19 Matters of Community Wide Interest

The Board received the following updates:

Parish Councils and Community Groups

There were no updates this time.

National Armed Forces Day

The Community Engagement Manager updated on this three-day event which would take place on the last weekend in June 2019, in Salisbury.

There were a number of ways people were invited to get involved. The big flag initiative was one. The CEM would be travelling around the community area to take a series of photos with the flag, at feature locations and with a selection of community groups. Karen asked anyone with ideas for photo locations to let her know.

Community Policing – Local Issues and Priorities

In addition to the written report in the pack, Sector Inspector Pete Sparrow gave a verbal update on some of the issues across southern Wiltshire.

A decision had been taken to split the area into two sections. Pete would take command of the Salisbury end and a new inspector would be coming in for the Amesbury section.

Knife crime and the County lines drug running was touching on all communities, from cities and then filtering out into the wider rural community. Parents and

grandparents needed to look out for family members who had come in to sudden wealth, if the children were not getting it from you and they are not earning, they are getting from somewhere. There were other parts of the county where they have not dealt with this quickly enough and it led to issues of violence.

The Special constabulary had already provided over 1500 hours of service this year. This was an amazing contribution.

There had been a series of shed/out building theft incidents of tools and machinery. We recommend that you mark up your machinery in a distinctive way, record serial numbers and check security on outbuildings.

The Police had attended a positive meeting held in Landford this week with over 100 people in attendance who came out to speak about theft issues there.

Questions and comments:

- Chairman How many of the Special's hours were working as independent Officers? <u>Answer</u>: The specials are always paired up whether they are qualified or not. Whether that is with a constable or another special.
- Local Member Cllr Randall, thanked the Police for attending the emergency village meeting in Landford. The parish had been very concerned about theft, there had been an influx in recent weeks. The clerk for Landford has been talking to other clerks to try and sort something out. Landford will be made secure, the concern is that the problem would be dispersed to other areas. Problem is right across the south, wondered if the AB could get involved to do something? Answer: Target hardening does encourage the problem to go elsewhere, and make your area safer. It is then for the other places to do the same. There are plenty of products out there to help protect yourselves.
- The Chairman noted that he would give some thought on a special themed session.
- Keith Rodgers When you get the new money from the precept increase, would you come to give a report on how that was being spent? <u>Answer</u>: I can confirm that the increase would be put towards an increase in Community Policing and the removal of our tri force agreement with Avon and Somerset. We would also be increasing our Community Coordinators, we have 2 currently in Salisbury. They help me to look at the demand and get the officers where they are needed.
- Cllr Devine You say we have no knife crime in Salisbury can I suggest that with the increase in precept and the 40 Officers coming in, you can find another car and come out to the rural areas to patrol, having a visible

presence would impact on the level of out building theft. <u>Answer</u>: The basic principles for Policing in the beginning, are still the same. We all have a duty to protect our communities, the only difference between me and you is that I have a warranted power. There are occasions when we have an area of 160 miles squared covered by just 3 Officers, that is the reality of Policing at the moment.

The Chairman ended by saying that we were all responsible for community safety and all had a part to play.

20 Parish Session

Trevor King, Chairman of Whiteparish Parish Council gave a presentation on the Whiteparish Skate Park Project.

About 18 months ago, a village resident came to the parish council meeting and suggested that we updated our facilities for the young people. This was rather fortuitous as our current facilities were showing signs of wear and tear. She wanted to get involved with the design along with a few young members of the village and was willing to raise some funding. We decided to embark on the new skate park project for the village.

We decided we could spend £100k, so we went out to ask providers what could be offered for that. We chose one company which had very favourable payment terms.

Work commenced last August. We liked the design and the terms but we were not impressed by the directors, however when the contractors arrived on site we were impressed with their efforts, as they could not do enough to help us meet our aspirations.

Thanks to our Parish Clerk who worked exceedingly hard on this project. It took around 10 weeks from start to finish. We have had nothing but positive comments.

We held an open event and will have another formal skate event later in the year.

The funding comprised of £100k through grants. One funder let us down along the way, and we were awarded £50k through sports England, and £5k from the Area Board.

The Chairman congratulated Maria for all the work she had contributed to the project.

Questions and comments:

• I was on the Alderbury PC when we had our park built. The night before

the contractors came, the project manager was unwell and could not be on site when they arrived, I was asked to stand in. The installation was not overseen by a project manager and the park was put in the wrong way around. It took the parents to rectify the issue, as the company refused to come and correct it.

The Chairman noted that the next Parish Session would feature Grimstead PC, who would come to speak about the creation of their circular footpath.

21 <u>Housing Need in Southern Area</u>

The Board received a presentation from the Cabinet Member Cllr Richard Clewer and Director for Housing Simon Hendey and debated the housing need in this community area, and the potential affordable housing options available to meet that need.

Nationally we have a housing crisis. In Wiltshire, we have 97 families in temporary housing, with a range of different housing problems across the county.

We are looking at other innovative ways to provide housing. There is a shortage of care workers, if we could house them in areas of need that would be one way.

Housing need in southern area

In the southern area housing need between 2016 – 2036 was calculated at 2238 households. The highest proportion of that was 54% requiring three bed properties.

Affordable housing need was calculated from using data from the Wiltshire Council Housing Register. Figures this week indicated that 56 households were registered in the Southern area with a housing need.

Affordable housing included rented properties at 80% of market rent or local housing allowance. These could be provided by the Council or registered providers.

Households offered affordable housing need to be on the Council's housing register, and must have a housing need as defined in legislation and have a local connection.

Shared Ownership Housing

These are available to first time buyers with annual income below £80,000 (£ 18,000 minimum recommended). Buyers are able to purchase a share, usually at least 25% of equity with a mortgage. They are then charged rent on unsold equity at 2.75%. The buyer can then later buy more shares and own the property outright.

These properties are provided by registered providers and can be accessed by

the <u>Help to buy South</u>. No local connection required unless a planning requirement has been applied on the development.

Community Land Trust (CLT)

These schemes are Community land trust set up to own and manage housing. Land or property cannot be sold off for private gain. There can be a variety of tenures.

Registered providers can undertake development on behalf of CLT. There is advice and financial support available from the Council. Access to these properties is via a CLT letting policy which prioritises local connection.

The Council has been successful in bidding for funding for these schemes.

Some villages want to see development and others do not. One way is through a Neighbourhood Plan.

<u>Downton Neighbourhood Plan (NHP) - Jane Brentor</u>

A NHP presumes development, some people think you have a NHP to stop development, that is not the case. The Core Strategy number of houses for Downton was 190. We based our plan on a housing needs survey that had taken place a few years before.

