to disrupt these criminals in our county.

A Swindon male was arrested for 11 burglaries that occurred in Swindon and Royal Wootton Bassett. The local male has been charged and remanded to custody until his court case.

The Rural Crime Team is noticing a rise in activity by poachers / hare coursers around the A4 corridor close to Yatesbury and Avebury. A number of farms have been effected, which has included abandoned vehicles, threats and damage and the RCT will continue to support those effected.

Since August, Operation ARTEMIS has been running which is the forces response to poaching across the county. We are asking members of the public to report any incidents of poaching via 101 or 999



Crimes that have impacted on the community from September to October 2018.

On 17/09/2018 at Royal Wootton Bassett two known suspects stole alcohol and other items, to the value of £1946.00, belonging to SAINSBURYS. The suspects were arrested and charged with theft, they have been put before the courts and received a suspended sentence as well as compensation to be paid and a rehabilitation order.

On 18/09/2018 18:30 an unknown Suspect(s) broke down the wooden picket boundary fence and entered the farm yard. The Suspect(s) removed the CCTV camera. The Suspect(s) jemmied the door locks off and forced the doors open causing damage around the door frames. The Suspect(s) entered the premises and disconnected the internet and unplugged the CCTV. The Suspect(s) smashed open the metal tool boxes and removed grinders, welders, diagnostic equipment, polishers and specialist marine tools TVO £35,000 - £40,000.

No suspects have been identified.

On 21/09/2018 17:30 in Saffron Close RWB, a known suspect has forced access into the property through the back patio doors and has written obscenities on the main wall of the living room in felt tip. Suspect has then carried out an untidy search and stole approximately £1400-£1500 worth of jewellery. A Swindon male was linked to this and other burglaries in RWB and Swindon.

The Swindon male was arrested for 11 burglaries that occurred in Swindon and Royal Wootton Bassett he has been charged and remanded to custody until his court case.

On 27/09/2018 17:00 two known suspects have set fire to grassland area in RWB and caused damage.

Both suspects were arrested and have been released under investigation.

On 28/09/2018 23:15 several known youths were located in Otter way RWB smoking cannabis in the play park, two small bags of cannabis were located close by. The cannabis was seized and sent for destruction. The youths were dealt with on the street.

On the 29/09/2018 20:16 a male and female were arrested on suspicion of possession with intent to supply drugs namely cannabis in RWB. Both have been interviewed and released under investigation pending further enquiries.

On 03/10/2018 unknown suspect has stolen power tools to the value £4000 from a secured business outbuilding in Parsonage farm, by cutting a padlock with a power tool.

Investigation is ongoing to identify any suspects.

On 06/10/2018 13:15 in Bradenstoke an unknown suspect has forced entry via front door and whilst in the property an untidy search was conducted and a purse containing foreign currency has been stolen.

A suspect has been identified and is linked to other caravan burglaries. Enquiries are ongoing.

On 07/10/2018 22:36 two unknown suspects have entered Tesco's store Cricklade and filled bags with air fresheners TVO £70 and possibly other items. Males have been aggressive and have left the store making no attempt to pay. Enquiries are ongoing.

On the 30/10/2018 18:00 Unknown suspect has broken into the injured parties unlocked van which was parked on his drive way. Various items have been stolen from inside including the IP's bank card which has been used at a number of places.

No suspects identified.

On the 03/11/2018 00:00 an unknown suspect(s) have entered a bolted gated compound in RWB and stolen a Sterling Quartz Caravan worth £14,000.

Enquiries are ongoing.

Police action to disrupt drug gang activity in Wiltshire known as county lines has led to a number of arrests.

With full results still to be collated, the week-long period of intensive law enforcement activity has so far delivered:

- Four males arrested in Swindon.
- 64 wraps of crack cocaine recovered
- Three weapons seized
- £1,000 seized
- At least 70 addresses identified which have vulnerable occupants (also known as cuckooing addresses)



Also, the operations found a number of young and vulnerable people at risk of being exploited by drugs gangs. These are now being safeguarded through on-going multi-agency work.

