5	Chairman's Announcements

	a) Wiltshire Passenger Transport Review
	Cllr Killane announced that Wiltshire Council was undertaking a review of Council supported bus services. No decisions had yet been made, and a consultation was open to see how far residents agreed or disagreed with the presented options, or to suggest alternatives. The consultation was open from 11 January 2016 to 4 April 2016.
	b) New Health and Social Care Information Website for Wiltshire
	The announcement was available in the agenda pack. Cllr Thomson announced that with agreement of the Area Board members Ellen Blacker had been funded to fill the role of Malmesbury's Older People's Champion. Parish Councils were advised to contact her to provide community links.

6 Local Youth Network Update and Applications for Youth Funding

Xina Hart, Community Youth Officer, along with Shaina Snashell and Finn Wood, Local Youth Network, were in attendance to provide an update on LYN activities.

The LYN was described as a group of young people and professionals who helped provide positive activities for young people, as described by the young people themselves.

Grants for youth activities could be applied for through the LYN. Activities must be for young people aged 13-19. The application form was available online, which would be evaluated by the LYN once complete. Once evaluated by the LYN a recommendation would be passed to the Area Board for funding.

The CYO would ensure that the right policies and procedures are in place with regards to procurement with regards to grant applications. Grants could be up to a value of £5000 per project and needed to meet the needs, outcomes, priorities and objectives for young people in the area.

Shaina Snashell and Finn Wood provided an update on LYN activities. An after-school Youth Café would be starting from 14th January, 3.45-5.45pm at Malmesbury Town Hall.

It was requested that the Area Board note the LYN expenditure for LYN training and consider the recommendation to award £1800 to Malmesbury Mindreset Project.

Cllr Philip Whitehead - Cabinet Member for Highways and Transport

Cllr Philip Whitehead, Cabinet member for Highways and Transport, was in attendance to provide information on the public transport review.

Currently eleven evening routes were supported, with 350,000 passenger journeys were subsidised yearly. The withdrawal of this could save £639,000 a year. On Sundays and public holidays eight routes were supported, with 150,000 subsidised passenger journeys each year. The withdrawal of this could save £165,000 a year. There were thirteen strategic services support, with 420,000 subsidised passenger journeys each year. Reductions in this could save £430,000 a year. Fifty seven rural services were supported, with over 1million passenger journeys subsidised each year. Reductions in this could save £1.19million a year. Sixteen town services were supported, with 550,000 passenger journeys subsidised each year. Reductions in this could save

£460,000 a year.

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In total 2.5million passenger journeys were subsidised each year. The withdrawal of this could save £5.1million a year.

It was explained that although they knew about the number of passengers, they did not know the impact of the services not being available. A consultation was being held to help gauge this impact. People were encouraged to respond to the consultation, as more answers would provide a clearer picture.

The possibility of community transport was being investigated. It was explained that a decision wouldn't be made until well into 2016.

A question was asked as to whether an "Uber" style scheme could be created for Wiltshire. Crowd-funding for bus services had been investigated. The cost for this type of service was noted as varying a lot.

The total subsidy cost of £5.1million was clarified as being all-subsidy. The cost of free bus passes was £4.9million per year for Wiltshire, which was required to be provided. The Malmesbury area subsidies were noted as being over £1million.

The biggest issue with providing community transport was explained as the number of volunteer drivers. Vehicle availability was noted as not being a problem.

Bill Parks - Head of Service for Local Highways North

Bill Parks, Head of Service for Local Highways North, was in attendance to discuss Parish Stewards, the MyWiltshire App, and insurance for Parish Councils when performing work on behalf of Wiltshire Council.

A useful source of information for highways issues was noted as being the Highways and Streetscene newsletters, which had been published monthly since October 2015. A link to the newsletters would be circulated to parish clerks and members

The MyWiltshire app was described as a source of information relied upon by a number of services. Litter clearing and road sweeping were examples of services which reacted to issues submitted through the app.

It was recommended that issues reported through the app were not submitted anonymously, as this allowed progress to be sent back to the reporter. Issues could be submitted directly through the app, through the Wiltshire Council website, or via phoning customer care to log an issue. As a result of the demobilisation of Balfour Beatty and the retendering of the highways contract an opportunity had become available to reintroduce parish stewards. The stewards would be reintroduced from April with the new contractor.

Parishes were asked to itemise issues which could be addressed by parish stewards. These included issues such as straightening signs and gritting. Parishes were asked list their top five issues in a spreadsheet which would be circulated to all parishes for response to the Community Co-ordinator.