The housing that was available was high cost housing, which limited young people being able to stay in the community.

The aim is to work at gaining the houses in the community that people need. We had a 40% turnout for the referendum which was the highest for Wiltshire at the time.

There are some real advantages of a NHP, as its owned by the community. We worked with developers to assess the sites that were available. The plan can have a real influence on what is needed and what is actually developed.

It really was a great deal of work, but you do gain a lot of knowledge about your area. If you are interested in going through with a NHP, help is available from Wiltshire Council to support you through the process.

Questions and Comments:

- Do you look at just housing or a holistic approach? <u>Answer</u>: We had 8 areas, including transport, local business, local environment, leisure, impact on housing need and development. Final development was very much influenced by the NHP. It gives a structure to have a plan to work towards. It also gives 25% of the CIL of any development.
- You refer to the value of having the expertise of specialised people.
 Answer: Yes, the NHP was adopted and owned by the PC but it was not

run by the PC, we found that there were people in the community who were interested came forward to give their skills.

Facilitated roundtable discussion

People were then asked to work in groups to discuss three questions, these were:

- 1. What type of affordable housing do you think will meet the needs of your local community?
- 2. Where do you think the affordable housing could be developed?
- 3. Who do you think should develop the affordable housing?

Feedback from roundtables

- The terms of affordable housing were difficult to assess.
- Whiteparish was sensitive about development, favoured mainly in-filing or exception sites.
- Housing Associations or WC should provide housing, not CLTs.
- Need to look at accommodation for young adults with more flexibility in terms of who can access the housing.
- Minority groups like care workers, based in Salisbury but need to access clients all over the southern Wiltshire community area. It makes sense to have accommodation available in the areas needed.
- More provision in villages for the elderly, to downsize.
- Support for investigation of Community Land Trust for provision for families in villages.
- More understanding of the demographics in villages.
- Sale at a premium of agricultural sites for exception sites.
- Winterslow had attempted a NHP twice, they had a housing need of 46, however there was only one plot of land that people could not agree on. Most residents were either over 60 or families with children that go to private school. It would be a housing association plot or site. There were only 800 850 houses in the parish already, it was difficult for the smaller parishes.
- Alderbury smaller houses were needed either for elderly downsizing or younger families. When developers come in the village gets what the developer wants rather than what village needs.
- Alderbury questioned as to whether there was a need for further housing in Alderbury and Whaddon, and was critical of the current building taking place near the school. Felt there was a need for more protection from aggressive developers to prevent large scale houses. PC to communicate policies to the residents.

The CEM noted that the objective of this discussion was for more voices to be heard, as round table discussion gave the chance for everyone to express themselves in this format. The Housing Strategy would be influenced by these comments.

Cllr Clewer added that if parishes now felt that they had a housing need that

could be filled in a specific way, to get in touch with the Council to us to discuss and help.

Action: CEM to send out the slides to PCs.

22 <u>Highways Maintenance Programme for 2019/20</u>

Diane Ware, Principal Technical Officer for Highways gave a presentation on the proposed Highways Maintenance schedule for 2019/20.

The Board was asked to approve the recommendations as set out in the report attached to the agenda.

Highways funding has been divided out across the 18 Community Areas, by road mileage.

The presentation detailed road conditions on A, B and C roads within Southern Wiltshire. The roads were assessed for works by the survey vehicle. data then processed and maps produced.

To patch and surface dress is £65/m2 and to resurface was £450m/2. Some roads had suffered heat stress during last summer, there would be more reactive patching works carried out this year.

The Chairman clarified that the proposed programme as detailed in the agenda was fixed, so any case for a change would impact on the works currently listed. New additions would see something else move down the list, however the order of priorities was open to our influence.

Questions:

- How long do the patching works carried out with the machine last?
 Answer: 2-3 years. A full-scale repair will last 15-20 years.
- Cllr McLennan added that the last time he had asked the service Director he had advised that any white lines and mini roundabouts had to be faded to 30%, before they could be considered for painting, had that criteria gone?
- These graphs paint a depressing picture. <u>Answer</u>: We had now changed to funding by condition rather than by length of roads.

Cllr Clewer noted that the council had been given additional funding and had been putting an extra £6m a year into Highways works. This year, the works include extra white lining, if you have white lines that need doing, then please report now. Pavements are another area which had not received significant funding in the past, please report on the app. Get your PCs to report anything that needs doing so that it is logged on the list.

Decision: The Southern Wiltshire Area Board agreed: (i) To welcome the road surfacing work and repairs carried out in 2018/19 and notes the improvement in the overall condition of Wiltshire's roads in recent years, but acknowledges that further investment is still required. (ii) To approve the highway maintenance scheme list for 2019/20 prepared for the Area Board. (iii)To note the new provisional five year programme, which will reviewed annually to ensure best value for money and whole life costing for the highways asset. 23 Young People - Positive Activities Update The Board noted the feedback from Youth Clubs, regarding commissioned youth activities during 2018/19, as detailed in the report attached to the agenda. The Chairman asked for a straw poll on how people felt the Board should move forward with the allocation of its youth budget for 2019/20. 1. AB to have a separate youth event. 2. Hold some sort of separate event and bring back funding proposals to the AB. Option 1 = no support, option 2 = full support. Proposals would be bought to the 1st May 2019 Board meeting about how the 2019/20 Youth Budget should be shared to youth clubs, initiatives and projects for the optimum benefit of all 11 - 18s (and to 25yrs for those with a learning disability or difficulty). Cllr McLennan noted that the Southern Area had 3 schools in Laverstock and one in Downton, he asked whether something could be done to allow the pupils from those school to participate. 24 **Projects Update** Speed Indicator Device (SID) – Parish Collaboration update No updates this time.

25 Southern Wiltshire Funding

The Board considered 3 applications for funding from the Community Area Grant Scheme, as detailed in the agenda pack and circulated at the meeting.

Woodford Valley Primary Academy – requested £500

To hold a Salisbury Schools Mini Marathon, which would be a fun 2300 metre mini marathon for children from over 30 primary school and parents organised by a handful of local primary schools. Hosted on the Laverstock downs on Saturday 18th May.

Rebecca Head teacher – worked to provide mini marathon for last 30 years on Laverstock Down. 1300 children run from 30 schools across Salisbury. We have had sponsors from Waitrose and Salisbury Journal.

Questions:

As this was a repeat event were things like H&S in place? <u>Answer</u>: Yes, we complete a risk assessment and sent to the LA. Salisbury Journal had withdrawn some aspects of support, which was why we needed to look for some top up funding. Other Area Boards were also being asked to contribute.

