

On a daily basis reported incidents and crime are monitored and reviewed locally in order to take any opportunity to detect a crime and prevent a reoccurrence.

The NPT concentrates its efforts on prevention and making interventions with those who are likely suspects. The NPT works in partnership with and addresses concerns from the community as well as tackling these priority crimes.

The information below provides some context with key messages to communicate to the community.

Burglary is occurring in residential locations. The burglar is entering homes through windows that have been left open, even if only slightly ajar. The burglar will take items of value.

It is thought that the burglar walks from house to house looking for an open window or gap to climb through, in order to carry out the crime. One incident shows that the burglar has reached through a small gap to grab a door key, and then gained access to the house.

Although it may be uncomfortable in this humid weather, the advice is to:

- 1 Keep windows closed
- 2 Remove house and car keys from near front and back doors never have them on show

These small changes should reduce the risk of residents becoming victims of crime in their own homes and make it more difficult for the burglar!

Vehicle crime remains an issue across the area. The most common offence is theft from cars where sadly the owner has left the vehicle insecure, even if the car is parked on a driveway!

Property stolen and favoured by the thief includes sat navs, sunglasses, briefcases and cash. All these items are either in full view or in the glove box.

A number of people have been arrested for thefts, but cars are still being broken into. Residents are urged to lock their cars, to be vigilant and to report (at the time) any suspicious activity. The local team is aware of those who are committing such crime and will continue to stop them by lawful and proportionate tactics. Additional staff are deployed, some in plain clothes, to catch those responsible. Theft from motor vehicles will not be tolerated!

Wiltshire Police - 172 years of public service

Violence against the Person is a concerning issue for police and one that increases fear and uncertainty amongst the community. The problems are not directly linked to the 'night time economy' but do impact on those who are law abiding and enjoying a night out.

The focus on reducing violent crime will remain. However, it requires a partnership approach between the police and the community, sending a clear message to perpetrators that violence will not be tolerated.

Anyone subject to or a witness to assaults (physical or non-physical) need to report what's happening as this is unacceptable behaviour and will be addressed by the police and other agencies.

On a separate note, NPT is noting an issue that should be shared with **dog owners**. Several incidents have occurred involving dogs, such as dogs attacking other dogs with people getting injured trying to separate them and others running loose and biting people.


The key message for owners and those in control of dogs is that they could be held responsible for their dogs' actions if it is deemed that they are "not properly controlled". This could result in control orders or vets' bills being sought at a magistrates court.






Incidents and Calls

Non-Fire incidents attended by WFRS






Transition update

Wiltshire's Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), the new GP-led commissioning organisation which will be responsible for buying local health services in Wiltshire, continues to develop its commissioning arrangements before it applies for 'authorisation' status in November 2012.

The organisation will take up commissioning leadership from April 2013. The organisation has established its Clinical Governing Board, with 14 voting members (consisting of a Chairman, three GPs who will act as 'locality representatives', an additional three GPs, a registered nurse and a secondary care specialist doctor, one Chief Accountable Officer, one Chief Finance Officer, one practice manager and two lay members) and eight non-voting members: (three 'locality' directors, Wiltshire Council's Director of Social Services, the Director of Public Health for Wiltshire, one member of HealthWatch and two lay members).

The CCG is considering its staffing structure whilst developing those commissioning functions it intends to keep in house. It is estimated that the organisation will have around 70 staff members and it will hold responsibility for managing a budget of approximately £460m to support the commissioning of high quality health services in Wiltshire. Working closely with GPs and other clinicians, the CCG will lead on the development of plans and projects which help meet the NHS's required national savings target of £20 billion.

Wiltshire CCG will take up responsibility for commissioning in 'shadow' form from October 2012, with support from the existing Primary Care Trust staff.

Wiltshire CCG Stakeholder Assembly

Representatives from patient groups, voluntary and community organisations, Army Primary Care, Wiltshire GPs and the local council met to discuss Wiltshire CCGs development and priorities across the county when Wiltshire CCGs held its Stakeholder Assembly on Tuesday 11 September.

Seventy Four delegates received presentations about Mental Health, Preventing III Health, Long Term Conditions (including dementia), Planned Care, End of Life, Community and Integrated Care and Unplanned Care & Frail Elderly with the assembly finishing with delegates given the opportunity to take part in a question and answer session with a panel consisting of health professionals and GPs. A wide range of questions were raised covering a variety of themes and attendees welcomed the potential to gain a deeper understanding and to hold meaningful discussions which have an impact on future decision making. The input from GPs was much appreciated as bringing a fresh dimension and honesty to the debate.

Stoptober - Smokefree Campaign

Stoptober will begin on 1 October 2012 and provides a wide range of support, guidance and encouragement for smokers wishing to attempt to go smokefree for 28 days. Stoptober is a positive and supportive campaign to help people achieve their stop smoking goal.