It was explained that Wiltshire Council did not insure volunteers, and that insurance for volunteers working within parish borders usually came from parish insurance. More information was available in the Highways and Streetscene December newsletter.

A question was asked on how someone would know an issue submitted had fallen below the priority level. The November Highways and Streetscene newsletter was referenced as listing and detailing the different service levels.

Instances of not receiving information on when an issue would be treated were raised. It was explained that a change and improvement in this kind of feedback would be seen once the new contractor had started. For now it was recommended to liaise with the Community Co-ordinator for information.

Signage problems were noted as having been an ongoing issue with the outgoing contractor. Bill Parks would talk to Matt Perrott to arrange a time to speak with the parish.

A paper which was received by the Area Board in May 2014 was referenced. The paper presented priorities and an approach to address the priorities. It was noted that more roads had been fixed than ever before. All work scheduled would be performed within two years of prioritisation for major resurfacing. Any details of work that hadn't been performed should be sent to Cllr Whitehead.

A scheme to map out issues would be launched on the MyWiltshire app between the end of March and summer 2016.

Sue Wilkin - Senior Public Protection Officer

Sue Wilkin, Senior Public Protection Officer, was in attendance to discuss No Cold Calling Zones.

The process of setting up No Cold Call Zones had been decided to become a community project. This was so that areas requiring the zones were able to set them up themselves.

Identified areas included those where people living with dementia were being targeted. Prosecution of people targeting those people was difficult without the

presence of a No Cold Call Zone.

It was explained that the scheme was not aiming to stop all people selling door to door. However, if someone going door to door in one of the zones could be arrested if they refused to leave.

Kim Power had helped set up one of the zones, and had previously discussed how successful it had been. A total of 30 zones had been set up. The main cost to the community was the purchasing of signs. Three polycarbonate signs were needed on average per zone, and 10 could be purchased for about £110. Residents are given letters, door stickers, and an information booklet, all of which are funded.

Those interested in setting up a zone were advised to contact Sue Wilkin, who could talk through setting the zone up as a community.

It was asked if a whole village could be set up as a No Cold Call Zone. This was explained as not being a problem legally. However, the cost of signage would need to be considered along with any potential negative impact on businesses within the village.

10 <u>Vicky Oates - Road Safety Unit</u>

Vicky Oates, Road Safety Officer, was in attendance to discuss Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs), Community Speed Watches (CSW), and Metro Counts.

It was explained by Vicky that the 1988 Road Traffic Act placed a statutory duty on Wiltshire Council to promote road safety. Specifically this was to undertake collision and casualty data analysis and to devise programs, including engineering and road user education, training and publicity that would improve road safety.

Metro Counts were described as a test to monitor traffic speeds, times, and vehicle types. Not all metro counts were run by Wiltshire Council, some were performed by developers. Any member of the public could request a metro count, which would be received by the Community Area Transport Group (CATG). Locations for metro counts could be requested in 20/30/40mph zones, but could not be repeated in the same zone within a 12month period without exceptional reasons.

Metro counts were currently still performed by Balfour Beatty as part of the 35% of their contract still in operation until 01 April 2016. Once results are received from the metro count they were analysed and set to the relevant Business Support Officer, the Community Speed Watch Co-ordinator, and the metro count requester. Results were based on the 85th percentile, which was the speed at which 85% of the traffic is travelling at or below. This was the standard method to assess traffic speed in the UK.

A new policy was in place which meant parish councils could install their own SIDs. Parish councils had been asked to apply, preferably in groups, for SIDs. Maintenance, fitting, and refitting, would be the responsibility of the parish council.

It was recommended that SIDs be run for three weeks at a time in each location. Running a SID for longer than this in a single location would have less of an impact.

Guidance was sought on getting a quote for the cost of installing SIDs. Good quality SID units usually cost about £2000. Local landscape groups were explained as now providing quotes to parish councils on installing SIDs. This information would be sent to parish councils.

The importance of providing insurance for working on the side of highways was emphasised, particularly for volunteers.

Cllr Thomson explained that he would discuss with the other Area Board members how to join up parish councils and share SIDs.

d) Campus

Kim Power announced that two open day events would be held at the Riverside Centre/Cotswold House: Wednesday 27th January, 6.00-9.00pm and Saturday 30th January 10.00am-2.00pm. This would be the opportunity to look at the building and comment on the proposed plans for development.

