17	Apologies for Absence				
	Apologies for absence were received by Councillor Jon Hubbard and Police and Crime Commissioner Philip Wilkinson. Apologies for lateness were received from Councillor Nick Holder, who joined the meeting at 7:27 pm during Item 20, Chairman's Announcements.

20	Chairman's Announcements				
	The Chairman noted and summarised the written updates included in the agenda pack, including updates on the cost-of-living crisis, the work being done				

by Wiltshire Libraries to keep local residents online, and the Independent Visitor Scheme.

Councillor Holder provided an update on the Council's response to the Climate Emergency and representatives from the Bowerhill Scout Group updated the meeting on how they have spent the funding recently awarded by the Area Board. The Bowerhill Scout Group representative spoke positively about the impact of the new mini bus, which has enabled the group to travel further afield than before.

21 Partner Updates

The Chairman invited the Area Board's partner organisations to provide any updates further to the written updates included in the agenda pack.

Wiltshire Police

Inspector Andy Lemon informed the Area Board of the progress being made within Wiltshire Police locally, noting the increased success rates relating to prosecutions. He also highlighted the successful arrest relating to a spate of local burglaries, three recent closure orders, the increased execution of warrants, the intensification of county lines policing, and the successful implementation of Operation Septum, a blade amnesty programme that included a knife arch visit to Trowbridge College. He noted that Wiltshire Police was approaching its peak demand period but highlighted a 7.2% reduction this year in violent crime and a reduction in complaints. Inspector Lemon concluded by pointing out that King George V Field in Melksham remained a problem area for policing.

The Chairman noted that after raising the lack of police visibility at the last Area Board meeting, he had noticed a significant improvement, resulting in a big difference in police perception. He passed on his thanks for their recent work in Steeple Ashton and for their renewed focus on using social media.

22 Wiltshire Police Chief Constable and Police and Crime Commissioner

The Chairman welcomed Chief Constable Catherine Roper to the Area Board and invited her to provide an update.

CC Roper passed on Police and Crime Commissioner Philip Wilkinson's apologies for absence and updated the Area Board on the work currently being undertaken by Wiltshire Police, including their response to being placed in Special Measures, otherwise known as the Engage process, following a recent assessment by His Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary and Fire & Rescue Services (HMICFRS). She explained that they had been identified as being inadequate in terms of victim support, investigation, and structural framework. As a result, CC Roper pointed to the Plan on a Page document (included in the agenda supplement) and briefly outlined the three main operational priorities to address those shortcomings: safer public spaces, violence, and burglary. She

also listed steps being taken to improve communication and public trust and engagement, including a recruitment drive covering the Criminal Investigation Department, the control room and upper management posts.

The Chief Constable then fielded questions from the floor. Questions were asked of police engagement in Melksham and potential poor service, to which Inspector Lemon agreed to investigate. Other questions included current numbers of police officers, the impact on the overall policing budget of a new police station in Salisbury, and the fairness of the policy that advised officers' involvement in the rural crime team be reviewed should they have ties with trail-hunting. Queries were raised about highway policing, with Councillor Holder drawing particular attention to an area of Bowerhill prone to speeding, about which Inspector Lemon agreed to liaise with Councillor Holder.

Finally, Bethani Blake from Victim Support encouraged the police to continue to make use of their services, to which CC Roper strongly agreed.

23 Area Board End of Year Report

The Chairman handed over to the Strategic Engagement and Partnerships Manager (SEPM) Richard Rogers to present the Area Board End of Year Report. The report summarised the work that the Area Board had done over the last year. The SEPM thanked the Area Board and the community for their support.

Gary Burns, Chairman of the Melksham Cricket Club, updated the Area Board about the expansion being undertaken at the club. He noted that they now had three adult teams on the books with an expanded youth section and a new ladies' section. He also highlighted the continued improvement to facilities, including a new artificial pitch system. He concluded by expressing his thanks to the Area Board.

Councillor Holder then spoke to the work he and the Area Board had been doing on his priority area of reducing isolation and loneliness. Councillor Holder paid tribute to David Walker and the work he had done in supporting the priority area and expressed this thanks to Councillor Hubbard and Theresa Strange for setting up Community Support 2.0, a project being taken forward by Age UK to support isolated and lonely people, particularly older people, describing it as ground-breaking work.

Cristopher Stephens enquired about Melksham Tennis Club, describing difficulties with Wiltshire Council support. The Chairman explained that the Tennis Club needed to apply for grants through the regular Area Board channels, and that he recently engaged in a conversation with the relevant Cabinet Member in which it was suggested there was an issue with the booking system for the general public, which was causing difficulties for providing support from the Council.

