43 Mere Electric Car Club Update

The Strategic Engagement and Partnership Manager (SEPM) Karen Linaker provided an update on the Mere Electric Car Club. The SEPM explained that Co Cars, a not-for-profit cooperative social enterprise that already successfully runs a network of shared, low and zero-emission cars across the South West. It was

noted that £10,000 has been approved for the Club to be located and operate in Mere.

The Area Board were asked to approve the legal agreement for the delivery of electric cars from early 2023.

Resolved:

- 1. To approve the terms of and authorise entry into the Grant Agreement between Wiltshire Council and Co Cars for the Mere Car Club project, as detailed in the report.
- 2. To delegate to the Strategic Engagement and Partnerships Manager, after consultation with the local unitary councillor, authority to extend the date of the project launch (capped at a 6 month extension), should delays occur to the estimated timetable above

44 Private Sector Renters - Fuel Poverty Update

The Area Board received an update from the Strategic Engagement and Partnership Manager (SEPM) Karen Linaker following concerns raised at the last Area Board meeting about energy efficiency in privately rented homes in south west Wiltshire and how to seek advice and support.

The briefing note acknowledged that private landlords required support, guidance and ideally funding assistance to help bring their properties up to the required standard. The note provided links to help and advice for tenants and landlords in relation to private housing, Council housing and other social housing.

The Director of Assets and Community Development, Simon Hendey, confirmed that there was financial support for renters and landlords from a community interest company and detail is available at this link – https://www.lendology.org.uk/about/.

45 <u>Community Safety Group</u>

The Strategic Engagement and Partnership Manager (SEPM), Karen Linaker, provided a brief update of the work of the Group. The SEPM explained that the Group had been operating for the last 18 months and reminded the Area Board that the Group met with the Police to discuss community safety issues, mainly surrounding concerns about speeding. It was suggested that other areas of interest could be discussed at future meetings, including anti-social behaviour and domestic abuse.

Wiltshire Families and Children's Transformation (FACT) Partnership Family Help Project Background Briefing November 2022

Wiltshire's multi-agency FACT partnership has identified how we work together as a system to provide early intervention and prevention (Family Help) as a priority transformation activity for the next two years.

These new Family Help arrangements will ensure that children, young people and families are able to access the right help at the right time through a co-ordinated approach to prevention and early intervention through:

- a co-ordinated approach at a whole population/universal level to prevent needs from arising and to build resilience across all residents
- a robust multi-agency approach to spotting any additional needs at the earliest point and providing effective joined-up support that prevents the needs from escalating further

There are certain elements that partners have agreed to develop and roll out across the whole of Wiltshire from the New Year whilst other elements are planned to be tested in a locality pilot approach in the Warminster and Westbury area.

Across Wiltshire, the project will deliver:

- A clear unifying brand for Family Help
- Online database of services, community resources & activities
- Co-ordinated whole system workforce development offer
- Consistency of core approaches across the Early Help workforce

The Warminster & Westbury pilot will also develop & test the benefits of:

- Wrapping a dedicated group of identified Early Help services & community groups around a cluster of schools/settings; embedding them in the communities they serve
- Establishing a local contact point for Early Help requests for support & case discussion whereby the responses make best use of local resources including the voluntary & community sector
- More flexible working practice with core workers delivering intervention in the place, way & time that achieves best impact eg home, school, online, group, breakfast time, evening
- A locally led inclusive & welcoming local community of practice for Early Help responding to local needs, identifying & sharing learning & good practice, engaging in reflective dialogue related to the pilot activity, promoting & delivering agreed culture & practice change activity



- Securing strong transition with a focus on pupils that need it most & joining up where siblings span multiple schools
- Specialist input on key themes including mental health, ASD, parental conflict & challenging behaviour delivered locally & taking account of the local context
- Local consultation mechanisms to ensure that we understand the needs & lived experience of children, young people & families in Warminster & Westbury

We are at the stage of engaging with the key local stakeholders in the pilot area to further develop our thinking and ensure that the next stage of activity is informed by their views, experience and context.