Cllr McLennan noted that this was a brilliantly handled event. The use of P&R was well handled. He moved the motion of awarding the full amount requested of £500.

Decision

The Southern Wiltshire awarded £500 to Woodford Valley Primary Academy towards the mini marathon event to be held in Laverstock. *Reason*

The application met the Community Area Grant Criteria for 2018/19

Downton Green Group – requested £150

To hold a wildlife friendly day at the Moot in Downton on the 19th May 2019. To support the great activities which would take place we need to hire a portaloo.

Cllr Clewer supported the project and moved the project be supported to the requested amount of £150, from the HWB fund.

Decision

The Southern Wiltshire awarded £150 to Downton Green Group towards the Wildlife Friendly Day in May 2019, from the Health & Wellbeing Budget.

<u>Collaboration of Landford, Downton, Alderbury and Redlynch Parish Councils</u> To carry out bus shelter improvements works.

This matter had been deferred until a future meeting to enable further investigation on this project.

<u>Laverstock Memory Group – requested £3000</u>

The Group provides on-going support for up to 15 people with dementia and for their family carers who meet in a separate room. Additional support is given when members or their carers need it, especially for people with dementia who live alone. Members and carers also continue to help create dementia friendly communities in our area.

Cllr Clewer noted that the provision sounded very useful, however the Board had a limited amount of HWB funding available. We need to consider the small number of people benefitting from this amount of funding, and that this is the third year you have approached us for funding.

Cllr Devine - If the NHS was able to cover this area of work it would be covered, it is not being covered. There are people here in need of this help.

Cllr McLennan - This is in my patch, but the relevance is that it is in the Southern Area. There was support for 15 people living with dementia and their carers. There were two groups of people being supported here.

Cllr Britton - of the £3k we are being asked for, only £1k is additional provision, to enable expansion, the £2k was for ongoing costs. This would not usually qualify under our general policy guidelines, on the other hand, we have a strong argument of the worthwhile work, and to look at building on this.

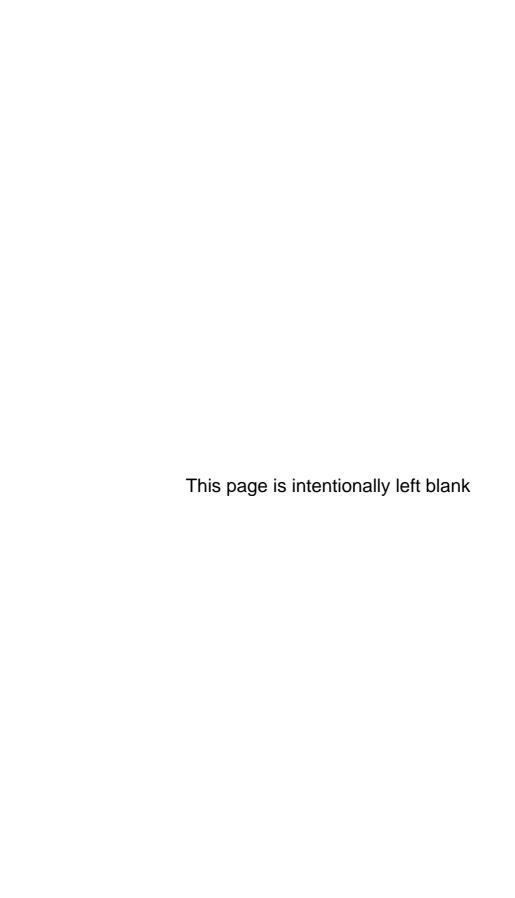
Decision

Title of Report	Response to 14 th March Area Board discussion on housing

1. Purpose of the report:

1.1. The purpose of this report is to present the main points that were raised as part of the discussion on housing and to propose actions to address them.

2. Main Considerations

- 2.1. The discussion on housing need in the Southern community area Board meeting on the 14th March raised a number of points. They are listed below with a response and proposed actions.
 - 1. Whiteparish would want only infill or exception site, and believe Housing Association or Wiltshire Council are best placed to meet the need.

RESPONSE: Whiteparish is listed as a large village in the Wiltshire Core Strategy. At Large Villages settlement boundaries are retained and development will predominantly take the form of small housing and employment sites within the settlement boundaries

ACTION: Officers to meet parish Council to ascertain of there are any development opportunities in the Parish.

2. Must ensure that priority is being given to key workers needs, including care workers.

RESPONSE: Unless there is a housing need in line with the Council's allocation policy this will be difficult to achieve. The solution could be Community Led Housing (CLH) where not all allocations would need to go through the Council's allocation scheme.

ACTION: Officers to explain to Community Land Trusts or groups looking to establish CLH the way in which nomination agreements / allocation policy could work to provide the CLH group flexibility in meeting local housing needs that are not demonstrated in the Council's allocation scheme. If identification of a suitable site under the current development plan proves problematic, a neighbourhood plan or neighbourhood development order could be prepared to enable land to come forward under a CLT scheme.

3. How to prioritise the needs of the elderly who want to stay in the village they live in, despite the size of their household being bigger than their need.

RESPONSE: The local community could potentially help to facilitate the provision of 1 or 2 bed homes/bungalows, for elderly people to down size,

through the allocation of a site in a neighbourhood plan or through a neighbourhood development order.

Small schemes (5 or fewer homes in rural areas or less than 10 dwellings everywhere else) can be 100% market housing but anything larger will be required to include a proportion of affordable housing (which those wishing to downsize are less likely to qualify for). It is probably worth exploring whether community led housing schemes, such as those managed by a CLT, could potentially provide a long term solution, where the sale of homes is carefully manged to ensure that they remain available for those wishing to downsize either via control of onward sale or long term rental agreements

ACTION: Rural housing needs surveys will be required to evidence the need. Officers will investigate if there are ways in which the Neighbourhood planning process can be used to address this issue.

4. To submit the most informed views on housing need, each location needs to be fully aware of the details of its demography.—

ACTION: the affordable housing needs can be addressed via rural housing needs surveys. Parish Council's can also add in a sheet of their own questions if they wish to determine a greater level of detail regarding the needs for the open market housing in the parish. The position on housing needs surveys in parishes is as follows,

Alderbury & Whaddon – last survey carried out 2013 but was not approved by Parish Council, and therefore not finalised and published.

Britford – no survey

Clarendon Park - no survey

Coombe Bissett – survey completed May 2018

Downton - survey completed January 2014

Firsdown – no survey

Grimstead – no survey

Landford – survey completed July 2010

Laverstock, Ford & Old Sarum – survey completed Nov 2013

Odstock /Nunton – no survey

Pitton & Farley – survey currently in process

Redlynch (including Nomansland) - last survey 2010.

