23	Chairman's Announcements			
	The Chairman noted and summarised the written updates included in the agenda pack, including updates on the cost-of-living crisis, the work being done Page 3 of 6 by Wiltshire Libraries to keep local residents online, and the Independent Visitor Scheme.			
24	Partner Updates			
	The Chairman then invited the Area Board's partner organisations to provide any verbal updates in addition to the written ones included in the agenda pack.			
	• Wiltshire Police Inspector Ben Huggins and PS Chris Wickham provided an overview of the neighbourhood policing team structure and highlighted stop-and-search and proportionality data. They mentioned a slight spike in criminal damages in Devizes town centre and a continuation of rural thefts. They highlighted the work being done by community speed enforcement officers to counter speeding offences, and stated that youth violence remained a priority when dealing with anti-social behaviour.			
	Councillor Reay raised the issues recently encountered by several Seend residents in getting through via 101 phone calls. Inspector Huggins reassured the Councillor that Wiltshire Police was in the midst of an active recruitment drive to address shortages in staff at call centres. Councillor Nash also pointed out that there were other ways of reporting crimes such as through the website. The Chairman raised problems with street drinking in the marketplace, to which Inspector Huggins stated that Wiltshire Police were liaising with Wiltshire Council to install a Public Space Protection Order. Noel Woolrych from Opendoors promoted the Safer Streets project currently being undertaken alongside Wiltshire Police, advising that online sessions were being run on 9 and 18 July 2023 via Facebook.			

• Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service (DWFRS)

Watch Manager Philip Flowers and Michael Cleaver provided an update from DWFRS. They promoted their 'safe and well' initiative and advised that the service offered protection for commercial properties with fire safety visits. Councillor Nash added that statistics would be available following an upcoming Fire Authority meeting.

• Devizes Town Council

Simon Fisher, Devizes Town Council clerk, stated that the council were in the process of addressing anti-social behaviour in the town, with consultation likely and evidence required to progress with Wiltshire Council. He noted that a significant concern was the possibility of displacement. Councillor Whitehead and Councillor Nash sought clarity over the size and scope of the ASB order and the likely need for collaboration with Bishop Cannings council.

• Sustainable Devizes

Graham Martin highlighted the recent Sustainability Fair as part of a twinning weekend themed around sustainability, noting the contributions from Nursteed and Devizes Schools. Councillor Reay thanked Mr Martin and the other volunteers for their work putting on the event.

• Opendoors

Noel Woolrych provided a brief update from that morning, involving a range of statistics about the demographic of individuals making use of the service and their number. He expressed his thanks to the local supermarkets for their contributions.

• Devizes and District Foodbank

Alex Montegriffo, community organiser and campaigns manager for Devizes and District Foodbank, provided an update on the work they had been doing. They noted that more people were being supported by the foodbank than at any point since data began, while also highlighting the new project at the St. James Centre, the work of Wiltshire Food, the recent push for affordable school uniform and the Household Support Fund's move to public health. Full details of the report can be found in the agenda pack. The Chairman thanked Alex for their work and emphasised the value of their engagement with the boater communities and other marginalised groups. Councillor Reay also offered her assistance in resolving any outstanding issues regarding the provision of alternative fuel payments.

	Wiltshire Youth For Christ
	Wiltshire Youth For Christ Team Leader Steve Dewar updated the Area Board about the success of their recent Roots for Shoots project and their mentoring work across local secondary schools. He described how teenage boys often lacked positive engagement and how as a result, the team were ensuring that the support systems in place for local young people work properly. The Chairman thanked Steve for his work and paid tribute to the success of youth provision in the community.
25	Area Board end of year review
	The Strategic Engagement and Partnership Manager (SEPM) Richard Rogers and Councillor Muns delivered a pair of presentations on the status of recent community area and youth projects that had been fully or partially funded by Area Board grants over the last two years. Youth Adventure Trust also presented a video highlighting one of their recent success stories and spoke briefly about the work they had been doing with youth people from difficult backgrounds around Devizes.

The presentation drew attention to Indices of Multiple Deprivation, which outlined how deprivation involved more than just income. When summarising the presentation, the SEPM emphasised that Aea Boards were being encouraged to spend money where it was needed most.