As such, we will be setting up a range of briefings and consultation meetings to give all services and groups in Warminster and Westbury the chance to hear more about the background thinking and to start to input to the plan for the pilot activity. There will be subsequent meetings that will involve wider stakeholders as we build an inclusive partnership to create and deliver the local model – we want to understand and make the most of the good practice and assets already in place locally as well as creating and testing new arrangements that will subsequently inform the pan-Wiltshire model. To enable the project to achieve its full potential we will be looking to engage with the widest possible network of organisations as well as setting up specific mechanisms to ensure that the voice of children, young people and families is at the heart of the project.

VCSE Alliance (BSW Integrated Care Board) Update

Over the past 18 months voluntary sector colleagues across the county have been working with their Integrated Care System colleagues to develop new ways of working and transformation.

At this time of change it is vital that the voices of the sector and the people they support are heard and reflect services planned. This work is taking place across the Bath/Swindon/Wiltshire (BSW) area.

The three Councils for Voluntary Services (CVS) - 3SG, Voluntary Action Swindon (VAS), Wessex Community Action (WCA) and Community First, the Rural Community Council for Wiltshire and Swindon, are working together to ensure that the right VCSE input is sought for decisions made on a locality level through their respective place based VCSE alliances.

In Wiltshire a VCSE Leadership Alliance made up of CEO's operating in Wiltshire who lead organisations who are providing significant health and social care support around older age, youth, carers, mental health, dementia, physical activity, culture and general prevention can act as a central point of contact and a front door into the sector for colleagues in health and the Local Authority.

This Wiltshire VCSE Leadership Alliance is just one strand of the mechanism to strengthen, involve and inform the sector. Both Community First and Wessex Community Action offer infrastructure support to the sector and have far reaching networks and forums. These include the voluntary sector forum, which brings together predominantly smaller VCSE partners, the Children's and Families Voluntary Sector Forum, Wiltshire Village Halls Association, Community transport groups, the Wiltshire Inclusion Network (WIN), youth clubs and the Volunteer Manager Forum. All offering clear pathways in and out and a strong reach into the wider sector.

So far the VCSE Leadership Alliance has been establishing its role in the BSW ICB, developing its governance and terms of reference and has offered views and feedback on important pieces of developing work including the BSW Health and Care model, which you can find more about here: BSW Health and Care model. The group has also supported by offering views on BSW population health programme, BSW Together's constitution and has also been involved in the development of BSW's place based alliances in BaNES, Swindon and Wiltshire.

Vehicle speed data from SIDs in Fovant, Wiltshire

Background leading to the purchase of three SIDs for the village

Fovant is a village of about 700 souls, on the A30 some 7 miles west of Wilton, sitting in the SW Wiltshire Area Board. It is bordered by a short stretch of the A30 with a speed limit of 30 mph, and from that junction there are two internal village roads heavily used by private and commercial traffic. These roads are now in 20mph limits. One of these internal roads leads in four miles to Tisbury, which has a population of about 2,400: the other route leads through other villages to the A303. These roads in Fovant are each more than ½ mile long - with a heavy density of houses, few footpaths, narrow in many places and winding often with poor visibility for drivers. With a heavy footfall, pedestrians often must share these roads with vehicles in potentially dangerous circumstances. The considerable expansion of housing in the locality, both updating and new developments, and the number of SMEs, all support the assumption that much of the traffic is regular. It would follow that some of the speeding is likely to be persistent.

After metrocounts were carried out on these internal village roads, in 2016 we were allowed to change their speed limits from 30 to 20 mph. On advice from Highways Engineers the parish paid for these roads to be well signed with 20mph roundels and repeater posts. Then in 2018, the Area Board part funded the purchase of SIDs to groups of parishes, and Fovant Parish Council (FPC) agreed to share a SID with the nearby villages of Swallowcliffe and Ansty. This device needed to be moved from village to village at approximately three week intervals; when the SID was in Fovant, it attracted positive comments from residents, but then there were criticisms during the longer periods when it was absent. The fact that some speeds showing on the SID were in the high 20s reinforced concerns about the survivability risks for pedestrians. It proved not possible to extract data indicating numbers and speeds of vehicles over particular time periods during the day.

