	The meeting considered the report which gave an update on activities and asked the Area Board to consider making awards.
	Matters raised included: the number of young people catered for by schemes including those from the village communities; the partnership working with the local PCSO; how work is targeted at vulnerable groups and children; and that almost all groups have reached up to 50% contributions from other sources.

	Admin Note: Having previously declared an interest, Councillor Grant left the room for the discussion and the vote on the HEALS application but was present and participated on the votes for the remaining applications.
97	Waste Collections
	The Area Board received a presentation from Martin Litherland, Head of Waste Management about changes in the Waste Management Service from the end of July 2018.
	Issues highlighted in the course of the presentation included: the increased range of materials, including waxed cartoons, would be recyclable from 30th July 2018; the reminders to rinse and squash waste to fit it into the receptacles; that additional bins are available on request; that recycling saved energy, costs less and frees up space in the household waste bin; the decrease in waste going to landfill; the plans, for next year, to be able to co-mingle materials, but that this would require further work; that some plastics were best to avoid as they were harder to recycle; that the changes would help to reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill and achieve recycling rates of at least 50%; that there

will be no changes currently to the timing and frequency of collections; the importance of getting information out about the importance of recycling the right plastics and the need to encourage reuse.

Councillors, Town and Parish Councils and Community Groups were encouraged to work with Waste Services to spread the message about the changes, and all people are encouraged to sign up for email updates from the service. https://services.wiltshire.gov.uk/WiltsForms/WasteRegistration

In response to a question by representatives from Malmesbury Against Plastics Groups, it was noted that: the Council was keen to promote ways that people can reduce the use of single use plastics and wanted to promote this; that black box size wont change but households can request additional boxes if they are needed; that the Council's strategy is to move forward in 2019 with a comingled service and that at that point the black box could be left for glass only;

Councillor John Thomson stated in response to a question that Council had made a decision to reduce the hours of operation at Household Recycling Centres across the county as a way to achieve cost savings as this was deemed preferable to closing some sites, and was done so after site usage was monitored to identify times of peak demand. It was also noted that HRCs had extended openings during summer months.

The Chair thanked the officer for the update.

98 Town Team - aspirations

Sarah, from the Malmesbury Town Team, gave a presentation on their project to encourage residents and visitors to discover more about what Malemsbury had to offer:

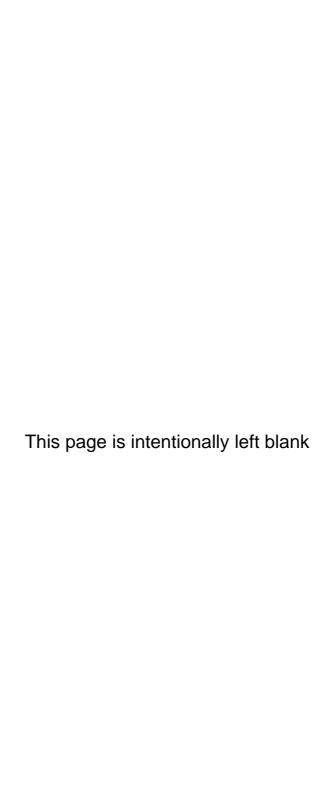
Matters raised in the course of the presentation and discussion included: that the group had been created as part of the s106 agreement that had funded some research and then a plan to enhance the vitality of the town centre; the work to promote and support more visitors; the five priority areas for work including branding and events: that there isn't a chamber of commerce for the town but work is underway; that a website www.discovermalmesbury.life had been set up; that a free town guide was developed; the marketing and advertising activity undertaken; the efforts to support a Friday market; that parking is often an issue and agreement had been reached for pilot for 2 hours free parking; that usage of that car park had increased threefold want to do further research on who uses and why; the work with town council and Wiltshire council; the late night shopping event, the current projects working on coach friendly status and the Vale action bid; the academic partnerships going in to research history, and efforts made to make history more accessible; improving signing from the long-stay car park to the town centre; and the project to have a gift card.