	Councillor Nash updated the Area Board on the work he had been involved in regarding school transport plans and the positive prospects of moving towards 'active transport'.
30	Open Floor
	The Chairman then invited those in attendance to ask questions of the Area Board.
	One attendee asked about why Wiltshire Council had been unable to evidence a 5-year housing land supply. Councillor Whitehead explained how due to inevitable peaks and troughs in the housing land supply, the Council was occasionally vulnerable to unwanted development as they could not factor in certain existing but unfinished developments. Councillor Whitehead asserted that the system currently used focused too much on land supply and not enough on delivery, also stating that the system was unsuitable for a county as large as Wiltshire.
	Another attendee posited that proposed social housing in Devizes was being built in the wrong place, too far out from the town centre and connected to the dangerously fast Caen Hill dual carriageway. The Chairman explained that the Area Board was unable to discuss the application to avoid pre-determination, Councillor Whitehead assured the attendee that even though the Council was proposing the development, the process for applying was no different to anyone else and would be scrutinised by Planning Officers like any other application. He encouraged the public to attend the Planning Committee meeting and make their views known, estimating that it would likely appear before a Committee in the Autumn.
	Paul Stevens, Chairman of Great Cheverel Parish Council, raised a highways issue with the Area Board, stating that the high street had been badly damaged

	but did not know who would pay for the repairs. Councillor Muns suggested that Mr Stevens speak to Councillor Muns outside the meeting to gather evidence and also advised on a Wiltshire Council webinar on potholes available on YouTube. Lastly, an attendee raised the issue of a resident parking scheme, which recently failed to be instated due to a lack of consultation responses. The attendee explained that it was only a small area that was affected and so many residents did not reply as parking issues did not affect them. He requested that the Council re-open the report, to which the Chairman suggested a conversation outside the meeting that involved Devizes Town Council. Councillor Whitehead advised that many resident parking scheme requests fail for the same reason.

Wiltshire Local Plan Review – Chair's Announcements

The consultation for the Wiltshire Local Plan will be held from Wednesday 27 September until Wednesday 22 November, with in-person and an online event being held across the county to enable people to find out more and have their say.

The council is holding 16 drop-in events at libraries and leisure centres around Wiltshire between Monday 2 October and Wednesday 18 October along with a live webinar-style event on Thursday 10 October on Microsoft Teams.

The in-person events are informal drop-in sessions where people can meet officers and find out more about the Local Plan and how to respond to the consultation. There is no need to book for the in-person events, anyone can just turn up and speak to officers. The online session will feature a presentation, followed by an opportunity to ask questions; people should sign up for the online event beforehand on the council website and are encouraged to submit questions in advance.

The Local Plan sets out the vision and framework for housing, infrastructure, and land for employment growth for the next 15 years. Once adopted, all planning applications will be determined against the plan, making it the most important place-shaping document for Wiltshire.

New state of the art health centre in Devizes


Opened in February, it's one of the first integrated health care centres in the region. The centre offers local residents a wide range of health and wellbeing services under one roof and provides primary care services, such as those traditionally found in GP practices, along with hospital outpatient services, physiotherapy, audiology, blood tests, and mental health support. It is a leading NHS net zero building with an energy EPC rating of A+, which utilises green technology, such as heat pumps and solar panels, to generate electricity and heat to serve the building.





Role of ICAs in BSW

Building Bridges multiplies maths life skills

Did you know that 49% of adults of working age have the maths skills of a primary-aged child and 78% are working at below a Level 2 (GCSE C/4) grade? Maths anxiety is one of the reasons why many people avoid revisiting their maths. They may shy away from talking about their maths skills due to a bad experience in school or feel that they are 'not a maths person.'

Multiply is a new government-funded programme to help adults improve their numeracy skills.

People aged 19 and over that don't have maths GCSE at grade C (or equivalent), can access free courses through Multiply to build their confidence with numbers and perhaps gain a qualification.

All Building Bridges Support Workers have been trained and qualified as

National Numeracy Champions via a CPD-accredited programme. This gives

them the knowledge and understanding needed to support adults who have low confidence with Numeracy so that individuals, children, parents, and families in the community can develop positive attitudes towards maths learning.

Some Maths Life skills that may be supported include:

- Money, savings, debts and benefits •
- Using public transport or learning to drive
- Income and household budgeting •
- Shopping for less
- Saving energy and money on bills
- Childcare costs

The Building Bridges Programme is working in partnership with Wiltshire Council to deliver life skills, maths learning and support individuals to gain accredited qualifications to help improve their confidence and chances of education, employment or job prospects and security.



Youth Action Wiltshire - Summer activity programme

We have created an exciting programme of summer activities for young carers and people facing challenges in their lives. The free-to-access activities are offered by Community first (Youth Action Wiltshire) during school holidays with the aim of offering respite and opportunities for young people to make friends and access support from our specialist team of trained youth workers.

Youth unemployment in Devizes

Devizes Area Board - Sep 2023

1. Purpose:

Devizes Area Board in selecting their priorities and actions are encouraged to be led by the data that is available and select interventions that will have the maximum impact. At the June 2023 area board meeting, it was agreed for one of the priorities to be "Strengthening our local economy focussing upon business, tourism and young people"

The <u>Wiltshire Community Foundation Needs Analysis</u> was published in March 2023 and is the most up to date local data available. Most of the data is sourced from this document with supporting intelligence taken from the <u>Indices of Deprivation</u>, <u>OFSTED reports</u> and the <u>Wiltshire Intelligence</u> <u>Network</u>.