In response to continuing pressure from residents, in 2021 FPC asked the Area Board for a grant towards the purchase of three SID devices, to be based at fixed locations on the internal roads, all on privately owned roadside land. FPC decided to relinquish its share of the existing SID so that the other two villages could increase their usage. Our new devices would be up to date and accessible, and the FPC or other volunteers would provide a service to extract and present accumulated data to the Authorities. The primary objectives of the scheme were three fold:

- a) to increase the awareness of drivers in these 20 mph limits;
- b) by working with the police, to provide speed data as a case for urgent police action in Fovant if there were significant numbers of vehicles exceeding unsafe and enforceable speeds;
- c) In due course to provide evidence for the inhibitory effect of a SID.

There was an implicit understanding that FPC would inform other parishes of the Area Board about progress towards these objectives, given that speeding is a frequently voiced concern in the group. All in all, we hoped our project would reflect the considerable contribution from the Area Board budget.

After an extensive professional survey of possible devices, the Fovant team decided to purchase Evolis SIDs from Elan City. They were installed in early 2022. Since then, visual observation of the speeds showing on these SIDs over the considerable distance from when the SID is triggered

indicates two different types of driver behaviour: conforming to the speed limit or slowing down a little to below or near the limit; or considerably exceeding the limit and not reducing speed at all during the approach to the SID.

Late in 2021, shortly before the SIDs were installed and operational, FPC asked for repeats of metrocount surveys at approximately the intended SID locations. Those data showed that 40-60% of vehicles were exceeding the ACPO recommended limit of 110% plus 2 mph, during any of the 1 hour periods throughout the day.

Data extraction developed in Fovant

In an attempt to try and direct police activity more efficiently, some post-processing has been done on data recorded by all three SIDs installed in Fovant, with the objective of showing when, between the hours of 6am and 10pm, speeding had occurred.

A sample spreadsheet generated for one of the three SIDs is **attached in a PDF file.** These SID results for the Dinton Road location in July 2022 are broadly similar to the metrocount results from a nearby location late in 2021. The July 2022 results for the Tisbury Road and High Street SID locations were also consistent with the last lot of metrocount data.

Liaison with Wiltshire Authorities

In April 2022, FPC wrote to Philip Wilkinson, the new Wiltshire PCC, to introduce our SID project. We said we felt ready to start the next stage, interaction with the police by providing data. We had inferred from the OPCC flyer put out by Zara-Ann Prendergast that this may be through contact with the new cadre of Community Enforcement Officers. We had heard briefings by CPT Police Inspectors at our Area Board, but these had only mentioned of data from CSW efforts. Over the years, FPC had considered trying to organise CSW, but lacking pavements and with narrow roads there were serious safety concerns and we had never managed to get volunteers.

The PCC replied that he would pass our case to John Derryman, Wiltshire CSW coordinator. Mr Derryman would be able to brief us on new moves to collate data to better target speeding 'hotspots' and persistent offenders.

Wiltshire Pilot study. Shortly afterwards, FPC was invited to join an ongoing Pilot Study in South Wiltshire. The coordinator Adrian Turnbull explained to us that the objective it to define a standard data format which all SID locations should then apply. He said there were already 93 devices across Wiltshire. He stressed that the design of the format would very much be driven by what the databases maintained by Wiltshire Police will accept.

In early August FPC sent Mr Turnbull examples of our simple data readouts showing numbers of vehicles exceeding 25mph in 1 hour periods, a 'speeding' threshold chosen for the readout but which could easily be changed. These actual data were a direct indication of law breaking in Fovant by motorists, with a third and often more exceeding speeds where prosecution is accepted to be enforceable. In reply, Mr Turnbull spelled out the information categories proposed for the future Wiltshire-wide SID inputs to the police. These included number of measurements, average speed, and maximum speed. There was no mention of direct indicators of speeding such as demonstrated by our data handling process — for example as we have done by setting an illustrative threshold of 25mph for traffic in these 20 limits.

Utility for immediate alerts to the Police about law breaking.


We believe we have demonstrated an elegant scheme for data extraction, developed by volunteers in Fovant, that could be applied to provide a direct and unambiguous alert to the Police


- that a significant proportion of motorists are exceeding speed limits;
- describing the time periods when enforcement interventions are likely to succeed;
- that would require minimal IT processing by the police before they take action.


Rapid responses by the police to simple alerts of this type provided by volunteers, indicating lawbreaking would

- increase confidence in the police;
- act as the deterrent to persistent law breaking by some drivers that is currently largely absent;
- reinforce a benchmark that would influence future driver behaviour in that locality.