Scott Farlow was introduced as an artist who was co-ordinating a project across all the parishes. The project would be taking inspiration from locality, local identity, and people's imaginations. People were encouraged to take home information and pass it on. An arts option plan would be developed to present a series of art projects. This would be hosted by the Riverside Centre and involve communities across the summer.

e) Highways

The December edition of the Highways and Streetscene newsletter was included in the agenda pack.

f) Town/Parish Councils

No update.

g) Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC)

Clive Barker, Chief Finance Officer, was in attendance to deliver a short presentation on the PCC's precept proposals for 2016/17.

There had been a 12% increase in crime from December 2014 to November 2015. Much of this was explained as resulting from encouraging people to report any crimes committed.

Public confidence in the police was at a good level, and good reports had been received from Her Majesty's Inspector of Constabulary.

The majority of funding for the PCC came through grants (62%), 38% was from Council Tax.

This year's provisional settlement demonstrated a central funding reduction from £63.7million to £63.4million, a £0.3million reduction.

Council Tax for Wiltshire was noted as being the lowest in its region. The consultation was about a proposed increase of 1.9%, which would be an increase of £3.12 per year. A £3.12 increase in Council Tax would provide a budget of £105.695million compared to £103.956million. There would be a funding gap of £2.6million for policing in Wiltshire. It was being investigated how to deal with the gap without losing any police officers.

Consultation was taking place from 16 December until 03 February 2016.

Update from Community Engagement Manager

Ollie Phipps, Community Engagement Manager, was in attendance to provide an update.

Carolyn from Dementia Friends was introduced. Carolyn was working with Wiltshire Council to ensure that all employees had the opportunity to become dementia aware. Dementia friendly communities were being set up across the county. A dementia friendly community was an area where those living with dementia were understood and supported by the community. Carolyn was available to help the process in Malmesbury.

"Singing for the Brain" sessions were already taking place in Malmesbury, along

with Memory Cafés. It was also noted that everyone at the abbey had become a dementia friend.

Packs had been made available for each parish to take away from the meeting. Each pack contained information on community transport, and upcoming Legacy 2016 events. Ollie Phipps and Xina Hart were available to talk to the parish councils on this information and provide help with grant applications.

Executive Summary

Wiltshire Council is undertaking a major programme of investment in highway maintenance over six years, which is delivering a significant improvement in the condition of the county's highway network.

The flooding in 2013/14 had an adverse effect on road conditions, but the additional investment through the Council's 'Local Highways Investment Fund 2014 – 2020' has arrested this deterioration, and the county's road conditions continue to improve.

The investment has been targeted at those roads in worst condition, and includes minor roads as well as the main roads. The programme is just reaching the end of its second year, and has already seen a substantial amount of work completed (see **Appendix 1**).

In 2016/17 it is proposed to increase expenditure on treating the smaller sites, many of which have been outstanding for some time, and to reduce the number of larger surfacing sites.

A list of potential sites for next year has been prepared for each community area (see **Appendix 2**). The site list is based on the existing condition of the roads and the anticipated deterioration in the future, and the area boards are invited to consider the proposals.

It should be noted that the list will probably need to be reviewed during the year as the rate of deterioration of individual roads does vary because of weather and local conditions.

There has been an extensive programme of integrated transport, traffic management and safety schemes carried out in recent years. (See **Appendix 3**). The Community Area Transport Groups (CATGs) have had a vital role in helping prioritise schemes.

The Council is in the process of identifying a 'Resilient Road Network' (See **Appendix 4**), which will form the core network where specific measures would be considered in order to ensure the continuing availability of this route in extreme weather conditions.

Proposals

Area Boards are asked to note the work completed so far in connection with the 'Local highways Investment Fund 2014 – 2020', and consider the list of proposals for highway maintenance in their areas for 2016/17.

The Area Board are requested to note the proposed 'Wiltshire Resilient Road Network', and are invited to comment on the proposed network and any sections of the route of particular concern in their area.

Reason for Proposal

Wiltshire Council has a major programme of investment in highway maintenance over six years, which is already delivering a significant improvement in the condition of the county's highway network.

The views of the Area Board are important in helping identify local priorities for road maintenance, and future programmes of work.

Purpose of Report

1. To advise the Area Board regarding progress on Wiltshire Council's Local Highways Investment Fund 2014 – 2020, and to review the local highway maintenance priorities for 2016/17.

Relevance to the Council's Business Plan

2. The Council's Business Plan sets out the vision to create stronger and more resilient communities. It includes three key priorities and twelve actions that the Council will deliver over the next four years. One of the twelve actions is to 'invest additional money between 2014 -17 to reduce the historic backlog in highways maintenance'.