West Dean – no survey

Whiteparish - last survey 2006

Winterslow – survey completed Nov 2017

It is for parishes to decide if they wish to commission a survey.

5. Agricultural land outside exception sites to be sold at a premium for development for affordable housing.

RESPONSE: The Local Plan Review is looking into whether there is scope for a more flexible rural exception site policy in order to better enable proposals that local communities want to come forward. However, land sold at a

premium could potentially impact on the viability of a scheme, so may not necessarily achieve the desired result. We would welcome comments on how the current rural exceptions policy could be amended to help deliver developments that communities need

ACTION: Housing needs surveys will identify the need to justify such an approach. Further dialogue with rural communities on revisions to policy will be undertaken as part of the local plan review.

6. Redlynch and Alderbury want smaller houses and definitely no more 4 bed houses.

ACTION: Housing needs surveys could identify the housing required.

7. Local people want to see that developers are providing what the community needs not what the developer wants to build.

ACTION: Rural housing needs survey will identify the housing that is needed

8. Alderbury and Whaddon need to see improvements in the local infrastructure of roads and services before they would want to accommodate more housing

RESPONSE: Generally the provision of improvements to local infrastructure should reflect the scale of development involved, and the extent that the improvements are justified (i.e. they must be directly related to the development and necessary to make the development acceptable). Local communities can request that specific infrastructure projects be included in the council's infrastructure delivery plan, although there is no guarantee that those projects will be given priority to receive CIL funding. Also, Parish councils do receive a proportion of CIL monies from housing development in their area and this money can be used by the parish councils to support or enable the delivery of infrastructure projects, where it is needed.

ACTION: Further dialogue with rural communities on local housing needs and associated infrastructure requirements will be undertaken as part of the local plan review.

4. Recommendation

- 4.1. Parishes consider commissioning Rural housing needs surveys where they are out of date or do not exist.
- 4.2. Parishes engage with Community led housing project to investigate Community led housing . CLH team to proactively engage with parishes over next twelve months . communityledhomes@wiltshire.gov.uk

What is Community Led Housing?

Community led housing is about local people playing a leading and lasting role in solving local housing problems, creating genuinely affordable homes and strong communities in ways that are difficult to achieve through mainstream housing.

Community led housing can empower local communities, making them more resilient and able to address issues such as affordable housing and the need for downsizer accommodation.

What is the Wiltshire Community Led Housing Project?

Wiltshire Council, in partnership with Community First and Wiltshire Community Land Trust, has set up a partnership project to advise and support communities to address their housing needs.

The project vision is to enable and support community groups to deliver housing development that provides defined community benefits which are protected in perpetuity; and to provide a legacy for community led development. Localism and innovation lies at the heart of this and it will help to build stronger and more resilient communities. Community led housing can be complimentary of the on-going Neighbourhood Planning work of the council and its communities.

Community led housing needs to have meaningful community engagement and has to have widespread community support. This means the community needs to have a common vision and shared values; they need to be empowered. This project supports and enables groups seeking to deliver alternative solutions to their community needs beyond the mainstream delivery mechanisms. It can also support community groups working in a developer-community partnership.

The project team has been established with two project managers, a senior planning officer and a housing enabler. It is a cross service project. Grant funding is currently available to groups to help with start-up subject to qualifying terms and conditions.

What has happened so far and what will be happening?

The project is currently supporting seven community groups across Wiltshire including the formally incorporated Seend Community Land Trust. This group have been supported in their establishment, and land identification and negotiation work. Going forward, further support will be given through the planning, building and living stages of their projects as appropriate. They started as individuals, formed a steering group and became a legally recognized community led housing group formulating their own development proposals to serve their community needs.

The team are keen to build as wide a network of community led housing groups as possible throughout Wiltshire. We want to speak to anyone who is interested in trying to take a leading role in addressing community housing issues.

A consultation has been launched on how we can prevent homelessness and help those who are homeless to find a home.

Wiltshire Council is asking for views on its new strategy which sets out priorities and actions to work with those who are homeless or threatened with homelessness, to help them secure and keep a good home.

Ashley O'Neill, Portfolio Holder for Housing, said: "We are making real progress in tackling homelessness in Wiltshire, but we can never be complacent – we always need to do more"

"We need to think creatively, deliver a wide range of services and have effective, strong, partnership working to prevent homelessness, and provide the homeless with support to tackle the cause of their homelessness."

"This strategy will rely on stakeholders and the communities in Wiltshire and we would like people to let us know their views so we can all make a positive impact on preventing homelessness into the future."

The consultation will seek views on five priorities:

- Reducing rough sleeping
- Identifying and preventing homelessness at the earliest possible stage
- Ensuring services are designed to prevent homelessness and support those who are homeless.
- Ensuring those who are threatened with homelessness or who are homeless can secure and keep a suitable home.
- Maintaining effective strategic direction and partnership working

Each priority has a number of actions. These include increasing street outreach, developing a resettlement support service, and ensuing there is more housing available to help the homeless.

The strategy has been informed by Wiltshire Council's Homelessness Review 2018 and Homeless Health Needs Assessment. It also follows the national Homelessness Reduction Act 2017, which introduced a new legal duty on specified public services to refer customers who may be homeless or threatened with homelessness to a local housing authority.

1. Purpose of the report:

To ask Councillors to consider the following applications seeking funding from the Southern Wiltshire Area Board.

Applicant: The Bridge Youth Project	£3352.00
Project Title : The Bridge Youth Project Mentoring Scheme	23332.00

2. Main Considerations

Councillors will need to be satisfied that grants awarded in the 2019/20 year are made to projects that can realistically proceed within a year of the award being made.

Area Boards have authority to approve Area Grants under powers delegated to them by the Cabinet member for Communities, Campuses, Area Boards, Leisure, Libraries and Flooding. Under the Scheme of Delegation Area Boards must adhere to the Area Board Grants Guidance 2014/2015.

Community Youth Grants will contribute to the continuance and/or improvement of cultural, social and community activity and wellbeing in the community area, the extent and specifics of which will be dependent upon the individual project.

Community Youth Grants give all local community and voluntary groups, Town and Parish Councils an equal opportunity to receive funding towards community based projects and schemes.

3. The applications

Applicant: The Bridge Youth Project Project Title: The Bridge Youth Project Mentoring Scheme	Amount Requested from Area Board: £3352.00
This application meets grant criteria 2014/15.	