Stoptober is a through the line initiative, incorporating TV, radio, print and online advertising, social media, a regional roadshow, ongoing customer communications and partnership support - as well a full PR campaign and national media partnership.

It will centre around a new Stoptober pack, mobile phone app and 28-day text support programme. These will be available for participants to order and download through www.smokefree.nhs.uk/Stoptober. A range of other collateral including posters, information cards and in-pharmacy assets will be available on the NHS Smokefree Resource Centre www.smokefree.nhs.uk/resources. NHS Wiltshire launches its Neurological Conditions booklet

The fourth annual stakeholder event for people with long term neurological conditions was held at Devizes Sports Club on Friday 3 August.

The booklet has been compiled and created by NHS Wiltshire with input from people living with long term conditions and their carers. It gives information on the services available in Wiltshire and copies are now available for the public.

Neurological conditions include a wide range of conditions from stroke and brain injuries, Multiple Sclerosis, Parkinsons Disease and Motor Neurone Disease, through to very rare often genetic conditions.

Some conditions cause progressive decline and disability whilst others can cause sudden unpredictable periods of symptoms after long periods of general good health.

Update From: ..Melksham Community Area Partnership Date of Area Board Meeting: 10 October 2012 Headlines/Key Issues:

Cross-Community Area Partnership working: Melksham CAP have been working with two other Community Area Partnerships in the area to identify community led, imaginative improvements to public transport, particular bus routes. There are potentially huge savings - £200,000 plus. Wiltshire Council are starting to cut bus services and the concern is whether they're cutting the right ones. Further cross-CAP activity began in September specifically covering the subject of arts and culture.

Community Engagement: Melksham CAP have a stand at the Melksham Food and Drink Festival on Sunday 16th September, and are undertaking an extensive community engagement event at Foundry Close in Melksham on 30th September in order to collect and collate resident's concerns and hopefully establish a community forum (or TARA) on an ongoing basis.

Community Action Plan: The Community Action Plan was updated and reissued at the end of July, and one of the most pleasing aspects of the revision was how many of the identified needs and activities have been completed in the past 6 to 8 months, including the promotion of cycling safety; the opening of two jubilee sports fields which guarantees their status for the future; the opening of a museum for Melksham; promoting the use of the Volunteer Centre, and assisting with the organisation of a Tidy Town day.

Waterways group: MCAP have now facilitated several meetings of a new Waterways Action Group for Melksham. Copies of plans of the proposed Melksham Link are to be placed on public display in a vacant shop window in Melksham as soon as they are available in order to stimulate public comment and feedback.

Projects:

Neighbourhood Plan: The Steering Group continue to be supportive of the concept of a federated neighbourhood plan. Instead of 10 or 11 villages all having their own, we should all get together and do one that covers the area as a whole. This would lead to economies of scale, work and cost. The Partnership would enable this to happen with the support of the board. We would then have a document which will be more influential.

Joint Strategic Assessment (JSA): MCAP intend to attend the JSA for Wiltshire engagement event on Friday 12th October 2012 to establish what's changing in Wiltshire, share information about the JSA programme with local key stakeholders and establish how various agencies are planning to deal with the issues highlighted.

- 6. Semington Village Hall Management Committee seeking £350 for Christmas Lights

1. Background

- 1.1. Area Boards have authority to approve Area Grants under powers delegated to them by the Deputy Leader and Cabinet member for Community Services (27 February 2010). Under the Scheme of Delegation Area Boards must adhere to the Area Board Grants Guidance for funding.
- 1.2. In accordance with the Scheme of Delegation, any recommendation of an Area Board that is contrary to the funding criteria would need the approval of the Leader, the appropriate Cabinet Member or the Cabinet.
- 1.3. In accordance with the Area Board Grants Guidance officers are required to provide recommendations in their report, however, the decision to support applications and to what level is made by Wiltshire Councillors on this Area Board.
- 1.4. Funding applications will be considered at every Area Board meeting.
- 1.5. Melksham Area Board has been allocated a 2012/2013 budget of £49,731 for community grants, community partnership core funding and councillor led initiatives. Following allocation at previous Area Boards, this leaves a total budget of £12,397 for the 2012/2013 budget.
- 1.6. A decision has been made in 2012/2013 that paper copies of funding applications will no longer appear as part of the agenda in an attempt to reduce volume of paper used. However, the application forms will be available on the Wiltshire Council web site and hard copies available upon request.
- 1.7. The 2012/2013 funding criteria and application forms are available on the council's website (<u>www.wiltshire.gov.uk/areaboards</u>) or paper versions are available from the Community Area Manager.