We suggest that this method of data extraction and presentation could be taken up more generally in Wiltshire as one of the executive tools to inform Community Enforcement Officers. It could be used in parallel with any assessment of more complex data bases to inform future policy decisions regarding high risk speeding locations across the County.



Stop and Search information for Warminster CPT



Inceptor Al Lumley has been promoted to Chief Inspector and has moved to Swindon. Sgt Louise Oakley has stepped up to the Inspector role until Jan 2023- On 3 rd January Inspector Harmsworth will start his new role as Inspector for Warminster Westbury, Mere, Tisbury community policing team Neighbourhood policing is a force priority and there will be uplift posts so there will be recruitment for more PCs for NPT and they need to be in place by April 2023 – we currently hold three PC post this will increase to 5.
ASB – YOUTH CRIME Page	***MAIN PRORITY*** NPT are aware that ASB and youth crime has escalated since the summer, and the team are working hard to tackle this — We have reports of general ASB, Public order offences, theft and Damage — Both in Warminster and Westbury PC MIKE OBERN is working hard with the response teams to robustly deal with youths — but its not as easy as it seems. We are communicating well with ER CCTV and King down school who are willing to assist us where they can The team successfully got a dispersal order placed on for Warminster over the weekend of 29 th and 30 th October, a number of youths were stopped, issued a notice and parents notified to collect their children and taken them home. Pc Tom Newman and PCSO Stew Hunt are working together to tackle the ASB in Westbury.
Shoplifting Spike, including Warminster	There was a spike in shoplifting in the surrounding area, however since September this has decreased, the work with CCTV and shop watch is working well, and we have detected the most recent shop lifting offences but is worthy of mentioning for wider acknowledgement that there might be an other spike showing early signs of the cost of living increase effecting people's behaviour. This has dropped of our exceptions as well for the last month. Coming in to December and Christmas period we will be concentrating efforts around proactive patrols for shop lifting, PC Tom Newman and PC Mike Obern will work together and conduct some plain clothes ops with the support of the PCSOS.
Speed Enforcement & CSW	The latest stats provided by the various Community Speed Watch teams show that over the last quarter, the Upper Deverill's have consistently the highest proportion of speeding motorists (approx. 1 in 10). In response, the local teams in conjunction with the roads policing units are increasing their presence in the area wherever possible. As a large proportion of speeders are statistically from the local area – this is a polite reminder to watch your speed. We encourage towns, Villages to set up CSW.
PEEL Inspection Progress	Following on from the previous Area Board update and the input on the PEEL inspection by HMICFRS (where Wiltshire Police were placed into 'special measures') We are please to say that progress in improving the areas most critical are well underway. Significant changes to team structures have been made to ensure serious and complex criminal investigations get a more consistent service, as well as a review underway for the structure of uniformed policing across the county. I would like to point out and direct everyone to our Wiltshire police website which is the central point for updates on PEEL progress and will be updated after each meeting of the PPOG.

Stop and Search information for Salisbury CPT

During the 12 months leading to August 2022, 136 stop and searches were conducted in the Salisbury area of which 69.1% related to a search for controlled drugs.

During 74.3% of these searches, no object was found. In 25.7% of cases, an object was found. Of these cases 74.3% resulted in a no further action disposal; 19.8% resulted in police action being taken; 11% resulted in an arrest.

Of the stop and search subjects who defined their ethnicity:

- White 113 stop and searches
- Black or Black British 6 stop and searches
- Asian or Asian British 1 stop and search
- Chinese or other ethnic group 1 stop and search



Local Priorities & Updates

Priority	Update
Non dwelling burglaries	We have seen an increase in reported non-dwelling burglaries across the area. We have increased our presence in our rural communities during the evening and nights, as these areas tend to be targeted more. We are continuing to work with our colleagues from Dorset and Hampshire in building intelligence and carrying out proactive operations.
Vulnerability Patrols / Closure Notices	Officers conduct regular visits to our identified vulnerable people to both reassure them following reported concerns and to deter visits by criminals who wish to exploit them. We have been working closely with Wiltshire Council Housing on evidence to support several injunctions which we have now got in place. These premises are visited regularly by the teams to provide support to those who are most vulnerable.
Community Speed Watch	Officers from the neighbourhood and response teams have continued to support our CSW colleagues where possible out in the community.

