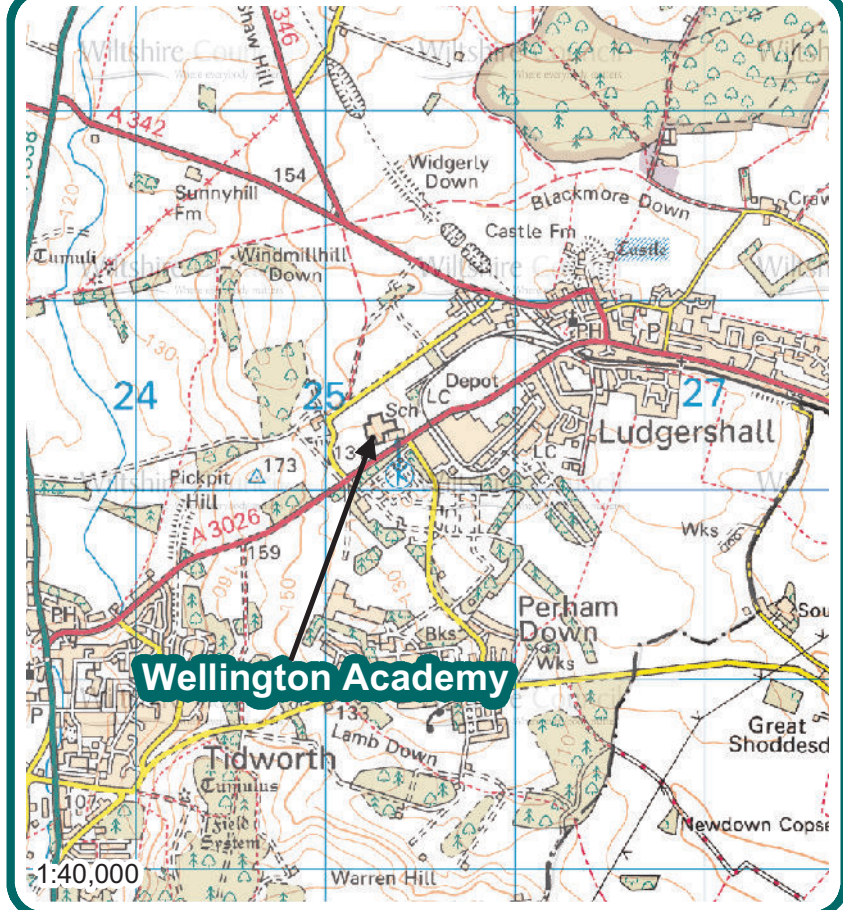
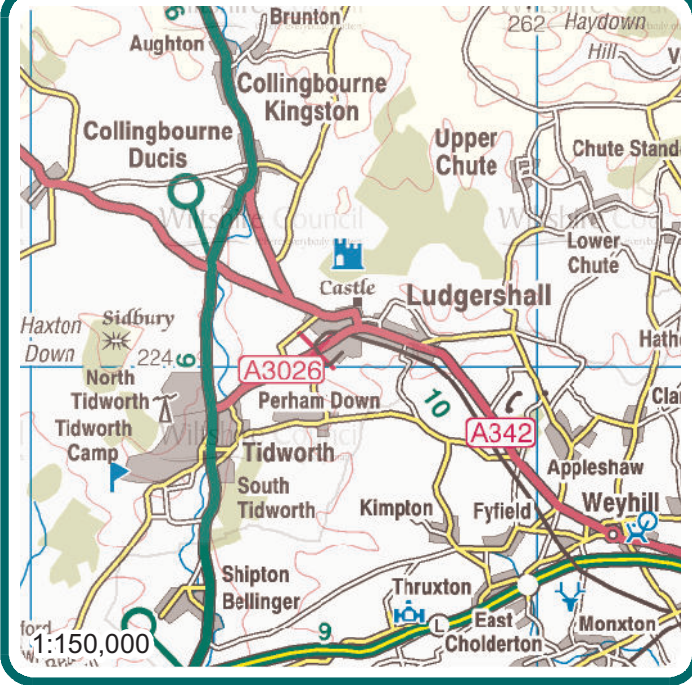

### Chairman's Announcements

#### Reducing Unnecessary Street Lighting in Wiltshire

Wiltshire Council has been approached by a number of communities seeking to reduce their carbon footprint, reduce light pollution of the night sky and reduce energy costs. Street lighting and illuminated signs have been identified as a major use of energy by the Council in a recent review.