Local Highway and Footway Improvement Group (LHFIG)

The Area Board then considered the funding recommendations from the LHFIG meeting on 9 May 2023.

Councillor Sankey proposed that the Area Board approve the funding recommendations from the LHFIG and was seconded by Councillor Oatley.

Health and Wellbeing Group (HWG)

Councillor Holder spoke to the HWG meeting the week prior, explaining that the bulk of the meeting was for the Group to be introduced to the new project officer from Age UK Wiltshire who was to lead on a jointly funded project. Councillor Holder also passed on his thanks to Richard Rogers for co-ordinating the recent event in Melksham's marketplace on 9 June 2023. Councillor Holder also expressed a desire to understand more about the NHS's current property strategy, explaining that their Estates Team have recently completed a review of the strategy and that the HWG would soon be asked to attend a meeting with them on that subject.

25 Area Board Funding Applications

26 <u>Urgent items</u>

Councillor Graham Ellis from Melksham Town Council raised the issue of the Blue Pool site and requested that local volunteers be granted access to Blue Pool to facilitate the project. The Chairman suggested that the Area Board could not themselves make that decision but would work with Wiltshire Council to facilitate it.

Simon Crundell, Melksham Town Mayor, addressed the recent Melksham House press release. The Chairman suggested that if those concerns were submitted to the Area Board, they would act as a conduit for them. Councillor Alford advised the quality of answer would be better if pursued through other departments rather than the Area Board.

27 Evaluation and Close

The Chairman thanked those present for attending and confirmed that the next Area Board meeting would be held at 7:00 pm on Tuesday 12 September 2023.

Wiltshire Local Plan Review - Chair's Announcements

The consultation for the Wiltshire Local Plan will be held from Wednesday 27 September until Wednesday 22 November, with in-person and an online event being held across the county to enable people to find out more and have their say.

The council is holding 16 drop-in events at libraries and leisure centres around Wiltshire between Monday 2 October and Wednesday 18 October along with a live webinar-style event on Thursday 10 October on Microsoft Teams.

The in-person events are informal drop-in sessions where people can meet officers and find out more about the Local Plan and how to respond to the consultation. There is no need to book for the in-person events, anyone can just turn up and speak to officers. The online session will feature a presentation, followed by an opportunity to ask questions; people should sign up for the online event beforehand on the council website and are encouraged to submit questions in advance.

The Local Plan sets out the vision and framework for housing, infrastructure, and land for employment growth for the next 15 years. Once adopted, all planning applications will be determined against the plan, making it the most important place-shaping document for Wiltshire.




Getting Results

Class A and B located in address in Littlejohn-suspects arrested.







SGT RUTTER- is over seeing future planning for Halloween, night time economy events and licencing, public engagement events, the forming of a listening circle to discuss Violence Against Women and Girls and the introduction of Store Watch and CCTV with Melksham Town to decrease the statistic trend upwards in theft.



PC COOMBS- is developing days of action in Bowerhill to combat vehicular ASB and offences alongside the DVLA, Road Policing Unit and Community Speed Watch, tackling ASB in the Avon Place shopping precinct in the town centre and working on the introduction of a No Alcohol Zone in town. He is also working alongside youths requiring crime diversion measuring through the SWIFT programme.



PC MILLER- is working on ASB in Church Walk with our crime prevention officers whilst seeking closure orders on addresses causing us issues with drugs and economic theft. She is also working alongside the Rural Crime Team to seek an increased presence in our rural Melksham Communities.



Building Bridges multiplies maths life skills

Did you know that 49% of adults of working age have the maths skills of a primary-aged child and 78% are working at below a Level 2 (GCSE C/4) grade? Maths anxiety is one of the reasons why many people avoid revisiting their maths. They may shy away from talking about their maths skills due to a bad experience in school or feel that they are 'not a maths person.'



Multiply is a new government-funded programme to help adults improve their numeracy skills.

People aged 19 and over that don't have maths GCSE at grade C (or equivalent), can access free courses through Multiply to build their confidence with numbers and perhaps gain a qualification.

All Building Bridges Support Workers have been trained and qualified as National Numeracy Champions via a CPD-accredited programme. This gives

them the knowledge and understanding needed to support adults who have low confidence with Numeracy so that individuals, children, parents, and families in the community can develop positive attitudes towards maths learning.