The Chairman thanked Sarah for the update. Community Policing Update 99 Inspector Mark Luffman, Community Policing Team Inspector, gave a presentation regarding the development of the policing model in the area, and gave an honest picture of the demand on police and the resources available to officers. Matters highlighted in the course of the presentation and discussion included: that there is 1 officer for every 800 people; the level of crime in Wiltshire including the average daily instances; that there had been a reduction of 350 officers since 2008 following reductions in funding; that around 1,000 families in the county had been identified as being on the Troubled Families Programme; how the force was responding to organised crime in the county; how increased reporting following greater awareness of issues such as child sexual exploitation has increased demand; that a cyber-crime unit has been set up to address new forms of criminality; how the risk of missing people is assessed; how people with mental health needs can be taken to a place of safety, and that police now have some mental health nursing staff available in police control rooms to help staff on the ground deal better with issues; that Wiltshire remains a very safe place; that there were no plans to recruit detectives from civilians, but that the force was encouraging uniformed officers to move into CID; the priority areas for action, and how police are using the public to assist them in minor crimes; how local initiatives, working together in partnership, create diversionary activities and develop outreach projects to try and prevent vulnerable younger people from being preyed upon; the changes made under the community policing team model around two years ago, and how the teams are split geographically; the value placed on PCSOs by the local community; the work being done to reinvigorate neighbourhood watch groups; the call on resources such as the visit from the American president, counter-terrorism and the ongoing investigations in Salisbury and Amesbury. The Chairman thanked the officer for the presentation; and the Area Board recorded formally its gratitude to the Wiltshire Police, and commend the partnership work which has been shown in response to recent events. 100 Partner Updates The meeting noted the written updates submitted and had the opportunity to ask questions on the issues raised therein. Additional verbal updates included: Riverside Centre – A new group had started to support people with issues around bereavement which would meet 2-4pm every Tuesday. Malmesbury Town Council – There would be a stand at WOMAD staffed

by volunteers to help promote Malmesbury and encourage visitors.

A consultation on a pattern of electoral divisions for that council size will run from 28 August 2019 to 5 November 2019. Any proposals must align as closely as possible to an electorate size of 4291 per division (projected figures for 2024), reflect community identity, and provide convenient and effective local government.

A new licensing regime for Animal licensing is taking effect from 1 October 2018, with significant implications for Wiltshire Council's Licensing Team and new and existing licence holders

Below is a brief summary of the implications of the new regulations:

The Animal Welfare (Licensing of Activities Involving Animals)(England) Regulations 2018 define the animal based activities that require licences as follows:

- Selling animals as pets (or with a view to their being later resold as pets) in the course of a business including keeping animals in the course of a business with a view to their being so sold or resold.
- Providing or arranging for the provision of accommodation for other people's cats or dogs in the course of a business on any premises where the provision of that accommodation is a purpose of the business. (This includes home boarding)
- Hiring out horses in the course of a business for either riding, instruction in riding, or both.
- Breeding three or more litters of puppies in any 12-month period; or breeding dogs and advertising a business of selling dogs.
- Keeping or training animals for exhibition in the course of a business for educational or entertainment purposes, either to any audience attending in person, or by the recording of visual images of them by any form of technology, or both.

All four existing types of licence, together with the additional activity of keeping and training animals for exhibition, will be encompassed by one new 'Animal Activity licence'. If an applicant is running more than one licensable animal related activity, each activity will be assessed separately and set out in one licence. The length of licence (previously one year in most cases) may be anything between one and three years dependent on the outcome of their inspection, and the type of licence

Local Authorities current arrangements include locally set conditions. The new provisions contain nationally set regulations for each animal based activity, which cannot be changed in any way and form the basis for conditions on the new licences going forward.

The fees are now to be split into two parts – the application fee, payable at the time of submission to cover the Council's costs in considering and determining the application, and the licence fee, which covers ongoing enforcement and compliance requirements. Ahead of the implementation date, revised fees will be set to accommodate the changes.

Wiltshire currently has 269 licensed animal licensed premises and most licences under the existing legislation with the majority of licences expiring on 31st December 2018.

The Licensing Team are planning to hold information seminars for new applicants and existing licence holders early in October 2018.

Well it has been a busy time for Wiltshire police over the last couple of months and for myself as your new community coordinator . I have settled in well and I am thoroughly enjoying working with the

local community.

There will be a few changes to the report over the next few months, which I hope you will enjoy and give you a better idea of what is happening in your areas and our results.

I will also make you aware of the current Wiltshire police campaigns and what you can do to help.

Good News story.

On 05/08/2018 suspects have entered a secure caravan storage yard in Minety and have taken a caravan belonging to a known victim valued at £9,000.00.

Police have located this caravan in Thames Valley Area and the owner has been informed.

Crimes that have an impact on the community 3rd August 2018 to 5th September 2018

On 03/08/2018 23:30 Unknown suspect(s) have entered The owners address in Milbourne through an insecure open front window, owners vehicle has been stolen and inside the vehicle are various tool, value unknown.