A start has been made with a project to replace the lighting units in the county's 1,600 illuminated bollards with new low energy units. Dimming and turning off unnecessary lighting for part of the night have already been successfully introduced in trial sites at Urchfont and Tidworth.

The Council has set aside £5,000 for each Area Board to introduce schemes in their areas this year. The Area Board is asked to solicit interest from Town and Parish Councils and other interested parties to take part in the scheme. The Area Board will then decide on which submissions will go ahead in their area.

The Area Board is also asked to nominate an individual to act as Project Leader, to liaise with the community and resolve any issues with the public. The Council's staff and specialists will be available to advise on technical aspects, including the viability of the proposals, and will arrange the installation of the schemes. If successful more cash will be made available for schemes next year.

1.	<p><u>Welcome, Introductions and Chairman's Announcements</u></p> <p>The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting of the Tidworth Area Board and asked all those present to introduce themselves.</p> <p>The Chairman made the following announcements:</p> <p><b>Forthcoming Gypsy and Traveller Consultation</b>  An 8 week consultation on the issues and general approach to identifying land for new gypsy, traveller and show people sites would begin on Tuesday 6 April until Friday 4 June. All information could be found online at:  <a href="http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/gypsyandtravellersiteallocationsdpd">www.wiltshire.gov.uk/gypsyandtravellersiteallocationsdpd</a> and in the main council offices and local libraries.</p> <p>A drop-in event to discuss the issues in more detail would be held on Tuesday 11 May between 4.00pm and 8.00pm at the Corn Exchange in Devizes. An event would also be held in Salisbury on Thursday 13 May.</p> <p>There was also a display stand on show in the hall which provided members of the public with further details of the consultation.</p> <p><b>Consultation on Services to Children with Special Educational Needs</b>  A review of services was being carried out and a consultation in progress; the closing date was 12 noon on Monday 24 May. Any questions should be directed to Tracey Gates, Project Officer, in the first instance <a href="mailto:tracey.gates@wiltshire.gov.uk">tracey.gates@wiltshire.gov.uk</a> 01225 756170.</p> <p>There would be opportunities to meet officers to discuss the proposals on Monday 29 March, 7.00pm at Devizes School, or on Tuesday 4 May, 7.00pm at Salisbury City Hall.</p> <p>Cllr Mark Connolly stated that the consultation may lead to the closure of the Special Educational Needs unit at Zouch Primary School. He had received assurances that the Centre was not running at capacity and that none of the students in the Centre would need to travel to other Centres in the County as their needs were not severe. If students in the area were to have severe educational needs that the local schools could not cater for, free transport would be provided to take them to the other Centres around the County.</p>	

	<p><b>Flooding Consultation</b> Wiltshire Council had set up two operational flood working groups to collate information on flooding and drainage issues across the county.</p> <p>Parish and Town Councils were being invited to assist with the collation of data by providing information about any local flooding issues in their areas. Packs were available for Parish and Town Council representatives to take away from the meeting. Once completed, they should be returned to the Community Area Manager at the next meeting.</p> <p>A 'Flood Fair' would be held at the Olympiad Leisure Centre in Chippenham from 10.00am until 2.00pm on 14 April. Any Parish or Town Council representative wishing to attend should contact Renate Malton on <a href="mailto:renate.malton@wiltshire.gov.uk">renate.malton@wiltshire.gov.uk</a>.</p> <p><b>Community Asset Transfer</b> Wiltshire Council was supporting the transfer of assets to local communities and a diagram to explain the transfer process was included in the agenda pack.</p> <p>Any Parish or Town Council or local community that was aware of any possible assets for transfer should contact the Community Area Manager, Val Powley on <a href="mailto:val.powley@wiltshire.gov.uk">val.powley@wiltshire.gov.uk</a>.</p> <p><b>Islam4UK Briefing Note</b> A briefing note on the previously proposed Islam4UK march in Wootton Bassett was included in the agenda pack. The Chairman stated that this was a very good example of Wiltshire Police and Wiltshire Council working in partnership.</p> <p><b>Community Area awards</b> Val Powley announced that the Community Area Awards would be held on Thursday 18 March, 7.00pm at the Sports and Social Club in Ludgershall. People were encouraged to attend the event.</p> <p><b>Age No Barrier</b> Val Powley announced that an 'Age No Barrier' week was being held from Saturday 10 July to Friday 16 July. 2.	<p><u>Apologies for Absence</u></p> <p>Apologies for absence were received from Steve Dagger (Tidworth</p>	