Rural Crime continues to be a focus for the team with increased reports of poaching / hare coursing over the past weeks. We are continuing to conduct proactive operations with our neighbouring forces and our Rural Crime Team in tackling rural crime.

Local Priorities & Updates Continued

Priority	Update
ASB	We have received a number of reports of ASB in Churchill Gardens, Odstock Road and some areas in Laverstock. Some of these reports have mentioned the use of catapults. Officers have been engaging with local residents to try and identify possible offenders. Targeted patrols are being conducted in these areas to increase visibility and community reassurance.
Rogue Traders	We have continued to receive reports of rogue traders operating across the area. Officers have carried out several proactive operations with our partner agencies. A number of persons have been checked with regards to the services they are advertising and providing to the community to ensure the work is legitimate. Officers have also delivered a number of security advise leaflets in several areas which have previously been targeted.
Shoplifting	This time of year sees an increase in report of shoplifting offences many of which are reported as bulk shoplifting incidents. The neighbourhood team will be involved in a number of proactive operations in the city centre to provide additional visibility and to deter possible suspects from committing such offences.

The South-West Wiltshire Area Board in June 2022 reviewed available local data and evidence, and integrated this with local knowledge and community conversation to agree the following local priority themes:

Each priority theme has a series of more specific local actions that the Strategic Engagement and Partnership Manager and Area Board Delivery Officer will work with the South-West Wiltshire Area Board to positively address them. The full action plan can be found at the end of this document. Two examples of support and change that the Area Board has influenced since last reporting in September 2022 are:

Improve engagement with young people

Working with Seeds4Success to set up new counselling and trampolining sessions as additional activities for the ongoing Health & Wellbeing Youth Nights at the Nadder Centre

These are activities the young people have demonstrated a clear need for and corresponds with the Nadder Centre Steering Group's request that more activities for young people be facilitated at the centre

The Area Board will be asked to contribute funding towards the new counselling and trampolining offer at the December meeting

Key links to Wiltshire Council's Business Plan: We Get the Best Start in Life; We Live Well Together.

Support older people and vulnerable adults health and wellbeing

Began delivery of the Carer Support Wiltshire Make A Friend Be A Friend initiative in Wilton and Barford St Martin. Publicity has begun and the new phone line and volunteer team is set up.

This initiative was funded by the area board before the pandemic to offer an additional means to support isolated older people connect with and actively participate in local activities.

EV Charging Point Infrastructure (EVCPI) Grant Scheme

What: Small grants up to £2500 – can sit alongside ORCS funding if criteria are met. Intended for 'fast' charger suitable for resident charging (usually 7kWh chargers which provide a full charge in c7hrs).

Who: Town & Parish Councils can apply (also on behalf of Village Halls).


Where: On sites owned by Wiltshire Council or other landowner, provided the site is feasible and there is some demand and community support. Can apply for multiple sites if they are suitable.

When: Open now: ORCS funding only certain until March 2023





Area Board Briefing Note – Cost of Living Update – November 2022

Cost of Living Update - November 2022

As detailed in the update to Full Council in October, Wiltshire Council is focusing on three principal areas to meet the Cost of Living crisis, namely support for Businesses, Our Staff and the People in our communities.

The Council has provided extensive coordination of resources on a <u>dedicated Cost of Living page</u>. This includes links to information for sources of national and local support.

Officers have worked to pull together to create an interactive directory that allows people to find out what warm spaces and community food providers are in their immediate local area. The directory also includes what other facilities and services are provided at each location.

The directory has been created using information collected by the Council to establish what support is already up and running in the county and will be regularly updated.

Wiltshire Council's friendly library staff will be playing their part too, by working with Warm and Safe Wiltshire and The Rural Communities Energy Support Network, to assist residents seeking basic energy advice and make referrals to experienced energy advisors in all but its smallest libraries. All libraries will be able to signpost people to community partners and agencies that can support people through the rising cost of living. Libraries will also be collection points for Warm Packs, which includes a hot water bottle and blanket, for anyone who would benefit from some free essentials. These will be available for collection soon.

