Agenda Item No.	Summary of Issues Discussed and Decision
20	Welcome The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting and invited the Councillors present to introduce themselves.
21	Apologies for Absence Apologies for absence were received from: Cllr Anna Cuthbert – Wiltshire Council Cllr Judy Rose – Devizes Town Council Cllr Nigel Carter – Devizes Town Council Station Commander Andy Green of Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service Sarah Lowkis, Head teacher, Lavington School Phil Bevan, Head teacher, Devizes School
22	Minutes Resolved: To approve and sign as a correct record the minutes of the meeting held on 16 July 2018 with the correction below: Minute Number 14: Open Floor Cllr Albert Wooldridge, Devizes Town Council, advised the meeting that Wiltshire Council had voted at a recent meeting to ban Chinese lanterns on their land.
23	Declarations of Interest Cllr Simon Jacobs, Cllr Peter Evans and Cllr Richard Gamble declared a pecuniary interest in Agenda Item 15, Community Grant Applications, due to connections with the Devizes Development Partnership who were applying for a grant. Therefore they declared that they would not vote on this grant item.
24	Chairman's Announcements The Chairman asked Cllr Philip Whitehead to give an update on the road works in London Road.

It was stated that the planned works had overrun due to an unmarked gas main being found, which had to be relocated. It had also transpired that the ground in the location was very soft and therefore digging work undertaken had to go much deeper than anticipated. These issues would lead to an overrun of approximately four weeks, meaning the works should end the last week of September. In the first week of October the road would then be resurfaced. In order to complete this there would be some overnight road closures. Once complete the increased congestion should decrease and the completed work would help alleviate congestion leaving Devizes in the morning which in turn would help to decrease air pollution. Cllr Whitehead stated he appreciated that the situation was horrendous and was causing disruption, for which he apologised.

Questions and comments were received from the audience, these included; extreme discontent at the disruption and delays caused; queries as to why the soft ground was not discovered previously and whether the correct surveys had been undertaken; asking whether the gas board could be sued for having a gas main that was not marked on any map; questioning who was responsible and whether someone from the Council would step up to take responsibility; queries as to the timings of the lights once installed and whether this would increase air pollution in Windsor Drive; asking who was picking up the bill for the delays; queries as to why the temporary traffic lights were not being managed better, for example not being used during rush hour; and questions as to whether there would be a detrimental effect to the businesses on the industrial estate once the new traffic lights were in use.

In response Cllr Whitehead stated the following; all the usual surveys had been undertaken, however until you started digging you could not be sure what the ground would be like; he would investigate whether the gas board could be sued regarding the unmarked gas main; the timing of the new traffic lights would give priority to London Road, however traffic should still leave Windsor Drive more quickly, so air pollution would be reduced. Wiltshire Council would have to pay for the costs incurred by the overrun; the contractors were doing everything they could to finish the work as quickly as possible and to minimise disruption.

The Chairman took a question from the floor regarding whether Cllr Anna Cuthbert, the member for Bromham, Rowde and Potterne, had moved away, and therefore was she still able to help her constituents? Cllr Laura Mayes stated the Cllr Cuthbert had not moved away but was currently on sick leave. Interim arrangements had been put in place, so Cllr Laura Mayes would cover Rowde, Cllr Richard Gamble would cover Potterne and Cllr Jonathon Seed would cover Bromham.

The Chairman then made the following announcements:

 Local Government Boundary Commission for England – Consultation

The Chairman advised the meeting that there was a written update in the

agenda pack with full details of the LGBCE Consultation and then summarised the main points. The LGBCE for England had decided on a future council size for Wiltshire Council of 98 with an average elector to councillor ratio of 4291 per councillor. Many of the Devizes area wards were smaller than this and therefore there was likely to be changes to division boundaries in the Devizes area. A consultation on the pattern of electoral divisions would run from 28 August 2018 to 5 November 2018. The meetings was encouraged to respond online to the consultation and email submissions to Wiltshire Council

Annual Electoral Canvass

The Chairman encouraged the audience to respond to the Household Enquiry Forms, preferably online.