	Town Council), Mike Holt (Collingbourne Kingston Parish Council) and Alan Butterworth (Tidcombe and Fosbury Parish Meeting).	
3.	<p><u>Declarations of Interest</u></p> <p>Councillor Chris Williams declared a personal interest in Item 13 on the agenda as he had been involved in the Community Payback bid in his position as Cabinet Member. Councillor Williams would participate in the discussion on this item, and vote.</p>	
4.	<p><u>Minutes</u></p> <p>Col Tabor enquired whether the recommendation on Item 8 (page 6) of the minutes relating to the de-priming of the A338/A346 corridor had been actioned. Councillor Charles Howard explained that this matter would also be considered by the Area Boards for Amesbury, Pewsey and Marlborough, and that recommendations would be actioned once all views were obtained.</p> <p><b><u>Decision</u></b>  <b>The minutes of the meeting held on 18 January 2010 were agreed a correct record and signed by the Chairman.</b></p>	
5.	<p><u>Joint Strategic Needs Assessment Event</u></p> <p>Maggie Rae, Joint Director of Public Health, gave a presentation on the findings of the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment in the Tidworth Community Area. Maggie explained that Wiltshire Council was the first council in the country to produce such information at a local level.</p> <p>Some of the main findings of the assessment included the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The local population had a large proportion of young people (particularly males) which reflected the high number of military personnel.</li> <li>• Tidworth Community Area was among the most deprived areas in the Index of Multiple Deprivation.</li> <li>• Life expectancy was lower than the Wiltshire average for both males and females, with females also having a longer life expectancy than males.</li> <li>• The level of teenage pregnancies was higher than the Wiltshire average, with 1 in 16 girls between 15 and 17 becoming pregnant each year.</li> <li>• Tidworth Community Area ranked 19th out of 20 areas with regards to alcohol related hospital admissions.</li> <li>• However, Tidworth ranked 1st with regards to everyday</li> </ul>	

alcohol consumption.

- One in four of the children measured were found to be overweight or obese according to their BMI – this ranked Tidworth 17th out of 20 areas.
- An estimated 24.2% of adults smoked, compared to the Wiltshire average of 20.2%.
- Self-reported health was very good, with 79.2% of people thinking they were in 'good' or 'very good' health. This ranked Tidworth 6th out of 20 areas.
- Tidworth ranked 19th out of 20 areas for domestic violence, with an average of 5.5 incidents per 1,000 people.

The next steps were to run a series of workshops and Health Fairs to continue to engage people in health issues and raise general awareness. The Health Fair for Tidworth Community Area would take place on Wednesday 14 April from 3.00pm until 6.00pm at Tidworth Leisure Centre and local residents were encouraged to attend.

Following Maggie's presentation, the following comments were made:

- Ambulance response times in the area were perceived to be very poor.
- Fire and Air Ambulance response times were better and the Ambulance response times needed to catch up.
- Doctors' surgeries were not open in evenings or weekends which made it difficult for working people to access them. This was believed to be one reason why men were less likely to visit a doctor with symptoms.
- A national scheme was being rolled out to provide full health checks for people aged between 40 and 74 years.
- An assessment of the Great Western Ambulance Service was due to be carried out.
- Meetings were taking place with the Ambulance Trust to identify temporary ambulance points to assist with response times.

Cllr Connolly thanked Maggie for the informative presentation and requested that, after the next assessment is carried out, the results were brought to the Area Boards sooner.

The Chairman also thanked Maggie for the presentation and recommended that the issues be taken back to Parish and Town Councils for further consideration.