Devizes has the highest youth unemployment in Wiltshire and this report seeks to use available data and intelligence to not tackle just employment opportunities but to identify the root causes of it. This approach should help both prevent future youth unemployment but help to tackle the associated issues such as ASB and mental health.

2. Summary of data:

- Devizes has the highest proportion of working age adults and young adults experiencing unemployment in Wiltshire.
- 3.05% of the Devizes population aged 16-64 receive unemployment benefit and 5.46% of those aged 18-24 receive youth unemployment benefit. Both are the highest in Wiltshire. The average in England for those receiving youth unemployment benefit is 4.7% and for 3.06% for Wiltshire. ¹
- Relatively high levels of youth unemployment are likely to be linked with low levels of Higher Education participation and low educational attainment of disadvantaged pupils across Wiltshire and Swindon. The data available suggests that this is the case.
 - The Wiltshire average for the number of young people aged 16+ who have no qualifications is 14.41%. The figure is 15.93% for Devizes.²
 - Devizes has an above average for Wiltshire number of young people aged 16+ who have only level 1 qualification. The figure is 11.6% compared with a Wiltshire average of 10.2%³
 - > Average attainment for all students is below average for Wiltshire.⁴
 - Data from 2018/19 showed that during that year there were only 78 apprentices in the Devizes community area compared with an average of 139 in Wiltshire. However, it should be noted that the average was skewed by particularly high rates in Amesbury, Wootton Bassett, and Warminster.⁵
 - Devizes school has not had a full inspection by Ofsted since 2015. On average they take place every 4 years so one is probably due soon. A short inspection took place in 2019 and was awarded "good" status. Whilst it was noted that actions have been

taken by the school to improve attendance and that disadvantaged pupil attendance is improving, they observed that the "The proportion of disadvantaged pupils who are persistently absent is too high".⁶

- Wiltshire College in Jan 2019 closed its site in Southbroom Road making it even more difficult for students to access courses as they now have to travel to Chippenham, Lacock or Trowbridge.
- Devizes has the lowest job access score in Wiltshire and Swindon This is constructed by measuring the accessibility by public transport and car from every LSOA to work.⁷ As a whole car ownership in Wiltshire is higher than national average but Devizes has the lowest car ownership in Wiltshire outside of Swindon and Salisbury.⁸
- Devizes also has the highest crime rate in Wiltshire and Swindon (116 offences per 1,000 population) and is concerning even when compared with the national average of 96.⁹
- Devizes South-West is one of the of the most deprived areas in Wiltshire and ranks amongst the 20% most deprived areas in England. Devizes East Central and Nort East are also in quintile 1. The key reasons for these areas being deprived are around income, education, skills, and crime.¹⁰
- Devizes also has the second highest level of mental health need in Wiltshire.¹¹
- Devizes is about average for Wiltshire towns in areas such as personal debt and food poverty and that it has the greatest number of charities and the most charitable funding awarded to it in Wiltshire and Swindon.¹²

3. Summary of key issues:

- The data above informs us that Devizes has a problem with youth unemployment and that this seems to be linked to poor mental health and ASB amongst young people.
- The root causes for this seem to include:
 - Educational attainment The gap between the disadvantaged young people and the non-disadvantaged has widened over recent years. This is reflected in attendance at school and behaviour both of which are known to be key contributors in obtaining employment.
 - Access to further and higher education This has been exasperated by the closure of Wiltshire College in Devizes
 - Access to jobs Travel to places of work is extremely challenging, particularly for the more disadvantaged as there is no rail station and they are less likely to own a car. The number of apprenticeships locally does not seem sufficient.

4. Next Steps:

 It should be noted that Devizes is performing as well if not better compared to other areas in Wiltshire such as around digital inclusion, care, the elderly, personal debt and the cost of living. Devizes also has the highest level of connectedness in Wiltshire.ⁱ

- The findings instead suggest that the focus of our future work should be more around prevention and addressing the socio-economic challenges that face disadvantaged young people within Devizes.
- It is almost certain that a collaborative approach with partner organisations is required. Conversations should take place with key stakeholders including Wiltshire College, Devizes School, businesses (including Chamber of Commerse and FoSB), housing associations (Aster, Sovereign), Work Wiltshire, and young people to refine our understanding of the issues, and what is already happening. This should include looking at the link between education and local businesses as well as apprenticeships and job opportunities.
- Actions should be identified from these conversations that improve the life chances of our disadvantaged young people which will in turn should have a positive effect upon crime and mental health.

5. Recommendations:

- I. Devizes Area Board creates a working group consisting of key stakeholders such as those included in section 4 in order to take forward this work. This group to be led by ClIr Iain Wallis and ClIr Dom Muns given their respective area board priority leads.
- II. The working group is accountable to Devizes area board and will regularly report back at the business meetings including any recommendations for interventions and requests for funding.