Background

- 3. Expenditure on highways maintenance declined substantially during the 1990's, and there was underinvestment in roads maintenance nationally for many years. There was an increase in spending from 2000/1, with the introduction of Local Transport Plan funding, but there was still a large backlog of maintenance required on the network.
- 4. In 2014 Wiltshire Council started a major programme of investment in highway maintenance over six years to bring about a significant improvement in the condition of the county's highway network.

Main Considerations for the Council


Local Highways Investment Fund 2014 - 2020

5. The investment is being targeted at those roads in worst condition, and includes minor roads as well as the main roads. Assessments based on road safety information and road condition data has been used to prepare annual lists of priority sites for treatment which are presented to the Area Boards for consideration.

- 6. Some roads need to be treated as priorities in order to address skid resistance and safety problems. As well as addressing the roads in worst condition, improvements are being made to the drainage and footways to bring them up to standard.
- 7. In addition to the larger sites, the Council has also been repairing smaller localised sites which are suffering from deterioration, or which need repairs. This programme of pothole and defect repairs will continue across the county in response to local damage identified through the Council's regular inspections or reports from the public and road users.


Condition of Roads in Wiltshire

- 8. The condition of classified roads is measured by technical surveys carried out using vehicle mounted laser scanners to a methodology established by the Department for Transport (DfT). These reflect the overall road condition and have been reported as National Indicators for a number of years.
- 9. The condition of the classified roads in Wiltshire has improved considerably since 2009/10. The flooding in 2013/14 clearly had an adverse effect on the road network, but the additional investment through the Council's Local Highways Investment Fund has helped stem this deterioration.
- 10. The investment made by the Council over the years has seen a reduction in the length of A Class road where treatment should be considered:



Percentage of A Class Roads in Wiltshire in poor condition

11. The B and C class roads have also improved. There has been a reduction in the percentage of road where treatment should be considered in recent years:



Percentage of B and C Class roads in Wiltshire in poor condition

- 12. The condition data on the unclassified roads is not as robust as for the classified roads, but indications are that these roads are also starting to improve. Data is being collected on the unclassified road network using the same methodology as for the classified roads, but this will take a few years to achieve the same level of detail. Initial analysis of this data indicates that approximately 6% of the surveyed unclassified network is in poor condition.
- 13. The road conditions in Wiltshire have been compared to other south-west counties. Conditions of the A class roads in Wiltshire, based on the 2013/14 figures published by DfT, are broadly similar to those in Dorset and Somerset, but not as good as those in Devon and Cornwall. The B and C Class roads, which are an important part of the network in Wiltshire, have been better than those of the adjoining counties for a number of years.

Highways Maintenance Programme

- 14. There has been considerable maintenance work carried out on the highway network in Wiltshire in the last two years as part of the Council's Local Highways Investment Fund. The list of local sites completed is included as **Appendix 1**.
- 15. During 2015/16 there were a number of sites which it was not possible to complete. These were primarily surface dressing sites, sometimes referred to as 'tar and chip', which is a cheap cost effective way of treating rural roads. However, it does need the underlying road structure to be in good condition as it provides a thin surface to improve skid resistance and seal the road construction, but does not add significantly to the strength to the road.

- 16. In the event the extent of structural repairs required on some of the minor roads proved larger than anticipated, and some surface dressing sites had to be deferred. The process has to be carried out during a short period in the summer, and it was not possible to complete the full programme of works last year.
- 17. There were a few sites which had to be postponed because of public utilities work. This was to avoid the road being dug up soon after being laid. The intention is that that any public utility mains and cables should be laid completed before the road is resurfaced.
- 18. A list of potential sites for next year has been prepared for each community area (see **Appendix 2**). The site list is based on the existing condition of the roads and the anticipated deterioration in the future, and the area boards are invited to consider the proposals.
- 19. In view of the general improvement in road conditions, and the current financial restrictions, it is proposed to defer some of next year's investment until following years. This will reduce the number of larger surfacing sites being undertaken next year, but those where road safety is a serious consideration will still be prioritised.
- 20. The new contractual arrangements following the end of the current highways contract has enabled the Council to establish a direct contract with the surfacing sub-contractor. This has seen an improvement in service with more certainty of delivery with a good quality of work.
- 21. An area where delivery has improved significantly in recent months is with regard to the smaller sites where there is localised damage and potholes. These can be particularly difficult because they often need road closures and diversions to enable the works to be carried out safely. Programming these works, and integrating them with works by other on the network, is a challenge, but good progress is now being made.
- 22. It is proposed to increase the budget for this type of work substantially in 2016/17 in order to address some of the smaller sites which it has not been possible to progress in recent years. It is intended that the local Highways staff will have greater input in identifying priorities, potentially with the CATGs also being involved. The procedures will be developed in more details over the next few months.
- 23. The Council has been carrying out footway and drainage works in conjunction with many of the surfacing sites, but there is a requirement to develop a programme of footway works. Condition data has been collected for the urban footways over a number of years, and is expected to be substantially completed this year. This will enable a programme of footway major maintenance to be identified for consultation and potential implementation in 2017/18.