6.	<p><u>Youth Services Staffing Allocations</u></p> <p>Kevin Sweeney, Operations Manager for Youth Development Services, gave an update on the review of youth resources allocations.</p> <p>Funding for services for 13 to 19 year olds had been inconsistent in the past and efforts were now being concentrated on allocating resources to areas fairly, based on various deciding factors.</p> <p>These factors included four main consideration points that determined how funding would be allocated, as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Entitlement – accounting for 20% of the funding</li> <li>• Population – accounting for 50% of the funding</li> <li>• Deprivation – accounting for 10% of the funding</li> <li>• Rural isolation – accounting for 10% of the funding</li> <li>• Central reserves – 5% held as a contingency</li> </ul> <p>In the Tidworth Community Area, an additional 14 hours worth of youth work per week had been allocated which was great news. Local determination would decide how these additional hours would be spent.</p> <p>In the discussion that ensued, the following points were raised:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Consideration should be given to allocating budgets to young people. However, a Government target to allocate 25% of budgets to young people by 2017 meant that this was something that was already underway.</li> <li>• Social deprivation was prevalent in the area and one parish council, Collingbourne Ducis, was already allocating 2.5% of its budget to youth work.</li> <li>• More funding was desired to bring in outlying, particularly rural, areas.</li> </ul> <p>Cllr Connolly announced that Wiltshire Council had allocated an additional £100,000 in its budget to distribute to the Area Boards to commission work on youth services. This was in addition to the usual levels of grant funding and worked out at £5,000 per Area Board.</p>	
7.	<p><u>Youth Project</u></p> <p>Kevin Sweeney gave a brief update on the Youth Project.</p> <p>Previous meetings that had been held to look at rural needs had unfortunately been unsuccessful. However, these were now being</p>	

	<p>revisited and assessments of rural young peoples needs were currently being carried out.</p> <p>One of the main focuses of the assessments was to ask the young people what they want to see happen in their areas. This would link into the provision of the additional 14 hours per week that were now available.</p> <p>Anybody with ideas or wanting further information should contact Kevin or Val Powley.</p> <p>Finally Kevin thanked team member Wendy Higginson for her hard work covering the vacant post within the team, which had now been advertised.</p>	
8.	<p><u>Police Protective Services Department</u></p> <p>Jim Griffey, Detective Sergeant at Wiltshire Police, gave an overview of Police Protective Services, which formed a major part of the Wiltshire Police service but was a relatively unknown department.</p> <p>Departments covered by Protective services included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Major Crime</li> <li>• Special Branch</li> <li>• Economic Crime</li> <li>• Public Order</li> <li>• Civil Contingencies</li> <li>• Critical Incidents</li> <li>• Organised Crime</li> <li>• Public Protection</li> <li>• Forensic Department</li> <li>• Operations (road policing, dog section, firearms).</li> </ul> <p>Strong partnership working and information sharing with partners was key to the success of the Department.</p> <p>The Chairman thanked Jim for his presentation and for raising awareness of the Protective Services.</p>	
9.	<p><u>Update on Issues Raised</u></p> <p>Val Powley provided a brief update on issues raised.</p> <p>Since the issues system had been introduced, a total of 29 issues</p>	

	<p>had been received. This was relatively low in comparison to other areas and people were encouraged to use the online facility to raise any issues they may have.</p> <p>Issues raised should be as specific as possible to ensure that a satisfactory resolution could be achieved.</p>	
10.	<p><u>Update from Tidworth Community Area Partnership (TCAP)</u></p> <p>Col Tabor gave an update from the Community Area Partnership and raised the following points:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The next meeting of the Partnership was being held on Friday 19 March at 10.00am.</li> <li>• Initial finance was now in place to employ a Co-ordinator and it was hoped that the person would be in post within the next four weeks.</li> <li>• Work was continuing on the Garrison Theatre project, which would provide a 700-750 seated theatre for military and community use.</li> <li>• A 'Blue Light Day' was proposed for Friday 27 August and people were encouraged to get involved. More information was available from David Marks.</li> <li>• The Garrison clean-up last May resulted in 20 tons of rubbish being collected. This year it would take place on Thursday 22 April.</li> <li>• A potential area had been identified in Tidworth for allotments and talks would continue on this at the upcoming partnership meetings.</li> </ul> <p>The Chairman thanked Col Tabor for his update and echoed the encouragement for people to attend the Partnership meeting on Friday.</p>	
11.	<p><u>Updates from Town and Parish Councils, the Police, the Army, NHS and other Partners</u></p> <p>Updates from Wiltshire Police, NHS Wiltshire and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service had been received and circulated prior to the meeting.</p> <p>Mike Franklin of Wiltshire Fire and Rescue made a few additional points:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• In response to concerns with ambulance response times, he announced that 36% of the Fire Service's activity was spent on co-responding.</li> <li>• There was a programme of education taking place with</li> </ul>	