As well as existing customer contact channels, the Council is planning how to use the Wellbeing Hub line to help people find the right support.

Support for Businesses and Schools

The Enterprise Network (set up by the Council) is hosting a series of webinars designed to provide start up and small businesses help, support and advice to guide businesses through the current economic challenges. To find out more about the Take TEN series and to join the webinars or watch videos, people can go to: www.theenterprisenetwork.co.uk/support/cost-of-doing-business.

As part of the carbon reduction work, School Leaders are being encouraged to sign up to the Energy Sparks programme which can help them get on top of their energy bills and find ways to reduce costs. We are also supporting Council maintained schools with a grant to access their half hourly smart meter data for a year to give them the data they need to make informed choices.



Support for Staff

As well as ensuring staff have access to wellbeing and support resources, including a new Mental Health Advocate scheme, the Council will review policies and processes as appropriate, and will consider how staff can be flexibly deployed to meet emerging need.

Targeted Support in the Community

The Council has been administering the Government's national Household Support Grant Scheme designed to support those most in need across England, to help with the significantly rising living costs in the period up to the end of March 2023. The money can be used to support households in the most need who would otherwise struggle with energy bills, food and water bills, particularly those who may not be eligible for the other support that the Government has recently made available but who are nevertheless in need.

The council has been awarded £2,728,656 in total and has worked with partner agencies to allocate the money and ensure it gets to those who need it most. Payments began in October and are continuing to be made. People do not need to apply to Wiltshire Council as those eligible will be identified and contacted.

The Council is working with partners in the VCSE sectors to promote their campaign to encourage donations, particularly from those who have surplus fuel rebates, to help fund schemes to support those most in need.

Wiltshire Council has also provided funding to Wiltshire Community Foundation and partners to deliver support under the Surviving Winter campaign which provides practical and financial help for people living in fuel poverty. From 1 November, people who are in receipt of means-tested benefit and are aged over 65 or suffer from a long-term health condition, may be eligible for assistance including fuel vouchers and a range of advice. Funding is also being provided to Age UK Wiltshire for provision and delivery of hot meals to isolated elderly residents who are unable to meet the cost of this service themselves; for further information contact Age UK Community Meals on 01793 279606.

Support during the holidays

Wiltshire Council will be delivering its successful Holiday Activity and Food (FUEL) programme again this winter. The programme provides children eligible for benefits related free school meals, refugees, those currently in the care system and those referred by a professional service with access to free high quality activities, nutritious meals and food education during the school holidays.

The FUEL programme is delivered with funding from the Department for Education and



will run from Monday 19 December – Thursday 22 December. Eligible families will be able to sign up by following the application link listed on <u>FUEL programme - Wiltshire Council</u> The application window is open now until December 11, please sign up early to avoid disappointment.

The camps provide the opportunity for all participants to take part in a range of enriching activities including structured sports, arts and crafts, STEM activities, laser tag, circus skills, robotics and much more. Participants also will take part in nutritional workshops and be provided with a hot lunch each day.

Two FUEL Christmas camps specifically for young people with special educational needs and/or a disability will also place at Springfield Community Campus in Corsham and at Five Rivers Health and Wellbeing Centre in Salisbury and individuals will be able to take part in activities such as dodgeball, dance, new age kurling, cricket and boccia. Highway Maintenance Update – SW Wilts November 2022

I'm sorry that I can't be present at the LHFIG meeting in person due to current illness.

We are in the winter season now with gritting taking place when temperatures fall low enough at the beginning and end of the day; the combination of regular rainfall followed by frosts and the application of road salt, is likely to accelerate wear and tear to road surfaces and lead to larger numbers of potholes forming unfortunately. To deal with this our pothole and hot materials gangs use premium grade tarmac materials through the autumn and winter months to try and make repairs last longer and cope with wet conditions etc.

At this point of the year all the process's that rely on fair summer weather and higher ambient temperatures have had their programmes concluded, so Surface Dressing, White Lining, Spray Injection/Jet Patcher works etc will not take place again until late spring/summer of the new financial year 2023/24, assuming budgets are again made available for that to happen.