Integrated Transport Schemes

- 24. The CATGs have proved particularly successful at identifying and prioritising local transport issues, and a number of schemes have been delivered in recent years, with many more being developed for future implementation. See **Appendix 3**.
- 25. It is proposed that this process should continue with the budgets for this type of work continuing for next year. The Area Boards are encouraged to use the CATG process to deal with local concerns.
- 26. The Council analyses the injury accident records in order to identify sites with particular accident problems. These sites are reviewed and where appropriate improvements are proposed. These will continue to be developed, with the CATG kept informed of progress.

Resilient Road Network

- 27. The major maintenance work is improving the condition of the highway network and making it more resilient to extremes of weather. The flooding during 2014 affected a number of key routes in the county, and there is a need to identify a core network where specific measures should be considered in order to ensure the continuing availability of the route.
- 28. The Council already has an identified network of main roads which is the priority to keep open in the event of an extreme snow event. This comprises the busiest main roads, and is about 10% of the network. Once these have been cleared other roads are then treated in accordance with local priorities and conditions. There is a much more substantial network of roads which is subject to precautionary salting when ice is forecast.
- 29. It is proposed that the core network (See **Appendix 4**) should be designated the 'Wiltshire Resilient Road Network', and should be reviewed to determine whether specific measures are necessary to ensure its continued availability in adverse weather conditions of all types.
- 30. Any comments on the proposed resilient network, or areas of concern, would be appreciated, especially with regard to any sections of the route which may be considered particularly vulnerable. The Area Board may wish the CATG to consider the proposed network.
- 31. Extending the length of roads to be included in the core network would not be feasible because of resource limitation with regard to snow ploughing or specific works to improve resilience. If the proposed resilient network is too large it could divert funding away from other roads on the network.

Safeguarding Implications

32. Does not apply.

Public Health Implications

- 33. Increased investment in road maintenance has benefits for public health. The improved road surfaces, better skid resistance and associated safety improvements help reduce the numbers killed and injured on the road network. These improvements complement the other measures to improve road safety, such as traffic calming and speed limits, being introduced through the Local Transport Plan funding and the Community Area Traffic Groups.
- 34. The improved road surfaces, particularly on the minor urban roads, will be of benefit to cyclists and pedestrians. At present the condition of some of the urban roads may discourage cycling as cyclists are adversely affected by poor road conditions and uneven or damaged surfaces. The proposed investment would support the strategy to encourage cycling as set out in the Local Transport Plan.
- 35. Roads in poor condition in urban areas can result in disturbance and noise for residents, especially on busier routes carrying heavy goods vehicles at night. Better road surfaces should result in reduced background noise in residential areas, with potential mental and physical health benefits.
- 36. The Council monitors road collision data in order to focus safety improvements at those sites with the worst accident records. With the additional funding this process will continue, and where appropriate other alterations to signing, drainage, street lighting or road markings could be incorporated into resurfacing work and schemes to improve safety.

Environmental and Climate Change Considerations

- 37. The road network is particularly vulnerable to the effects of climate change. In recent years we have seen the effects of a series of severe winters which have resulted in damage to the roads and an increase in the number of potholes. In 2014 flooding damaged a number of roads in Wiltshire, and increased deterioration.
- 38. In the longer term a more robust highway network, with roads in better condition, would require less reactive maintenance and reduced travelling to respond to potholes and localised defects. A planned maintenance regime would enable the traffic disruption to be kept to a minimum. With unplanned maintenance the delays to traffic and associated fuel consumption could be considerable.
- 39. The identification of a Resilient Road Network for the county will help identify the key areas where measures may be required to ensure the continuing availability of main routes in extreme weather conditions.

Equalities Impact of the Proposal

40. The improvements in road safety anticipated with increased investment in road maintenance would be expected to benefit all road users, but

- especially the more vulnerable, including pedestrians, cyclists and other non vehicle users.
- 41. The highway network is important to local businesses, and to public transport operators. The delays due to un-programmed maintenance and road repairs have been identified as concerns by local businesses. The high profile programme of works to address road conditions will help send the message that transport is important in Wiltshire and could help to promote inward investment and job creation.