Head of Crime Prevention for Wiltshire Police Sonja Leith said: "County lines is everyone's responsibility and I would urge members of the public to be vigilant and look out for some of the most visible signs that county lines drugs gangs are operating in neighbourhoods and to report this to police.

"Together with our partner agencies across Swindon and Wiltshire, we work hard to identify where county lines are exploiting vulnerable children and adults, to proactively disrupt these networks and to safeguard and protect those at risk of harm. The intelligence we receive from our communities is crucial in helping us, our partner agencies and neighbouring forces tackle county lines.

"By raising awareness of the issue, I hope more people will be able to spot the signs and feel comfortable in reporting information to the police. Your call could save lives."

*****OP SEPTRE UPDATE*****

As part of **Op Sceptre** - the national knife crime prevention initiative was launched, bringing together police forces co-ordinating ways to tackle knife crime, appealing for people to hand in unwanted or illegal knives and bladed weapons during the period of the amnesty: Monday 17 - Sunday 30 September. Our two week campaign featured case studies from people whose lives have been affected by knife crime - from the victim of knife crime to the police officer who had to deal with a serious stabbing. Knives are used as an everyday tool in the home and in industry, but when placed in the wrong hands or adapted for the wrong purpose can have devastating consequences.

Special amnesty bins were available at six locations across the county: Swindon's Gablecross Police Station, Marlborough Police Station, Melksham Police Station, Chippenham's Monkton Park, Trowbridge Police Station and the Temporary Police Station at the rear of Five Rivers Leisure Centre in Salisbury. The knife amnesty gave people the chance to dispose of knives and weapons by simply taking them to one of the specified police stations and dropping them in to an amnesty bin. During the period of the amnesty those handing in knives and weapons will not face prosecution for possession of a knife or weapon and can remain anonymous.

Of the 43 forces across England & Wales, Wiltshire had the 29th highest number of serious knife crimes reported. However, for possession offences Wiltshire ranked 34th of 43 - only Gloucestershire was ranked lower within the South West.*

Between August 2017 and July 2018, there was a total of 800 offences in Wiltshire, where a knife or blade was used, a reduction of 3% on the previous year. **

However, any incidents of knife crime are a major concern but the public should be reassured that we will continue to vigorously investigate offences linked to any knives or weapons recovered.

Assistant Chief Constable Gavin Williams said: "We want to raise the awareness of the dangers of carrying a knife or owning an illegal weapon. As a county Wiltshire cannot be compared to what is happening in cities like London or Manchester but we cannot be complacent; we must take action to educate the public and do what we can to remove knives from our streets.

"Most people in Wiltshire or even in the country don't carry a knife; it should not be considered the 'norm'. A very small minority choose to leave the house with a knife or blade, but the reality is they themselves are more likely to get injured.

"I would also like to appeal to parents across the county to talk to their children. We know that some young people carry knives for what they consider to be protection, but it is placing them and those around them in danger.

Angus Macpherson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, said: "Knife crime wrecks lives - not only the life of the victim but their families and friends. There are many people directly and indirectly linked to just one incident - not just the victim and perpetrator.

"The amnesty is great way to encourage people to do the right thing and hand in any illegal weapons.

"Parents and schools can do their bit by checking what their children are carrying in their bags; it's a good way to educate youngsters too that being caught with a knife could mean they end up in serious trouble as well as risking being injured themselves.

"Long term - good education and prevention means the wider community becomes a safer one."



We're launching a new campaign that aims to increase the amount of intelligence we receive on modern day slavery.

The campaign, called #TellUsWhatYouSee, aims to educate the public on the signs and indicators of various forms of Modern Day Slavery, and how to report this information, in order to help us tackle this crime.

Forces in the South West have seen a 5% increase in intelligence reporting between 2016 and 2017, receiving a total of 3272 pieces of intelligence. Forces anticipate this figure will rise next year, having already surpassed the 2017 figure with two months left till the end of the year.

While the increase is positive and in part down to increased media attention on modern slavery in nail bars and car washes, there are still many forms of lesser-known modern slavery going on, in neighbourhoods and local communities across our force area.