	<p>young people this autumn to raise awareness of road safety.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Empty buildings and the associated build-up of rubbish was a serious fire hazard and could potentially attract arsonists. Any potential risk areas should be reported to the Fire Service as soon as possible.</li> <li>• The Strategic Plan was now available and copies could be obtained either online at <a href="http://www.wiltshirefire.gov.uk">www.wiltshirefire.gov.uk</a> or by contacting Linda Smith on 01380 723601 or Manor House, Potterne, Devizes, SN10 5PP.</li> </ul> <p>Col Tabor gave a brief Military update and reminded people of the three casualties in Afghanistan in the last three weeks and asked that thought was given to them, their colleagues and families.</p> <p>Jo Howes announced that a new NHS Out of Hours Single Provider had been identified for each area, and that in the Tidworth Community Area it would be the same provider as previously. However, people could now also see a Practitioner at Amesbury as well as Savernake if they chose to. The out of hours telephone number was 0300 111 5717 and leaflets were available.</p> <p>A couple of issues from the floor were raised, including the state of the roads and the time taken to repair pot-holes. Andrew Kerr, Chief Executive and Cllr Jane Scott, Leader of the Council, both explained that the repairing of Wiltshire's roads was a big priority for the Council and that an additional £1.65 million had been allocated for roads maintenance.</p> <p>In response to concern from a member of the public, Cllr Jane Scott announced that the allocated budget for road maintenance would not be reduced and re-allocated to other service areas.</p>

**NHS Update - April 2010****Proposal for Primary Care Centre at Quakers Walk will not proceed**

The proposal for the development of a Primary Care Centre at Quakers Walk was brought for consideration to NHS Wiltshire by the town's GPs, who were to manage the PCC, and the developers, the Bristol-based charity the St Monica Trust, in November 2009. A planning application was submitted to Wiltshire Council by the St Monica Trust in February 2010.

At meetings on Thursday 18th March and Friday 19th March with representatives of the St Monica Trust and the GPs, the parties came to the conclusion that they could not progress the scheme in a way which meets all of their requirements.

Chief Executive of NHS Wiltshire, Jeff James, said:

"We are disappointed that this proposal has not reached a positive conclusion. Though the financial environment has changed since we made our plans in January 2007, we are keen to fulfill our commitment to provide better facilities for primary care services in Devizes. However, in spite of hard work and a constructive approach to negotiation on everyone's part, it has not been possible to put together a commercially viable proposal which works for the St Monica Trust, the GPs and the PCT". The Primary Care Trust will begin looking to see whether the proposal to develop the Green Lane site can be re-visited.

**Changes to out-of-hours service**

From April 1, NHS Wiltshire has commissioned a single provider, Wiltshire Medical Services, to run out-of-hours medical and dental services across the whole of Wiltshire. NHS Wiltshire is confident that the new service will offer a robust, consistent and high-quality service right across the county.

Wiltshire Medical Services (WMS) is a well-established company run by local GPs, which previously provided out-of-hours care to a large part of the county. The service uses no agency or locum doctors, and most doctors work in daytime general practice in or near Wiltshire, giving them knowledge of the local area as well as specialist experience in urgent, out-of-hours medicine.

The new service will operate from all the existing out-of-hours bases, plus two new ones - at the Great Western Hospital, Swindon, and Warminster. As at present, patients will access the service by phoning their GP. They will then be given a number to call (0300 1115717) via answer phone message, or automatically diverted.

Once through to the Out-of-hours service, your call will be handled by a team of nurses and doctors, who will then either:

Advise you on how to manage your problem yourself

Ask you to come in to be treated at your most convenient treatment centre or, if appropriate

Send a member of the clinical team to visit you in your own home

The treatment centres have been chosen to provide an improved geographical spread across the county. For patients, the new service will be as good, or better, than it is at the moment. It will provide consistent care across the county, and will have increased capacity for home visits, particularly important in an area with many isolated rural communities.