Project Summary: The mentoring scheme was set up to support vulnerable young people in secondary schools who need additional support by linking them with volunteers from the community. They meet with a volunteer mentor for an hour per fortnight over the course of an academic year. This is a safe space where they can discuss any issues that matter to them and have someone trustworthy who will listen to them and act as a positive role model. We help young people to set goals and to realise more of their potential. A full evaluation is undertaken.

Please tell us WHO will benefit and HOW they will benefit from your project and benefit your local community:

1.The Bridge Mentoring Scheme matches students in 4 Salisbury-based secondary schools with a mentor from the local community. These are currently Wyvern College, St Edmunds Girls School, Sarum Academy, and Avon Valley College.

Wyvern & St Eds receive the highest proportion of mentors within the scheme with 18 mentors out of a total of 39. There is now also a very strong possibility having recently met with the Headteacher that we will be taking the scheme into Trafalgar School who are extremely keen to access it. The Deputy Head and Pastoral Lead Rachael Faulkner comments As support from external agencies dwindles and schools are asked to take more responsibility for every aspect of a childs life we at Trafalgar feel that many of our students would benefit hugely from supportive mentoring from people with no agenda who are motivated by the desire to help encourage and challenge students who may not have this support out of school. Many of our students need time invested in them to flourish and to achieve their potential. With an exciting scheme like this that time can be provided and those students can be allowed to be the best they can possibly be.

After receiving full training and induction mentors are matched with a mentee from one of the schools and they meet together fortnightly in school typically during a lesson time for an entire year. The mentor acts as a listening ear and positive role model enabling the mentee to unpack life, build necessary skills, and look towards the future. Over the last couple of years the issues that young people in school are facing have escalated and the schools know that these young people desperately need someone to talk to and a reliable consistent role-model to help them to grow and to learn coping strategies.

The mentoring scheme is now a key part of the pastoral structure within WyvernSt Edmunds and our Mentoring Coordinator Kate Moody has an office base there. Pupils can be referred by teaching staff but they are also able to self-refer should they wish to do so. Mentors and mentees can work through a range of issues ranging from difficult family relationships and bereavement, to mental health issues and friendship struggles. However whilst there are often difficulties to work through in each young persons life the mentor is able to extol the positives that undoubtedly exist and speak encouragement and support.

There is a significant demand for more mentors within WyvernSt Eds and a very obvious need at Trafalgar where we hope to launch the scheme in the coming months. However we do not charge the schools a single penny for the scheme for budgets are often stretched. Therefore we do appeal to the South Wilts Area Board for support that will enable us to serve more young people within this catchment area.

We are pleased to include some recent quotes that demonstrate a need for the service locally. View from a tutor - St Edmunds June 2018 E. has become really confident this year to talk more about her Dads death and making people aware of support that students can get if they too have lost a parent. E. has talked about the project that she is completing with her Mentors support and

has really appreciated the way her Mentor has allowed her to be independent with this. E. has shown a mature approach to her loss. View from a student-Year 8 female pupil March 2018 My sessions with my Mentor are the highlight of my week. She listens to me and encourages me. View from a mentor who is leaving due to getting a full-time job Thanks for the Mentoring opportunity. I will really miss it. I certainly learnt a lot about teenagers and about myself. Schools are currently very stretched financially with central funding cuts having an impact. One teacher recently said to us There have been so many funding cuts over the years and the Bridge does an amazing job at supporting vulnerable children in my school.

Perhaps one of the biggest needs locally is the lack of generational integration. It is so unusual for two people of completely different ages and backgrounds to come together and many of the mentors talk about this as an amazing opportunity to give something back to the community and to show young people that there are people out there who care for them. A significant number of mentors are retired and it is vital that they are able to volunteer in worthwhile causes that really make a difference.

- 2.We ran a pilot scheme in the summer of 2015. This involved the voluntary participation of six young people from Wyvern College. These students were absolutely instrumental in helping us to establish the scheme and were particularly helpful in articulating the key priorities and the needs that existed amongst their peers. They told us about the need for a positive role model to talk to and a non-judgemental listening ear to share their concerns with on their journey through the year. Young people continue to be pivotal in shaping the mentoring scheme. This is evidenced through their ongoing feedback and evaluation. A Year 10 pupil says Mentoring is inspiring for you and for the person you are going to meet ...I have changed in myself cos I can speak more openly and I am more confident. I am telling my friends to get a mentor too. Some of the referrals come from students themselves having heard about the positive experience through a friend
- 3.To date over 50 young people have engaged with the scheme in 4 local secondary schools most of them having met with a mentor every fortnight for an entire year. Currently 13 young people are being mentored within the South Wilts area board catchment. Statistics from the schools indicate that eight of these pupils live within the catchment area for the Board. However new mentees are continually coming on board throughout the academic year. Given the Laverstock schools catchment area and that of Trafalgar it is likely that the majority of these will live within the South Wilts boundary. This cannot be predicted with any accuracy. We are very much aware of the potential for expansion by way of recruiting and training new volunteer mentors so that more young people can be supported. In addition there is the possibility of extending the scheme into more secondary schools. Your funding would enable us to ensure that many more new young people would benefit from this scheme and have a mentor in their lives to support them.

- 4. There is absolutely no charge to young people or their families to engage with the mentoring scheme. We are thrilled that for the cost of one part-time co-ordinator we are able to engage with so many young people who may otherwise not have individual support. It is so cost-effective. The mentoring scheme is also available and accessible to all young people. We welcome anyone who would benefit from a mentor. We also make sure to promote this opportunity to teachers and staff and with pastoral teams. Often the Bridge Mentoring Scheme is part of the official pastoral care route within the schools.
- 5. All of the mentors are volunteers drawn from a wide range of local churches. Mentors are encouraged to come forward via publicity across all of our networks. It should be noted that whilst the Bridge Youth Project is a Christian organisation absolutely nothing about the mentoring scheme is about talking to young people about Christianity. It is simply about the resources of local churches making a difference in the lives of young people.

CEM comment:

The request is to contribute £3352 towards the overall costs of this scheme in 2019/20 which is £13,674 (£600 of which is refreshments and materials, £13,074 of which is the project co-ordinator's salary). Mentoring is proving to be a really effective means of support for young people, and more and more schools are turning to these schemes to reinforce their pastoral care strategies. The applicant has clarified that currently 8 young people out of the 13 being mentored at Wyvern/St Eds live within the Southern Area Board catchment area, but that new pupils will enter the scheme during the year, also at Trafalgar School, a new school wishing to adopt the scheme. The Youth Fund exists to facilitate young people's engagement in positive activities. Some young people need more support than others in order to feel able and confident to engage in positive activities, mentoring is a proven method to assist with this.