25 Partner Updates

Written updates were available in the agenda pack from Wiltshire Police, Fire and Rescue Services, Healthwatch Wiltshire and the Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group.

In addition to the written updates, the following verbal updates were given by partners present.

Wiltshire Police

Inspector Chris Martin gave a brief update. He covers the Devizes, Marlborough, and Pewsey areas. His new deputy Peter Foster had started and may attend future Area Board meetings in his stead. Beauty spot thefts had decreased, however burglaries were on the increase and therefore were being prioritised. There was crime prevention advice in the written update.

Police and Crime Commissioner

PCC Angus Macpherson introduced himself to the meeting and gave a brief update. There had been a vast number of officers in the South of the county recently due to the Salisbury major incident. All forces in England and Wales had helped to support Wiltshire police. The six months since the first incident had been a financially difficult time and the meeting was encouraged to visit Salisbury to help support the recovery. The incidents had cost Wiltshire about £10 million, to date we had received approximately £7 million from central government towards these costs. He was in contact with the home office to try to ensure that the incident does not cost Wiltshire anything and to secure further funds.

Devizes Town Council

Simon Fisher clerk of Devizes Town Council stated that Devizes had joined the Great West Way partnership. A new touring route was being created – approximately 125 miles in length. This would join up many of England's iconic destinations and attractions along a corridor west of London through to Bristol. The project focuses on creating a world class

	tourism experience, winning new business and market share and growing the visitor economy. Cllr Richard Gamble voiced his support for this project which is being managed by Visit Wiltshire.
26	Community Area Transport Group (CATG)
	Cllr Whitehead directed the meeting to the minutes of the last CATG meeting, held on 19 July 2018, which were published in the agenda pack. There were no questions from the floor.
27	Air Quality
	Cllr Peter Evans gave an update on Air Quality. There was a meeting of the Devizes Air Quality and Transport Strategy Group on 30 th August 2018. The next phase of the Devizes towpath refurbishment between London Road and Coate was underway. The latest air quality reading from Shanes Castle was 39, this was an improvement and the first time it had been under 40 for some time. The air quality at Shanes Castle would be monitored. If the reading stayed under 40 it may mean that no works would need to be undertaken there.
	In response to questions Cllr Evans stated that the results of the London Road roadworks air pollution report should go to the next air quality meeting in November. Results of reports could be seen online at www.wiltshireairquality.org.uk .
28	Devizes Health and Wellbeing Group
	The Chairman introduced Mr Cliff Evans, the new Chair of the Devizes Health and Wellbeing group. Mr Evans gave an update on the Devizes Health and Wellbeing Group. It had been decided to expand the remit of the Health and Wellbeing Group to include everyone rather than just the over 55's. The name of the group had recently been changed from the Devizes Community Area Wellbeing Group to the Devizes Health and Wellbeing Group, as it was felt that you cannot really separate health from wellbeing. The Wellbeing Day held on 23 June 2018 highlighted that there are a large number of groups in the Devizes area offering health and wellbeing services. However communication between these providers was an issue. Therefore a meeting between providers and interested parties was being arranged, called "The Big Conversation". Everyone was welcome to attend this meeting where it was hoped to identify what services are available, where they are and what Devizes requires. Networking and discussion between the groups was a further aim of the meeting. The meeting had provisionally been arranged for 5 November, 10.00am – 12.30pm at the Town Hall. However this was subject to change and the meeting was advised to check the Devizes Community Matters website at https://ocm.wiltshire.gov.uk/devizes/ for updates.

29 <u>Local Youth Network</u>

The meeting received an update from Damien Haasjes, Head of Business Development and Community Engagement of the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust.

