1.	Chairman's Welcome and Introductions
	The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting of the Warminster Area Board and invited members of the board to introduce themselves.
2.	Apologies for Absence
	There were no apologies.
3.	<u>Minutes</u>
	Decision
	The minutes of the previous meetings held on 21 June and 19 September 2018 were agreed as correct records and signed by the Chairman.
4.	Declarations of Interest
	There were no declarations of interest.
5.	Chairman's Announcements
	The Chairman made reference to the announcements included within the agenda and welcomed the Dorset & Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service, based at Warminster Fire Station, who were in attendance with their fire engine and presenting later in the meeting.
6.	Family Learning Festival
	Update
	Jacqui Abbott, Community Engagement Manager, gave an overview of the Family Learning Festival, which was the first to be held in Warminster. Many family friendly activities had taken place throughout the half term week in October, which had received positive feedback noting that the festival would be bigger and better next year.
	Fire Safety & Safe and Well Information
	Jon Macdonald, introduced the firemen in attendance and gave an overview of the Warminster station. The Warminster station was a retained station which meant that the firefighters were on call at all hours.
	The incidents that firefighters had to deal with were varied which included fire and road traffic incidents. Community engagement and prevention work was a

	focus where a number of initiatives had been developed such as the Fire Cadets, Salamander, Safe Drive Stay Alive – a road traffic collision workshop and Safe and Well visits.
	Safe and Well visits were aimed at helping the vulnerable remain safe and well within their homes. The visits could involve; assessing fire safety within their home, developing fire escape plans, talking about welfare, heat alone scheme and sign posting to other essential services.
	Advice was sought on animal welfare during the fireworks and the advice given was to keep animals inside.
	Shape up 4 Life
	Katherine Reeves, Weight Management Programmes Lead, gave a presentation on Shape Up 4 Life.
	Shape Up 4 Life was a free 12 week weight management programme for Wiltshire residents. Each week would focus on a different aspect of weight loss such as eating well, portion sizes and food labels. The sessions ran for 45 minutes which were delivered by qualified instructors. Sessions could be run in any village as long as a minimum of 12 people signed up.
7.	Local Youth Network Update and Youth Activities Grant Applications
	Janette Bowra, Local Youth Facilitator, informed the meeting that there were no grant applications. There would be a possible Salamander course ran in Warminster with more details to come.
8.	Updates from Partners
	Some written updates had been received before the meeting and were included in the agenda.
	Mr Jerry Herbert introduced himself, explaining that he had started in August 2018 with a role to support and share the responsibilities and vision of the Police and Crime Commissioner, and to help implement and deliver the Police and Crime Plan. A key role will be to understand issues, concerns and representing the views of the public in Wiltshire and Swindon to help shape the priorities.
	The nature of crime had changed which meant that investment would be needed to tackle those new issues.
	Deputy Sector Head James Williams, spoke on his report included in the agenda.

5.	A representative from Chapmanslade gave a presentation on life in the rural community and it's challenges.
	The presentation focused on housing development, traffic issues including congestion, speeding and overweight heavy goods vehicles. The village hall and the important role it has for the community, how media is used to enhance communication in the village, school and church integration into the community and the village plan.

	The Community Engagement Manager informed the meeting that the WW1 trees had been delivered and were ready for collection from the Civic Centre in Warminster.
	Older People's Champion Update
	Deborah Gogarty, Chair and Older People's Champion, informed the meeting that she had been attending a variety of events and volunteering which had been inspiring. She congratulated all volunteers noting how inspirational and creative they were. There was also a number of programmes coming up such as the mens shed, a transport survey, mental health drop in sessions, a spot on Warminster Community Radio and an event in June 2019 for volunteer week.

Subject:	Polling District and Polling Place Review

The Electoral Registration and Administration Act 2013 requires Wiltshire Council to undertake regular reviews of both polling districts and polling places within its area. The Polling District and Polling Place Review is distinct from the Electoral Review of Wiltshire Council which will determine a pattern of electoral divisions.

A polling district is a geographical sub-division of an electoral area, (an electoral area being a UK Parliamentary constituency, a European Parliamentary electoral region, a parish, parish ward or an electoral division).

A polling place is the building or area in which polling stations will be selected by the Returning Officer. A polling place within a polling district must be designated so that polling stations are within easy reach of all electors from across the polling district.

The purpose of such a review is ensure that all electors have reasonably practicable facilities for voting and that polling places are reasonably accessible to electors who are disabled.