Some of you may be aware that our Term Maintenance Contractor Ringway who currently delivers all highway maintenance works, were unsuccessful in re-bidding for the contract recently. Consequently Milestone Ltd will be replacing them from the 1st of April 2023 going forward. Although there will be some inevitable minor disruption due to the mobilisation and de-mobilisation respectively by the contractors involved, highway maintenance service will continue to be delivered throughout that period and in the future. Existing operatives will be transferred to the new employer under TUPE regulations and that will of course include the existing parish stewards.

Reactive Surfacing works are continuing to take place in SW Wilts which involve local hand patching and minor machine lay of hot tarmac materials, with good results being achieved at local sites such as Teffont Evias, Broad Oak Farm Semley and Rookery Lane Swallowcliffe, where hard and repeated lobbying including by elected members and some parish councils, have secured works that have been needed for some while. Reactive works at Place Farm in Court Street Tisbury have unfortunately delayed due to difficulties with the

diversion routes for the required temporary road closure clashing with other programmed closures, but these are expected to be overcome and the works re-scheduled shortly.

The major maintenance major scheme list which is administered centrally, caters for those sites where the defects or near end of life carriageway conditions dictate that full scale resurfacing or reconstruction works are required to restore good carriageway condition at an individual site.

The major scheme list has now been expanded to include a rolling programme that extends up until 2030, meaning that sites that have already been identified can be prioritised and programmed as and when budget and resources become available between now and that date. The rolling nature of it also means that if "new" sites of high priority (like on a high speed road) are identified, they can be added and the running order will inevitably be shuffled around.

Recent budgetary constraints due to the inflationary pressures on all of us have had significant effects on local authority budgets and the major maintenance one is no exception. So the increased costs of bitumen, fuel, construction materials, labour and national insurance etc have resulted in some schemes having to be put back to a later date; an example of this in our area would be the C25 Hindon Lane Tisbury, where likely resurfacing will now be moved back into the next financial year, at the earliest. The imminent scheme for Lower Road Quidhampton should proceed as planned hopefully for the end of January, beginning of February 2023 however.

Sites for Surface Dressing (tar and chip) which is the preferred surface treatment for rural roads, continue to be chosen and managed by our consultants Atkins from survey and inspection data that they collate and analyse, rather than by WC staff.

Before leaving the subject of major maintenance provision, I can confirm that I have again submitted a number of sites for any new verge overrun damage programme for the new financial year 2023/24, for rural roads, with The Raceplain Road at Netherhampton as a local priority. With regard to the latter the major maintenance team having assessed that, are currently of the opinion that the extent of works required does not justify priority treatment. I'm not happy with that and am working on "Plan B" accordingly!

Also the very dry summer just passed has resulted in many rural roads across the county that "sit" over shrinkable clay sub-grade becoming damaged by heat stress, with cracking and heaving evident as a result to various degrees of severity. The prevalence of shrinkable clay in the Knoyles and Mere areas in particular has resulted in me bringing those to the attention of the major maintenance team and asking for action. However both this programme as well as the one for verge overruns is currently un-funded within major maintenance, so hopefully funds will be made available in the next financial year to take those initiatives forward.

Other required major works and schemes regarding improvements to highway drainage continue to be passed to that team by me, resulting in a small number of CCTV drainage investigations currently taking place across the area, such as in Teffont Magna this week; commitments to fully investigate and potentially replace the suspected collapsed highway culvert at Broad Oak Semley and the clearing of silt in the Culvert under The Dene in Hindon (once the bridge parapet recently damaged again by an HGV is repaired first) – have been secured from that team.

Turning to more routine local maintenance operations, Annual now Autumn season verge cutting has been under way for a few weeks now with our subcontractor Simon Jackson and our local WC tractors cutting both grass and some hedges where the council have responsibility that are also on gritting routes, where the gritters sometimes struggle with available road width.

Once the grass cutting has been completed the intention is to get the tractors mechanically cutting drainage grips, both known priorities, as well as those identified by the parish stewards.

The local Gully Tanker crew continue to empty gullies on the schedule, with priority given to high risk and high speed roads first, as well as doing ad-hoc emptying and jetting responding to specific incidents and concerns, such as in Wilton, East Knoyle, Hindon and Mere recently, to name a few.