The Wiltshire Wildlife Trust had received a Youth Grant from the Area Board to fund a 'Wild Week' Summer Holiday Forest School Club. The five day Forest School was targeted at secondary school age young people with a range of special needs such as autism, ADHD and low self-confidence. The activities took place at Roundway Orchard and Drews Pond Wood and included; 'Wild Art' identifying wildlife, bush craft and survival skills, conservation work, team building and social skills. Five young people got involved with the project, so attendance was lower than hoped, however those five young people all responded very positively to the project.

The Chairman thanked Damien for his work and presentation.

The Chairman also mentioned National Citizen Service. A four week scheme during the summer holidays where young people (aged 15-17) could volunteer and experience challenges, building useful skills for work and life. The scheme cost £50 to take part and offered a lot of opportunities so was good value for money. Devizes schools were well represented on this scheme and good feedback was received from participants.

30 <u>Barnardo's LGBTQ Report</u>

The Board received a presentation from Liz James, Barnado's Children's Services Manager for Wiltshire and consultant Christine Tanner on a report commissioned by the Local Youth Facilitator on support for LGBTQ young people living in the Devizes Area. The report had been published and was available in the agenda pack.

The core information contained within the report was regarding the consultation that was undertaken and the recommendations based on this consultation. Unfortunately responses to the initial consultation, which involved setting up a group for LGBTQ young people where they could attend consultation events, was very poor. The target group were in a difficult position, unsure who to talk to and who to trust and therefore were quite elusive. Therefore the Survey Monkey website was used to distribute a survey. Whilst the response to this was better, the number of responses received was still low. The consultant attended a young person's LGBTQ group in Bath who were very vocal about their experiences. Devizes School had already launched a group for young people, which was supported by a member of staff who was part of the community. This group was supported at senior management level and the school had adopted a 'whole school' approach, with a proactive attitude to raising awareness and tackling bullying, which was to be applauded. Feedback from the young people

stated that they felt empowered by these groups. Due to social stigma they felt the need to meet to meet with similar people where they could connect and be accepted.

Sadly it was found that teachers sometimes struggled with this issue, and were following old guidance which made it unclear what they could actually discuss. A government green paper was to be published soon with much better advice.

Some of the youth provision was no longer available and it was a big challenge to reach this group at a critical stage in their development. Once again the Devizes School was praised on the model they were running.

The report recommended that all schools should have a single point of contact for a group, who would be a source of support in schools. It also recommended that the whole school approach should be adopted. This may require support and training for teachers.

The Chairman thanked Christine and Liz for the presentation.

31 Wiltshire Council Shared Lives Service

The Board received a presentation from Ronni Lever, Shared Lives Team Manager, on the Wiltshire Council Shared Lives Service.

The Wiltshire Council Shared Lives Service had been running for 45 years and recruits carers to care for people who fall under the adult care umbrella, for example people with learning disabilities, health problems, head injuries and autism. The carer would provide care and lodgings within their own home. A key part of this was provide companionship, connectedness and inclusivity.

A major aim of the service was to increase people's awareness of the scheme and to recruit new carers. There was a thorough recruitment process involved in recruiting new carers, as this was not just a lodging scheme, the carer must have the appropriate skills and knowledge in order to provide care for the service user. There was a foundation training programme and the whole recruitment process could take several months. Once recruited the carer was matched carefully with a prospective client. The needs of clients can vary greatly and the length of stay could be short term or long term.

The Shared Lives scheme offers an alternative to the usual models of adult care provision, such as group homes. The service is regulated by the CQC who have stated that nationally the shared lives services consistently outperform all other types of care.

In response to questions from the Chair it was stated that the fee the carer receives varies depending on the needs of the person being looked after. More placements under the scheme could make the Council great savings as the cost

of the shared lives scheme could be hundreds of pounds per week cheaper than residential care. It was also more beneficial to the client.

32 <u>Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group</u>

The Board received an update on the Devizes Health Centre from the Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group, from Dr Richard Sandford-Hill, Chair; and Sarah MacLennan, Associate Director, Communications and Engagement.