A programme of work has been scheduled to gather, analyse and consult upon relevant information and recommendations for revised polling districts. Further information is available <u>here</u>.

## Consultation opens on vision for special needs schools

Wiltshire Council is welcoming the views of parents, carers, pupils, staff and the general public on its vision to transform special needs education.

The council proposes to invest £20m in a new centre of excellence for pupils with special needs and disabilities. It will be developed at Rowdeford near Devizes to match the excellent facilities at Exeter House, Salisbury.

The vision means that the old schools at Larkrise, Trowbridge, St Nicholas, Chippenham and Rowdeford will close in 2023.

People have until 1 March 2019 to comment on the plans. They can respond to the statutory consultation in the following ways:

- At information surgeries in the schools
- At open meetings for parents/carers run by Wiltshire Parent Carer Council (WPCC) which will be advertised on the <u>WPCC website</u>

The proposals for the purpose-built and amply-equipped school will address the need for an additional 220 SEND places for Wiltshire while providing:

- Great teaching from well-trained, caring specialist dedicated staff
- The right facilities and support hydro-pools, sensory rooms, physio, open outdoor space, speech and language therapy and family care
- Strong community links with cafes, community gardens and public playing fields

- Closer links between SEND schools, and greater support for all mainstream schools
- Links with specialist nurseries offering children with special needs seamless attention from very small to teenage years
- Good road routes to both sites which are central to the home locations of children and young people with SEND with space to expand

Laura Mayes, cabinet member for children's services, said: "This ambitious investment will transform SEND in Wiltshire and provide outstanding schooling for special needs pupils into the future.

"We are bringing together the best facilities, the best teaching and the best learning environment. This will help our staff apply their expertise and experience in greater strength and with greater purpose.

"The vision will mean change, and that can sometimes be challenging. But we're certain that pupils, families and staff will love the new schools."

The final decision on the vision for SEND will be made at Wiltshire Council's cabinet meeting in March 2019 after completion of the consultation.

# A Vision for Special Education in Wiltshire





Wiltshire Council is proud and pleased to announce a bright new future for children with special educational needs.

We propose a bold investment of around  $\pounds 20m$  in two new centres of excellence in the county – purpose-built and amply equipped, giving our children a better start in life than ever before.

The new and extended campuses are proposed for Rowdeford, near Devizes, and Exeter House, Salisbury.

The new direction for SEND in Wiltshire will mean keeping Rowdeford at Rowde, St Nicholas at Chippenham, and Larkrise, Trowbridge, open until the new schools are completed in autumn 2023.

All the pupils and staff teams from Larkrise and St Nicholas will come together in the new, purpose-built modern school at Rowdeford, Rowde, from 2023.

The buildings at Larkrise and St Nicholas are past their prime, out of date and need replacing.

They no longer meet Department for Education guidelines on space.

They don't have enough outdoor green areas for children to play and learn in the fresh air.

We also need a new vision because the numbers of children we care for is rising, and the money we have to pay for it is falling.

But this is not about saving money.

The investment means we are committing more to special education needs. Not less.

Our vision targets our budget to provide a better education and a better experience for our children.

This vision is based on three years of consultation with families, schools and communities. It offers a future where we concentrate the best facilities, the best teaching, and the best learning environment in specialist locations in the north and south of the county, rather than only being available in some parts of Wiltshire.

It means our expertise and experience can be applied in greater strength with greater purpose and greater focus across two centres, reaching out to all schools.

It might mean a little more travel time for some children.

For many it could mean less.

For all, it will promise a better education, better life chances, and better outcomes. It also assures:

- great teaching from well-trained, well-paid, caring, specialist and dedicated staff
- the right facilities and support: hydro-pools, sensory rooms, physio, open outdoor space, speech and language therapy, family care
- strong community links with cafés, community gardens and public playing fields
- attractive, comfortable, child-scale buildings safe, friendly, calm and engaging places with wide corridors and lots of natural light
- closer links between SEND schools and neighbouring mainstream schools. Each have resources the others can benefit from
- links with specialist nurseries, offering children with special needs seamless attention from the time they are tots to their teenage years
- both sites are on good road routes, central to the home locations of children and young people with SELP and with space to expand.

We look forward to discussing our vision with parents, families and schools.

Subject:	New proposals to build on successful community model for children's centre services

Wiltshire Council is asking for people's views on proposals to expand its successful model of providing children's centre services in local community venues.

More vulnerable families are being reached as many of the services for under 5s are now provided at the heart of communities.