Officers are investigating and the vehicle has been located and returned to the owner, the owner has confirmed that nothing of value has been stolen and all his tools are present in the vehicle..

Help us tackle County Lines

Young and vulnerable people living in our communities are being exploited by drugs gangs. It's happening right now. And we need your help to protect them.

County lines is a term used to describe gangs and organised criminal networks involved in exporting illegal drugs into one or more importing areas in the UK, using dedicated mobile phone lines or other form of 'deal line'. They are likely to exploit children and vulnerable adults to move and store the drugs and money, and they will often use coercion, intimidation, violence and weapons. gangs based in cities like London are targeting the most vulnerable people in small towns across the country to sell class A drugs on their behalf.

This type of behaviour is a significant threat to our communities and will not be tolerated.

But we need your help to spot the signs and act on your concerns. Your voice will be heard and will make a difference.

Director of Intelligence Sonja Leith said: "County lines is everyone's responsibility and I would urge members of the public to be vigilant and look out for some of the most visible signs that county lines drugs gangs are operating in neighbourhoods and to report this to police.

"Our intelligence teams work hard to identify where county lines are exploiting vulnerable children and adults, and to proactively disrupt these networks. The intelligence we receive from our communities is crucial in helping us, our partner agencies and neighbouring forces in tackling county lines and safeguarding people.

"By raising awareness of the issue, I hope more people will be able to spot the signs, and feel comfortable in reporting information to the police. Your call could save lives."

Angus Macpherson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, said: "Two of my priorities for the next four years, as outlined in my Police and Crime Plan 2017 – 2021, are to prevent crime and keep people safe, and protect the most vulnerable people in society. It is these very people who are being targeted by individuals from large metropolitan cities, who are travelling to rural counties like Wiltshire, with the belief that they will be able to deal drugs from the properties of these vulnerable people. As a result, vulnerable people are being threatened and exploited, often in their own homes.

"I am aware that many people still consider drugs as a victimless crime. This is not the case, and we want to ensure that people who find themselves in these situations have support.

"The Force will continue to work with local authorities to reduce the harm and prevent the crime caused by alcohol and substance misuse, but I would also urge the residents of Wiltshire and Swindon to help us combat drug supply — we cannot do it alone and the police often rely on information from the public to build up an intelligence picture. Please continue to help by reporting any information to 101."

Signs to look out for:

Exploitation

- ■■ Has a child or young person gone missing from school or home?
- ■■ Are they meeting with unfamiliar adults?
- ■■ Have you noticed a change in their behaviour?
- ■■ Are they using drugs and alcohol?
- ■■ Has there been a breakdown in relationships with family and friends?

This could be a sign that they are being coerced and controlled to commit crime.

Call 101 to report it.

Cuckooing

Drug dealers will often take over the homes of vulnerable people as they use it as a base to deal drugs in the area. The vulnerable person may be being kept inside against their will.

- ■■ Have you noticed more people calling at an address? Sometimes at unsociable hours?
- ■■ Have you noticed a neighbour has not been seen for a while?
- ■■ Are there suspicious smells coming from an address?
- ■■ Are there suspicious or unfamiliar vehicles outside the address?

Cuckooing could be taking place. Look out for your neighbours and report suspicions to 101.



Individuals may be trafficked into, out of or within the UK, and they may be trafficked for a number of reasons including sexual exploitation, forced labour, domestic servitude and organ harvesting.

Often, people may not see themselves as victims.

Assistant Chief Constable Craig Holden, Force Lead for Crime, Justice and Vulnerability at Wiltshire Police, said: "Although Modern Slavery presents itself in many different ways in our communities, over the last few years the most notable and visible have been within nail bars and car washes.

"There has also been a significant trend in off-street prostitution, often involving women trafficked into sexual slavery; many who thought they were coming to the UK for other jobs and a better life.

"It is understandable that spotting the signs of modern slavery can be difficult but it is vital that we as a Force, and our local communities, are educated and have an approach that helps us to protect vulnerable people and prevent their exploitation.

"Information from the public is vital in the fight against modern slavery. Together, we can eradicate slavery and trafficking in Wiltshire, and reduce the exploitation of the most vulnerable people".

What are some of the signs of exploitation?

- Lack of personal protective equipment
- Chaperoned or accompanied everywhere
- Money being withheld from them
- Language barriers
- Working long hours
- Lack of possessions
- Passport held by someone else

Angus Macpherson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, said: "Wiltshire Police and local partner agencies play a crucial role in tackling modern slavery and human trafficking across the county.