It was stated that the last time the CCG updated the Board they were bidding for money through NHS allocation. They were delighted to report that the bid had been successful and that the Devizes Health Centre would be built. The CCG was currently involved with bureaucratic processes that were taking a long time. In the hope of speeding up the process they went to their MP and the Chief Executive of the CCG met with the Health Minister. The Health Minister lent his support to the project and was keen for them to become an exemplar and set standards for other health centre projects. The CCG were now progressing to the financial case and design brief for the project.

The CCG apologised for the delays, noting that it had taken 4-5 years to get to this point. Unfortunately there were processes that had to be followed. However they wished to reassure the meeting that the centre would be built, particularly now that the Health Minister had lent his support to the project. The estimated completion date would be late 2020 to mid-2021.

The Chairman thanked the CCG for their presentation.

33 Open Floor

In response to a question from the floor from one of her constituents regarding the London Road roadworks, Cllr Laura Mayes stated that she had regularly been to the site and had the foreman's mobile phone number. It was appreciated that the roadworks were causing chaos and Cllr Mayes had been working with the Highways team behind the scenes to try to minimise this. They were unable to only undertake the works overnight due to the costs that this would incur. Likewise, peak times could not be avoided as this would mean the project would take much longer to complete and would also increase costs. However, the foreman had agreed to be more flexible and would try to alleviate some of the problems by only using the temporary lights when necessary. Unfortunately there were limits to what could be done, for which Cllr Mayes apologised.

The Federation of Small Businesses fed back to the meeting that a survey of all

150 of their members in Devizes showed that around 50% had felt an impact due to the roadworks.

Further responses from the floor stated that they felt Wiltshire Councils communication on the matter had been lacking and that people needed more information. Cllr Mayes agreed with this sentiment and stated that originally updates had been posted on Facebook, but due to abuse received in relation to these posts, people were now being advised to go to the Council website for updates.

A question from the audience was received that related to the pavements in Escourt Street, which were reported to be filthy, greasy and littered. The Devizes Town Council clerk stated that they were aware of the situation and were trying to deal with it.

Another audience member raised the point that school children were littering on the green, however there was no bin in the locality. It was suggested that they speak to Devizes Town Council to see if one of the bins could be moved. Devizes Town Council stated that the bins had been located where they were due to the location of takeaways, however they would be interested to learn where people thought bins would be better located.

34 Area Board Funding

The Board considered the following application to the Community Area Grants Scheme:

 Devizes Development Partnership, £5,000 towards their Enhancement of Devizes CCTV project.

A representative of the DDP spoke in support of the application noting that some of their equipment needed updating as the picture quality was not very good. There were areas where better coverage was required and they would be installing a 360 degree panoramic camera in one location.

It was;

Resolved:

To grant the Devizes Development Partnership, £5,000 towards their Enhancement of Devizes CCTV project.

Graeme Morrison, Community engagement Manager advised the Board that there may be several late applications for grants. Due to the timescales involved he could use delegated powers to approve the grants and the Board could ratify them at the next Area Board meeting.

Chairman's Announcements

Subject: Banning of Sky Lanterns and Balloon Releases on Wiltshire Council Land.

Large scale balloon and sky lantern releases are familiar sights and are often carried out at events to remember lost loved ones or mark other special events. Wiltshire Council is the latest to pass the ban on the release of balloons and sky lanterns on its land, following a report on the environmental and wildlife impact. The ban includes biodegradable balloons, as balloons cannot degrade quickly enough to not prove a hazard for wildlife.

The council understands that there are different reasons that people may wish to take part in organised balloon / sky lantern release events, however there are other activities that can be undertaken. We hope this move by Wiltshire Council will help to raise awareness of the issue and will encourage other Town and Parish Councils to take a similar approach.