Currently the services are provided in a mix of venues, including dedicated buildings or community sites such as libraries, church halls and community centres. More people are also accessing information online so future provision will have to meet that need.

Latest figures show on average 83% of the activities that children's centre services run are already held in community venues. In Cricklade this is 92% and in Longfield all activities are held in the community or parents' homes.

Now Wiltshire Council is keen to expand the successful model by finding more community spaces including halls, libraries, campuses and leisure centres. People are being consulted on alternative venues so underused buildings can be closed and more sessions can be held for children and families in well-used community sites. The services for families with under 5s provide a range of support and advice around parenting, home learning environment, domestic abuse support, employment and training opportunities and healthy lifestyles.

Children's centre services would continue to work in collaboration with health visiting and midwifery and other colleagues who support housing and employment. There would also be a greater emphasis on providing help earlier for families before they reach crisis point.

Due to reductions in funding to the council, we are having to look at funding for all services. We have worked with children's centre services providers The Rise Trust and Spurgeons, to identify underused buildings to ensure that frontline services to our families are protected. They have helped provide an overall picture of which centres are best used and where new community venues can be found. The centres which are part of the consultation are: Cricklade, Pewsey, Mere, Salisbury City, Trowbridge Longfield and Westbury White Horse.

If these proposals are accepted Cricklade, Pewsey, Westbury and Trowbridge Longfield would be offered to onsite childcare providers to expand to offer much needed additional childcare. Mere will be offered back to the school and the lease will be surrendered on Salisbury City which is rarely used as services are offered in the Methodist church next door as it is a far better space.

### **Project Description**

The local church has known many young people who have needed long term mental health support that they struggle to receive from home or in school. In response to this issue which is a priority in the Joint Strategic Assessment for Warminster the Lighthouse has had some of its volunteers mentoring in Kingdown for the past few years. This has been an invaluable support for the school but the demand for mentoring support and pastoral care has become unsustainable especially as budgets tighten. ## WARMINSTER AREA BOARD REPORT - FEB 2019

Hello and welcome to this Community policing report.

Wiltshire Police is bucking the national trend of increasing crime figures by seeing a reduction of 1%.

At a time when violent crime continues to increase, dominate national media and rightly concern local communities a decrease in knife crime of 18% since September 2017, has been recorded in Wiltshire.

Angus Macpherson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, said: "The impact of knife crime can be devastating, not only for the victim and perpetrator, but also their families and friends.

"We are not seeing the same problems in Wiltshire that there are nationally because of the work being done by Wiltshire Police alongside the local authorities and other partners to tackle knife crime. This year I want to be able to allocate funding for a renewed focus on crime prevention using a range of tactics to target those who may commit crime in future.

"But the reality is that the police cannot tackle this alone and need to draw upon the strength of communities to play an equal part.

"Parents and schools can play their part by checking what their children are carrying in their bags; it's a good way to educate youngsters too that being caught with a knife could mean they end up in serious trouble as well as risking being injured themselves.

"Long term - good education and prevention means the wider community becomes a safer one.

"I am determined that we will continue to do as much as we can to eradicate knife crime in Wiltshire. Just one knife-related incident is one too many and I am acutely aware of this."

T/ Assistant Chief Constable Deborah Smith, the Force lead for crime, justice and vulnerability said "Wiltshire still remains one of the safest counties to live and work in, and the crime statistics released today show us as one of only four UK forces reporting an overall reduction in crime.

"Due to national media coverage of knife crime problems across the UK, we know this is an area that people have particular concerns about. However, here in Wiltshire, we have seen an 18 per cent reduction in knife crime since September 2017.

"There is still a lot of crime prevention work to do around people carrying knives, as incidents of

weapon possession are up 3 per cent, but overall we are making very good progress. In September the Force held a county-wide knife amnesty which resulted in 427 knives being taken off our streets.

"It is concerning that society seems to be becoming more violent and dealing with this problem is just one of the many challenges facing a modern day police force. We'd like to reassure our communities that despite the crime statistics released today showing a 3 per cent increase in violent crimes in Wiltshire, these incidents are often linked to wider issues such as drug and alcohol abuse or mental health episodes. We continue to work closely with our partners to tackle these wider issues.

"It is also important to note that serious violent crimes such as the recent incidents we have seen in Swindon are very rarely random attacks. The people involved in these sorts of crimes are often known to each other and are usually linked to wider issues such as gangs and drug dealing including dangerous drug networks and county lines.