Risk Assessment

- 42. There are serious risks in connection with road maintenance. These include the safety and reputational aspects of those killed and seriously injured on the highway network. In order to reduce these risks the Council has approved highway inspection and skid resistance procedures in place, but in order to keep the network in safe condition it is important that the highway network has adequate investment, and the safety issues are prioritised.
- 43. The road condition data collected thorough the technical surveys is used to focus investment on those sites where there is most need and greatest risk. As well as the safety benefits this approach also ensures that best use is made of the limited available funding in order to keep the asset in optimum condition.

Risks that may arise if the proposed decision and related work is not taken

- 44. The risks to the Council from lack of road maintenance are in terms of claims against the Council as the result of accidents, or in extreme cases prosecution as a result of particular incidents. As well as the safety and cost aspects, there are also significant reputational implications of such events.
- 45. Not carrying out highway maintenance would lead to declining public satisfaction in the future as road conditions remain the same and no progress is made on improving them.

Risks that may arise if the proposed decision is taken and actions that will be taken to manage these risks

- 46. There is a risk that the proposals will not deliver the improvements in road condition anticipated. This risk will be managed by using the technical data to focus the necessary investment on those sections of road where work is required to meet safety requirements, and on those places where it would improve road conditions the most. Effective asset management will reduce this risk and make sure the investment is effective.
- 47. There is a risk that the investment will not increase public satisfaction with the service. In view of the initial results from those authorities which have made a substantial investment it would appear that satisfaction levels will

improve with the investment. However, a programme of publicity, branding and public involvement through the Area Boards will help raise awareness of the project, and will help to reduce this risk.

Financial Implications

48. The Council's approved budget has included increased investment to deliver the Council's Business Plan with regard to road maintenance. This has been £24 million for the past two years. It is proposed that £3 million of next year's expenditure will be moved in to future years in view of the improving road conditions and current budget pressures.

Legal Implications

49. The Council has a duty under the Highways Act to maintain the county's roads. The highway inspection procedures, policies and improvement plans ensure that this duty is fulfilled. The increased investment and improved road conditions is helping the Council meet its responsibilities with regard to road maintenance.

Options Considered

50. The Council reviews its proposed road maintenance programme annually in order to make best use of the latest information and take into account deterioration of the road conditions because of weather or other factors.

Conclusions

- 51. The conditions of the road network are important to the public, and this is reflected through the People's Voice and NHT surveys. There has been expenditure above anticipated LTP funding levels in Wiltshire which is improving the condition of Wiltshire's highway network.
- 52. The Highways Investment Fund 2014 2020 over the six years will provide a significant improvement to the condition of the network, including improving the condition of the unclassified roads, and improving safety on the classified roads. The involvement of the Area Boards to help identify local priorities for treatment is important.



Dangerous Driving

At the end of January, 40 year old male from Siddington was given a two and a half year sentence for deliberately driving at cyclists on two separate occasions in 2014 in the area of Ashton Keynes. This was a lengthily investigation with our traffic department taking the lead.

Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service briefing for Community Area Boards January /February 2016

Responsibility for fire and rescue policy has moved from the Department for Communities and Local Government to the Home Office.

The Government has a manifesto commitment to deliver greater joint working between the police and fire service, and it recently consulted on proposals to enable Police and Crime Commissioners to take on greater responsibility for fire services at local level.

Mike Penning has assumed responsibility for the portfolio, becoming Minister for Policing, Fire, Criminal Justice and Victims. He said: "As a former firefighter and now Minister for Policing, I know from first-hand experience how well the police and fire service can work together. We believe that better joint working can strengthen the emergency services and deliver significant savings and benefits for the public. This is about smarter working, reducing the cost of back office functions and freeing up the time of front-line staff."

"This move will have benefits for both services. Fire authorities can learn from the journey that police forces have undertaken on reform over the last five years. Equally, the success of fire and rescue services in prevention holds important lessons for the police."

Fire Service asks drivers to 'mind the gap'

Would a fire engine be able to get to your house in an emergency? That's the question Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service is asking local people.

A fire engine needs clearance of 10ft (three metres) to pass safely. Streets congested with parked cars can delay fire engines and other emergency service vehicles attending an incident.

With more and more households having more than one car, the Service is becoming increasingly concerned that fire crews could be seriously delayed getting to an emergency incident because of inconsiderate parking.