Below is a brief summary of the implications of the new regulations:

The Animal Welfare (Licensing of Activities Involving Animals)(England) Regulations 2018 define the animal based activities that require licences as follows:

- Selling animals as pets (or with a view to their being later resold as pets) in the course of a business including keeping animals in the course of a business with a view to their being so sold or resold.
- Providing or arranging for the provision of accommodation for other people's cats or dogs in the course of a business on any premises where the provision of that accommodation is a purpose of the business. (This includes home boarding)
- Hiring out horses in the course of a business for either riding, instruction in riding, or both.
- Breeding three or more litters of puppies in any 12-month period; or breeding dogs and advertising a business of selling dogs.
- Keeping or training animals for exhibition in the course of a business for educational or entertainment purposes, either to any audience attending in person, or by the recording of visual images of them by any form of technology, or both.

All four existing types of licence, together with the additional activity of keeping and training animals for exhibition, will be encompassed by one new 'Animal Activity licence'. If an applicant is running more than one licensable animal related activity, each activity will be assessed separately and set out in one licence. The length of licence (previously one year in most cases) may be anything between one and three years dependent on the outcome of their inspection, and the type of licence

Local Authorities current arrangements include locally set conditions. The new provisions contain nationally set regulations for each animal based activity, which cannot be changed in any way and form the basis for conditions on the new licences going forward.

The fees are now to be split into two parts – the application fee, payable at the time of submission to cover the Council's costs in considering and determining the application, and the licence fee, which covers ongoing enforcement and compliance requirements. Ahead of the implementation date, revised fees will be set to accommodate the changes.

Wiltshire currently has 269 licensed animal licensed premises and most licences under the existing legislation with the majority of licences expiring on 31st December 2018.

The Licensing Team are planning to hold information seminars for new applicants and existing licence holders early in October 2018.

Hello and welcome to this Community Policing Team report,

Targeted Patrols Devizes and surrounding areas:

Burglaries

Unfortunately East CPT has seen a rise in burglaries over the past 8 weeks, due to this we have now ensured this is a priority for East CPT.

Alongside our increased patrols we are offering the following security advice to residents;

To improve the security in and around your home we are asking residents to remember the following advice:

- Lock your doors and windows every time you leave the house, even if you're in the garden, and make sure you have approved locks or bolts on all doors and windows
- Never leave a spare key in a hiding place like in a plant pot or letterbox a thief knows all the hiding places
- · Keep all keys, purses and wallets out of sight and away from the letterbox
- Consider installing a burglar alarm, and only use a company that is registered or certified with the NSI or the SSIAB
- Do not open the door to anyone you don't know or are not expecting. Always check by using a spy-hole or look through a window
- Make sure that you have up to date contents insurance
- Register all serial numbers from electrical items, tools and garden equipment with Immobilise.com (the free national property register). Mark items without serial numbers with an artificial DNA property marker such as Smartwater or SelectaDNA
- Do not keep large amounts of cash at home it is much safer in a bank or building society

- Trim back any plants and hedges at the front of your property to no higher than 1 metre to remove hiding places
- Always report any suspicious activity, note any vehicle registrations, descriptions of persons involved and direction of travel
- Use a timer to set lights to mimic your usual activity when you are not at home
- Take photographs of all jewellery including hallmarks and keep them safe. Also consider using an artificial DNA property marker on jewellery or other valuable items
- Make sure any bolts are low enough so they cannot be opened by reaching over the top of the gate.

Those responsible for this blight on our countryside are suspected of having links to organised crime. It is vital we bring them to justice.

This month we have accumulated one new offender – we see this as a positive move as the SWITCH team can manage this person.

Improved access to GPs

From 1 October 2018 people registered with a Wiltshire practice are able to book routine appointments to see a GP, practice nurse or other health professional in the evenings from 6.30pm to 8pm, and at weekends and Bank Holidays.

Across the population of Wiltshire there is an additional 235 hours per week of clinical time in this move to improve access to health services.

You won't always be able to see your registered GP and may need to go to a different practice in your area to take up the after-hours and weekend appointments.