"Wiltshire Police continues to work closely with our partners to focus on early intervention and prevention in relation to violent crime. This is being driven through the Swindon and Wiltshire community safety partnerships and includes new initiatives to tackle violence across the county.

"If you suspect someone of illegally carrying a knife, I'd urge you to report it to the police immediately by calling 101, or 999 in an emergency. Alternatively information can be passed to Crimestoppers anonymously by calling 0800 555 111."

December 2018 showed a total of 126 crimes for the whole Warminster Area Board region against the average of 116.6 for this same month over the last 2 years. This is within the parameters we would reasonably expect. There are no exceptions within the data.

#### ER11 (Warminster Town Centre Beat)

December 2018 showed a total of 87 crimes for the ER11 area against the average of 77.7 for this same month over the last 2 years. There are no exceptions within the data. The 5 largest crime groups accounted for 93% of this recorded crime as follows;

Violence Against the person showed 33 crimes compared to the average of 23.7 Theft showed 25 crimes compared to the average of 18.8 Criminal Damage showed 12 crimes compared to the average of 14.4 Burglary showed 7 crimes compared to the average of 5.1 Public Order showed 4 crimes compared to the average of 6

## ER12 (Warminster Rural and Villages Beat)

December 2018 showed a total of 39 crimes for the ER12 area against the average of 39 for this same month over the last 2 years. There are no exceptions within the data. The 5 largest crime groups accounted for 92% of this recorded crime as follows;

Violence Against the person showed 11 crimes compared to the average of 9.1 Burglary showed 8 crimes compared to the average of 6.1 Theft showed 6 crimes compared to the average of 9.2 Criminal damage showed 4 crimes compared to the average of 4.8 Vehicle offences showed 3 crimes compared to the average of 6

\*Of the criminal Damage offences, 14 of these relate to one Nursing Home who have reported 12 months of historical damages in one phone call (rather than reporting them at the time). They suspect these are occurring internally rather than a stranger related crime. Investigations are ongoing. 5 of the damages also relate to internal incidents in a private space for young people.

#### Five people arrested during warrants in Warminster area

More than 30 officers and staff including two drugs dogs took part in an operation targeting drug use in West Wiltshire last week (January 17).

Led by Det. Sgt Anthony King from the Community Tasking Team, they carried out five warrants under the Misuse of Drugs Act in the Westleigh area of Warminster as well as an address in Westbury.

As a result of the raids, five people were arrested. A wide range of items were seized including suspected class A drugs and related drug paraphernalia, a firearm, a large quantity of cash across several of the addresses, mobile phones and suspected stolen bank cards.

Two vehicles were also seized including a BMW X5 and a Vauxhall Zafira as a part of the ongoing investigation.

A man in his 30s from Warminster was arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the supply of a class A drug and possession of a Section 5 Firearm.

All those arrested were taken to Melksham custody for questioning. All were released under investigation.

Community Coordinator PC Lee Pelling said: "Following a number of complaints in recent weeks from the local community regarding drug activity on Westleigh Estate, we have worked closely with the local housing association - Selwood Housing - to take positive action and carry out multiple warrants leading to the arrest of five people, all suspected of being involved in the supply of class A drugs.

"I would urge local communities to pass any information regarding drug activity to the police or their local authorities. I hope this this sends a clear message to members of the public that no one is above the law, and if you are engaging in criminal activity, we may come knocking on your door. Not only that, but if we believe you are benefitting from this criminal activity, we will take action under the Proceeds of Crime Act."

Verena Buchanan, Group Housing Director at Selwood Housing said: "Our neighbourhoods team has been working closely with Wiltshire Police to investigate concerning activity on this estate, leading to this raid last week. We take the safety of our customers and staff very seriously and this is a positive move to ensure Westleigh remains a safe place to live."

## **COMMUNITY POLICING PRIORITIES WITHIN YOUR AREA**

#### WEEKLY TASKING MEETING

Inspector Andy FEE chairs a weekly internal "tasking meeting" where emerging community issues and concerns are raised and discussed for the whole West Wiltshire CPT area. From this meeting, priorities and actions are set and a tasking document produced. This involves developing strategies and the targeting of resources (including partner agencies) into tackling the issue or concern.