Anyone parking on the roadside is asked to:

- Park tightly to the kerb
- Leave enough space for a fire engine or an ambulance to pass
- Leave extra room near tight corners and never park right on a junction
- Observe double yellow lines they are often there to ensure turning space for larger vehicles
- Fold in your wing mirrors

The Service is now running 'Mind The Gap', an awareness campaign into the dangers of inappropriate parking, with fire crews carrying out leaflet drops in areas where problems are frequently reported.

The Wiltshire & Swindon Road Safety Partnership comprises of Wiltshire Council, Wiltshire Police, Swindon Borough Council and Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service.

They are working towards the following locally agreed targets.

40% reduction in all KSI's*

50% reduction in Child KSI's*

10% reduction in Slight Injuries

These are to be achieved by 2020 and are based against the base averages between 2004-2009.

For the last full year of published statistics in 2014 there were 1574 recorded collisions which resulted in 2157 casualties of which 31 were fatal. The overall cost of these casualties to the community is estimated to be £125 million (*Department for Transport*)

For the two organisations involved, Healthwatch Wiltshire and Wiltshire People 1st, it means an increase in the awareness and understanding of what it's like for people with learning difficulties living in a Wiltshire care home and to test an inclusive approach to engagement and volunteering.

A team of people with learning difficulties have taken part in this new project to check the quality of residential care homes providing support for other people with learning difficulties. For the team of Quality Checkers who took part it meant an opportunity for training, learn new life skills, and to take part in a project which is designed to improve services. The team visited 11 care homes and spoke to residents, empowering them to speak out about their experiences. On the whole they were impressed with what they saw and heard and produced informative reports which included recommendations for improvements after each visit.

Parish Steward Scheme

Whilst the council has operated the Parish Steward Scheme previously, it continues to develop the arrangements and seek improvements.

The below details the current understanding of the new arrangements. It is anticipated that it will take the incoming contractor a number of months to fully implement the scheme, as training will be required, new vehicles supplied and staff will need to learn the new procedures.

The council will expect the scheme to be fully operational by the summer.

The Parish Steward Scheme will:

- 1. Have clear visibility and be immediately associated with the Council
- 2. Comprise personnel who combine excellent communication skills with sound technical knowledge
- 3. Strive for the highest standards of integrity and quality of service
- 4. Engage Town and Parish Councils and members of the Councils in identifying and addressing local concerns
- 5. Deliver a high frequency of visit with duration according to local needs

Programmes will be published. These will be sent to the appointed Parish or Town Council contact and to members of Wiltshire Council via the Local Highways Newsletter. The Newsletter includes seasonal advice and news and information on the scheme.

The programmes will be structured to provide a number of visits each year.

During May and August visits are conducted without prescribed dates. This break enables Stewards to respond rapidly around their area to collaborate to achieve greater objectives or simply to introduce a higher degree of flexibility to the programmes to accommodate annual leave.

During May, grass and other small plants grow very quickly indeed. This can create safety concerns at road junctions and other sensitive locations. It is very important that the Parish Stewards are enabled to address this need.

Ragwort is an invasive weed with a nasty tendency to bring about accumulative liver failure in horses and other creatures exposed to it. The Council has maintained a determined effort to reduce this plant's presence to a minimum. During the end of June or start of July one week is allowed for Parish Stewards and some other resources to remove these plants for incineration. Stewards are of course active in removing this plant at other times as a general duty.

There has always been a need to focus the available public resources on safety matters. It has always been equally clear that all communities respond to the tidy appearance of public and private property. During August Parish Stewards are assigned to the latter area. Hand rails, bollards, parapet rails and ancient mile posts will be prepared and re-painted. When combined with the general duties of traffic sign cleaning the appearance of much of the highway scene it will allow an improved asset. This work is both valuable and popular and makes a clear statement of Wiltshire Council's interest in all of its communities.

Throughout the year a wide variety of emergencies occur across the 2,400 miles of Wiltshire roads. Parish Stewards can move quickly to respond to these problems. The vehicles specially chosen for their proven record of strength and durability. Parish Stewards work to support emergency services where the need occurs. This may be managing traffic, clearing plants and clearing up resultant debris.

During the winter months the twenty Parish Stewards participate fully in keeping as much of the county's network clear and as free of ice as possible.

Throughout the year the weather provides the service with a multitude of challenges; flooding, land slips, fallen trees and collapsed buildings to name but a few. The Parish Stewards work with other resources to meet these challenges whenever or wherever they present themselves.