The service will be provided by a mix of GPs, Nurse Practitioners and Emergency Care Practitioners, most of who are already working in Wiltshire and familiar with the local area.

WMS was chosen to provide the service after a competitive bidding process, on the basis of their history of providing a locally-based, service of the highest quality. They have previously provided out-of-hours services across most of the county apart from the south, and have long-standing experience. Two of the directors work as GPs in Wiltshire.

The out-of-hours service is part of a package of urgent and emergency care offered by the NHS. In an emergency (e.g. serious injury, loss of consciousness, chest pain or suspected stroke), patients should always phone 999. For healthcare advice over the phone, NHS Direct is available on 0845 4647.

### **Bowel Cancer Screening Programme rolls out in the South West**

The Bowel Cancer Screening Programme (BCSP) will be fully rolled out across the South West this month. Nearly half a million screening kits have been sent out across the region since the introduction of the programme and already more than 350 cancers have been detected.

## **Speed Limit through Everleigh, A342**

I am writing as a member of the Everleigh Parish Council in response to the recent Wiltshire Council Speed Limit Review. This review is an excellent piece of detailed work. However, the Everleigh Parish Council were disappointed that the review recommends no change to the current speed limit of 50mph along the A342 as it passes through Everleigh (Road Section A342 – 19 of your Review).

Although there have been a relatively low number of collisions in the past 6 years on this stretch of road (a total of nine), the majority of our residents feel that vehicles are driving too fast on the A342 in Everleigh and that a speed limit of 40mph would be more appropriate. This road section contains numerous bends and road junctions; these are all key underlying principles identified in your report.

This issue was first raised by the Parish Council 10 years ago and a petition was submitted to the Wiltshire County Council in 2006; no response was received.

Vehicles moving at speeds in excess of 40mph pose a hazard for several categories of people: pedestrians moving by foot along the A342; Everleigh residents whose property entrance/exit is along the A342; motorists entering the A342 from the 2 main T Junctions or Goa Balti Restaurant/Farm Shop junctions; and slow moving, large farm vehicles entering the A342 from the track leading to Pigleaze Dairy.

The Everleigh Parish Council therefore feel strongly that the speed limit on the A342 in Everleigh should be reduced from 50mph to 40mph, and would welcome an opportunity to discuss our proposal on the ground with you or your team in order to reconsider this issue.

## **Purpose of Report**

To ask Councillors to consider 2 applications seeking 2010/11 Community Area Grant Funding

1. Collingbourne Cricket Club - seeking a grant of £1,000 towards the cost of Replacement of Cricket Nets and Matting. Officer recommendation – Approval.
2. Zouch School, Tidworth – seeking a grant of £3,500 towards the cost of piloting a project to help integration of the army families with the local community. Officer recommendation – Approval.

## 1. Background

- 1.1. Area Boards have authority to approve Area Grants under powers delegated to them by the Deputy Leader and Cabinet member for Community Services (27 February 2010). Under the Scheme of Delegation Area Boards must adhere to the Area Board Grants Guidance for funding.
- 1.2. In accordance with the Scheme of Delegation, any recommendation of an Area Board that is contrary to the funding criteria would need the approval of the Leader, the appropriate Cabinet Member or the Cabinet.
- 1.3. In accordance with the Area Board Grants Guidance officers are required to provide recommendations in their report, however, the decision to support applications and to what level is made by Wiltshire Councillors on this Area Board.
- 1.4. During 2010/2011 all applicants are being encouraged to contact the Charities Information Bureau which is working on behalf of Wiltshire Council to support community and voluntary groups, town and parish councils to seek funding for community projects and schemes both from the Area Board and other local and other national funding sources.
- 1.5. Funding applications will be considered at every Area Board meeting.
- 1.6. A decision has been made in 2010/2011 that paper copies of funding applications will no longer appear as part of the agenda in an attempt to reduce volume of paper used. However, the application forms will be available on the Wiltshire Council web site and hard copies available upon request.
- 1.7. The 2010/2011 funding criteria and application forms are available on the council's website ([www.wiltshire.gov.uk/areaboards](http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/areaboards)) or paper versions are available from the Community Area Manager.