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The priorities for West Wiltshire are:

OP ARTEMIS - Poaching and Hare Coursing. Rural and remote locations are at risk from Poachers damaging fences and gates to access land to Hare Course and Poach. This sometimes leads to cattle and sheep escaping out onto the roads causing issues for motorists and for the farmers. Crops and fields are also being damaged. We are conducting pro-active patrols to reduce this type of crime

## **COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH (CSW)**

Every 2 weeks, 4 Community Speedwatch Schemes across West Wiltshire are selected by Leanne Homewood for CPT support (additional targeting, enforcement and patrols) to supplement the CSW team planned sessions. These are included in our weekly tasking document for action and update. All the results from the supplementary speed checks conducted are fed back to the relevant Town and Parish Councils in their individual Police Reports. The current Speedwatch Schemes being supported are as follows;

#### **Community participation in National Armed Forces Day 2019 events**

#### Aim:

The project's aim is to enable communities from around Wiltshire to engage with and participate in the activities around the National Armed Forces Day event in Salisbury in June 2019.

#### **Executive Summary:**

The Community Engagement Manager, along with the Library Heritage and Arts Team, will work to deliver three projects that will require community involvement and provide a lasting legacy following the events.

- Social media photograph campaign as part of the event launch
- Community art tapestry project to be displayed at the event in June
- Human poppy world record attempt at the event in June

Funding will be requested from area boards to support each of the three projects as outlined below in this report.

#### **Benefits:**

This project directly addresses both Wiltshire Council's and the Warminster Community Area's local priorities including:

- Combatting loneliness and isolation
- Improve our mental health
- Provide more activities for older people
- Provide positive activities for young people
- Improving affordable access to arts and cultural activities
- Increasing volunteering and providing skills
- Creating a lasting legacy for National Armed Forces Day 2019

#### Proposal:

• Social media photograph campaign as part of the launch of the National Armed Forces Day 2019

Community members will be encouraged to take pictures that show what the armed forces mean to them within Wiltshire, and to post them on social media sites such as Twitter, Instagram and Facebook using the hashtags #SalisburyNAFD and #WarminsterUK

Each community engagement manager will capture 5-10 images in their community area including a NAFD official flag.

As well as promoting the event, the images will be used to create a collage for display at the events in June. The collage design will be something that represents the armed forces and the communities support for them.

### • Community art tapestry project to be displayed at National Armed Forces Day 2019

Wiltshire Council will commission an artistic lead to work with community groups in each of the 18 community areas, identified by Community Engagement Managers, to create a tapestry, which will be combined together to form one larger piece to be displayed at the event in June. This will create a lasting legacy for the event which can be displayed around the county at Libraries, Campuses and Hub and future events.

#### Human poppy world record attempt

Community members will be encouraged to come to Salisbury on the Sunday of the weekend of events to participate in a "human poppy". This will be created by providing participants with a coloured poncho and arranging them into the shape of a poppy (see image below).

The aim of this will be to break the World Record for the largest ever human poppy which is currently 2,567 people. We aim to get between 3,500 and 4,000 people to take part. This could involve providing transport from around the county by putting on coaches from each community area to ensure the event is inclusive and anyone can take part.

In order to officially break the world record there is a significant amount of impartial monitoring required by Guinness. There will be costs involved in this and other parts of the attempt which are outlined below.



#### Funding:

Funding is requested from Warminster Area Board for aspects of the project as outlined in the table below.

### Winter driving checklist



There are certain winter preparations you can make to your vehicle as well as precautions you can take before travelling.

Make sure that you have an emergency kit in your car. This should include:

- Ice scraper and de-icer
- Warm clothes and blankets for you and all passengers
- Torch and spare batteries or a wind-up torch
- Food and a flask with a hot drink
- Any medication you need to take regularly
- Boots
- First aid kit
- Jump leads
- A shovel
- Road atlas
- Sunglasses (the glare from winter sun can be dazzling)
- Car charger for your mobile phone

Is your vehicle ready for winter?

Check that your vehicle is ready for winter using the POWDERY checklist as a good reminder:

PETROL (or diesel). Have you got enough? Do you know where to fill up?

OIL - check levels once a month

WATER - check radiator, screen wash and anti-freeze levels regularly



DAMAGE - check wipers, lights etc for signs of wear and tear or damage

ELECTRICS - check lights, indicators and controls are working properly

**R**UBBER TYRES – are they well inflated, legal, with good tread and free from damage?

**YOURSELF** – are you fit to drive? Have you slept well? Are you taking any medication(s) that could make it unsafe for you to drive?

#### Tyres and your safety

The tyres on your car are the only part of the vehicle in contact with the road surface. You may consider yourself to be a good, safe driver but when was the last time you checked your tyres? Failure to ensure that your car is fitted with safe tyres may cause you to lose control and crash.