Were not quite sure where to put this but it is quite crucial to say that the overall cost of the scheme relates entirely to Kate Moodys Mentoring Coordinator salary of 10800. With Trafalgar wanting to come on board and the scheme now at full capacity we need to increase Kates hours to 25 which would mean the overall costs are 13074. The costs for 18 mentors out of 39 would be 6034 proportionally. The costs for the 10 in the South Wilts Catchment would be 3352. Our income varies from month to month and sometimes our reserves both free and restricted drop down to equal only one and half months expenditure. We have to pay salaries every month and spend roughly 1200-1300 every month to fund the entire work of the charity across 24 local schools. We rely on grants from funders to supplement regular income from other sources which never covers all of our expenditure. We have a 2 year grant from Wiltshire Community Foundation that ends this summer and so we reapply again and also apply to other potential sources but none of these are guaranteed.

This could be funded through hire per session, or through a capital contribution for clubs to purchase the bubble football equipment and run the activities themselves (costs for equipment range from £500 £2k + insurance). The latter option would have implications for each club's public liability insurance and leader training.
- iv. Second favourite option appears to be Innov8 sports activity, then Any Body Can Cook, then Boomsatsuma arts activity.

1. Purpose of the report

To provide Councillors with details of the three issues due for consideration at the cancelled 3 April 2019 Southern Community Area Transport Group, and to present an overview of schemes funded in 2018/19 (see attached).

2. Main Considerations

The three issues are as follows:

(a) Issue 6529. The Borough, Downton. Kerbing of The Green.

There are a number of grassed areas in Downton known as The Green. Over the years these have all been kerbed apart from the green closest to the junction with the A338. This results in the green being overrun and is slowly eroded by both the traffic the weather. As well as being unsightly, the erosion leads to deep potholes along the edge of the Green which then pose a hazard to all vehicles.

The green is owned by Longford Estates and maintained by Downton Parish Council. Downton Parish Council have asked that the final section is kerbed.

This was initially discussed at the Southern CATG meeting on 22 August 2018. At this time it was reported that Longford Estates did not have any funding available to contribute to the cost of the work. The CATG were in principal supportive of the scheme but felt that the owners, Longford Estates should also make a contribution to the work.

Longford Estates have reconsidered their position and are prepared to contribute 50% of the cost of the scheme.

An estimate for the work is £12,500, Longford Estates are prepared to contribute £6250, Downton Parish Council £3125 and therefore the CATG would need to contribute £3125.

(b) Issue 6951 - Long Drove, East Grimstead New village nameplate

The village nameplate for East Grimstead on Long Drove between West and East Grimstead requires replacing. This is likely to be a very low priority for the Area Office and therefore Grimstead Parish Council have made a request to the CATG for funding.

An estimate for the work is approximately £100 and Grimstead Parish Council are prepared to contribute 25%.

(c) Request for contribution to Landford & Ford / Alderbury Parish SID collaboration project - £800.

3. Outstanding Works

There are currently two schemes outstanding;

(a) Issue No: <u>5637</u> White Hill, Pitton Additional Lining Works

This will be complete after the proposed surfacing dressing works have taken place later this year.

(b) Issue <u>6359</u> Winterslow – Middleton Road Kerbing Work in the Bus Layby.

It was agreed at the Southern Area Board on 28 November that this work would be delayed until 2019/20 to allow the work to take place during the school holiday and therefore this scheme is programmed to take place on 8 April 2019.

4. Budget Update

The Southern Community Area Transport Group budget allocation for 2019/20 remains unchanged at £13,676. The current amount unallocated is £17,335 and the budget sheet is appended to this briefing note.

Should the schemes above be approved the funds remaining would be £13,335.

5. Recommendation

That councillors note the overview update as attached, and confirm funding contributions to the schemes listed in this report.

It is well evidenced nationally and locally that engaging young people in positive activities in their leisure time is very positive increasing skills reducing anti-social behaviour and improving relationships in communities. Self-esteem among young people improves pressure is removed from families under stress and communities become more functional. Evidenced in the Audit Commission Tired of Hanging Around Agenda Childrens Plan 13-19 strategy family parenting strategy. Youth clubs give young people a low-cost place to go outside of school offering them a sense of belonging. Club activities and support from club leaders allow young people to develop skills and build confidence and resilience for the future as well as have fun.Old Sarum Youth Club offers free to access diverse positive activities for local young people in a safe structured environment. This provision enables young people to develop skills build constructive friendships try new activities have fun and increase confidence and self esteem. We are applying to the Southern Wiltshire Area Board to help us maintain our youth club which provides crucial provision and support for young people living in Old Sarum and the surrounding area. Our youth club sessions are attended by 10 - 16 year olds we currently have 50 members with an average of between 25 and 30 young people attending each session. Through Youth Action Wiltshire we offer a Young Leaders training and support programme and we encourage local 15 and 16 year olds to take up these roles after completing First Aid Safeguarding Managing Challenging Behaviour Sports and Leadership courses. Young Leaders gain qualifications recognising their achievements and develop a range of transferable skills. They are an important element of our delivery supporting our staff and adult volunteers to deliver sessions and they provide peer role models for other youth club members. Old Sarum Youth Club is inclusive we listen to young people and develop our programme to meet their needs and wishes. We reach many of the Local Area Boards priority groups including young people living in deprived areas those with SEND those from low income families young carers and those from military families. Our staff team are employed by Youth Action Wiltshire this enables seamless links for those members who would benefit from engaging in additional positive activities and support to do so through targeted youth development projects such as Splash NCS and Wiltshire Young Carers Service. This has been really appreciated by the parentscarers and young people themselves. We hold an open day in the summer which includes the whole local community from the very young to older people having fun and experiencing new opportunities this helps to ensure our youth club is known of and utilised by all of our local community. Our programme is currently enhanced by sessions delivered by Anybody Can Cook Go Active Innovate and Boomsatsuma. These sessions enable young people to develop a wide range of skills. Following planning sessions with young people we would like to develop our delivery in the coming year to include work with Wiltshire wildlife Trust. These new sessions would include building wind turbines car racing with solar cars and other practical conservation educational activities. Our sessions are free to access enabling equality of opportunity for all local young people. Our club and centre are accessible for young people with SEND and we adapt our activities to best meet the needs of all engaging young people. We offer off-site activities in the school holidays which are hugely important to some of the young people who may otherwise never have the opportunity. Our club is led by two appropriately qualified and experienced members of staff one being a very passionate PE head of year school teacher. We believe that young people need to be central to the planning and organisation of our club we support members to have open discussions on what they want our club to offer and its timetable which works really well. Our activities are designed to support young people to develop a range of soft skills and this learning and development is supported by our staff young leaders and adult volunteers. We often encourage discussions around different cultures and language positively tackling any potential discrimination and increasing community cohesion. As a minimum the funding we are requesting from Southern Wiltshire Area Board for 2018 to 2019 will help us provide 26 diverse youth club sessions of positive activities engaging a minimum of 50 local young people including those living in deprived areas those with SEND those from low income families young carers and those from military families. We anticipate that 40 of the young people engaging with our youth club will report that they have tried new activities had fun and made friends. A minimum of 35 of the young people will report that they have developed skills and increased confidence.