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## **2. Main Considerations**

- 2.1. Tidworth Area Board has been allocated a 2010/2011 budget of £50,237 for community grants, community partnership core funding and councillor led initiatives. The carry forward from the 2009/2010 budget is £213. This sum plus a further £487 from the 2010/2011 allocation was approved at the Area Board meeting on 15 March 2010 for Grant No. TID: 016/09 "Eco Bikes". This leaves a total budget of £49,750 for 2010/2011.
- 2.2. Councillors will need to be satisfied that grants awarded in the 2010/11 year are made to projects that can realistically proceed within a year of the award being made.
- 2.3. There will be 6 rounds of funding during 2010/11. The first is contained in this report the remaining will take place on:-

8.1.1. Officers recommend that Collingbourne Cricket Club is awarded £1,000 towards the replacement of cricket nets and matting.

8.1.2. Officers are of the opinion that this application meets the 2010/11 grant criteria.

8.1.3. The application demonstrates a link to the Tidworth Community Area Plan 2003-2013 under the Culture and Leisure section in that it enables a successful sports club to continue to provide good facilities for people of all ages from Tidworth, Ludgershall, Everleigh and the Collingbournes to play cricket.

8.1.4. The application encourages young people and adults to make lifestyle changes that will have a positive effect on the health of them and their families by encouraging more people to play a sport. It also provides an opportunity for young people to participate in positive activities.

8.1.5. Collingbourne Cricket Club is a non profit organisation which aims to provide sports facilities for a wide range of people in Collingbourne and district including Tidworth, Ludgershall and Everleigh. They host a county primary Kwik tournament and club members support coaching at local schools. They currently have four representative teams with their first Eleven recently promoted to the Wilshire League. They have over 40 members playing regularly for the club. They are planning that the refurbished facility will see increased use by local schools.

8.1.6. The project aims to replace the nets and matting at the cricket club to improve the current facilities and enable more use by local communities including schools. This also includes some ancillary work on retaining walls and edging timber around the nets and matting.

8.1.7. The club seeks to be inclusive both to different age groups and to the adjoining communities.

8.1.8. The club has obtained the majority of the funding (£5,280) from an application to Sport England (£4,230) and from Wiltshire Cricket League (£500) and club funds (£550). They are seeking £1,000 from the Area Board Grant fund to enable them to undertake all the work needed to refurbish the facility.



8.1.9. If the grant was not awarded, this would mean the club using some of the reserve funding that it keeps for replacement/repair of essential grass cutting/treating machinery and they could not operate at the level of cricket of the leagues that they are currently in.

8.2. TID: 002/10	Zouch School	Integration of Army families with the local community	£3,500

8.2.1. Officers recommend that Zouch School are awarded £3,500 towards their project to integrate military families with the local community, conditional on the remaining external funding being confirmed.

8.2.2. Officers are of the opinion that this application meets the 2010/11 grant criteria.

8.2.3. The application demonstrates a link to the several of the themes in the Tidworth Community Area Plan 2003-2013 including Communication, Health & Social Care, Community Protection, Education & Life Long Learning and Culture and Leisure.

8.2.4. The project addresses the important work being carried out in the county on Military Civilian Integration. The military are the largest employer in the county and troops and their dependants have difficulties linking into the local community because of the very different lifestyles they live due to the frequent absence on duty of the military parent or carer in the family. One of the main aims of the Tidworth Community Area Strategy is to create a stronger community by bringing the civilian and military communities closer together and providing services and facilities within the Community Area to which all have access.

8.2.5. The applicant is one of the primary schools in Tidworth which takes over 95% of its children from Army families. 30% of the children have special needs, strongly influenced by the transient Army lifestyle. The school has carried out research amongst the families of children who attend the school and have co-researched this with the Army Welfare Services and Community Development agencies. The vast majority of families are headed by mothers who are effectively single parents for considerable periods of time. The situation is also affected by the return of the fathers, which can cause tensions in the family through relationship issues and lack of family involvement/understanding/participation

8.2.6. The project aims to initiate the participation of Army parents and the surrounding Army Garrison towards the existing town and village communities to enable them to start taking an active and progressive part in village and school life by creating a series of community involvement projects over six months. It will serve as a pilot for future work with the military and civilian parts of the community.