Labour exploitation, which is linked with industries such as car washes, nail bars and building sites, is the most common form of intelligence we've received information on, followed closely by sexual exploitation, which covers brothels and sex workers. Reports of criminal exploitation and domestic servitude are minimal and are lesser known to the public as modern slavery.

We know domestic servitude is happening across the UK but there is very little information on it due to how invisible this form of modern slavery can be. Only one force has received a report of domestic servitude out of the hundreds of reports we've received year on this form of modern slavery. We are keen to hear from anyone who suspects domestic servitude is happening. Some of the signs to look out for include an individual who is not only responsible for children 24 hours a day, but also for the cleaning or day-to-day housework and is never allowed to leave home alone.

Assistant Chief Constable Craig Holden, Chief Officer Lead for Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking at Wiltshire Police, said: "I welcome the fact that intelligence submissions we receive from the public are already up on the previous year. This goes to show that the local communities of Wiltshire and Swindon are taking this issue seriously and are supporting us in our fight against this horrific crime.

"However, we need the public to continue being our eyes, telling us what they're seeing and sending that information in, either direct to police on 101 or through the Modern Slavery Helpline on 08000 121 700."

Angus Macpherson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Swindon and Wiltshire, said: "Protecting the most vulnerable in society is one of the four priorities of my Police and Crime Plan.

"Modern slavery is a serious, complex and challenging issue for police forces and partners across the country. It is not just a 'big city issue'. Wiltshire is a safe place to live but that doesn't mean it is immune.

"The Chief Constable and his team will continue to 'lift the stone' on this toxic crime in our communities. I want to see offenders brought to justice wherever possible through close cooperation with our partners."

There were 93 active on-going investigations linked to potential modern slavery within the South West force area as of 15 October and these investigations rely heavily on information received from the public, also known as intelligence.

Put simply, intelligence is information, which can arrive in a number of ways to us and plays a crucial role in the disruption and prosecution of Modern Day Slavery. One piece of intelligence could be the missing piece an investigator needs to carry out a safeguarding visit or issue a warrant for an arrest. That's why it's vital that the public tells us what they see and report any activity they suspect could be linked to modern day slavery.

Since 2016 forces in the South West have made 541 referrals through the National Referral Mechanism, which is a framework for identifying victims of human trafficking or modern slavery and ensuring they receive the appropriate support.

Community Engagement

Remembrance Day Parades



Marking the Fire Service's history and close affiliation to the Royal Navy, both Royal Wootton Bassett and Cricklade stations attended acts of Remembrance to those who gave their lives in conflicts and this was especially poignant as it marked the ending of the WW1 hostilities 100 years ago. Over 900 Firefighters lost their lives during WW2 whilst fighting fires and rescuing those injured or killed during the bombing of our major cities.

Crews at Cricklade and RWB Fire stations carried out a number of events recently including:

Royal Wootton Bassett Academy supporting their careers and safety event
Charity car wash in aid of The Wiltshire Air Ambulance and the Firefighters Charity

BBC's Children in Need Rikshaw Challenge also paid a pit stop visit to Royal Wootton Bassett recently. The station turned out in force to support his great cause and provided the team with much needed hot drinks



Safety Messages

- In the last six years, over 250 recall notices have been issued for electrical products, mostly due to a risk of electric shock or fire. Use Electrical Safety First's online product checker to make sure the appliances in your home are safe: www.electricalsafetyfirst.org.uk/recall
- Make sure you register your electrical appliances so that you are the first to know of any safety repairs or recalls. You can do this through the manufacturers' websites, or through the register my appliance website: www.registermyappliance.org.uk
- Don't overload plug sockets. An extension lead or adaptor will have a limit to how many amps it can take so, to help reduce the risk of fire, be careful not to overload them. Try to keep to one plug per socket
- Many imported chargers do not satisfy UK safety regulations and can cause serious electric shock, injury or fire. Don't be tempted to buy the cheap ones. Never use water on an electrical fire and don't take any risks with your safety. Pull the plug out or switch the power off if it is safe to do so. Get out, stay out and call 999.
- Switch off appliances at the socket when not in use. This helps to reduce the risk of fire. Switch off appliances when you go to bed or when you go out unless they are designed to be left on, like freezers.