14. How will you monitor this?

We will record the number of members that our youth club has the number of new members that join during the year the number and content of the positive activities that we provide and the engagement numbers at each session. This will enable us to provide attendance statistics fill rate and hours attended for each young person. With our youth club members we will design a tool to measure the impact that engaging with our sessions has on skill development and confidence. This could take the form of a questionnaire or tool similar to Outcomes Star. We will assess the quality and impact of our delivery with young people and our staff young leader and volunteer team. During and after sessions we will facilitate guided reflection this process of formative evaluation will be used to make continuous improvements to our delivery. We will hold regular committee meetings ensuring members wishes and outcomes to date inform our future plans. We will keep a record of all our income and expenditure which will be overseen by the treasurer and bought along to the regular committee meetings.

Youth Action Wiltshire will continue to provide the In kind support that they currently do which includes free training and DBSs for volunteers free insurance for our activities and HR support. We will use learning and evidence of positive impact from our delivery to secure future alternative funding. Possible future funders of our club include Awards4All and Wiltshire and Swindon Community Foundation. Our committee and young people have come up with two fundraising ideas which we will be developing in the summer increasing our income from fundraising events. We will continue to recruit new volunteers who are crucial to our youth clubs delivery.

How does your project support local needs and priorities?

According to a recent Age Concern and Help the Aged survey, 7 per cent of people 65+ in England say they always or often feel lonely. Including those who say they are sometimes lonely, the figure rises to 33 per cent. (Age UK "Loneliness and Isolation Review")

In 2011, there were around 9,031 people aged 65 and over in South Wiltshire – almost a quarter of the population. Based on the Age Concern survey, there are around 632 elderly South Wiltshire residents who feel lonely all the time, and more than 2,300 who feel lonely sometimes.

Amongst carers over 65, the statistics on loneliness are alarming. 25% of carers say they always feel lonely, and if we include carers who sometimes feel lonely, it rises to a staggering 62%.

Isolation among older carers can be caused by a number of factors:

- The need for the carer to stay with the cared-for person, leaving them both house-bound in many cases;
- The increased financial pressure which forces many to give up social and leisure activities;
- A lack of suitable transport this is more difficult for older carers who are less able to help the cared-for person in and out of a car, or where public transport is limited;

• This isolation is compounded by the fact that older people are less likely to use the internet, which is how most local events are promoted. As a result many elderly carers are not aware of events happening locally. Lack of IT skills also makes it more difficult to stay in touch with friends and family.

We'd like to address this as follows:

- Create a poster and postcard addressing the issue of loneliness and isolation;
- Deliver postcards to 22,000* homes in the South Wiltshire area;
- Place posters in local GP surgeries, libraries, and on community notice boards, and at local markets;
- The print approach is key as it ensures we reach elderly people who do not use social media or the internet. The campaign will also be supported on social media to increase reach and frequency;
- Provide a phone answering service to signpost all elderly South Wiltshire residents (not
 just carers) who respond to the postcard, to local activities and groups. Carers will be
 supported by CSW;
- Introduce a new regular activity group for carers and those they care for, including covering the cost of transport for those who need it;
- Signpost to other organisations already running groups in South Wiltshire.

We are currently trialling this approach in the Melksham, Corsham and Trowbridge community areas. Whilst it is still too early to gauge success, we have already had a number of calls to the service and successfully introduced lonely and isolated older people to local groups.

We are confident that this approach will enable us to engage with elderly people who are lonely or isolated, whom we would otherwise struggle to reach.

*22,000 is a guide number. The actual number of homes will be calculated based on Royal mail postcode data.

How many older people/carers to do you expect to benefit from your project?

50 elderly South Wiltshire area residents who are not currently in contact with local charities and community groups.

With a comprehensive mailing to 22,000 South Wiltshire homes, we hope to reach the majority of lonely elderly people – including carers.

With an average response rate of 1.5% we would expect to directly engage with around 50 South Wiltshire residents over 65 who feel lonely or isolated. We would expect about 25% to be carers and 75% to be non-carers*

Carer Support Wiltshire will handle all enquiries generated by the campaign, offering support to carers and signposting non-carers to relevant local organisations, groups and activities.

*1.5% of the 793 carers and 2,558 non-carers aged 65+ in South Wiltshire who feel lonely or isolated

How will you encourage volunteering and community involvement?

The campaign messaging will include a call to action for volunteering. Respondents interested in volunteering will be directed to the most relevant local organisations and groups based on their interests and experience.

We are currently recruiting a team of volunteers to hand out postcards on popular market days, to help us to further our chances of engaging local people and spreading awareness of the new service. Assuming this approach proves successful, we would repeat this to support a service launch in South Wiltshire.

How will you ensure your project is accessible to everyone (for example: people living with a disability or on low incomes, or vulnerable, or socially isolated etc.)?

Part of Carer support Wiltshire's commitment to this project is to provide help with paying for replacement care and assistance with transport for those carers who would otherwise be unable to attend local group activities.

By organising a new activity group for carers and the cared-for person, we can give those carers who are unable to leave the person they care for, an opportunity for both to get out of the house, enjoy some new mental stimulation, and make new friends.

Carer Support Wiltshire group events are free of charge, as are many other local groups. Our aim is to engage with as many existing free of charge groups and activities as possible.

The blanket mail approach ensures all South Wiltshire residents are reached – including elderly non-internet users.

How will you work with other community partners?

There has been consistent enthusiasm from the community groups we've contacted in Corsham, Melksham, and Trowbridge. All have welcomed the approach and opportunity to take part.

Several charities are involved (including Age UK, Alzheimer's Support, and Wiltshire Centre for Independent Living), and we have so far engaged 64 local community groups and services – all of whom have committed to contacting anyone referred to them within one week and making that person feel welcome.

We will contact all local groups and organisations which run social activities in South Wiltshire, to offer opportunities to get involved in the project. Community partners will need to provide information on their regular events and contact details in order to participate in the campaign. They will not need to commit any resources in the form of staff or funding.