8.2.7. This is a multi-generational, multi-age, multi-local group, community engagement project with no cost to the end users to eliminate any financial disadvantage. Army families living in garrison areas are perceived to be a disadvantaged group because of the situation they are in.

8.2.8. If the Area Board makes a decision not to fund the project, the number of participating army families, local groups and individuals will be reduced, events would be drastically reduced and the project would become much smaller and lose its social involvement impact.

Many young people involved in alternative sport are those who are dis-engaged from mainstream sports. Consequently without regular physical activity they are prone to developing sedentary lifestyles. This could increase the chances of developing coronary heart disease or diabetes as well as reducing self esteem, energy levels and the ‘feel good’ factor associated with involvement in exercise.</li> <li>- By engaging young people in regular alternative sport sessions the project will provide young people with positive healthy activities and give them the opportunity to learn new skills and achieve. This could lead on to roles within sport as a volunteer or coach if the interest is maintained and life skills learned that will play a large role in career and life development.</li> <li>- The development of independent alternative sports activity centres will allow young people to take part in a new and exciting project that will be relatively easily accessed. There are only 2 current projects in Wiltshire that provide this and through the project we hope to increase this to 5 or 6 – this will clearly give young people a great chance to take up something new, improve at something or excel in a chosen sport. All of which contribute to greater opportunities in their lives and a sense of belonging, identity and wellbeing.</li> </ul> <p>Safer Communities</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Activities provided on a regular basis for young people in alternative sports can contribute to reducing anti social behaviour in local areas. Projects tend to be delivered in partnership with local youth development service workers and at the time of the day that would see most anti social behaviour perpetrated. Therefore it will require differing organisations across Wiltshire to work together in order to make it successful.</li> <li>- The project will promote opportunities across both the voluntary and statutory youth work sector and will provide volunteering opportunities for both young people and people within the wider community.</li> <li>- The main aim of the hubs is to promote inclusion for all and allow people within the community to get involved in both the running and the development of the hubs.</li> <li>- Development of the alternative sports will allow young people to succeed at school as it allows them to develop new skills and build on existing skills. Developing stronger resilient young people. It also allows them to participate in positive activities whilst socialising and having fun. The sports promote team work and effective communication.</li> </ul>
<p>What makes this initiative a local priority (eg evidence from research and local support)</p>	<p>Success of the Pewsey and Tidworth Alternative sports Hubs show that there is a clear need for alternative positive activities for young people in Wiltshire to engage in.</p> <p>There is a clear need for alternative sports in Wiltshire based on the number of young people who turn up to our alternative sports taster sessions. In 2009/2010 alone we had 759 young people attend taster sessions that we organized and over 250 attend our current existing alternative sports clubs.</p> <p>A recent Tomorrow's Voice survey (surveying 1695 young people) showed that 43% of young people would like engage in alternative sports with 56% wanting these activities in locations other than school. Over 65% of young people requested an external professional to lead these sessions and between 20-23% expressed interest in alternative sports coaching, umpiring or event volunteering.</p>

	<p>There is clear need for alternative sports due to increased number of sports unlimited bids through schools to run 6-8 week alternative sport sessions. Recent research has also shown that there is a link between alternative sports provision and a reduction in Anti- social behavior. As a result WAYS has been approached by the Anti Social Behavior Team to help reduce anti social behavior in specific areas with Calne and Trowbridge being two of those areas. Consultation has been done with Community Area Young People's Issues Group (CAYPIG'S) and there has been clear indication that there is an increased need for alternative sports.</p> <p>There has also be a growing interest in Alternative sports across Wiltshire as expressed in the Wiltshire Skate Jam series facebook site having attracted over 250 young people in its first 10 hours of launching.</p> <p>The demand from local organisations and schools for alternative sports coaching courses also signifies that there is an increase in need for alternative sports coaches providing activities for young people.</p>

The project will also benefit young people across other area boards where tasters sessions and skate jams will be held. The placement of the hubs around Wiltshire would attract young people from military families around Tidworth/Pewsey and within socially deprived areas – most notably Bemerton Heath within Salisbury.</p>