Some Maths Life skills that may be supported include:

- Money, savings, debts and benefits
- Using public transport or learning to drive
- Income and household budgeting
- Shopping for less
- · Saving energy and money on bills
- Childcare costs

The Building Bridges Programme is working in partnership with Wiltshire Council to deliver life skills, maths learning and support individuals to gain accredited qualifications to help improve their confidence and chances of education, employment or job prospects and security.







Youth Action Wiltshire - Summer activity programme

Role of ICAs in BSW



Our ICAs have a key role in enabling the ICS in delivering its strategic aims including supporting broader social and economic development. 



BSW ICB celebrates first anniversary

BSW ICB has celebrated its first twelve months of working to improve health and wellbeing outcomes for local people. There have been numerous examples of joint working, from tackling winter pressures, to helping people get home from hospital more quickly. Other achievements include:

New state of the art health centre in Devizes

Opened in February, it's one of the first integrated health care centres in the region. The centre offers local residents a wide range of health and wellbeing services under one roof and provides primary care services, such as those traditionally found in GP practices, along with hospital outpatient services, physiotherapy, audiology, blood tests, and mental health support. It is a leading NHS net zero building with an energy EPC rating of A+, which utilises green technology, such as heat pumps and solar panels, to generate electricity and heat to serve the building.

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



Introduction

Following expansion of a town centre supermarket a developer contribution was secured to improve pedestrian facilities from the supermarket to the town centre. The Town Council have requested that the money is used to provide a pedestrian barrier to the edge of the raised pavement along the western side of Bank Street.



Wiltshire County Council have given Ringway Parkman a brief to investigate the feasibility of fixing the barrier to the existing pavement together with some minor associated works in connection with Street Lighting and minor area enhancements.

The existing pavement consists of cast in situ concrete slabs supported off a random rubble stone wall to the front face. It is believed that there are no construction records available from when the slabs were installed.

Design Criteria

The provision of the barrier is covered by BS 7818 (1995), Specification for Pedestrian Restraint Systems in Metal.

There are four allowable classes of barrier ranging from a light duty class 1 to a heavy-duty class 4. For this particular situation class 3 will be used which is the minimum requirement where crowd loading could be encountered. This class also mirrors the BS5400 bridge parapet design for pedestrians. Whilst BS7818 covers the entire barrier make up including geometry, materials and workmanship it is assumed that the barrier having been chosen by the Client from a reputable and experienced fabricator meets these criteria.

In the absence of any design details for the existing footway slabs the only way to check their suitability for mounting the posts is by insitu testing. BS 7178 suggests that when insitu testing is undertaken then a partial safety factor of 1.2 shall be used and held for fifteen minutes with no distress being evident.

In Situ Testing

A temporary steel post was fixed to one of the better of the existing slabs using similar fixings to those proposed for the final fixing. On testing the post a crack opened up across the footway slab at approximately 80% of the required loading, and not allowing for any factors of safety. This test confirmed that even the best of the existing footway slabs are unsuitable for mounting the barrier.



Other Options Investigated

Ringway Parkman looked into the possibility of recasting sections of the footway slabs on top of the subsoil to provide a suitable fixing for the parapet. On closer inspection of the site a number of disused cellars were discovered and judging by the age of the buildings it is assumed that there would also be others for neighbouring properties. The footway slabs formed the ceiling of the cellars and where visible the concrete was measured at 150mm thick with a corrugated iron permanent soffit former. Therefore in the absence of a suitable bearing subsoil the new slabs would have to be designed to current standards as self-supporting and together with the added expense of consultation with affected property owners it is not believed that the available budget will cover the cost of undertaking this work.

Another option briefly investigated would be to cast a new ground beam in front of the existing footway for fixing the railings. This would in effect narrow the main road by 300 – 400mm which will cause a restriction at the northern end of Bank Street. There also appears to be a number of Utilities in the area immediately in front of the wall and these would have to be diverted so again this option is not considered to be feasible on the current budget.

Conclusions

The existing slabs are not sufficiently robust to provide the required mounting strength for a public barrier designed to class3 loading. It is also not believed that a suitable alternative method of mounting could be carried out for the immediately available budget.

Addendum

This page forms an addendum to the original report.

Following issue of the previous report (dated 12th May) Ringway Parkman excavated trial holes in the carriageway at the base of the stonewall in order to accurately locate the position of any services present. This work was undertaken on 21st May 2004.



Two holes were excavated, one opposite the Flower shop and the second adjacent to the small flight of steps near the Home Appliance showroom.