In addition the Vactor tanker with a traffic management crew has just paid the area one of it's quarterly visits and worked on a number of sites and post-flooding issues such as the A350 Turnpike at East Knoyle and Station Road Semley. This resource has recently been joined by an additional machine "Vactor 2", whose additional power and jetting facilities will hopefully increase effectiveness in clearing any blocked drainage runs.

The Fovant Chapel will provide the location for the Fovant Food Bank. This is to be run under the umbrella of the Trussell Trust. It will provide a warm, discreet, welcoming place for those in need, to access food supplies, a welcome, a listening ear and a hot drink and biscuit. There will be information signposting to other sources of help and advice to those in need in the Village. A concise, informative leaflet will be designed and delivered to every home in Fovant, which will provide written information signposting to organisations and places of help and support. Timely communication and information will be shared on the Residents Facebook Page and the Village Website: www.fovantvillage.com. This will ensure that all will be able to access the information they need. A winter coat bank will provide the opportunity for the donation of warm coats and clothing. Blankets and hot water bottles will be available to assist with reducing the negative effects experienced by those unable to heat their homes adequately to keep warm. The Waterside Youth Club will open specifically for the provision of a Warm Space for 5 hours each week. These sessions will be for adults over 18 only. There will be hot drinks and biscuits provided, as well as a friendly ear and warm space to read, chat or take part in activities such as board games and jigsaws. The Village Hall is extending 2 existing weekly activities offering a cup of soup and bread roll a hot drink and biscuits for no charge, although donations will be gratefully accepted. Free Wifi will be provided, giving the opportunity for working, accessing emails and online information, enabling connectivity and reducing anxiety and isolation. Activities such as board games, newspapers and magazines will be available. The possibility of holding film afternoons are under discussion, which would give villagers an opportunity to come together for an enjoyable and sociable time, not only addressing potential issues with adequate warmth but also that of loneliness and vulnerability. The licensing implications of this kind of activity are being researched. Demographics given by the GP at The Spring Orchard Surgery as of 8th November 2022, state that, out of a total of 575 Fovant residents registered, 18.5 % are over 75 years, 5% are at increased risk of covid complications and 21% live alone. These figures demonstrate the potential need for the provision of warm, welcoming, non-judgmental spaces. The Spring Orchard Surgery will hold a weekly health and wellbeing GP - led drop in session, hosted by the Waterside, offering a safe, confidential environment within which concerns and anxieties can be discussed by those less confident in attending the Surgery through the usual appointment system. The Spring Orchard Surgery, The Fovant Chapel, The Village Hall, the Waterside and the Fovant Community Support Group are all part of the Fovant Network who are working together to create Neighbourhood Warmth to those in need over the colder months.

Project Summary:

Local Youth Action Scheme is a social action initiative targeted at young people who are in school years 11 or 12 or of that age. It is a project that was designed by local young people to replace our delivery of NCS which had become to focussed on participant numbers and not on the individuals and their needs and potential outcomes from engagement. The project will run intensively over 4-5 week period in June & July and young people will take part in team building, training and accreditation, plan and run a project that benefits the community and then enjoy a reward residential in Pembrokeshire as a team to celebrate their achievements.

1. Background

Area Boards have authority to approve funding under powers delegated to them. Under the Scheme of Delegation Area Boards must adhere to the Area Board Funding and Grants Criteria. This document is available on the council's website.

Three funding streams are available to the Area Board, each with an annually awarded amount. These funding streams are as follows:

- Community Area Grants (capital)
- Young People (revenue)
- Health and Wellbeing (revenue)

The Area Board will be advised of the funding available prior to their first meeting of each financial year.

2. Main Considerations

- 2.1. Councillors need to be satisfied that the applications meet the requirements as set out in the Area Board Funding and Grants Criteria and that the health and wellbeing and young persons funding guidelines have been adhered to.
- 2.2. Councillors must ensure that the distribution of funding is in accordance with the Scheme of Delegation to Area Boards.
- 2.3. Councillors need to consider any recommendations made by sub groups of the Area Boards.

3. Environmental & Community Implications

Grant funding will contribute to the continuance and/or improvement of cultural, social and community activity and wellbeing in the community area, the extent of which will be dependent upon the individual project.

4. Financial Implications

Councillors must ensure that the Area Board has sufficient funding available to cover the grants awarded.