"This type of crime is an emerging national threat, and the reality is the Police cannot tackle this alone and need to draw upon the local community and partners to play an equal part. I would urge the public to remain on the look-out for possible exploitation in their communities and to report any concerns they have.

"Safeguarding the most vulnerable people and offering the best possible service to victims across Wiltshire and Swindon continues to be a top priority for the Police".

National research indicates that a third of all reports of missing people are children aged between 13 and 15 years old.

In the last six months in Wiltshire there were 927 reports of missing children. Last month alone officers dealt with 193 missing children, a significant number of whom were reported missing more than once.

Detective Inspector Mark Kent, Force lead for Missing said: "The national and local statistics are shocking. When we hear about missing children we think of this happening in big cities, but the plain truth is that it is happening locally in our largely rural county of Wiltshire.

"No matter what your lifestyle or circumstance, growing up can be a difficult. Young people are exposed to a whole host new of threats, challenges and choices, which place them at greater risk.

"We know that with missing there is often a clear link to Child Sexual Exploitation,, domestic abuse, neglect, grooming, gangs or drugs, But whatever the reason they are missing, we consider children and young people vulnerable and at risk of harm. Going missing is the symptom of underlying, more complex problems."

Over the last six months we have seen an increase in the number of young people reported missing in Wiltshire, which has risen by just under 50 per cent. This is a seasonal trend - we see numbers reported rising during the summer months and falling in the winter.

National charity Missing People reports that one in five children experiencing conflict and neglect in the home have been reported missing. Seven in 10 young people who have been sexually exploited have been reported missing and one in 10 children with mental health issues reported missing.

Many of the young people who frequently go missing are in care. Those who go missing from their home or place of care often have complex needs, resulting from challenging and traumatic family backgrounds.

DI Kent added. "Missing adults and children have a huge impact on the demand for policing in Wiltshire and the cost of it reflects on the number of individual cases that exist. Most children return safe and well soon after their reported disappearance. Many children go missing frequently and each report costs an average of £2,500 to investigate.

"It would be easy for the police to become frustrated with children who frequently go missing, but it is our job to protect them from harm, and we know that children who go missing a lot are most at risk from abuse or exploitation. It is important to see the bigger picture. Behind every report is a vulnerable young person at risk and in need of our help.

"We work together with the local authority Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH) and specialist children's social care teams; professionals who look for what is going on behind the scenes in young people's lives.

"We remind our officers to put themselves in their shoes, ask the right questions, listen and treat every child as an individual. No two cases will ever be exactly the same and everyone should be treated fairly and with compassion."

Wiltshire Police is signed up to Child Rescue Alert, a national system to alert the public to an abduction or other high risk child disappearance where the child is in imminent danger of serious harm. The initial hours after a child goes missing are crucial and a sighting by a member of the public can lead to the safe recovery of the child.

Alerts are used in extreme cases and are fortunately used rarely. They can be sent directly to individuals who register with the service, as well as through the media.

Nationally 152,465 members of the public have already signed up, some 5,263 of these in Wiltshire. The charity has set a target of getting one million people registered to receive alerts.

<u>Malmesbury Area Board Report – 18th September</u> 2018.

Automatic fire alarms



Responding to automatic fire alarm (AFA) activations that subsequently turn out to be unwanted fire signals has been identified as a major draw on our resources, resulting in an inappropriate use of emergency crews and equipment.

Such activations cause resources to be diverted away from other, more important, activities, making them potentially unavailable to respond to genuine emergency calls.

Unwanted fire signals have a major impact on the Service and cause concern, as they:

- Render fire crews unavailable, creating the possibility of delayed attendance to genuine emergency calls.
- Create unnecessary risk to fire crews and members of the public when fire appliances respond under emergency conditions.
- Are disruptive to planned work, particularly training and community fire safety activities.
- Can cause a false expectation amongst personnel, especially those attending high numbers of false alarms.
- Impose significant financial burdens on the Service.
- Have a negative impact on employers who release on-call firefighters working the retained duty system.
- Cause problems for the occupiers of affected premises through lost production and general disruption to business continuity.
- Cause complacency among employees, reducing the effectiveness of automatic fire alarms by delaying the initiation of emergency procedures.
- Indicate other failings may exist within the premises' fire safety management.

A properly designed and maintained automatic fire detection system provides early warning of fire. However, a badly designed or poorly maintained system can become a potential hazard due to inappropriate or unwanted activations.