The Fire Service continue to offer Safe & Well visits to residents and if you or someone you know is in need a working smoke alarm to be fitted or needs some fire safety advice in the home or are just worried about what to do in an emergency then you can contact us at; <http://www.dwfire.org.uk/safety/safe-and-well-visits/>

We will arrange for one of our trained advisors or fire crews to pop round and discuss your requirements and needs, give you some top tips for fire safety within the home and if you meet our criteria for free smoke alarm installation we will also do that during the visit.

Chimney Fires

Chimney fires can develop into roof fires in the right conditions with devastating effects. This is especially true with thatched roof properties.

To reduce your risk of a chimney fire we recommend:

- Ensuring any works carried out are by a registered professional

- Sweep your chimney at least twice a year – in autumn and early spring
- Keep your chimney in good working order, for example by fitting a bird guard to prevent birds nesting in the flue.

Chimneys should be swept:

- At least once a year when using smokeless fuels or bituminous coal
- Every three months when burning wood
- Once a year when using oil or gas.

When your fire is alight, check the loft space occasionally to make sure no smoke is leaking into the roof space from cracked joints or defective brickwork.

As the Availability tables show, crewing of appliances during the day falls below our ideal expectation of 100%. We continue to strive and improve on the number of personnel at each station through our recruitment process so as we can increase the number of hours our

appliances are available for emergency calls. The local appliances are only available to attend calls due to the commitment given by those who live and work within your community, without those in the community coming forward your appliance will not be available. If you are able to give some of your time or know someone who may be interested in joining our 'On-call' teams then why not pop into one of the stations on a. Crews are not volunteers but are paid a salary to train and respond to emergency calls. Recent Notable Incidents

There has been a number of incidents attended since the last Area Board report including a commercial fire in Swindon and thatched property fire near to Marlborough. These calls (on top of the normal incidents attended) have kept the stations busy during this recent period.

Cricklade attended a fire in Minety where over 60 tonnes of straw and manure were alight. A local farmer came to the assistance of the crews and removed unburnt material away from the main body of fire. Crews were grateful for the farmers assistance as this greatly reduced the amount of time the Fire Service were required to spend at the incident.



Improved access to GPs

From 1 October 2018 people registered with a Wiltshire practice are able to book routine appointments to see a GP, practice nurse or other health professional in the evenings from 6.30pm to 8pm, and at weekends and Bank Holidays.

Across the population of Wiltshire there is an additional 235 hours per week of clinical time in this move to improve access to health services.

You won't always be able to see your registered GP and may need to go to a different practice in your area to take up the after-hours and weekend appointments.



GP appointments are now available in your area during the evenings and at the weekend.

GP Alliance

The Wiltshire GP Alliance (WGPA) is a not-for-profit group made up of almost all the GPs across Wiltshire. It aims to help practices work better together to improve GP resilience, and stimulate and share improvements – for instance with availability of GP appointments – across the county.

WGPA are managing the improved access provision in Wiltshire which means surgeries are now working together to provide extra appointments in the evening and at weekends.

The alliance is still in its early days but they aim to provide more services ‘at scale’ by supporting genuine cooperation between practices, and help stabilise the workforce, and facilitate transformation to solve problems in health and care.

STAY WELL THIS WINTER

The first phase of national advertising and promotion is focusing on increasing the number of people who call 111 when they have an urgent but not life-threatening medical need. The aim is reduce the number of people going to A&E departments or calling 999. The NHS 111 campaign runs from 1 October to 25 November 2018.

The next phase is Stay Well This Winter which in October is encouraging people to get a flu vaccination, and then in November includes messaging around early and effective treatment for respiratory ailments. The November campaign will focus on older people and people with long-term health conditions.

Other campaign elements in coming months will focus on extended GP access, NHS 111 online and pharmacy.

Keep Antibiotics Working

Public Health England's 'Keep Antibiotics Working' campaign returned on Tuesday 23rd October to alert the public to the risks of antibiotic resistance with the aim of reducing patient's expectation for antibiotics.