There are a number of weekly checks you should carry out to ensure that your car is safe.

#### **Tread depth**

Checking your tyres is one of the most basic yet important tasks you should perform as part of your regular safety checks. Worn tyres are a huge risk on the roads, as a tyre in poor condition will have a detrimental effect on the vehicle's braking and steering.

The minimum legal tyre tread depth for cars and vans is 1.6mm, although we recommend you change your tyres at 3mm. Tests have shown that, at 50mph, the stopping distance of a vehicle with 1.6mm tyre depth is 39.5 metres – with 3mm the distance had decreased to 31.7 metres. That's almost the width of a tennis court.

In wet conditions, tyre tread depth is even more important. If you don't have sufficient tread, then you will have little or no wet grip performance.

It's easy to check – take a 20p piece and insert it into your tyre tread. If you can see the outer band of the coin, then your tyres may be dangerous – get them checked.

#### Tyre pressure

The air pressure of tyres will also greatly affect a vehicle's handling – refer to your vehicle handbook for correct tyre pressures. Ensuring that your tyres are at the correct pressure can also increase your car's fuel economy and save you money.



#### Other damage

You should inspect the tyre surface and sidewalls for cracks, worn patches or bulges. If you are concerned that your tyres are damaged, then consult a garage immediately. Many tyre specialists now provide a mobile service, so there is no need to move the vehicle if you find a defect.

#### Penalties for defective tyres

There is currently a maximum fine of £2,500 and three penalty points for each defective tyre. If you have two bald tyres, then that's potentially a £5,000 fine and six points on your licence. Disqualification is also possible in some circumstances.

### Driving in adverse conditions



The best way to be safe in extremely bad weather is to avoid driving at all. However, that's not always possible. In addition, bad weather can be unpredictable and it's common to get caught out while on the road.

These basic safe driving principles apply in all adverse conditions:

Slow right down – if visibility is poor or the road is wet or icy, it will take you longer to react to hazards and your speed should be reduced accordingly. If you have a temperature gauge in your vehicle that is showing zero degrees or below, then presume that the roads will be icy.

Maintain a safe gap behind the vehicle in front – stopping distances are double in the wet and ten times greater in icy weather. The gap between you and the vehicle in front is your braking space in a crisis.



Look out for vulnerable road users – be aware that people on foot, bicycles, motorbikes and horses are harder to spot in adverse weather and in the dark. Drive as though someone could step out in front of you at any time.

Look out for signs warning of adverse conditions – including fixed signs, such as those warning of exposure to high winds, and variable message signs on motorways that warn of fog, snow and which may display temporary slower speed limits.

Stay in control – avoid harsh braking and acceleration, and carry out manoeuvres slowly and with extra care.

Use lights – put lights on in gloomy weather or when visibility is reduced. Only use front and rear fog lights in dense fog.

Listen to travel news on local radio so you know where problem areas are.

#### Your local station is recruiting

On-call (retained) firefighters are ordinary people doing extraordinary work – they are men and women who may have other jobs or responsibilities as well as their vital role with the Fire & Rescue Service.

On-call firefighters are part-time staff who make themselves available for emergency call-outs depending on their other commitments. They are usually contracted for between 48 and 120 hours per week, but this can vary. Between them, each fire station team will provide cover for weekdays, evenings, nights and weekends.

#### How many firefighters are on-call?

Some 60% of firefighters in Dorset and Wiltshire work on an on-call basis, making them hugely important to both the Service and the communities that they serve. Of our 50 stations, the majority are crewed only by on-call firefighters and on-call staff work alongside their wholetime colleagues at many of our other stations.

#### Who can be an on-call firefighter?

Our on-call staff come from all walks of life: they may be employed, self-employed, parents at home or students. Some work in building or allied trades, whilst others are shop assistants, farmers, typists, factory workers or managers.

What they all have in common is self-reliance, confidence, respect, enthusiasm, team spirit and a willingness to be ready for anything when they are alerted to an emergency.

On-call and wholetime firefighters are expected to meet the same entry standards and they receive the same training and development to enable them to work to common standards.



#### Who can apply?

You can find out more about the role and current vacancies through these pages, but key requirements for applicants are:

- You must be at least 18 years old when you join us (you can apply once you are 17<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>)
- You must be able to respond and attend the fire station within five minutes (this can vary slightly dependent on location)
- You must have a good standard of physical fitness
- You must have the right to work in the UK