Management procedures should be set in place as part of an emergency plan. Suitably trained personnel should investigate the cause of the alarm activation before calling the fire





and rescue service (with the notable exception of residential care providers who should not allow these procedures to cause undue delay in calling 999).

Chinese lanterns



Chinese lanterns (also known as wish, sky or flying lanterns) have origins that go back thousands of years, and they have become increasingly popular as a way of celebrating weddings, birthdays, anniversaries or other special events.

However, there is a high risk of fire from using such lanterns, either through incorrect handling, unspent fuel cells or unexpected flight patterns.

The lanterns are generally made from paper, supported by a wire or card frame that incorporates a holder at the bottom for a solid fuel cell. The paper outer may or may not be fire retardant. Flying times suggested by manufacturers vary from 6-8 minutes and up to 20 minutes, with achievable heights claimed to be up to one mile.

Whilst lighting and launch are largely in the control of the user, the actual flight path and ultimate destination are generally not. There is also no guarantee that the fuel cell will be fully extinguished and cooled when the lantern eventually descends, and any subsequent contact with a combustible surface could result in a fire developing.

It is best to avoid using Chinese lanterns if you are near:

- Areas with standing crops.
- Buildings with thatched roofs.
- Areas of dense woodland.
- Areas of heath or bracken, especially in dry conditions.

Top tips

- Lanterns should be used by responsible adults only.
- Adults should not be under the influence of alcohol or any substance that could affect their level of responsibility.
- When launching the lanterns, make sure you have a water supply to hand in case something goes wrong.
- Keep the launch area clear of combustible materials.
- Don't try and launch damaged lanterns and be aware that writing messages on the paper can cause damage.





- Don't smoke whilst handling lanterns.
- Ensure that there is sufficient clearance for the lanterns to avoid obstacles such as trees, power lines or buildings.
- Avoid launching lanterns near roads, especially major roads or motorways, as they
 can be off-putting to drivers.
- Don't try and launch lanterns if it is windy, and be sure of the wind direction as this will affect the flight path.

Fireworks



Fireworks are safe if you use them properly. If you're putting on a home display, you should follow some simple steps to make sure that everyone has a good time without getting hurt:

- Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable.
- Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time.
- Read and follow the instructions on each firework, using a torch if necessary.
- Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks.
- Never return to a firework once it has been lit.
- Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them.
- Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.
- Never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire.
- Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving.

Did you know?

- It is against the law to carry fireworks in public if you're under 18.
- Fireworks must not be sold to anyone who is under 18.
- It is an offence to let off fireworks during night hours (11pm to 7am), except on Bonfire Night (midnight), Diwali, New Year, and Chinese New Year (1am).
- It is an offence under the Explosives Act 1875 to tamper with or modify fireworks.
- Sparklers can reach temperatures more than 15 times as hot as boiling water!





After the event

- Never put fireworks, even those which are fully spent, on the bonfire.
- Never dispose of fireworks by burying them.
- Safely dispose of fully spent fireworks.
- Soak misfired or partly spent fireworks in a container of water in an area where they
 cannot be tampered with (preferably away from the display site) and contact the
 manufacturer or supplier for advice on disposal.

A Safe and Well visit is **FREE** and normally lasts about one hour covering topics such as:

- Using electricity safely
- Cooking safely
- Making an escape plan
- What to do if there is a fire
- Keeping children safe
- Good practice night time routine and other points relevant to you
- Identifying and discussing any further support the occupier may need

Medicines under the guidance include treatments for coughs, colds, dandruff, mild cystitis, nappy rash, warts and verrucae, ear wax, head lice and mild dry skin.

This means that some patients who contact their GP Practice to make an appointment regarding any of the 35 conditions may be advised by the receptionist to seek advice from a pharmacist instead. There are certain scenarios where certain patients should continue to have their treatments prescribed.

Project description

Friends of Athelstan Museum have nearly finished restoring and converting a derelict church as an additional facility for the Athelstan Museum. It will enable us to a hold exhibitions displays lectures and social events. B; greatly extend our educational outreach to schools. C; store our collection in a controlled environment and have room to work on it. These facilities will be made available to other groups within the town. Although we have come in very close to budget additional expenses mean we have very few funds left to equip the building. We require eighty practical stacking chairs, stowable tables of various sizes and kitchen equipment.

Total project costs: £13364.60

Input from Community Engagement Manager:

This group of volunteers have been working hard to fundraise to complete the renovations and conversion of the church into an additional resource for the museum to be used by the community.