The first hole was dug to a depth of 700mm and extended 1000mm out from the wall. The high voltage electricity service was located 750mm out from the wall at a depth of 600mm. No other services were found. There was also a precast concrete kerb laid flat adjacent to the wall and approximately 100mm deep. The purpose and extent of this kerb is not known. The second hole was dug to a similar dimension however no services or buried kerbs were found at this location.

Conclusion

From the trial holes taken it is believed that a wall could be built in front of the existing wall without diverting any utility apparatus. The wall would not have do be designed as a retaining wall as the existing wall is adequate, the new wall will however have to resist the forces imposed by the railings. A brief outline design suggests that the new construction would need to be

founded 700mm below the existing road level in order to achieve sufficient active pressure on the front face to resist overturning, with reinforced concrete used in order to keep the construction slender and thus minimise any restriction to the carriageway.

A budget estimate for the construction works would be £400/m based on the 110m length of reconstruction required. On top of this would be any decorative stone facing if required and the costs of supplying installing the barrier.

Briefing note – Bank St, Melksham

<u>History</u>

The high level footway at Bank Street is over 100 years old and was likely to be constructed to allow access to be maintained in times of flood. Prior to its construction it is likely that the properties on Bank Street would have had steps leading directly to a lower level footway.

Current Construction

The footway has at some time been surfaced using in-situ concrete slabs. The slabs are supported at cellar shafts with corrugated iron sheeting and steel beams. The cellar shafts, originally to allow the tipping of coal into the cellars, are capped by manhole covers close to the front edge of the footway.

The concrete shows signs of cracking in places and the surface has been broken and reinstated with tarmac in places as a result of utility works.

A number of properties along Bank Street have low thresholds and there is very little level difference between the footway surface and the entrance to the properties.

It is thought that only 4 of the cellars remain, three of which have accessible shafts. These are situated at no.15 (Bewley Undertakers), no.17 (Conservative Club) and The Grapes Inn.

Option 1 – slab replacement

A report prepared by consultants Mouchel in 2008 suggested that the existing concrete slabs be removed and a new footway constructed. This would require pre-cast concrete lintels to span across the access shafts to support the footway. The footway surface would consist of footway paving slabs consistent with those used elsewhere in the town centre.

This option however could potentially cause damage to the wall associated with the high level footway and the in-filled cellar shafts and steps may cause structural issues should the materials shift. Utility apparatus is also present in the existing footway.

The estimated costs of the works (based on 2008 prices) were in the region of £80,000. This does not include a figure for traffic management, utility diversion works or any potential reconstruction of the wall or cellar in-fills. Bearing these elements in mind, alongside rate increases, it is likely that this work would cost closer to £150,000.

Option 2

A second option for improving the surface of the footway is to remove the tarmac in-fills and reinstate these areas and any other uneven patches with in-situ concrete. This will help to achieve a level surface. This footway could then be retextured using a shot-blasting process to create a slip-resistant surface.

This process has been used elsewhere (e.g. The Brittox in Devizes) however this has mainly been in locations where the surface does not have a significant level difference to the

carriageway. It is likely to cause a contractor some concern should they be required to use their shot blasting equipment on the high level pavement at Bank Street.


Option 3 – concrete infill and HFS

This option would include the concrete infill as per option 2 and further work to overlay the footway with a high friction surface. It is felt this option is likely to be the most cost effective and practical solution to improve the footway surface on Bank Street. Further discussion with a surfacing contractor will need to take place to identify the most appropriate high friction product for Bank Street in order to achieve a long lasting solution.

It is estimated that this option would cost in the region of £20,00

Recommendation

It is recommended that option 3 be considered for further investigation and implementation.

Usually we would say switch them off to be on the safe side but considering the issues identified by the visually impaired pedestrian (which are quite significant and not easily resolved by other means i.e. second push button) we are going to propose a second site visit with Telent (the signal engineers) to turn the bleepers down at the crossing and switch on the bleepers at the junction (at their lowest level) and review if the bleepers can be heard between the two sites. If they can't be heard, then we will leave the crossing ones on and switch the junction ones on too, which would be a great benefit to the resident. If the bleepers can be heard at the lowest setting then we will likely switch the crossing ones off and leave the junction ones off too. We will programme in a visit with Telent and provide more feedback when completed. Sorry this isn't a more definite answer. The crossing ones have been left on for now as they are only just audible and the risk of confusion is low especially for those familiar with the sites. We now await their findings of a second visit to the site with their contractor.