The Parish Stewards is the first line of resource in meeting the demands of highway maintenance. Parish Stewards are supported by many other resources, most managed locally and a few as a part of annual programmes.

The Parish Steward Scheme is a mobile works scheme comprising elements of programmed, seasonal and responsive work. The scheme achieves greater efficiency by having as much work as possible programmed in advance.

Programmed work offers minimal travelling time with maximum time at the place of work. Every effort is needed to move as much responsive work into a programme as can be done.

The Parish Steward Work lists are programmed in the Local Highway Office. The lists comprise input from Area Highway staff with the Town and Parish Councils.

Parish and town councils have already been given priority sheets. This allows them in advance of any visit to advise the Parish Stewards (through the Area Office) of the local priority work needing to be completed.

Parish Stewards will also have access to the MyWiltshire reporting system. Allowing them in real time to receive reports and feedback on works undertaken.

Parish and Town Council Involvement Evenings

The council is running its annual town and parish council involvement evenings in April.

We would be pleased to see you all there. We have put indicative areas to venues, but you are most welcome to choose a more convenient alternative if you wish.

The usual topics will be discussed, but this year we have the new: highway contract and arrangements; contact arrangements following the split in services; parish and town council involvement initiatives; public convenience policy.

Public Convenience Consultation

The council has only received one notification that a parish council is not interested in taking on the service. Wiltshire Council is now exploring the details of any transfer with the remaining interested parish and town councils.

The public convenience survey concluded on the 11th December 2015 and the council has now had the opportunity to consider the findings.

I summarise the salient results below:

- 1. We have circa 500 responses to the survey.
- 2. Over 95% of the responses were completed by residents.
- 3. Over 65% of those surveyed wished the facilities delegated to town and parish councils.
- 4. Just under 60% wanted better signage at public buildings to show if toilets were available.
- 5. A Community Toilet Scheme assisted by small grants should be introduced to encourage local businesses to open up their facilities to general users.
- 6. As you would expect there were concerns stated regarding any possible closure of facilities.

<u>Urban Grass Cutting Arrangements</u>

The grass season is once again upon us. Wiltshire Council and the Landscape Group have met to discuss the urban cutting arrangements for this year.

I am sure it will not have escaped anyone's attention that last autumn and winter was warm and wet. Ideal grass growing conditions. This means that the grass length is considerably longer than we would like. This will inevitably lead to a slower first cut and visual issues before and after cutting. Wiltshire Council and TGL will endeavour to minimise any issues.

The urban grass cutting will commence when conditions allow in March, weather and ground conditions allowing. As a circle will take approximately four to five weeks, this means that some grass will not be cut until in April.

If you have an area of concerned that is not marked, this can be cut by the Parish Steward on his scheduled visit if that is your local priority.

Shrub and Hedge Maintenance

Through the winter the priority amenity hedges have been cut and the shrubs maintained. In March the amenity hedge and shrub maintenance ceases. Any amenity hedge or shrub not maintained at that time will not receive a visit until the autumn/ winter. If you wish an amenity hedge or shrub maintained that has not managed in 2015/16, this should be reported on your Priority Sheet for the council's attention next season.

Rural Grass Cutting Arrangements

The arrangements will be identical to the 2015/16 arrangements. The same rural verges will be cut at approximately the same time in 2016. If you have a verge that you do not wished cut please put this on your Priority Sheet for the council's attention for this summer's cut.

New Highway Arrangements

The current Wiltshire Highways and Streetscene Contract is to end in March 2016

The Landscape Group will maintain all the amenity services. These contracts will run to 2020 and will not be included in the new Highways contract.

Tarmac will operate the larger works for major road resurfacing and surface dressing and likewise will not be included in the new Highways contract.

Highways Consultancy contract awarded to Atkins December 2012 remains in place and again will not be included in the new Highways contract.

Jackson's will operate the annual rural highway verge cutting operations.

Wessex Tree Care will provide the tree works.

All the other services will be provided by the new Highways contract and I detail the arrangements below:

- Start April 2016
- Last for 5 years, with up to 2 year extension subject to performance.
- Contract will be open to Swindon Borough Council.
- Potential annual value of about £15,000,000

The services included are:

- Local Highways (With the exception of the above)
- Winter and Emergency Service
- Drainage Surveys and repairs
- Street Lighting
- Bridge Maintenance
- Integrated Transport Schemes

Highway Maintenance (with the exception of road resurfacing and surface dressing)

- Respond to flood events
- Respond to other emergencies