CSW is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children, young people and vulnerable adults engaged in the breadth of its activities. We have a safeguarding policy which outlines the duty and responsibility of staff, volunteers and trustees working on behalf of CSW in relation to the protection of vulnerable adults from abuse.

All CSW staff undergo mandatory Safeguarding Vulnerable Adults from Abuse Training which is refreshed every three years. Managers undertake the Wiltshire Council Safeguarding Vulnerable Adults from Abuse Training for managers.

The designated Vulnerable Adult Protection Officer for CSW is the Chief Executive. The role of the designated officer is to oversee all instances involving adult protection that arise within CSW. They will respond to all vulnerable adult protection concerns and enquiries. Specialist training is provided for this member of staff.

A unique phone number and email address has been set up for the campaign, to enable us to track the exact number of enquiries.

CSW will track carer respondents to measure levels of engagement with CSW services. Non-carer respondents will be tracked (anonymously) from initial contact to referral. We encourage all referral partners to document referrals received from this campaign, and all have agreed to provide feedback to us.

13. If your project will continue after the Wiltshire Council funding runs out, how will you continue to fund it?

This is initially a one off mail out to connect with lonely and isolated elderly people in South Wiltshire. If the approach proves successful, we would plan to repeat the campaign in 24 months.

With data from the first campaign to demonstrate results, we are confident we can secure local corporate funding for future campaigns.

How does your project support local needs and priorities?

Purpose of the role:

The Southern Community Carer Champion will work with local community and existing assets to raise awareness of all age carer services and identify carers who may need additional services. The role will be 1 day per week for 12 months with equipment, management and support provided by Carer Support Wiltshire.

The Carer Champion will develop a better understanding of the needs of carers in Southern Wiltshire, improve access to services and facilitate sustainable support within communities. Rural communities in particular tend to be under served and we see rural areas as a main focus of the Carer Champion.,

The Carer Champion will:

- Provide an outreach service in key community venues to raise awareness of carer services
- Work alongside other services to identify an increasing number all age carers
- Ensure that carers' needs are identified and that they are able to access services

- Talk to and seek the views carers in their local communities on matters related to services provided by the Council or NHS and represent these views at area boards.
- Work with area board and local voluntary groups to encourage joint working and share experience to help new local groups set up.
- Advocate for carers and be a focal point for identifying what service improvements or developments are required
- attend local community groups and events to promote the needs of carers in that area
- Work in collaboration with local services including the public and unpaid carers to develop resources to meet the needs of carers in each area. Ensure that carers are included and well supported

How many older people/carers to do you expect to benefit from your project?

Based on our work in Southern Wiltshire to date, we would expect a Carers champion to support 88 carers.

36 new carers identified and registered. These carers will go on to have assessments and appropriate support.

52 carers connecting to access information or services, or to request a re-assessment.

40 carers engaged through carer clinics at GP surgeries and local libraries.

12 local activity and community groups welcoming lonely carers in their communities.

20 carers will be struggling with their caring role and will need a break.

Only 1 in 10 carers assessed will require ongoing support, and most of those will receive a funded service from Wiltshire Council.

How will you encourage volunteering and community involvement?

The Carer Champion will receive training and support from Carer Support Wiltshire's Volunteer Manager and Volunteer Co-ordinator. CSW has a successful volunteer programme with over 80 active volunteers.

Carer Support Wiltshire's Volunteer Co-ordinator will recruit local volunteers to support the Carer Champion, enabling a much wider reach whilst maintaining a strong community based approach.

Carer Support Wiltshire will provide travel expenses for volunteers supporting the Carer Champion.

How will you ensure your project is accessible to everyone (for example: people living with a disability or on low incomes, or vulnerable, or socially isolated etc.)?

Carer support Wiltshire's focus for this project is to develop local community resources and connections, which are sustainable and which provide carers with low cost or no cost sources of support ion their own community.

The Carer champion will have access to CSW appeal funds to provide respite care and assistance with transport for those carers who would otherwise be unable to attend local group activities. Carer Support Wiltshire group events are free of charge, as are many other local groups. The carer champion will be available for consultations and support at easily accessible local venues such as GP Surgeries and libraries as well as carer cafes and group meetings.

How will you work with other community partners?

Carer Support Wiltshire has a track record of collaborating with organisations, companies, community groups and local government. CSWs work with community partners includes making and receiving referrals, joint projects and resource sharing. CSW's network of community partners in the Southern community area will provide the Carer Champion with immediate access to key stakeholders. The network includes organisations such as:

The Carer Champion will expand and strengthen this network to increase awareness of the support that is available for carers and to learn about the specific needs and challenges of carers in the Southern Community area.

CSW is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children, young people and vulnerable adults engaged in the breadth of its activities. We have a safeguarding policy which outlines the duty and responsibility of staff, volunteers and trustees working on behalf of CSW in relation to the protection of vulnerable adults from abuse.

All CSW staff undergo mandatory Safeguarding Vulnerable Adults from Abuse Training which is refreshed every three years. Managers undertake the Wiltshire Council Safeguarding Vulnerable Adults from Abuse Training for managers.

The designated Vulnerable Adult Protection Officer for CSW is the Chief Executive. The role of the designated officer is to oversee all instances involving adult protection that arise within CSW. They will respond to all vulnerable adult protection concerns and enquiries. Specialist training is provided for this member of staff.

12. Monitoring your project.

How will you know if your project has been successful? *required field

Carer Support Wiltshire has embedded feedback and reporting into every project and area of work. We produce detailed quarterly reports to Wiltshire Council on outcomes and achievements against agreed goals and targets.

We will use the same tools and processes to measure the success of this project. Carers feedback is captured through feedback forms, anonymous surveys, group discussions and focus groups.

For this project we will be recording details from those who engage with the service, including:

- Where they live (postcode only)
- What challenges their caring role presents
- How often they feel able to do the things they would like
- If they have any additional support needs
- What prevents them from doing the things they like e.g. having no-one to do things with, lacking transport, lacking money, caring responsibilities, disability

We will then follow up to measure outcomes against these initial details.

13. If your project will continue after the Wiltshire Council funding runs out, how will you continue to fund it?

Funding requested is for 1 year. Our belief is that the Carer Champion role will have significant impact on raising awareness and enabling more carers to access support and engage with community activities. The detailed data which will come out of this 1 year funded period will enable us to create a strong proposal to Trusts and Corporate partners to continue funding the program. Additionally, the contacts and network development carried out by the Carers Champion will become part of the CSW referral network, ensuring better referrals pathways and improved communication between organisations.