Whilst antibiotics are vital for treating many infections, there is evidence that antibiotics are often used when they are not needed, for example, for viral infections such as colds or flu where they are not effective or for illnesses that can get better by themselves. Research has shown that this is, at least in part, due to patients expecting antibiotics, without understanding that they may not be effective for their illness.



Area Board Update November 2018

Key findings from Campervan and Comments Tour 2017


Last summer's Campervan and Comments Tour saw Healthwatch Wiltshire staff and volunteers travel 400 miles around Wiltshire to gather the views and experiences of people of all ages on health and care services.

Taking to the roads in a classic 1969 VW campervan, we parked up at a variety of locations around the county, collecting 2,077 comments during the two-week tour.

Overall, we received more positive comments than negative ones.

A full report with recommendations will be available soon.

This project was conducted under Healthwatch Wiltshire's previous provider, Evolving Communities.



What people told us...

Most people were happy with the treatment they received from their GP but were unhappy about long waiting times to get appointments.

Hospital maternity, children's and cancer services were highlighted as good, but long waits to see consultants drew negative comments.

Communication between hospitals and other services came in for criticism, and experiences of using social care services appeared to be inconsistent.

Delays in accessing mental health services were the main concern for most people, but many also said staff were helpful and treated them well.

Most people told us they were happy with their dentist and the quality of treatment they received, whether NHS or private.

Update from	Royal Wootton Bassett Town Council
Date of Area Board Meeting	21 November 2018

Headlines/Key Issues

- Poppy - A public meeting to discuss the future of the Stone Poppy was attended by 80 people. Following their feedback, which supported the idea of re-instating the original poppy with a supportive metal frame, the council decided to extend the consultation by including an item in the Community Magazine which would be delivered to every household in the town. The consultation will look to build on the ideas put forward by the public meeting and try to determine the best approach to financing the activity.

- Youth Provision – Currently a youth group is run for two and half hours a week at the United Reform Church. Funding is secure until March 2019. Because of the budgetary constraints it was not possible for the Area Board to ensure continued funding beyond March 2019. The Town Council has ring fenced funding in the draft budget for 2019-20 and 2020-21 to ensure this service continues.

- The new Town Council web site is in operation. Those using it should find it more user friendly and interesting than the previous version. It is not quite complete as the updated council meeting calendar is not quite ready for inclusion on the web site but will be ready soon.

- The work at Jubilee Lake to rectify erosion has been completed. One of the last items to be finished was a new bridge on the path from Sorrel Close to the lake.

- One major development on the edge of the town, an Aldi supermarket on the former T H White site at Coped Hall has been approved by Wiltshire Council.

- The public enquiry in the proposed development at Marsh Farm is to recommence on 3 December. This major and controversial development is for 320 dwellings, a supermarket and a care home is proposed for a green field site



The last couple of months have brought further progress to the work of the Royal Wootton Bassett Local Youth Network (RWB LYN):

Funding

Funding has now been secured for the RWB LYN through the Area board. This has been provided to support preliminary work, help create a sustainable forum and formulate a plan that supports the needs of young people in Royal Wootton Bassett. Further funds were received from participation in the Rotary Youth Challenge by a team of local young people. All funds are kindly being held by Royal Wootton Bassett Town Council.

Youth Provision

Following the RWB LYN championing the cause, the Royal Wootton Bassett town Council Amenities Committee has agreed to ring fence funding for 2 years of Youth Provision at the current level (one 2.5-hour session per week, for 48 weeks) to ensure the continuation past March 2019. This then paves the way for the Area Board to support funding given that local procurement and finance will be in place, in addition to a local forum.

Needs Assessment

Work continues in this space via online, event and in school surveying from which it is hoped that our Needs Assessment will be available in February 2019.

Activities

Organisations in Royal Wootton Bassett have been provided with the template for our Christmas Tree Decorations and Christmas Craft Event. Our groups have been offered free pantomime tickets for January and we will be marking our first year in 2019.

Volunteers

We were pleased to welcome onboard 5 new volunteers this Autumn, to support our work.

Pledges

Our Positive About Young People pledges have been signed by 62 people including the Head of RWB Academy, the Deputy Police & Crime Commissioner and our Mayor. We hope that this will encourage people to think and behave differently towards our young people.