GP Alliance

The Wiltshire GP Alliance (WGPA) is a not-for-profit group made up of almost all the GPs across Wiltshire. It aims to help practices work better together to improve GP resilience, and stimulate and share improvements – for instance with availability of GP appointments – across the county.

WGPA are managing the improved access provision in Wiltshire which means surgeries are now working together to provide extra appointments in the evening and at weekends.

The alliance is still in its early days but they aim to provide more services 'at scale' by supporting genuine cooperation between practices, and help stabilise the workforce, and facilitate transformation to solve problems in health and care.

This winter, NHS England and Public Health England are introducing a new overarching brand that brings together all the winter pressures campaign activity - Help Us, Help You. In recent years there has been an increasing emphasis on people taking responsibility for staying healthy and managing their own health and Help Us, Help You is a powerful new way to build on this.



STAY WELL THIS WINTER

The first phase of national advertising and promotion is focusing on increasing the number of people who call 111 when they have an urgent but not life-threatening medical need. The aim is reduce the number of people going to A&E departments or calling 999. The NHS 111 campaign runs from 1 October to 25 November 2018.

The next phase is Stay Well This Winter which in October is encouraging people to get a flu vaccination, and then in November includes messaging around early and effective treatment for respiratory ailments. The November campaign will focus on older people and people with long-term health conditions.

Other campaign elements in coming months will focus on extended GP access, NHS 111 online and pharmacy.

Keep Antibiotics Working

Public Health England's 'Keep Antibiotics Working' campaign returned on Tuesday 23rd October to alert the public to the risks of antibiotic resistance with the aim of reducing patient's expectation for antibiotics.

Whilst antibiotics are vital for treating many infections, there is evidence that antibiotics are often used when they are not needed, for example, for viral infections such as colds or flu where they are not effective or for illnesses that can get better by themselves. Research has shown that this is, at least in part, due to patients expecting antibiotics, without understanding that they may not be effective for their illness.

Key findings from Campervan and Comments Tour 2017

Last summer's Campervan and Comments Tour saw Healthwatch Wiltshire staff and volunteers travel 400 miles around Wiltshire to gather the views and experiences of people of all ages on health and care services.

Taking to the roads in a classic 1969 VW campervan, we parked up at a variety of locations around the county, collecting 2,077 comments during the two-week tour.

Overall, we received more positive comments than negative ones.

A full report with recommendations will be available soon.

This project was conducted under Healthwatch Wiltshire's previous provider, Evolving Communities.











What people told us...

Most people were happy with the treatment they received from their GP but were unhappy about long waiting times to get appointments.

Hospital maternity, children's and cancer services were highlighted as good, but long waits to see consultants drew negative comments.

Communication between hospitals and other services came in for criticism, and experiences of using social care services appeared to be inconsistent.

Delays in accessing mental health services were the main concern for most people, but many also said staff were helpful and treated them well.

Most people told us they were happy with their dentist and the quality of treatment they received, whether NHS or private.

We are now in possession of dash cam footage of a near miss from one of our parish councillors clearly demonstrating the dangers. Issue discussed under AOB at previous meeting and agreed to undertake road marking amendments in conjunction with ongoing work in Seend (commenced 05/11/18).		
	Return arrows are being laid on the approach to discourage overtaking.		
Issue 6675 A342 Bromham	Bromham Parish Council would like to put in motion a speed restriction on the A342 from South of the Calne A3102 50/40mph speed restriction to the St Edith's Marsh 30 MPH restriction. This length of the A342 is now a 60MPH road with frequent occurring accidents which can be backed up by local police and a freedom of information request for the crash map information for accidents. This stretch of road starting at the Calne junction has the following: Farm shop, Residential properties, Chittoe junction - poor visibility. The Audi Garage, Residential properties, The A3102 Melksham junction with Collins Veg. Shop - minor accidents happen here on a regular basis not always police recorded- V P Collins Vegetables at 81 Devizes Road
